SUBJECT: SELECTION OF PRESIDENTIAL GUESTS FOR THE
UNITED KINGDOM / IRELAND TRIP

Purpose

To approve a list of recommended individuals to be invited to travel to Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland as *Presidential Guests* during your upcoming trip to this region.

Background

We plan to include a group of *Presidential Guests* in your upcoming trip. By including these individuals, we seek to help advance the goals of the trip abroad and highlight your role and commitment to the Irish peace process back home. The individuals will bring with them political, economic, and community development knowledge and experience as well as their commitment to peace in the region. As witnesses to your trip, they will be in an enhanced position to help support and communicate the importance of this peace process in key American communities.

We will invite 42 individuals to travel to Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. Invited guests will travel on a single aircraft and join you for certain elements of the trip. All guests will be asked to cover the cost of airfare and expenses. Numbers are limited due to aircraft size. We feel strongly that no more than one aircraft be dedicated for the transport of *Presidential Guests*.

Although this message of peace is one that reaches beyond a single ethnic group, our focus is to maximize our efforts to reach Irish America with the message. Irish Americans are the second largest ethnic group in the country. On average, 16% of the American population claims Irish heritage; ranging from 18.5% in the Northeast to 13% in the West. Although Irish Americans are scattered throughout the country, the highest concentrations remain in the Northeast and Midwest states of Massachusetts (26% of population), Pennsylvania (19%), New Jersey (18.3%), Ohio (17.5%), Illinois (16.3%), and New York (15.6%).

The list of recommended *Presidential Guests* for your review is representative of a commitment to peace in the region, with a strong emphasis on Irish America in key areas of the country mentioned above. We attempted to strike a balance from an Irish political perspective and from a religious perspective. The list is broken down into the following eight categories:

1.	Administration Officials	6 individuals
2.	Business	6 individuals
3.	Labor	4 individuals
4.	Elected Officials	6 individuals
5.	Organizations	6 individuals
6.	Religious	6 individuals
7.	Irish America	6 individuals
8.	The Arts	2 individuals

On the list attached, you will see that the religious category has only one Catholic. This is for the purpose of balance, since so many of the individuals in other categories are lay Catholics.

It also should be noted that in choosing individuals for the business category, our criteria included a commitment to peace in Ireland and/or Irish roots of the individual business person. Because this is not a trade mission, we were careful to make sure that individuals were included for a broader purpose than their interest in doing business in the region.

The recommendation process included input from all White House outreach offices, the NSC, as well as the Department of Commerce and Department of State. In the past week, a working group of representatives of these offices was put together to review and prioritize recommendations. The attached list has been agreed upon by that working group.

RECOMMENDATION

That you review and make any adjustments to the list of recommended *Presidential Guests* attached and approve the list so that invitations can be extended beginning Tuesday, November 7, 1995.

Ulster Business Leaders Expect Big Dividends From Clinton Visit

Belfast, Nov. 30 (Bloomberg) -- Northern Ireland business executives expect President Bill Clinton's visit to lead to a series of new investments in the province over the next few years, much of it from the United States.

More than a dozen announcements have been made in the last week alone, with companies ranging from French car parts maker Montupet to Boston-based software maker Stream International Inc. laying down plans for the creation of more than 2,500 jobs during the next decade.

New York-based International CableTel Inc. announced today it will spend \$1 billion during the next eight years connecting 80 percent of Northern Ireland's households with fiber-optic cable for telephones and televisions.

"People are keen to get their deal announced at a time when the world is watching," said Peter Long, a director of Mackie International, Northern Ireland's largest manufacturer. "People need some sort of visible manifestation that peace is here to stay."

Speaking at Mackie's West Belfast plant, which lies on the so-called "peace line" separating the Protestant Shankill Road from the Catholic Falls Road, Clinton encouraged employees and executives to continue to work for peace in Northern Ireland and promised it would lead to greater investment.

"With every extra day that the guns are still, business confidence grows stronger," Clinton told about 1,700 Mackie employees and their families. "Now is the time to sustain that momentum and lock in the gains of peace."

Although the barbed wire has come down and many of the dangers of living in Belfast during the last quarter-century of sectarian violence have almost vanished in the 17 months since the ceasefire, few new investments have been made.

Most business leaders don't expect any new contracts to be signed while the president is in Belfast either. The president's acknowledgement of Northern Ireland as a place to invest, however, should encourage existing businesses to expand and might help attract new business as well down the line.

A survey of foreign-owned businesses in Northern Ireland by business consultant Coopers & Lybrand said overseas companies plan to spend more than 270 million pounds (\$415 million) investing in expansion in Northern Ireland in the next few years.

'No Regrets'

"It is clear that for potential investors, the perception of Northern Ireland is more influential than the reality," said Stephen Kington, a partner in the Belfast office of Coopers. "But those who do invest come here for sound commercial reasons and have no regrets."

Currently, about 40 U.S. companies have operations in Northern Ireland, including Ford Motor Co., Seagate Technologies Inc. and Fruit of the Loom.

Clinton is traveling with a delegation of about 40 political, religious and business leaders, including the international head of St. Louis, Missouri-based Anheuser-Busch and the president of WMX Technologies.

"We're looking at the possibility of locating here," said Philip Rooney, president of WMX Technologies Inc., of Oak Brook, Illinois. "The ceasefire has changed the climate for business very much."

Rooney said WMX, which already owns a water equipment plant outside of Dublin, made a bid to the Belfast City Council two weeks ago for a waste complex, energy and landfill operation it said could create up to 100 jobs.

"It's potentially several hundred million dollars," he said. "The proposals went in Nov. 17, so we're hopeful."

Stephen J. Burrows, President and Chief Operating Officer of Anheuser-Busch International, said: "Ireland, and Northern Ireland in particular, is a place where Budweiser is very popular. In fact, Northern Ireland has our largest share for Budweiser outside of the United States."

"The road ahead depends not only on the peace process, but on all factors -- education, business, labor working together," Burrows said.

A lesson for Americans in Clinton's peacemaking style

President Clinton's recent trip to Ireland is a mystery to me. How could it mean such different things abroad and at home? I was present for two Clinton speeches in Derry, and I arrived in Dublin shortly after he addressed a throng at the gate of Trinity College. Everyone I spoke to said Clinton had rescued the peace. Protestant and Catholic, North and South, Nationalist and Unionist – all agreed with the Derry woman who told me, "President Clinton has given us a future."

But on returning to the United States, I learned that, though there had been extensive news coverage, the truly momentous quality of Clinton's intervention in Ireland had not been conveyed. It was as if the television images of flag-waving crowds, children presenting flowers and bedecked mayors offering civic symbols were snapshots of an unsophisticated mass adulation of a world celebrity. Clinton might as well have been Mick Jagger – or the pope.

But it was not like that. If the violence that has rocked Northern Ireland over the last 27 years had happened in the United States, the numbers of dead, adjusted for relative populations, would be counted in the hundreds of thousands. Most families in Northern Ireland have felt the horror of the killing directly. The Troubles have been every bit as traumatic as the American Civil War was. It is a comparison Bill Clinton made in Guildhall Square. He dared to say that both parties in the American conflict were guilty, and both needed to seek and extend forgiveness. Even now that wound is not healed.

The Irish had reason to be cynical about such an outsider's judgment, yet they were utterly silent as this man from the American South challenged them, despite all that they had suffered and all that they had done, to turn to-

ward each other with open hearts. Forgiveness, Clinton implied, is the only way to peace. I could not help but think how quickly such language would be dismissed at home, even as I sensed how welcome it was to these people. When they gave him an ovation, it seemed like a commitment to do exactly as he had asked.

In the United States, Clinton is derided as, in Gary Wills' memorable phrase, "an omnidirectional placator." I myself have criticized him in such ways. Yet in Ireland his readiness to take seriously the views of everyone meant that in the morning of the day I saw him he could meet with Gerry Adams of Sinn Féin and in the evening with

In Ireland, he exercised the leadership of communication.

die-hard unionist Ian Paisley – and each could come away feeling he had been heard.

In Ireland, Clinton exercised a kind of leadership in which we have little experience; not the leadership of domination, but of communication. His message that the illusion of group superiority must be given up was conveyed by the simple way in which he claimed no superiority for himself. That is the meaning of his method – that the truth comes not when one individual or group imposes it on another, but when parties risk an open-ended relationship of dialogue and negotiation.

I believe it is not too much to say that everyone who experienced Clinton's presence in Ireland was changed by it. His presence itself seemed an instance of a new possibility. For the Irish, that change translated into a renewed

hope for peace. But for all of us, it meant a dramatic redefinition of how political power can be exercised.

These reflections have relevance this week as Clinton travels to Paris for the signing of the Bosnia peace accords. Polls suggest that most US citizens are skeptical of his plan to send troops to enforce the peace, understandably perhaps. Just as images from Ireland strike detached Americans as TV flashes – whether it is pubs being blown up or thousands waving joyously at the president – images from Bosnia have seemed even more unreal. And why not? How could we possibly grasp the reality of an incipient new holocaust in the heart of Europe?

Yet if the number of Balkans dead were adjusted for population to the United States, the tally would be many millions. Every one of us would have lost someone we love. In that case the casualty figures would not be figments. The knowledge of what was happening would compel us to do something to stop it. The people of Bosnia do not wonder why the NATO force is coming. They know, and on all sides they welcome it.

American skepticism protects our reckless individualism. President Clinton is asking us to yield both in favor of a new act of political imagination, to see how the fate even of a distant people is tied to ours. And he is asking Serbs, Croats and Bosnians to reimagine their situation, too. If Americans must reject the illusion that we are a group apart, fulfilling our destiny alone, the people of the Balkans must reject the illusion that one group can fulfill its destiny by subjugating another.

These are lessons the Irish are already learning. We could take a clue from their clear, unambiguous reaction. For all the risks, President Clinton is up to something new, serious and very hopeful.
