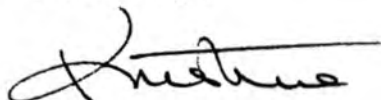

My son, Tom, died of AIDS in 1986. I feel that President Reagan and President Bush really failed PLWA by their ineptness and indifference to the problem and hope that President Clinton will make a difference.

When I retired I knew that I wanted to be a part of educating young people about AIDS. I have organized a support group in our area....and it has been growing at an alarming rate for this part of rural New York. I have written a book about my family's experience in our community and am concerned about the growing numbers of cases....there is no hamlet or town in northern New York that has not been touched by AIDS.

For the past four years I have been traveling in our area talking to young people and educators about AIDS and am concerned that the statistics are still rising.

You are the AIDS Coordinator for the Country...but what exactly does that mean? What effect will your appointment have on our area? Is there any way that we who have gone through this experience can put that experience to use on a greater level...can we help you...and how?

I am concerned that we are not doing enough and look to you as the AIDS Coordinator to be a part of the education process that will make it possible for AIDS to start a downward trend.

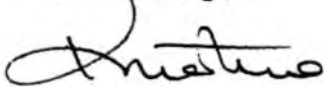

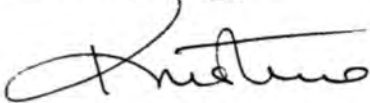

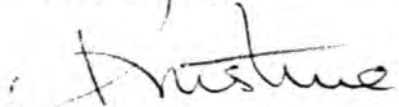

You got off to such a super beginning through the media that I felt compelled to share this salute and wish you well. Those of us who have known you and worked with you are confident that great things will happen with your leadership.

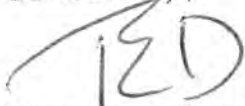

Create a 2- 3 minute videotape and a one pager for posting weekly for schools,games arcades,bowling alleys, social clubs, M-TV, anywhere teen age kids hang out.

Available on E Mail type applications and/or via weekly UPS delivery. Multiple,flexible modes.

Using the CDCP weekly mortality/morbidity reports as a base, report a weekly box score on new cases, by age groups. Each week to feature a different hard fact:

- Morbidity/mortality
- Age trends
- Demography
- Relationship to other diseases
- Historical
- Gender
- Sexual orientation
- Demography of condom use
- etc

Do not get cutesy with this, or try to mock or match the rap subculture; keep it simple,straight,scientific, but interpret with a different visual each week . (Data conversion to lively graphics can be readily done with an IBM 6000,,Model 560 UNIX or its equivalent.That computer will provide video animations and visual representation of computer data.)

Consider using celebrities, whether from B-ball or rap. But do not joke around or preach. Just present facts, week after week.

This treats teens as grown ups; gives them unvarnished data; lets them make up their minds; but uses familiar ad agency tools to do it...where they work,play,and live.

Consider running contests for AIDS of the Week.

AIDS Czar's Plan: People Talking With Each Other

Kristine Gebbie will try to develop a more effective national prevention strategy. States would create their own programs.

WASHINGTON—Newly selected federal AIDS coordinator Kristine M. Gebbie's reaction a dozen years ago to the first cases of the mysterious disease that was killing gay men in Los Angeles was like that of most Americans.

"I remember thinking, gee, those folks in California have a problem," she recalled. "It took a few months before it sank into my thick head that we have a problem."

Even at that, Gebbie probably was ahead of the national curve. As an Oregon state health official, she soon became involved in tracking the epidemic.

When President Clinton announced in June that she was his choice for the new post, she was widely known in the AIDS community.

Her selection won considerable praise from public health leaders, lawmakers and AIDS lobbying and service organizations. But she also had to fend off attacks from activists who question whether she is emotionally and psychologically strong enough for the job.

"We needed 'Jurassic Park' and we got 'Sleepless in Seattle,'" says Larry Kramer, who founded the gay activist group ACT UP.

"My gut reaction tells me she's a very nice person, and the last thing we need for this job is a very nice person," Kramer continued. "We need Stormin' Norman. Someone who can knock heads together."

To that, Gebbie had a ready response: "I may not have as much flash as some people would like, but I can talk to people, and I can get them to talk to each other."

"I think some people expect the person in this job to be... someone preaching at politicians about how to do it right. [But] I don't think that's as effective as getting people into rooms together to talk. That's not to say I won't speak out, however."

The post, created by Clinton in keeping with his campaign promise to do more to stem the AIDS epidemic, seeks to coordinate the activities of the many

federal agencies involved in the various aspects of AIDS—from the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to the Public Health Service and the National Institutes of Health.

Gebbie, 50, will try to develop a more effective national prevention strategy, in which the federal government offers more resources and technical assistance to states and communities to create their own programs. Information should reach everyone, particularly young people before they hit adolescence, she says.

"Even kids in kindergarten hear things," she says. "You don't talk to them about safe sex, but you teach them that their body is something to take care of, and that viruses can mess it up. I believe very strongly that AIDS education has to be part of a comprehensive health education program, not something separate."

A registered nurse and epidemiologist who once taught at UCLA, Gebbie was chief health officer for the state of Oregon when AIDS first showed its deadly presence. She later ran health programs for the state of Washington.

Although Oregon initially had no large caseload, Gebbie became involved in trying to sort through the ramifications of the accelerating epidemic.

She was head of the AIDS task force for the American Assn. of State and Territorial Health Officials, and later was asked to join the AIDS commission established by the Ronald Reagan Administration. Having been critical of Reagan's response to the epidemic, she was dubious at first but finally agreed to serve after being wooed by its chairman, Adm. James D. Watkins.

"I picked her and she was a great asset to me, especially since we were outnumbered," Watkins says, referring to the commission's many ultra-conservative members. "She was very tough when there was nonsense coming out of some of the other commissioners. She could carry the day."

Gebbie is the divorced mother of three children, ages 22, 19 and 17. Born in Sioux City, Iowa, she grew up in Miles City, Mont., and Albuquerque, N.M. She hikes, walks three to four miles a day,

knits and reads detective novels in her spare time. There is little spare time these days, however, because she also is trying to finish her doctoral dissertation, a case study of changes in Washington state statutes and "how and why state governments reorganize themselves."

Gebbie has been an adviser to the Administration's health care reform process, and believes that AIDS is a focal point for many elements of the national debate—and a virtual lens in which society itself can be viewed.

"It leads you into just about every complicated human question that you have to deal with," she says. "What does human sexuality mean? What is the balance point between an individual's rights and responsibilities and a community's rights and responsibilities? What is our responsibility to people at the end of life? At what point do we accept the reality of death and not fight it with everything we have?"

"AIDS does not just involve the health care system—it overlaps into the business and political world as well. I find that kind of complex puzzle challenging."

For Now, Education Is the Key Weapon

New report on AIDS mortality points up need for teaching the young about this scourge

In the decade since acquired immune deficiency syndrome grew from an isolated and mysterious affliction into an international epidemic, deadly milestone after deadly milestone has come, passed and too often been forgotten. But with the disclosure that AIDS has become the leading killer of young men in five states, including California, the nation once again is reminded of the painful facts: that even if the AIDS scourge could be eradicated today, the human toll from the disease would continue to rise indefinitely.

The new study, published last week in the *Journal of the American Medical Assn.*, reveals that in 1990 deaths from AIDS-related conditions outpaced those from cancer, heart disease and accidents in men between the ages of 25 and 44 in California, Florida, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York. AIDS was also the primary cause of death for males in that age group in 64 cities with

populations greater than 100,000, including six here in Southern California.

With the lag between exposure and infection, it's only a matter of time before more states and cities join that horrible list, now almost three years old.

Thus far AIDS has killed more than 182,000 people in the United States. And worldwide, gloomy reports by the World Health Organization predict that the number of people infected with the AIDS virus will explode from 14 million today to more than 30 million by the end of the decade.

With little hope of any medical breakthrough presented at the ninth International AIDS Conference in Berlin two weeks ago, prospects for curing the disease seem remote in the near term.

All this suggests that now, as before, the best means of slowing the spread of this dreaded plague lie in aggressive and intensive prevention. That entails, at the very least, frank and open discussions about sex before youngsters become sexually active. The young and the nonchalant must be reached. Whether it's done at home, at school, through informational videos or rap music isn't important—as long as it is done.

AIDS Top Killer of Young Men in California

AIDS has surpassed cancer, heart disease and accidents to become the leading cause of death among men ages 25 to 44 in California, accounting for 24% of all such deaths in 1990, according to the first systematic study of its kind by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

AIDS and related infections were also the leading cause of young male deaths in 64 U.S. cities, including 11 in California, according to the report published today in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*. Among women of the same age, AIDS was the main cause of death in nine cities, all on the East Coast.

San Francisco had the highest rate of AIDS-related deaths in the nation for men of the age group studied—61%. Other California cities that ranked high include Pasadena, 38%; San Diego, 37%; Long Beach, 36%; Berkeley, 34%; Los Angeles, 31%; Glendale, 30%; and Fullerton, 26%.

Although the proportion of deaths among young adults caused by AIDS is high, the researchers cautioned that deaths among young adults accounted for only 7% of all deaths in 1990, the latest year for which detailed mortality data is available.

Nonetheless, people ages 25 to 44 now constitute 54% of the U.S. civilian labor force, so their loss is "disproportionately disruptive" to U.S. society. "Such premature deaths result in the loss of many productive years of life and deprive young children of their parents," they wrote.

In an editorial accompanying the study, Dr. Sten H. Vermund of the National Institutes of Health wrote that the AIDS epidemic still shows no sign of behaving like past epidemics, which typically peak early and then taper off.

"Unfortunately, no such HIV infection mortality peak is evident; death rates continue to rise inexorably. . . . The health crisis of

AIDS/HIV is of immense significance in the United States and will remain so beyond this millennium."

California ranked third in the nation in the share of deaths among men 25 to 44 that is attributable to AIDS and related diseases. Only New York (29%) and New Jersey (28%) had a higher rate in 1990.

AIDS was not the leading cause of death for women in any state, and caused only 2.7% of deaths among California women in the 25-to-44 age group.

Nationally, AIDS caused 16.5% of all deaths among males ages 25 to 44 in 1990, second only to accidental injuries and up from 14% the previous year. For young women, the percentages were 4.8% in 1990 and 4% in 1989.

Race played a crucial role in the death rate for young women, the study found. AIDS was only the ninth leading cause of death for young Anglo women, but was the third-leading cause of death for blacks and Latinas. The high rate of AIDS deaths among such women, Dr. Richard M. Selik and his colleagues at the Centers for Disease Control said, reflects the high rate of intravenous drug abuse in Eastern cities.

For young men, in contrast, the leading method of transmission is homosexual relations, so the deaths are distributed in a more even pattern throughout the country, the researchers said. The disparity in death rates between men and women also reflects the higher incidence

of AIDS in men than in women.

For the year and age group covered by the study, the total number of AIDS deaths was 16,717 men and 2,031 women. A total of 182,275 deaths in the United States have been attributed to AIDS since federal officials began tracking the disease in 1981.

In California, there have been about 59,000 AIDS cases to date and 37,000 deaths, according to epidemiologist Michael Hughes of the Department of Health Services. The department had predicted about 10,000 new cases this year, but there have already been 11,000, he said—largely because of a broadening of the definition of AIDS that took effect at the beginning of 1993.

Hughes noted that the rate of AIDS deaths is relatively low among young women here because—unlike New York, New Jersey and Florida—California has a low incidence of HIV infection among intravenous drug abusers. But he added that there are pockets of high HIV incidence among drug abusers, such as the East Bay region near San Francisco, and the infection of young women can be expected to grow as a result.

The high rate of deaths in cities such as Fullerton, Pasadena and Glendale, he said, probably is a simple reflection of the fact that they are part of metropolitan Los Angeles.

President's Visit Thrills Valley Crowd

VAN NUYS—Going to see the President during one of the stops on his economic-plan traveling show is a lot like going on one of the big thrill rides at Magic Mountain.

The wait is long, the crowd is sweaty, and the payoff is brief but potent.

Hundreds of Valley residents were more than willing to take that ride Tuesday when Bill Clinton made a stop at Valley College in Van Nuys to make a short speech and answer questions from a pre-selected group of students.

The non-selected majority had questions they wanted answered too. Not surprisingly, a favorite topic was economic support for students.

"If I could ask him a question it would be about student loans," said Vilma Mejia, 18, a first-year sociology student living in Burbank. Mejia had arrived at 7 a.m. to get a good viewing spot for the speech, scheduled to begin at 11:30 a.m.

She clutched a small camera and an algebra textbook.

"Right now, the tuition is about \$120 a semester for a full-time student," she said. "They are talking about it going much higher. Maybe triple."

"I would not be able to afford that."

A group of second-year nursing students, standing nearby in the blue and white uniforms they wear daily to classes, feared drastic cutbacks. "We were lucky that when we started they accepted 48 people into our class," said Manfred Rantner, 32, who lives in Simi Valley. "Next year, they will only take 24."

When Rantner and his colleagues graduate, they will be registered nurses entering a health care system that Clinton hopes to overhaul.

"He might have a national health program," said Heidi Moussavi, 25, of Van Nuys. "But if students can't go to school, who is he going to have to staff it?"

Despite the concerns, the vast majority of people in the crowd seemed to be solid Clinton supporters. They were less happy with the Secret Service, who ruined the plans of the early arrivals by suddenly moving the crowd into a narrow corridor out of sight of the courtyard.

Watching the area being swept by security dogs was of only limited entertainment value. The crowd grew restless. Some who had seemingly gotten a lot of practice at general admission concerts successfully jockeyed for improved positions.

Graphic designer Robert Birch had a large, rolled-up canvas banner over his shoulder that he planned to unfurl during the President's speech. Birch, who lives in Northridge, had a snapshot to show that the banner said, "AIDS-AUSCHWITZ."

He knew he probably wouldn't get close enough for the President or the TV cameras to see the banner. "Maybe not, but if the students see it and think about AIDS and that enough is not being done about it, that's enough," he said.

Monty Patana, 48, a native of Thailand who lives in Glendale, would have liked to have talked to the President about foreign policy.

"I would say to him, 'If a country is not democratic, do not help that country,'" said Patana, who is studying biology. "In my country, it is a soldier who is in power. There should be no military aid."

In this country, the people in power get to bypass the crowd on their way to a good seat to see the President. Mayor Tom Bradley and mayoral candidate Michael Woo waved to the crowd as they passed. Finally, about two hours after

the crowd was pushed back, the Secret Service started to allow people to come forward, one by one, through a metal detector. But they were allowed no closer than about 100 feet from where the President would be standing.

Birch was not allowed to bring his huge AIDS banner. Some Richard Riordan supporters were forced to take the wood supports out of the signs that they had planned to hold up.

After several minutes, one Secret Service member hinted that if the crowd was on its best behavior, it would be allowed closer. But after a few dozen people were finally let through to join the VIPs, the gate was closed again.

All those left behind had to be content with a view of the back of the President, far away.

But Clinton knew they were there.

Like any performer who knows the value of working the cheap seats, he teased the crowd behind the gates by occasionally turning and flashing his smile. Each time he did, there was a genuine stirring of excitement.

As much as they cared about issues, those in the crowd could hear him talk any night of the week on the TV news. The idea Tuesday was to get a good, in-person look at the ultimate celebrity. And maybe even a picture.

But the crowd got more.

After several questions from the invited group, Clinton told them that he couldn't answer any more because he had to go shake hands in the crowd. He headed over and the crowd went nuts.

Those in front braced themselves for the inevitable push from the back. Some in back passed cameras forward so that people they didn't even know could get close-up pictures for them.

Surrounded by the Secret Service, Clinton reached out to the group, touching as many outstretched hands as possible. People who had only a few minutes before been hot and complaining now looked flush with excitement.

But only a few minutes after he was gone, the crowd came back to order and began to disperse.

One man tried to start a chant, shouting over and over with great urgency, "96! 96! 96! 96!" But no one joined in.

Finally as the man stopped to catch his breath, someone in the crowd said, "Let's just get through '93, first."

On behalf of all the members of the National Hispanic/Latino AIDS Coalition, a group of national, regional and local organizations and individuals fighting against HIV and AIDS in Hispanic/Latino communities, we are submitting to you our comprehensive National Hispanic/Latino AIDS Agenda.

This unique document is the result of the first major unified effort to address the lack of effective and equitable HIV/AIDS policies, programs and funding for our communities. We are committed to providing leadership in advocating for change, because we believe that we can only respond effectively to the most challenging health crisis facing our communities by working together.

HIV/AIDS has had a disproportionate impact on Hispanic/Latino communities. Although Hispanics/Latinos make up 9% of the total population of the United States, we account for 16% of the total AIDS cases. The situation is even worse among women and children, where cases among Hispanics/Latinos account for 21% and 24% of the total number of cases of AIDS, respectively.

Among the major recommendations of the agenda are the following:

Elected and appointed officials at the federal, regional, state and local levels must make Hispanic/Latino HIV/AIDS issues a top priority. Elected and appointed leaders serve as powerful role models, promoting education, leadership and civic involvement. This type of advocacy must be exercised to attract appropriate attention and resources for our communities' response to HIV/AIDS. In addition, Hispanic/Latino health professionals and community advocates — especially people living with HIV/AIDS — must be included in any process that leads to the development of HIV/AIDS policies and programs.

Institute a federal comprehensive AIDS prevention strategy that will provide culturally based and linguistically appropriate prevention messages to Hispanic/Latino communities. Provide funding for research on the sexual attitudes, beliefs and practices of the Hispanic/Latino population, especially among the higher risk groups: injecting drug users, gay and bisexual men, and men who have sex with men. In addition, the federal government must increase incentives for Hispanic/Latino researchers, in order to develop a community-based research effort.

Increase funding and technical assistance for Hispanic/Latino community-based organizations (CBOs) that provide prevention, support and health services to Hispanic/Latino communities. The government must also assure that adequate resources are allocated to provide prevention, health and social services to the Hispanic/Latino gay, lesbian and bisexual community, and to Hispanic/Latina women with HIV/AIDS and their families.

Each of the 24 issues addressed in this agenda is accompanied by specific recommendations on the actions that must be taken to ensure the survival of our communities. Each requires a response from those who can implement the changes we call for.

The Coalition is working closely with the Congressional Hispanic Caucus (CHC) to seek its support and leadership in the federal response to the epidemic. Representatives of the Coalition will meet with members of the CHC and with other members of Congress on June 29, to present our agenda. In addition, because the health concerns of the Hispanic/Latino communities are the concerns of all Americans, other Coalition members will meet with elected and appointed officials at the federal, state and local level.

We have sought and received the support of organizations and individuals from around the country, and more than 100 have endorsed the agenda. Several coalition members will participate in seven news conferences in Washington, New York, Miami, Los Angeles, San Juan, San Antonio and Chicago to present our issues to the public on June 29.

We applaud your administration's efforts to build healthy communities, to expand access to health care for all, and to increase funding for AIDS programs. We ask you to support our efforts on behalf of the thousands of Hispanics/Latinos suffering from AIDS and HIV disease.

We would like to request a meeting, where we would be able to discuss the issues outlined in the National Hispanic/Latino AIDS Agenda with you and your staff. We would like to address how the member organizations can work with your administration on the implementation of our recommendations.

NHLAC Releases National Hispanic/Latino AIDS Agenda

Washington, D.C.

For Immediate Release

Some 100 national, regional and local organizations Tuesday asked Congress and the White House to join them in providing effective and equitable policies, programs and funding to combat the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Hispanic/Latino communities in the United States.

During a news conference in Washington, they released the National Hispanic/Latino AIDS Agenda, the result of the first major unified effort aimed at helping Hispanic/Latino communities around the country respond effectively to the epidemic of HIV/AIDS.

"Hispanics/Latinos represent 9 percent of the U.S. population, but we account for 16 percent of all AIDS cases reported between June 1981 and December 31, 1992," said Eunice Díaz, a member of the National Commission on AIDS and of the Steering Committee of the recently formed National Hispanic/Latino AIDS Coalition (NHLAC).

"Our communities have long waited for our leadership to recognize that AIDS is a priority for us," Díaz added. "It's time for our elected and appointed officials to take responsible actions that reflect our needs."

Congressman Luis Gutiérrez, D-Chicago, who met with representatives of the Coalition before the news conference, praised the group's efforts. "The success in reaching consensus on the best strategies to deal with AIDS in Hispanic communities is a major step towards bringing this epidemic under control," said Gutiérrez, who chairs the Health and Judiciary Task Force of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus (CHC).

The Coalition also sent a letter to President Clinton, requesting a meeting to discuss the issues outlined in the Agenda.

Following the news conference, held in the Cannon House Office Building, the CHC and the Coalition held a briefing for all members of Congress on the best ways to deal with the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Hispanic/Latino communities in the United States and Puerto Rico.

Among the major recommendations in the document, which covers 24 areas of concern, are the following:

Elected and appointed officials at the federal, regional, state and local levels must make Hispanic/Latino HIV/AIDS issues a top priority. Elected and appointed leaders serve as powerful role models, promoting education, leadership and civic involvement. This type of advocacy must be exercised to attract appropriate attention and resources for our communities' response to HIV/AIDS. In addition, Hispanic/Latino health professionals and community advocates — especially people living with HIV/AIDS — must be included in any process that leads to the development of HIV/AIDS policies and programs.

Institute a federal comprehensive AIDS prevention strategy that will provide culturally based and linguistically appropriate prevention messages to Hispanic/Latino communities. The government also must assure that states and localities that receive federal funding for prevention programs either carry out or fund programs that reach all groups at risk, including gay and bisexual men, injecting drug users and their sexual partners, women, youth, incarcerated populations, immigrant and migrant populations, and persons with tuberculosis.

Tuesday's activities in Washington were part of a national effort that included news conferences by members of the Coalition in six cities around the country — New York, Los Angeles, San Juan, San Antonio, Miami and Chicago. Copies of the agenda were also being distributed to officials of the federal and local health and social services departments and to all Members of Congress.

The Agenda was put together through the volunteer efforts of representatives of several organizations, who selected the recommendations for action from a number of HIV/AIDS agendas developed by Hispanic/Latino organizations from around the country. It has been endorsed by some 100 national, regional and state organizations and individuals .

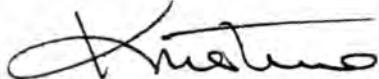

I spoke with you recently about Federal housing assistance resources in the Tri-County area for persons infected with HIV. I hope you found the information to be useful.

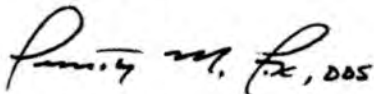

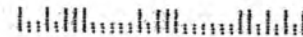

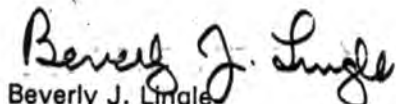
In my 7 1/2 years on the Board I have been proud to be a part of many watershed decisions:

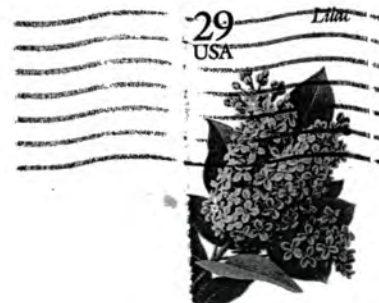
