DEAR REGINA:

HERE IS THE PROPOSAL I PROMISED IN MY LETTER OF 8/13. I HAVE PURPOSELY KEPT THIS TO AN OUTLINE FORMAT. IM SURE THAT NO ONE THERE HAS TIME TO WASTE ON LONG-WINDED PROPOSALS FROM EVERYONE WHO THINKS HE HAS A NEW ANGLE ON THE H.I.V. PROBLEM. IF ANY PART OF THIS CATCHES ANYONE'S ATTENTION, I WILL BE HAPPY TO ELABORATE. THE PROPOSAL IS IN FOUR PARTS AS YOU RECOMMENDED.

1. QUALIFICATIONS AND BACKGROUND OF THE INVESTIGATOR. I BELIEVE YOU SAID THAT THE POWERS THAT BE WOULD WANT TO KNOW WHERE I'M COMING FROM IN ORDER TO TAKE THIS SERIOUSLY.
2. THE NATURE OF THE PROBLEM AND REASON FOR INVESTIGATION. I'VE KEPT THIS TO A BARE MINIMUM. HOPEFULLY THERE IS ENOUGH TO ESTABLISH THAT THERE REALLY IS A PROBLEM.
3. STRUCTURE AND USE OF SURVEY INSTRUMENT. HERE, I HOPE TO ESTABLISH THAT THIS WILL BE A CLEAN AND ETHICAL STUDY. I HAVE NOT TRIED TO DEVELOP THE SPECIFIC QUESTIONS, BUT I HAVE COVERED THE DOMAINS TO BE TAPPED.
4. WHAT I NEED TO SELL THIS AT THE LOCAL LEVEL. FOR THE LOCAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE TO PERMIT THIS STUDY, THEY WILL HAVE TO BE CONVINCED THAT IT IS NOT JUST PERSONAL CURIOSITY--THAT SOMEONE OF SOME STANDING IS INTERESTED IN THE RESULTS.

UNDERSTAND, I AM REALLY NOT TOO THRILLED ABOUT DOING THIS STUDY. IT WILL BE VERY DELICATE AND MORE THAN A LITTLE RISKY. IF ANYONE CAN PROVIDE THE ANSWERS, I WOULD BE DELIGHTED TO DROP THE WHOLE MATTER. IF NOT, I WOULD BE WILLING TO CRACK OPEN THE DOOR TO THE INVESTIGATION WITH THE UNDERSTANDING THAT, IF THERE IS A NEED TO LOOK FURTHER, SOMEONE ELSE WILL PICK IT UP.

ALSO BE AWARE THAT THE STUDY WHICH I PROPOSE WILL NOT YIELD ANY ANSWERS. I'M NOT SURE I WOULD KNOW HOW TO DESIGN A STUDY TO GET AT THE "ANSWERS." IN LOOKING AT WHAT STUDENTS HAVE BEEN TAUGHT AND HOW THIS INFLUENCED THEIR SEXUAL BEHAVIORS, THE BEST I CAN HOPE FOR IS A CLEAR INDICATION AS TO WHETHER THE PROBLEM AS I PERCEIVE IT ACTUALLY EXISTS.

AT THIS POINT, IT'S ALL YOURS. THERE IS NOTHING MORE I CAN DO UNTIL I HEAR FROM EITHER YOU OR BRENDA. GOOD LUCK.

I enjoyed speaking with you this morning regarding the questions your students posed about HIV transmission. As promised, enclosed is a copy of the new (6/93) Surgeon General's Report as well as a copy of the most recent surveillance report from the CDC.

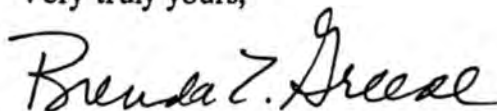
The former provides the government's most up-to-date guidance on HIV. The latter shows how epidemiological data is reported and organized by the CDC; you will see that oral intercourse is not separated out as a category (neither is sexual abuse of children 13 and under). It is my understanding that reporting of transmission category occurs after the person has been interviewed about all possible modes of transmission; I am not certain whether every person is asked if they have engaged in oral intercourse if they first report having engaged in vaginal and/or anal intercourse. The best source of information on whether data on oral intercourse is collected probably would be your local health department or your state health department.

I also am enclosing a copy of the CDC's AIDS education guidelines which first were published in 1988. These guidelines were developed to help schools determine what, when, and how HIV prevention would be taught. On pages 7-8, under the section for Junior High/Senior High School, you will see references about oral sexual behaviors. Whether schools are dealing explicitly with this information is questionable.

Researchers have said that until we have data from a reliable research study into people's specific sexual behaviors, there will be denial of the extent to which people practice anal sex, oral sex, and same-sex sex, as well as an inability to design prevention programs targeting specific behaviors appropriately. To date, the federal government has opposed conducting such a study.

I hope you find this information useful in helping your students to understand how they can reduce their risk of infection with HIV. I also hope that your discussion with Robert Frye at the state education department will be helpful. Please let me know if I can be of further assistance.

ORIGIN AND DEVELOPMENT OF RESEARCH QUESTION:

THIS QUESTION ORIGINATED WITH AN INQUIRY FROM A STUDENT IN ONE OF MY PSYCHOLOGY CLASSES. WE HAD DISCUSSED THE PITFALLS OF RESEARCH, INCLUDING THE DANGER OF UNDERTAKING RESEARCH WITH BIASING ASSUMPTIONS. LATER, IN A DISCUSSION OF AIDS--SPECIFICALLY THE ALARMING INCREASE AMONG HETEROSEXUALS AND TEEN-AGERS--A STUDENT NOTED THAT ALL THE LITERATURE SEEMS TO ATTRIBUTE THIS SPREAD TO TRANSMISSION THROUGH INTERCOURSE. SHE ASKED IF THIS WAS A LEGITIMATE CONCLUSION.

FURTHER DISCUSSION FRAMED THE QUESTION INTO THIS FORM.

SINCE, HISTORICALLY, THE MAJOR ROUTES OF SEXUAL TRANSMISSION HAVE BEEN AMONG HOMOSEXUALS THROUGH ORAL AND ANAL CONTACT, AND

SINCE THERE ARE FEW HETEROSEXUAL CONTACTS (ESPECIALLY TEEN-AGE LIAISONS) WHICH DO NOT INVOLVE SOME DEGREE OF ORAL (AND POSSIBLY ANAL) CONTACT,

DO THE DATA EXIST TO SUPPORT THE CONCLUSION THAT THE MODE OF TRANSMISSION HAS SHIFTED FROM ORAL AND ANAL TO VAGINAL?

THE STUDENT WAS NOT SUGGESTING THAT THE VIRUS IS NOT SPREAD THROUGH INTERCOURSE. SHE WAS ASKING WHETHER THERE ARE DATA TO SUPPORT THE CONCLUSION THAT IT IS SPREAD PRIMARILY THROUGH THIS BEHAVIOR.

(INCIDENTALLY, THESE STUDENTS RAISED ANOTHER QUESTION WHICH I HAVE NEVER SEEN IN ANY OF THE LITERATURE. SINCE THE TRANSMISSION OF H.I.V. IS BODY FLUID TO BLOOD, WOULD NOT A DROP OF SEMEN CONTACTING A SCRATCH ON THE HAND TRANSMIT THE VIRUS? IF SO, THEN SUCH FOREPLAY AS MUTUAL MASTURBATION OR EVEN HEAVY "PETTING" COULD BE DANGEROUS.)

AS THE DISCUSSION CONTINUED, IT DEVELOPED THAT MOST OF THE STUDENTS HAD BEEN TAUGHT THAT THE CONDOM IS A RELATIVELY GOOD PROTECTION AGAINST AIDS. HOWEVER, NOT ONE OF THEM HAD BEEN TOLD ANYTHING ABOUT USING A CONDOM EXCEPT DURING INTERCOURSE.

LATER, I HAD A CHANCE TO DISCUSS THIS WITH THREE JR. HIGH STUDENTS. THEY SAID THAT THEY HAD BEEN TAUGHT THAT YOU SHOULD USE A CONDOM WHILE "HAVING SEX." PUSHED FOR SPECIFICS, ONE 12-YEAR-OLD GIRL BLURTED OUT, "YOU SHOULD PUT IT ON BEFORE YOU PUT IT IN." IF THIS IS THE UNDERSTANDING OF MOST TEENS, THEN THERE IS A REAL PROBLEM.

IF, IN FACT, TEEN-AGERS ARE ENGAGING IN MANUAL, ORAL AND ANAL SEX, AND

IF THEY ARE BEING TAUGHT THAT THE CONDOM SHOULD BE USED ONLY DURING INTERCOURSE,

THEN THEY ARE SET UP TO CONTRACT H.I.V. EVEN THOUGH THEY USE CONDOMS.

IF THIS IS THE CASE, IT COULD ACCOUNT FOR (1) THE DRAMATIC SPREAD AMONG TEENS AND (2) THE APPARENT FAILURE RATE OF CONDOMS (i.e., THE VIRUS IS CONTRACTED PRIOR TO BRINGING THE CONDOM INTO USE)

I DIDN'T HAVE ANSWERS FOR THE STUDENTS SO I CALLED THE AIDS HOTLINE.

THEY DIDN'T KNOW THE ANSWERS, BUT THEY REFERRED ME TO THE NATIONAL SCHOOL BOARDS ASSOCIATION WHERE I TALKED WITH BRENDA GREENE, MANAGER, HIV AND AIDS EDUCATION.

BRENDA DIDN'T KNOW EITHER. SHE SENT ME SOME INFORMATION AND REFERRED ME ON TO BOB FRYE IN RALEIGH. (BUT SHE DID PASS ON ONE VERY INTERESTING BIT OF INFORMATION. SHE SAID THAT THEY HAVE FOUND THAT A HIGHER PERCENTAGE OF YOUNG TEEN GIRLS ARE OPTING FOR ORAL AND ANAL SEX BECAUSE (1) THEY CAN'T GET PREGNANT AND (2) THEY ARE STILL TECHNICALLY VIRGIN.)

I WAS NOT ABLE TO CONTACT BOB FRYE, BUT I DID GET TERESA KLIMKO. SHE COULDN'T GIVE ME ANY ANSWERS, BUT SHE REFERRED ME TO REGINA PETTEWAY.

WHEN REGINA, THE HIV/HEALTH EDUCATION CONSULTANT, N.C. DEPT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, COULD NOT PROVIDE ANSWERS, I BEGAN TO GET SERIOUSLY CURIOUS.

IT WAS IN MY TALKS WITH REGINA THAT I BEGAN TO SEE THIS AS SOMETHING WHICH NEEDED TO BE INVESTIGATED. I SUGGESTED THIS TO REGINA AND SHE ASKED THAT I PREPARE THIS PROPOSAL.

BEFORE DOING SO, I REVIEWED THE MATERIAL SENT TO ME BY BRENDA GREENE AND REGINA PETTEWAY. IT APPEARS THAT VIRTUALLY EVERYTHING BEGINS WITH THE ASSUMPTION THAT HETEROSEXUAL TRANSMISSION MEANS INTERCOURSE. SPECIFICALLY, I HAVE NOTED THE FOLLOWING.

SOME OF THE PUBLICATIONS NOTE THAT HIV CAN ENTER THE BODY THROUGH THE MOUTH, RECTUM, OR VAGINA AND MIGHT RESULT FROM "--PRACTICING SEXUAL BEHAVIOR THAT RESULTS IN THE EXCHANGE OF BODY FLUIDS (i.e., SEMEN, VAGINAL SECRETIONS, BLOOD)--" (CDC, MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY REPORT, VOL.37, NO. S-2, PP 6-7). HOWEVER, ALL OF THE PUBLICATIONS (INCLUDING THE CDC REPORT) CONSISTANTLY REFER TO "UNPROTECTED SEXUAL INTERCOURSE" AS THE ROUTE OF TRANSMISSION.

THROUGHOUT THE MATERIAL, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT STUDENTS BE TAUGHT TO USE CONDOMS WHILE "HAVING SEX." IN OUR LANGUAGE TODAY, "HAVING SEX" IS A EUPHUISM FOR SEXUAL INTERCOURSE. I KNOW OF NO TEEN WHO WOULD CONSIDER HIM OR HERSELF TO HAVE "HAD SEX" UNLESS THERE HAD BEEN INTERCOURSE.

EVEN THE N.C. STATE LEGISLATIVE REPORT (VOL.15, NO. 12), IN REPORTING ON THE PROGRESS OF HIV/AIDS EDUCATION PROGRAMS, STATES:

"IN 1987, A NATIONWIDE SURVEY OF MORE THAN 11,000 EIGHTH AND 10TH GRADE STUDENTS FOUND THAT 94 PERCENT KNEW THAT THERE IS INCREASED RISK OF HIV INFECTION FROM HAVING INTERCOURSE WITH AN HIV INFECTED PERSON;---AND 91 PERCENT AGREED THAT ADOLESCENTS SHOULD USE CONDOMS IF THEY HAVE SEXUAL INTERCOURSE." (P-6)

FINALLY, THROUGHOUT THE LITERATURE, THERE IS REPEATED USE OF THE CONCEPT OF AIDS/PREGNANCY PREVENTION. SINCE THERE IS ONLY ONE WAY TO GET PREGNANT, THIS VIRTUALLY LOCKS HIV TRANSMISSION TO INTERCOURSE.

IT IS REALLY NOT SURPRISING THAT THE ANSWERS TO MY STUDENTS' QUESTIONS ARE NOT TO BE FOUND. AS SEVERAL HAVE POINTED OUT, WE SIMPLY CANNOT ASK TEEN-AGE STUDENTS THE TYPE OF QUESTIONS WHICH WOULD BE NEEDED TO FACTOR WHETHER THOSE WHO HAVE HAD INTERCOURSE HAVE ALSO ENGAGED IN ORAL OR ANAL SEX. MOREOVER, IT HAS BEEN SUGGESTED THAT THERE IS A CULTURAL FACTOR AT WORK. NO ONE REALLY WANTS TO THINK ABOUT SOME CUTE LITTLE EIGHTH GRADER BEING INVOLVED IN ORAL OR ANAL SEX.

AND SO, THE QUESTIONS REMAIN.

ARE WE TEACHING STUDENTS THAT CONDOMS ARE TO BE USED ONLY DURING INTERCOURSE?

IF SO, DO WE HAVE THE RESEARCH TO SUPPORT SUCH AN APPROACH?

IS IT POSSIBLE THAT WE ARE TACITLY ENCOURAGING STUDENTS TO ENGAGE IN UNPROTECTED, HIGH RISK BEHAVIORS, USING THE CONDOM ONLY AFTER IT IS PROBABLY TOO LATE?

INVESTIGATIVE PROCEDURE:

POPULATION

THE INITIAL POPULATION WILL CONSIST OF STUDENTS TAKING PSYCHOLOGY COURSES AT CATAWBA VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DURING THE FALL QUARTER 1993. ALL STUDENTS WHO FINISHED (OR DROPPED OUT OF) HIGH SCHOOL WITHIN THE PAST EIGHT YEARS WILL BE OFFERED A CHANCE TO PARTICIPATE. THIS SHOULD YIELD AN n OF ABOUT 100.

IF THE RESULTS INDICATE NEED FOR MORE STUDY, AND IF THE COLLEGE APPROVES, THE SURVEY COULD BE EXPANDED TO INCLUDE ALL STUDENTS AT C.V.C.C. THIS WOULD YIELD A POPULATION OF ABOUT 2000.

ASSUMING THAT AS MANY AS HALF MIGHT BE UNWILLING TO ANSWER THE TYPE OF QUESTIONS WHICH WILL BE NEEDED, THIS WOULD MEAN AN INITIAL n OF ABOUT 50 AND A POTENTIAL n OF ABOUT 1000.

THERE ARE ADVANTAGES IN DEALING WITH THIS POPULATION AS OPPOSED TO A HIGH SCHOOL GROUP. FIRST, THESE STUDENTS WILL ALL BE OVER 18 AND CAPABLE OF INFORMED CONSENT. QUESTIONS CAN BE ASKED IN THIS SETTING WHICH COULD NOT BE USED IN ANY HIGH SCHOOL. SECOND, THESE WILL HAVE FINISHED HIGH SCHOOL SO RECENTLY THAT IT WOULD BE REASONABLE TO ASSUME THAT WHAT THEY LEARNED IS STILL BEING TAUGHT. THIRD, SINCE EIGHT YEARS WILL BE REPRESENTED, IT MIGHT BE POSSIBLE TO DETECT TRENDS IN THE CONTENT OF AIDS EDUCATION.

INSTRUMENT

THE QUESTIONNAIRE WILL CONSIST OF FOUR PARTS

PART I, DEMOGRAPHICS:

THIS WILL ASK SEX, AGE, AND HIGH SCHOOL DATES AS WELL AS SOME SOCIOECONOMIC INFORMATION SUCH AS FAMILY SIZE, STRUCTURE, AND S.E.S. STATUS, AND THE S.E.S. NATURE OF THE COMMUNITY AND SCHOOL.

PART II, WHAT STUDENT WAS TAUGHT

THIS WILL ATTEMPT TO DETERMINE EXACTLY WHAT THE STUDENT WAS TAUGHT ABOUT AIDS PREVENTION BOTH IN THE FORMAL SCHOOL PROGRAM, IF ANY, AND BY PARENTS AND PEERS.

PART III, STUDENT'S PERSONAL SEXUAL BEHAVIOR

THIS WILL BE THE TRICKY PART. THE STUDENT WILL BE ASKED WHETHER HE OR SHE ENGAGED IN MUTUAL MASTURBATION, ORAL SEX, ANAL SEX, OR INTERCOURSE. IF SO HE OR SHE WILL BE ASKED AT WHAT AGE, HOW OFTEN, WITH HOW MANY PARTNERS, AND WHETHER PROTECTION WAS USED FOR EACH BEHAVIOR.

PART IV, FREE RESPONSE

PROVISION WILL BE MADE HERE FOR THE STUDENT TO ELABORATE ON ANY RESPONSE IN THE FIRST THREE PARTS. IT HAS BEEN MY EXPERIENCE THAT MANY CLARIFICATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS FOR FURTHER RESEARCH CAN BE OBTAINED IN THIS MANNER.

OBVIOUSLY, COMPLETION OF EACH PART OF THE QUESTIONNAIRE WILL BE COMPLETELY VOLUNTARY. EACH STUDENT WILL BE FREE TO COMPLETE ANY, ALL, OR NONE OF THE QUESTIONNAIRE. NO NAME OR IDENTIFYING INFORMATION WILL BE SOUGHT.

WHAT I NEED FROM SOMEONE IN AUTHORITY

CONSIDERING THE PERSONAL, INTRUSIVE NATURE OF THE QUESTIONS TO BE ASKED, ESPECIALLY IN PART III, I WILL NEED APPROVAL FROM THE ADMINISTRATION TO CONDUCT THIS RESEARCH. SINCE C.V.C.C. IS A PUBLIC INSTITUTION, THE USE OF SUCH A SURVEY COULD EXPOSE THE COLLEGE TO PUBLIC CRITICISM. FRANKLY, I AM NOT SURE THAT I CAN GET PERMISSION UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES. BUT I AM SURE THAT THE FIRST THING I WILL HAVE TO DO IS TO ESTABLISH THE NEED-TO-KNOW.

WHILE I REALIZE THAT THE STATE CAN NOT AUTHORIZE OR SANCTION SUCH A STUDY, IT WOULD BE ENOUGH TO BE ABLE TO SHOW THAT THE DATA FROM THE STUDY MIGHT BE VALUABLE IN DESIGNING FUTURE AIDS EDUCATION PROGRAMS.

THEREFORE, IF SOMEONE IN AUTHORITY COULD PROVIDE ME WITH A STATEMENT CONFIRMING THAT:

1. THERE APPEARS TO BE A REAL PROBLEM WHICH NEEDS FURTHER STUDY;
2. THOSE WHO DESIGN AIDS EDUCATION PROGRAMS WOULD BE INTERESTED; AND
3. THE RESULTS MIGHT CONTRIBUTE TO MORE EFFECTIVE AIDS EDUCATION;

THAT WOULD GIVE ME ENOUGH TO PURSUE THIS FURTHER.

Medizone International Completes Arrangements to Manufacture Equipment for Use in Collaborative Clinical Trials in Italy to Study Effect of Ozone Therapy on AIDS, Hepatitis B Patients

September 8, 1993, New York, New York Medizone International, Inc. (OTC-MZEI) announced today the completion of contractual arrangements for the manufacture of the hardware components of five Medizone Drug Delivery Systems. This equipment is intended to be delivered to Italy for use in a collaborative research project designed to examine, in Phase I clinical trials, the efficacy of ozone therapy and Medizone's patented technology in the treatment of various blood-related human diseases, including AIDS and Hepatitis B.

Medizone President Dr. Joseph S. Latino explained that the manufacture of the hardware components of the five Medizone Drug Delivery Systems for shipment to Italy is a major step towards fulfillment of the Company's obligations under the collaborative arrangement. The hardware, at an approximate cost of \$68,500, will incorporate, at an additional cost, disposable gas exchange modules, devices within the scope of the Company's proprietary thin film technology process. By letter agreement with the Italian Scientific Society for Oxygen-Ozone Therapy ("ISSOT") executed in March, 1993, the Company also agreed to provide FDA-approved protocols for use by the research group, which was designated by the Italian Ministry of Health to sponsor the project. Dr. Latino has been invited to join the research group. Further communications with the ISSOT indicate that an estimated 300 patients are expected to participate in the trials, to be conducted at five university-based Italian hospitals over a period of approximately nine months. . .

In accordance with the treatment protocol, patients will undergo a one-hour treatment procedure on alternate days during the course of a twelve-week period. The treatment consists of the withdrawal of 300 cc. (approximately ten ounces) of blood, to be interfaced with ozone/oxygen gas through extracorporeal circulation (outside of the body), and then reinfused into the patient. Patients will continue to be clinically monitored for at least nine months after completion of treatment.

Dr. Latino reiterated the Company's recent announcement of the successful completion of two stages of a Canadian research project that demonstrated preliminary scientific evidence supporting the use of Medizone's proprietary blood decontamination technology in a live primate (monkey) model, further evidencing the scientific rationale toward achieving human trial status.

Thank you for your letter of August 26th reporting on your recent visit with Dr. Lee P. Brown regarding drug policy changes and enclosing copies of your resolution and supporting signers calling for the appointment of a Presidential Commission on Drug Policy.

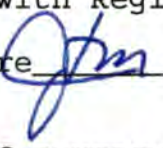

SUBJECT: Meeting with Region V State AIDS Director

Attached is a brief summary of issues discussed at the meeting of the Region V State AIDS Coordinators sponsored by the regional office and organized by the Regional AIDS Coordinator. I have additional information on programs that are working well (successes) that will be helpful to planning and policy groups later on.

September 13, 1993

**SUMMARY OF MEETING WITH REGION V STATE AIDS DIRECTORS
SEPTEMBER 9, 1993**

An agenda and list of attendees is attached. In addition to the listed participants, Robert Campbell, Ohio was present. In most cases, the AIDS coordinators were accompanied by one staff member. This meeting was organized by the Region V RAC and travel costs for State people were paid for by the Regional Office. The purpose of the meeting was to provide an opportunity for the State AIDS Coordinators to exchange information about their concerns and their successes in providing AIDS prevention education and services in their states. The meeting was piggy-backed onto the FDA Regional AIDS Fraud Conference held September 8.

Each Coordinator listed the three greatest concerns in their states.

Michigan

1. State funding has been between \$4-6 M since 1988. State legislature thinks the epidemic is under control. They are reducing HIV budget. **State interest and state dollars needed. State substance abuse money not being used for any HIV prevention.**
2. Lack of Federal - National coordination. NASTAD needs to work with Federal Departments and PHS. Lack of PHS coordination. FDA not coordinating with HRSA or CDC. CDC/HRSA coordination "a mess". One group within HRSA needs to administer Ryan White.
3. Polarization at several levels. Need **Presidential leadership on discrimination issues**. Prevention planning needs state leadership.

Ohio

1. State leadership conservative. CBO's providing leadership.
2. Title IIIa RW money never came through states.
3. Medicaid reimbursement time consuming, too much paper work. 5% cap on administrative costs for RW money is punitive.
4. Direct funding of CBO's should be through states in order to build the needed PHS infrastructure for providing services.

Minnesota

1. Prevention dollars are 1/3 CDC, 2/3 state. New legislation is 4 steps backwards for MN.
2. Complacency in State legislature.
3. Community -based program evaluation: need one set of data. Need technical assistance for CBO's and money to provide TA.
4. Poor health care delivery system. Not enough health care providers in minority communities. CBO's funded without state approval often poor performers.

Indiana

1. Fix turf battles in HRSA. Need coordination of Ryan White title II and title III funding. HRSA still doesn't know who NASTAD is...
2. Local DOHs autonomous. Need to define roles of state and local and rebuild partnership.
3. Prevention marketing campaign not involving states. States can help. Stop planning in secret, need grass roots constituency to help push federal initiatives.

Illinois

1. Problems with HRSA. No evidence that they are listening. Need Ryan White Title I/ Title II focus group. Title III coordination needed. Technical assistance to states. No help from project officers or from CDC prevention people. Not one CDC site visit in six years.
2. What are drug agencies doing with HIV money? 15% prevention money...how is it being used.
3. Need help with service and prevention delivery systems for rural areas. Rural folks get second class health care services (**What will health care reform do for providing better access to care in rural areas?**)

Chicago

City gets separate prevention funds. State prevention dollars going into city. CDC does not fund projects outside city. Federal dollars go directly to city not through state or city DOH. More state than federal dollars paying for drug reimbursement program.

Prevention Issue

What is primary role of counseling and testing sites?
Prevention? Finding disease to get more money? Integrate testing services into other health care settings. Need more follow-up on HIV +.

Other issues:

- Migration for drug reimbursement: the differences in drug assistance programs between states promotes migration by PLWAs to states with best reimbursement programs. Need federal coordination to prevent inequality of what is available from state to state.
- NASTAD role: State AIDS Directors will be vital to National AIDS Coordinator's ability to work with States. Will be need for evaluation of efficacy of programs.
- States need to be asked what technical assistance is needed.

I have notes on accomplishments from these states as well. They will be helpful when we need to determine what has worked well and should be used as models for other states.

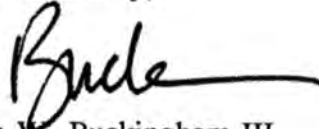

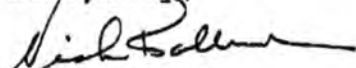

As we indicated at our August meeting, we stand ready to help you out to design a course of action that will increase public support for those living with AIDS/HIV.

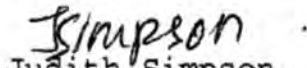

How can you help ?

Get the Facts

Seek up-to-date information about statistics, trends, scientific and medical advances, government actions and appropriations. Every community has its own AIDS crisis, so keep abreast of local issues. Contact your local library, health department or call the National AIDS Information Clearing House (1-800-458-5231).

Educate Others

Listen to people, hear their concerns, provide useful information. Insist that your employer conduct seminars and distribute information. Health organizations will provide trained personnel and audio, video and printed materials.

Show You Care

Join in activities designed to increase awareness, to protest inaction, to pay tribute. Become a buddy, help with food preparation and distribution, volunteer at hospitals, hospices or local AIDS service providers.

Contribute Financially

Consider donations of food, clothing and presents too. Honor family and friends on holidays with donations made in their names to AIDS organizations.

Speak Out

Write and call your local, state and national leaders. Voice your concerns for research, health care, education programs for youths and risk reduction efforts. Insist on more press coverage and ask your clergy to speak out publicly about the need for caring.

Fight Prejudice

AIDS is a health crisis not a moral issue. AIDS does not discriminate, it effects everyone regardless of race, religion, sexual preference or economic standing. All people with AIDS deserve our caring and support.

Protect Yourself and Respect Others

Talk with sexual partners about AIDS and never initiate sexual activity while "under the influence". Use condoms and spermicidal lubricants. Never share needles or other drug paraphernalia.

All people living with AIDS are innocent. Let love and caring overcome fear. Our society must commit to providing care for all people. Imagine a day without AIDS. Work for a cure.
