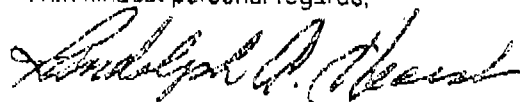
These young people represent the brightest high school students from all 50 states, the District of Columbia and the DoD Dependents Schools Overseas.

INTRODUCTION

In 1962, the United States Senate voted unanimously to endorse a nationwide youth program that would bring high school students to Washington, D.C. for a brief on site introduction to the functions of the federal government and, in particular, the United States Senate.

The program was created and originally authorized by Senate Resolution 324 (see back cover) and continued in succeeding years by unanimous action of the Senate.

The resolution specified that the program should be "supported by private funds with no expense to the federal government." The William Randolph Hearst Foundation made available the necessary funds and, each year, two high school juniors or seniors from each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia have participated in this unique experience.

In early 1981, the U.S. Senate amended Resolution 324 to provide for the participation of the Department of Defense (DoD) Dependents Schools overseas in the Senate Youth Program (see back cover).

THE PROGRAM

The 1993 United States Senate Youth Program will be held in Washington, D.C. from January 30-February 6, inclusive.

The 104 student delegates will be immersed in Washington activities throughout their week's stay. Visits to the Senate, House of Representatives, the Supreme Court and the Pentagon are interspersed with hours at various Smithsonian museums. Delegates will be greeted personally by senators, cabinet members, officials of the Departments of State and Defense and others. They often hear major policy addresses by government speakers and greetings from the President or Vice President have usually been included.

The foundation will pay all expenses for the Washington week including transportation, hotel and meals. (See number 2 under Rules regarding DoD Dependents Schools.)

A nurse will be available to delegates at all times and a physician will be on immediate call throughout the week.

The foundation will maintain insurance (subject to the restrictions contained in Rule 3), in such amounts and covering such risks as the foundation determines, from the time the delegates leave home until their return.

The armed services will provide specially selected men and women officers to act as escorts for the student delegates while in Washington.

HOW TO QUALIFY

Two students from each state and the District of Columbia, and a first and second alternate from each state and the District of Columbia, will be selected by the office of the chief state or district school officer.

The office of the DoD Dependents Schools, Washington, D.C., will be responsible for the selection and confirmation of the Dependents Schools' delegates and alternates.

Alternate delegates will be selected as replacements in the event a primary delegate is for any reason unable to participate in the program's Washington week.

Selection will be based solely on the outstanding ability and demonstrated qualities of leadership as elected high school student body officers of the 1992-1993 school year.

1. Any high school junior or senior student (irrespective of race, color, creed, sex or financial need) is eligible for the program provided he or she has not previously been a delegate to the program, and is currently serving in an **ELECTED** capacity in any one of the following student government offices:

- a. Student body president, vice president, secretary or treasurer
- b. Class president, vice president, secretary or treasurer
- c. Student council representative.

2. Each student must be a **PERMANENT RESIDENT** of the United States and currently enrolled in a public or private secondary school located in the state (including for these purposes the District of Columbia) in which either one of his or her parents or guardians legally resides. A student attending a school which is located in a state other than the state of legal residence of either one of such student's parents or guardians is not eligible.

Exception to the permanent residency requirement will only be made in the cases of the DoD Dependents Schools' students. These delegates will serve the internship under the senators of the state of which the parents/guardians are U.S. legal voting residents.

The high school principal, chief state school officer, or the Washington, D.C. Office of DoD Schools will have detailed information on your state's selection procedures.

RULES

1. The chief school officer from each state, the District of Columbia and the DoD office of Dependents Schools (DoDDS) must submit the names of their two delegates and alternates in writing to the foundation on or before November 1, 1992. **Each state, therefore, will have an earlier deadline in late September or early October.** In addition, the chief school officer and DoDDS must confirm each student's appointment as a delegate or alternate with the student's high school principal.

Once the confirmation of the delegates and alternates is received, the foundation will forward to the delegate a statement of participation to be signed by his or her parents or legal guardians, a copy of the rules and scholarship regulations and other pertinent information relating to the delegate's stay in Washington.

2. The foundation will arrange transportation to and from Washington, D.C. It will be the responsibility of the local school district, local secondary school, parents and/or legal guardians to transport (at their expense) each delegate to and from the nearest commercial airport, bus terminal or railroad station.

The Department of Defense will provide round-trip transportation for the DoDDS delegates from their homes to Washington, D.C.

3. No tours or side trips will be permitted by individual delegates enroute to or from Washington, D.C., or while in Washington, D.C.

4. Each delegate will be the guest of the United States Senate throughout the program and will be required to conduct himself or herself in such a manner as to reasonably assure that neither the United States Senate nor the Senate Youth Program will be discredited as a result of the conduct of such delegate.

5. Rules related to the Senate Youth Program and scholarship awards shall be construed, interpreted and applied by the foundation, whose action and determination shall be final and binding.

SCHOLARSHIP

The William Randolph Hearst Foundation believes it is in the public interest to encourage these outstanding young people to continue their educational development. To this end, the foundation will make available to each of the 104 delegates selected to participate in the program a two thousand dollar (\$2,000) scholarship award, subject to the conditions and requirements specified in the adjoining rules. Additional information concerning the scholarships will be given to the delegates upon their arrival in Washington.

Certificates representing a \$2,000 scholarship award will be presented to delegates during their visit to Washington—often personally by their senators. If the primary delegate is unable to attend the Washington Week, the foundation must be notified in advance. Appropriate disposition of scholarship funds will be determined by the program director.

If a delegate does not intend to make use of the \$2,000 scholarship award during his or her college career, the foundation must be notified in writing on or before October 15 of such delegate's final high school year.

SCHOLARSHIP RULES

These rules will govern the award of the \$2,000 Senator Youth Program Scholarships:

a) To qualify, a student must participate in the Senate Youth Program during its Washington Week. If a selected student is unable to participate, merits of his or her reasons will be considered by the foundation relative to scholarship awards.

b) To obtain scholarship funds a student must, within two years after high school graduation, enroll at an accredited U.S. college or university, pledging to include courses in government or related subjects to his or her undergraduate program.

c) Eligible students must complete an Application for Grant of Scholarship form, have it signed by the dean of admissions or registrar, affixed with the college or university's official seal, and forwarded to the foundation.

d) The \$2,000 scholarship check, when received by the school, is to be designated for the specified student's educational expenses within a four-year period. Funds may be expended for tuition, enrollment and other fees and charges, or room and board provided or approved by the school. Funds not used by the designated student are to revert to the general scholarship fund for utilization at the school's discretion.

e) Extensions of the above time limitations may be considered only in exceptional circumstances. To seek extension of the two-year enrollment requirement, a student must provide the foundation with a reason for the delay by October 15 of the year he or she would otherwise have been required to enroll. In seeking to prolong the four-year scholarship period, a student must promptly notify the foundation of the reason for interruption of his or her education.

f) A student will automatically forfeit eligibility for a scholarship award by failure to fulfill the above rules, or in the event of misconduct as a delegate to the Senate Youth Program.

UNITED STATES SENATE

• RESOLUTION 324 •

In 1962, Senate Resolution 324, submitted by Senator KUCHEL (for himself and Senators MANSFIELD, DIRKSEN, and HUMPHREY), was referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration, and, subsequently, unanimously approved by the United States Senate as follows:

Whereas the continued vitality of our Republic depends, in part, on the intelligent understanding of our political processes and the functions of our National Government by the citizens of the United States; and

Whereas the durability of a constitutional democracy is dependent upon alert, talented, vigorous competition for political leadership; and

Whereas individual Senators have cooperated with various private and university undergraduate and graduate fellowship and internship programs relating to the work of Congress; and

Whereas in the high schools of the United States, there exists among students who have been elected to student body offices in their junior or senior year a potential reservoir of young citizens who are experiencing their first responsibilities of service to a constituency and who should be encouraged to deepen their interest in and understanding of their country's political processes: Now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate hereby expresses its willingness to cooperate in a nationwide competitive high school Senate youth program which would give several representative high school students from each State a short indoctrination into the operation of the United States Senate and the Federal Government generally, if such a program can be satisfactorily arranged and completely supported by private funds with no expense to the Federal Government.

RESOLUTION 146 To amend S. Res. 324 of the Eighty-seventh Congress to provide for the participation of the Department of Defense education system for dependents in overseas areas in the Senate Youth Program.

Resolved, That S. Res. 324, Eighty-seventh Congress, agreed to May 17, 1963, is amended by adding at the end thereof the following new section:

Section 3. For the purpose of this resolution, the term "State" includes the Department of Defense education system for dependents in overseas areas.

It will be the 31st year of the United States Senate Youth Program, the only program sponsored by the Senate and funded by the William Randolph Hearst Foundation.

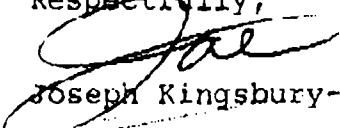
Every President since 1962 has, at one time or another, greeted the student delegates.

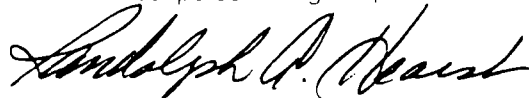

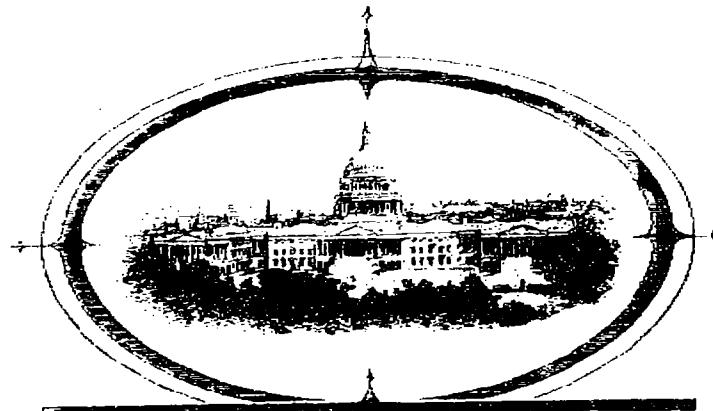

I. PURPOSE

You will meet with House, Senate and other leaders at their annual breakfast sponsored by the bi-partisan National Prayer Breakfast Executive Committee.

II. BACKGROUND

The Prayer Breakfast formed in the World War II years when leaders of the Senate gathered to discuss the problems of the war and to pray together. A similar group began in the House of Representatives, and eventually the National Prayer Breakfast emerged. The breakfast is celebrated in the spirit of peace and of Christ; it is multi-denominational. Since 1953, when President Eisenhower attended the first combined Prayer Breakfast with members from the House and Senate, Presidents have attended the event every year.

III. PARTICIPANTS

Over 3,000 persons will attend the breakfast from all 50 states and from 140 countries.

There will be 159 current and former members of the House and 48 current and former members of the Senate at the breakfast.

Mrs. Hillary Clinton, Vice President Gore and Mrs. Tipper Gore will attend the breakfast. The entire Cabinet, the Supreme Court and members of the Diplomatic Corp have been invited; we expect that many will attend.

There will be only one photo opportunity at the event. When you rise to speak in the Ballroom, press will be allowed into the buffer for a head-on shot. Press invitations are limited, and the press has not been notified that you have confirmed attendance.

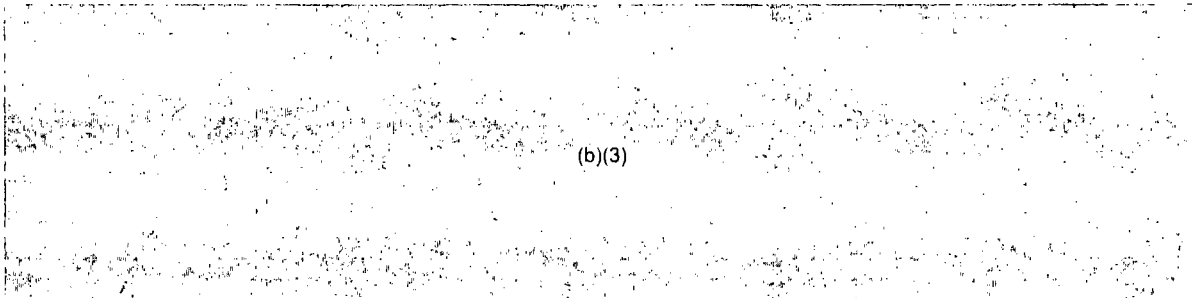

Between Mrs. Mubarak and Mrs. Clinton

Mrs. Mubarak is in Washington on a personal visit, accompanied by her two sons, Gamal (29) and Alaa (32), and Alaa's wife, Hady. Both boys have trained in banking. Before coming to Washington on January 27, Mrs. Mubarak attended a United Nations conference on disaster relief. She speaks excellent English and has accompanied her husband to the U.S. at least seven times.

Mrs. Mubarak is very active in children's issues, education and health care. She is involved in a number of charitable and social service projects in Egypt, as well as several international projects. She is Vice Chairman of the Pan-Arab Council for Infancy and Child Development.

Talking Points

- o The President and I hope that your consultations at Walter Reed and Georgetown were satisfactory. If there is anything I can do to be of assistance, please let me know.
- o I would be interested in hearing about the Friends of the Children's Library organization. What success have you had in getting publishers to allow translation of their childrens' books into Arabic?
- o What are some of the programs you have found most successful in Egypt for helping improve childrens' health and overcoming illiteracy?
- o The President has asked me to look into the provision of health care in the U.S. I would be interested in hearing any ideas you may have based on your experiences in Egypt and the Arab World on the provision of health care to children, particularly for families that are poor.

We have prepared for your review a set of suggested general talking points for your visit with Majority Leader Mitchell and at least 28 Senate Democrats. You know doubt know what you plan to say, but these may be of further assistance.

If there are any questions regarding these talking points, or if there are areas where what we've written seems off-base with the current words and themes you're using, please let me or Christine Heenan know at x2929. In addition, we have attached:

- a one-page summary of words and phrases that best summarize the President's position as defined to date, and a one-page guide of words and phrases to avoid when discussing health care, tailored for the Member/staff audience. (prepared by Judy Feder and Atul Gawande)
- a list of expected attendees.

Preceding your meeting with all the Democrats, you, along with Ira and Judy, will have a private meeting with Senator Mitchell and his Chief of Staff John Hilly. It is likely that this discussion will focus primarily on how federal health care savings are allocated: whether to health reform or to deficit reduction. Mitchell desires that it go to health reform.

As you know, reconciliation is also a likely topic of discussion.

GENERAL TALKING POINTS

HEALTH CARE: COMPLEX AND CHALLENGING ISSUE

- Health care reform is one of the most complex and controversial issues that the President and Congress face. I am under no illusion that achieving success will be easy.
- Democrats were elected in the last election to lead on this issue and I am committed to helping the President and the Congress enact a law that comprehensively reforms the system.

OPTIMISTIC ABOUT CHANCES FOR SUCCESS

- I am optimistic that by working together, we can develop, pass and enact a comprehensive health care initiative this year. There are two primary reasons for my optimism:
 - First, you individually and collectively have been working on health reform and related elements of this issue for years, if not decades. You have accumulated a vast array of knowledge and experience that we can and expect to draw upon over the next weeks and months.
 - Second, I'm encouraged by the constructive and productive transition effort that was undertaken over the last two and half months. It enables us to start from a strong position of understanding where the key players and resources are.

PROCESS DISCUSSION

- Discuss different roles of Interagency Task Force and working groups (it may be appropriate here to reiterate your role)
- Explain that Task Force involves all departments with interest and expertise in health issues (list attached)
- Emphasize policy development roles and responsibilities of Ira and Judy, and their collaborative working relationship
- Briefly discuss how working groups will operate and that they will draw upon recognized, broad-based experts, including members of Congress and their staffs.
- Describe outreach process: constituency outreach, communications plan, etc. Emphasize your intention to avoid the failed public and the media education strategies of previous administrations on this issue.

ROLE OF MAJORITY LEADER MITCHELL AND SENATE DEMOCRATS

– I am well aware that a number of you and your staffs have, over the years, developed an expertise and interest in particular components of health care reform. It is my hope that we can tap this knowledge and experience by asking for direct participation in the working group process. We will be coordinating with all of you on how best to do this.

– The Majority Leader will be consulted with continuously. We will call upon him to share his views and those of the members at every stage of the policy development process.

– The Congressional leadership will also be responsible for arranging frequent and continuous discussions with all interested members to assure that their views are incorporated into the overall policy development process. It is my hope that these meetings will start taking place shortly.

– I'm personally committed to working with all of you. I want to offer you an open door: if at any point in this process you have concerns or advice that our team would benefit from, I'd appreciate hearing it.

SPECIFIC TALKING POINTS ON CLINTON PLAN

The Clinton Plan will build on what's best in our system -- private health care the choice of the world's finest doctors, nurses and hospitals. We need new rules to protect consumers and give Americans security and peace of mind.

- **For controlling costs and reforming the insurance market:**

Bring health care inflation under control through an entirely new insurance system.

- Provide a disciplined budget which limits insurance premiums and medical bills.
- Empower consumers to choose among competing health care plans so that insurers will finally face real competition.
- Ban pre-existing condition exclusions that block citizens out of the health coverage they need.
- Establish a comprehensive benefit package that guarantees that the coverage you need is there when you need it.

- **For assuring security of coverage:**

Expand coverage by building on, extending and reforming the employer-based system, so that everyone is covered.

- Call on employers, individuals and providers to contribute to the cost of health care and to work to keep costs under control.
- Provide subsidies to assist the system's most vulnerable contributors-- small businesses and low-income Americans.

- **For assuring and promoting flexibility:**

Where special needs and circumstances dictate a tailored and flexible approach, insure that flexibility is provided for state and local communities to address their unique concerns in an appropriate manner within the overall context of national reform.

- Assure that rural areas are adequately addressed, both in terms of access and cost containment

I. PURPOSE

You will meet with House, Senate and other leaders at their annual breakfast sponsored by the bi-partisan National Prayer Breakfast Executive Committee.

II. BACKGROUND

The Prayer Breakfast formed in the World War II years when leaders of the Senate gathered to discuss the problems of the war and to pray together. A similar group began in the House of Representatives, and eventually the National Prayer Breakfast emerged. Mrs. Mubarak is in Washington on a personal visit, accompanied by her two sons, Gamal (29) and Alaa (32), and Alaa's wife, Hady. Both boys have trained in banking. Before coming to Washington on January 27, Mrs. Mubarak attended a United Nations conference on disaster relief. She speaks excellent English and has accompanied her husband to the U.S. at least seven times.

Mrs. Mubarak is very active in children's issues, education and health care. She is involved in a number of charitable and social service projects in Egypt, as well as several international projects. She is Vice Chairman of the Pan-Arab Council for Infancy and Child Development.

Talking Points

- o The President and I hope that your consultations at Walter Reed and Georgetown were satisfactory. If there is anything I can do to be of assistance, please let me know.
- o I would be interested in hearing about the Friends of the Children's Library organization. What success have you had in getting publishers to allow translation of their childrens' books into Arabic?
- o What are some of the programs you have found most successful in Egypt for helping improve childrens' health and overcoming illiteracy?
- o The President has asked me to look into the provision of health care in the U.S. I would be interested in hearing any ideas you may have based on your experiences in Egypt and the Arab World on the provision of health care to children, particularly for families that are poor.

We have prepared for your review a set of suggested general talking points for your visit with Majority Leader Mitchell and at least 28 Senate Democrats. You know doubt know what you plan to say, but these may be of further assistance.

If there are any questions regarding these talking points, or if there are areas where what we've written seems off-base with the current words and themes you're using, please let me or Christine Heenan know at x2929. In addition, we have attached:

- a one-page summary of words and phrases that best summarize the President's position as defined to date, and a one-page guide of words and phrases to avoid when discussing health care, tailored for the Member/staff audience. (prepared by Judy Feder and Atul Gawande)

- a list of expected attendees.

Preceding your meeting with all the Democrats, you, along with Ira and Judy, will have a private meeting with Senator Mitchell and his Chief of Staff John Hilly. It is likely that this discussion will focus primarily on how federal health care savings are allocated: whether to health reform or to deficit reduction. Mitchell desires that it go to health reform.

As you know, reconciliation is also a likely topic of discussion.

GENERAL TALKING POINTS

HEALTH CARE: COMPLEX AND CHALLENGING ISSUE

- Health care reform is one of the most complex and controversial issues that the President and Congress face. I am under no illusion that achieving success will be easy.
- Democrats were elected in the last election to lead on this issue and I am committed to helping the President and the Congress enact a law that comprehensively reforms the system.

OPTIMISTIC ABOUT CHANCES FOR SUCCESS

- I am optimistic that by working together, we can develop, pass and enact a comprehensive health care initiative this year. There are two primary reasons for my optimism:
 - First, you individually and collectively have been working on health reform and related elements of this issue for years, if not decades. You have accumulated a vast array of knowledge and experience that we can and expect to draw upon over the next weeks and months.
 - Second, I'm encouraged by the constructive and productive transition effort that was undertaken over the last two and half months. It enables us to start from a strong position of understanding where the key players and resources are.

PROCESS DISCUSSION

- Discuss different roles of Interagency Task Force and working groups (it may be appropriate here to reiterate your role)
- Explain that Task Force involves all departments with interest and expertise in health issues (list attached)
- Emphasize policy development roles and responsibilities of Ira and Judy, and their collaborative working relationship
- Briefly discuss how working groups will operate and that they will draw upon recognized, broad-based experts, including members of Congress and their staffs.
- Describe outreach process: constituency outreach, communications plan, etc. Emphasize your intention to avoid the failed public and the media education strategies of previous administrations on this issue.

ROLE OF MAJORITY LEADER MITCHELL AND SENATE DEMOCRATS

- I am well aware that a number of you and your staffs have, over the years, developed an expertise and interest in particular components of health care reform. It is my hope that we can tap this knowledge and experience by asking for direct participation in the working group process. We will be coordinating with all of you on how best to do this.
- The Majority Leader will be consulted with continuously. We will call upon him to share his views and those of the members at every stage of the policy development process.
- The Congressional leadership will also be responsible for arranging frequent and continuous discussions with all interested members to assure that their views are incorporated into the overall policy development process. It is my hope that these meetings will start taking place shortly.
- I'm personally committed to working with all of you. I want to offer you an open door: if at any point in this process you have concerns or advice that our team would benefit from, I'd appreciate hearing it.

SPECIFIC TALKING POINTS ON CLINTON PLAN

The Clinton Plan will build on what's best in our system -- private health care the choice of the world's finest doctors, nurses and hospitals. We need new rules to protect consumers and give Americans security and peace of mind.

- **For controlling costs and reforming the insurance market:**

Bring health care inflation under control through an entirely new insurance system.

- Provide a disciplined budget which limits insurance premiums and medical bills.
- Empower consumers to choose among competing health care plans so that insurers will finally face real competition.
- Ban pre-existing condition exclusions that block citizens out of the health coverage they need.
- Establish a comprehensive benefit package that guarantees that the coverage you need is there when you need it.

- **For assuring security of coverage:**

Expand coverage by building on, extending and reforming the employer-based system, so that everyone is covered.

- Call on employers, individuals and providers to contribute to the cost of health care and to work to keep costs under control.
- Provide subsidies to assist the system's most vulnerable contributors-- small businesses and low-income Americans.

- **For assuring and promoting flexibility:**

Where special needs and circumstances dictate a tailored and flexible approach, insure that flexibility is provided for state and local communities to address their unique concerns in an appropriate manner within the overall context of national reform.

- Assure that rural areas are adequately addressed, both in terms of access and cost containment

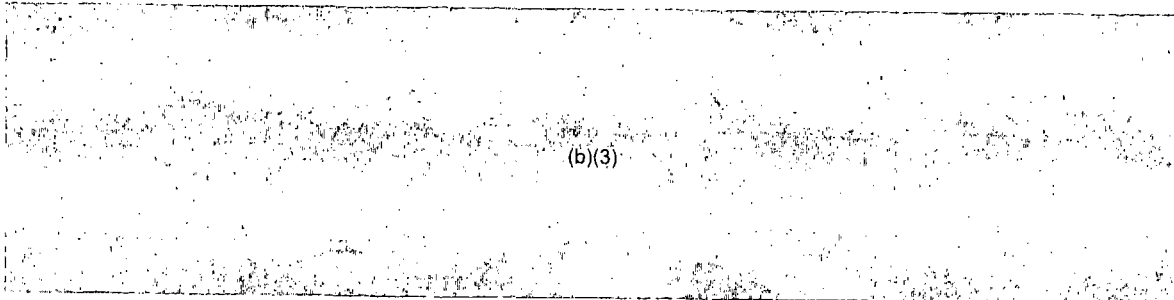

Between Mrs. Mubarak and Mrs. Clinton

Mrs. Mubarak is in Washington on a personal visit, accompanied by her two sons, Gamal (29) and Alaa (32), and Alaa's wife, Hady. Both boys have trained in banking. Before coming to Washington on January 27, Mrs. Mubarak attended a United Nations conference on disaster relief. She speaks excellent English and has accompanied her husband to the U.S. at least seven times.

Mrs. Mubarak is very active in children's issues, education and health care. She is involved in a number of charitable and social service projects in Egypt, as well as several international projects. She is Vice Chairman of the Pan-Arab Council for Infancy and Child Development.

Talking Points

- o The President and I hope that your consultations at Walter Reed and Georgetown were satisfactory. If there is anything I can do to be of assistance, please let me know.
- o I would be interested in hearing about the Friends of the Children's Library organization. What success have you had in getting publishers to allow translation of their childrens' books into Arabic?
- o What are some of the programs you have found most successful in Egypt for helping improve childrens' health and overcoming illiteracy?
- o The President has asked me to look into the provision of health care in the U.S. I would be interested in hearing any ideas you may have based on your experiences in Egypt and the Arab World on the provision of health care to children, particularly for families that are poor.

We have prepared for your review a set of suggested general talking points for your visit with Majority Leader Mitchell and at least 28 Senate Democrats. You know doubt know what you plan to say, but these may be of further assistance.

If there are any questions regarding these talking points, or if there are areas where what we've written seems off-base with the current words and themes you're using, please let me or Christine Heenan know at x2929. In addition, we have attached:

- a one-page summary of words and phrases that best summarize the President's position as defined to date, and a one-page guide of words and phrases to avoid when discussing health care, tailored for the Member/staff audience. (prepared by Judy Feder and Atul Gawande)
- a list of expected attendees.

Preceding your meeting with all the Democrats, you, along with Ira and Judy, will have a private meeting with Senator Mitchell and his Chief of Staff John Hilly. It is likely that this discussion will focus primarily on how federal health care savings are allocated: whether to health reform or to deficit reduction. Mitchell desires that it go to health reform.

As you know, reconciliation is also a likely topic of discussion.

GENERAL TALKING POINTS

HEALTH CARE: COMPLEX AND CHALLENGING ISSUE

- Health care reform is one of the most complex and controversial issues that the President and Congress face. I am under no illusion that achieving success will be easy.
- Democrats were elected in the last election to lead on this issue and I am committed to helping the President and the Congress enact a law that comprehensively reforms the system.

OPTIMISTIC ABOUT CHANCES FOR SUCCESS

- I am optimistic that by working together, we can develop, pass and enact a comprehensive health care initiative this year. There are two primary reasons for my optimism:
- First, you individually and collectively have been working on health reform and related elements of this issue for years, if not decades. You have accumulated a vast array of knowledge and experience that we can and expect to draw upon over the next weeks and months.
- Second, I'm encouraged by the constructive and productive transition effort that was undertaken over the last two and half months. It enables us to start from a strong position of understanding where the key players and resources are.

PROCESS DISCUSSION

- Discuss different roles of Interagency Task Force and working groups (it may be appropriate here to reiterate your role)
- Explain that Task Force involves all departments with interest and expertise in health issues (list attached)
- Emphasize policy development roles and responsibilities of Ira and Judy, and their collaborative working relationship
- Briefly discuss how working groups will operate and that they will draw upon recognized, broad-based experts, including members of Congress and their staffs.
- Describe outreach process: constituency outreach, communications plan, etc. Emphasize your intention to avoid the failed public and the media education strategies of previous administrations on this issue.

ROLE OF MAJORITY LEADER MITCHELL AND SENATE DEMOCRATS

- I am well aware that a number of you and your staffs have, over the years, developed an expertise and interest in particular components of health care reform. It is my hope that we can tap this knowledge and experience by asking for direct participation in the working group process. We will be coordinating with all of you on how best to do this.
- The Majority Leader will be consulted with continuously. We will call upon him to share his views and those of the members at every stage of the policy development process.
- The Congressional leadership will also be responsible for arranging frequent and continuous discussions with all interested members to assure that their views are incorporated into the overall policy development process. It is my hope that these meetings will start taking place shortly.
- I'm personally committed to working with all of you. I want to offer you an open door: if at any point in this process you have concerns or advice that our team would benefit from, I'd appreciate hearing it.

SPECIFIC TALKING POINTS ON CLINTON PLAN

The Clinton Plan will build on what's best in our system -- private health care the choice of the world's finest doctors, nurses and hospitals. We need new rules to protect consumers and give Americans security and peace of mind.

- **For controlling costs and reforming the insurance market:**

Bring health care inflation under control through an entirely new insurance system.

- Provide a disciplined budget which limits insurance premiums and medical bills.
- Empower consumers to choose among competing health care plans so that insurers will finally face real competition.
- Ban pre-existing condition exclusions that block citizens out of the health coverage they need.
- Establish a comprehensive benefit package that guarantees that the coverage you need is there when you need it.

- **For assuring security of coverage:**

Expand coverage by building on, extending and reforming the employer-based system, so that everyone is covered.

- Call on employers, individuals and providers to contribute to the cost of health care and to work to keep costs under control.
- Provide subsidies to assist the system's most vulnerable contributors-- small businesses and low-income Americans.

- **For assuring and promoting flexibility:**

Where special needs and circumstances dictate a tailored and flexible approach, insure that flexibility is provided for state and local communities to address their unique concerns in an appropriate manner within the overall context of national reform.

- Assure that rural areas are adequately addressed, both in terms of access and cost containment

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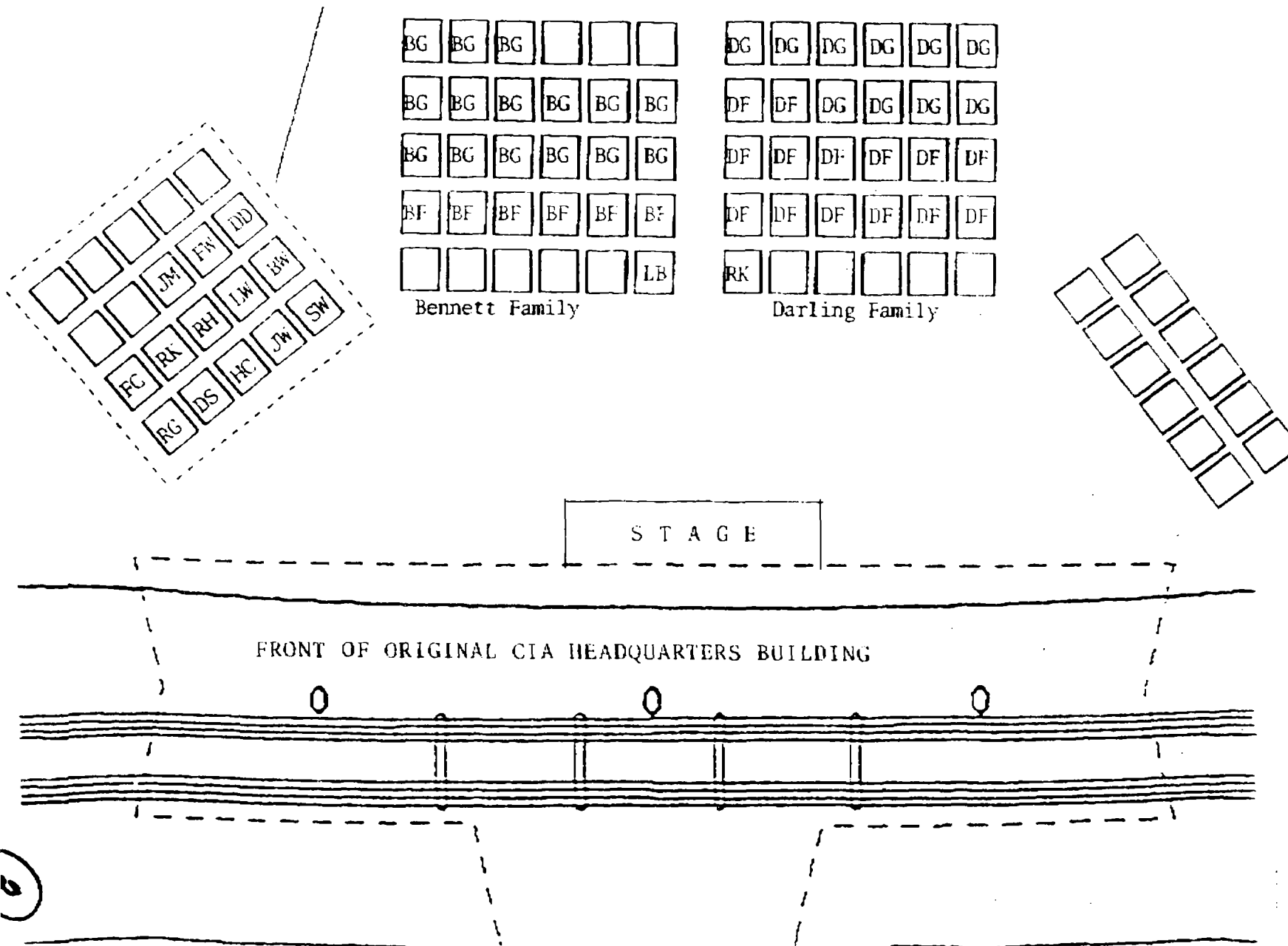
