## **B DISTINCTIVE HISTORICAL AND QUALITATIVE FEATURES--WHAT MAKES SU UNIQUE**

The nation's leading institution in studying the balance between teaching and research at major research universities and putting into effect measures needed to remedy what is now perceived to be an imbalance

- An international leader in research on parallel computing, with a center (Northeast Parallel Architectures Center) headed by renowned computer scientist Geoffrey Fox

- A university committed to encouraging excellence in, and opening its doors to, public school students in its surrounding urban area through its novel Syracuse Challenge program, which offers special academic assistance, and guarantees admission to SU to those city high school students enrolled in the program who graduate with a percentage grade average of 85 or better and achieve a combined SAT score of at least 1000. The University promises to meet the financial need of those students admitted to SU through the program.

### TRANSPORTATION

Syracuse is located at the crossroads of two interstate highway systems, east/west I-90 - the New York State Thruway, and north/south I-81.

**Highway:** More than 160 trucking companies, including the nation's top 13 carriers of general freight, service the Syracuse area.

**Air:** Over 180 passenger flights depart daily from the Syracuse Hancock International Airport, serviced by eight major airlines and four commuter lines. Six major air cargo companies service the Syracuse terminal in addition to several regional carriers, forwarders and passenger airlines that offer air freight services.

**Bus:** CENTRO provides public transportation for Syracuse and suburbs at a fare of \$.75. Syracuse and Oswego Motor Lines is an independent inter-city bus company serving most areas throughout Onondaga and Oswego Counties with fares ranging from \$.75 to \$3.00. Onondaga Coach, Greyhound and Trailways also provide inter-city passenger service.

**Rail:** Conrail provides direct rail freight service to a variety of Northeastern markets. Amtrak provides rail passenger

**Water:** The Port of Oswego is located on the southeast shore of Lake Ontario, 34 miles northwest of Syracuse. The New York State Barge Canal System encompasses 524 toll-free miles and runs east-west across New York State, connecting the Niagara River with the Hudson River. The Onondaga Lake Barge Canal Terminal is located just north of Syracuse.

#### EDUCATION AND TRAINING

**Public, Private and Parochial Education:** There are 21 school districts in the Syracuse region with an enrollment of approximately 81,500 students. The 21 districts are comprised of 110 Elementary Schools, 34 Junior High, and 28 High Schools.

**College and Universities:** There are 44 private and state colleges within the Greater Syracuse Region, with a combined enrollment of over 215,000 students. There are eight schools in the City of Syracuse, including Syracuse University, Le Moyne College, SUNY Health Science Center, the College of Environmental Science and Forestry, Onondaga Community College, SUNY Empire State College, Bryant & Stratton Business Institute and Central City Business Institute.

**Vocational Training:** The five public vocational centers and 24 private vocational and technical schools offer more than 80 courses of study in a wide variety of fields.

#### RECREATION & CULTURE

- More than 50 state, county and city parks and several nature centers offer a wide range of recreational opportunities.
- 40 golf courses (more than any other area in the Northeast)
- 40 museums and galleries, including the nationally known Everson Museum of Art, designed by LM. Pei, houses the nation's most comprehensive display of American ceramics.
- Syracuse Symphony Orchestra, the 28th largest orchestra in the United States, serves the central and northern New York Region.
- The Carrier Dome, home of Syracuse University athletics; the only domed stadium in the northeast.
- The New York State Fair, the longest running state fair in the country, annually attracts more than 600,000 people from across the Northeast.
- Syracuse Winterfest, annually attracts 200,000 people to the 10-day celebration.

**HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON AND SEN. DANIEL PATRICK MOYNIHAN (D.-N.Y.)  
VISIT THE SU CAMPUS TUESDAY, APRIL 5**

**The First Lady Discusses Health Care Issues at a Public 2:30 P.M.  
Student Rally and Gets Private Tour and Demonstration of Potential  
Health Care Applications of Parallel Computing at SU's Northeast  
Parallel Architectures Center (NPAC)**

**SYRACUSE--First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and Sen. Daniel Patrick  
Moynihan (D-N.Y.) will visit the Syracuse University campus on  
Tuesday, April 5.**

At 2:30 p.m., Mrs. Clinton and Sen. Moynihan will appear at a student rally in SU's Hendricks Chapel; Mrs. Clinton will discuss health care issues at the event, which is open to the public and sponsored by SU's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs.

Television monitors airing a live, closed-circuit feed of Mrs. Clinton's remarks will be set up in Goldstein Auditorium of the Schine Student Center for those who are unable to find seating in Hendricks Chapel. Free public parking is available in the University's West Campus parking lots, between the Carrier Dome and Route 81.

Prior to their appearance at the rally, Mrs. Clinton and Sen. Moynihan will receive a private tour of SU's Northeast Parallel Architectures Center (NPAC) and see some of the potential health care applications of high performance computing and communications (HPCC) technology.

At NPAC, Mrs. Clinton and Sen. Moynihan will meet with the Center's director, Dr. Geoffrey C. Fox, professor of physics and computer science at SU and an internationally renowned authority on, and pioneer in the development of, parallel computing.

Fox will introduce a series of demonstrations involving NPAC's InfoMall USA, a new alliance of universities and 46 corporations and economic development organizations for the development and application of software for multimedia HPCC technologies in health care, the military, and elsewhere. Included will be a demonstration by SUNY Health Science Center pediatric cardiologist Dr. Frank Smith showing telemedicine running over NYNET, one of the first ATM (Asynchronous Transfer Mode) networks in the world; and a demonstration by Richard A. Johnson, of Booz, Allen and Hamilton, Inc., of a health care fraud detection system that can also be applied to credit card and security fraud.

The Syracuse University campus is a familiar site to several members of the Clinton Administration: Seven current presidential appointees are SU graduates.

Donna Shalala, secretary of Health and Human Services, received master's and Ph.D. degrees in social science from SU's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs in 1970. Christine Varney, cabinet secretary, received a master's degree in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1978. Walter Broadnax, deputy secretary of Health and Human Services, received a Ph.D. in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1975.

Oliver Quinn, deputy solicitor for the Department of Labor, earned a bachelor's degree in political science from SU's College of Arts and Sciences in 1972. Raymond Pierce, deputy assistant secretary of civil rights in the Department of Education, earned a bachelor's degree from the College of Arts and Sciences in 1980. Roslyn Mazer, deputy assistant attorney general for the Office of Policy Development in the Justice Department, received a bachelor's degree in political science from the College of Arts and Sciences in 1971. Anthony Carnevale, head of the National Commission for Employment Policy, earned master's and doctoral degrees in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1974 and 1977, respectively.

In addition, Charles Baquet III is awaiting U.S. Senate confirmation as deputy director of the Peace Corps; Baquet earned a master's degree in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1975. And Dr. John P. White, director of the Center for Business and Government at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and former assistant secretary of defense, was recently appointed head of the federal Commission on Roles and Missions of the Armed Forces.

Founded in 1924, the Maxwell School is the oldest university-based school of public and international affairs in the nation and the first to offer graduate training in public administration.

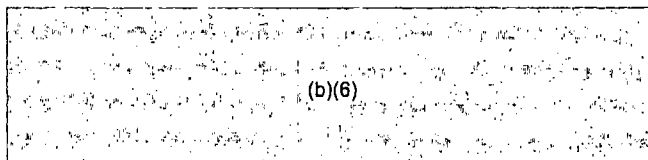

**The First Lady Discusses Health Care at a Public 2:30 P.M. Student Rally and Will Get a Demonstration of High Performance Computing and Communications Technology at SU's Northeast Parallel Architectures Center (NPAC)**

**SYRACUSE--First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan (D-N.Y.) will visit the SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY campus on Tuesday, April 5.**

At 2:30 p.m., Mrs. Clinton and Sen. Moynihan will appear at a student rally in SU's Hendricks Chapel; Mrs. Clinton will discuss health care at the event, which is open to the public and sponsored by SU's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs.

Sen. Moynihan will be introduced to the Chapel audience by SU graduate student Shelley H. Cohen, who will receive the Master of Public Administration degree from the Maxwell School in May and the Master of Science degree from the SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry in September; last summer she served as an intern in the White House Office on Environmental Policy and, from 1990 to 1992, as a legislative correspondent in the office of Sen. Joseph I. Lieberman (D-Conn.).

Prior to their appearance at the rally, Mrs. Clinton and Sen. Moynihan will receive a tour of SU's Northeast Parallel Architectures Center (NPAC) and see samples of high performance computing and communications (HPC) technology.

At NPAC, Mrs. Clinton and Sen. Moynihan will meet with the Center's director, Dr. Geoffrey C. Fox, professor of physics and computer science at SU and an internationally renowned authority on, and pioneer in the development of, parallel computing.

Fox will introduce a series of demonstrations involving NPAC's software, which is used by many universities and 46 corporations and economic development organizations for the development and application of software for multimedia HPC technologies in health care, the military, and elsewhere.

The Syracuse University campus is a familiar site to several members of the Clinton Administration: Seven current presidential appointees are SU graduates.

Donna Shalala, secretary of Health and Human Services, received master's and Ph.D. degrees in social science from SU's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs in 1970. Christine Varney, cabinet secretary, received a master's degree in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1978. Walter Broadnax, deputy secretary of Health and Human Services, received a Ph.D. in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1975.

Oliver Quinn, deputy solicitor for the Department of Labor, earned a bachelor's degree in political science from SU's College of Arts and Sciences in 1972. Raymond Pierce, deputy assistant secretary of civil rights in the Department of Education, earned a bachelor's degree from the College of Arts and Sciences in 1980. Roslyn Mazer, deputy assistant attorney general for the Office of Policy Development in the Justice Department, received a bachelor's degree in political science from the College of Arts and Sciences in 1971. Anthony Carnevale, head of the National Commission for Employment Policy, earned master's and doctoral degrees in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1974 and 1977, respectively.

In addition, Charles Baquet III has been nominated as deputy director of the Peace Corps; Baquet earned a master's degree in public administration from the Maxwell School in 1975. And Dr. John P. White, director of the Center for Business and Government at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and former assistant secretary of defense, was recently appointed head of the federal Commission on Roles and Missions of the Armed Forces; White earned M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from the Maxwell School in 1964 and 1969, respectively.

Founded in 1924, the Maxwell School is the oldest university-based school of public and international affairs in the nation and the first to offer graduate training in public administration.

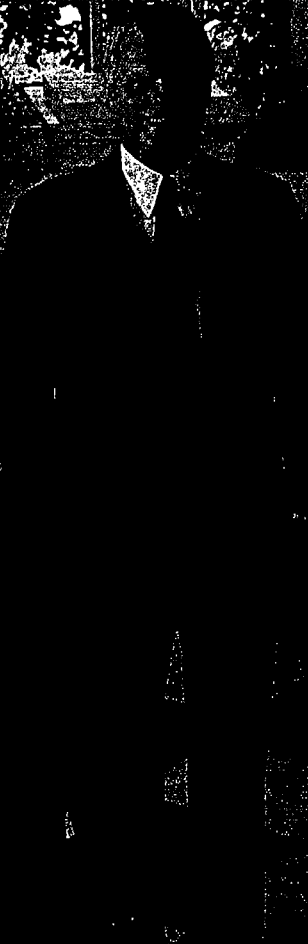

- 1870 SU promoted equal education for both men and women.
- 1874 SU offered the nation's first bachelor of fine arts degree.

- 1980 SU built the Carrier Dome, the first domed athletic stadium of its kind located on a university campus.
- 1984 SU launched the CASE Center, one of the first NYS Centers for Advanced Technology created to revitalize economic growth through technology transfer.
- 1993 SU opened the Center for Public and Community Service to promote volunteer service as a fundamental part of the learning experience of students.
