Proposal for a visit to Las Vegas by First Lady Hillary Clinton

These proposals are submitted assuming the First Lady would be so kind as to visit for between 1 to 2 hours. (A longer visit would be greatly appreciated and separate proposals for a longer visit are available upon request.)

1. A tour of University Medical Center.

University Medical Center (UMC) is a county hospital with 560 beds.

UMC provides acute care and serves as a teaching hospital and trauma center for the entire southern Nevada region.

UMC operates: southern Nevada's only burn center

an advanced pediatric program including a Level III neonatal unit.

the only trauma center in southern Nevada

the only Comprehensive Cancer Care Center

An outpatient clinic

an AIDS inpatient unit and outpatient clinic

a Maternal/Child Care Center

a free-standing rehabilitation center

four Quick Care centers.

UMC opened one of the first dedicated AIDS units in the country in July 1987. Unfortunately, the unit is always full. Nevada has been especially hard hit by the AIDS epidemic. Nevada has ranked among the top ten states for AIDS incidence. Because of the number of people in the state, the absolute number of AIDS cases is less than the number of cases in large, metropolitan areas. Hence, UMC has never been able to obtain Federal assistance for medical care for people with HIV. The financial burden has fallen primarily on UMC. UMC has been able to ensure that no one with HIV disease in the southern Nevada community goes without the medical attention nor the social support they need. UMC is part of a coordinated HIV/AIDS care program that is having great success with limited resources.

UMC struggles annually to meet the health needs of southern Nevada primarily because of the number of indigent they serve. There has been an 11% surge in the number of patients lacking resources draining UMC. This has accounted for shortfalls in many years. To cover these financial shortfalls, the county is forced to either raise the taxes or use money that was set aside to improve patient services.

After the tour of this facility, we propose a panel discussion in the small auditorium on the premises of UMC. Congressman Bilbray and the First Lady would be on a panel with two or three other friends of the plan and discuss some of the important issues in the plan and how they will affect Nevada then take some easy questions from the audience.

Congressman Bilbray's office is engaged in discussions with a local network affiliates to televise a health care panel discussion in January. Schedules permitting, the First Lady's visit could combine with this televised discussion.

Option 2

The aforementioned tour of University Medical Center. After the tour, we would assemble a friendly crowd and the First Lady would have an opportunity to speak.

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BRIEF SUMMARY OF UNIQUE FEATURES OF NEVADA HEALTH CARE

- **Over 295,000 people in Nevada are uninsured. That is a rate of 26.6%--the highest in the country.**
- **Characteristics of the uninsured are typical--75% have jobs or are dependents of someone who works, 30% of women receive no pre-natal care, and even with Medicaid, 1 in 5 Las Vegas children cannot go to a doctor because no one pays the bill.**
- **Over 80% of the businesses in Nevada are small businesses.**
- **Nevadans are not healthy. Nevada ranks 42nd in total health, 42nd in heart disease, 48th in smoking, and 48th in death per 100,000. Nevada is #1 in the nation for alcohol and tobacco related deaths. Life-style factors are to blame.**
- **There is an increasing elderly population living in Nevada. Because of the favorable tax treatment (Nevada has no state income tax), moderate climate, and a relatively low cost of living, many people retire to Nevada. This complicates the health system because of all the reasons associated with aging populations, as well as unique finance issues.**
- **Managed care is taking roots in Nevada. A majority of citizens are involved with managed care. Family Health Plan (FHP) has added 200,000 Medicare beneficiaries to its Medicare Risk-contracting program. The workmen's compensation system operates under managed care, and Medicaid is moving toward more managed care.**
- **Nevada has both an urban and a rural population.**
- **Opposition to the Health Security Act has mounted locally. The local paper, The Las Vegas Review Journal, runs a series of boxes daily on the editorial page called "ClintonCare at Work." These quote pieces of the legislation and offer a line or two of italicized, cynical text. There have been letters to the editor from the public that are patently inaccurate based on these boxes.**

In addition, the Nevada Restaurant Association has come out against the plan. The administrator of Humana Hospital (a large, private hospital) has spoken against the plan. Lastly, Nevada physicians are skeptical at best.

A visit from Mrs. Clinton would give supporters of the plan the ammunition to fight for the Health Security Act.

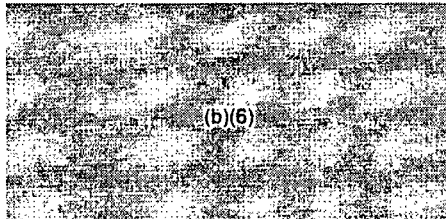

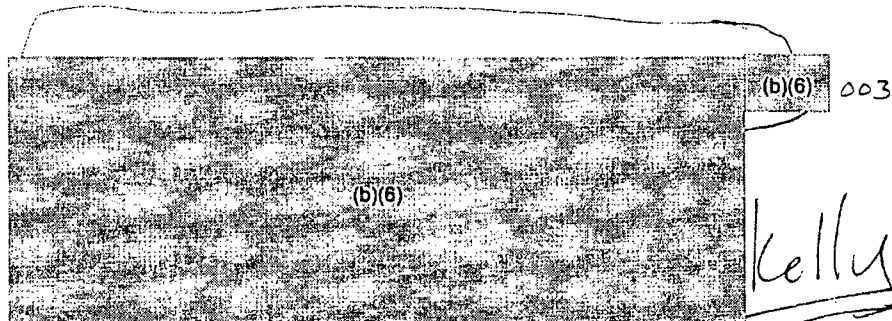

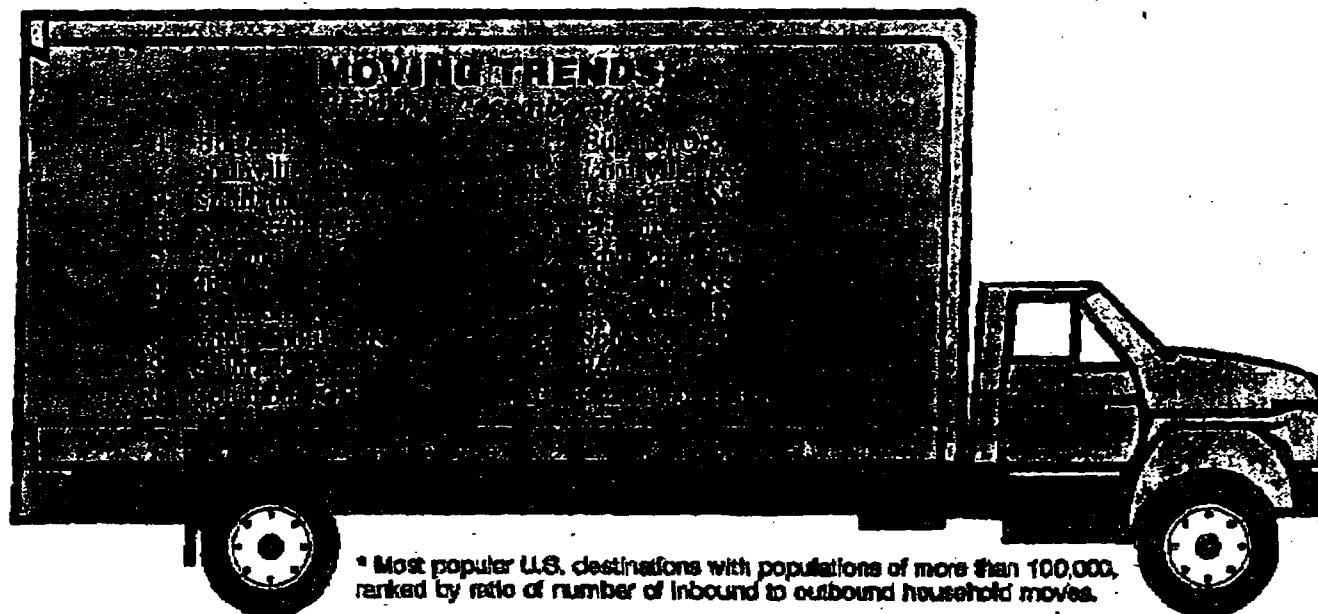

Study: 117 in for every 100 leaving

SUN STAFF REPORTS

Las Vegas was in lucky 19th place in a recent nationwide study conducted by the Ryder truck rental firm.

That study ranked Las Vegas the 19th most popular destination for people changing residences to cities with populations over 100,000 in 1993. The study ranked cities by the ratio of households moving in to those moving out.

More than 117 households moved into the Las Vegas area for every 100 that moved out. Los Angeles was the largest single source of people relocating to Las Vegas and was also the top destination

for people moving out of Las Vegas in 1993 (the study was completed before last week's earthquake struck Southern California). Phoenix was second in both categories and Salt Lake City was third.

San Diego was the fourth largest source of people moving to Las Vegas and San Francisco was fifth. Seattle was the fourth most popular destination for outbound Las Vegas, followed by Reno in fifth place, the survey showed.

Boise, Idaho, was the most popular destination city, with 181 inbound households for every 100 outbound households. Nashville, Tenn.; Springfield,

Mo.; Sioux Falls, S.D. and Richmond, Va., rounded out the top five.

Reno placed in the top 20, ranking 19th with 115 inbound households for every 100 outbound households, the survey showed.

The rankings are based on information gathered from Ryder's more than 4,700 truck rental locations, as well as statistics from various government agencies.

Senator Harry Reid of Nevada



Harry Reid was sworn in as a United States Senator on January 6, 1987. In that brief time he has compiled a distinguished record on behalf of Nevada and the entire country.

Congressional

Senator Reid is the author of the 1988 "Taxpayer Bill of Rights," historic legislation that protects the American taxpayer from IRS abuses. The Taxpayer Bill of Rights has been praised throughout the country for protecting average citizens everywhere from the tax bureaucracy.

In 1989, Reid pushed legislation through Congress designating 733,400 acres of pristine wilderness as a lasting legacy to future generations of Nevadans. The Nevada Wilderness Protection Act was signed into law by President Bush on December 6, 1989.

In 1990, Senator Reid continued his fight to end the 80-year-old "water wars" in Northern Nevada. He succeeded in negotiating an agreement between California and Nevada on California's water allocations from the Truckee River, Carson River and Lake Tahoe Basin.

Senator Reid also convened a transportation summit in early 1990 that gathered Nevada officials and national transportation experts to examine Nevada's transportation needs. The summit was the first of its kind in the country.

His many other accomplishments and distinctions include:

Education, where he has provided essential support for the Nevada Literacy Initiative and other educational efforts

Ethics, where he has been a determined fighter on behalf of campaign reform and ethics in government

Environment, where he is known throughout Nevada and the country for creating the Great Basin National Park in Eastern Nevada and leading the Nevada Delegation in the fight against the proposed nuclear dump at Yucca Mountain

Economic Development, where he has proven an able proponent of Nevada on the Senate Appropriations Committee...and a visionary when it comes to new industries and enterprises that will benefit people throughout his state.

Senator Reid is the author of a comprehensive victims' rights bill and tough anti-drug legislation. He sponsored legislation that has led to the toughening of our national laws against drunk driving.

Committee Assignments

In addition to his position on the Appropriations Committee where he serves as chairman of the Legislative Subcommittee, Senator Reid is also a member of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee. He chairs the Subcommittee on Toxic Substances, Environmental Oversight, Research and Development.

His other committee assignments include the Aging Committee and the Indian Affairs Committee. He is also a member of the Helsinki Commission and the Democratic Task Force on Hispanic Issues.

Personal

Born and raised in Searchlight, Nevada, Senator Reid attended public school in Searchlight and Henderson. He received his undergraduate degree from Utah State University in 1961 and his law degree from George Washington School of Law in 1964, one year after he had already passed the bar exam in Nevada.

He is married to the former Landra Gould, whom he met at Basic High School. They are the proud parents of five children: Lana, Rory, Lelf, Josh and Key.

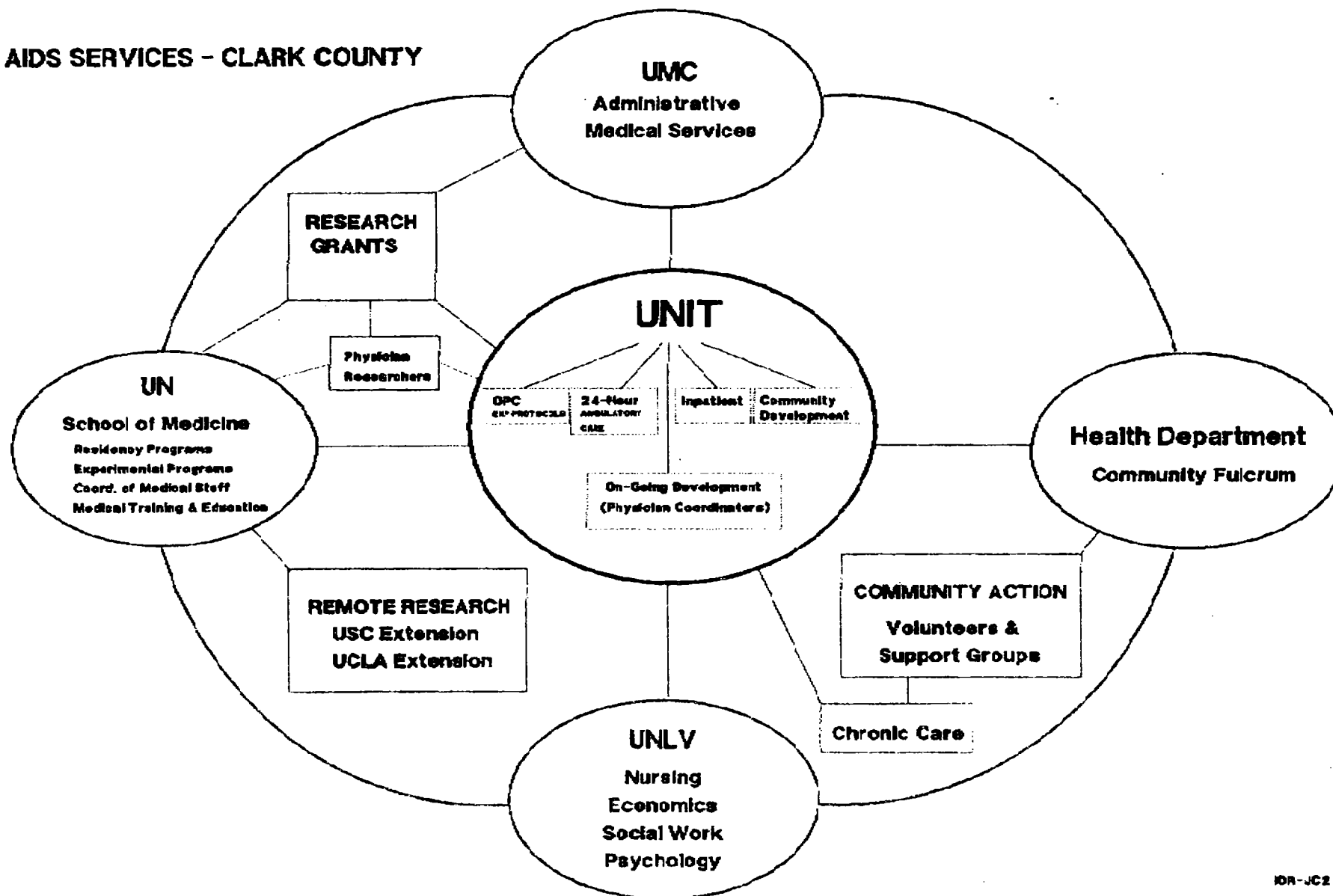
Professional and Civic

Senator Reid's first job was as Henderson City Attorney from 1964 to 1966. He was an elected member of the Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital Board of Trustees from 1966 to 1968. He then served in the Nevada Assembly from 1968 to 1970, and in 1970, was elected the youngest Lieutenant Governor in Nevada history at the age of 30. He was chairman of the Nevada Gaming Commission from 1977 to 1981. Prior to his service in the Senate, Reid represented Nevada's first congressional district in the United States House of Representatives from 1983 to 1987.

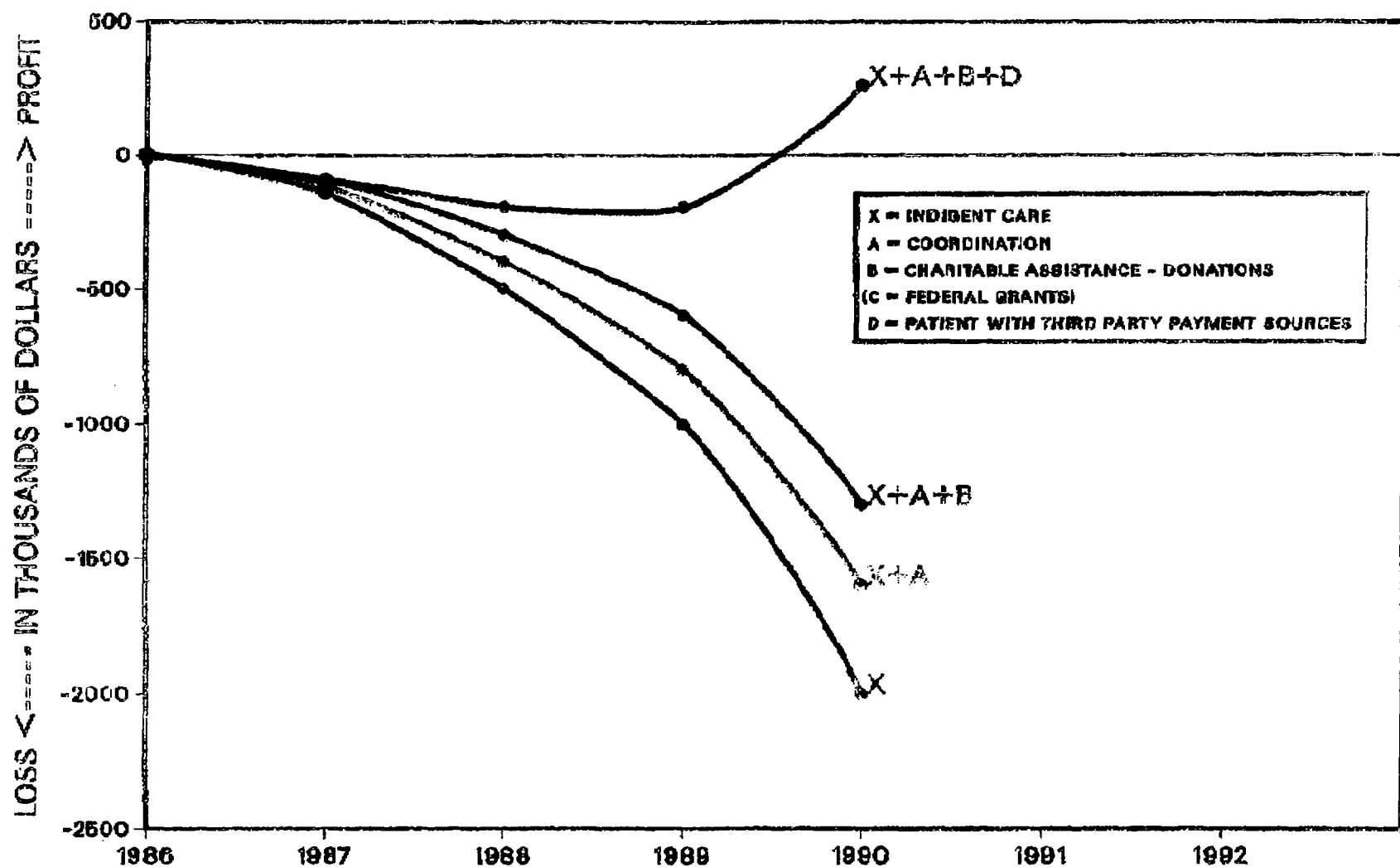

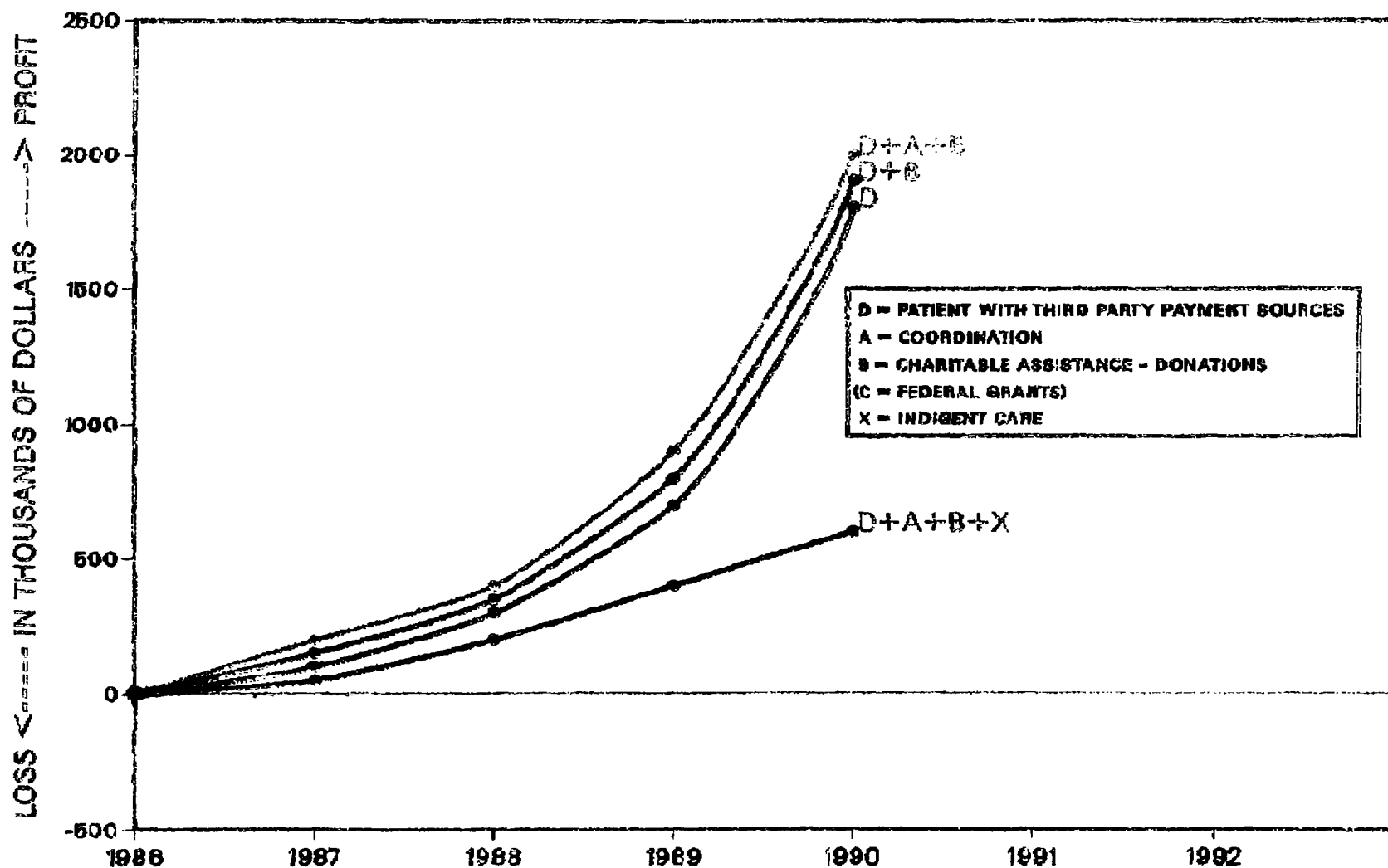

I think not. \$17,597.25 for pharmacy supplies? I must have bought every bed pan in the hospital. Mrs. Clinton, I find it hard to believe how anyone could use \$21,000.00 worth of medicine in that length of time without becoming an addict. Either the cost of the drugs was escalated by the hospital, or the pharmaceutical companies are charging an outlandish price to begin with. I have attached an itemized list of the charges by the hospital. The total medical bills were in excess of \$120,000.00.

Now for the grand finale: paying the bill. Obviously my wife couldn't work and I was lucky enough to find a job for a measly \$8.00 an hour. Cost to operate my home per month, minus food, \$975.00. My take-home pay was \$1,040.00 per month. That left \$65.00 for food and gas for the car. The hospital wanted \$200.00 per month plus 12.5% interest on the unpaid balance of \$91,114.35. I explained I could only pay a small amount to begin with, but would eventually pay the entire bill. They would not accept this and turned it over to a collection agency.

Result: Chapter 7 bankruptcy. We lost just about everything we had. The only reason I have my home is that it is protected by a homestead act.

Mrs. Clinton, no one in the United States of America should have to lose everything they have worked for all their lives because they were unfortunate enough to become ill. Something has to be done to prevent this type of scenario from happening again. May I make the following suggestions?

Keeping pace with the rapid growth of Southern Nevada, changing medical technology and the latest developments in patient care are the objective at University Medical Center.

The wide range of services offered by University Medical Center are evidence of its commitment to quality health care that meets the needs of the community.

For example, UMC was the first hospital in Nevada to develop an organ transplantation program, UMC is the state-designated trauma center for Southern Nevada, it operates the only burn care center in the state, and was the first hospital in Nevada to have an emergency department staffed 24 hours a day by pediatric emergency physicians.

Currently, the Medical Center has 560 beds, more than 800 physicians on its staff, and employs hundreds of nurses, technicians, therapists, and other highly trained personnel.

Because it is a clinical campus, the emphasis at UMC is not just on treating disease and injury, but learning how to treat them better. This goal has been accomplished through UMC's affiliation with the University of Nevada School of Medicine. UMC and the Medical School presently operate residency programs in internal medicine, general surgery, obstetrics and gynecology and general surgery. Surgical services, including open heart procedures, are available around the clock at UMC, which features a modern radiology department, outpatient surgery, coronary care and intensive care units, an orthopedic unit, and neurology unit.

Nevada's first organ transplantation program was established at UMC. The program's first kidney transplant was performed on Christmas Day 1989 and in 1993 the team performed its first pancreas transplant.

The hospital also houses Las Vegas' only Comprehensive Cancer Center, and its oncologist have developed one of Nevada's top cancer programs. UMC's Cancer Center nursing staff has special education in oncology care and is certified by the

In response to Southern Nevada's growing population, UMC has established Quick Care Centers in many areas of the community. Each of the Quick Care Centers offers extended service hours, does not require an appointment and are a great alternative to the high costs and long waits associated with most emergency departments.

A major community asset operated by the hospital is its Level II Trauma Center. Located on the first floor of UMC's new Trauma/Pediatric Center, the trauma center is the most advanced facility of its kind in the United States.

The trauma team's highly skilled medical professionals are prepared to immediately respond 24 hours a day to the specialized medical/surgical needs of severely injured victims.

The UMC Trauma and Pediatric Center also houses UMC's new pediatric and pediatric intensive care units. Like the trauma center, they too are equipped with the latest in medical technology and staffed by specially trained nurses and physicians.

UMC's nursery includes a Level III neonatal nursery, the highest level of newborn care certified by the state. The nursery is staffed around the clock by neonatologists - pediatricians who specialize in the care of newborns - and specially trained nurses.

National Oncology Nursing Society.

Aided by research shared among leading cancer institutes, the UMC team can provide patients with the latest treatment advances. For example, it makes available to patients the latest development in experimental cancer fighting drugs, including Interferon and Intraleuken.

Another UMC department that greatly benefits the community is its Lions Burn Care Center, the only burn care unit in Nevada. Not only does the unit serve the entire state, but also portions of Arizona, Utah and California.

In response to Southern Nevada's growing and active senior population, UMC has developed a special community-based program. Called the "Silver Advantage Network," the program offers health education and screening, physician and health care referral, business and services discounts, Medicare claims assistance, interest free hospital payments and medical savings.

HISTORY

University Medical Center has been serving the health care needs of Southern Nevadans since 1931, when a dusty dirt road was the only way to reach the fledgling 20-bed hospital and its one doctor and nurse.

Back then, Las Vegas had a population of only 4,000, was a railroad watering stop and little else. Fans were the only means of combating the scorching summer heat.

Only a few hardy motorists used the poor road between Los Angeles and Salt Lake City. There was no Boulder City, North Las Vegas or Henderson.

Hospital needs then were met by small Las Vegas Hospital which sufficed until 1931, when construction on Boulder Dam began and brought to the area the first of what would be an influx of more than 12,000 residents, creating a demand for more hospital facilities.

By 1931, Las Vegas had grown to 7,000 residents and because of the effect of the Depression, many were unemployed. For every worker hired at the dam it was estimated that four came looking for a job and either were refused employment or were unable to stand the rigors of work in Black Canyon.

Realizing that something had to be done for these people, the Clark County Commission turned its sites to the poor farm on the outskirts of town.

New medical facilities, however, were urgently needed and in 1931, with the Nevada Legislature about to go into session, county commissioners passed a resolution asking for state permission to borrow construction funds.

The money was acquired and by July 1931, county patients were able to be moved to the new 20-bed Clark County Indigent Hospital on a dirt road west of the railroad tracks. Later the road would be paved and named West Charleston Boulevard.

By then, several ambulance trips were necessary each day between Las Vegas and the dam site. The temperature in Black Canyon was recorded at more than 140 degrees. There were many more cases of heat prostration than accidents. Even after the government built a hospital in Boulder City, it still was unable to handle all the sick and injured from the dam.

For the first two years of its existence, the new county hospital operated with one doctor and one nurse, both on duty or on call 24-hours a day, seven days a week.

Construction on the dam was completed in 1935, and although thousands of workers left Southern Nevada, many others stayed on to make permanent homes in Las Vegas and Boulder City.

In 1938, a movement was started by labor unions to make the hospital a general one, so paying patients could also be

admitted. In 1940, the hospital's first board of trustees was elected and its name changed to Clark County General Hospital.

Also that year, Dr. Hale Salvin was hired as county physician and obtained funds from the County Commission to install surgical facilities. The hospital now had a surgical wing, x-ray machine and an autoclave, making it possible for the hospital to do its own sterilizing for the first time.

By 1942, the hospital trustees decided a house physician was necessary, and Dr. J.C. Cherry was hired for \$150. a month.

According to news reports, the hospital's roof leaked when it rained and pans were placed around to catch the water. Lights were strung along exposed pipes in the operating room, water came from a well, and a septic tank handled the sewage.

Demands on the hospital continued to out-distance available space.

In looking for solutions to the problem, Dr. Cherry appealed to the federal government for help. In 1943, he completed arrangements to transfer ownership of the facility to the Federal Works Administration, which in turn spent nearly \$450,000 for new construction.

At the conclusion of World War II, the county bought the hospital from the federal government for \$182,000.

In the early days of the hospital, modern-day ambulances were undreamed of. The job of picking up the sick and injured and transporting them to the emergency department belonged to

local mortuaries.

Reaching the hospital, however, became a problem because it was located west of the railroad tracks and most of the population lived on the east side.

Dr. Cherry urged the state to build an underpass, which was opened on Feb. 8, 1950, eliminating the problem created by the once-dangerous grade crossing.

In the early 1950s, in response to numerous requests from physicians and private citizens, the hospital was renamed Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital. With the name change, the hospital began to undertake a new mission - keeping up to date with the latest development in medical technology and treatment and expanding its services to meet the needs of a rapidly growing and diverse community.

Between the early 1950s and the late 1970s, expansion of the hospital progressed rapidly.

By the mid-sixties, Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital had a new \$1.6 million three-story circular wing and a \$590,000 outpatient building. In 1968, the Lions Clubs of Clark County funded a burn care unit at the hospital.

In 1978, a six-story medical/education center was built on the west end of the hospital campus. The \$4.5 million project was funded by a federal grant.

Construction on a seven story patient tower was completed in early 1979 with the addition of a new obstetrics unit and an

enlarged burn care unit.

In February 1986, the hospital's name was changed to University Medical Center of Southern Nevada to better reflect its role as a teaching institution and a medical center offering complete care.

Today, UMC is more than a hospital, it's a comprehensive medical center with a history of providing the public with complete, quality care.

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Proposal for a visit to Las Vegas by First Lady Hillary Clinton

These proposals are submitted assuming the First Lady would be so kind as to visit for between 1 to 2 hours. (A longer visit would be greatly appreciated and separate proposals for a longer visit are available upon request.)

1. A tour of University Medical Center.

University Medical Center (UMC) is a county hospital with 560 beds.

UMC provides acute care and serves as a teaching hospital and trauma center for the entire southern Nevada region.

UMC operates: southern Nevada's only burn center

an advanced pediatric program including a Level III neonatal unit.

the only trauma center in southern Nevada

the only Comprehensive Cancer Care Center

An outpatient clinic

an AIDS inpatient unit and outpatient clinic

a Maternal/Child Care Center

a free-standing rehabilitation center

four Quick Care centers.

UMC opened one of the first dedicated AIDS units in the country in July 1987. Unfortunately, the unit is always full. Nevada has been especially hard hit by the AIDS epidemic. Nevada has ranked among the top ten states for AIDS incidence. Because of the number of people in the state, the absolute number of AIDS cases is less than the number of cases in large, metropolitan areas. Hence, UMC has never been able to obtain Federal assistance for medical care for people with HIV. The financial burden has fallen primarily on UMC. UMC has been able to ensure that no one with HIV disease in the southern Nevada community goes without the medical attention nor the social support they need. UMC is part of a coordinated HIV/AIDS care program that is having great success with limited resources.

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UMC struggles annually to meet the health needs of southern Nevada primarily because of the number of indigent they serve. There has been an 11% surge in the number of patients lacking resources draining UMC. This has accounted for shortfalls in many years. To cover these financial shortfalls, the county is forced to either raise the taxes or use money that was set aside to improve patient services.

After the tour of this facility, we propose a panel discussion in the small auditorium on the premises of UMC. Congressman Bilbray and the First Lady would be on a panel with two or three other friends of the plan and discuss some of the important issues in the plan and how they will affect Nevada then take some easy questions from the audience.

Congressman Bilbray's office is engaged in discussions with a local network affiliates to televise a health care panel discussion in January. Schedules permitting, the First Lady's visit could combine with this televised discussion.

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BRIEF SUMMARY OF UNIQUE FEATURES OF NEVADA HEALTH CARE

- **Over 295,000 people in Nevada are uninsured. That is a rate of 26.6%--the highest in the country.**
- **Characteristics of the uninsured are typical--75% have jobs or are dependents of someone who works, 30% of women receive no pre-natal care, and even with Medicaid, 1 in 5 Las Vegas children cannot go to a doctor because no one pays the bill.**
- **Over 80% of the businesses in Nevada are small businesses.**
- **Nevadans are not healthy. Nevada ranks 42nd in total health, 42nd in heart disease, 48th in smoking, and 48th in death per 100,000. Nevada is #1 in the nation for alcohol and tobacco related deaths. Life-style factors are to blame.**
- **There is an increasing elderly population living in Nevada. Because of the favorable tax treatment (Nevada has no state income tax), moderate climate, and a relatively low cost of living, many people retire to Nevada. This complicates the health system because of all the reasons associated with aging populations, as well as unique finance issues.**
- **Managed care is taking roots in Nevada. A majority of citizens are involved with managed care. Family Health Plan (FHP) has added 200,000 Medicare beneficiaries to its Medicare Risk-contracting program. The workmen's compensation system operates under managed care, and Medicaid is moving toward more managed care.**
- **Nevada has both an urban and a rural population.**
- **Opposition to the Health Security Act has mounted locally. The local paper, The Las Vegas Review Journal, runs a series of boxes daily on the editorial page called "ClintonCare at Work." These quote pieces of the legislation and offer a line or two of italicized, cynical text. There have been letters to the editor from the public that are patently inaccurate based on these boxes.**

In addition, the Nevada Restaurant Association has come out against the plan. The administrator of Humana Hospital (a large, private hospital) has spoken against the plan. Lastly, Nevada physicians are skeptical at best.

A visit from Mrs. Clinton would give supporters of the plan the ammunition to fight for the Health Security Act.

Twenty percent of the patients at a hospital on President Bush's itinerary today have no health insurance and can't pay their bills.

Another 20 percent of University Medical Center's patients are so poor their bills are paid by a county indigent fund or Medicaid.

So hospital officials were eager to hear the president's plan today to reform the nation's health care system, which is saddled by runaway costs and unaffordable insurance.

But few expected Bush's proposals - vouchers for the poor and tax breaks for the middle class - to provide much immediate relief.

"There is no quick-fix for this," Dr. Jack Lazerson said Wednesday. "There's got to be some long-term planning and some way of dealing with this issue out of the re-election years."

Bush's \$ 100 billion plan calls for giving poor people vouchers worth up to \$ 3,750 and tax breaks of the same amount to the middle class. The program would be paid for by cutting back government spending on Medicaid and Medicare.

Bush was scheduled to unveil the plan in Cleveland, then fly to Las Vegas to visit UMC this afternoon.

Officials at the 501-bed county-run hospital, which is required by law to treat indigent patients, are keenly aware of the health care crisis: Last year, the hospital lost \$ 4.5 million, said Bruce Wiggins, chief operating officer.

Wiggins said the hospital would have lost even more had it not been for cost containment and marketing aimed at getting wealthier patients to have elective procedures done at UMC.

Wiggins said medical vouchers could help in paying for treatment of the uninsured. "Clearly, if those people don't pay, the other patients end up subsidizing them," he said.

But other hospital officials said the plan failed to answer basic health care questions, such as whether to spend money on high-tech medical equipment or preventive medicine.

Lazerson, chairman of pediatrics for the University of Nevada School of Medicine, which is based at the hospital, said health care costs could be managed better if more money were spent on prevention.

Dr. Thomas Cinque, the medical school's associate dean, said the health care system simply can't afford to give everyone top-of-the-line treatment.

"Does everybody who needs (a heart transplant) one get one at \$ 50,000 a throw, plus \$ 10,000 maintenance a year?" he asked. "Fifty thousand people a year need hearts and that's a tremendous cost."

PRESIDENT BUSH: (Applause.) Well, thank you all very much, and again, I apologize if we've kept this distinguished group, busy people, waiting, but we're delighted to be here. Kind of a hit and run day. It started in Cleveland where I announced the fundamentals of a new national approach for health care, which I intend to work very hard for. But I want to thank Dr. Brasness (ph) and single out the governor of the state. He's been most hospitable to me since we've been here. Also Barbara Vucanovich, who's Congressman here, a great friend of mine of long- standing, and simply say that I'm very pleased to be here to thank all of you for this afternoon's tour. And you can't help but when you walk through these -- these halls and see the incredible work and dedication of the people. As we saw both at the neonatal care and the burn care center, you can't help but count your blessings for those who are devoting their lives to helping others. You can't -- when you see somebody treating babies like that, tiny premies or helping the -- those ravaged by burns, it just, at least in my heart, evokes tremendous gratitude and admiration for what you do. And so I hope you know that people outside the medical profession are extraordinarily grateful to those who give of themselves as you all do.

I did release this comprehensive health care program earlier today. And let me just without giving you the full load summarize a little bit. I know you're used to extended debates about health care and you probably get a lot of requests for free advice on this subject and many others. But I think everyone understands that sometimes -- understands all of you do something that politicians sometimes forget and that is that America's medical system offers the best care in the world. It's not simply that we start with the scientific and research end with far more Nobel Prize winners in medicine than any other country. But it's just generally the quality of care. And when people from other countries seek the best possible care, you just have to look where do they go. Well, they come to the United States of America. And with all the problems and all the breathless press reports about health care, I think of the guy who got in a car accident. When he got to the hospital, the

doctor set his broken bones, examined him carefully and assured him that he'd go home the next day. The next day came and the doctor rushed to the patient's room with a look of great anxiety and concern, and "Is something wrong?" the patient said. The doctor replied, "I'm not sure. Just to be safe, I'd like you to stay another day. You see, I didn't know how badly you were injured until I read about your accident in the newspaper."

(Laughter.)

Well, there's a parallel here of -- reports of the demise of American medicine, in my view, are greatly exaggerated. And American -- I will repeat --

American medicine is the best in the entire world. And my comprehensive health care plan builds on the strengths -- on these strengths of our medical care system. I'll not go -- I will not endorse nor go with a nationalized -- they used to say socialized medicine -- a nationalized plan that will guarantee only long lines, indifferent service, and very high taxes. And I've worked hard to come up with a plan that will work. And that's the plan that we are proposing. It addresses American basic concerns about health care that too many people don't have access to care. I think we could all agree on that, that it costs too much, and that you can't be sure of keeping coverage if you change your job or if you or someone in your family has an illness or an injury.

This plan ensures that every workers, regardless of health status, can get health care coverage, can choose providers, can afford care, and can keep it. Let me just outline the plan in brief for you. It's got four points. One, we make health care affordable by offering a health insurance tax credit, a voucher, to low income individuals and families, and then a health insurance tax deduction to middle income individuals and families.

Poor people who pay no taxes at all are covered. And they'll get insurance for free. And these measures will help 95 million Americans purchase the health insurance that they need.

And two, we improve the efficiency of our system by reforming the insurance system and developing what we call health insurance networks. I've -- you probably refer to it as pooling. These networks will improve efficiency and they literally will help drive insurance costs down.

We make consumers of health care better able to compare costs, keep competition in the health care system.

And three, we're going to work hard to wring out the waste and excess, and we start by putting a lid on these outrageous medical malpractice lawsuits. Over the past decade, malpractice insurance -- the premiums -- have risen by an average of more than 15 percent per year. And this national epidemic of lawsuits has persuaded some doctors to avoid such vital specialties as surgery or obstetrics.

America's love for the lawsuit has just got to stop. And we've got legislation out there trying to do something about it.

(Applause.)

And it really is important in cost control, as everyone here knows. It's very, very fundamentally important in (kind of?) getting -- in how we pay for the whole program.

And fourth, we're going to get the growth of federal health programs under control. This isn't easy politically. But we've got to do it. Medicaid went up 38 percent this year alone. And we'll encourage major innovation at the state and local levels. And we'll do this without cutting benefits. And I believe it can be done without raising taxes.

America's been blessed by the world's best doctors and the best hospitals. I heard today how this hospital has been able to battle down the costs, eliminating some of the deficit that has been around. You've got the finest training institutions in this country. Really, we have the finest. And this plan will not undermine this base of quality and excellence. You don't need your hands bound by red tape either, and you don't need these stethoscopes replaced by federal millstones. And I think we need -- (applause) -- (I think the?) -- I -- having been around hospitals and blessed by seeing loving care for our kids, I am absolutely convinced that the medical profession is dedicated to the concept of service.

This debate must not diminish that, must not take that away from the medical community at all. And I think you need our support. Everyone has got to play a part. I'm prepared to play mine in building a healthier nation. Every hospital depends also as we all know not just on professionals but also on volunteers. And you know this better than anyone. All of you do. How -- hundreds of thousands of people across this country, in literally hundreds of thousands of groups and organizations give their time to make medical care accessible to

others. And every community relies not just on professionals, not just on physicians but also on teachers, on counselors, on nurses, people giving of themselves to help others along the path to good health. Our Secretary of HHS, Dr. Lou Sullivan, has talked eloquently about the rule of character in health. And he's mounted an effective campaign to encourage preventive care. And he teaches people about good habits, decent behavior, promotes the cause of immunization. Celebrities including my friend Arnold Schwarzenegger promote active healthy lifestyles. I might say a word about him. He's head of our Commission on Fitness, and he's taking it very seriously. He's gone to 28 states, all pro bono, and taken a message out there to the young people of this country are responding to.

So, lifestyle is important. And I don't know about you, but when Arnold says exercise, I exercise. (Laughter.) The point I'm trying to make is that everyone has a role. And this plan really encourages people to work together. And so, I just again want to thank the doctors across this country, using all of you as the audience here today, but others, not just here but around the country for the careers that you've embarked on and are ennobling, on the challenge that you've chosen, and I am determined to push for a health care plan that will work. I think we've got it. And I think we can do it without diminishing and losing the wonder of individual initiative and excellence. So

that's the hallmark, that's the underpinning of this plan and needless to say, I don't want to see this many influential people assembled without putting in a pitch for it. So please help us if you can, if you agree with us. And thank you for what's been a wonderful few minutes for me in a busy day. It started in Cleveland where we went to a hospital in Cleveland and talked about -- little more detail about this plan, then here today and San Diego tomorrow. Going in there this evening. But it's been a joyous day for me. And thank you for what you do in helping other people across this country. Thank you so much.

(Applause.)

Nevada is lagging badly in the funding it provides for the battle against AIDS, the head of the AIDS unit at University Medical Center (UMC) says. Dr. Jerry Cade says a recent survey of various states and what they spend on AIDS shows an "incredible reluctance on the part of (Nevada) state government to recognize this disease and to put money into it."

Cade made the comments following the release of a survey which shows that Nevada ranks 35th among the 50 states for funding to cope with the disease. The survey shows that Nevada's per capita funding for AIDS in fiscal 1991 was 11 cents, compared with \$5.03 for New York, the top-ranking state.

The rankings come from the AIDS Policy Center of the Intergovernmental Health Policy Project at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

The state's poor showing in AIDS funding means many people aren't getting the medical treatment they need, Cade says. Cade said the UMC AIDS unit has a long waiting list of patients needing AZT, a drug effective in slowing the disease's progression. "As of two weeks ago, we had a waiting list of 37 people," Cade said. "It's morbid. Each of those people has to wait until someone dies until they can get AZT."

Nevada spent \$128,000 in fiscal year 1991 on AIDS programs, with none of the money going to patient care, according to the study. Nationwide, 46 percent of the states' AIDS expenditures went to patient care. Nevada spent all of its AIDS money on education, testing and counseling.

Victoria Hamilton, state AIDS coordinator, said most of the \$128,000 was spent on a four-member state communicable disease staff that provides counseling and assistance to prisons and persons operating local AIDS support programs. "This is not a

state where we put a lot of money into health-related matters," she said.

Cade, former executive director of AID for AIDS of Nevada, earlier this year lobbied Governor Bob Miller and legislators for more state AIDS funds. "There has been an ostrich-like attitude at the state level," he said. "It's an attitude of 'let's keep ignoring this problem and maybe it will go away.'"

Nevada has the nation's eighth highest rate of AIDS, 18.3 AIDS cases per 100,000 in fiscal year 1991, according to a recent state report.

Keeping pace with the rapid growth of Southern Nevada, changing medical technology and the latest developments in patient care are the objective at University Medical Center.

The wide range of services offered by University Medical Center are evidence of its commitment to quality health care that meets the needs of the community.

For example, UMC was the first hospital in Nevada to develop an organ transplantation program, UMC is the state-designated trauma center for Southern Nevada, it operates the only burn care center in the state, and was the first hospital in Nevada to have an emergency department staffed 24 hours a day by pediatric emergency physicians.

Currently, the Medical Center has 560 beds, more than 800 physicians on its staff, and employs hundreds of nurses, technicians, therapists, and other highly trained personnel.

Because it is a clinical campus, the emphasis at UMC is not just on treating disease and injury, but learning how to treat them better. This goal has been accomplished through UMC's affiliation with the University of Nevada School of Medicine. UMC and the Medical School presently operate residency programs in internal medicine, general surgery, obstetrics and gynecology and general surgery. A fellowship program to train pediatric emergency physicians was recently added.

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Sometimes sick or injured patients need care that goes beyond the treatment of their initial medical problems. This is the role of UMC's rehabilitation team.

UMC operates the most comprehensive hospital-based rehabilitation program in Southern Nevada. It cares for a variety of patient needs from stroke to spinal cord injury to traumatic brain injury.

UMC's rehabilitation team consists of physicians, nurses and occupational, physical and speech therapists. The team's goal is to help its patient realize their fullest potential and resume lives that are as independent and productive as possible.

Surgical services, including open heart procedures, are available around the clock at UMC, which features a modern radiology department, outpatient surgery, coronary care and intensive care units, an orthopedic unit, and neurology unit.

The trauma team's highly skilled medical professionals are prepared to immediately respond 24 hours a day to the specialized medical/surgical needs of severely injured victims.

The UMC Trauma and Pediatric Center also houses UMC's new pediatric and pediatric intensive care units. Like the trauma center, they too are equipped with the latest in medical technology and staffed by specially trained nurses and physicians.

UMC's nursery includes a Level III neonatal nursery, the highest level of newborn care certified by the state. The nursery is staffed around the clock by neonatologists - pediatricians who specialize in the care of newborns - and specially trained nurses.

National Oncology Nursing Society.

Aided by research shared among leading cancer institutes, the UMC team can provide patients with the latest treatment advances. For example, it makes available to patients the latest development in experimental cancer fighting drugs, including Interferon and Intraleuken.

Another UMC department that greatly benefits the community is its Lions Burn Care Center, the only burn care unit in Nevada. Not only does the unit serve the entire state, but also portions of Arizona, Utah and California.

In response to Southern Nevada's growing and active senior population, UMC has developed a special community-based program. Called the "Silver Advantage Network," the program offers health education and screening, physician and health care referral, business and services discounts, Medicare claims assistance, interest free hospital payments and medical savings.

HISTORY

University Medical Center has been serving the health care needs of Southern Nevadans since 1931, when a dusty dirt road was the only way to reach the fledgling 20-bed hospital and its one doctor and nurse.

Back then, Las Vegas had a population of only 4,000, was a railroad watering stop and little else. Fans were the only means of combating the scorching summer heat.

Only a few hardy motorists used the poor road between Los Angeles and Salt Lake City. There was no Boulder City, North Las Vegas or Henderson.

Hospital needs then were met by small Las Vegas Hospital which sufficed until 1931, when construction on Boulder Dam began and brought to the area the first of what would be an influx of more than 12,000 residents, creating a demand for more hospital facilities.

By 1931, Las Vegas had grown to 7,000 residents and because of the effect of the Depression, many were unemployed. For every worker hired at the dam it was estimated that four came looking for a job and either were refused employment or were unable to stand the rigors of work in Black Canyon.

Realizing that something had to be done for these people, the Clark County Commission turned its sites to the poor farm on the outskirts of town.

New medical facilities, however, were urgently needed and in 1931, with the Nevada Legislature about to go into session, county commissioners passed a resolution asking for state permission to borrow construction funds.

The money was acquired and by July 1931, county patients were able to be moved to the new 20-bed Clark County Indigent Hospital on a dirt road west of the railroad tracks. Later the road would be paved and named West Charleston Boulevard.

By then, several ambulance trips were necessary each day between Las Vegas and the dam site. The temperature in Black Canyon was recorded at more than 140 degrees. There were many more cases of heat prostration than accidents. Even after the government built a hospital in Boulder City, it still was unable to handle all the sick and injured from the dam.

For the first two years of its existence, the new county hospital operated with one doctor and one nurse, both on duty or on call 24-hours a day, seven days a week.

Construction on the dam was completed in 1935, and although thousands of workers left Southern Nevada, many others stayed on to make permanent homes in Las Vegas and Boulder City.

In 1938, a movement was started by labor unions to make the hospital a general one, so paying patients could also be

admitted. In 1940, the hospital's first board of trustees was elected and its name changed to Clark County General Hospital.

Also that year, Dr. Hale Salvin was hired as county physician and obtained funds from the County Commission to install surgical facilities. The hospital now had a surgical wing, x-ray machine and an autoclave, making it possible for the hospital to do its own sterilizing for the first time.

By 1942, the hospital trustees decided a house physician was necessary, and Dr. J.C. Cherry was hired for \$150. a month.

According to news reports, the hospital's roof leaked when it rained and pans were placed around to catch the water. Lights were strung along exposed pipes in the operating room, water came from a well, and a septic tank handled the sewage.

Demands on the hospital continued to out-distance available space.

In looking for solutions to the problem, Dr. Cherry appealed to the federal government for help. In 1943, he completed arrangements to transfer ownership of the facility to the Federal Works Administration, which in turn spent nearly \$450,000 for new construction.

At the conclusion of World War II, the county bought the hospital from the federal government for \$182,000.

In the early days of the hospital, modern-day ambulances were undreamed of. The job of picking up the sick and injured and transporting them to the emergency department belonged to

local mortuaries.

Reaching the hospital, however, became a problem because it was located west of the railroad tracks and most of the population lived on the east side.

Dr. Cherry urged the state to build an underpass, which was opened on Feb. 8, 1950, eliminating the problem created by the once-dangerous grade crossing.

In the early 1950s, in response to numerous requests from physicians and private citizens, the hospital was renamed Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital. With the name change, the hospital began to undertake a new mission - keeping up to date with the latest development in medical technology and treatment and expanding its services to meet the needs of a rapidly growing and diverse community.

Between the early 1950s and the late 1970s, expansion of the hospital progressed rapidly.

By the mid-sixties, Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital had a new \$1.6 million three-story circular wing and a \$590,000 outpatient building. In 1968, the Lions Clubs of Clark County funded a burn care unit at the hospital.

In 1978, a six-story medical/education center was built on the west end of the hospital campus. The \$4.5 million project was funded by a federal grant.

Construction on a seven story patient tower was completed in early 1979 with the addition of a new obstetrics unit and an

enlarged burn care unit.

In February 1986, the hospital's name was changed to University Medical Center of Southern Nevada to better reflect its role as a teaching institution and a medical center offering complete care.

Today, UMC is more than a hospital, it's a comprehensive medical center with a history of providing the public with complete, quality care.



The search for a breast cancer gene

For the past nineteen years, Mary-Claire King, Ph.D., an internationally acclaimed geneticist, has been trying to isolate the gene that causes breast cancer. Here she tells Pulitzer prize-winning science reporter Natalie Angier how understanding this breast cancer gene could help doctors battle the disease so many women fear

Q: What's the difference between genetically inherited breast cancer and non-hereditary breast cancer?

A: First of all it's important to understand that breast cancer is always genetic: It's the result of mutations, or alterations, in our genes. But women who develop hereditary breast cancer were born with these mutations, while others develop genetic alterations at some point in their lives.

The gene we are studying is the one responsible for most cases of hereditary breast cancer. Yet we think the same gene plays a role in the origin of the far more common type of breast cancer, which is not inherited.

How many women do you estimate carry the inborn genetic mutation?

A lot of us, perhaps one in 200 women, or 5 to 10 percent of all women with breast cancer. And for women born with the genetic mutation, the risk of developing breast cancer is over 80 percent.

What are the options for a woman with a family history of breast cancer who participates in your study and is found to have the inherited genetic mutation?

At the moment, the best we can offer is increased surveillance. For most women, having mammograms after age 50 is appropriate, but women found to have inherited susceptibility to breast cancer should start much younger.

If the current options are so unsatisfactory, what good does it do to study the gene?

In the medium or long run, it will do a lot of good both for women with inherited breast cancer and those with nonhereditary breast cancer. I hope to use the molec-

ular information we can get from the gene to develop what's been called molecular mammography, a way of visualizing minute changes in breast tissue the moment they begin, rather than waiting until there's a sizable lump, as we currently do. That would push back diagnosis by years or decades, doing for breast cancer what the Pap smear did for cervical cancer.

Apart from inherited susceptibility, why do you think breast cancer rates are climbing?

In my view, the likeliest explanations are the increased prevalence of several important risk factors. Women are beginning to menstruate at a younger age than they used to, and they are continuing to menstruate until a later age. The longer the period of fertility, the higher our breast cancer risk.

Another risk factor is the length of time between the onset of menstruation and first pregnancy. Seventy years ago, a girl might have begun menstruating at age 14 and had her first child by age 21. Today, the average age at which menstruation begins is 11, but many women don't have their first child until perhaps age 30.

Do you think fat in the diet contributes to breast cancer?

Only insofar as a fat-rich, nutrient-rich diet in childhood leads to earlier onset of menstruation. But whether a high-fat diet in adult women is associated with breast cancer in my view has not been proven.

As a woman of science, you're in the minority. Do you think women have a different style of science than men do?

In terms of the way we carry out experiments and interpret results—no. However, I do think women tend to tackle ques-

tions in science that bridge gaps. We're more inclined to pull together threads from different areas, to be more integrative in our thinking. That may be related to being able to take care of children and do everything else as well. We really do walk and chew gum at the same time.

Do you think male scientists are excessively competitive, to the point where it gets in the way of scientific progress?

Yeah, I sometimes wish things were more cooperative. And that will only happen when there are a lot more women in the field. People from different fields in biology don't talk to each other enough, and that has got to change if we're going to get anywhere in understanding cancer.

The male ego notwithstanding, are we likely to see new treatments for breast cancer in the near future?

I'm optimistic about the science, but science is not enough. We had one woman in our study, 27 years old, who was found to have the inherited susceptibility for breast cancer. A physician gave her a mammogram, and sure enough, he found a tumor. She needed a mastectomy, but she had no insurance and she wasn't poor enough to qualify for Medicaid. So all of us—physicians, geneticists, everybody on the project—got together and went to volunteer agencies and charities to raise money for her surgery.

It's obscene that we were in a position to work on the molecular genetics of this woman's inherited risk and yet she couldn't get a basic treatment without our launching a charity drive. This is no way to run a country. Genetics is only a small part of the problem. Health-care reform is essential to our survival as women.

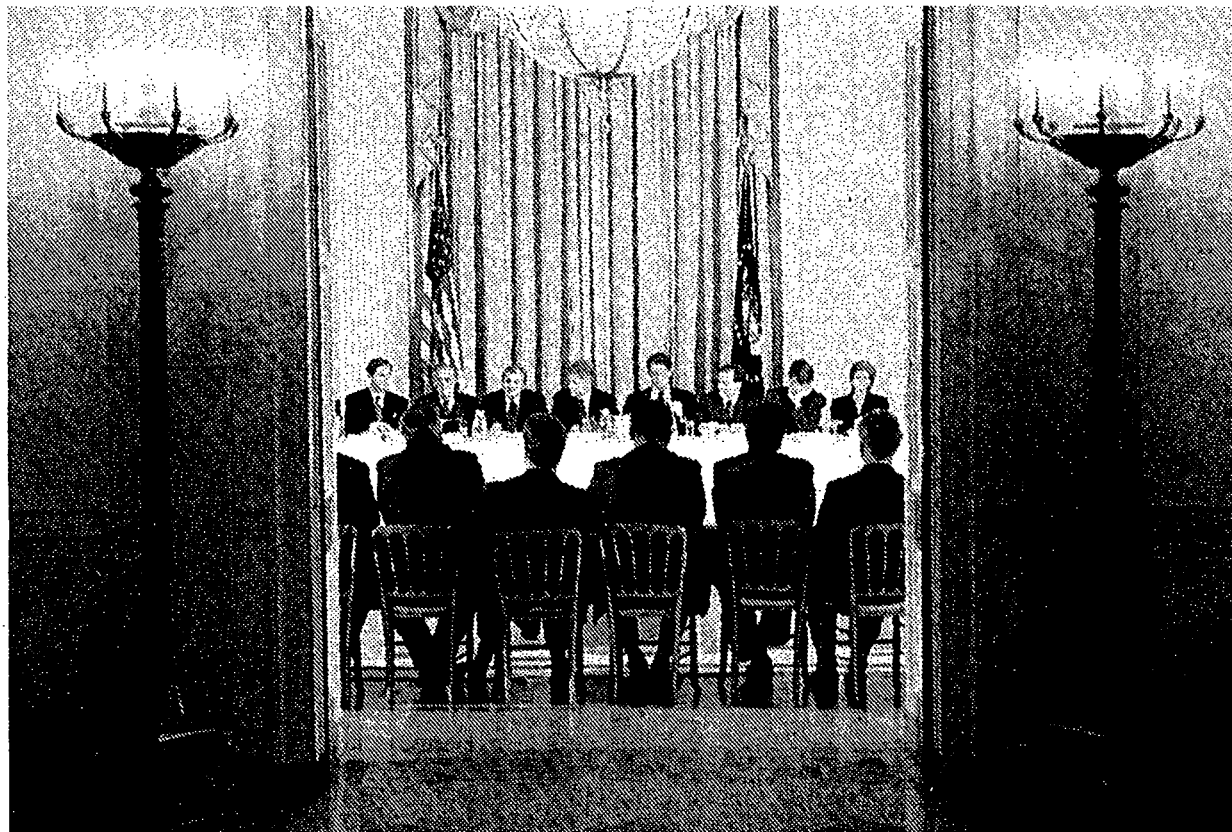

I WOULD LIKE TO THANK ANN ABBOTT, SHELDON GOLDSTEIN, ANN COOK AND DOROTHY FALLER FOR CHAIRING THIS CONFERENCE. AND CONGRATULATIONS TO THE AWARDEES OF SOCIAL WORKER OF THE YEAR, THE LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD, AND PUBLIC CITIZEN OF THE YEAR.

AND I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO THANK SANDY HARDING, MADELINE GOLDE, SUE HOECSTETTER (HAWK-STETTER) AND ALL THE MEMBERS OF THE NASW FOR ALL OF YOUR HELP, WORK AND SUPPORT -- NOT ONLY, BUT ESPECIALLY WITH HEALTH CARE REFORM. YOU HAVE BEEN ONE OF THE STRONGEST VOICES FOR HEALTH CARE REFORM IN THIS COUNTRY. WHILE PLENTY OF GROUPS HAVE PAID LIP SERVICE TO HEALTH CARE REFORM; YOU HAVE ACTIVELY BELIEVED IN IT.

EARLIER IN THE CENTURY, JANE ADDAMS CALLED FOR 'THE LIFE OF THE LARGER CAUSE' AND THE NEED FOR 'PUBLIC-SPIRITED MEN AND WOMEN, WITH A THOROUGHLY AROUSED CONSCIENCE' TO PUSH OUR NATION FORWARD IN THE DIRECTION OF OUR HIGHEST IDEALS. I BELIEVE THAT EVERY DAY YOU ANSWER HER CALL. AND THE PRESIDENT AND I GREATLY APPRECIATE YOUR ACTION(S) AND YOUR SUPPORT.

IT GIVES ME EXTRA PLEASURE TO TALK TO ALL OF YOU TODAY FOR I BELIEVE THAT WE SHARE A VISION OF WHAT AMERICA MUST BECOME. YOUR FUNDAMENTAL BELIEF THAT SOCIAL WORKERS MUST "ADVOCATE CHANGES IN POLICY AND LEGISLATION TO IMPROVE SOCIAL CONDITIONS AND PROMOTE SOCIAL JUSTICE" ALSO DRIVES OUR PLAN FOR HEALTH CARE REFORM. ALL OF US ARE COMMITTED TO ENSURING THE WELL-BEING OF EVERY MEMBER OF OUR SOCIETY.

LAST WEEK THE PRESIDENT DELIVERED THE NATIONAL HEALTH SECURITY ACT TO THE CONGRESS. THIS INITIATIVE REPRESENTS THE FIRST TIME IN MANY YEARS THAT THE CONGRESS HAS HAD BEFORE IT A COMPREHENSIVE MEASURE TO PROVIDE HEALTH SECURITY FOR ALL AMERICANS. THIS IS AN ISSUE THAT HAS BEEN CONSIDERED IN CONGRESSES MANY TIMES BEFORE. IT GOES BACK AT LEAST AS FAR AS WHEN PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT WAS ATTEMPTING TO LEGISLATE SOCIAL SECURITY. AT THAT TIME HE ALSO INTENDED TO LEGISLATE HEALTH SECURITY BUT COULD NOT ACHIEVE THAT OBJECTIVE. EVER SINCE THE 1930'S AND IN EVERY CONGRESSIONAL SESSION, BILLS HAVE BEEN INTRODUCED AND PRESIDENTS HAVE ATTEMPTED TO DEAL WITH OUR HEALTH CARE PROBLEMS. BUT THERE WAS ALWAYS SOME REASON, SOME TIMING, SOME EXCUSE WHY WE COULD NOT MOVE FORWARD. AND SO THE PROBLEM HAS CONTINUED TO DEVELOP.

WE ARE NOW AT A UNIQUE MOMENT IN HISTORY, WHEN THERE IS A CRITICAL MASS IN THE CONGRESS, BOTH DEMOCRATS AND REPUBLICANS, WHO ARE FINALLY WILLING TO SAY YES, LET US HEAR AMERICANS FROM ALL WALKS OF LIFE WHO ARE CALLING FOR THE REFORM OF OUR HEALTH CARE SYSTEM.

BUT PERHAPS MOST IMPORTANTLY, WE HAVE A PRESIDENT WHO IS ABSOLUTELY COMMITTED TO GETTING THE JOB DONE, AND WHO IS WILLING TO PUT HIMSELF AND HIS ADMINISTRATION ON THE LINE.

I KNOW THAT IN SOCIAL WORK IT IS VERY IMPORTANT TO START TREATMENT WHERE THE CLIENT "IS" -- WELL, IN THE PROCESS OF DRAFTING THE PLAN THAT THE PRESIDENT HAS PROPOSED WE BEGAN WHERE OUR CLIENTS--THE AMERICAN PEOPLE--ARE. WE HAVE LISTENED TO THOSE, LIKE YOURSELVES, WHO CARE FOR PEOPLE. AND TO THOSE WHO RECEIVE CARE. WE HAVE LISTENED TO THOSE WHO THOUGHT THEY WERE SECURE, BUT LOST THEIR COVERAGE AND JOINED THE 2.25 MILLION AMERICANS EVERY MONTH, WHO FOR SOME PERIOD OF TIME LOSE THEIR HEALTH INSURANCE. WE HAVE LISTENED TO THE STORIES OF JOB LOCK. WE HAVE LISTENED TO THE EXCRUCIATING TALES THAT COME FROM PEOPLE BEING DENIED INSURANCE COVERAGE BECAUSE OF PRE-EXISTING CONDITIONS. WE HAVE LISTENED TO ALL OF YOU WHO KNOW FIRSTHAND THE BENEFITS AND PITFALLS OF OUR CURRENT SYSTEM.

AND WE HAVE HEARD WHAT YOU HAVE SAID. WE HAVE USED YOUR SUGGESTIONS. WE BELIEVE THAT WE HAVE INCORPORATED THE BEST ELEMENTS OF THE VARIOUS APPROACHES THAT WERE PUT FORTH AND HAVE CREATED A WORKABLE, MIDDLE POSITION. WE HAVE ADOPTED "MANAGED COMPETITION" AND INSURANCE REFORMS FROM THE PROPONENTS OF A MARKET DRIVEN APPROACH TO HEALTH CARE REFORM, WHILE EMBRACING WHOLE-HEARTEDLY MANY OF THE PRINCIPLES OF THE SINGLE-PAYER APPROACH. WHILE WE MAY HAVE DIFFERENT APPROACHES, WE ALL WANT TO GET TO THE SAME PLACE -- UNIVERSAL COVERAGE, COMPREHENSIVE BENEFITS, FAIR FINANCING WHERE EVERYBODY PAYS AND EVERYBODY IS RESPONSIBLE, AND SYSTEM WIDE COST CONTROLS. OUR PLAN ALSO ALLOWS STATES TO IMPLEMENT SINGLE PAYER HEALTH CARE SYSTEMS.

MANY OF THE PROBLEMS THAT YOU ALL FACE IN THE CURRENT SYSTEM ARE ADDRESSED IN THE PRESIDENT'S REFORM PLAN BECAUSE RIGHT NOW, LET'S FACE IT, MOST OF THE CARDS ARE HELD BY THE GOVERNMENT OR BY INSURANCE COMPANIES. INSURERS HAVE THE ABILITY TO GRANT AND DENY COVERAGE. THEY COMPETE ON THEIR ABILITY TO ATTRACT HEALTHIER PATIENTS. THEY HAVE SO MANY DIFFERENT INSURANCE POLICIES WITH SO MUCH FINE PRINT THAT WE OFTEN SEE COVERAGE EXCLUSIONS WHERE A COMPANY THOUGHT THEY WOULD HAVE COVERAGE. EVERY SINGLE DAY YOUR CHOICE AS A HEALTH CARE PROVIDER AND AS A PATIENT IS BEING LIMITED BY INSURANCE COMPANY DECISIONS THAT UNDERMINE YOUR AUTONOMY AND YOUR DISCRETION. NOW IS THE TIME FOR EVERY AMERICAN TO STAND UP AND SAY TO THE INSURANCE INDUSTRY "WE WANT OUR HEALTH CARE SYSTEM BACK."

NOW, HOW DO WE DO THAT? THE PRESIDENT BELIEVES THAT WE OUGHT TO ADOPT HIS PLAN FOR HEALTH CARE REFORM. WE BELIEVE THIS IS THE BEST WAY. OUR PLAN IS BASED ON WHAT WE HEARD FROM THE AMERICAN PEOPLE, AND WE INTEND TO CONTINUE OUR DIALOGUE WITH THEM. WE ARE OPEN TO DISCUSSION, AND TO NEGOTIATION. WE WELCOME ANY CHANGES THAT WILL ENHANCE AND STRENGTHEN OUR PROPOSAL, BUT THERE ARE SIX BASIC PRINCIPLES ON WHICH WE WILL NOT COMPROMISE AND ON WHICH OUR PLAN IS BASED.

THE FIRST AND MOST IMPORTANT IS SECURITY. I KNOW THAT YOU ARE TOO FAMILIAR WITH THE HUMAN TRAGEDIES EXPERIENCED BY SO MANY AMERICANS DUE TO LACK OF ACCESS TO HEALTH CARE. WE HAVE TO REACH UNIVERSAL COVERAGE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. NOT ONLY BECAUSE OF THE HORROR STORIES THAT COME TOO OFTEN TO OUR ATTENTION BECAUSE OF THE DENIAL OF HEALTH CARE. BUT BECAUSE OF THE ECONOMIC REALITY THAT UNTIL EVERY AMERICAN IS INSURED AND DOES HAVE HEALTH SECURITY, THERE CANNOT BE THE KIND OF COST EFFECTIVE APPROACHES TO HEALTH CARE THAT WE EXPECT TO ACHIEVE.

FOR TOO LONG OUR SYSTEM HAS REWARDED THE WRONG KINDS OF BEHAVIORS. WHY DON'T WE PAY FOR THE WELL CHILD EXAM, FOR THE MAMMOGRAM, FOR THE PAP SMEAR INSTEAD OF PAYING FOR THE OPERATION OR THE CHRONIC DEBILITATING CONDITION? IT IS OUR FIRM BELIEF THAT THE PACKAGE OF BENEFITS SHOULD EMPHASIZE PRIMARY AND PREVENTIVE HEALTH CARE.

AND IF WE CAN SHIFT OUR FOCUS TO THIS WHILE WE PROVIDE SECURITY, WE WILL NOT ONLY BE TAKING CARE OF HEALTH PROBLEMS EARLIER, WE WILL BE SAVING MONEY. IT IS TIME WE PUT AT THE HEAD OF THE LIST OF WHAT PEOPLE NEED AND DESERVE.

THE BENEFITS PACKAGE MUST ALSO INCLUDE MENTAL HEALTH BENEFITS. IT MUST INCLUDE SUBSTANCE ABUSE BENEFITS. THE HEALTH SECURITY ACT IMMEDIATELY ADDRESSES SOME OF THE MOST DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES WITHIN THE CURRENT INSURANCE SYSTEM AND ELIMINATES ALL DIFFERENCES IN COVERAGE BY JANUARY 1, 2001, OR EARLIER. WE KNOW THAT WITHOUT TREATING MENTAL HEALTH, WITHOUT TREATING SUBSTANCE ABUSE, WE RE NOT GOING TO HAVE TRUE HEALTH CARE REFORM. AND FINALLY, WE RECOGNIZE THE IMPORTANT ROLE OF SOCIAL WORKERS AND OTHER NON-PHYSICIAN PROVIDERS IN MENTAL HEALTH CARE DELIVERY.

THE SECOND ABSOLUTE PRINCIPLE IS, WE HAVE TO SIMPLIFY THE SYSTEM. WE CANNOT PERMIT IT TO CONTINUE UNCHECKED, SPEWING OUT MORE FORMS AND MORE REGULATIONS IN BOTH THE PRIVATE AND THE PUBLIC SECTOR EVERY YEAR THAT GOES BY. IN THE LAST FIFTEEN YEARS, HOSPITALS, ON AVERAGE, HAVE HIRED FOUR ADMINISTRATIVE AND CLERICAL EMPLOYEES FOR EVERY DOCTOR. WE HAVE WATCHED AS WE HAVE TANGLED OUR HOSPITAL ADMINISTRATORS IN A WEB OF PAPERWORK THAT HAS NO RELATIONSHIP TO THE CARE YOU AND I EXPECT WHEN WE WALK IN THE DOOR. WE HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY NOW TO ELIMINATE THAT PAPERWORK JUNGLE THAT HAS BESET OUT HEALTH CARE SYSTEM. IF WE CAN BEGIN TO TACKLE AND FINALLY CONQUER THIS SYSTEM, WE WILL SAVE BILLIONS OF DOLLARS AND FREE UP LITERALLY THOUSANDS AND THOUSANDS OF HOURS FOR HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS TO DO WHAT THEY DO BEST -- TAKE CARE OF PATIENTS.

THE THIRD PRINCIPLE IS CHOICE. MORE AND MORE, THE CURRENT SYSTEM IS LIMITING CHOICE FOR CONSUMERS. EMPLOYERS WHO BEAR THE COST FOR MOST PEOPLE'S INSURANCE (FOR THOSE WHO ARE INSURED) MAKE AND INCREASINGLY LIMIT THE CHOICE AS TO WHAT PLANS WILL BE AVAILABLE. WITH THE HEALTH SECURITY ACT, INDIVIDUALS WILL CHOOSE FROM AMONG THE PLANS IN THEIR ARA.

THEY WILL DECIDE WHETHER THEY WANT TO JOIN AN HMO OR A PPO OR A FEE FOR SERVICE, OR SOME YET UNCREATED NETWORK THAT WILL DELIVER THE CARE IN THE WAY, AT THE PRICE, AT THE QUALITY THAT THEY WANT.

IF WE PRESERVE CHOICE, WHAT WE HAVE DONE IS NOT ONLY TO GIVE THE POWER FOR MAKING THAT DECISION TO THE INDIVIDUAL, WE HAVE GIVEN THE RESPONSIBILITY TO THE INDIVIDUAL. WE NEED BETTER INFORMED CONSUMERS IN HEALTH CARE. MOST PEOPLE KNOW MORE ABOUT THE CAR THEY BUY THAN THE HEALTH INSURANCE PLAN THEY SUBSCRIBE TO. THEY DON'T KNOW HOW TO MAKE DISTINCTIONS AMONG THE VARYING KINDS OF SERVICES THAT ARE OFFERED. WE NEED TO PROVIDE INCENTIVES FOR THEM TO DO SO, AND CHOICE IS THE PRINCIPLE THAT WILL LEAD THEM IN THAT DIRECTION.

FOURTH, THERE WILL BE AND WILL HAVE TO BE SAVINGS IN THIS SYSTEM THAT CAN BE BETTER UTILIZED. THIS IS ONE OF THE MOST MISUNDERSTOOD ASPECTS OF HEALTH CARE IN AMERICA RIGHT NOW. WE ARE CURRENTLY SPENDING ABOUT 14 PERCENT OF OUR GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCTS ON HEALTH CARE. IF WE DO NOTHING, IF WE THROW UP OUR HANDS AND SAY OH MY GOSH, GOOD TRY, BUT JUST LIKE FRANKLIN ROOSEVELT AND HARRY TRUMAN AND LYNDON JOHNSON AND RICHARD NIXON AND EVERYBODY ELSE WHO TRIED, WE JUST CAN'T DEAL WITH THIS PROBLEM THEN WE CAN LOOK FORWARD TO SPENDING INCREASING AMOUNTS OF OUR POCKET WAGES ON HEALTH CARE. WE CAN LOOK FORWARD TO HAVING 20 PERCENT OF OUR GDP BY AROUND THE YEAR 2000 BEING SPENT ON HEALTH CARE WITHOUT ASSURING SECURITY, WITHOUT CHANGING THE SYSTEM TOWARD PRIMARY AND PREVENTIVE CARE. THE STATUS QUO IN THIS INSTANCE IS NOT STATIC.

WE BELIEVE THAT THERE IS THE CAPACITY TO REALLOCATE THE MONEY IN BOTH THE PRIVATE AND THE PUBLIC SECTOR IN EFFICIENT WAYS THAT WILL ENABLE US TO REACH UNIVERSAL COVERAGE AND DO SO MORE COST EFFECTIVELY.

FIFTH, QUALITY: WE HAVE THE BEST HEALTH CARE SYSTEM IN THE WORLD, BUT WE NEED TO STRENGTHEN IT AND MAKE SURE IT IS ACCESSIBLE TO EVERYONE. ANY REFORM SYSTEM MUST NOT ONLY PROVIDE FOR BUT REQUIRE QUALITY STANDARDS AND QUALITY OUTCOMES. THAT IS A STATEMENT THAT I THINK EVERYBODY WOULD AGREE WITH, BUT WE NEED BETTER WAYS OF MAKING IT HAPPEN. WE NEED MORE INFORMATION.

QUALITY HAS TO BE THE KEY TO EVERYTHING WE DO. WE HAVE TO ASK OURSELVES, WILL THIS BE GOOD FOR PATIENTS? WILL THIS BE GOOD FOR PHYSICIANS, NURSES? WILL THIS MAKE QUALITY BETTER? ANY HEALTH PLAN THAT CANNOT ANSWER THESE QUESTIONS AFFIRMATIVELY IS A PLAN WE MUST REJECT. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND THE STATE GOVERNMENT WILL HAVE TO TAKE MORE RESPONSIBILITY FOR COLLECTING INFORMATION ABOUT QUALITY AND FOR DISSEMINATING IT, SO THAT BOTH PHYSICIANS, HOSPITALS, PROVIDERS, PATIENTS, ALL OF US KNOW WE CAN MAKE INFORMED CHOICES.

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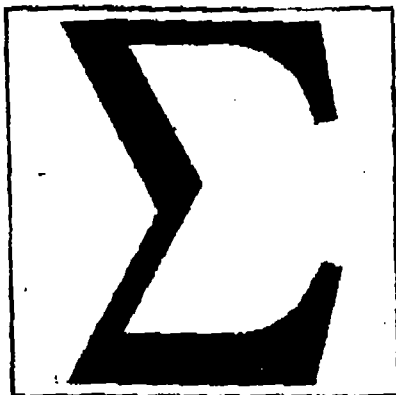

What is SNAPPE?

The Southern Nevada Area Population Projection and Estimation Committee — more simply known as "SNAPPE" — is an independent organization of demographers, planners and analysts who are directly involved in forecasting the Southern Nevada economy, its population, and other demographic factors.

Organized in 1986, SNAPPE's first accomplishment was to help

change the method used by the State Department of Taxation to estimate the population of Nevada cities and counties.

At present, the primary purpose of the group is to share information on the development of population estimates and projections for Southern Nevada. This newsletter is an attempt to share that information with the public. (See last page for list of SNAPPE members.)

The Real Migration Story

Do 6,000 people a month move into Clark County? No way. Or at least not in the sense that most folks mean.

In the late 70s and early 80s, 7 - 11 percent of Nevada's population was new to the state each year. By we did not grow by that much, partly because 6 - 7 percent of the State's population packed up and moved out each year.

Nevada's net in-migration rate — the increase after all the ins moved in and the outs moved out — fluctuated between 0.6 and 5 percent a year. This is not an uncommon story; Gross migration flows generally swamp the net figures.

So if someone quotes 6,000 a month moving into Clark County, first ask if they mean "gross" or "net" migration. Chances are they are interested in net.

Net in-migration makes our population grow, but so does a more old-fashioned technique: having babies. Here, too, there is both a gross and a net flow. People are born, people die, and the difference — the net — is called "natural increase."

Where, then, did the 6,000 a month figure come from? In 1990, the State estimated Clark County's population at 800,840, compared with 733,180 for 1989. That worked out to an increase of 67,660 over the year, or an average of 5,638 per month. That could be rounded up to an increase of 6,000 a month. But remember that part of that increase was natural, not move-ins.
