PROCLAMATION SIGNING AND RUN FOR
AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION'S HEART DAY

I. PURPOSE

To sign the proclamation proclaiming February American Heart Month and to run with American Heart Association (AHA) volunteers to emphasize the importance of exercise as a form of preventive health care.

II. BACKGROUND

By a joint resolution, in 1963 Congress requested that the President issue an annual proclamation designating February as American Heart Month. With your desire to do something beyond simply signing the proclamation and the American Heart Association's eagerness to sponsor an event that would draw attention to their mission, this "fun run" came about.

Approximately, 45 runners will participate in the Valentine's Day 2.2-mile run on Hains Point. The runners include 40 volunteers from the American Heart Association along with Congressmen Mel Reynolds, Jose Serrano and David McCurdy. All runners will wear "Heart at Work" T-shirts provided by the AHA.

Before the run, you will meet Jesse Thiess a three-year-old boy with congenital heart disease. He will be accompanied by his six-year-old brother Jimmy and his parents, Lisa and Jim. Jesse will present you with a crystal heart filled with heart-shaped candies symbolizing the 30,000 children born each year with heart disease. He will also announce the start of the run by bellowing: on the mark, get ready, get set, go!

The AHA's president Dr. Edward Cooper and his wife Jean; Nancy Chapman, immediate past president of the AHA's Washington, D.C. affiliation; Dr. Michael Price, president of AHA's Washington, D.C. affiliation; Thom Winkler, AHA's national secretary; and Cass Wheeler, AHA's deputy executive vice president will gather to watch the run. Dr. Cooper comes from Philadelphia and Cass Wheeler travels from Dallas to participate.

The AHA was founded in 1924 by a group of physicians and social workers concerned about the lack of information on heart disease. The Dallas-based non-profit organization has 3.5 million volunteers and spent more than \$218 million during fiscal year 1990-91 on scientific research, public and professional education and community programs related to health.

The theme for Heart Month is "You Can Help Prevent Heart Disease and Stroke, We Can Tell You How."

I guess now that I have these candies I really have no excuse for going to McDonald's after this run.

I want to thank Dr. Cooper, Ms. Colb and the American Heart Association for their work in educating the American public about how to prevent heart disease.

We celebrate "American Heart Month"

because we must never forget the daily toll

that heart disease takes on people of all ages.

More than 70 million Americans currently

suffer from one or more kinds of

cardiovascular disease.

**And approximately every 34 seconds,
someone in the United States dies of some
form of heart and blood vessel disease.**

I have learned, thanks in large part to the American Heart Association, that there are concrete things that we can do in our daily lives to improve cardiovascular fitness: most importantly, eating right and exercising regularly.

At the beginning of my campaign for President, I changed my own eating habits and started jogging on a more regular basis because I knew that I owed it to myself and my family to do everything I could to prevent heart disease.

But we must not only do the things in our own lives to help our own cardiovascular fitness -- we must fight the larger battle against heart disease for each other as well.

I. PURPOSE

You will meet with House, Senate and other leaders at their annual breakfast sponsored by the bi-partisan National Prayer Breakfast Executive Committee.

II. BACKGROUND

The Prayer Breakfast formed in the World War II years when leaders of the Senate gathered to discuss the problems of the war and to pray together. A similar group began in the House of Representatives, and eventually the National Prayer Breakfast emerged. The breakfast is celebrated in the spirit of peace and of Christ; it is multi-denominational. Since 1953, when President Eisenhower attended the first combined Prayer Breakfast with members from the House and Senate, Presidents have attended the event every year.

III. PARTICIPANTS

Over 3,000 persons will attend the breakfast from all 50 states and from 140 countries.

There will be 159 current and former members of the House and 48 current and former members of the Senate at the breakfast.

Mrs. Hillary Clinton, Vice President Gore and Mrs. Tipper Gore will attend the breakfast. The entire Cabinet, the Supreme Court and members of the Diplomatic Corp have been invited; we expect that many will attend.

IV. PRESS PLAN

National Prayer Breakfast
February 4, 1993

I have been looking forward to this event because I knew that we would all be here simply to seek God's help and guidance for our world, for our nation, and for ourselves.

This morning, we put aside our differences and come together as men and women who freely acknowledge that we don't have all the answers, that we need each other, and that we need the love and guidance of God.

For all of us, this is, most of all, a moment for humility.

Yes, my faith is a source of strength for me. But, far, far, more important, it is a source of humility, because it teaches that none of us is a stranger to sin and to weakness. My faith is a source of hope because it teaches that each of us is capable of redemption. And my faith is a source of challenge because it teaches that we must all strive to live according to our beliefs.

Just two weeks and one day ago, when I took the oath of office before God Almighty and my countrymen and women, I said that I could only fulfill my responsibilities with the help of the American people -- and with the help of God.

I need and seek the help and the prayers of people like those in this room, people from every faith and philosophy, people who are ready to assume personal responsibility for the world that we share with our sisters and brothers, the world that we will pass along to our children and grandchildren.

For me and, I am sure, for you, that sense of responsibility is rooted in my religious faith.

For if we truly believe that every man and woman is created in the image of God, then we must respect the freedom and dignity of every person and feel a sense of shared destiny with each other.

Freedom and responsibility are two sides of the same coin, rooted in our belief that all of humanity shares in the spark of divine creation.

As have many of you, I've spoken often of the problems we face, here in America and throughout the world.

We must face those difficulties -- with clarity, and with courage. But also with faith in our own ability to meet those challenges, and with gratitude to God, for the gifts He has given us.

Yes, we have problems. But we also have strengths and resources and opportunities that are the gifts of a loving God and the legacy of the generations that came before us.

As it says in Scripture:

"For the Lord thy God bringeth thee into a good land, a land of brooks of water, of fountains and depths that spring out of valleys and hills..."

[Deuteronomy, 8:7]

And it says further:

"...thou shalt bless the Lord thy God for the good land which he hath given thee." [Deuteronomy, 8:10]

While those words describe the Promised Land, I believe they also describe the land in which we live, a land of promise for many who have come here with nothing but the determination to build a better life.

And here in this blessed land, we have much that we need to keep the promise of America. Our natural resources are the gifts of a generous God; our way of life unleashes the talents of an ambitious people; and our people's skills and strengths can be traced to every culture, every country, and every continent on the face of this earth.

But we need to do more than simply count our blessings. We need to restore and renew our spirit of community and responsibility. We need to remember that, as the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., once wrote, "We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny." **[Letter from Birmingham City Jail]**

I believe that, if only we could come together in that spirit of community and responsibility, we could solve our other problems much more easily.

So I ask you to join me in praying that, as we go forth in the days ahead, the world will know us by our love for God and for each other.

The meeting generally lasts an hour.

Note that the Conservative Democratic Forum would like to meet with you soon. They have some ideas about the economic plan they want to explore with you. Congressman Charles Stenholm (Tx) is the leader. Stenholm is a deputy whip and will be attending the Whip meeting.

The Congressional Black Caucus, the Hispanic Caucus and the Women's Caucus have asked for a meeting with the Chief of Staff and these meetings are being scheduled.

For your information, I am forwarding to you a list of special elections provided by the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee.

There will be four (4) Special Elections held this Spring: in California, Mississippi, and Wisconsin -- in the former districts of Leon Panetta, Mike Espy, and Les Aspin -- and in Ohio. Following is an overview of the four races.

The California primary will take place on April 13, and the General election on June 8. We consider this the safest of the four elections, although a strong Republican candidate could make a surprise showing.

The other three races are more competitive. In Mississippi, there is a non-partisan election, in which a candidate must attain 50% of the vote to win. If no candidate wins a majority of votes, there is a run-off between the top two candidates. In a Democratic district with a 58% African-American population, there is a risk that the Democratic vote will be split, leaving room for a Republican candidate to gain enough votes to qualify for a run-off. The primary is scheduled for March 10; the General for March 30.

The Democratic candidates in the Wisconsin race have little name recognition, which clearly handicaps their ability to raise money. One of the Democratic candidates is Jeff Neubauer, a State Chair. The Republican candidates are stronger and at least one has said that money will be no object for his campaign. The dates of the primary and general elections are determined by the Governor, and will most likely occur in April and May.

The Ohio district is solidly Republican, and has been further strengthened by redistricting. The Democrats do not appear strong enough to significantly challenge the Republicans in this race. The Primary will occur on March 16; the General on May 4.

Given that all four races are -- to varying degrees -- competitive, I believe that the Administration should actively support the Democratic candidates with any available resources. Thank you very much.

Senator Feinstein will press for Norton's selection which is expected to create 4,000 jobs.

The WSF's Flo Hyman award is given to the athlete who represents the spirit, dedication and commitment of Flo Hyman, the 1984 Olympic Volleyball captain who died of Marfan's Syndrome in 1986.

Lynette Woodard, a native Kansan, is the 1993 recipient of the Flo Hyman award. Woodard was the captain of the gold medal 1984 U.S. Women's basketball team, the first woman ever named to the Harlem Globetrotters and is known for scoring more points than any other player in the history of women's college basketball. Woodard was the first female ever elected to the University of Kansas Hall of Fame and is the all-time leading scorer, male or female, at the University of Kansas, surpassing even Wilt Chamberlain. Currently, Woodard plays professional basketball in Japan.

OKLAHOMA CITY ISSUES BRIEFING:

GOVERNOR WALTERS:

A statewide grand jury is heating up its investigation of alleged criminal activity in Gov. David Walters' 1990 campaign. The focus of the grand jury has been allegations that some contributors to Walters' campaign exceeded the \$5,000 limit and that state jobs were promised in return for donations.

On Wednesday, the jury unsealed a 13 count indictment to one of Governor Walters' "Gang of Five," Larry C. Browner. The jury alleged Browner used family members and business associates to secretly make \$30,000 in illegal contributions to Walters' 1990 campaign. He is charged with two felony counts of second-degree forgery, one felony count of conspiracy to defraud the state and 10 misdemeanor counts of violating campaign contribution laws.

It was reported in the Daily Oklahoman, that in Governor Walter's recent trip to Washington, he brought Mr. Browner with him, and introduced Browner to you

Governor Walters has denied any wrongdoing. He has accused the media of targeting him, and challenged the jury to "have a sense of fairness, and ask the other candidates whether or not there are improprieties in their campaign".

THE PLAN:

Reaction to your plan has been lukewarm compared to other areas of the country. News articles with local reactions say most Oklahoman's are willing to do their fair share to get America's economy back on track, but are reluctant to support the plan entirely and want to know more about spending cuts. People are nervous about taxes, and are looking for spending cuts. "Tax and Spend" has gotten a lot of play, especially since the Oklahoma GOP had their state convention last Saturday, and Haley Barbour beat up the plan and the administration during his keynote speech.

People reacted well to the White House staff cuts, and are pleased that government is "contributing" too.

You will most likely be asked about the Energy Tax. In newspaper articles the energy tax was the one part of the plan which brought the most concern. Part of the argument against the energy tax is higher taxes on energy would hurt some of Oklahoma's largest employers, including American Airlines, and some rural areas in the state.

Jerry J. Janisnowski, president of the National Association of manufacturers said in the Daily Oklahoman that in Oklahoma, it

takes 24,800 Btu of energy to produce a dollar of state economic output -- the ninth highest in the nation.

An Oklahoma joint venture is planning a more than \$2 million project to build and open eight natural gas fueling stations -- four of which will be located in Oklahoma city by the end of this year. (Please see attached article)

DEFENSE

Three Oklahoma localities - Tulsa, Oklahoma City, and Lawton - are among 20 finalists for Defense Department finance and accounting centers.

According to the Daily Oklahoman (2/25/93), A Pentagon task force's recommendations on locating the centers have been made and are on Secretary Aspin's desk.

The sites are to be published in the Federal Register on February 12 for a February 15 release date, but rumor has it that there will be an announcement on Monday (3/1/93).

The state legislature has passed a measure that offers an incentive package that allows a state tax subsidy worth an estimated \$8 million a year for 20 years and an incentive package that would provide the city or county that lands the project a quarterly payment equivalent to 5.25 percent of the payroll the center generates for up to 20 years. The state program was designed to fill the gap between what the local government has been able to raise and what is needed to meet Defense Department requirements.

The Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce projects up to 12,000 jobs could be generated by the defense accounting center.

HEALTH CARE

Oklahoma will spend \$500,000 to fund a "telemedicine" pilot project aimed at improving health care in rural areas of the state.

The project will link six rural hospitals to the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences center, giving the hospitals access to medical technology otherwise unavailable. The goal of the plan will be to improve the financial situations of rural hospitals as well as to improve rural medical care.

POLITICAL

Rep. Mike Synar made a speech on the House floor Monday (2/22/93) endorsing the Brady bill.

Sen. David Boren has again introduced legislation establishing 10 federal boot camp centers for young criminal offenders.

Boren, co-chair of a joint committee studying congressional reform, has suggested that former members of Congress be tapped for service on ethics panels.

Oklahoma Republicans spent much of their state convention last Saturday (2/20/93) decrying your economic plan.

Republican Vince Orza has said he would like to run again for Governor. An "Oklahomans for Orza '94" group has begun fundraising.

In attendance at your speech to members of the Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday (2/23/93) was a delegation from the Oklahoma State Chamber of Commerce & Industry.

Companies Plan to Open CNG Stations

A Tulsa-based joint venture is planning a more than \$2 million project to build and open eight compressed natural gas (CNG) fueling stations — four in Oklahoma City and four in Tulsa — by the end of this year, officials said Wednesday.

Three of these CNG units could be operating by April, said Robert D. "Bob" Phillips, president of Kenby Oil Co. and past president of the Oklahoma Petroleum Marketers Association.

Phillips, "marketing principal" in the planned new CNG network, said eight stations would make the venture the state's largest CNG provider, not counting private sources using CNG for their own vehicles.

Texaco sells CNG through a public outlet in Tulsa, while separately, Phillips Petroleum offers CNG at two Phillips 66 retail outlets, one in Oklahoma City and the other on the turnpike between Tulsa and Oklahoma City, Phillips said.

Participants in the first three of the projected eight joint-venture CNG units are Future Fuels Inc., Oklahoma Natural Gas Co. and Fuelman of Oklahoma, operated by Kenby under an agreement but otherwise not corporately linked, Phillips said.

Future Fuels, a Tulsa firm, will provide the investment capital to fund the initial installations and will make their compression systems and supply the fueling equipment and maintenance for the CNG stations, officials said.

"Fuelman is actually just a trade name we use — part of a network of fuel operators in about 15 states that use that same trade name" under licenses from a Louisiana-based organization of fueling outlets, including nearly 90 in Oklahoma, Phillips said.

Fuelman offers an automated, card-access fueling system where fuel is not only dispensed via computer but where transactions are automatically entered for billing and reporting, officials said.

They said that in Tulsa, the Fuelman network operates under the name Commfuel, an automated fueling system which Kenby Oil Co. bought in 1990.

Phillips said initial customers at the planned CNG stations will be commercial and government organizations that have fleets of vehicles in the Tulsa and Oklahoma City areas, and anyone with a Fuelman access card. But he said, "We have the capability to open (the stations) up to the public."

Promoting CNG as an alternative fuel has "sort of been a typical 'which comes first' situation — the public stations or the (converted) vehicles," he said.

"We just decided we're going to put the stations in, and we were able to come up with this joint venture concept where we're spreading the capital costs around, and we're providing locations and the marketing expertise."

The first two Tulsa sites for the joint ven-

ture CNG outlets will be Comfuel stations at 10801 E 35 Place and downtown at Archer and Elgin, officials said.

Phillips said that in Oklahoma City, "we've got one site under lease — on Reno at Agnew — where we're applying for building permits now." A site along Interstate 35 in

south Oklahoma City is also under consideration.

The first two Tulsa stations and the Oklahoma City unit on Reno are expected to be unmanned and automated, he said.

ONG will supply the natural gas at the joint venture's first three CNG outlets, Phillips said.

Our nation was founded by men who so believed in the value of education that they created the first free public school system in the world. Since then, great leaders from Jefferson to Roosevelt to Eisenhower have used education to mobilize America, to give our people the tools they need to flourish in a changing world, and to lift us all to greater freedom and prosperity.

We are once again undergoing fundamental change, with end of the Cold War and ascendancy of a new and extremely competitive global economy. Too many of our students do not, however, have the skills to meet this challenge.

That is why as Governor of Arkansas I worked very hard on developing six new national goals for educational excellence in America. Now as President I am committed to helping every community achieve them, because like our founders I believe that only through an educated America can we continue to offer greater opportunity to every generation of American children.

But no President or Governor alone can or should take sole responsibility to move America forward. Each of us in every community must rededicate ourselves to improving our schools and through them, call America again to a higher purpose.

Pavlychko said. "We would be in one moment a non-nuclear nation. Events in Russia are developing in a very dangerous direction." He said the parliament would ratify START, but added; "NPT is impossible." And he said Ukraine would keep its SS-24 missiles indefinitely. Christopher, according to a transcript obtained by Ukrainian sources, was sympathetic to historic concerns. "For too long, you and the other new independent states lived under tyranny," he said. However, he added: "Retention of nuclear weapons would diminish rather than enhance your security. It would impede, if not imperil, the process of integration into the world community of democratic nations that is the only real guarantee of Ukraine's security."

- o Following the introduction of his proposed health care reform legislation, President Clinton plans to travel to New York for a crime event, reports a White House official. Clinton is expected to release the details of his health care plan on either Wednesday or Thursday. And on Thursday afternoon, "the President is going do a crime event when he goes to New York," said the official.
- o Meanwhile, the crowded Senate agenda means the prospects of a vote on the crime bill this week are "pretty slim," say Senate sources. The Interior Appropriations Bill, along with the DOD Appropriations Bill now in conference committee, suggest action on the crime bill is unlikely this week. And today, debate on unemployment compensation begins. At the center of that debate will be an effort by Senators Hutchison (R-TX) and Shelby (D-AL) to attach an amendment which would repeal the retroactivity of all new taxes in the Clinton budget package that was passed on August 4. As for the chances of a vote on the crime bill, one knowledgeable Senate source told the Bulletin. "It's possible we'd have a vote, but given these other rather substantial obstacles we have to hurdle, the prospects of it being brought up this week are pretty slim."
- o While the Administration gears up to push its crime bill on Capitol Hill, an interagency working group is toiling behind the scenes to develop additional short- and long-term initiatives to combat violence. The White House's Domestic Policy Council has formed an interagency working group -- which includes representatives from a number of Federal departments, including Justice and HHS -- to do a "quick overview" of the problem and potential solutions, and then "come out with a blueprint of suggestions," says Clinton's Domestic Policy Advisor Carol Rasco. "We are working right now on the crime bill and we will be looking at [additional] things that can be done along the way. This is critical. We are looking at the short term and long term," Rasco told the Bulletin.

Rasco was quick to point out that no decisions have been made on potential recommendations and that there is no timetable or deadlines for the working group's efforts. When asked, however, if an anti-violence product would emerge this winter, Rasco responded: "Violence can't wait that long." Among the ideas thought to be under consideration by the Administration's working group are efforts to expand "boot camps" for teenagers. "President Clinton has always thought that boot camps have a very definite place" and "we felt very good about what we did with boot camps in Arkansas, although they were still very new when we left," said Rasco. Also thought to be under consideration is an initiative to increase Federal resources for anti-violence education efforts in the nation's schools.

And while the interagency working group labors behind closed doors, should First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton assume the leading role in the anti-violence project, the effort may gain significant public exposure. And according to a White House official, the First Lady will likely take on the task. "I know that's what she wants to do," said the official. Asked about the possibility, Rasco would only say: "Mrs. Clinton has certainly indicated a deep interest in the issue." And according to a spokesperson to Mrs. Clinton: "She has spoken out about violence, and incorporates it into her remarks about health care. ... Right now, is she planning to chair another task force? I don't think that would be accurate to say at this time. I don't doubt she will play a role in it, but her chairing a task force has not been discussed."

- o The Senate will likely turn back another effort to shut-off debate on the Interior Appropriations Bill tomorrow, say Senate sources. The most contentious issues concern the Administration's decision to legislate land management and grazing fee reforms into the bill. Republican Senators Domenici and Wallop have enlisted the help of some key Democrats, including Colorado Senator Ben Campbell, to lead the fight. "We're going to win it," said a GOP Senate source. "Cloture will not be invoked tomorrow when a second petition comes up. They don't have 60 votes to pass cloture."
- o The GOP House leadership is reluctant to discuss precisely where it and the Clinton Administration will find \$2.35 billion needed to compensate for loss of tariff revenues if NAFTA is to be enacted. On Friday, GOP Whip Newt Gingrich said a "net tax cut" would result if the Administration finds as much as \$1 billion in cuts from federal benefits programs and the remainder from revenue raising proposals which would not technically be considered tax hikes. "There are a number of ideas that are being reviewed," a source close to Gingrich told the

Bulletin this morning. "We'd prefer not to have each commented on. We want to solve this in a way where everybody supporting NAFTA will feel comfortable and I don't think it will be beneficial to that effort to send something up before it's been explained to -- and understood -- by everybody. I think [Gingrich] believes it would be reasonable to hope we'd have a solution to the problem this week; one that the Administration and the strongest anti-tax Republicans could both feel comfortable with."

- o The Agriculture Department said today that school lunches give students more fat and salt than they need while shortchanging them on carbohydrates. The USDA report found that 38 percent of the calories from school lunches come from fat, higher than the 30 percent cap set by government nutritionists. The Agriculture Department subsidizes the program by more than \$4 billion a year through cash payments to help poor students get free or low-priced meals, and through buying food for schools.
