I am encouraged by the interest of individuals on the complex issues of HIV/AIDS prevention.

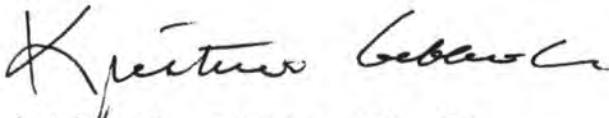
Your comments address the need to contain the spread of the virus. You indicated, however, that this should be done by isolating persons living with HIV. HIV/AIDS is not like other diseases for which quarantine and isolation have been the traditional methods of containment. HIV is transmitted by very specific behaviors, not by casual contact.

Effective education campaigns have proven effective in changing those behaviors in persons that have participated in programs in all parts of this country. Under those circumstances, it would be more advisable to improve the nature of the prevention messages that we are delivering to populations at risk rather than trying to limit the civil liberties of those infected.

I have been entrusted by the President with the task of protecting the lives of all Americans, regardless of race, creed, gender, age or sexual orientation. Our Constitution grants the right to life to all those fortunate enough to be born under our flag. In order to safeguard their safety, it is imperative that we do not confuse the message and that we understand that we are all equal under the American flag and are entitled to its protection.

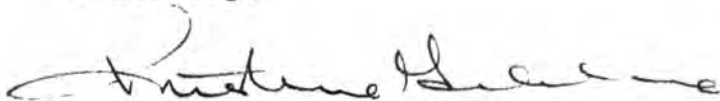

My intention to write to you has been purposefully delayed to allow for your "settling" into your new responsibility. The urgency of the needs and the intensity of my continued interest in the devastation of AIDS prompts my current communication.

Serving as a counselor in a methadone-maintenance clinic provided my introduction to AIDS in connection with substance abuse. Training was provided for me as a trainer-of-trainers by a consulting firm, Polaris, Inc. After this, I sought, studied and introduced the literature and AV aids provided by the local American Red Cross to educate our clinic staff. Subsequently, I was on the planning committees for the ARC International Conferences on "AIDS and Drug Users" and "AIDS and Women". Also, I developed contact with the Whitman-Walker Clinic public health educator staff to further broaden staff knowledge of AIDS.

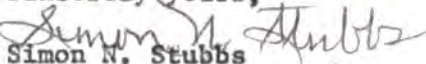
Further work in direct mental health service has given me opportunity to witness firsthand AIDS as a major issue of the 90s. I had predicted in 1987 that the "invincibility" of youth would ultimately cause a significant increase in cases for that age-group. Grimly, time has proved the correctness of that prediction.

Another area of grave concern to me is the situation of persons with AIDS in penal institutions. Two years ago, I wrote a paper in which I sought to address the issue. I would be pleased to share it with you if you so indicate. My writing continues with research on AIDS and ministry for doctoral studies at the Howard University Divinity School.

My prior studies as a pre-med student stimulates my approach to AIDS as a matter of science. However, faith based on service to others is the catalyst. Therefore, I have co-lead support groups and been "buddy" to a now-deceased 28-year old. Presently, I assist with providing support to a 37-year old man who is a client from 22 years ago. He is in the Whitman-Walker "Curtis White" facility. Along with his mother, I will accompany him to a memorial service for PWAS at St. Gabriel's RC Church on October 30, 1993

It would be a privilege to meet with you to share my writing and my thinking on this critical matter.

We, the undersigned organizations, are writing to urge your support for a significant funding increase in the President's FY 1995 budget request for HIV primary prevention. Our organizations represent significant, broad-based support for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) HIV prevention programs. We continue to be concerned that prevention efforts are plagued by insufficient resources despite the \$45 million increase for CDC in FY 1994. While we strongly commend the Administration for its leadership in securing additional resources for prevention activities, we also urge a \$200 million increase for primary prevention activities in the FY 1995 budget.

It is critical that you convey the importance of increased HIV prevention funding. We ask that you advocate for an increase of \$200 million for CDC's HIV prevention programs in the President's FY '95 budget. As you know the FY 1994 appropriation for prevention is \$543,253,000. A \$200 million increase for FY '95 would bring the CDC's HIV prevention budget to \$743 million and provide much needed resources for community based prevention programs, epidemiology and surveillance, counseling and testing, adolescent programs, and special demonstration projects.

Funding for CDC's HIV prevention programs has increased only ten percent over the past four years. The changes in this epidemic continue to point out the urgent need for intensive interventions for people of color, women, gay and bisexual men, and substance abusers and their partners. In addition, infection rates among young
