Dear Mrs. Clinton:

I am sorry that you are unable to speak at the annual meeting of the Committee for Economic Development (CED) in Washington next week, but I understand fully the pressures you are facing as you complete your important work as Chair of the President's Task Force on National Health Care Reform.

Recognizing the complexity and political volatility of the issues your task force is addressing, I would like to offer the assistance of the nonpartisan CED in forging a national consensus on those issues. Accordingly, I would like to invite you to be the Keynote Speaker at a dinner of the CED Board of Trustees -- 250 business leaders and educators -- in New York City in the fall. As we have discussed with your scheduling office, we would like to propose several alternative dates: September 23, September 30, or October 14.

Our plan is to build a two-day program on health care with your dinner address as the centerpiece. The audience would include the CED Board of Trustees, senior business executives from the New York area and throughout the country, and a representative group of economists, educators, and civic leaders. We would expect an audience of perhaps 300. The dinner would be preceded and followed the next day by a symposium focusing in depth on options for U.S. health care reform.

As an objective, nonpartisan, and nonpolitical organization of business leaders, CED would be an especially appropriate forum for stimulating dialogue about a workable health care program among a diverse group from the corporate community. Those attending this dinner (and the symposium) would include the leadership of many of the nation's largest employers, insurers, pharmaceutical and health care companies, important growth companies and heads of major academic institutions.

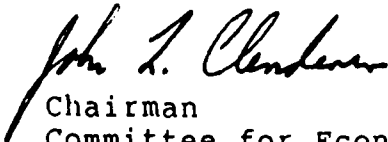

I should point out that CED has no current position on health care reform. Our role would be to serve as a neutral "convener" of those, primarily in the business community, who will have a major stake in the outcome of the health care debate.

We would, of course, work closely with your office in structuring both the dinner and symposium program with a view toward achieving a consensus on major components of a health care program that truly serves the public interest. CED's President Sol Hurwitz will be in touch with your scheduling office soon to see if one of these dates is convenient for you.

RE: Grant announcement during First Lady's visit

This is to provide you with information about the health care event which we think would be ideal for Hillary Clinton to be a part of during her visit here next Thursday.

The event would center on an announcement that the prestigious Robert Wood Johnson Foundation is donating \$1.5 million of \$2 million in grants to the Primary Care Development Corporation (PCDC). The PCDC is the nonprofit entity which will oversee the design and construction of 30 new Communicare centers, an expansion of the Communicare program often referred to as "Communicare II." The City is contributing \$17 million to a PCDC revolving fund, while the grant money will be used for working capital. The Robert Wood Johnson grant is important as a kind of seal-of-approval: It shows that some of the smartest people in health care philanthropy are behind this initiative in a very big way.

Under Communicare I, the city has transformed 20 City-owned health facilities into comprehensive family health centers. The entire Communicare program will result in a total of 50 health centers, serving half a million New Yorkers, within four years.

The PCDC is a unique creation that was designed to give community health organizations that wish to build Communicare centers access to the long-term bond market, using the City's credit. Unlike hospitals, these organizations are not usually considered sufficiently credit-worthy to have a shot at getting these funds. The bottom line is that the City has figured out an innovative way of funding new health centers in economically-strapped times.

This is a perfect event for the First Lady, since Communicare is one of several Dinkins Administration initiatives that are completely in line with what the President proposed in his health care reform package. Communicare centers are small, community-based centers that provide basic, primary and preventive health care in medically underserved neighborhoods, exactly the kind of facilities that are needed if everyone is to be guaranteed access to quality health care.

Another such initiative is the City's successful effort to enroll eligible Medicaid recipients in managed care plans, which both provide quality care and reduce costs. More than 140,000 people have been enrolled to date. This should also be mentioned at the event, since, taken together, these initiatives show that the Mayor has been a leader in health care reform.

We are proposing that the event be held at the William F. Ryan Community health Center, 110 West 97th Street. It's an example of the kind of facility that can be built under Communicare II.

MAYOR DAVID N. DINKINS COMMITTED TO WOMEN'S ISSUES

Building a Diverse Government

♀ Mayor Dinkins has appointed **more women to high ranking positions in his administration than any Mayor in New York City's history**. These posts include two Deputy Mayors, the Chair of the Housing Authority, the Commissioners of the Community Development Agency, the Human Resources Administration, and the Departments of Correction, Employment, Finance, Health, Housing Preservation and Development, Parks and Recreation, and Sanitation, and recently, the acting Director of the Office of Management and Budget. For the first time, **women control more than 50% of the city's budget**.

Caring About Women's Public Health Issues

♀ Mayor Dinkins **ensured that Medicaid funding for abortions** would be preserved, even after the federal government banned the use of federal monies to pay for abortions. Mayor Dinkins also **filed an amicus brief** in the U.S. Supreme Court in March 1992 **urging a reaffirmation of Roe v. Wade**, and wrote to Congress asking to override President Bush's "gag" rule.

♀ Under the Mayor's Office of Children and Families, the Family Violence Initiative utilizes a three-faceted approach to meet the needs of victims of domestic violence. The Initiative has also **expanded domestic violence prevention programs** from 6 to 12 police precincts; has doubled the number of emergency beds for battered women and their children --from 392 to 864-- and is currently developing non-residential services for victims of domestic violence. Additionally, Mayor Dinkins has strenuously lobbied Members of Congress for passage of the Violence Against Women Act.

♀ Held hearings about the impact of environmental hazards on the occurrence of breast cancer and is using the results to **lobby for breast cancer research funds**.

♀ **Ensured that women's health care clinics remained open when Operation Rescue tried to block them** during the 1992 Democratic National Convention. The Mayor has lobbied city, state and federal legislators for passage of a **Clinic Access Bill** to **protect the rights of all women**.

♀ Successfully led a coalition of 30 mayors from around the country to urge the federal government to **allow RU-486 testing in the United States**.

♀ **Instituted CommuniCare**, a new and successful model for health care delivery, providing patients with 24-hour care and preventive medicine. CommuniCare centers provide an alternative to the emergency room in the most medically-underserved neighborhoods. The 12 CommuniCare centers already opened serve over 65,000 New Yorkers, and in the next year additional centers are expected to serve 180,000 people.

Economic Development

♀ Mayor Dinkins created the city's first **Minority/Women-Owned Business Enterprise** program to ensure that, at least, 20% of city contracts are awarded to women and minorities.

Strengthening Families

♀ Mayor Dinkins created the **Mayor's Office for Children and Families** to monitor the policy and implementation of services to children and families provided by all city agencies.

♀ **Opened 15 Family Preservation Program** offices serving communities with the highest number of out-of-home placements in an effort to help families stay together and reduce the number of children entering foster care. The Mayor also created the **Family Rehabilitation Program** for parents with children up to 6 years old, which combines preventive and drug treatment programs, and helps troubled families avert foster care.

Education

♀ Mayor Dinkins created **Beacon Schools**, which provide children and adults with social services and educational opportunities in their neighborhoods. Twenty two Beacons have already been established and, by the end of next year, the city will have 37, with at least one in every school district.

♀ Committed \$13 million annually in city funds for **adult literacy programs** which serve 58,000 adults, nearly two-thirds of whom are women.

♀ **Opened libraries five days a week** and next year they will open six days a week, for the first time since 1947.

Child Care

♀ Mayor Dinkins **increased day care services** for our children by adding over **2,000 publicly funded day care slots**; committed an additional \$20 million in capital funds to accelerate the construction of day care centers in collaboration with the private sector, and developed on-site programs at three city hospitals for children with HIV/AIDS, or whose parents are substance abusers.

Fighting Against Discrimination

♀ Mayor Dinkins appointed a Task Force on Sexual Harassment, chaired by Bella Abzug, which proposed groundbreaking recommendations to **improve sexual harassment prevention policies** and procedures for the city's work force. The Mayor's Commission on the Status of Women is preparing a comprehensive plan to **prevent sexual harassment in city government** which will be a model for the rest of the country.

♀ The Mayor's Department of Consumer Affairs **produced a report describing the unethical practices of divorce lawyers** in their dealing with women clients and suggested reforms to improve this situation. The report also found that gender discrimination occurs in the city in a variety of establishments. Mayor Dinkins ensured that action was taken against firms practicing **price discrimination due to gender**.

♀ Under Mayor Dinkins' leadership, the city established a **Domestic Partnership Registry**, making New York city the largest municipality in the United States to recognize non-traditional families.

BRIDGING PAPER ON THE COMMUNICARE PROGRAM
FOR THE PRESIDENT'S STAFF

September 16, 1993

Introduction

Like other large urban centers, New York City faces two major problems in bringing health care to its underserved communities: (1) financing of care for the uninsured and (2) lack of a primary and preventive care infrastructure to offer appropriate, cost-effective care. The two problems are bound together. A health security card in the absence of services will not provide access. Access is unaffordable in the absence of universal coverage.

The President's program addresses the problem of the uninsured. Mayor Dinkins' Communicare Program builds the infrastructure of needed services.

What is the Communicare Program?

The Communicare Program is Mayor Dinkins' two-phase initiative to expand access to primary care in the underserved communities of New York City.

How does the Communicare Program advance the President's health care reform effort?

Communicare will supply the essential "missing piece" of the health system in New York City's underserved communities--primary and preventive care services. This piece is essential in order for health care reform to:

- o Address the urgent and epidemic health care needs of America's urban communities, including the scourges of AIDS, drug abuse, tuberculosis and other diseases.
- o Maintain effective immunization and other prevention efforts, which cannot succeed in the absence of regular caregivers who take responsibility for the total care of a child or family.
- o Control costs and achieve efficiency by offering low cost prevention and early intervention as an alternative to America's expensive emergency rooms and intensive inpatient and specialty care.
- o Enable the growth of managed care, which cannot occur in the absence of available primary care practitioners who actually manage the care of each patient.

Communicare Briefing Paper - 2 -

September 16, 1993

What is Phase I of the Communicare Program? Phase I:

- o Funded 20 projects to reorganize and expand community based primary care in 13 underserved communities. When complete, these projects will add capacity for 250,000 visits, enough to serve an additional 65,000 New Yorkers.
- o Concentrated solely on primary care offered by its two public agencies--the NYC Department of Health and the NYC Health and Hospitals Corporation.
- o Focused largely on reorganizing and expanding care in existing community-based facilities.
- o Was funded entirely by the City, which invested \$48 million in this program (\$21 million in capital and \$27 million in operating expenses).

What kind of care do community residents receive under the Communicare Program?

- o Care is delivered in community-based facilities located in the communities where the underserved live.
- o Care is comprehensive and family-oriented.
- o Each patient is assigned a personal physician that is responsible for delivering or managing all the care required.
- o Patients have 24-hour telephone access to clinical staff.
- o Communicare Centers offer evening and/or weekend sessions for working families.
- o Physicians are Board-certified or Board-eligible and have admitting privileges.

What is the status of Phase I?

- o Twelve projects are now complete and operating. The remaining seven will be completed within the next 18 months.

What is Phase II of Communicare? Communicare II:

- o Will make available resources to both public and voluntary sector providers to build some 30 new or expanded community-based primary care centers in underserved communities.

Communicare Briefing Paper - 3 -

September 16, 1993

- o Is a much larger and more far-reaching program to expanding primary care. Communicare II will add a new capacity of some one million visits, enough to serve some 300,000 additional New Yorkers.
- o Is a public-private partnership between the City, the State and the private sector. Bringing together the resources of these three partners far exceeds what any one could accomplish alone.
 - The City will offer a \$17 million revolving loan fund for planning and developing new primary care facilities. It will also offer credit support to make available \$250 million in tax exempt bonds for the construction and financing of these facilities.
 - The State will sell the bonds, assure that operating revenues are adequate to support operation of the facilities that are built and supply facility start-up monies.
 - The private sector is funding administration of this effort and will fund support and technical assistance programs to strengthen the facilities built under this program.
 - Voluntary and public sector providers will sponsor and operate the facilities built by this program.
- o Is administered by a small, independent, non-profit organization--the Primary Care Development Corporation.

Why is Communicare II attractive to the President's approach to "reinventing government?"

- o Communicare II is a public-private partnership in which government uses its resources to leverage participation of the private sector.
- o Communicare II is a case example of states and localities taking initiative to solve their own problems.
- o The program is results-oriented. It directs resources for expansion to the front lines--community-based organizations, private voluntary and public providers.
- o It is administered by a small, non-profit organization and does not rely upon building a large, permanent bureaucracy.

Communicare Briefing Paper - 4 -

September 16, 1993

- o Finally, Communicare II offers a model replicable by any state or locality concerned with addressing the needs of its underserved communities.

What is the status of Communicare II?

- o The Primary Care Development Corporation has been established with the assistance of private sector start-up grants totalling over \$2 million.
- o The first project selection cycle will occur this fall and the first primary care projects will enter development by early next year. Construction on each will begin roughly a year later.

My friends, I'm here to talk about health care, and my plan for a healthier New York.

I'm here to talk about the advantage we have, as the world capital of research, treatment, and care -- the city that pioneered everything from penicillin to the pap smear --

And I'm here to talk about the obligation we have, to use that advantage to lift up all of our people.

I'm here to talk about the healthy New York we can build, if we work together --

A city in which health care is a right, not a privilege.

A city in which New Yorkers have the security of knowing that right cannot be taken away from them.

A city which slashes the bureaucracy, lowers the cost, and improves the quality of health care -- all at the same time.

A city in which innovation and compassion go hand in hand.

And I'm here to reject the right-wing Reagan-Bush philosophy that said:

If you don't have the wealth, you can't have the health.

When health was just another line on a grim list of budget cuts --

When infant mortality surged;

When children went without vaccinations and nutrition;

(MORE)

When New York City spent more money to fight tuberculosis than the whole federal government spent nationwide;

When America was the laughing stock of the healthy nations of the world.

I'm here to say: we can do better for our children and families.

And I'm here to unveil my Future-Print for healthy families, and a healthy city -- a 24-point plan of action and compassion.

We've already launched Communicare One, our revolutionary network of primary care centers for those who need health care the most, but can afford it the least.

Under this plan, we will move forward with Communicare Two, which will bring the total number of neighborhood health centers to 50, all across our city.

We're creating an innovative Primary Care Development Corporation -- the first of its kind in the nation.

It will bring non-profit and neighborhood groups into a unique partnership for a healthier New York, and it will give them the financing and the assistance they need to open Communicare centers, and to care for our communities.

And by shifting a broad range of specialized services from the Health Department to our hospital system, we'll ensure that those with special health needs are brought into the full range of primary care and treatment.

This is the right plan for our city. And with President Clinton leading the charge for national health insurance, it's the right time to do it.

But even as both sides of the Congressional aisle are pleading the need for better health care -- in our own city, we find voices of unhealthy opposition.

The Republican candidate shares the right-wing approach that has wounded us so badly -- and he helped to craft that cancerous agenda in the first place.

He was part of the Reagan team that tried to cut the disabled off social security.

He stood by while his conservative cronies used their sharp budget scalpel to transplant bigger bombs for better hospitals.

(MORE)

His own slash-and-burn budget proposal would cut our Health Department so drastically, it would be reduced to the size of a waiting room.

He wants to shut down our critical Department of Mental Health and evict the homeless.

His idea of health care reform is selling off public hospitals to the highest bidder, like used bicycles at a suburban garage sale. And if that means some have to go without health care, that's fine with him.

And his voice is absent from the debate on national health care -- but that doesn't worry me. By the time this campaign is over, he'll have taken several different positions.

Even today, the Republican candidate criticizes my plan -- which he hasn't even seen.

But he offers no vision, no strategy, no plan -- and on the subject of health care, no hope for the future.

You see, we know where the Republican candidate stands -- anywhere and everywhere he can.

And if he tries to convince us he really cares about health care, we know it's nothing more than political plastic surgery.

We have a very different approach.

We believe our hospitals should open their doors to everyone -- from powerful heads of state, to the powerless babies of Bosnia.

We believe that, in a city with so much medicine, no one should go without.

We believe that a mother who has lost her job needs a doctor as much as a mother who is working.

And we agree with Bill Clinton that a few dollars of prevention is worth a thousand dollars in cure.

For me, improving health care is more than a matter of public policy. It's a point of personal pride.

You see, I know what it's like to be without decent care. I raised my two children in Harlem in the fifties and sixties -- while going to school during the day, and working at night.

(MORE)

Today, I am presenting a Future-Print for a healthier New York that is based on two principles:

First, we must keep our health care system the greatest, the most innovative, and the most powerful in the world.

And at the same time, we must make sure that it serves all the people of our city.

We've already made important progress toward that goal.

And my Future-Print builds on the historic successes we have had in our first term, in delivering improved medical services to those people who need it most but can afford it least.

In our first term, we uncovered problems with health care delivery through my two top-to-bottom investigations of our city's public health and hospital systems.

We moved quickly to solve those problems.

I am proud to say that the health care programs I initiated are the model for quality managed care all over the country.

Communicare is bringing the family doctor back into underserved neighborhoods.

It is transforming overburdened, bureaucratic health clinics into full family health centers -- saving money and saving lives.

We've taken more than one-hundred-and-fifteen thousand New Yorkers out of the emergency room and put them into the managed care of quality HMO's.

In fact, ten percent of all New Yorkers on Medicaid are now enrolled in managed care. That's more than we predicted --

More families helped, and more money saved.

Our Department of Mental Health is reaching out to our city's immigrants -- overcoming the language barriers and the cultural barriers, to meet the special health needs of new New Yorkers from around the world.

Our aggressive pre-natal care program has lowered the infant mortality rate in our city by ten percent.

We've become the national leader in AIDS care and treatment -- expanding our all-out assault to meet the new federal definition of the epidemic;

(MORE)

Launching one of the most extensive efforts to prevent AIDS through education;

And reaching out to high-risk communities, such as I.V. drug users.

We've fought one of the greatest public health crises in our nation -- the tragedy of handgun violence.

While the Republican candidate lobbied against a ban on cop-killer bullets --

We broke the iron will of the N.R.A. and passed the toughest local gun control laws in the nation -- including a total ban on deadly assault weapons.

And we realize that we can't improve health care simply through government action.

We've got to help the health care industry to grow and thrive. We've got to encourage talented young people to become doctors, and nurses, and biotechnologists --

And I can't tell you how proud I am that my own daughter Donna became a nurse.

We've got to help nurture the industry from top-to-bottom -- from the world-class research lab to the neighborhood pharmacy.

And we've made a good start.

Offering grants to medical school graduates who take up primary care.

Offering work experience to at-risk junior high school students, pointing them toward careers in health care -- so that instead of needing help, they give it.

Creating the first vision High School for Health Professions and Human Services, to prepare students for the health care jobs of the 21st Century.

And launching a multi-million-dollar training program, to move thousands of New Yorkers from the public assistance rolls into health care jobs over the next three years.

Our efforts have been so successful, even my Republican opponent, in one of his rare references to health care, said he'd like to see our program of primary care centers continue.

(MORE)

But "me-too" isn't good enough.

We need real leadership, and real vision to move our city forward. And that's why I'm here today.

You are all receiving copies of our 24-point plan, "Creating A Healthy New York: A Plan to Promote the Health of All New Yorkers."

Let me share some of the highlights.

It begins with the fundamental premise: if we wait until our people are sick, we'll waste too much time, too much money, and too many lives.

We've got to reach out to New Yorkers when they're well -- and we've got to keep them well.

That's the rationale behind Communicare, which gives the neediest New Yorkers decent, consistent, primary health care.

It's a revolution in health care, and we're leading the way for the entire nation.

We have opened or broken ground on 17 Communicare centers already.

When my vision is complete, and Communicare Two is underway, we will have constructed 50 centers around the city.

The needs of more than half a million New Yorkers will be served by doctors who know their patients and their medical history.

And we'll give neighborhood non-profit groups an opportunity to run their own Communicare centers. Through our highly innovative Primary Care Development Corporation, we'll offer the financing and the assistance they need to build a healthier city -- from the bottom up.

But Communicare Two is only one part of our plan to keep New Yorkers well.

We will launch an unprecedented network of "Wellness Centers" -- bringing an aggressive agenda of health education, basic nutrition, and exercise into our neighborhoods.

We'll reach out to New Yorkers where they live and work -- in community centers, in our Beacon neighborhood schools, in senior centers, in parks and in public housing developments.

(MORE)

We'll teach them to become full partners in guarding their own health.

And when people can't come to us, we'll go to them. We're sending out new mobile health vans, to offer health care on wheels.

We'll bring pregnancy tests to the neighborhoods -- and we'll test for HIV and tuberculosis as well. We'll refer those who need help to our health centers. And we'll wage a front-line battle against chronic health problems in our neediest neighborhoods.

We are also launching a unique Primary Care Outreach Corps -- a corps of young neighborhood outreach workers who will reach out to those in need of medical care, help them get to the doctor's office, and follow-up to see that they're getting the care and treatment they need.

And we realize that, too often, our city misses the opportunity to link people with primary, ongoing health care when they come to a hospital for a health crisis.

So we're stepping up our efforts to reach out a healthy hand.

We're shifting 60 crucial primary care services from our Health Department to our public hospital system -- programs such as Communicare, Child and Dental Health, and Homeless Health.

This way, we'll streamline the system, shred the red tape, and create a single point of entry to our network of care and treatment.

When people enter the system for a specific health problem, we'll introduce them to our entire range of care.

Slowly but surely, we'll make primary care the first resort and emergency rooms the last resort -- instead of the other way around.

And we'll do even more to bring government agencies together to fight for better health. We're asking our hospitals to inform the Department for the Aging whenever they treat a malnourished senior. And we'll link those seniors to one of our meal programs.

You see, I know that, even with a world-class health care system, there are two groups that are in danger of missing out:

(MORE)

The very young and the very old.

We've got to do much more to reach out to children and seniors -- to bring them into the system, and to keep them there.

My Future-Print will help us to do that, through a broad range of innovative new programs, and aggressive expansions of proven programs.

We will launch four new mental health programs to meet the needs of older New Yorkers.

The fact is, the elderly is one club to which we will all gain membership -- if we're lucky, that is. But for too many, the twilight of life is a time of loneliness and fear.

We've got to do all we can to let our seniors know that we care about them; we need them; and we appreciate all they have given us.

We'll offer special support for seniors who are caring for their grandchildren; and we'll offer continuing care for seniors released from the hospital.

We'll start a program of mobile mental health services for the elderly -- to bring evaluation and treatment into their homes.

And we'll create a new telephone re-assurance line for seniors.

We'll do much, much more for those who are at the dawn of their lives as well -- because you can't build your future if you're battling illness.

You can't lead this city into the 21st Century if you can't reach your full potential.

So we are establishing Operation Baby Boost, to give babies with developmental disabilities the early support they need to grow big and strong.

Our prenatal care program has already brought down infant mortality by more than ten percent, and saved millions of dollars in post-natal costs. But I'm still not satisfied.

In the next four years, we will reach women even earlier in their pregnancies, and increase the level of both pre-natal and post-partum care -- to save even more precious young lives.

(MORE)

We'll expand our successful School Health Initiative, to put a medical presence in every single public school over the next four years.

We'll expand the number of Medical Homes for Children with Asthma to a total of 46 centers -- to take these children out of the emergency rooms, and give them a new breath of life and hope.

And I envision a city in which immunization is not a perk for the privileged, but a part of the program.

So I am announcing the most extensive Immunization Day in our city's history, this October 16th, to conclude an unprecedented free immunization drive.

And we'll follow-up by creating a high-tech, computerized immunization registry -- to remind parents and providers when an immunization is due;

And to ensure that every child receives the full course of treatment.

And in addition to our mobile health vans, I believe we must do more to promote the health of New York's women, and to preserve their basic health rights.

You know where I stand on a woman's right to choose. It's never been in question -- and I'm proud that I've taken a stand.

To the Republican candidate, on the other hand, pro-choice means choosing a different position every day.

That's the great irony of Republican politics.

The Reagans, the Quayles, and the Giulianis of the world want to dismantle government's authority and dampen its effectiveness -- except when it comes to a woman's body.

I have a different view. When a woman's body is concerned, government should mind its own business.

And so should the harassers, the protestors, and the right-wing ideologues.

So in July, I asked Speaker Peter Vallone and the City Council to impose tough criminal penalties on those who block access to abortion clinics; or harass women trying to enter them; or otherwise degrade our right to privacy.

And our Future-Print suggests even more for women's health.

(MORE)

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Our hospital system will launch a 25-million-dollar women's health initiative, including expanded screenings for breast cancer and cervical cancer.

Pregnancy testing with same-day results.

Bilingual OB/GYN workers, so a visit to the gynecologist won't be a foreign experience.

Better family planning and education.

And the expansion of domestic violence prevention, counselling, and treatment.

You see, my vision for 21st Century health care is of a city that makes a special effort to reach out -- to help out -- to match our incredible health care resources to our indelible health tragedies.

I'm proud of our commitment to curing tuberculosis. But we'll do more.

We'll continue our program of home visits and intensive therapy.

We'll renovate our T.B. clinics.

And we'll open a Model Center for tuberculosis care -- to develop state-of-the-art care and treatment.

I'm proud of our commitment to those with AIDS and HIV. But we'll do more.

I am proposing the Ryan White HIV Service Corps -- to train a new generation of doctors, nurses, and social service providers -- in exchange for a commitment to AIDS care in our city.

And I will establish a new "air bridge" in partnership with the State and Federal governments and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico -- to provide quality, integrated care for the HIV-positive who travel between our city and Puerto Rico.

I'm proud of our commitment to the health needs of our city's homeless. But we'll do more.

We're starting a Street Outreach Task Force, to reach out to every part of our city, and to offer the services and programs that will lead our homeless to give up a life of mean streets for a life of clean sheets.

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I'm proud that crime is down in every major category for the first time in 36 years, and for two consecutive years -- although we still have a long way to go.

And I'm proud of our commitment to preventing violence -- one of the most devastating health care crises in the nation. But we'll do even more.

We'll expand youth services, and outreach, and education.

We'll put a police officer in every public school, under a new program called C.O.P.S. -- Caring About Our Public Schools.

And our Future-Print for a Safer New York, "Safe Streets, Safe City Two," subtitled "No Surrender," will enable us to do even more to prevent and reduce crime.

Dear Mrs. Clinton:

I'm writing to request your participation in WHAT'S AILING MEDICINE, a national public television documentary I'm producing on health care reform with Walter Cronkite. This ninety minute PBS special report is designed to illuminate and personalize the impact of the Clinton Administration's health care reform plan on patients, providers, and payers.

The documentary portraits we've already edited are emblematic of the fundamental problems that your proposed legislation will address. We would be most grateful if you would consent to an interview in which you would explain how the Clinton plan would alleviate the problems of the people featured in our film. Rather than talking abstractly about health policy, your comments would clarify how the proposed legislation affects the average citizen.

Media efforts to translate these highly complex technical issues into understandable and compelling terms have been largely unsuccessful. A recent New York Times article explains, "The national health care debate, perhaps as much as any news story, is testing journalism's ability to do its job, to explain to people why they should care. Journalists' ability to translate that debate effectively is likely to help determine the fate of efforts to change the health care system." I believe your comments about the powerful documentary vignettes in WHAT'S AILING MEDICINE would make an enormous contribution to the public's understanding of and participation in the upcoming debate.

Although we do not yet know the time frame, we would like to conduct this interview soon after the unveiling of the Administration's plan, because PBS hopes to broadcast the program shortly thereafter. PBS is currently holding a 9:00 P.M. prime time slot on November 5, 1993, but they will remain as flexible as possible about scheduling this program. Based on my previous experience, we can expect about five million viewers to tune in to this broadcast.

Needless to say, we are willing to work around your schedule. We could conduct the interview in New York, in Washington, or in any other city on your travel schedule. We could send you a cassette of the documentary segments before the interview or show them to you during the interview.

I have been reporting on health care for PBS for over a decade. My collaboration with Mr. Cronkite has already yielded three highly acclaimed documentaries: CAN'T AFFORD TO GROW OLD, about long term care for the elderly; BORDERLINE MEDICINE, a comparison of the U.S. and Canadian health care systems; and OUR CHILDREN AT

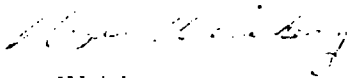
RISK, about access to health care for children. These programs have reached tens of millions of viewers; they've won dozens of broadcast journalism awards; and they've been nationally broadcast numerous times. Ron Pollack, who participated in several of these productions, encouraged me to write to you. WHAT'S AILING MEDICINE EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

WHAT'S AILING MEDICINE with Walter Cronkite, a ninety minute national public television documentary produced by Roger Weisberg and Thirteen/WNET in New York, will investigate the health of America's health care system from the perspectives of its three main participants -- patients, providers and payers. The program represents the continuation of a partnership which, to date, has yielded three critically acclaimed health policy documentaries: CAN'T AFFORD TO GROW OLD, BORDERLINE MEDICINE, and OUR CHILDREN AT RISK.

In order to explain how health care reform will affect the average American, the program will highlight the cases of three patients. Patient A, who has no health insurance, is diagnosed with an advanced stage of cancer after being unable to afford early screening tests. Patient B's employer-sponsored health insurance will not cover a necessary bone marrow transplant, arguing that it is considered experimental. Patient C has Medicare and undergoes coronary artery bypass surgery, but experiences severe post-operative complications. There is considerable controversy surrounding Patient C's procedure due to the fact that she is 88 years old; she had blockage in two arteries and could have been treated medically; and she had her surgery at a hospital with a high morbidity and mortality rate because the hospital does not perform a sufficient volume of open heart surgery.

The doctors of Patients A, B and C will address the growing bureaucracy within their profession and the erosion of their clinical freedom. Many physicians argue that the intrusion of payers into their clinical practice is ruining the sacred doctor/patient relationship and makes them feel pressured to satisfy third parties who are more interested in cost containment than patient well-being. They will also discuss the growing malpractice crisis and explain how the omnipresent fear of lawsuits pervades the life of the doctor, affecting all of his clinical decisions.

Finally, we will look at those who really pay the bills for Patients A, B and C. We will see how we all pick up the tab for patients who don't have health insurance, whether in the form of higher taxes or through higher medical premiums. Employers will discuss the crippling effect that soaring medical costs are having on their businesses and on international competitiveness, and government and health officials will discuss the difficulty of separating useful treatment from useless treatment.

At no time in our recent history has there been a greater consensus about the need to reform our beleaguered health care system. Nevertheless, there is massive confusion about how the reform will work and how to achieve the appropriate balance of government regulation and free market competition. WHAT'S AILING MEDICINE will examine the pressures faced by patients, providers, and payers under our current health care system. But most importantly, WHAT'S AILING MEDICINE will feature public policy experts who will offer a vision of reform designed to alleviate the problems portrayed in the documentary. Instead of reciting a litany of grim statistics about our nation's health care, the program will put a human face on the health care crisis and will clarify the opportunity for reform at this critical juncture.

ABOUT THE PRODUCER

Roger Weisberg, producer, director, and writer, joined WNET/Thirteen, New York in 1976. During 1978-79, he was a producer of the Emmy Award-winning series, *HELP YOURSELF*. He produced dozens of programs on subjects like aging, child abuse, wife battery, consumer fraud, divorce, credit and money management, housing, and neighborhood revitalization.

During 1979-80, Weisberg was producer of the national public television special *BACK WARDS TO BACK STREETS*, a documentary on the deinstitutionalization of the mentally ill, which won awards from the New York State Broadcasters' Association, and the 1981 Rehabilitation Film Festival.

During 1980-81, Weisberg produced and directed *NO PLACE LIKE HOME*, a documentary which analyzed long term care options for the frail elderly hosted by Helen Hayes. *NO PLACE LIKE HOME* was awarded a Gabriel Award, an American Film Festival Award, the Robert F. Kennedy Journalism Award "for outstanding reporting on the problems of the disadvantaged," and an Alfred I. DuPont-Columbia University Citation.

During 1982-83, Weisberg produced and directed, *OLD ENOUGH TO DO TIME*, a documentary which examined changing juvenile justice policies across the nation hosted by Daniel J. Travanti. *OLD ENOUGH TO DO TIME* was honored with an award from the International Film and Television Festival of New York, a Silver Gavel from the American Bar Association, and an Emmy nomination.

During 1984-86, Weisberg produced and directed *HEALTH CARE ON THE CRITICAL LIST*, a documentary on health care cost-containment hosted by Jack Klugman, and *POWER STRUGGLE*, a documentary on alternative energy sources hosted by Meryl Streep. *HEALTH CARE ON THE CRITICAL LIST* won a Golden Gate Award at the San Francisco International Film and Television Festival. *POWER STRUGGLE* won a blue ribbon at the 1986 American Film and Video Festival and additional awards at the International Film and TV Festival of New York, and The National Educational Film and Video Festival.

In 1987, Weisberg produced and directed *WHO LIVES, WHO DIES*, a documentary on rationing medical care in the United States hosted by James Earl Jones. *WHO LIVES, WHO DIES* won a gold medal and a special Consumer Education award at the John Muir Medical Film Festival. The program also won first prize at the American Journal of Nursing Media Festival, and top awards at the National Educational Film and Video Festival, and Health Sciences and Communications Media Festival.

In 1988, Weisberg produced and directed *TO WHAT END?*, a documentary on the role of nuclear weapons in national security hosted by Marvin Kalb. *TO WHAT END?* was nominated for an Olive Branch Award.

In 1989, he produced and directed *CAN'T AFFORD TO GROW OLD*, a documentary on long term care for the elderly that was hosted and narrated by Walter Cronkite. *CAN'T AFFORD TO GROW OLD* won First Prize at the Retirement Research Foundation's National Media Awards, and top awards from the National Educational Film and Video Festival, the Birmingham International Educational Film and Video Festival, and the Health Sciences and Communications Media Festival.

In 1990, Weisberg produced and directed *BORDERLINE MEDICINE*, a documentary comparing the U.S. and Canadian health care systems hosted by Walter Cronkite. *BORDERLINE MEDICINE* won top honors in the International Health and Medical Film Festival, a Blue Ribbon Award in the American Film Festival, a Gold Award in the Houston International Film Festival, a Silver Screen Award in the U.S. Industrial Film and Video Festival, and a Golden Eagle from the Council on International Nontheatrical Events (CINE).

In 1991, Weisberg produced and directed *OUR CHILDREN AT RISK*, a one hour documentary hosted by Walter Cronkite which examines the crisis of child poverty and health care delivery for the nation's disadvantaged children. *OUR CHILDREN AT RISK* has won top honors at the American Film Festival and the National Educational Film and Video Festival.

In 1992, Weisberg produced and directed *ROAD SCHOLAR*, a feature-length documentary chronicling the cross-country trip of Romanian-born poet and NPR radio commentator Andrei Codrescu. The film has already participated in dozens of domestic and international film festivals. It won several awards including a Cine Golden Eagle, and top honors at the Columbus International Film Festival, the San Francisco International Film Festival, the Seattle Film Festival, and the National Educational Film and Video Festival. It is currently being released in theaters across the country by the Samuel Goldwyn Co. A 55-minute version of the film was also produced for the PBS' *TRAVELS* series and Hyperion Press has published a companion book also entitled Road Scholar.

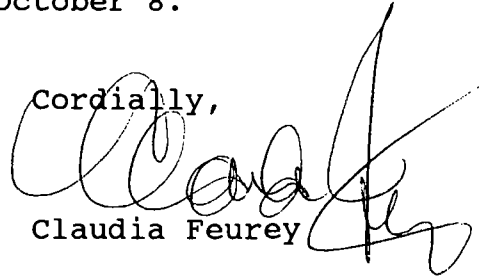

Tomorrow at 2:00pm the Mayor and the First Lady will be joined by the Bronx Borough President Fernando Ferrer and Congressman Jose Serrano at the Highbridge Communicare Health Center in the South Bronx.

In his remarks, the Mayor will describe some of his primary care initiatives including the Communicare program to build primary care resources and Child Immunization Day, which will take place this Saturday, October 16, 1993. Briefing materials on the Highbridge Communicare Center and these primary care initiatives are attached.

HIGHBRIDGE COMMUNICARE HEALTH CENTER

The Highbridge Communicare Center is one of twenty City-operated health clinics that are being transformed into comprehensive family health centers under the first phase of the Mayor's Communicare program. It is a storefront health center located in the poorest Congressional District, one that has been largely abandoned by most health care providers. In response to the dire health situation, the Highbridge site was opened in 1986 as a part-time health screening clinic staffed by a nurse.

When Communicare was launched in 1992, Highbridge was designated as a site to be transformed into a comprehensive family health center. Building on earlier renovations funded by the Bronx Borough President, the Mayor, as part of his Communicare initiative, enhanced the facility, purchased new equipment, and fully staffed the center in order to provide comprehensive primary care to the community.

There are now two family practitioners, two part-time pediatricians, one physician's assistant, one registered nurse, and support staff who seek to manage the care of all patients. Some Medicaid recipients are enrolled in a full managed care plan on a monthly capitation basis. The center is open one evening a week and on Saturdays. Providers are accessible 24 hours a day by telephone. The Highbridge Communicare Center offers a model of neighborhood based primary care that could easily be replicated in inner city neighborhoods throughout the country to create the primary care infrastructure through which managed care could be offered.

In 1990 and 1991, the measles epidemic had an especially devastating impact on the Highbridge community, where the rate was 195% above the City's average, indicating that children are not fully immunized. The Highbridge Center is one of 130 health and community centers throughout the City that have volunteered to participate in Child Immunization Day on Saturday, October 16. It will be open to provide free immunizations to pre-school children and enroll them for ongoing primary care.

Getting across the health reform tightrope is going to be an incredibly difficult balancing act for the Administration. We're deeply concerned that with Medicare and Medicaid reductions of the size we're starting to hear about in the Clinton plan, the President may be getting out on that highwire with his balancing pole already heavily weighted against success.

Hospitals want health reform to succeed, and we salute the President's leadership on this tough issue. His plan contains many elements we agree with.

But there's good reason hospitals question whether \$238 billion savings out of Medicare and Medicaid can be achieved. Hospital resources for delivering services to the poor and the elderly are already stretched thin. Folks in Washington have to understand

that these reductions aren't made in a vacuum. They translate into real hardship out there in communities; into tough choices hospitals are going to have to make about what services they can offer and how many people they can offer them to.

At the same time, hospitals recognize that a reformed health care system is going to have to live within limits. But the way to make the tough choices between how much this country can afford for health care, and what benefits that amount of money will pay for, is first through broad public debate and ultimately, we believe, through an independent national commission that reflects that debate.

Dr. Boyer is a Quaker. He is married to the former Kathryn Garis Tyson, a certified nurse midwife. They have four children: Ernest, Jr., Beverly, Craig, and Stephen.

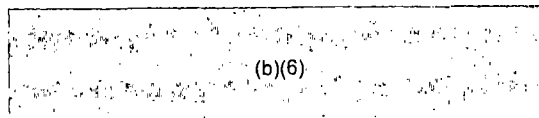
