Russian IFOR Participation

ù Hope Russians and other Partnership for Peace countries will participate. Any combat forces, however, must

be under NATO command and control.

ù Russia does not have a veto over IFOR operations.

ù In any case, the agreements reached between Perry-Grachev have not been approved by NATO, yet.

ù There have been no decisions made regarding the political relations with NATO.

ù Talks are continuing and Perry will meet Grachev at the end of the month.

ù Perry/Grachev reached agreement on Russian participation of IFOR. Russian forces will come under the operational command of a Russian general officer who will report to General Joulwan as overall commander of IFOR. The Russian Brigade will be folded into an American division which will exercise tactical control. The Russians will retain national command over their forces as other nations that participate in IFOR.

ù Russia and U.S. may also participate in a special force that will deploy 30 days after IFOR. That force will work on transport, logistics.

ù Prefer NATO/Russian forces not separated between Federation and Serb areas.

Agreement on the Region of Eastern Slavonia

ù Transitional period of 12 months which may be extended for 12 months.

ù UN Security Council requested to establish a Transitional Administration.

ù UN Security Council requested to authorize an international force to deploy during the transitional period to maintain peace and security and assist in implementation of this agreement.

ù Transitional Administration shall help establish and train temporary police forces

ù All persons have the right to return freely to their place of residence in the Region and to live in conditions of security.

ù Not later than 30 days before the end of the transitional period, elections for all local government bodies shall be organized by the Transitional Administration.

ù The Government of Croatia shall cooperate fully with the Transitional Administration and the international force.

If asked whether IFOR is to be the international force

ù The international force and its composition has not been determined. The UN Security Council must first authorize an international force. IFOR does not have a mission to implement an agreement in Eastern Slavonia.

Federation in Dayton

ù Secretary Christopher flew to Dayton November 9 to announce decisions that bring to life the Bosnian/Croat Federation.

ù President Tudjman witnessed the signing. Izetbegovic and Zubak signed it. The two mayors of Mostar and Mostar's EU administrator signed it.

ù The U.S. representative to the Federation, Daniel Serwer, played a key role in negotiating this agreement.

Sanctions Relief

ù Izetbegovic and Milosevic requested immediate resumption of natural gas deliveries to both Bosnia and Serbia on humanitarian grounds and as a confidence building measure.

ù Working with Contact group members for action at the UNSC under existing

humanitarian exemption.

ù This is a humanitarian gesture to provide heating fuel in response to severe winter conditions.

ù Delivery is for two months.

ù Action is similar to one last year where relief was provided for humanitarian reasons.

ù (If asked about sanctions suspension) This will take a full UNSCR and our position has not changed-we will support suspension when there is a peace agreement.

Intelligence Sharing with the Bosnian War Crimes Tribunal

ù The U.S. intelligence community is not "sitting on" information that may be of use to the Tribunal prosecutor.

ù A coordinated Intelligence Community process in place since spring to manage handling of requests for information/classified responses to requests. We provide available information even in the absence of a specific request.

ù U.S. has not withheld any intelligence with the intent to prevent the prosecution of any war criminals including Mladic and Karadzic.

ù Talks in Dayton have had no bearing whatsoever on our commitment to support and assist the War Crimes Tribunal in every way its efforts to bring war criminals to justice.

ù Reporting such information is time-consuming, but we make a strenuous effort to respond as rapidly as possible.

ù We will find a way to get the Tribunal the information it needs.

Peace Plan Implementation

- ù NAC approved concept of ops for IFOR.
- ù Detailed planning by NATO Military Authorities proceeding; Joulwan briefed President and national security team on state of NATO'S plans.
- ù Number of forces for operation not determined - will depend on peace agreement modalities. Approximate number would be 20,000 US, 40,000 nonUS.
- ù NATO briefed UN, UN Peace Force contributors, and interested PFP countries. Contributions by non-NATO countries would be welcome.
- ù Churkin attended "16-plus-one" with NAC to discuss NATO's planning.
- ù Concept of ops 5 phases:
 - Phase I: Preparation Phase. Presently in this phase now.
 - Phase II: Entry. Begin after signing of peace agreement. Military forces would deploy to area by sea/land.
 - Phase III: Implementation. Deployment of forces in country to secure critical areas and main outposts.
 - Phase IV: Transition to Peace. Initial robust forces slowly drawdown over years as peace agreement took effect.
 - Phase V: Exit. Orderly hand over of commitments to appropriate civilian organizations and withdrawal of IFOR and equipment.

ù U.S. has/will continue to investigate and provide information to UN/War Crimes Tribunal regarding violations of international human rights and humanitarian law in a timely manner.

ù Shattuck documented evidence of Bosnian Serb atrocities. Last August, went to Central/Northeastern Bosnia, collected eyewitness accounts of mass executions, beatings, rape and other violations of human rights and international humanitarian law. Shattuck just returned to region to interview refugees in Zenica.

ù Albright presented to UN Security Council compelling evidence gathered by US. Evidence based on US intelligence and photographic intelligence, strongly suggested mass grave sites in Srebrenica.

ù Actively support international organizations like UNHCR and Red Cross to

ù Critically important that members of Congress and public keep an open mind over next few weeks as peace is negotiated. We won't have a clear picture of the requirements and risks until agreement is reached. When we do, we will present details of our plan, and President will seek public and Congressional support.

Points We Have Made

ù It is in our interest to have broadest possible base of public support -- in both parties -- for U.S. role in implementation of settlement if we achieve one. Want to hear your views.

ù Despite many hurdles to overcome, believe we have best chance in four years to reach settlement. U.S. leadership, so critical to achieving peace, will be critical to implementation as well.

ù Remain firmly convinced that only NATO can effectively enforce military aspects of settlement. NATO presence is essential to creating secure environment in which political and economic rebuilding can begin.

ù As leader of NATO, U.S. has to be involved. Our interests are very much at stake: Our engagement essential to prevent spread of conflict, achieve lasting peace.

ù First, and most important, there won't be a peace agreement unless NATO enforces it.

ù We believe the parties can reach a mutually acceptable peace settlement. But even if they do, they all recognize the need for an international implementation force to stabilize the situation and build confidence so that peace can take hold.

ù NATO is the only organization capable of playing this role.

ù Second, if NATO takes on the implementation mission but we do not participate, it will be the end of NATO and of U.S. leadership on transatlantic security issues.

ù Some argue that Bosnia is a European problem so the Europeans should take care of it. This may sound attractive, but the reality is that we have a deep interest in European security.

ù The United States was drawn into two world wars and a 50-year Cold War because of threats to security and stability in Europe. The lessons of history are clear -- U.S. leadership is essential for Europe to solve its problems.

ù And third, the risks of participating in the implementation force must be weighed against the risk of an expanded war if the peace process fails.

ù The dangers of spillover are real.

ù The only way to prevent the spread of conflict and future massacres of innocents is to seize this opportunity when all parties may be willing to accept an agreement -- and to recognize that the only way to make the agreement stick is for NATO, with the U.S. in the lead, to provide the stability necessary in the first months after the settlement.

ù We will make sure terms of agreement are enforceable and that parties themselves accept the mission and robust ROE that NATO implementation force (IFOR) must have.

ù Let me emphasize a few key points:

ù IFOR will have carefully defined mission, clear chain of command with no "dual key", and authority to use force against any violation.

ù Forces will not be predominantly American: Europeans and other non-Americans will provide 2/3 of troops.

ù Hope Russians and other Partnership for Peace countries will also participate. Any combat forces, however, must be under NATO operational or tactical control.

ù We will have a clear exit strategy and will be careful to guard against mission creep.

ù Part of exit strategy to establish stability on ground by time IFOR completes mission. This will be one of the keys to ensuring settlement does not break down after IFOR leaves.

- Preference is to establish balance of forces between Federation and Bosnian Serbs through arms control measures that provide for a "build-down."

- Arms control by itself unlikely to achieve stable balance, so we are prepared to help equip/train Federation forces to ensure they have effective self-defense capability.

- Effort will be separate from NATO-led implementation force and will need to be carefully managed to avoid

any risks to the IFOR and to avoid stimulating a regional arms race. First step: lifting of arms embargo.

ù Expect NATO mission can be completed in about a year, but need to see agreement and NATO plan before making such commitment.

ù International community can create opportunity for parties to make durable peace, but ultimate responsibility is theirs.

UK, NORTHERN IRELAND, IRELAND, EU SUMMIT TRIP

-- We are still planning to make this very important and historic trip.

-- This visit comes at an important time in Europe and we plan to discuss the full range of European security and economic issues.

-- In particular, as the first President ever to visit Northern Ireland, President Clinton will have the unique opportunity to celebrate the extraordinary changes in peoples lives and the real hope for a lasting peace and prosperous future that 15 months of cease fire has brought.

Peace Talks

-- Support the twin track proposed by the British and Irish governments.

-- British and Irish governments are working hard to move the twin track forward and I hope they will be able to do so in the near future.

IRELAND

U.S. Role

ù We are committed to working with the two governments and the parties to help in the search for peace.

ù Thankful there has been a year in which the guns and bombs are silent.

ù First time in a generation there is real hope for a lasting peace and a more prosperous future. People of Belfast are finally living a normal life.

ù One can literally say that there are individuals walking the streets in Belfast alive today who would not be had we not gotten involved. American engagement has been an essential

ingredient in
the search for
peace.

ù We have had a number of contacts over the last several weeks about how to move the peace process forward.

ù We are hopeful a way can be found to move things forward. Contacts with all the parties are continuing. We are not prepared to go into any detail.

Twin Track

ù We see a basis for progress in the "twin-track" proposal to begin inclusive talks between the British and Irish Governments and the Northern Ireland political parties and to establish an international body to address the issue of decommissioning the paramilitaries' weapons.

ù We will continue to encourage all sides to be flexible and find a way to move the process forward.

British Stalling on Talks?

ù As we have said, we hope that momentum will have been restored to the process by the time the President visits Northern Ireland at the end of November.

ù We believe Prime Minister Major is committed to achieving a lasting peace in Northern Ireland.

Position on Decommissioning:

ù On decommissioning of weapons, we have said that parties observing the cease-fire "must take the next step and begin to discuss serious decommissioning." We have made clear to Sinn Féin and loyalists that we expect movement on this issue.

Senator Mitchell to Chair Commission on Decommissioning?:

ù The two governments and parties are discussing the proposal. Have not yet made a decision.

ù It's premature to discuss any U.S. Government or private citizen role until there is a formal decision.

Comments of new UUP leader Trimble on twin track?

ù Trimble's speech of October 21 represented no change in the unionist position of opposition to the twin track approach.

ù Our view is that twin track strategy of the British and Irish Governments offers the best prospect for moving the peace process forward.

ù Looking forward to working with Mr. Trimble as we have with the Unionists over the past year.

Paisley Visit

ù Paisley met with NSA Lake and VP Gore October 27.

Deportations

[Irish groups mounting a campaign against deportation of former IRA members, some who are married to U.S. citizens and/or have U.S. children. U.S. law provides no flexibility in prohibiting permanent residency to those linked to terrorism. We are looking into possible legislative waivers.]

ù Issue recently brought to our attention.

ù Law provides no flexibility on many cases.

ù Staff reviewing issue.

SUCCESSOR TO NATO SYG CLAES

-- Every member of NATO recognizes that the choice of the New Secretary General will

significant impact on the future of the Alliance at this critical juncture in its history.

-- As you know, it is a decision that requires the consensus among all 16 members of the alliance. We will continue to consult until we reach agreement with our allies on this very important matter.

RUSSIA/NIS

Current Items

Yeltsin Heart Problem

-- President Yeltsin remains in hospital but taking on increasingly active schedule.
Embassy
Moscow in touch with Russian officials; what Embassy has heard from them about Yeltsin in tracks with what Russian officials saying publicly.

Perry-Grachev Talks on Russia and Bosnia IFOR

-- Perry and Grachev agreed on November 8 on military framework under which Russian combat forces will participate in a Bosnia peace implementation operation. Warmly welcome this understanding, as we consider Russian participation in Bosnia peace implementation important and desirable.

(If pressed for details of arrangement, best to defer to Defense)

Chechnya

-- Have seen reports of attacks against Chechen Prime Minister Zavgayev (Moscow-backed) and against Chechen rebel leader Dudayev. Condemn attacks whose purpose is to further destabilize peace

effort in Chechnya.

-- While formal Russian-Chechen talks suspended, sides have held informal working meetings, and Moscow had reiterated its commitment to pursue negotiated settlement.

-- Dispute in Chechnya can only be resolved by negotiated settlement. Urge sides to work together to implement military agreement and to find political solution.

General Items

U.S. Stake in Relationship

-- U.S. has vital stake in engaging Russia and supporting reform there. Matters greatly to us if Russia dictatorship or democracy, centrally planned or market-oriented economy.

-- Long-term strategy. Transformation underway will be complex, protracted. Struggle going on between those who support reform and those who oppose or fear change.

-- Engagement producing important successes: reducing nuclear threat, over 50% of Russian GDP now from private sector, no Russian troops in Central Europe or Baltics.

-- President's productive meeting with Yeltsin at Hyde Park on October 23 underscored stability, inner strength of U.S.-Russia partnership.

Cuts in/Conditions on Bilateral Aid

-- Have differences with Russians on important areas. Working hard to resolve these

-- But our assistance advances critical U.S. interests. It helps reformers succeed in building a democracy and a market economy, and it helps reduce nuclear threat to U.S. Not in our interest to cut this assistance.

Russian Concerns about NATO Enlargement

-- Understand Russia has concerns about NATO enlargement. Intend to manage enlargement process in deliberate, transparent manner that threatens no country and strengthens security and stability of Europe as a whole.

-- Russia a key player in building stable, undivided Europe. Our goal is to develop NATO-Russia relationship in parallel with NATO's process of taking in new members. Robust NATO-Russia relationship in interests of U.S., Europe and Russia.

Iran Reactor Sale

-- President has discussed Bushehr reactor sale with Yeltsin. Vice President and Prime Minister Chernomyrdin continuing serious dialogue on issue.

-- Have made clear and continue to stress our opposition to any nuclear cooperation with Iran, given Tehran's ambitions to acquire nuclear weapons capability.

CFE

-- Parties have achieved something thought unattainable a decade ago: over 50,000 pieces of military equipment destroyed to establish a stable balance of forces in Europe - dramatically lower than just a few years ago.

-- Consensus was also reached Friday among the 30 CFE parties on broad outlines of solution to the issue of the flanks, which preserves the integrity of the treaty and will not diminish the security of any state.

-- As part of that decision, parties agreed to work intensively to complete the task

of resolving
the flank issue as soon as possible.

POLISH ELECTIONS

ù Awaiting final results, though projections suggest that Aleksander Kwasiewski (kva sh-NYEV-skii) has narrowly defeated President Lech Walesa in yesterday's elections.

ù This appears to have been a free and fair elections, Poland's second direct Presidential elections since 1989.

ù Both candidates ran on platforms to maintain Poland's democratic and market reform and to seek its integration with Western institutions.

ù We hope Poland's next president will carry out his campaign promises and maintain the reforms that have brought Poland so much success since 1989.

ù After a tough campaign, it will be important for Poland's next President to reach out to the whole country to bring people together.

ù Whatever the final outcome, Lech Walesa has a secure place in history as one of the democratic heroes of the 20th century. As leader of Solidarity and Poland's democratically-elected President, Lech Walesa led his nation through a dramatic, unprecedented and largely successful transformation. Poland, Europe, American and the world are better off for it.

ù (If asked re NATO membership) Countries aspiring to NATO membership need to be firmly committed to democracy, market economic reform and responsible foreign and security policies. Poland has made major

strides in these areas and we hope its progress continues.

ALBANIA

Q: Any comment on the Washington Post story on U.S. defense cooperation with Albania?

A: We believe the current military relationship between the U.S. and Albania is in the interests of both countries.

Albania has been playing a responsible role in a very unstable region.

We hope our military cooperation can continue, but this will depend in great part on continued Albanian progress toward democracy and market economic reforms.

JAPAN

-- U.S. - Japan relations are fundamentally sound in all aspects, including security and trade.

-- We are working closely with the Japanese government to deal with Okinawa base-related problems and resolve them as quickly as possible. Joint Commission to start work tomorrow. Need to work calmly, cooperatively and carefully to deal with these issues.

-- Will reschedule state visit to Japan as soon as we can bring an end. This is a crucial relationship and a very successful one. We will work hard to ensure that it is restored to full vitality.

CHINA

-- Many challenges remain in our bilateral relationship with China, but we have a shared recognition that improving relations is in the overall strategic interest of both sides.

-- We have made important progress recently in dealing with disagreements, especially in handling trade disputes and preparing the way for China's eventual admission to the World Trade Organization.

-- Vice President Gore met with China's President Jiang in Osaka. He renewed the commitment to a policy of comprehensive engagement I had affirmed when President Jiang and I met in New York last month.

PAKISTAN: ISLAMABAD BOMBING

-- The United States strongly condemns the murderous attack on the Egyptian Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan.

-- I have conveyed my outrage over this terrorist act to President Mubarak and Prime Minister Bhutto. I have offered my condolences for those killed and wounded in the bombing.

-- We are ready to work with the Governments of Pakistan and Egypt to help determine those responsible for this crime and bring them to justice.

ALGERIAN ELECTIONS

ù A large percentage of the eligible Algerian electorate turned out for the presidential vote on November 16. Preliminary results indicate that Liamine Zeroual was chosen to serve as President for a new five-year term.

ù The turnout in these elections offers hope that Algerians who seek a peaceful end to Algeria's crisis will participate in a political process to achieve that goal if given the chance to do so. President Zeroual's election is an opportunity to lay the foundation for such a process.

SAUDI ARABIA BOMBING AFTERMATH

Q: Have you identified the perpetrators of the bombing yet?

A: The full resources of the US government are being brought to bear on this investigation and we are determined to do everything possible to ensure that the perpetrators are identified and brought to justice.

However, the investigation is at a very early stage and we are not going to speculate on who may be responsible.

Q: What do you know about the Islamic Movement for Change, which claimed responsibility for the attack?

A: A number of groups have claimed responsibility for the attack. We are investigating all of these claims.

We are aware of the IMC and its stated opposition to the US presence in the Persian

Gulf.

Q: What security measures are being taken to guard US personnel and facilities in Saudi Arabia?

A: The Saudi government and US agencies have responded quickly and effectively to improve security for US personnel and facilities, both government and private, throughout the Kingdom.

(If pressed:) I don't want to get into the details of the new security arrangements. That would be counterproductive.

Q: What contact has there been between the USG and the Saudi government?

A: Ambassador Mabus and his staff have been in constant contact with Saudi officials at all levels, including King Fahd and Crown Prince Abdullah.

At his meeting with the King, Ambassador Mabus passed on the President's appreciation for the tremendous effort the Saudis have made in the wake of the bombing.

Although Saudi Ambassador Prince Bandar was not in the US at the time of the bombing, we have been in contact with him and he has been helping expedite the movement of US equipment and personnel both to and from the Kingdom.

Q: Do you believe that the security of U.S. facilities in Saudi Arabia was lax before the bombing?

A: I think we should wait to hear what the experts say before making a judgment on that.

HAITI

-- We have deplored the recent outbursts of violence in Haiti that followed the murder of two of Haiti's parliamentary deputies, but calm has returned and President Aristide is continuing the policy of reconciliation he has followed since his election.

-- Haiti has embarked on a democratic transition that has not always been perfect, but its forward movement and democratic course is certain. Several candidates are now running for the up-coming presidential elections following recent successful parliamentary elections.

-- The Haitian police force is in the process of taking full responsibility for law and order when the UN mission completes its work in February. We will continue to train and assist them under a five-year training agreement that is currently in force.

-- Representatives of our government have been working closely with President Aristide and his government to encourage and assist their economic transition and I expect President Aristide to move forward on privatization of state-owned industries as he has promised.

NIGERIA

-- The United States is outraged over the gravely flawed judicial process which led to the execution of Ken Saro-Wiwa and eight others.

-- These executions demonstrate to the world the Abacha regime's contempt for

even t
he most
basic international norms and universal standards of human rights.

-- We are working with our allies and partners to find ways to put broad,
internatio
nal pressure
on Nigeria and to move toward a democratic future and to respect the rights of its
o
wn citizens.

-- In this regard, the President consulted by phone last week with South African
Pr
esident
Mandela. Although no concrete measures emerged from the discussion, both
leaders ag
reed to pursue a
multilateral approach in applying pressure on Nigeria.

-- We are ruling nothing in and nothing out. But any sanction must have broad
inter
national
support to be effective.

MACKE

-- The President was shocked when he first heard of Admiral Macke's remarks.
But he
also noted that
Macke had enjoyed a long career, serving his country with distinction.

-- They were unacceptably insensitive toward women and the victims of rape and
bruta
l assault.

-- The President strongly support Secretary Perry's leadership in this matter, and t
he decision by
Admiral Macke to retire immediately.

-- With our close ally we will move beyond this to build upon our 50 years of
partne
rship that
has given both our peoples great opportunity for peace and prosperity.

APPROPRIATIONS BILL

Background: On November 17, the House and Senate reached agreement on a \$243 billion defense budget for next year which is \$6.9 billion more than requested by the Administration. It added funding for additional B-2 Stealth bombers and National Missile Defense, as well as accelerated procurement of warships, aircraft and other weapons systems not requested by the Administration. Congress sent the bill to the White House over the weekend; a statement regarding it has not yet been signed by the President.

The bill (H.R. 2126) also included language prohibiting privately funded abortions at U.S. military hospitals overseas, except in the case of rape, incest or if the mother's life was endangered if carried to term. (Prior to this, privately funded abortions were permitted at U.S. military hospitals overseas for rape, incest, or elective abortions; government funded abortions have always been permitted when the mother's life was endangered if carried to term -- and continue to be permitted under the new bill.)

Points

- ù Committed to maintaining best trained, best equipped, most ready armed forces in the world.
- ù Administration budget protects readiness and ensures we are prepared to defend American interests.
- ù Concerned by inclusion of almost \$7 billion we did not request, mostly for procurement and R&D programs, and with the bill's unfair treatment of overseas military personnel and their dependents with regard to the availability of safe abortion services.
- ù The President has previously said that absent a broader agreement with Congress that

at adequately funds
 crucial domestic programs in other appropriations bills, he will veto any defense
 ap
 propriations bill that
 adds extra billions for defense programs not in his request. Therefore, because
 ther
 e is no such
 agreement, the President will veto the Defense Appropriations Bill.

TUNA AND DOLPHINS

Q: What is the Administration's position on the Stevens-Breaux Bill, "The
 Internatio
 nal Dolphin
 Conservation Program Act?"

A: "The International Dolphin Conservation Program Act," which was introduced
 by Sen
 ator
 Stevens (R-Alaska) and Senator Breaux (D-LA) implements the Panama
 Declaration signe
 d by the United
 States and 11 other countries on October 4. This declaration strengthens the
 curren
 t international efforts
 to protect dolphins and the ecosystem as a whole in the Eastern Pacific Ocean.
 Othe
 r goals are to
 minimize the incidental catch of other species taken during tuna fishing
 operations,
 and to sustain fishery
 catches. Five major environmental groups have endorsed this landmark
 agreement. Th
 ey are Greenpeace,
 the Center for Marine Conservation, the Environmental Defense Fund, the
 National Wil
 dlife Federation,
 and the World Wildlife Fund.

The Administration supports the Panama Declaration and this bi-partisan
 legislative
 effort to secure long
 term protection of dolphins.

POW/MIA

Background: Defense DPMO (Defense POW/MIA Office) has a new work plan that sets new priorities for resolving cases. 567 have been declared "unrecoverable." The Hill is being briefed today. CNN and Washington Times have reported this.

ù This is in no way a legal finding nor is it a final declaration. Most cases remain open.

ù Is an evaluation based on review of and nature of the evidence. Most lost at sea or in way that suggests little or no chance of ever recovering remains.

ù A special panel must review this finding and make a final decision. That panel not yet formed. Refer to DPMO.

ù All USG efforts continue to repatriate remains and resolve discrepancies with the Vietnamese. This includes a trilateral commission with Laos to resolve cases there.

UNITED KINGDOM

Successor to NATO SYG Claes

-- Every member of NATO recognizes that the choice of the New Secretary General will have significant impact on the future of the Alliance at this critical juncture in its history.

-- As you know, it is a decision that requires the consensus among all 16 members of the alliance. We will continue to consult until we reach agreement with our allies on this very important matter.

Nigeria

-- The United States is outraged over the gravely flawed judicial process which led to the execution of Ken Saro-Wiwa and eight others.

-- These executions demonstrate to the world the Abacha regime's contempt for even the most

basic international norms and universal standards of human rights.

-- We have tightened our ban on visas, banned military sales and recalled our Ambassador. In addition, we are working with our allies and partners to find ways to put additional broad, international pressure on Nigeria and to move toward a democratic future and to respect the rights of its own citizens.

-- We are ruling nothing in and nothing out. But any sanction must have broad international support to be effective.

-- Pleased to hear that Ken Saro-Wiwa's brother, Owens Wiwa, escaped to Britain with help of Body Shop International (cosmetic retailing firm).

Russia/NIS

U.S. Stake in Relationship

-- U.S. has vital stake in engaging Russia and supporting reform there. Matters greatly to us if Russia dictatorship or democracy, centrally planned or market-oriented economy.

-- Long-term strategy. Transformation underway will be complex, protracted. Struggle going on between those who support reform and those who oppose or fear change.

-- Engagement producing important successes: reducing nuclear threat, over 50% of Russian GDP now from private sector, no Russian troops in Central Europe or Baltics.

-- President's productive meeting with Yeltsin at Hyde Park on October 23 underscored stability, inner strength of U.S.-Russia partnership.

Yeltsin

-- Have exchanged messages with Yeltsin recently on Dayton agreement and on need to

continue
working closely together to bolster peace in Bosnia.

-- Still in hospital but taking on increasingly active schedule..

December 17 Russian Elections to be Postponed?

-- President Yeltsin, Prime Minister Chernomyrdin and other Russian officials
have s
aid
parliamentary elections will go ahead as scheduled December 17. Regard these
electi
ons as important
step in Russia's continuing process of building democracy.

Chechnya

-- Have seen reports of attack against Chechen Prime Minister Zavgayev
(Moscow-backe
d).
Condemn attacks whose purpose is to further set back peace effort in Chechnya.

-- While formal Russian-Chechen talks suspended, sides have held informal
working me
etings,
and Moscow has reiterated its commitment to pursue negotiated settlement.

-- Dispute in Chechnya can only be resolved by negotiated settlement. Urge sides
to
work
together to implement military agreement and to find political solution.

Cuts in/Conditions on Bilateral Aid

-- Have differences with Russians on important areas. Working hard to resolve
these

-- But our assistance advances critical U.S. interests. It helps reformers succeed
in building a
democracy and a market economy, and it helps reduce nuclear threat to U.S. Not
in o
ur interest to cut
this assistance.

Perry-Grachev on Russia and Bosnia IFOR

-- Perry and Grachev agreed on November 8 on military framework under which
Russian

combat
forces will participate in a Bosnia peace implementation operation. Warmly
welcome
this understanding,
as we consider Russian participation in Bosnia peace implementation important
and de
sirable.

Russian Concerns about NATO Enlargement

-- Understand Russia has concerns about NATO enlargement. Intend to manage

of Europe as a whole.

-- Russia a key player in building stable, undivided Europe. Our goal is to
develop
NATO-Russia

-- President has discussed Bushehr reactor sale with Yeltsin. Vice President and

given Tehran's ambitions to acquire nuclear weapons capability.

NORTHERN IRELAND

Purpose of Trip

-- Visit will help celebrate 15 months of peace in Northern Ireland.

-- Cease-fire has made a real difference in people's lives -- for the first time in
a generation,
people in Northern Ireland can walk streets without fear of gun or bomb. Major

accomplishment of which they should be proud.

-- First visit of a U.S. President will help focus on that achievement and foster confidence in the peace process as well as trade and investment.

-- Will continue to support the twin track and all who take risks for peace.

U.S. Role

-- Our role is threefold.

--First, diplomacy -- have made clear we will support those on both sides who are willing to compromise for sake of peace.

--Second, modalities -- willing to have American participation in international commission to deal with disarmament issue, if it would be helpful. (Note: George Mitchell would likely be asked to head the commission.)

--Third, economic support -- for International Fund for Ireland and for increased private trade and investment in Northern Ireland and border counties.

-- U.S. has only one goal in Northern Ireland -- to support efforts to achieve a just and lasting peace based on consent.

-- Have reached out to both communities to support those willing to take risks for peace.

International Fund for Ireland

-- Believe the Fund is accomplishing its twin goals of promoting economic regeneration and reconciliation.

-- Fund has invested in over 3000 projects, in rural and urban areas and in both communities. It has invested over \$250 million, which leveraged over \$1 billion in total new investment. It has created over 20,000 permanent jobs.

Decommissioning

-- Parties observing cease-fire must take next step and begin to discuss serious decommissioning of weapons. Have made clear there must be movement on this issue.

Peace Talks

-- See merit in twin track proposal as way to move forward on decommissioning issue and on talks.

-- British and Irish governments are working hard to move the twin track forward and I hope they will be able to do so in the near future.

Elected Assembly

-- I think all ideas for moving forward should be discussed. Political track of twin track would offer opportunity to do this.

Major Stalling?

-- We believe Prime Minister Major has demonstrated that he is committed to achieving a lasting peace in Northern Ireland.

Senator Mitchell to Chair Commission on Decommissioning?

-- It's premature to discuss any U.S. Government or private citizen role until there is a formal decision to establish an international body to address the arms issue.

Explosives Found

-- No, I do not think that the discovery of the explosives in a van near the border bodes ill for the cease-fire. Understand suspects associated with splinter group opposed to cease-fire.

Results of White House Trade and Investment Conference

-- Number of significant results, including planned new investment by the private sector in high tech companies, a successful trade mission, and a program to bring 50 business

people
 e annually to
 work in U.S. companies to enhance their management skills and foster business
 ties.

Deportations

[NOTE: Irish-American groups mounting a campaign against deportation of
 former IRA
 members, some who are
 married to U.S. citizens and/or have U.S. children. U.S. law provides almost no
 fle
 xibility in prohibiting permanent
 residency to those linked to terrorism. We are looking into possible legislative so
 lutions.]

- Issue recently brought to our attention.
- Law provides little flexibility on many cases.
- Would not want to do anything that would be discriminatory vis-a-vis other
 groups
- Continuing to review the issue.

Adams Living Up to Commitments?

- We have urged Sinn Fein and the loyalists to begin serious discussion of
 decommis
 sioning issue.
- Believe twin track approach is vehicle to do that.

Expect British to Change Position on "Washington Three"?

[NOTE: Washington Three refers to the British insistence that the process of
 decom
 missioning weapons must begin before Sinn Fein can be invited to all-party
 political
 talks. It was part of a speech by Sir Patrick Mayhew in Washington in May and a
 p
 oint
 the Irish disagree with and we have never endorsed.]

- Our view is that twin track approach designed by British and Irish
 Governments of
 fers the best basis for making progress in peace process.
- If two governments launch twin track and establish international body to look

at
decommissioning issue, they would, I am sure, give serious consideration to its recommendations.

"Peace Talks Now" Rallies, Camps

[NOTE: It is possible that Sinn Fein will have rallies or set up camps to express support for calling talks without conditioning them on progress on decommissioning.
]

-- Recognize that Sinn Fein supporters expressing their view. Continue to think
bes
t way to get to talks is by launching twin track approach, and getting started on "
talks about talks", which will be necessary in any case.

Punishment Beatings

-- I will continue to condemn all such acts of violence and brutality. They have
no
place in a civilized society.

-- Agree that establishing trust between community and its police is important --
exp
ect that will be among issues to be discussed as people here come to grips with
sha
ping their future.

-- But I see no excuse for intimidating and beating people up for any reason.

Prisoners

-- Support decisions taken to increase confidence in the peace process, such as
rece
nt change in law that allowed release of over 80 prisoners from jail in Britain.

-- But such decision are the province of the governments involved.

Emergency Legislation

[NOTE: Emergency legislation that abridges rights of suspects for terrorist
crimes

,
including denying trial by jury, is still in force in Northern Ireland and was rece
ntly rolled
over by Parliament.]

-- Desirable for citizens of Northern Ireland to enjoy same civil liberties guarante
ed to citizens in

other parts of UK. As situation normalizes, hope the British Government can restore a more normal criminal justice system in Northern Ireland.

Springvale Campus

-- Decision whether to build new Springvale campus of University of Ulster up to go
vernment, since they will have to fund it. Understand they are conducting an economic appraisal of the project.

IRELAND

Ireland in Partnership for Peace?

-- For people of Ireland to decide.

-- Would point out that PFP is devoted to preservation of peace in Europe through trust and cooperation among members. Not a military alliance.

-- Ireland too benefits from the stable, peaceful Europe PFP is designed to foster. Membership could improve Ireland's ability to act in concert with other European countries in peacekeeping missions.

-- Would not compromise Ireland's neutrality. Not necessarily a step toward NATO membership.

Divorce Referendum

-- People of Ireland have voted on this. It was their decision. No comment on outcome. Mention victory for government's efforts?

EU Presidency

-- Look forward to working closely with Ireland during its EU Presidency in last half of 1996, when the Intergovernmental Conference of the EU will be underway.
