Dear Mrs. Clinton:

We are writing to request your participation as a speaker at a national level meeting for immunization partners, which will be held on December 6-7, 1993. Specifically, we would appreciate your speaking on December 6th from 9:45 to 10:15, your topic will be Health Care and Immunization Reform. We would welcome your remaining as our guest for the entire program if your schedule permits. The meeting will be held at the Loews L'Enfant Hotel in Washington, DC. Your response to our request may be directed to Virginia Burggraf at (202) 554-4444 extension 287.

Last year, Every Child By Two and the American Nurses Association joined in an effort to bring the assistance of national organizations together in an Immunization Partnership - to promote immunization nationally and assist vaccination campaigns locally. More than 40 national organizations attended our first meeting last December, and more than 70 are now immunization partners. The enclosed newsletter will tell you more about what these partners have contributed to immunization, but in short, they have dramatically increased awareness of the need to vaccinate on time, and they have helped to significantly boost immunization levels in many part of the country-through direct assistance to public immunization programs, by sponsoring special immunizations clinics, and via education outreach to those who care for children.

Every Child By Two (ECBT), formed by former U.S. First Lady Rosalynn Carter and former First Lady of Arkansas Betty Bumpers, has provided national leadership on immunization. They have involved the spouses of governors and members of Congress, traveled around the country to help raise awareness and boost the immunization efforts of public health providers, and participated in the development of policy and measures that will institutionalize vaccination, such as the ALL KIDS COUNT immunization tracking grant program of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. they have inspired many to become involved as advocates for immunization, working through its state nursing organizations to develop innovative approaches to vaccinating children, addressing national and state policies that would permit nurses to be even more effective as partners in providing vaccinations and other health care for children, and working nationally to support measures to institutionalize and sustain a national immunization program.

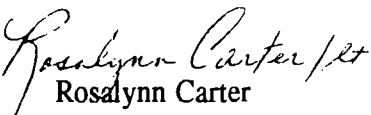
President Clinton has demonstrated a commitment at the highest level of government to immunizing our nation's children. The leadership provided by the President builds on the more than two years of advocacy and awareness-raising efforts that have been underway in response to outbreaks of measles and other childhood diseases that occurred between 1989 and 1991. During that time, there were more than 55,000 cases of measles and 150 deaths.

To improve the immunization status of America's children, the federal government and the U.S. Congress appropriated, for the first time, funds for education and outreach. And through the current budget process, the President and the Congress are reinforcing this commitment by additional funds and through establishing measures, such as a national immunization tracking program, that will help institutionalize how we reach and vaccinate children at the appropriate ages. ECBT and the ANA are both committed to forwarding President Clinton's immunization program, through their own organizations and by continuing the Immunization Partnership to involve other organizations.

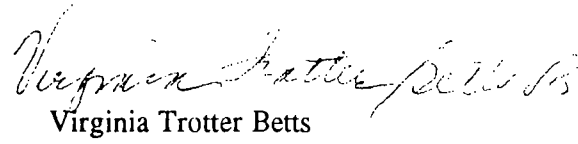
The purpose of this year's meeting, which we have entitled "Immunization Partners: A Shared Vision" is to bring the original partners together again, and invite new partners who can help reach parents and children. We want to provide an overview about the importance of timely vaccinations, inform about efforts that have been taking place, review the leadership and action of the federal government to improve immunization levels, offer examples of what immunization partners have accomplished, and discuss how immunization fits into health care reform. We realize this is an ambitious agenda, and have allowed two days for the meeting so that it can be used as a launching point for renewed activity that will support the President's immunization program.

We are enthusiastic about the prospects of inspiring the continued involvement of immunization partners in working to eradicate the diseases that threaten our children. We know that your contribution to the program would help achieve our goals. We look forward to hearing from you and hope to see you in December.

Dear Participants:

We join the Boston Globe in welcoming you to this New England Summit on Health Care Reform.

No region in the country is more aware of the need for action and reform. One million and three hundred and fifty thousand citizens are without health insurance in New England, and the number has increased by sixteen percent since 1989. Health care costs in the region are high and increasing rapidly. The average family spent less than \$2,000 for health care in 1980. Today, the figure is \$5,400, and by the year 2000, it will double again if nothing is done. Families trying to make ends meet, businesses trying to compete, and governments trying to balance budgets and meet other priorities are all disadvantaged by rising health costs.

Our communities, large and small, urban and rural, have serious problems delivering health care effectively and efficiently, even to those with insurance protection. Needless illness and the lack of affordable and accessible care scar countless lives.

New England faces daunting health care problems, but we also have special strengths. The region is renowned for its leadership in medical research, treatment, and training, and it is also a leading center of the insurance industry. We have innovative programs to deliver better health services to senior citizens, inner city residents, persons living in rural areas, and others with special needs. Our states have been in the forefront of the search for creative solutions to health care problems. But we cannot go it alone. National action is necessary, and it is finally happening.

The national debate now underway will culminate in Congressional action next year. This Health Care Summit is a unique opportunity for New Englanders to air their concerns, exchange views, and discuss President Clinton's program. We are especially honored that the First Lady is here to participate. We are also very pleased that our Republican colleagues in the Congress are joining us in the spirit of bi-partisan cooperation that is crucial to the success of health care reform.

Each of us is looking forward to the discussion today, and we thank you for joining us.

Alvin Poussaint, M.D., Associate Dean and Professor of Psychiatry, Harvard Medical School (MA)

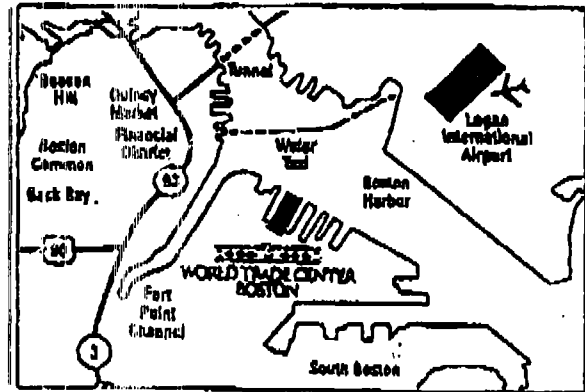

(Tobin Bridge, I-93S, Storrow Drive)

From I-93S, take Exit 22 "South Station". At the top of the ramp, (first stoplight) take a left. At the second stoplight, take a left onto Atlantic Ave. (Landmarks: *One Financial Center* - on the right; *South Station* - ahead of you on the right; *Federal Reserve Bank* - ahead of you on the left.) 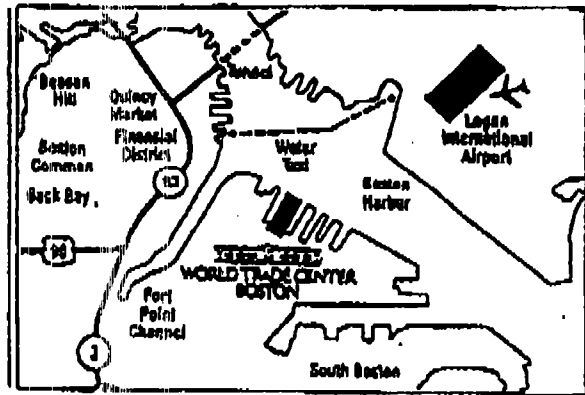
