The Institute of Medicine (IOM) of the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) is honored to invite you to speak at their annual meeting on Tuesday, October 19, 1993. This meeting will be held in the Auditorium of the National Academy of Sciences, 2101 Constitution Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. The meeting topic is "Selected Issues in Health Care Reform." A tentative agenda is enclosed.

The Institute of Medicine, a private non-profit organization, which functions under the NAS charter from the Congress, enlists distinguished members of the medical and other professions in the study of issues and problems that affect the public's health. Its chartered purpose is the advancement of the health sciences and education and the improvement of health care. I am enclosing some materials that describe the Institute of Medicine for your information.

The purpose of this meeting on selected issues in health care reform is to inform members and to provide a forum for dialogue. and medicine can interact with policymakers to discuss mutual interests. Our Annual Meeting will provide such a forum.

- The audience is appropriate to hear the message and carry it forward for implementation. The leadership of American medicine (including physicians, nurses, and allied health personnel) and health policy will be in attendance. They will listen with great interest and be anxious to assist health care reform efforts to improve the health of our nation.

- The Institute of Medicine has a proven track record in analytic work that has and will continue to inform the process of health care reform. An example is our recent work on measuring quality of care and access to health care.

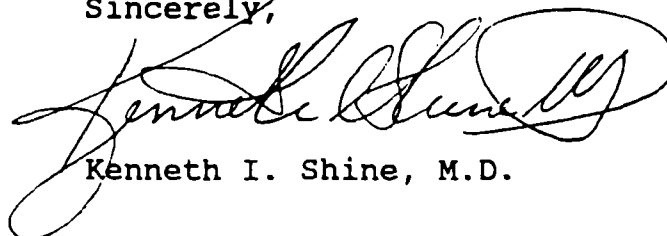
- A presentation at our annual meeting will demonstrate your continued commitment to working with the medical and public health communities to achieve better health care for the nation.

- Any Administration message filtered through this meeting would transmit, with the highest credibility, the President's and your concern and request to the scientific and medical community to continue their efforts to find solutions and to reform our system of care to benefit patients.

This last year IOM Robert Wood Johnson Fellows have been privileged to be active participants in the White House task forces and learned much from this experience. I too appreciated the opportunity to be part of this effort.

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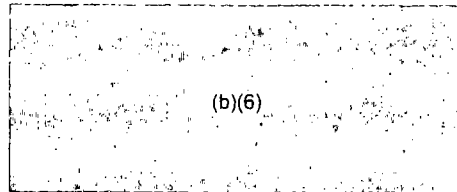

The Institute of Medicine was chartered in 1970 as a component of the National Academy of Sciences.* The reasons for the creation of the Institute are stated in an introduction to its charter:

The growth of knowledge in the health sciences has greatly expanded the capabilities of medicine. Rising expectations of better health and of improved quality of life for all members of our society now include good health care as a universal human right and as a goal of this society. The provision of such care places increasingly heavy demands on health services and on their complex relations with other sectors of society. The resulting expansion of requirements for health manpower and the continuing need to provide for further scientific progress present grave challenges to our medical and social institutions. These developments have generated the need for a national institution, composed of individuals of distinction and achievement, committed to the advancement of the health sciences and education and to the improvement of health care.

*The National Academy of Sciences is a private corporation established by federal charter, which was created by an Act of Congress and signed in 1863 by President Abraham Lincoln. The Academy is a nonprofit, tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

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■ INSTITUTE OF MEDICINE ■

The Institute of Medicine was chartered in 1970 by the National Academy of Sciences to enlist distinguished members of the medical and other professions in the study of issues and problems that affect the public's health. Its chartered purpose is the advancement of the health sciences and education and the improvement of health care.

The Institute's principal resource for carrying out its mission is the membership, which currently numbers about 500 regular members, about 400 senior, and 20-some foreign associates. The charter stipulates that at least one-quarter of the IOM membership be elected from professions other than health and medicine. More than one-quarter of the present members are from law, economics, engineering, and the physical sciences, a diversity that ensures a breadth of perspective and multidisciplinary approach to Institute studies. The health professionals in the membership include basic biological and behavioral scientists, clinical scientists, and health care practitioners. The honor of election to membership is accompanied by a member's commitment to active participation, without compensation, in the Institute's work.

The Institute is governed by a Council consisting of the President and 20 members elected by the membership to three-year terms. The Council meets quarterly; it approves the Annual Program Plan and fiscal year budget—both income and expenditures—and provides policy guidance. A five-member Executive Committee of the Council acts monthly to review all proposals for new and revised projects. Five standing committees—program, finance, membership, dissemination, and resources development—provide recommendations to the Council in their respective areas of responsibility.

Each program activity of the Institute is the responsibility of an ad hoc steering committee of members and other experts appointed by the President, subject to approval by the President of the National Academy of Sciences.

SUBJECT: Additional Information on Doctors Breakfast and former Surgeon General Koop

Rationing

According to Lynn Margherio, Dr. Koop has reviewed a copy of the plan and is comfortable with the majority of it. As you know, he has been consulted extensively and many of his suggestions have been incorporated into the recently distributed draft (e.g., his loan forgiveness program for doctors).

There is concern, however, that he will focus part of his remarks in support of rationing as he believes this is the most effective method in which to achieve cost containment. (He holds this belief so strongly he applies it even to himself. Although he needs knee surgery he refuses to do so because he believes the taxpayers money shouldn't pay for an operation for someone as old as he - he's in his mid-seventies.)

Scheduling Commitment

Dr. Koop believes he has a commitment to have either you or the President present at the first provider forums. We've been told that you agreed to this request in response to a conversation you had with Ira. The two events are the Institute of Medicine forum on October 19th and the American Association of Medical Colleges forum on November 9th. Dr. Koop may bring this up.

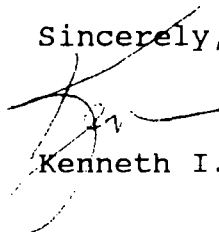
Enclosed is a tentative program for our Annual Meeting on October 18 and 19. We are prepared to be very flexible on the 19th.

I. PURPOSE

II. BACKGROUND

Institute of Medicine

The Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences is holding its annual meeting tomorrow and Wednesday. The Institute of Medicine (IOM) is a private, non-profit organization which derived itself from the National Academy of Sciences 20 years ago to be "committed to the advancement of the health sciences and education and to the improvement of health care." Their charter specifically states that health care should be available to all Americans. Their membership elects 50 new members each year from across the U.S. who are outstanding leaders in health and health science. Members include: Dr. Phil Lee, David Sacher, David Kessler, Harold Varmus.

National Academy of Sciences

The National Academy of Sciences is a private corporation established by federal charter, which was created by an Act of Congress and signed in 1863 by President Abraham Lincoln. The Academy is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization

Institute of Medicine Reports

The IOM drafts reports for government of all aspects of health care and health science. In 1986, the IOM published "Confronting AIDS: Directions for Public Health, Health Care, and Research" at a time when government was not particularly interested in the disease. Other reports have focused on unintended pregnancy, RU-486, Medicare, alcoholism, and other topics important for health.

Audience

450 members of the Institute of Medicine.

Attendees are leaders in American medicine in the broadest sense: Deans of medical and nursing schools, university faculty responsible for teaching hospitals, a few from private sector HMO's (Kaiser). This audience will be a very public health oriented group - concerned about overall impact of health reform on communities; different from medical professional groups (AMA).
