Blackside Inc., the producers of the critically acclaimed "Eyes on the Prize" docu series about the civil rights movement, has filed a lawsuit in U.S. District Court in Boston against the estate of Martin Luther King Jr.

The company is seeking a judgment that it has the right to use excerpts from the filmed speeches of King in the series, and be allowed to distribute it.

The original six-part series ran in 1987 on PBS and was followed by a second eight-part series in '90. The original series was released on homevideo in October through Pacific Arts; part two is set for April.

Last year, lawyers for King's estate and for his widow, Coretta Scott King, notified the Boston-based producers, as well as the Corp. for Public Broadcasting and Pacific Arts, that further distribution of the shows in schools or on homevideo infringed on copyrighted material. Blackside is alleging that this has had a "chilling effect" on further sales of the series. Blackside is asking for a judgment in which the court would rule that no copyright infringement exists.

I. PURPOSE

Mrs. King asked for this meeting in order to 1) offer congratulations and 2) discuss 1993 plans for the Martin Luther King Federal Holiday Commission. (She will also undoubtedly mention the invitation regarding your attending the 4/30 event.)

II. BACKGROUND

Mrs. King is in Washington to testify before the House Subcommittee Census, Statistics and Postal Personnel (House Post Office and Civil Service Committee). This is the Subcommittee's annual oversight hearing on commissions, etc. (Mrs. King will meet with the President prior to your meeting.)

1993 is a significant anniversary year for the Kings as it is the:

- 25th anniversary of MLK's death;
- 30th anniversary of the March on Washington and Dr. King's "I Have A Dream" speech;

Not surprisingly, Mrs. King and the Commission have a full agenda to commemorate the significance of this year. The agenda for 1993 and beyond include:

- Making the King Federal Holiday Commission permanent;
- Calling for followers and supports of Martin Luther King, Jr. to return to Washington on August 28, 1993 to observe the 30th anniversary of 1963 March on Washington and to begin a "new age of healing, hope and opportunity";
- Expand the annual "I Have a Dream" Youth Assembly to include state assemblies (PA, NC, NY and Arkansas are already moving in this direction);
- Expand their Youth Against Violence Symposiums to all fifty states;
- Expand efforts to bring knowledge of Dr. King, his life, legacy and teachings to millions of more grade and high school students;

Dear Mrs. Clinton:

Civil rights leader Coretta Scott King is throwing her support behind President Clinton's decision to allow homosexuals to serve in the military.

She announced her position in a speech Tuesday at the headquarters of the FBI - the agency that once hounded her and her late husband, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. - where she lauded embattled Director William Sessions for his commitment to hire women and minorities.

"Gay and lesbian people have served in the armed forces with honor from the early days of the republic on down to today, and many have given their lives for the freedom that we enjoy today," Mrs. King said. "Any law that denies them their full citizenship rights has no place in a great democracy."

"If I can stand up for the freedom of black people and all other people whose civil rights and human rights are violated, then I would be inconsistent if I didn't support the gay and lesbian community's effort to be accepted and to have equal rights," she said.

When she strode into the FBI auditorium to a standing ovation from the over-capacity crowd of mainly black agents and office workers, Mrs. King said it was "ironic" that she should speak there in honor of Black History Month.

"The last time anybody from the King family was here was in the 1960s, when the doctor met the director," J. Edgar Hoover, FBI spokesman Steve Markardt said. "History records that as a less than positive experience."

Mrs. King recalled that the bureau harassed her husband from 1962 until he was slain in 1968. Even after his death, she said, "The surveillance of the FBI did not stop. I discovered there was a file on me until way into the '70s."

However, she said, "The FBI of the 1990s has turned its back on the abuses of the Hoover era."

Sessions' predecessor, William Webster, began the "monumental" and "historic" change, but Sessions "has implemented even more far-reaching reforms to make the FBI look and act more like America," Mrs. King said.

Sessions is fighting to keep his job in the face of a critical Justice Department report.

The audience of FBI employees roared its appreciation when she said, "Certainly I never would have accepted the invitation had it not been for your present director."

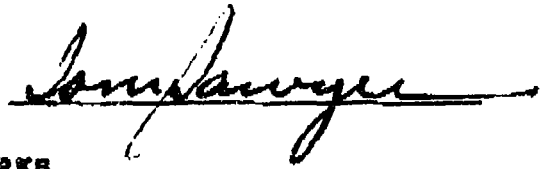
"Regardless of the outcome of this current campaign to discredit you," she later told Sessions, "history will show that you stood firm for a more democratic and inclusive FBI."

The director sat quietly through the speech.

The Justice Department's Office of Professional Responsibility has said Sessions evaded taxes, misused government assets and may have used his position to get a "sweetheart" deal on his home mortgage, among other things. He has denied wrongdoing.

Thomas Susman, one of Sessions' lawyers, said Tuesday that the director's legal team last Friday gave the White House counsel and Acting Attorney General Stuart Gerson a detailed response to the Justice report and an additional, preliminary study on the mortgage.

President Clinton, who has the authority to remove Sessions, has said he will make no decision until his attorney general is sworn in. Nominee Janet Reno's confirmation hearings are not expected to begin until early March.

**8th Annual Observance Of The Birth Of
Martin Luther King, Jr.**

January 23, 1993

Mr. Speaker, on Monday, January 18, 1993, we observed the 64th anniversary of the birth of America's greatest civil rights leader, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Martin Luther King, Jr. was the central force in the civil rights movement during the time of its greatest achievements, from 1957 to 1968. The civil rights movement was not a struggle for Black Americans alone. It was a struggle to ensure equality of opportunity for all Americans. While imprisoned for demonstrating in Birmingham, Alabama, Dr. King issued his "Letter from Birmingham City Jail," in response to his critics. In that letter he stated, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." This statement is just as true today as it was when it was written 30 years ago.

This year is a very special year for the King family and the nation as a whole. 1993 marks the 10th anniversary of the establishment of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission, on which I have the pleasure to serve; the 10th anniversary of the enactment of the King holiday; the 25th anniversary of Dr. King's tragic assassination in Memphis, Tennessee; and the 30th anniversary of the March on Washington and Dr. King's timeless "I Have A Dream" speech.

1993 also will be a year of opportunities. We have a new Administration and Congress that better represent the diversity of our country. Now is the time to renew our commitment to Dr. King's legacy of equality and social progress through nonviolence. Now is the time to address the consequences of rapid change in the racial and ethnic composition of our population. Now is the time to prepare our young people to participate fully in a service-oriented economy that often demands a higher level of skills and training. Following these steps is the only way that we can keep Dr. King's dream alive for all of us.

I want to commend the work of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission. In particular, I want to recognize the selfless work of its Chairperson, Mrs. Coretta Scott King; its Executive Director, Mr. Lloyd Davis; and the many dedicated and committed staff members. When the Commission first began its work, only seventeen States observed the King holiday. Today, thanks to the coordinating efforts of the Commission, all but one

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State observes Dr. King's birthday with a paid holiday, and over 100 foreign countries celebrate the occasion, as well.

In providing assistance and guidance to States and organizations with respect to the observance of the King holiday, the Commission responds to thousands of inquiries and distributes a wide array of educational materials. The Commission also publishes a newsletter, "Living the Dream," which provides information to holiday observers around the country.

Equally important, the Commission has sponsored activities which promote Dr. King's goals of racial equality and nonviolent social change. His teachings are promoted through the Commission's participation in projects on issues such as drug abuse, illiteracy, voter registration, and urban economic development.

This year the Commission is planning some very exciting events. Included among these events are a Unity Ceremony; an observance at the Lincoln Memorial on the 30th anniversary of the historic March on Washington, which will include the dedication of the First Amendment Museum; and the National "I Have A Dream" Youth Assembly.

The First Amendment Museum will honor individuals, such as Dr. King, who went to the Lincoln Memorial to exercise their rights of freedom of speech, assembly, and petitioning the government to redress wrongs. The concept for this museum originated from a group of Scottsdale, Arizona, high school students who wanted to become involved in the democratic process and committed themselves to a project that will help pass on Dr. King's legacy to future generations. While this project was not directly sponsored by the Commission, the Commission should be recognized for the substantial technical and educational assistance it provided to the Department of the Interior.

The 5th Annual National "I Have A Dream" Youth Assembly will be held in Washington, D.C. The first Youth Assembly was attended by approximately 210 young people. Since that time, attendance has grown to over 900. The Assembly is built around Dr. King's appeal for youth to "make a career of humanity" by committing themselves to becoming better persons, helping America to be a greater nation, and working for a finer world in which all persons might live freely with justice and opportunity.

These two events get to the heart of what the Commission is all about: passing Dr. King's legacy and teachings to our children who will shape the future of the community of nations.

As chairman of the Subcommittee on Census and Population, which has oversight responsibility for federal holidays and holiday commissions, I would be remiss if I did not mention that

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the Commission's work has been hampered by a lack of sufficient funds. The Commission received no federal funding prior to 1990, and experienced difficulty developing a successful fundraising program, due primarily to the competition of hundreds of other worthy causes seeking assistance from a shrinking pool of private funds.

Fortunately, support for the King holiday continues to grow. Thus, the commissioners, directors, staff, and volunteers press on.

Achievement of social change through nonviolent means in the former Soviet Union demonstrates the universality of Dr. King's principles and message. As we contemplate Dr. King's influence worldwide, we must face a continuing challenge here at home. It is a challenge to carry out Dr. King's unfinished agenda and a vision which consists of peace, racial and cultural harmony, and inclusiveness.

Now, more than ever before in our nation's history, achieving racial and cultural harmony is a necessary goal and a formidable task. Results of the 1990 census revealed that the fabric of our population is more diverse than ever. Twenty-five percent of us are people of color. During the 1980's, the Black population increased by 13%; the Asian population more than doubled; the Hispanic population grew by 53%; and the Native American population rose by 38%. As we all are aware, cultural and language differences can often lead to social division and economic inequality. As Dr. King stated in his "I Have A Dream" speech, "We cannot walk alone." We can't.

The King holiday presents the opportunity for us to renew our commitment to Dr. King's dream of achieving racial harmony, cultural tolerance, and equality of economic opportunity. His vision must be our vision. His principles must be our guide. His hope must be the hope of our youth.

Sixteen U.S. companies have opened offices or otherwise established economic links to South Africa in the past 1 years, reversing the disinvestment trend of the late 1980s, a research firm said Wednesday.

The Investor Responsibility Research Center Inc. in Washington said the new investments were facilitated by then-President Bush's 1991 executive order repealing a ban on new U.S. investment in South Africa. That ban was included in the Comprehensive Anti-Apartheid Act of 1986.

Three firms invested in 1991, the IRRRC said, and the other 13 went into South Africa last year.

The IRRRC declined to name all 16, saying it wanted to protect its research. But it did say Visa International, Lotus Development Corp. and Cummins Engine Co. Inc. were on the list.

The news was not welcomed by apartheid opponents in the United States.

"It looks like I'll have to deal with this again," said Rev. Leon Sullivan, author of an operating code for companies in South Africa called the Sullivan Principles. The principles called for integration of the South African workplace and fair treatment of workers in the country.

None of the 16 new companies are signatories to the Sullivan Principles, the IRRRC said.

The African National Congress, through its president Nelson Mandela, has said it welcomes investment in South Africa, but only when a new government is in place.

On Feb. 18, the ANC formally agreed to govern jointly with whites and other parties for up to five years after the end of apartheid. The current, white-led government said black people could join the national government in a largely advisory capacity by June.

Sullivan said, "My position still holds that until there is a non-racial government and blacks have the equal right to vote, the sanctions should remain and the objective must be to eliminate apartheid."

"We must keep the pressure up," he said.

Visa vice president David Brancoli said that there are six companies with Visa franchises in South Africa. Asked if Visa had any quandaries about doing

business in South Africa, Brancoli answered: "As long as they (the franchises) observe the operating regulations of the (Visa franchise) program they are members in good standing."

Richard Eckel, a spokesman for Lotus, said his company went into South Africa in 1991 "in a responsible way" and is a "positive element of change in the country." He said Lotus contributes to community development. "They are happy we are there," Eckel said of the South African people.

An IRRC survey found 119 U.S. companies currently have direct investment or employees in South Africa.

The new economic links effectively reverse the disinvestment trend that saw 168 U.S. firms sell or close their South African operations from 1985 to 1990, the IRRC said. Four of the companies on the IRRC list have re-entered South Africa after disinvesting in the mid-1980s.

Steven L. Zeller said Cummins had no investments in South Africa but did contract with an independent distributor with whom they have a "longstanding relationship" of more than 10 years. They also have an employee on temporary duty there, who has been in South Africa for a year, Zeller said.

The anti-apartheid law was enacted after a national campaign that included arrests at the South African embassy in Washington organized by Randall Robinson, head of TransAfrica, an advocacy group. Among those arrested were Coretta Scott King, former President Carter's daughter Amy, singers Stevie Wonder and Harry Belafonte, Jesse Jackson and the late tennis star Arthur Ashe.

"When the all-clear is given, we would want to see the economy resuscitated. That is not the case quite yet. If I had my druthers I would see the corporations wait until we see this change at mid-year," Robinson said Wednesday. "My bottom line is: Wait until it happens."

Alison Cooper, an IRRC spokeswoman, said a number of the 16 companies have a small presence in South Africa. "But it does bump them from one category to another, from no employees to one with employees," she said.

Other companies have chosen not to invest directly but have formed licensing and distribution agreements with South African companies. From July 1991 to the present, the IRRC has found that the number of U.S. companies with non-ownership links to South Africa has jumped from 184 to 299.

In a dramatic appearance at FBI headquarters Tuesday, Coretta Scott King said FBI attempts to smear her slain husband continued after his death and she credited the agency's embattled director, William S. Sessions, with moving the bureau away from such tactics.

"I can stand here before you with faith that the FBI of the 1990s has turned its back on the abuses of the Hoover era," said King, who spoke at the FBI's commemoration of Black History Month. She characterized her selection to deliver the address as "ironic."

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, who died nearly 21 years ago and for whom the FBI headquarters building is named, denounced Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as "the most notorious liar in the country" in 1965 after King questioned the FBI's commitment to civil rights cases.

Under Hoover, the FBI undertook a worldwide campaign to discredit King, including sending materials to his wife questioning his fidelity. The campaign extended to Oslo where King went to accept the Nobel Peace Prize.

His widow, who heads the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change in Atlanta, dismissed a Justice Department investigation that concluded Sessions had repeatedly abused his office. She characterized the probe as "the current campaign to discredit you."

"History will show you stood firm for a democratic and inclusive FBI," King said, producing applause and cheers from the predominantly black audience of about 550 jammed into the headquarters auditorium.

King's appearance came as Sessions issued a new blast at the investigation by the Justice Department's office of professional responsibility, despite requests by the White House and Justice Department to avoid further public comment until the matter is reviewed by the new attorney general. President Clinton has nominated Miami prosecutor Janet Reno for the post and she is awaiting Senate confirmation proceedings.

In a Teletype to all employees, Sessions denied Justice Department findings that he had engaged in a "sham" arrangement to avoid paying taxes for his use of an FBI limousine that brings him to and from work.

Sessions had said he was following the opinion of FBI legal counsel Joseph R. Davis, who concluded that the FBI director would be eligible for a law enforcement tax exemption if he carried a firearm in the vehicle, which he did by placing an unloaded gun in a briefcase in the trunk.

But in his Teletype, Sessions distanced himself from that opinion, saying he has obtained a "thorough and careful" analysis by expert tax lawyers who suggested that he owes no additional taxes and actually should receive a tax refund.

Senior FBI officials at headquarters and in several field offices expressed dismay over Sessions' Teletype communication, saying he had distorted the conclusions of the investigation and presented intentionally misleading information in his defense.

At the headquarters ceremony, the audience murmured assent and surprise when King observed that FBI files show that agents followed her well into the 1970s, several years after her husband's assassination in 1968.

"No one could have predicted 20 years ago that the FBI would become a friend and supporter of the civil rights and human rights movement," King said. "This transformation has succeeded in totally reversing the policies of the FBI. This monumental change is certainly of historic proportions." King credited William H. Webster, who headed the FBI for nearly 10 years before Sessions took over in 1987, for "helping to begin the diversification of the FBI."

"But I give most of the credit to your current director, William Sessions, who has implemented even more far-reaching reforms to make the FBI look and act more like America," she said.

Stating that she had turned down previous invitations to speak at FBI headquarters, King said she never would have accepted "if it weren't for your present director," a comment that drew more applause and cheers.

For three decades, Marcine Shaw has been a pillar of the community. She helped establish group homes for gang members and the disabled. She brought organized sports and literacy programs to youths.

And as senior deputy to former County Supervisor Kenneth Hahn, she cut through red tape to bring health care, food and other services to constituents in Willowbrook, Athens, Compton and other communities in the 2nd Supervisorial District.

But after 17 years of county service and literally hundreds of community meetings, Shaw has retired.

"I think I established a rapport with the community. They knew if they gave me a concern they could relax and know that it would be handled," said Shaw, 62. "And if it couldn't be handled, they would get a truthful answer as to why. I never promised anything I couldn't deliver."

Even though she no longer works in an official capacity, Shaw is no less involved with the people she has served.

She is chairwoman of the Compton Unified School District personnel commission, the Greater Watts Enterprise Zone board of directors and the Lynwood Sheriff's Athletic League. And she is seeking a seat on the Compton City Council.

Before joining Hahn as a staff assistant in 1976, she served 10 years as his appointee to the county Building Rehabilitation Appeals Board. Earlier, she founded the Willowbrook Youth Athletic Assn., which brought Pop Warner football to South Los Angeles youths.

Her living room is filled with mementos of the last 30 years, including plaques, resolutions, paintings and dolls from people and organizations with whom she was involved.

Many community leaders say that in Shaw, they had a key link to Hahn, for years one of the most influential politicians in Los Angeles County.

When Wini Jackson, formerly a Los Angeles County Library public information officer, wanted to develop a program in 1980 to bring in African-American artists and leaders, she broached the idea to Shaw. Shaw took it to Hahn, and the result is the 13-year-old Living Legends series at the A. C. Bilbrew Library in South-Central. The program has attracted author James Baldwin, pianist Eubie Blake and Coretta Scott King.

"I could always go to her and say I have an idea for opening doors for children and she would take it to the supervisor," said Jackson, a community affairs officer with the county Department of Children's Services.

Community leaders recall that Shaw and another Hahn aide stood guard at the Kenneth Hahn Plaza in Willowbrook on the first night of last spring's riots, fending off would-be looters until the National Guard arrived. Shaw, who helped garner community support for the plaza during several years of planning in the early 1980s, said she refused to see those efforts wasted.

"I thought about the '65 riots when people didn't have food (afterward) and I thought, 'You aren't gonna get this shopping center,' " Shaw said.

Shaw's efforts have won her a place on the Promenade of Prominence in Watts, and the community room at the Willowbrook Senior Citizens Center is named after her. Hahn said the recognition is long overdue.

"She was the best field deputy in America," Hahn said. "She was a master at bringing attention to the needs of individual people. She was loyal, efficient and intelligent. If there was a fire, a disturbance or other problem, she was there." DUKE HELFAND
