Taylor-Made Campaign

■ Elizabeth Taylor will soon put her AIDS clout to work in South Africa, launching an AIDS awareness campaign there at the request of African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela. "She has done wonderful work in this field all over the world. I think

she can do wonderful work for us too," Mandela told the ANC Youth League congress yesterday. Mandela said he is discussing a convenient date for Taylor to visit South Africa in the near future. But yesterday, Taylor was admitted to St. John's Hospital in Santa Monica, Calif., for

treatment of a dislocated hip, the result of slipping in the snow during a recent Swiss vacation. Her publicist said doctors weren't sure how long Taylor would be hospitalized.

Menendez Judge: Shh!

■ Tough-talking attorneys in the Erik Menendez murder trial seem to have been talking too much for Superior Court Judge Stanley Weisberg.

Weisberg faxed an order late yesterday afternoon to stop them from discussing the trial while a separate jury deliberates the fate of Erik's older brother, Lyle. The brothers are charged with first-degree murder in the shotgun slayings of their parents in 1989.

Erik Menendez's attorney, Leslie Abramson, who held a sidewalk news

conference immediately after the mistrial Thursday, was quoted yesterday as saying she was fielding offers for a defense fund for Erik and would be open to a plea bargain.

District Attorney Gil Garcetti, who has said he would retry the case in the event of a mistrial and who may have new evidence, was about to hold a news conference in his office when Weisberg's order came.

Streisand Donation

■ Barbra Streisand has thrown her weight behind yet another cause. The singer-actor-director honored the memory of President Clinton's mother, Virginia Kelley, by donating \$200,000 Thursday to a breast cancer fund established in her name at the University of Arkansas.

"I am deeply saddened by her passing, but she died as she lived, with grace and dignity, full of enthusiasm and the joy of life," Streisand said.

The weekend before she died, the 70-year-old Kelley was in Las Vegas to attend two rare Streisand concerts. The singer attended the funeral in Hot Springs, Ark., last Saturday.

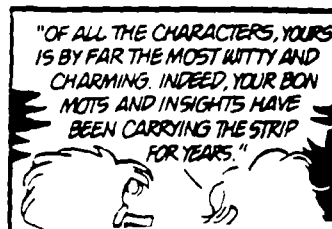
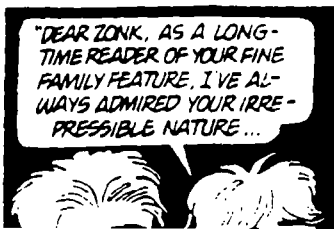
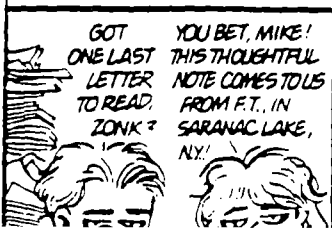

APLA TRIBUTE, JANUARY 27, 1994
BARBRA STREISAND'S INTRODUCTION TO
HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON

It is truly an honor to once again participate in support of this vitally important organization. Never in its 10 year history has the work of APLA, and others on the front line in the battle against AIDS, been more needed.

Unfortunately, the fight against AIDS is not going well. Medical breakthroughs have been excruciatingly slow in coming and more than a decade of suffering has left our community decimated by this plague.

Fortunately, we have an Administration that has pushed through a 20 percent increase in money for research and raised funding for the Ryan White Health Care Act by 66 percent.

In his AIDS Day speech last month, President Clinton responded to a heart rending article in the New York Times Magazine by reporter, Jeffrey Schmalz, who had already died of AIDS at the time of publication.

"I am dying. Why doesn't someone help us?" Mr. Schmalz had written. I believe that the President will meet that challenge because he has embraced people with AIDS in human terms rather than dismissing them as annoying statistics, or worse--the enemy.

Faced with a distraught heckler during his AIDS Day speech, the President empathetically said, "I'd rather that man be in here screaming at me than having given up altogether."

Jeffrey Schmalz also wrote: "Where once Washington doors were closed to AIDS activists, they are now open. AIDS sufferers are no longer treated as immoral lepers."

But much more needs to be done. As President Clinton said, "The best thing we can do for people who are living with HIV and living with AIDS is to pass a comprehensive health care plan so that people don't lose their benefits."

That is the all important task which the President has entrusted to the woman you honor tonight.

Hillary Rodham Clinton. Not since Eleanor Roosevelt have we had such a role model of universal compassion.

The connection between the two most outstanding First Ladies in our nation's history is not accidental. Hillary Clinton has written that Eleanor Roosevelt was her inspiration.

Not to take anything away from the memory of Mrs. Roosevelt but she had 12 years in the White House and Hillary Clinton has had only one. But

what a year! And she still has seven more as First Lady. She was voted the most admired woman in the country as the public has witnessed her seriousness of purpose, her genuine warmth and her stunning intellect. For the first time in our country's history we can imagine a woman president.

But it won't be easy because, as the carping criticism directed at Hillary Clinton has demonstrated, the strong, competent woman is still a threatening figure in our culture.

Despite the fact that she has mastered the intricacies and provided leadership on health care, the most difficult social policy question of our time, some critics still want to discuss her hair style rather than what's inside her head.

The trivializing attacks on her are the same made on Eleanor Roosevelt over fifty years ago, picking at the fluff of image rather than the strong fabric of substance which both women possess in abundance.

In 1992, the too short Year of the Woman, I talked about stereotypes as they apply to women in my business and the so-called "uppity feminists" everywhere who would dare to invade the powerful world of men. I said, "Language gives us an insight into how women are viewed in a male-dominated society."

A man is commanding - a woman is demanding.

A man is forceful - a woman is pushy.

He's assertive - she's aggressive.

Well, when it comes to AIDS those seemingly negative words become positive ones.

Thank God Hillary Clinton has been aggressive in fulfilling the task assigned to her by the President to provide health care to the tens of millions of Americans who have been excluded from what should be the world's best medical system, but isn't.

Thank God she is pushy about eliminating restrictions based on preexisting conditions, including people who are HIV positive.

Thank God she's demanding that we emphasize primary and preventive health care to avoid disease rather than only responding when the disease is rampant.

But Hillary Rodham Clinton has brought something just as meaningful as those qualities of superb competence and energy into our public life--she has brought a sense of the importance of community and shared values.

The Washington Post said, "She is looking beyond policy to a moral agenda. She talks about virtue and personal responsibility and being connected to a higher purpose." Amazingly, she has been mocked for this by some, as if public policy, like life itself, can have meaning without a deeper, soulful base.

For more than a decade the reliance of our Presidents on selfish individualism led us into the wasteland of official indifference to the suffering of many. One stark result of that politics of contempt and neglect, driven by homophobia, is that millions are now afflicted by the AIDS epidemic which might have been contained if only our high officials had cared.

Let me now introduce someone who clearly does care; someone who represents the unlimited possibilities for a woman to be all that she can be; a loving wife and mother, a daughter, a sister, a lawyer, a leader and someone who proves that women can embody both beauty and power. Please welcome the First Lady of the United States, Hillary Rodham Clinton.

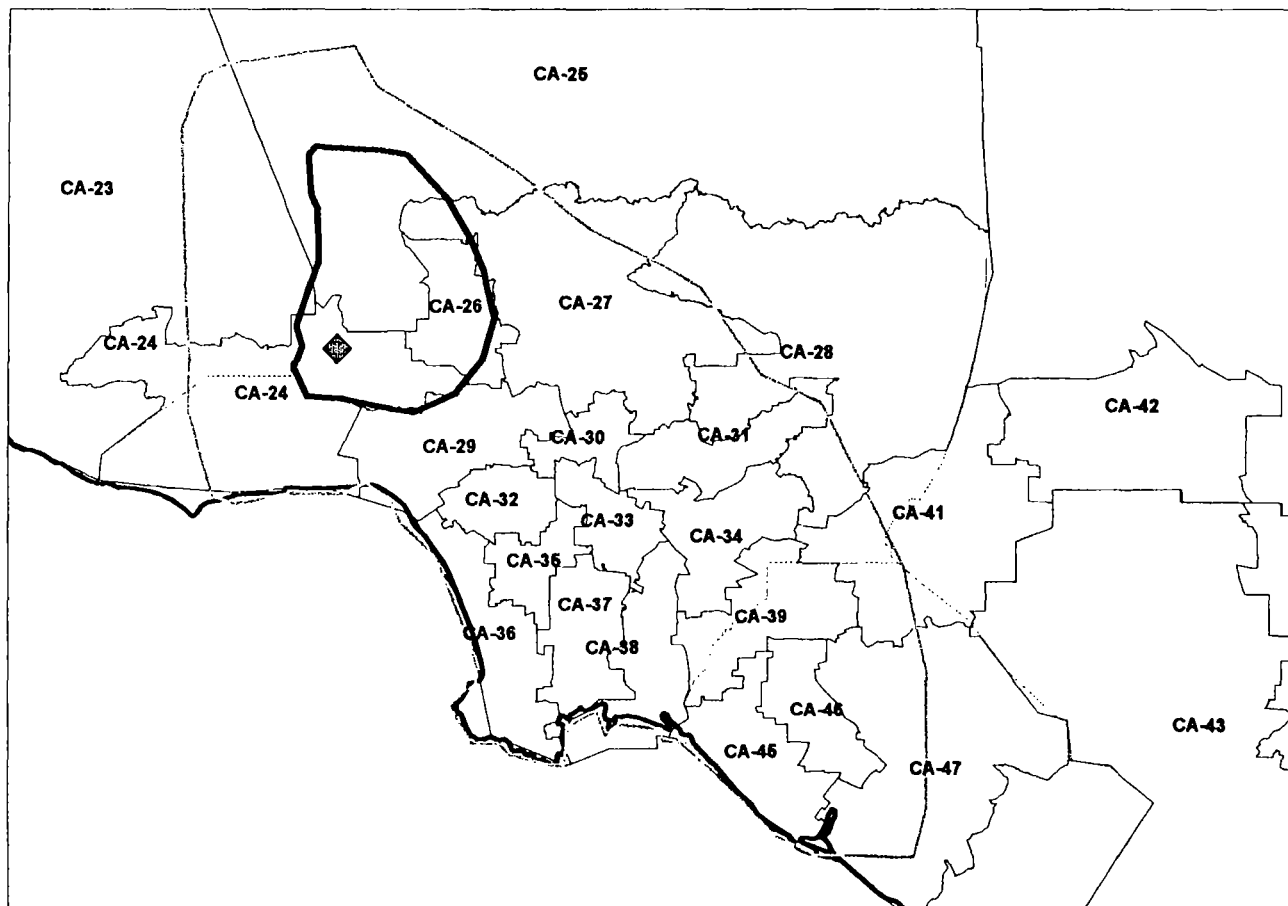

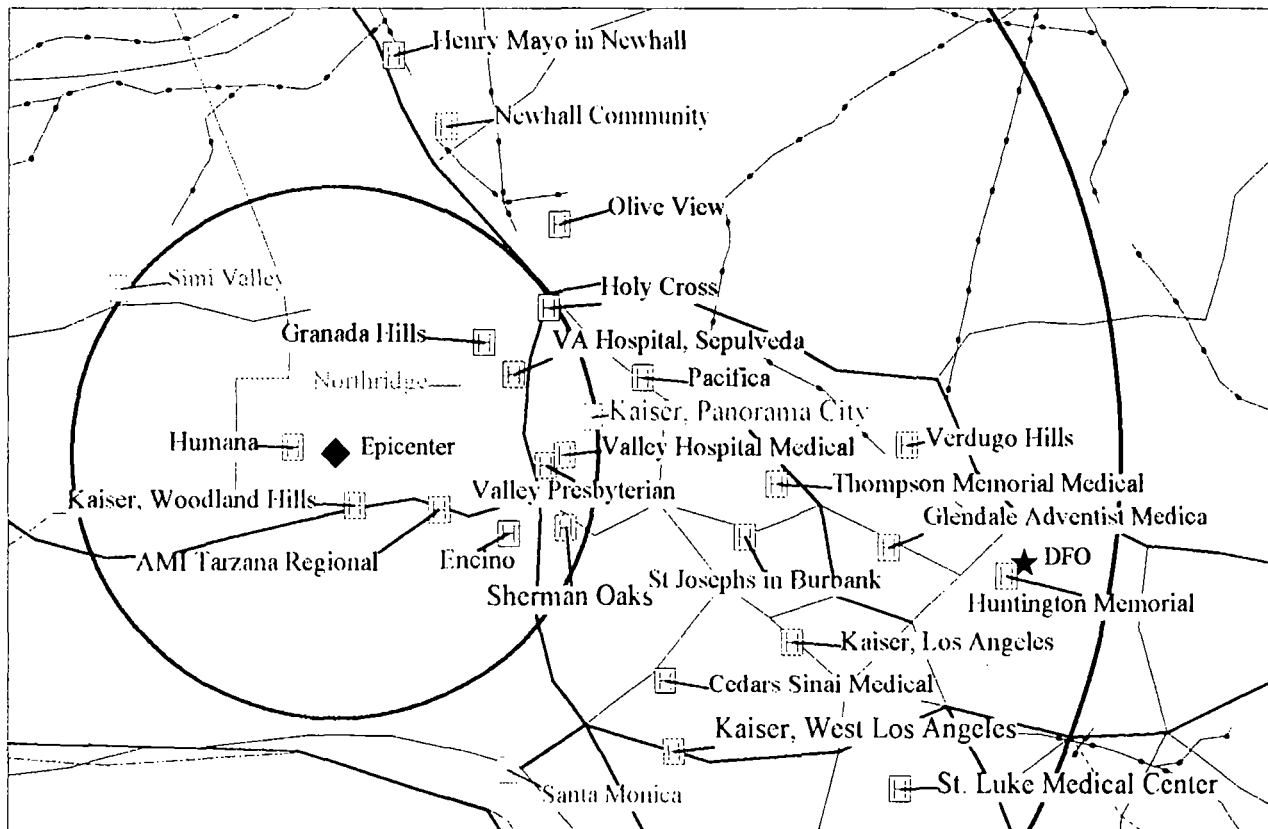

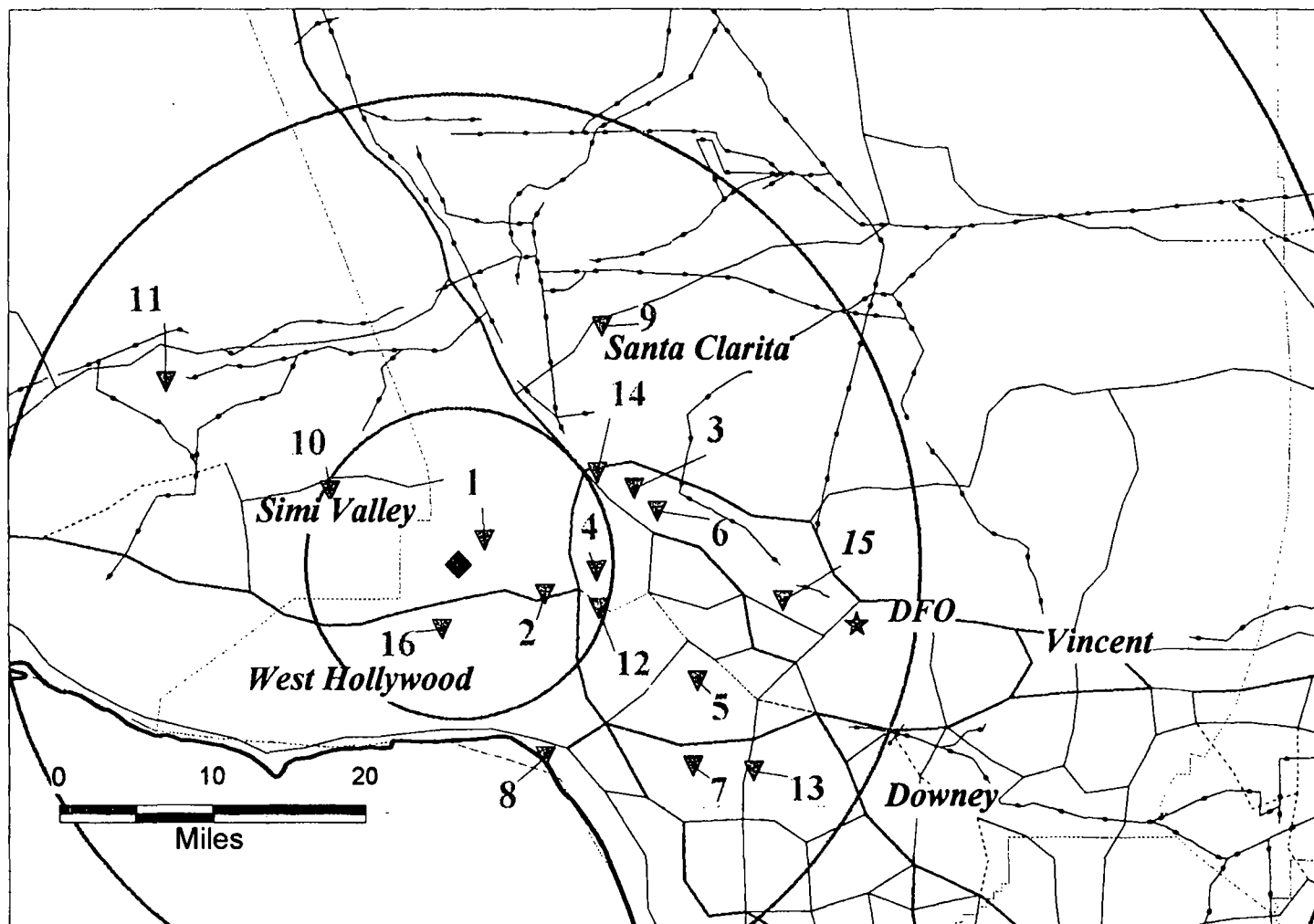

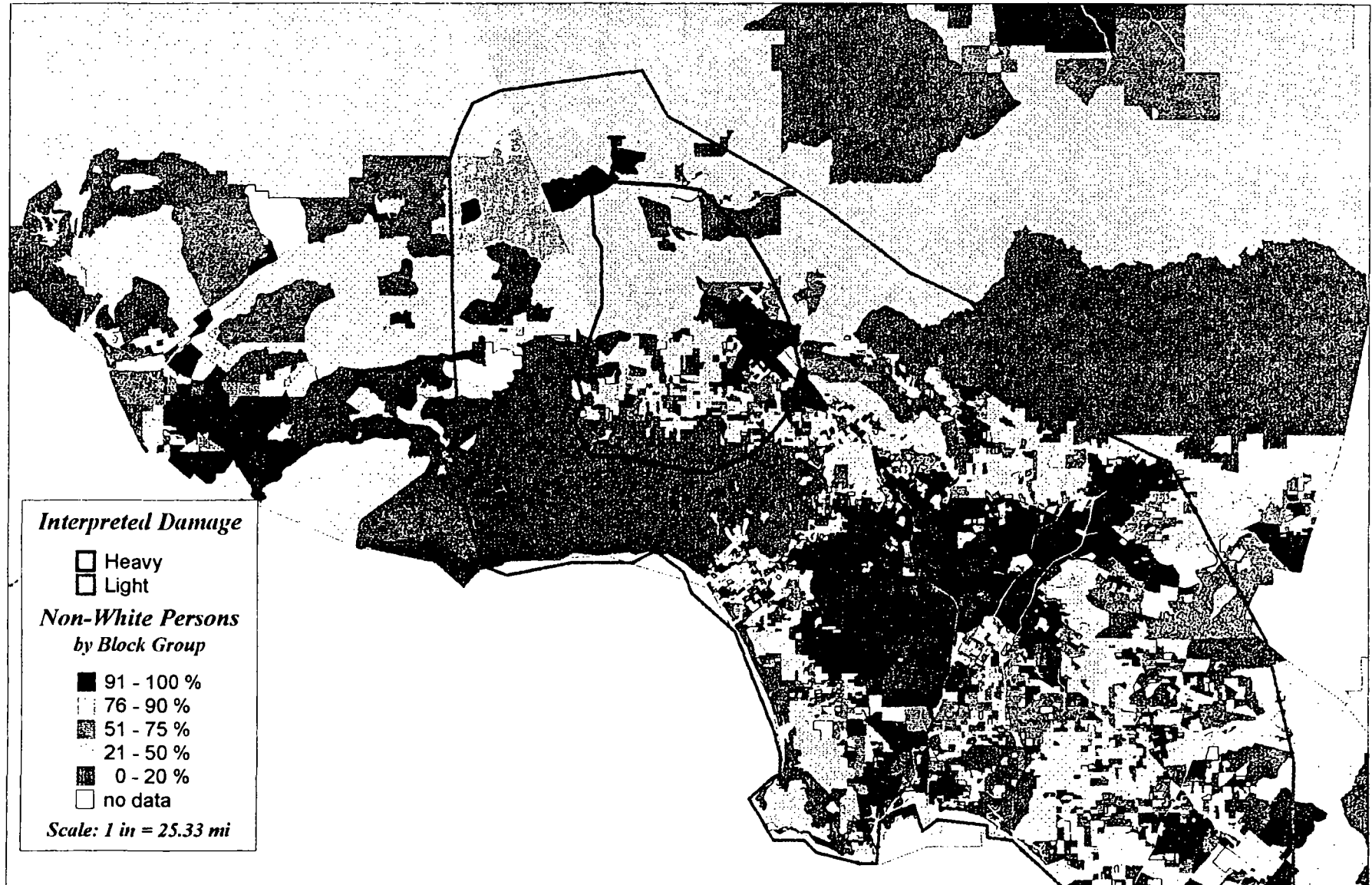

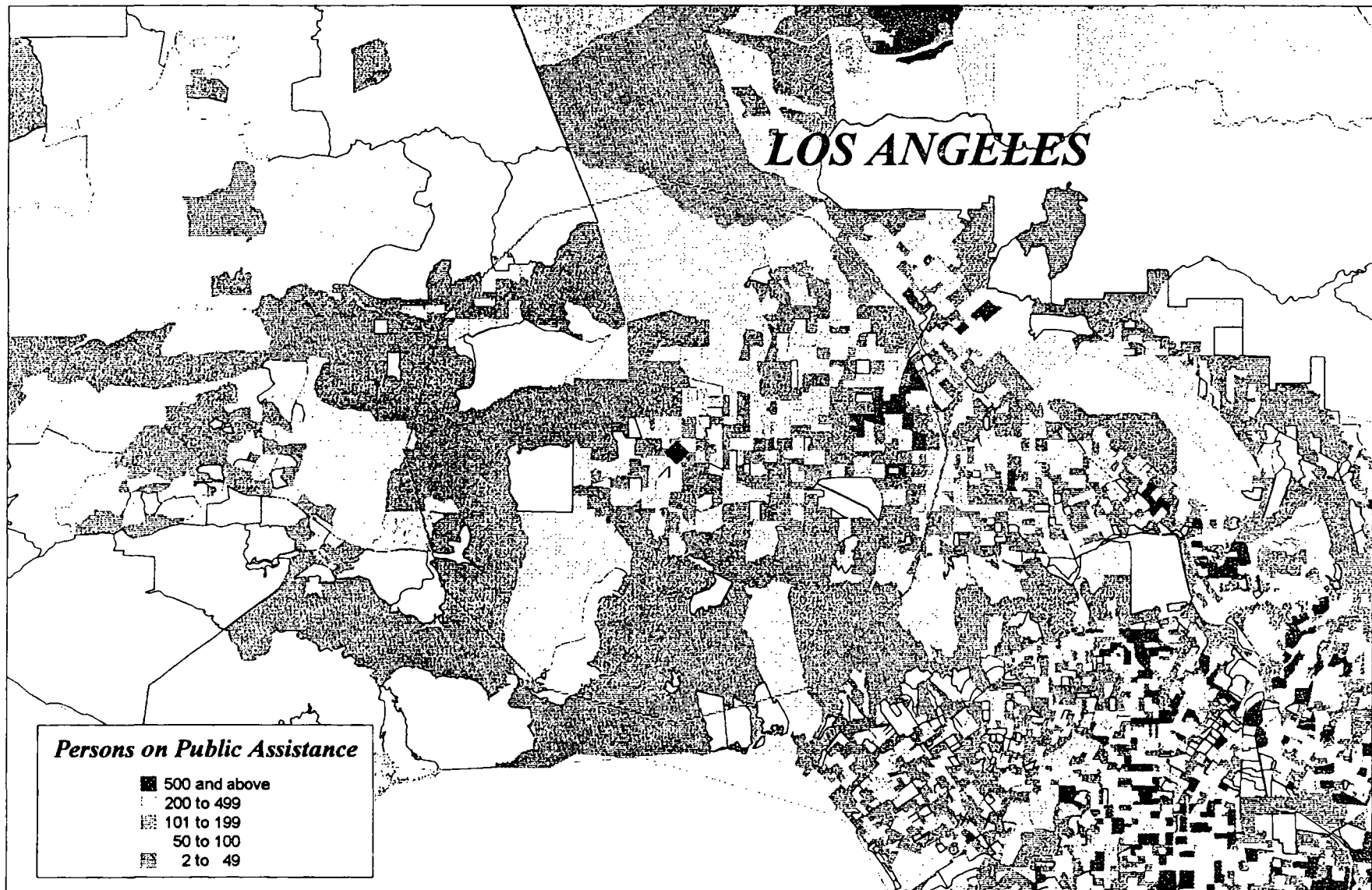

THE INDIVIDUAL AND FAMILY GRANT (IFG) PROGRAM

The IFG program is a Federal/State cost-shared program authorized by Section 411 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, Public Law 93-288, as amended. Its purpose is to provide funds for the necessary expenses and serious needs of disaster victims which cannot be met through other forms of disaster assistance or through other means such as insurance.

GRANT AMOUNT AND ELIGIBLE CATEGORIES

For FY 94, each individual or family may receive up to \$12,200 from the IFG program in each major disaster. The maximum grant amount is adjusted annually in accordance with changes in the Consumer Price Index. IFG eligible categories include: housing, personal property, medical, dental, funeral, and transportation. Costs which are ineligible include: improvements or additions to real or personal property, recreational property, cosmetic repair, business expenses, and debts incurred before the disaster.

STATE ADMINISTERS THE PROGRAM

The State administers the program and pays for 25% of the grants disbursed. The Federal government provides the remaining 75% of the costs for grant awards as well as the regulation, policies and procedures which govern the program. States also receive up to 5% of the Federal share of the program for administrative costs. The Governor may request a loan of the State's 25% share.

DAMAGE VERIFICATION

FEMA's contract inspection firms perform inspections and provide government estimates to the State for housing and personal property. Families do not have to provide housing or personal property estimates or receipts, but are asked to document expenditures for medical, dental, funeral, or transportation needs.

SBA AND IFG: ELIGIBILITY

To obtain assistance under the housing and personal property categories, applicants may be required to first apply to the Small Business Administration (SBA) for a disaster loan. If SBA rules applicants ineligible for an SBA loan or if loan amounts are insufficient, SBA automatically refers the application to the IFG program for consideration.

FLOOD INSURANCE REQUIREMENT

IFG recipients living in Special Flood Hazard Areas who receive assistance as the result of flood damages to their home and/or personal property must buy flood insurance and maintain the policy for three years. The cost of the first year's premium is included in the grant award.

CRISIS COUNSELING PROGRAM

Section 416 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Public Law 100-707) authorizes the President to provide training and services to alleviate mental health problems caused or aggravated by major disasters. The Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program is designed to provide supplemental funding to States for crisis counseling services to people affected by Presidentially declared disasters. There are two types of grants for which States may apply: immediate services and regular program funding. A state may request either or both types of funding.

To be eligible for crisis counseling services funded by this program, the person must be a resident of the designated area or must have been located in the area at the time the disaster occurred. In addition, the person must either have a mental health problem which was caused by or aggravated by the disaster or its aftermath, or he or she must benefit from services provided by the program. This program has been developed in cooperation with FEMA and the Center for Mental Health Services (CMHS). The funded crisis counseling projects are monitored by both FEMA and CMHS.

Immediate services include those screening, diagnostic, and counseling techniques, as well as outreach services such as public information and community networking, which can be applied to meet mental health needs immediately after a major disaster declaration. The funding, which is provided for up to 60 days after the date of the disaster declaration, must be requested in writing within 14 days of the disaster declaration. The request for immediate services funding is processed in the Disaster Field Office. The Regional Director or his/her on-site designee, the Disaster Recovery Manager, is the approving official for immediate services funding and may extend funding up to an additional 30 days if a regular program request is pending. This allows for program continuity between the two funding periods.

The Regular Program is designed to provide crisis counseling, community outreach, and consultation and education services to people affected by a Presidentially declared disaster. Funding for this program is separate from the immediate services grant. The request for funding must be submitted within 60 days of the disaster declaration. Regular program funding may be provided for up to nine months, and if due to extenuating circumstances more program time is necessary, a 90 day maximum extension may be approved. The regular program grant proposal is reviewed by both FEMA and CMHS. Recommendations are forwarded to the Assistant Associate Director, Disaster Assistance Programs, for final determination. If approved, the grant is awarded and administered by CMHS.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

"Public Assistance" as that term is used by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) under the authority of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Stafford Act), Public Law 93-288, as amended, means supplemental assistance to State and local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations after a declaration of a major disaster or emergency by the President.

Eligible applicants for this assistance include a State government, local governments and any political subdivision of the State, Indian tribes and Alaska Native Villages. Private nonprofit (PNP) organizations which may receive assistance are those which operate the following types of facilities: educational, utility, emergency, medical, custodial care and those providing essential services of a governmental nature to the general public.

As soon as practicable after the declaration, the State, assisted by FEMA, conducts briefings for State, local and PNP officials to inform them of the assistance available and how to apply for it. An intent to apply for assistance must be filed with the State within 30 days after the area is designated eligible for assistance. Following the briefings, a Federal/State/local team inspects every damaged public or PNP facility and prepares a Damage Survey Report (DSR) for each location.

DSRs may be prepared for a variety of projects including:

- Clearance of debris from public and private property.
- Emergency protective measures for preservation of life and property in response to the declared event.
- Repair or replacement of damaged facilities such as buildings, utilities, roads and bridges, water control facilities, and recreational facilities.

FEMA reviews and approves the DSRs and obligates the Federal share of the costs (which cannot be less than 75 percent -- in this disaster, this level was set by the President at 90 percent, except for emergency protective measures, which was set at 100 percent) to the State. The State then subgrants funds to local applicants. For those projects whose total estimated cost is less than \$42,400, payment of the Federal share of the estimate is made upon approval of the project and no further accounting to FEMA is required. For projects costing \$42,400 or more, payment is made on the basis of actual costs determined after the project is completed; interim payments may be made before completion as funds are needed. After FEMA obligates funds to the State, further management of the assistance, including disbursement to subgrantees is the responsibility of the State. FEMA will continue to monitor the recovery progress to ensure the timely delivery of eligible assistance and compliance with the law and regulations.

HAZARD MITIGATION GRANT PROGRAM

Purpose of the Program: The Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) is designed to fund immediate and long term mitigation projects after a major disaster declaration. Under this program, FEMA can contribute up to 50 percent of the cost of eligible mitigation measures. Total federal funding for the HMGP is limited to 15 percent of the estimated grants to be made under the Public Assistance and Individual Assistance Programs. The overall goal of the Program is to reduce a State or community's vulnerability to natural hazards.

Eligibility Criteria: Eligible applicants are the same as for the Public Assistance Program, although the HMGP does not duplicate mitigation measures eligible under that program. The HMGP provides funding for mitigation measures that substantially reduce the risk of future damages. The funded projects must be cost effective and environmentally compatible, and should be consistent with the evaluation of hazards and mitigation objectives in the State Hazard Mitigation Plan.

Other Mitigation Requirements: In the FEMA-State Agreement, the State accepts the responsibility to evaluate natural hazards in the disaster area and to prepare or update a Statewide hazard mitigation plan within 180 days of the declaration. This plan is commonly referred to as the State 409 Hazard Mitigation Plan. In addition, an Interagency Hazard Mitigation Team (IHMT) is made up of representatives of 12 Federal agencies who evaluate mitigation opportunities and recovery options after flood disasters. The Team prepares a report within 15 days of the disaster declaration, which provides a framework for the State Hazard Mitigation Plan and often identifies potential projects for funding under the HMGP.

SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION DISASTER LOANS

TYPES OF DISASTER LOANS:

Home Disaster Loans: Loans to homeowners or renters to repair or replace disaster related damage to homes or personal property that is owned by the applicant. Renters are eligible for personal property loans.

Business Physical Disaster Loans: Loans to businesses to repair or replace disaster related damaged property owned by the business, including inventory and supplies.

Economic Injury Disaster Loans: Working capital loans (referred to as EIDL) to small businesses and to small agricultural cooperatives to assist them through the disaster recovery period. These loans are available only if the business or its owners cannot obtain this type of assistance from non-government sources. This determination is made by SBA.

CREDIT REQUIREMENTS:

These are loans and you must show that you have the ability to repay them. Physical loss loans in excess of \$10,000 and EIDL loans in excess of \$5,000 must be secured with collateral. Generally, for individuals, that will include a lien on the applicant's real estate. However, loans will not be declined for lack of a fixed amount of collateral.

There are different interest rates and terms for these loans. They depend on whether or not you could recover from your disaster damage with your own funds or have the ability to borrow through non-government sources. It is called "Credit Available Elsewhere" and "Credit Not Available Elsewhere." This determination is made by SBA. Current rates are approximately 4 percent for homeowners that cannot obtain credit elsewhere, and 8 percent homeowners that can obtain credit elsewhere.

LOAN AMOUNT:

For homeowners up to \$200,000 is available for repair or replacement of real estate; up to \$40,000 is available for homeowners and renters for repair or replacement of personal property. The loan amount is limited to the amount of uninsured, SBA-verified losses, but may be increased by up to 20 percent for mitigating devices for damaged real property.

For business physical disaster loans, up to 100 percent of the uninsured, SBA verified loss not to exceed \$500,000. Within this limit, the loan may be increased by up to 20 percent for mitigating devices for damaged real property.

Any insurance proceeds that are required to be applied against outstanding mortgages may be included in disaster loan eligibility. Any insurance proceeds that are voluntarily applied against outstanding mortgages by the owner may not be included in disaster loan eligibility. Refinancing of existing mortgages on homes and business property is possible in some circumstances.

For Economic Injury loans, assistance can be provided up to \$500,000.

The total loan amount to any one business entity (including affiliates for combined Economic Injury and Business Disaster Loans) cannot exceed \$500,000.

LOAN TERM:

For businesses with "Credit Available Elsewhere," the maximum term is up to three (3) years. For all other borrowers, loan terms not to exceed 30 years are available. Loans terms are individually determined based upon what is reasonable in consideration of your repayment capability.

LOAN LIMITATIONS:

No loans for damages to secondary homes. No loans for damage to items such as personal pleasure boats, planes, recreational vehicles, antiques, collections. Limitation on loan amounts for items such as landscaping, family swimming pools.

FLOOD INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS:

Applicants who have SBA loans that require them to maintain flood insurance are not eligible for loans if they have not maintained their insurance. If your property is located in a special flood hazard area, you must purchase and maintain flood insurance for the insurable value of your property, regardless of the amount of your loan.

DISASTER FOOD STAMPS

GENERAL: Eligibility for food stamps is on a household basis. If you and the people who live and eat with you do not have very much money, you may want to apply for food stamps. Food stamps are coupons that can be used like cash to buy food. There are special food stamp rules for people affected by a big disaster such as a flood.

FILING AN APPLICATION: If you want to apply, you must file an application at the local food stamp office. You may call the FEMA emergency number to get the address of the food stamp office. Be sure to tell the truth on your application. If you get more food stamps than you should because of a mistake, you will be asked to pay back the extra amount. If you give wrong information on purpose, you may be ineligible for a period of time, fined, or put in prison. After the disaster is over, checks may be made to see if households got food stamps by giving wrong information.

INTERVIEW: After the food stamp office receives your application, a food stamp worker will interview you and go over your application with you. If you do not understand a question, you should ask the food stamp worker to explain it during the interview.

PROOF: During the interview, you will be asked to show proof of your identity and where you live. Examples of proof of your identity are a driver's license, wage stub, a birth certificate, a voter

registration card, or a work ID card. Examples of proof of where you live are a statement from a non-relative landlord, rent or mortgage receipt, telephone book, post office records, utility bills, or driver's license.

ELIGIBILITY RULES: Households that were already getting food stamps and other households may be eligible for disaster food stamps. You cannot get disaster food stamps unless your home was in the disaster area, your household will be buying food and preparing meals, and you can answer YES to one of the following questions.

- Has your home or self-employment property been damaged or destroyed by the disaster?
- Does your household have any other disaster-caused expenses?
- Has your income been delayed, reduced, or stopped as a result of the disaster?
- Does your household have any cash or money in a bank account which you cannot get to because of the disaster?

Eligibility is based on how much money you can get now (for example, cash on hand or from a bank account) and how much you expect to get later such as income. Some disaster expenses will be subtracted such as expenses to repair damage to a home or property

necessary for work, expenses for temporary shelter, expenses for moving out of an evacuated area, expenses related to protecting a home or business from the disaster, and expenses due to a disaster-related personal injury or death. The limits for household income and cash resources, less disaster expenses, for a month are:

You will be asked to provide the social security number for household members if known.

RECEIVING FOOD STAMPS: If you are eligible, you should get food stamps the day after you apply. You may get food stamps in one of several ways:

- you may be given a paper or card you can take to a bank or other place to get your food stamps,
- the food stamp office will give or mail the food stamps directly to you, or
- you will be given a plastic card that you can use to buy food.

This varies by area.

The amount of benefits a household gets depends on the number of people in the household and if food stamps are given out for a whole month or a half-month.

Food stamps come in books worth different amounts. A household member should sign each coupon book.

USING FOOD STAMPS: You may use food stamps in any store that takes them. Most grocery stores take food stamps. You can only use food stamps to buy food or to buy seeds or plants for a garden to grow food for your own use. You cannot buy alcoholic drinks, tobacco, vitamins, toilet paper, or paper towels with food stamps. It is a very serious crime to sell your coupons for cash or drugs.

You must have the book cover to spend food stamps worth more than \$1. The store will give you change (in food stamps or up to 99 cents in cash change) if you do not have the exact amount you need.

IMPACT AID

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- The Department is requesting an additional \$165 million. These funds are for grants to help school districts meet increased operating costs resulting from the earthquake and to compensate for reduced local revenue directly related to the disaster.
- The Department has released seven million in existing Impact Aid disaster funds for the Los Angeles Unified School District.
- The grant monies may be used for a variety of expenses, such as: transportation costs, additional food service costs, extended day programs, additional counsellors, and compensation for lost local school revenues resulting from lowered property tax assessments related to the earthquake.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

- School districts in any of the counties in the Presidentially declared disaster area should apply to the Department for grants. Applicants must provide documentation of the extra operating costs associated with the earthquake.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION
STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE (PELL GRANTS)

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- The Department is requesting \$80 million for the Federal Pell Grant program.
- Student aid funds, in general, are used to pay for allowable costs of postsecondary education, including tuition, fees, books, school supplies, and living expenses. This proposal would provide emergency relief to help meet the additional financial needs of postsecondary students during academic years 1993-1994 and 1994-1995. This proposal responds to such problems as losses in family assets and income from the effects of the recent California earthquakes.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

- Applicants must provide documentation of their increased need associated with the earthquake.

RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- \$150 million is requested for rental assistance programs in HUD. These funds provide rent subsidies in the form of vouchers for up to 10,000 dislocated families for private apartments for up to 18 months.
- HUD will release funds from its emergency reserve to provide immediate rental assistance for victims of the earthquake. The request will supplement those emergency funds advanced by HUD.
- The rental assistance funds will be distributed to the local Public Housing Authority. Victims can apply for such rental assistance at the FEMA Disaster Assistance Centers or at their local Public Housing Agency.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

- Funds are provided through Public Housing Agencies to victims of the earthquake with incomes at or below 50 percent of the local median income (\$24,150 for a family of four in the city of Los Angeles-Long Beach primary metropolitan statistical area).

FLEXIBLE SUBSIDY PROGRAM

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- HUD requests \$100 million for the Flexible Subsidy program.
- The supplemental will be used to finance the repair and reconstruction of federally insured and/or assisted multifamily housing damaged in the earthquake.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

- Flexible Subsidy comes in two forms, depending on its purpose:
 - One form is a "soft direct loan," which is a non-amortizing, subordinate loan charging 1 percent interest and not payable until the property is sold or the mortgage matures. This type of "loan" is used to correct deferred maintenance problems or accrued operating deficits (e.g., unpaid taxes and utilities).
 - The second is in the form of a "below-market rate direct loan," which is amortizing and usually charges 3-6 percent interest. This type of loan is used to make capital improvements to benefit the health and safety of project residents.
 - The program is used nationwide by HUD to return distressed, privately owned low income housing to decent physical condition and economic viability.

HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM (HOME)

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- \$250 million is requested for the CDBG and HOME programs.
- HUD has already provided affected areas with approximately \$238 million in CDBG and HOME funds by making an early distribution of funds due those jurisdictions by formula this fiscal year. The \$250 million requested will be in addition to these previously released funds.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

- CDBG funds can be used for a range of infrastructure, housing, and service needs in areas affected by the earthquake. Supplemental funds could be used for all eligible CDBG activities except activities reimbursable by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Small Business Administration (SBA).
- HOME funds can be used for a range of housing needs in areas affected by the earthquake, including replacement and rehabilitation of housing damaged by the earthquake. Supplemental funds could be used for all eligible HOME activities except activities reimbursable by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Small Business Administration (SBA).

FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION EMERGENCY RELIEF PROGRAM

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- A total of \$1,391 million is requested for highways, of which \$400 million is requested as a contingency.
- The Department currently has \$91 million available for use in emergency repairs related to the earthquake, of which \$41 million has already been allocated to California.
- The funds will be used to clear debris from the earthquake, restore essential traffic operations, provide for emergency traffic operations, and repair damage to Federal-aid highway roads and bridges, including the nine major structures that were severely damaged by the earthquake.
- Funds for the Emergency Relief Program of the Federal Highway Administration have been fully allocated.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

- The Emergency Relief (ER) program provides assistance to States and local highway agencies to repair damages from natural disasters or catastrophic failures. ER funds are available to repair roads and bridges that are normally eligible for Federal funding under the Federal-aid highway program. Roads ineligible for ER assistance are eligible for assistance from the FEMA.
- The Federal share of eligible costs for the emergency repair work to restore essential traffic services accomplished in the first 180 days is 100 percent. For all other work, the Federal share is determined by the statutory matching share applicable to the Federal-aid highway facility damaged. In the case of California, that would be 91.57 percent for Interstate facilities and 88.53 for other Federal-aid highway facilities.
- Given the extent of the damage, the Administration proposes to exempt highway repairs associated with the earthquake from the statutory cap of \$100 million per disaster. A similar exemption was provided for highway repairs for the Loma Prieta earthquake.

FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- FEMA is requesting \$3.484 billion in Disaster Relief appropriations and \$15 million in Emergency Management Planning and Assistance (EMPA) resources. The latter will fund earthquake research activities in conjunction with other agencies (e.g., NIST, NSF, USGS).
- The Disaster Relief request is in addition to \$143 million in contingent emergency appropriations already released, and \$265 million in contingent appropriations to be released shortly. Total FEMA Disaster Assistance for the earthquake would be \$3,892 billion.
- Disaster Relief funds will be used to respond to emergency needs of individuals and families (including temporary housing and crisis counseling) and for repair of public facilities. Public facilities include schools, non-Federal aid roads, public water systems, government buildings, and eligible private non-profit structures. Funds will also be used to support about \$400 million in hazard mitigation activities; those projects that will reduce future disaster liability. This allocation to mitigation activities is required by a statutory formula.
- EMPA resources (\$15 million) will be used to increase scientific understanding of the effect of earthquakes on public infrastructure by studying this disaster.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

- Disaster housing assistance (funds for rent, and minor home repairs) are funded completely by the Federal government and are provided directly to recipients. Individual and Family Grants (funds for repair/replacement of lost or damaged property) are cost shared on a 75 percent Federal/25 percent State basis, which is not waivable under the statute. Crisis counseling services are also funded at 100 percent by the Federal government.
- Public assistance is generally cost shared at 75 percent Federal/25 percent State basis but will be adjusted for California to a 90 percent Federal/10 percent State formula. The extent of the damage will exceed the threshold used to determine cost share formulas for past disasters (\$64 in damage per state resident).

SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION
DISASTER LOANS

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- SBA requests \$163 million to support an additional \$559 million in disaster loans and \$35 million for disaster loan processing. These low-interest loans would be made primarily to homeowners, renters and business owners to aid in their recovery from uninsured losses.
- In addition, funds supporting \$391 million in loans and \$50 million for disaster loan processing has already been released.
- Including contingency funds previously released, SBA's resources will support \$950 million in loans.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

- This program provides direct loans to homeowners, renters, and businesses to repair or replace damage to real property to its pre-disaster condition. Businesses of any size are eligible, as are non-profit organizations. Also, economic injury disaster loans (EIDLs) are available for working capital to small businesses and small agricultural cooperatives.
- All potential applicants should first register with FEMA at the nearest Disaster Application Center (DAC). FEMA refers victims with incomes above minimum thresholds to SBA for possible loan assistance. All business victims and self-employed homeowners or renters are referred to SBA.
- SBA conducts interviews to explain the disaster loan program and the application process and forms. SBA provides local workshops where disaster victims can get help in completing the loan application forms and obtaining the necessary supporting documentation (such as copies of tax returns). Loan applications can be submitted by mail or in person.

PRESIDENTIAL CONTINGENCIES

SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST

- \$400 million is requested for contingencies to address a variety of programmatic needs. These include program requirements tentatively identified in the Departments of Commerce, Veterans Administration, Labor and Health and Human Services.
- These monies would be allocated to various departments based on an assessment of needs. The process would mirror that used for the Loma Prieta earthquake, when Congress appropriated \$250 million for the President to transfer to "any Federal governmental activity to meet the requirements of the [recent] natural disasters."
- Potential Commerce needs include disaster assistance funding, a regional infrastructure bank to capitalize a source of loans for infrastructure repair and rehabilitation not otherwise funded, and telecommuting pilot programs.
- Other potential requirements include increased agency staffing needs to process disaster assistance expeditiously while guarding against fraud, additional Community Development Block Grant funds, and repair to Veterans Administration facilities.

It is a great pleasure to be here tonight. And it is a wonderful honor to receive the Commitment to Life award -- particularly when it is given by a group of people who so completely exemplify what a commitment to life really means.

It would seem that Nature continues to insist on testing your commitment. But I believe that the response of the people of Los Angeles to the devastation caused by last week's earthquake proves that your strength and your concern for one another is stronger than ever. Given my experience with the people of this city I would have expected no less.

Two years ago, before the Democratic National convention, I had the opportunity to tour AIDS Project Los Angeles, and to witness first hand the incredible work APLA does to care for and support people who are living with AIDS.

Any joy one feels about the success of an organization such as APLA must be an ambivalent one. For it is our dearest wish that such an organization was unnecessary...that there was no thing as the pandemic of AIDS.

But that is a wish. And the reality is that since January 1981, more than 340,000 people have developed AIDS in the United States, and more than 200,000 have died from the complications resulting from AIDS. It is a plague that knows no boundaries: it infects our children and our elderly, our rich and our poor; it has ravaged the lesbian and gay community, the heterosexual community, men and women of all races living in every country around the world. Today it is estimated that over one million Americans are living with HIV. (And as of August 1993, 21,912 of those living with AIDS were from the Los Angeles Community.)

For most, if not all of us here tonight, these statistics have meant the loss of people we love. We have been forced to watch as AIDS and HIV have stolen the lives of our parents and children, brothers and sisters, friends and lovers. We have been forced to say good-bye far too many times.

Yet among all the darkness, there is light. A light that burns so brightly you can feel its warmth the moment you enter AIDS Project Los Angeles. Because what APLA, and all of you here tonight, have shown is that no matter how dire the circumstances, we will

keep fighting. That there is no disease powerful enough to keep us from loving, and supporting and caring for each other. You have shown that passion and courage can prevail.

Every single one of you has made a commitment to life. Those who are living with HIV or AIDS have shown a courage and a strength that is truly inspirational. Every day you fight for what you believe in -- not only for yourselves, but for us all.

You have worked hard to educate the public about living with HIV and AIDS and in the process you have taught us valuable lessons about living. You have taught us to appreciate each and every day.

And you are not alone. When others closed their eyes and sometimes their hearts, the members of AIDS Project Los Angeles reached out. You have responded to the many segments of the AIDS community. Your first-class provision of comprehensive services, your far-reaching education programs -- every thing that your remarkable organization does -- helps guarantee that tomorrow is an even better day for People Living With Aids here in Los Angeles. You left no one alone.

And YOU are not alone. Because we in government are determined to live up to your shining example. For the past decade, the federal government has not been willing to commit its resources to the AIDS crisis nor even willing to speak about it publicly. Those days are over. To address the AIDS crisis head-on, now, for the first time, the President has appointed the first National AIDS Policy Coordinator, Kristine Gebbie, to direct the national policies to stop HIV transmission, to care for those already infected, and to find a cure as soon as possible. The Clinton Administration has increased overall AIDS funding by 25 percent, including a 300 million dollar increase in funding for the Ryan White Care Act.

We are aware that people with HIV-AIDS need comprehensive health care services and that these are too often difficult to obtain. I personally have worked hard to develop a national approach to health care that would provide coverage for every American. Universal coverage is and must be our bottom line.

Some people think that we can make a crisis go away simply by denying that it exists. I think all of us here know the injurious effects of that attitude. We did not make the AIDS crisis go away by ignoring it; we made it worse. And we are in danger of doing the same thing to our health care system. It is time to face reality. It is time to ask ourselves some hard questions.

Questions like what kind of a system denies insurance to the people who need it most? What kind of a system says to people "I'm sorry but you are too high a risk. You will have to find some way to bear the enormous brunt of health care costs yourself." Not the kind of system that we want. Not the kind of system that any person who possesses the courage and compassion that I have seen among the people of Los Angeles would

create. And not the kind of system that the President has proposed.

The insurance companies have been allowed to discriminate for too long. And this discrimination has got to stop right now. Health care costs should not be decided on the basis of whether you are young or old; thin or fat; sick or well. Health care costs should not be determined by whether or not someone in your office has cancer. In short, health care costs should not be determined by insurance companies. They should be determined only on the basis of fair market cost.

Every American citizen must have insurance regardless of health status. People with HIV and AIDS must be able to enroll in any health plan and receive the comprehensive benefits package at the same community rates paid by everyone within their area. The package must be portable so that people with AIDS and other chronic diseases can keep their coverage regardless of when they work or whether they change or lose their jobs.

Sadly, we cannot yet prevent people with AIDS from dying; but we can prevent them from dying without health care coverage. We can guarantee comprehensive health coverage with no lifetime limits. We can give Americans with HIV and AIDS the security of knowing that their medical needs will be met without bankrupting them. We can give them a benefits package that includes coverage of prescription drugs, home care options and long-term care while placing reasonable limits on how much patients can be required to spend out-of-pocket each year.

We know that nothing we can do will be enough until we can find a cure for the AIDS virus and the means to prevent HIV infection. And we are committed to funding the necessary research until this goal is accomplished.

It is our hope that the people at AIDS Project Los Angeles and all of you here tonight will one day -- not too far away -- be able to turn your enormous talents and support elsewhere because we will have conquered this disease.

But until that day arrives, I know that we will keep coping and we will keep fighting. I know that every day all of us will reaffirm our commitment to life.

This means that persons with HIV or AIDS will always be able to enroll in any health plan and receive the comprehensive benefits package at the same community rates paid by everyone within their area. The Clinton approach outlaws pre-existing condition exclusions and prohibits plans from charging higher premiums for individuals with poor health status. Never again will you be told you are a bad insurance risk; you will know that you have access to high quality, affordable health care that is always there.

The Clinton approach guarantees comprehensive health coverage with its lifetime limits; Americans with AIDS will have the security of knowing that their medical needs will be met without bankrupting them. The comprehensive benefits package includes coverage of prescription drugs, home care options and long-term care while placing reasonable limits on how much patients can be required to spend out-of-pocket each year. The Clinton plan also provides incentives for health plans to provide preventive services. It would strengthen as no other proposal does the nation's public health system, which would enhance HIV prevention efforts. It also increases support for prevention research at NIH and expand research to improve clinical care.

A PROCLAMATION

AIDS and HIV disease have cut short the lives of many Americans who had so much to contribute. They have plagued our sons and daughters, our mothers and fathers, our brothers and sisters, and our friends and co-workers. The devastating effects of AIDS have touched all of us. More than one million of our fellow citizens are infected with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. Since January 1981, more than 340,000 Americans have developed AIDS, and more than 200,000 have died from complications resulting from AIDS.

On this World AIDS Day, we recognize and are humbled by the global impact of HIV disease. The World Health Organization estimates that more than 14 million people worldwide are infected with HIV and that more than 2.5 million have developed AIDS. By the end of this century, more than 30 million people will have been infected with HIV and, of those, more than 10 million adults will have developed AIDS.

The extent of HIV infection is overwhelming, but we must

not allow ourselves to despair in the face of these daunting statistics. Instead, we must accelerate our efforts to find effective treatments, a vaccine, and an eventual cure for this scourge that haunts us.

This Administration has undertaken a new commitment to AIDS research and prevention and to the development of improved care and treatment for those with HIV disease. Through the strengthened Office of AIDS Research at the National Institutes of Health, we are increasing our efforts to improve treatments and working more effectively to find a cure for HIV and AIDS.

State governments and public health officials across our Nation have mobilized to educate the public and address the needs, not only of persons with AIDS, but also of their families and loved ones. Community-based organizations throughout the country have provided education, care programs, and support to those coping with HIV and their families. Volunteers across

America, members of local service organizations, church groups, gay and lesbian service organizations, and thousands of individuals have heard the summons to action and have given selflessly of their time and energy. Those who labor to hasten the end of this terrible epidemic deserve our deep appreciation and admiration.

Education is our most effective tool in preventing the spread of HIV/AIDS. We need to ensure that all Americans will protect their lives and the lives of their loved ones by making safe and healthy choices. Government alone cannot solve this crisis. We all must look deep within our souls to find the compassion, the values, the spirit, and the commitment that will allow us to conquer this modern-day plague.

I call upon every American to join in the effort to fight the spread of HIV and to treat those living with HIV with dignity and respect. We all hope and pray for the day when we discover a cure and a preventive vaccine. Until that day -- which I know will come -- we all must work together, strengthen our resolve to marshal the resources necessary to end the epidemic, and increase our compassion for those who need our help in their struggle against HIV disease.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, WILLIAM J. CLINTON, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim December 1, 1993, as World AIDS Day, and I invite the Governors of the States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, officials of other territories subject to the jurisdiction of the United States, and the American people to join me in reaffirming our commitment to combatting HIV/AIDS and to helping those living with this disease.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this thirtieth day of November, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and ninety-three, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and eighteenth.

SUBJECT: Political and HCR issues for the Los Angeles trip
January 27, 1994

At your office's request, I have put together some of the political issues that may arise during Thursday's visit to Los Angeles to speak at the AIDS Project LA event.

The HIV/AIDS Community Political Issues:

Generally, the Administration's relationship with the AIDS community has been very good. Positive issues have been the FY 94 increases for research, prevention and Ryan White.

Supporting the creation of the Office of AIDS Research, a Kennedy-Waxman initiative, has been an important accomplishment that many LA people worked on.

People in LA need to know that HCR will include everyone. There continues to be a lack of education in the community about HCR. We hear a lot of comments expressing the concern that HCR will not pass Congress. We need to reassure them that this is truly universal coverage. Our office has identified the top ten issues of concern to people with HIV/AIDS:

Financing and Risk Adjustment - will redlining be used to adjust out areas with high density of people living with HIV?

Essential Providers - this is an important concern. AIDS specialists need to be available to everyone who needs them.

Grievance Procedures - will the process be so slow and long that people will have died from AIDS before their grievance is heard?

Long term care and home health care -

Mental Health and Substance Abuse - how limited will these benefits be. HIV/AIDS people have additional needs here.

Confidentiality and discrimination protection -
Protection may lapse if local Alliance Boards are elected instead of appointed. The fear here is that the right wing will take some board over and promote anti-AIDS and anti-choice practices.

Ryan White CARE Act - wraparound services will be protected. People fear cuts in Ryan White.

Prevention/Research funding -

Supplemental services under Medicaid - implications for services that are now covered, but will become "state options".

Prescription drugs - although there is coverage people are concerned about drug formularies being used to exclude expensive drugs and what a national standard.

Getting drugs to market faster is a major concern in California. The State passed a law (AB-1952) making testing easier for drugs manufactured in California. It might be good to bring up that the new HHS Drug Development Task Force will work to make government and the private sector work better together.

Needle Exchange for HIV prevention remains a high priority in the community. This is a sensitive policy issue which is currently under review and being researched with within and outside the federal government.

Medical use of marijuana to combat AIDS relating wasting and/or nausea is also a very current issue in San Diego. Just recently a man with AIDS was imprisoned for possession, and he claims that he was raped while there. The Public Health Service is currently studying this issue.

ACT-UP may be out for a small demonstration, but it's not likely to pick up much steam.

The Gay/Lesbian Community Political Issues:

Although we do not track gay and lesbian issues outside of HIV/AIDS, we did make several inquiries to identify the following:

One of the top issues is the gay ban in the military. Some observes believe that there will be a lot of action on California college campuses regarding ROTC and its exclusion. People are

still very angry about the "don't ask, don't tell".

Tony Miller, an openly gay candidate for Secretary of State, who is the Acting Secretary of State is running as the first openly gay person for a state wide office (on the Democratic ticket).

John Duran, an openly gay well known civil rights lawyer is running for the State Assembly in a district that covers West Hollywood and the westside of LA and part of the Valley.

Public Health Service Publishes Guide for AIDS Treatment

Ignorance of medical particulars will no longer be a good excuse for doctors and nurses to avoid taking care of people infected with the AIDS virus, the United States Public Health Service said yesterday.

The agency published a 196-page "clinical practice guideline" on how to diagnose and manage patients in the early stages of infection with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV).

"Some providers are reluctant [to treat HIV patients] for a variety of reasons," Philip R. Lee, director of the Public Health Service, said at a news conference. Some of that reluctance comes from fear and prejudice, though most, he said, comes from the belief by many doctors that HIV infection is too complicated for anyone but experts to manage.

"By having the knowledge base in one place, at their fingertips, I think

we'll overcome the major obstacle," Lee said.

The guideline is the seventh in a series of PHS pamphlets aimed at improving treatment of common medical problems. As with the others, the one for HIV infection stresses the importance of primary care practitioners, not specialists, in making the diagnosis and providing routine treatment of the illness.

The document functions not only as a "how-to" manual for strictly medical questions; it also details issues such as the risks and benefits of revealing one's HIV status to others; the importance of including women and minority groups in AIDS drug experiments; and some of the particular problems of access to care encountered by poor people infected with the virus.

The guideline addresses the needs not only of adult men—the original and largest infected population—but also pregnant and non-pregnant women, adolescents, children and infants.

About 1 million Americans are

now infected with HIV. This year, between 40,000 and 60,000 new infections will occur, and between 47,000 and 66,000 people are expected to die of AIDS, according to federal estimates. About half of all AIDS patients are blacks or Hispanics.

During the early years of the 10-year-old epidemic—and to a large extent still—HIV patients were treated by infectious disease specialists or other physicians who had developed a particular interest and expertise in the infection.

"In too many communities, people have been undiagnosed, misdiagnosed or ignored after diagnosis . . . by providers who are ignorant of how to treat or unwilling to treat," said Cornelius A. Baker, a representative of the National Association of People with AIDS. The guideline "is an extremely useful tool in demystifying treatment . . . especially in those providers who are seeing their first case of confirmed HIV infection."

Though the guidelines acknowledge that people with advanced

AIDS may need specialty care, they stress that treatment of relatively stable HIV infection falls well within a generalist's realm.

"We are here today to say there is no magic to taking care of HIV-infected patients. It is no different from taking care of a person with any other chronic condition," said Wafaa El-Sadr, chief of infectious diseases at Harlem Hospital Center and a co-chairman of the 19-member panel that wrote the guideline.

El-Sadr and James M. Oleske, a pediatric AIDS specialist at New Jersey Medical School and the other co-chairman, examined 30,000 articles on HIV infection, ultimately reading and evaluating 700 of them, with the help of other panel members.

The guideline offers advice on such subjects as: how frequently HIV patients should undergo blood tests to measure the condition of their immune systems; when antiviral drugs are most useful; what is the best drug regimen for preventing *Pneumocystis carinii* pneumonia, a common infection in AIDS

patients; and what routine screening tests (such as those for TB and cervical cancer) doctors should be sure to order for HIV patients.

The document is very specific, in some places naming drugs and dosages. In addition, it cites the medical literature when discussing various issues, and labels its recommendations as "supported by evidence," "suggested by evidence" or simply the product of "expert opinion."

A 36-page "Quick Reference Guide for Clinicians," which includes recommendations and treatment "decision trees," and a 17-page "Consumer Guide" to early HIV infection were also released yesterday.

Children's Defense Fund Cites Gun Violence

The equivalent of a "classroomful" of children is killed every two days by firearms, the Children's Defense Fund reported yesterday, warning that homicide is now the nation's third leading cause of death for elementary and middle school children.

The children's advocacy group, in its annual State of America's Children report, called for a "cease-fire" in "America's undeclared 20th Century civil war," citing a steep rise both in the number of children victimized by guns and those arrested for committing crimes with guns.

The attention to violence represented something of a new focus for the group, which has traditionally used its report to underscore child poverty and related social problems.

"Our worst nightmares are coming true," said Marian Wright Edelman, CDF president. "After years of epidemic poverty, joblessness, racial intolerance, family disintegration, domestic violence and drug and alcohol abuse, the crisis of children having children has been

eclipsed by the greater crisis of children killing children."

Based largely on federal health statistics, the report emphasized the cumulative impact of the rising child death toll from homicides, suicides and gun accidents:

■ In 1991, the number of American children younger than 10 who died as a result of firearms was twice the number of U.S. troops killed in the Persian Gulf and Somalia combined.

■ Between 1979 and 1991, nearly 50,000 children were killed by guns, a figure roughly equivalent to the number of Americans killed in the Vietnam War.

■ A child in this country is 15 times as likely to die as a result of gunfire as a child in Northern Ireland.

At the same time, arrests of juveniles for murder and the more serious cases of manslaughter rose by nearly 93 percent between 1982 and 1991. Over the same period, comparable arrests for persons 18 and over grew by about 11 percent.

The organization called for a series of steps, including more stringent regulation of guns and ammunition, preventive measures of education and family support programs, jobs for young people and programs

to keep children safe and off the streets when they are not in school.

The impact of this violence, the report said, is psychological, social and financial.

The cost of treating gun injuries to children adds billions of dollars to the nation's public health costs, CDF said. The National Association of Children's Hospitals and Related Institutions calculates the average cost of hospitalization for a child gun injury at \$14,434. While 13 children die each day from gunfire, another 30 are injured.

The report also quoted psychiatrists and other experts on the effect on children in high-crime areas, many of whom have witnessed robberies, stabbings and killings.

"They become sad, angry, aggressive and uncaring after exposure to continuous violence," the report said, quoting the work of James Garbarino, president of the Erikson Institute and co-author of a book on children and violence. He said the effect on inner-city children of exposure to violence has caused them to show symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder comparable to children in Mozambique, Cambodia and Palestine.

The report assigned the rising violence by and against children to the combined effects of poverty, economic inequality, racial intolerance, substance abuse, violence at home and in the media, and the increase in divorce and out-of-wedlock births.

CDF called for families and friends to mobilize to stop the proliferation of non-sporting firearms and ammunition in private hands, and for adults to "break the code of silence about the breakdown of spiritual values."

"All parents must struggle to value children enough to discipline them, spend time with them, be decent role models for them and fight for what they need from our community and nation," the report said.

It went on to urge that parents not keep guns under the bed or in the closet, truck or car.

The organization cited other statistics underscoring poor conditions for millions of American children.

The number of children in poverty, for example, increased in 1992 to 14.6 million, or 21.9 percent of the total. Not since 1965 have so many children lived below the poverty line, it said.

The number of children reported as abused or neglected in 1992 rose

to 2.9 million, three times the figure for 1980. The number of children living in foster care rose to 442,000 in 1992, nearly 70 percent more than the figure a decade earlier.

When compared with the 50 states, the District was ranked poorly in the report on several measures. It ranked last in percent of births to women receiving early prenatal care in 1991, with just over 55 percent of women falling into that category.

SUBJECT: Background Information on HIV/AIDS for Your Upcoming
Trip to Europe

I wanted to let you know that Philip Lee, M.D., Assistant Secretary for Health, at HHS and I have recently returned from trips to Europe. Since you will be traveling to Europe this weekend, I thought you may find the attached background information on HIV/AIDS useful. It includes information on both global and domestic activities.

An issue that may be brought to your attention if you visit the World Health Organization Global Program on AIDS (GPA) deals specifically with the Fiscal Year 1993 funding reduction for the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID). This reduction will have an impact on USAID's funding to the GPA. More detailed information on this issue is included in the attached Global HIV/AIDS material under the Agency for International Development.

Attachment

GLOBAL HIV/AIDS INFORMATION

- Originally identified in homosexual populations, three-quarters of all worldwide HIV infections have been transmitted through heterosexual intercourse. Other modes of transmission include contaminated blood transfusions, the sharing of intravenous drug injection equipment, and transmission from mother to child during pregnancy.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that by the year 2000 the cumulative total of HIV infections in men, women, and children will be between 30 and 40 million. This is probably a conservative prediction.
- HIV has a long incubation period between infection and illness of between 5 and 10 years. Current AIDS-related deaths are resulting from initial infections of almost a decade ago, and infections today are unlikely to manifest themselves until the next century.
- Because HIV is predominately transmitted sexually, AIDS kills many people who are in their 20's, 30's and 40's -- their economically most productive as well as their childbearing years. The world's youth, whose median age of first intercourse is now 15 to 16 years of age and in some places as young as 12, are especially vulnerable. This is the population that will drive the pandemic in the future.
- By the year 2000, 90 percent of the HIV infections will have occurred in the developing world. The WHO estimates that by mid-1993 more than 8 million HIV infections and 1.5 million cases of AIDS have occurred in sub-Saharan Africa. In some cities across the African continent, HIV has infected between a quarter and a third of adults between the ages of 15 to 49. Figures for North Africa and the Middle East are unclear but the WHO believes that more than 75,000 cumulative HIV infections have occurred in that region.
- There is indication that Asia will surpass Africa in terms of numbers of HIV positive persons. The spread of the disease in Thailand and India is growing at an exponential rate and is attributed to commercial sex trade and increased users of injecting drugs.
- Both Central Asia and Eastern Europe are experiencing increases in numbers of HIV positive persons. Contributing factors, such as the increase in commercial sex trade for hard currency, migration throughout the region, and intravenous drug use, combined with health systems in distress, can have a negative effect on attempts to prevent the further spread of HIV/AIDS. The WHO estimates 50,000

cumulative cases in the region.

- The Latin American and Caribbean region claim approximately 1.5 million infections with over 240,000 AIDS cases.
- In Australia, North America, and Western Europe, there have been an estimated 1.5 million cumulative HIV adult infections with over 400,000 cases of AIDS. Over one million of these infections have occurred in the United States.

U.S. INVOLVEMENT IN GLOBAL HIV/AIDS

- The major United States Government agencies involved with HIV/AIDS internationally are the: Department of Health and Human Services (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Institutes of Health - Fogerty International Center), Department of Defense (DoD) and the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID). Ongoing programs include research, training, technical assistance and prevention activities. Below is a description of these respective programs.

CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION

- Through requests from the WHO, the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), and the USAID, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) provides short term technical assistance, resident technical advisors, and training to support the design, implementation, management, and evaluation of HIV prevention activities and programs in countries most affected by the HIV/AIDS pandemic.
- CDC has been involved in three long term research projects in Cote d'Ivoire, Thailand, and, until recently, Zaire. Through collaborative agreements with the governments of these countries, CDC established epidemiologic, laboratory, and prevention studies regarding HIV/AIDS.

NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH - FOGERTY INTERNATIONAL CENTER

- The National Institutes of Health Fogerty International Center sponsors the AIDS International Training and Research Program. The program's objectives are to: increase the capacity of foreign scientists to deal with the AIDS epidemic through epidemiological research, clinical trials and other prevention programs; to support collaborative research between the U.S. and foreign scientists in the epidemiology, diagnosis and treatment of AIDS; and to stimulate cooperation and sharing of research knowledge by scientists combatting AIDS worldwide.
- This program recently expanded to include Russia and entities of the former Soviet Union. Eleven trainees from the former

USSR have participated in training courses in the U.S. under this program. The program provides for training in AIDS and AIDS-related epidemiology as well as postdoctoral research and training in AIDS, both in the U.S. and in-country.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

- The DoD sponsors programs in basic and applied research, including the search for a viable vaccine throughout its facilities both in the United States and abroad. Treatment programs are available for both military active duty personnel and beneficiaries. Prevention programs are also available through on-site programs.
 - Listed below are estimates on the costs for HIV/AIDS for the DoD broken out in terms of research, treatment and prevention. The projections for prevention include only the cost of screening and testing for military enlisted personnel centers, active duty and Guard and Reserve elements. They do not include the cost of an extensive network of service specific preventive medical officers and nurses who provide support, counseling, and education at military facilities.

AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- Since 1986, the USAID has taken a leadership role in HIV prevention and control by supporting HIV/AIDS interventions in over 70 countries. By developing comprehensive programs that integrate multiple interventions, AID's programs are oriented towards preventing the spread of HIV/AIDS by sexual transmission.
- USAID has implemented most of its HIV/AIDS initiatives through two independent projects: AIDS Public Health Communications (AIDSCOM) and AIDS Technical Support (AIDSTECH) as well as by placement of public health specialists in selected countries. In FY 1992 funding obligations for HIV/AIDS prevention activities totalled over \$95 million.
- From Fiscal Years (FY) 1986 to 1992, USAID has committed more than \$400 million to HIV/AIDS prevention activities through bilateral programs and contributions to the multilateral efforts of the WHO Global Program on AIDS (GPA).

- In FY 1992, USAID contributed \$25 million to the GPA out of a budget total of \$36 million (the balance of \$11 million was contributed by other donor countries).
- As an agency, however, USAID is targeted to take a 40 to 50 percent funding cut for FY 1993. This anticipated \$10 million cut will be reflected across agency programs with the GPA affected proportionately.
- The United States is also a co-sponsor with Japan and other countries on a proposed initiative that would merge the activities of GPA with other United Nations agencies, such as the United Nations Development Program, UNICEF and the United Nations Family Planning Agency involved in AIDS. The purpose of this proposed initiative is to coordinate more closely all U.N. AIDS-related activities at the program level and allow more input from the individual country level.

The following is being issued by Phill Wilson of AIDS

President Clinton's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell, Don't Pursue"
policy toward lesbians and gays serving in the military is a
product of the Alice in Wonderland School of Public Policy -- it
tries to pretend that what is isn't and what is not is.

Six months ago, President Clinton announced his conviction
that conduct should be the only yardstick against which our
military service personnel are measured, and yet at the final
hour, he decided that there would be two yardsticks -- one for
our straight personnel and a different one for lesbians and gays.

The question is, does this kind of policy address the
primary issues of who serves and does not serve in our military to
our best advantage as a nation? Does it establish a structure
whereby the most qualified people are available to perform the
jobs the military calls for? Or does it instead set up a
structure whereby our military becomes preoccupied with denying
lesbians and gays the right to serve regardless of job
qualification?

The President and the military have advocated for the latter.
And why? Are lesbians inherently too short or too heavy? Are
gays intellectually inferior to their straight male counterparts?
Every study that has ever been done has come to the same
conclusion -- there is no real reason for the ban against
lesbians and gays in the military.

There is only fear and prejudice, and we cannot let fear
and prejudice be the yardstick by which we measure our service
personnel at the expense of conduct and accomplishment.

American lives have been endangered by the credence given to hysterical misinformation about the possible spread of HIV in the armed services. The military already has effective policies that help stop the transmission of the AIDS virus, and the misnomer that AIDS is just a "gay" disease has helped the virus spread unchecked to women, teens and communities of color.

Clinton's policy is discriminatory. Clinton's policy does not maximize human potential in the military. Clinton's policy of dishonesty certainly does not engender cohesiveness in the military. Clinton's policy fails the citizens of the United States who depend on our armed forces to safeguard the liberty of all Americans in the most efficient and equitable manner possible.

No one has denied that lesbians and gays are serving and will continue to serve in the U.S. armed forces. No one has even denied that lesbians and gays are serving the United States of America with distinction. No one has denied that kicking lesbians and gays out of the military has cost American taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars. Yet we still want to deny them the right to serve in the military.

If our President does not embrace truth, we are a nation of liars. If our President allows discrimination, we are not free. Liberty and justice for ... who?

Hot off her landmark Las Vegas concerts, Barbra Streisand will join Whitney Houston, Patti LuPone and Doris Day, among others, at the seventh Commitment to Life event -- the entertainment industry's biggest fund-raising event to combat AIDS.

The Jan. 27 program to benefit AIDS Project Los Angeles at the Universal Amphitheatre will honor First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and Walt Disney Studios Chairman Jeffrey Katzenberg for their efforts in health care and in the fight against the disease.

The lineup of stars scheduled to appear onstage includes Richard Gere, Lauren Bacall, Liza Minnelli, Sarah Brightman and Debbie Reynolds, as well as the New York-based Rockettes, the Bill T. Jones Dance Co. and the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra.

Streisand's publicist, Richard Guttman, said that the star does not plan to sing and will be on hand to introduce Mrs. Clinton. Show producer Steve Tisch said that he and co-producer Dana Miller have asked Streisand to consider singing one song from her Las Vegas show. "It would be sensational if she does," Tisch said.

At 1992's event, which raised \$3.9 million, Streisand made one of her rare singing appearances when she was the recipient of a Commitment to Life award.

The producers said the theme "Heaven Can Wait" will run through the show and serve as a tribute to celebrities lost to the disease. Each performer has a direct relationship to a lost celebrity.

The appearance by Day, who will sing, is a rare one, and is prompted by her friendship with the late actor Rock Hudson.

Houston, who will sing two songs, knew choreographer Michael Bennett.

Others to be remembered include Peter Allen, Howard Ashman, Arthur Ashe, Liberace, Robert Mapplethorpe, Freddie Mercury, Paul Jabara and Halston.

Minnelli, who was married at one time to Allen, will sing "And the Day After That," from the musical "The Kiss of the Spider Woman," with a chorus of 200. The song has become an unofficial AIDS anthem.

Miller said that LuPone will sing "As If We Never Said Goodbye," from the musical "Sunset Boulevard," as the faces of lost celebrities pass on a screen behind her. LuPone, who stars in the London company of the musical, will fly in for one night. She has performed in APLA shows before and, Miller, in answer to a question, said that her appearance had nothing to do with any attempt to upstage Glenn Close, the star of the Los Angeles edition of "Sunset Boulevard," and with whom LuPone appears to be in competition for the lead in the show's eventual New York company.

"The fact is, Glenn Close will be singing that night at the Shubert Theatre," Miller added.

The producers said that some free tickets will be made available to APLA's clients and that the names of about 10,000 persons who have died from AIDS will be rolled across a screen during the course of the show. "They are all celebrities," Miller said.

The co-chairs of the evening are QVC Chairman Barry Diller, Walt Disney Co. Chairman Michael Eisner, show business mogul David Geffen and Creative Artists Agency partner Ron Meyer.

Do they go too far or do they not go far enough?

When the federal Centers for Disease Control last week released a new series of HIV prevention ads for radio and television that target people 18 to 25, the ads drew criticism from both conservatives and gay activists. Many conservatives thought they were too explicit; gay community leaders complained that there weren't enough references to gays and bisexuals.

All four television networks have agreed to donate air time to broadcast the ads. Four Chronicle reporters -- Leah Garchik, Teresa Moore, David Tuller and Sam Whiting -- took a look at them. Here are their impressions:

.

TELEVISION ADS AD: ''AUTOMATIC''

Content: To zippy music, a condom jumps out of a drawer, hops across the floor and slips under the covers of the bed. Quote: ''It would be nice if latex condoms were automatic. But since they're not, using them should be.''

Comments: Anything that involves an adorable animal -- in this case a surprised kitten -- seems too cutesy-poo to me. Visual image of condom moving around by itself is inappropriate; point should be that they don't move around by themselves, that it takes a human to make them useful. . . . It seems like something from ''Get Smart.'' . . . The visuals sort of distract you from the message. . . . Clever idea and execution, but will it convince anyone?

AD: ''TURNED DOWN'' (ENGLISH AND SPANISH VERSIONS)

Content: A man and a woman are kissing passionately. When he

says he forgot to bring the condom, she turns on the light and tells him no dice.

Quote: She: "'Did you bring it?'" He: "'Uh-uh. I forgot it.'" She: (turning on light) "'Forget it.'" Narrator: "'Next time don't forget it. And every time make it part of the relationship.'"

Comments: Scenario of responsible woman and buffoonish man may resonate for many straights, but where's the gay version? . . . A bit demeaning to relationships. She not only turns him down because he forgot the condom, she turns her back on him, then turns on the light. . . . Best of visual ads because it's sexy, because anyone would want to be one-half of the beautiful, hot-blooded couple, because it leaves kids with the notion of having sex with a condom on or not having it at all and because it shows that being careful doesn't mean being a prude. . . . If that woman is smart enough to say, "'No glove, no love,'" why isn't she smart enough to have brought her own condoms?

.

AD: "'PEER EDUCATOR'"

Content: An AIDS education counselor talks about condoms while driving. A second version advocates abstinence.

Quote: "'I'll go anywhere to talk about latex condoms -- even into your living room.'"

Comments: No-nonsense information makes this the most effective of the ads. . . . This is the most compelling and believable of the ads because it is just one woman driving a car and talking as if the viewer is a passenger. . . . Too pedantic, and setting is too nonspecific. I turned off the message just as soon as she started lecturing.

.

AD: FREE BROCHURE

Content: Written message about condoms appears on the screen.

Quote: "'Latex condoms are effective in preventing the spread of HIV when used consistently and correctly.'"

Comments: Succeeds in getting the basic message across without relying on gimmicks and strained plot devices. . . . Too much like a stern warning that flu season is approaching. . . . Too deadly serious to reach most kids. Seems like the teacher standing in front of room and giving out dire and oh-so-dry warnings. . . . So fast, you blink and you miss it. Easy to tune out.

.

AD: ''WE'LL WAIT''

Content: In one version, a man facing the camera talks to his lover about their relationship; the second features a woman doing the same. They seem to advocate waiting to make love but make no direct mention of condoms or safe sex.

Quote: ''I want your hand on my back when I make my way through a crowd. . . . I'll never hurt you, never lie to you and never put you in danger.''

Comments: An OK idea, but the execution is hokey. . . . Will appeal to romantics who cried at telephone company's ''reach out and touch'' ads. . . . Ending is like a church message to wait for sex. . . . Annoyingly stereotypical, especially because we want to give out the message that everyone's got to protect themselves. . . . This ad could work for gay men and straight women.

Editor's note: On Friday, the federal government ordered the following public service announcement off the air after learning that narrator Anthony Kiedis of the Red Hot Chili Peppers was convicted of indecent exposure and misdemeanor sexual battery in 1990. See news story in Section A. Here's the ad you will not hear:

AD: ''NAKED''

Content: Singer Anthony Kiedis of the Red Hot Chili Peppers tells listeners to have safe sex.

Quote: ''There, I'm naked, see, and what I have here is a naked condom. . . . I'm not saying that you should have sex, I'm not saying that you shouldn't have sex, but I'm saying wear a latex condom if you're gonna have sex.''

Comments: Hip youth role model is cocky but likable and could convince some listeners to use condoms. . . . He'd make listener feel it's cool to wear a condom. . . . He is honest without being pedantic, and imagining him putting on a condom is titillating; he makes the listener stay tuned to his message. . . . He has the kind of voice that makes it easy to fill in the blanks. Cool. Effective. The absolute best ad.

AD: ''MIKE''

Content: Speaker asks us to pretend that his voice carries HIV and emits garbled sounds when he simulates covering the microphone with a condom.

Quote: ''Suppose my voice were HIV and you could get infected by listening -- you'd change the station.''

Comments: A bit silly, but could catch the attention of target audience. . . . Ad breaks down into foolishness when condom covers the mike and drowns out speaker's words. . . . This is a clown-like ad; a joke for joke's sake. . . . Jason Alexander (of TV's ''Seinfeld'') doesn't sound like much of anything -- he's no Anthony Kiedis. The condom muffling the voice/HIV also misses the other thing you think when you hear this: The condom can ''muffle'' sensation too.

AIDS Project L.A. to Honor Hillary Clinton

First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and Walt Disney Studios Chairman Jeffrey Katzenberg will be the recipients of the seventh "Commitment to Life" awards given by AIDS Project Los Angeles to recognize work in the fight against the disease.

The awards will be presented at the Universal Amphitheatre on Jan. 27.

The annual show has attracted some of the entertainment world's biggest names since it was conceived in 1985 by Elizabeth Taylor as an entertainment industry response to AIDS after the death of actor Rock Hudson. Since then, it has become one of the largest single AIDS fund-raisers. Last year's event recognizing Barbra Streisand and industry mogul David Geffen raised \$3.9 million for the AIDS service organization.

TV and film producer Steve Tisch, APLA chairman, cited Mrs. Clinton's health care reform proposals, "which are sensitive to AIDS issues," as the reason behind the award.

Tisch said Katzenberg is on the APLA governing board and has been "extremely supportive over the years, both personally and via Disney. He has made a substantial financial commitment to APLA and to date he has not allowed himself to be honored. It's time that the business honor him."
