Comments on Saudi-Yemen Op-Ed

You asked for our comments on the New York Times Op-Ed on the Saudi-Yemen imbroglio. We take no issue with Killion's characterization of Saudi policy towards Yemen. It is true that Saudi animus towards its southern neighbor has worsened since the Gulf war, and there is considerable evidence that the Saudis were the principal instigators of the southern secession movement.

Killion overstates the robustness of Yemen's fledgling democracy. The two parties that united and democratized from 1990 to 1993 in fact failed to build genuine democratic institutions, and the party leaders were trying to play by old rules. Those tensions led to the breakdown of powersharing and the fighting of recent months.

Killion also misrepresents U.S. policy. We were quite supportive of the 1993 elections and, during the mini-war, tried to balance our dominant interest in the stability and security of Saudi Arabia with our admittedly lower-order interests in Yemen. Democracy was not the defining issue of that war.

■ Henry G. Cisneros is sued by a woman with whom he had an affair ■ In Bill Murray, a sturgeon couldn't have a better friend.

A woman who once had a two-year affair with HENRY G. CISNEROS, the United States Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, filed a lawsuit yesterday, charging him with fraud and breach of contract, The Associated Press reported.

The suit was brought by LINDA MEDLAR, who was hired in 1986 by Mr. Cisneros, then Mayor of San Antonio, as a fund-raiser. He has acknowledged being romantically involved with her when he was Mayor. The suit claims that he has ceased

making payments of \$4,000 a month to her that were part of an oral agreement the two reached in 1990.

According to papers filed in State Court in Lubbock, Tex., Mr. Cisneros "recognized his responsibility for making her name, photograph and life a public spectacle and for her public humiliation, and for the destruction of her career and her marriage, and agreed that he had a responsibility for the damage done."

The suit seeks \$256,000 in actual damages and unspecified punitive damages, A.P. said. Mr. Cisneros said yesterday that he made the payments for three years "out of compassion" and with the knowledge of his wife, Mary Alice. He now earns about

\$148,000 a year, which he said is less than he made as a businessman.

"I felt I had done everything a person could reasonably do," he said.

In 1991, after the affair ended, Mrs. Cisneros filed for divorce but dropped the action a month later. The couple have three children. Mr. Cisneros said his involvement with Ms. Medlar was "a serious long-term relationship and required the most profound of personal reflection" over whether to remain in his marriage. "I concluded that the best course was to stand by my family," he added.

Who would have expected BILL MURRAY to speak at a meeting titled, "The International Conference on Sturgeon Biodiversity and Conservation"?

But there the comedian was at the American Museum of Natural History in New York on Thursday evening, expounding on the sturgeon and other matters before 200 scientists who had gathered for two days of scholarly deliberations on how to halt the global decline of the giant fish. The conference, which ends today, was organized by the Hudson River Foundation.

Mr. Murray, formerly of "Saturday Night Live," announced that he had looked up the definition of sturgeon in his Webster's Dictionary, published in 1954, when "men were men, women were chicks or babes and sturgeon were sturgeon," he said.

"Some of you are saying, 'What is he doing here?'" he said. His explanation was that he lives on the Hudson River, which is home to sturgeon.

Acknowledging the credentials of his audience, he asked: "How many of you are marine biologists? How many are ichthyologists? How many are systematists? How many believe that the sturgeon is kosher?"

But he left no doubt of his commitment to sturgeon. He crumpled up a check and threw it at KATHRYN BIRSTEIN, the wife of Dr. Vadim Birstein, a geneticist and a champion of sturgeons in Russia. It was a signed blank check.

political system that includes minorities, women and religious parties.

The Clinton Administration has done nothing to support this crucial democratic experiment. Instead, it has increased America's strategic and economic dependence on the Saudi regime, which was especially strong during the war against Iraq in 1991, fought to recover Kuwait, which Iraq seized in 1990.

Yemen's model for participatory democracy in an Arab nation sets an important precedent. If preserved, it could contribute to the long-term stability of the region. But if democratic solutions are not developed for the expression of popular discontent in the region, all political dissent is likely to be channeled in the direction of fundamentalist revolutions.

To neutralize this potential, U.S. needs to press its region — Saudi Arabia and Egypt — to

Saudi Meddlers In Yemen

At a moment when the hoary political axioms of Middle Eastern politics are being junked, another — the United States-Saudi Arabian strategic relationship — needs to be reviewed.

In meddling in Yemen's two-month civil war, the neighboring Saudis worked against the Clinton Administration's "enlargement" doctrine, which seeks to expand democracy around the world.

In any case, Saudi Arabia lost when the military forces of the democratically oriented Government of Yemen seized Aden on July 7, defeating the secessionist south.

In attempting to guarantee the breakup of Yemen by supporting the breakaway, the Saudis were settling an old score, for Yemen supported Iraq in the Persian Gulf war. But the main reason to try to bring the Yemen Government down was the political and economic threat that a unified and democratic Yemen posed.

Although Israel has long been the only democracy in the Middle East and is now tolerated by Saudi Arabia, Yemen emerged in 1991 as the sole pluralist Arab democracy. This makes Yemen a powerful inspiration for Islamic and non-Islamic groups in other Arab states that yearn to democratize, and causes the repressive Saudi regime to feel particularly threatened.

Yemen unified in 1990 after the collapse of the Soviet Union. Once it lost Soviet foreign aid, the former Southern Yemen Socialist Republic of President Ali Salim al-Bidh's Socialist Party was forced into the union.

In the north, popular discontent with the corrupt and incompetent rule of President Ali Abdullah Saleh's People's General Congress motivated the Government to consent to the merger. The leaders of the two former regimes created a coalition Government with Mr. Saleh as President and Mr. Bidh as Vice President.

The Yemenis were promised an open political system and a free press, and the coalition Government delivered. More than 40 parties contested

the elections in April 1990 and thousands of independent candidates entered the race. The issues were widely covered in more than 100 Yemeni newspapers and magazines.

The elections were not only Yemen's first multiparty political contest but the first ever on the Arabian Peninsula and the first in which women could participate.

By contrast, Saudi Arabia, ruled by a large absolutist royal family, permits no elections, women's rights or freedom of the press; its monarch was even reluctant to convene a powerless "consultative council."

The gulf's conservative monar-

chies, including Oman, where southern rebels fled, fear that Yemen could unleash an unstoppable trend toward multiparty systems. Underground cassettes of Yemen's vigorous parliamentary debates and its myriad opposition newspapers have been circulated in Saudi cities.

This has been particularly threatening to the Saudi monarchy, which faces expanding criticism at home. For the first time, organized opposition to the royal family's repression, greed and mismanagement of the economy has arisen. Last winter, Sunni clerics, Shites, women's groups and Western-educated liberals formed the Committee for the Defense of Legitimate Rights. Within days, it was accused of being the nucleus of a political party — forbidden in Saudi Arabia — and disbanded by the royal family.

This growing dissent inspired the royals to try to undermine Yemen's democratic experiment.

After the war broke out on May 4, the Vice President and his party quit the Government over allocation of power; on May 21, the south seceded. Saudi Arabia was poised to recognize the south as an independent state.

Before last year's elections in Yemen, Saudi Arabia was believed to be channeling substantial financial support to an anti-democratic, fundamentalist wing of Yemen's Islamic political party, al-Islah. The Saudis have also tried to organize northern tribal leaders to resist control by the central Government.

The Saudis are also frightened by Yemen's economic potential. Unification and democratization have opened the door to greater development. Dozens of oil companies undertook explorations in Yemen in the wake of the merger; they are reportedly looking for oil reserves that match the scale of Saudi Arabia's.

With a population of 13 million — larger but much poorer than Saudi Arabia's 8 million to 10 million — Yemen could challenge Saudi dominance on the peninsula if it reached its full economic potential.

The Saudis maintain that the oil exploration is taking place in disputed territory. Yemen says that it owns the territory. In 1992, the Saudis warned international oil companies that they considered prospecting for oil in a large but ill-defined area on the Saudi-Yemeni border a threat to their sovereignty. Several companies suspended or ended their activity. But the Hunt Oil Company politely rejected the warning; afterward, its oil and gas recovery station near Marib was bombed by the Saudi-supported southern secessionist forces.

Throughout the Arab world, political leaders are struggling to reconcile the growth of political Islam and popular pressure for participation in state affairs. But the Yemeni leadership is the only one that has responded to popular pressure by building a
