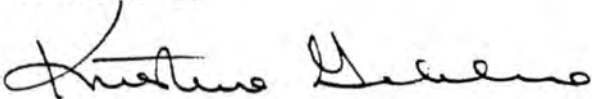

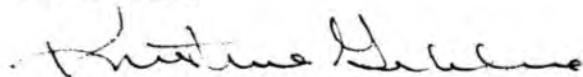
Thank you for taking the time to share your views on the HIV epidemic.

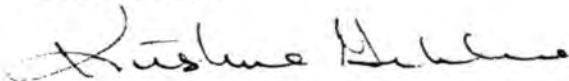
Thank you for taking time to write and voice your concerns about the AIDS epidemic.

HIV reporting and partner notification are very complex issues. It is important that individuals infected with HIV are linked quickly to care, both to stay healthy and to understand what behavior needs to be practiced to avoid spreading the virus further. It is my goal that our national program responding to HIV be built on the best of current science, and the best understanding we have of human behavior. The specifics will vary but this is the same approach used in previous decades of responding to the other diseases you mentioned.

In all cases, the health profession's commitment has included concern for the privacy of individuals, and this should be continued for HIV infection and AIDS.

Dear Ms. Gibbie,

I am a Registered Nurse who has watched the evolution of the AIDS Crisis with horror, sadness and disbelief. This disease is out of control and continues to take many lives because of mismanagement.

Under the law, making AIDS a handicap has further tied the hands of many individuals and agencies by protecting these individuals to the point of allowing the spread of the disease without any regard for the protection of the innocent. Ninety children/infants across the nation (known cases) are dying from AIDS today and the CDC does not know how they contracted the disease.

Historically, our nation has been exposed to many diseases ie: Polio, Tuberculosis and Diphtheria to name a few. These diseases were not "handicaps." Adequate health care was provided to the ill while protecting and safeguarding those who were not ill. These diseases were not allowed to be spread and have almost been eradicated.

Do you know that cases of Syphilis, Gonorrhea, Tuberculosis and even Measles are reportable to the Health Department? According to the MMWR, known AIDS cases represent only 10% of the infected HIV positive individuals yet many states do not require HIV infection to be reported.

In Florida, as well as many other states, if an individual is HIV positive but has not been diagnosed as AIDS (CDC definition) the Health Department does not want the information.

When Syphilis or other sexually transmitted diseases are reported to the Health Department, the sexual partners of the infected individual are notified so that they can seek medical advice. When an AIDS diagnosed individual is reported there is no partner notification. Does this seem reasonable?

We (the United States) are allowing the AIDS epidemic to grow.

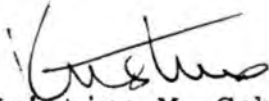

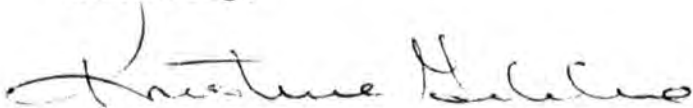

The Los Angeles County Commission on HIV and AIDS congratulates you on your recent Presidential appointment as the National AIDS Policy Coordinator and offers to assist your office in any way that will help you succeed in your most important mission. We are certain that with your extensive public health experience and national perspective on the epidemic, you will serve the country well as our National AIDS Policy Coordinator.

Since our inception in 1987, the Commission has enjoyed a close relationship with the Public Health Service's National AIDS Program Office through the active participation as a Commissioner by the PHS Regional AIDS Coordinator. We would emphasize that your office has a valuable resource with the Regional AIDS Coordinators, who by their participation in many state and local governmental and private AIDS commissions, task forces, and forums are able to translate national policy for effective local implementation and to provide a cross-fertilization of ideas and information among communities.

Specifically, Capt. Alan Harris, the PHS Region IX AIDS Coordinator, has been our Commission's direct link with the Public Health Service and has promoted the integration of our local AIDS programs with PHS-funded projects from NIH, CDC and HRSA. From 1990 until this spring, he was a member of the Los Angeles HIV Health Services Planning Council, and he continues to serve on a number of regional and state AIDS advisory bodies, from which vantages he provides our Commission and other communities with invaluable perspectives. He has identified changes in local and national HIV epidemiology, and has encouraged our endorsement of critical HIV intervention strategies including bleach/condom distribution for street-based IDUs, sterile needle exchange with referral to dedicated substance abuse treatment, County employee AIDS in the workplace education, and regionalized care networks linked to HIV/AIDS clinical research and training centers. He promoted the idea that our HIV Planning Council charter include the authority to review and recommend local, state, and Federal HIV prevention program funding in addition to HIV health services programs.

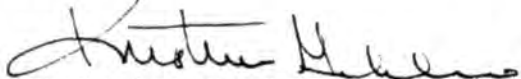

HHS Secretary Donna E. Shalala today hailed President Clinton's nomination of Harold Eliot Varmus, M.D., to be ~~director~~ of the National Institutes of Health.

"We are delighted that Dr. Varmus will be our new NIH director --the first NIH director to have won a Nobel prize--because he is one of the world's most eminent and most honored biomedical scientists," Secretary Shalala said. "He has been working at the cutting edge of modern cell and molecular biology, and he has had an active relationship with NIH for ^{as} (about) 30 years. Dr. Varmus ~~has been~~ an intramural scientist, grantee and public advisor." +

Dr. Varmus, 53, is a professor of microbiology, biochemistry, and biophysics, and the American Cancer Society Professor of Molecular Virology at the University of California, San Francisco. He is a leader in the study of cancer-causing genes called "oncogenes," and an internationally recognized authority on retroviruses, the viruses that cause AIDS and many cancers in animals.

Dr. Varmus and his UCSF colleague J. Michael Bishop, M.D., shared a Nobel prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1989 for demonstrating that cancer genes (oncogenes) can arise from normal cellular genes, called proto-oncogenes. While investigating a

retroviral gene, v-src, responsible for causing tumors in chickens, they discovered a non-viral src gene, very similar to v-src, present in the normal cells of birds and mammals.

In recent years, his work has assumed special relevance to AIDS, through a focus on biochemical properties of HIV, and to breast cancer, through investigation of mammary tumors in mice. His research activities are currently supported by grants from the NIH; by his professorship from the American Cancer Society; and by the Melanie Bronfman Award for Breast Cancer.

Dr. Varmus is chairman of the Board of Biology for the National Research Council, an advisor to the Congressional Caucus for Biomedical Research, a member of the Joint Steering Committee for Public Policy of Biomedical Societies, and co-chairman of the New Delegation for Biomedical Research, a coalition of leaders in the biomedical community. He directed "Winding Your Way Through DNA," a popular public symposium on recombinant DNA staged by UCSF last fall.

The author or editor of four books and nearly 300 scientific papers, Varmus has been elected to the Institute of Medicine, the National Academy of Sciences, and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. His most recent book, "Genes and the Biology of Cancer," intended for a general audience, was co-authored with Robert Weinberg for the Scientific American Library. He is an editor for several professional journals, and has served on a variety of review

and advisory boards for government, biotechnology firms, and pharmaceutical companies. Most recently, he was a member of the Institute of Medicine committee that advised the Department of Defense on the use of \$210 million allocated by Congress last year for breast cancer research. In 1986, he chaired the subcommittee of the International Committee on the Taxonomy of Viruses that gave the AIDS virus its name HIV.

Dr. Varmus was born Dec. 18, 1939. He attended public schools in Freeport, Long Island, N.Y. His father (Frank) practiced family medicine, and his mother (Beatrice) was a psychiatric social worker. He is a graduate of Amherst College (B.A. 1961), where he majored in English literature; Harvard University (M.A. in English literature, 1962); and Columbia University (M.D. 1966). While at medical school, he worked for three months at a mission hospital in northern India.

After an internship and residency in internal medicine at Columbia-Presbyterian Hospital in New York, Varmus served as a clinical associate for two years at the National Institute of Arthritis and Metabolic Diseases in Bethesda, Md., where he did his first scientific work in the area of bacterial genetics with Ira Pastan, M.D.

Dr. Varmus came to UCSF as a postdoctoral fellow in Bishop's laboratory in 1970, initiating a longstanding collaboration to study tumor viruses, and was appointed to the faculty later that year. He became a full professor in 1979 and an American Cancer Society Research Professor in 1984.

Dr. Varmus lives in San Francisco with his wife, Constance Casey, a book critic for the Los Angeles Times. They have two sons -- Jacob, who studies at the University of Iowa, and Christopher, who attends high school in San Francisco.

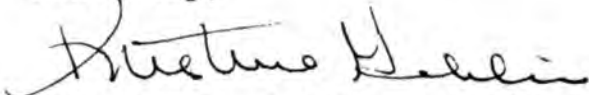

Carlton H. 'Sonny' Lee, AIDS Official, Dies at 35

Carlton H. "Sonny" Lee, 35, chief liaison officer of the National Commission on AIDS, died July 30 at a hospital in Pittsburgh of acute toxic injury caused by the experimental drug fialuridine. He was undergoing experimental treatment for chronic hepatitis B.

Mr. Lee is believed to have contracted the ailment while serving in the Peace Corps in Africa. He was one of several hepatitis patients who died this summer while participating in a clinical trial conducted through the National Institutes of Health.

A Washington resident off and on for 14 years, Mr. Lee had been with the national commission since 1989, serving as adviser to the commission's chair and coordinator of legislative activities. Earlier in his career, he was a legislative aide to Rep. Charles W. Stenholm (D-Tex.) and congressional liaison for the International Development Institute and the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

Mr. Lee served with the Peace Corps in Sierra Leone in the mid-1980s, managing tree nurseries in the northern province. He was congressional liaison for the Human Rights Campaign Fund from 1987 to 1989, working on legislation to fund AIDS research and on civil rights measures for people with AIDS.

Mr. Lee was a graduate of American University and a member of the Pi Sigma Alpha political science honorary society.

Survivors include his parents, Carlton and Joy Lee of Snyder, Tex.; three sisters, Annette Truluck of Charleston, S.C., Darlene Kriewald of Olden, Tex., and Susan Humble of Levelland, Tex.; and his grandmother, Nellie Phillips of Old-

Carlton H. Lee Jr., 35, AIDS Panel Lobbyist

Carlton H. Lee Jr., the Congressional liaison officer for the National Commission on AIDS and a key figure in Congressional approval of civil rights legislation affecting people with AIDS and other disabilities, died on Friday at Presbyterian University Hospital in Pittsburgh. He was 35 years old.

Mr. Lee, who was known by his friends as Sonny, contracted hepatitis B when he served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Sierra Leone, West Africa, from 1981 to 1986. The commission said he had a toxic reaction to an experimental drug that he was taking as part of a clinical trial by the National Institutes of Health.

From 1987 to 1989, Mr. Lee was a lobbyist for the Human Rights Campaign Fund. Since 1989, Mr. Lee was the chief lobbyist for the National Commission on AIDS, where he also served as an adviser to the commission's chairwoman, Dr. June E. Osborn.

Mr. Lee grew up in Snyder, Tex., and was a graduate of American University in Washington.

He is survived by his parents, Carlton and Joy Lee of Snyder, and three sisters, Annette Truluck of Charleston, S.C.; Darlene Kriewald of Austin, Tex., and Susan Humble of Levelland, Tex.

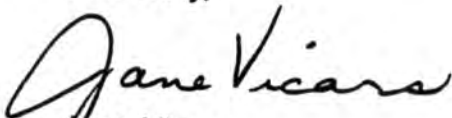
Dear Mr. Deary:

THE AUTHOR

Mary Jane Haugen, QMRP, Vice President, Director of Programming is a native of Magnolia, Arkansas with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Southern Arkansas University.

Ms. Haugen's first position as a graduate from SAU in 1978 was with the Arkansas Legislative Council under the Bill Clinton administration. Ms. Haugen was employed by the State of Arkansas and University of Arkansas at Fayetteville prior to moving to Houston, Texas in 1982.

Ms. Haugen became active in coordinating with San Antonio Independent School District the transition of students from high school to an independent living setting in the community. This relationship reached the level that the San Antonio Independent School District requested to purchase these programs for their 96 school district.

For the last few months you have been receiving copies of our correspondence with Dr. James Curran of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention regarding the External Review Process. It has been our goal to communicate with Jim directly and to simultaneously provide you with information regarding the perception of the process by those communities which will be most greatly affected by your work, and by their advocates. To ensure the value of our input to the process, we have solicited the ideas, concerns, and insights of community members and representatives. It is from this perspective that we have offered our ideas and assistance.

Our correspondence has raised many concerns, which we hope and encourage each co-chair to consider in the coming weeks. Chief among our concerns has been: 1) that the External Review process efficiently and effectively involves the broad array of diverse community input, at every stage, that rightfully should be a part of this process; 2) that the substance and scope of the mandates of the External Review committees be clear and thoroughly communicated to committee members, invited commentators, and the general public; 3) that there is ample opportunity for thorough public input into a draft report (or reports) to be issued by the committees, and, 4) that the content, form, and function of the final reports facilitate their ultimate use and prompt implementation.

We understand from speaking with Jim that, at the most recent "co-chairs meeting," he disseminated copies of our correspondence and provided opportunity for discussion of some of the concerns expressed therein. We are writing to you directly to offer our ongoing assistance.

Specifically, we would like to suggest individuals and organizations from whom each committee may wish to specifically solicit testimony, reports, or additional input prior to the finalizing of its report. At a minimum, we expect to provide a list of individuals and organizations to whom we strongly recommend a draft report be sent and from whom extensive comments should be solicited. By so doing, we would like to help ensure that each committee has the greatest opportunity to hear from those who will be most affected by the process in which you currently are engaged.

It is only with this type of contribution that the reports and proposals that grow out of the External Review process will be considered credible in the communities that will be called upon to assist in their implementation. We encourage you to contact us about this -- and about all of the issues we have raised in our correspondence.

1992 Survey Report

91 Medicines in Testing; 3 Approved This Past Year

Pharmaceutical industry research and development to find medicines to treat, prevent, and cure AIDS and AIDS-related conditions has never been stronger, according to a new survey by the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association. Three new medicines have been approved since our last survey a year ago; another 11 medicines are awaiting approval at the Food and Drug Administration. In all, 17 medicines have been approved for AIDS and AIDS-related conditions; 95 research projects, involving 91 separate medicines, are under way.

With the dramatic increase in cases of AIDS in women, as well as its continued incidence in children, this PMA survey has identified, for the first time, clinical trials that focus on meeting the specific requirements of women and children with AIDS. The survey results show that there are 50 medicines in development that include women in the human clinical trials and 13 medicines that include children.

As of this report, there are 17 approved therapies for AIDS and AIDS-related conditions on the market, compared with one when we conducted our first survey in 1987. Three new medicines have been approved for use since our last report a year ago: one for HIV infection, the other two for opportunistic infections. HIVID (zalcitabine) from Hoffmann-La Roche is approved in combination with Retrovir for treatment of adult patients with advanced HIV infection who have demonstrated significant clinical or immunologic deterioration; Nizoral (ketoconazole, oral solution) and Sporanox Capsules (itraconazole), both from Janssen Pharmaceutica, are approved for specific types of fungal infections. Our survey results also show that 41 medicines—almost half of those in

testing—are in development to treat opportunistic infections, which account for 90 percent of AIDS-related deaths.

There are now 91 AIDS medicines and vaccines in development, up from 88 in testing last year. These medicines are being developed by 66 pharmaceutical companies. Of the 91 medicines in development, 11 are at the FDA for review—more than double last year's number.

The research-based pharmaceutical industry's efforts so far have led to progress against this devastating disease. New medicines have made

some AIDS-related infections more controllable, which has increased life expectancy. And, in many cases, the quality of life for people with AIDS has been improved. We hope this report will be useful to all of those working in the critically important area of striving to find ways to cure and, one day, prevent AIDS.
