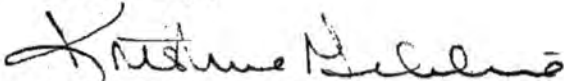
Thank you for your letter of November 17. I was very interested in the enclosed material and its description of your activities to provide comprehensive services to the HIV/AIDS population in Southwest Georgia. I was particularly interested in the apparent high degree of cooperation with the medical community, area hospitals, the primary care center and the local public health departments.

The President has demonstrated his commitment to the expansion of support of the Ryan White CARE Act. As a result, the FY 94 budget is \$579 Million. This is almost \$200 Million more than was provided in FY 93. In addition, the Administration's Health Care Reform legislation should assure in the future that service providers such as your center and the hospitals to which you refer should be able to continue to provide even more comprehensive care. This will be due to the fact that all of your patients would be covered by insurance for their care. President Clinton has insisted that his bottom line requirement is universal coverage without discrimination.

Although it is not possible for me to come visit your clinic at the present time, I will keep your kind invitation in mind and should I or one of my staff be in the area in the future, we will contact you and arrange for a visit.

Dear Ms. Gebbie:

I am writing to you in the hope that you will take the time to review the enclosed material. The enclosure consists of the partial draft of a paper describing the HIV/AIDS services that are offered to the residents of the 14 county area comprising Southwest Georgia (SOWEGA).

The draft is somewhat out of date as it covers the period of calendar year 1991 to 1992. The first two years of the clinic's operation. We now offer additional services and some 400 patients have been served. For well over a year we have been adding new patients at the rate of 13 to 15 per month. The enclosed data clearly indicates the impact of the program on hospital admissions.

The HIV/AIDS problem can no longer be considered an urban and metropolitan problem. The latest data, 1991, from CDC clearly indicates that the greatest percentage increase in cases is occurring in the South. This is confirmed by our experience which shows a 107 percent increase in patients served for 1991 to 1992.

This Clinic was designed to serve as a model clinic for use in rural areas with limited resources. We have trained personnel from various areas of the state who are establishing clinics.

There are several additional aspects of the clinic that make it unique. There is strong physician acceptance with over 60 physicians that have referred patients. The patients are jointly managed with the understanding that their referring physician is ultimately responsible for the patient. All hospitals in the service area cooperate. Health departments have provided space to establish satellite clinics. Four support groups have been established in three communities by concerned citizens, churches, and patients.

There coexists a Ryan White II program that has the same service area as the clinic. This program is administered by the District Public Health Office. They primarily are responsible for education, counseling and testing. This allows the clinic to concentrate on early intervention, while preventing duplication of services.

Ms. Gebbie, if you have had the opportunity to read the enclosed material, we would like to offer an invitation to you and/or members of your staff to visit our clinic. It will provide you with the opportunity to become familiar with a model clinic designed to serve rural areas with limited resources. In the event that you cannot arrange a visit, we would be pleased to provide a presentation to you and your staff if desired.

INTRODUCTION

AIDS can be considered an urban disease because of the high prevalence in urban and metropolitan settings. This is further indicated by the amount of resources to these areas as evidenced by the Ryan White I allocations.

More than ten years have lapsed since the AIDS epidemic was identified in this country. There is still little in the literature about the specific problem of providing services to HIV/AIDS patients in rural areas.

Based on the Centers for Disease Control 1991 annual report on the number of AIDS cases in the United States, the urban trend is changing. The number of reported AIDS cases increased by 5% from 1990 to 1991. Among regions, the South reported the largest number of cases in 1991--15,767--comprising 34.6% of the total. It also experienced the greatest proportionate increase in cases from 1990--10.2%. This increase has become evidence in rural areas as well as urban.

The Albany Area Primary Health Care, Inc. (AAPHC) is a federally funded 330 Community Health Center. It operates a clinic in each of 3 counties in Southwest Georgia. In two of the counties they are the only health services except a county health department. They serve approximately 22,000 patients, the majority of whom are Medicaid, Medicare, or indigent. AAPHC managed their first HIV patient in 1983. Since that time the number of cases that they have managed has increased to over 70 for each of the past three years.

With the increase in cases, it was felt that there was a need to establish a clinic to serve the HIV/AIDS patients in Southwest Georgia.

An application for a grant was made through Health Resources and Service Administration (HRSA) to AAPHC. The application proposed to establish an ambulatory clinic designed to provide treatment and management for HIV/AIDS patients. These patients would be located in rural and small urban areas with limited or inadequate medical resources. A grant award was received effective October 1, 1990. After one year, the grant was converted to a Ryan White III grant.

The clinic was designed to serve as a model that can be used in rural areas with insufficient or limited resources to serve the needs of HIV/AIDS patients.

Initially the HIV clinic provided services to patients who resided in the three counties served by AAPHC. The clinic site is located in Dougherty County. However, it soon became apparent that there was a demand for services from other counties. Services were extended to all of the 14 SOWEGA counties in late 1991. Patients were required to travel long distances to attend the clinic. Many were indigent and had difficulty in obtaining transportation. It was felt that there was a need to establish an additional clinic site that would be more accessible for these patients. The health department in Thomas County, which is located in Thomasville, was approached (Figure 1). They agreed to host the clinic. The satellite clinic opened in April of 1992. It is held twice a month and serves patients living in the southern part of the district.

DESCRIPTION OF THE AREA

The service area for the Southwest Georgia (SOWEGA) Rural HIV Model Program is a 14 county region in the Southwest corner of Georgia. This corresponds to the State's Department of Human Resources Health District 8/Unit 2 (HD8/2). The area has a population of 320,427. The racial composition is 59.9% white and 40.1% black. There are 23.7% of families with incomes below the federal poverty level.

Albany (Dougherty County) is by far the largest population center with a population of 96,311. Other population centers in the area are Thomasville (Thomas County) with a population of 11,733; Moultrie (Colquitt County) with 8,027; and Bainbridge (Decatur County) with 6,141. The area is approximately 6,000 square miles in size (Figure 1).

Because of its warm climate and relatively flat topography, SOWEGA has historically been, and still is, heavily dependent on agriculture and forestry. Outside of Albany, the population is scattered in small towns and rural areas. Although there is an adequate system of roads and highways, the only public transportation in the area is a municipal bus system in Albany.

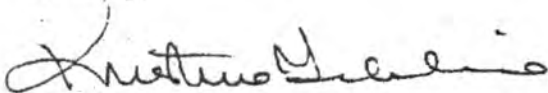

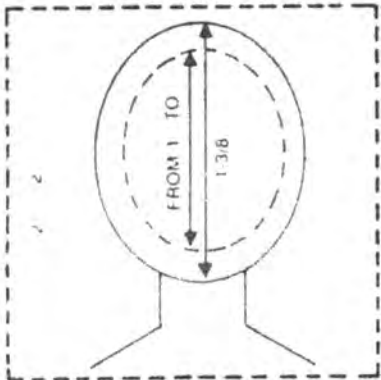

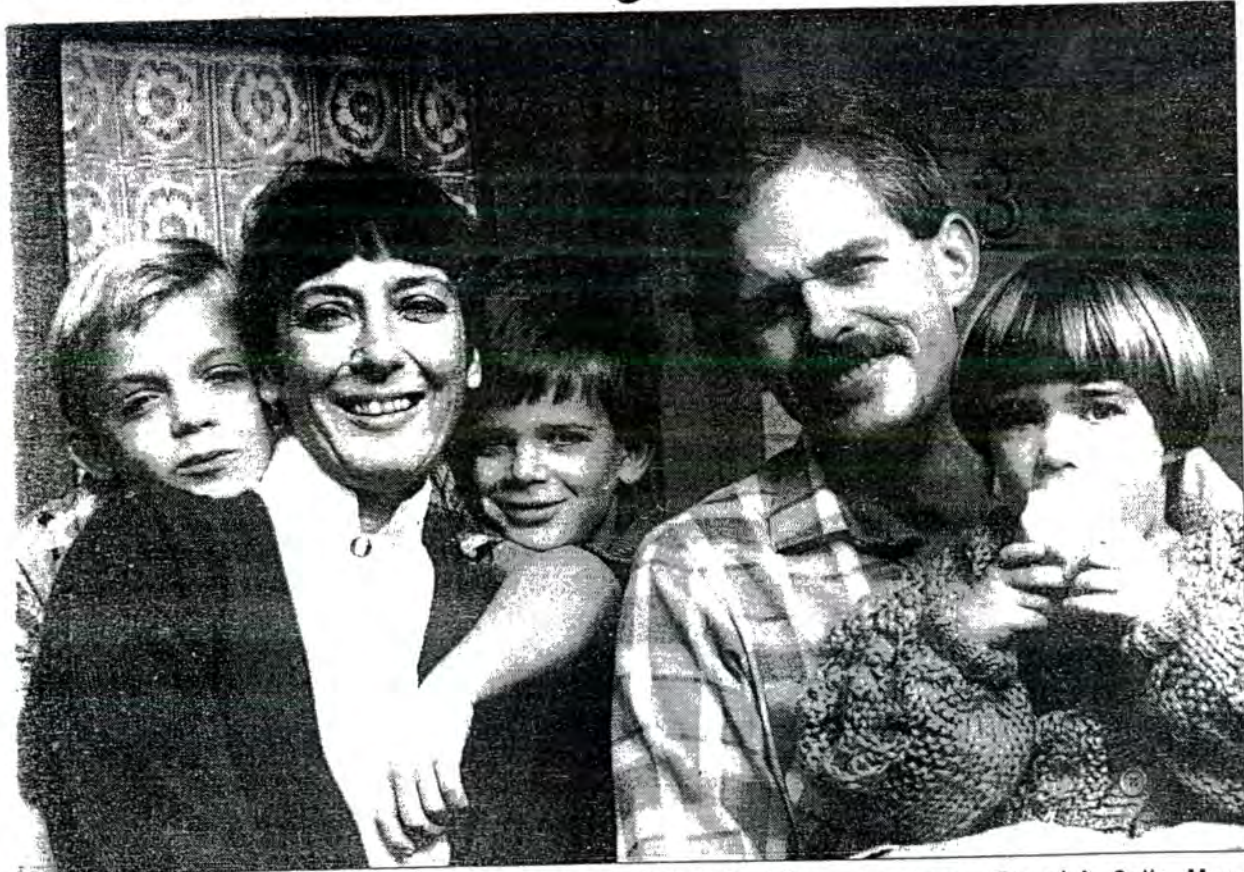

Farewell Mary Jacobs: PT family grapples with AIDS



Mary Jacobs, surrounded by her family on the steps of their Port Townsend home: From left, Colin, Mary, Hilary, Randy and Hilary.

Hundreds in Jefferson County mourned the September death of Mary Jean Tudor Jacobs of the AIDS virus.

Mary Jacobs, wife of Dr. Randy Jacobs of Port Townsend, had contracted the disease through a blood transfusion. During her final months, her husband kept a diary. He recorded both the progress of the disease and, more importantly, the progress of the Jacobs family and especially of Mary in coping with it — and finally accepting its course. Dr. Jacobs graciously permitted The Leader to excerpt parts of that diary.

Despite the fact that the toll of this disease has stolen thousands of people loved as much as Mary Jacobs, it continues to grow at an epidemic rate and with no immediate cure in sight. Dr. Jacobs noted that many people deal with their fears of

AIDS by refusing to confront it. His hope in presenting his wife's story, he said, is to show that the disease is a part of our lives today, and will require an enormous effort on the part of everyone to fight it.

The same effort is needed, he added, to assist those struggling with the devastating effects of AIDS.

From almost the start, the Lord provided her with His peace and assurance that He would hear her. This brought her great comfort allowing her to focus on life to the fullest possible. She spent hours daily in prayer and reading the word. She counseled

Prologue

Mary acquired HIV from a blood transfusion in February 1985. We first learned of her exposure in April 1987 shortly after daughter Hilary's birth. Her first serious illness occurred in September 1989. From that date she experienced good and bad months, with subtle yet progressive fatigue and weight loss. She could not tolerate long-term AZT or DDI. Her anemia eventually

many others dealing with their own personal crises and spread the good news of Jesus to many individually as well as speaking to numerous groups in our community.

In her last months as the illness progressed, she realized that God's plan might not be for a healing in this life, which she graciously accepted, and while still open to a miracle cure, trusted even more simply in Him and His will for her life.

May 25, 1993

Much has transpired over the past month. Obvious periods of confusion and recent memory loss. Adjusting to the every other day routine of IV amphotericin. Mary is tolerating the confinement and PIC line well. She is so life-oriented, incredibly able to surmount her limitations and suffering, clinging to all that she can.

We travel to Seattle, apprehensive. Our scheduled visit with Marty Siegel, MD, our infectious disease specialist. He too is concerned about her mental status and we decide to admit her to Swedish Hospital for a neuro evaluation.

Together we went to the MRI suite — holding her hand on the stretcher as long as I could, she seemed resigned. As I yielded her to the great scanner I had questions — will it be like this after the end? The scanner engulfed her frail frame, the hood shielding her face. She calmly submitted. Soon the cycle began, mechanically, with unexpectedly loud noises, clicking, firing like rounds from a machine gun. If only they were effective against the virus. It will only give us a picture of how much more it has taken of her.

Thankfully it was over. She re-emerged, stating that this would be the last scan. Once was too much. We quietly returned to her room. And after kissing her goodnight, I left her side for Port Townsend to collect my clothes, my thoughts and to touch my children.

May 26, 1993 - 7 a.m.

The news. Neurologist Sylvia Lucas visited Mary last night. Mary is anxiously waiting my return. She doesn't remember Sylvia's full exam or visit. I talk quietly with Marty and Sylvia in the hall. Not good. Fears confirmed. HIV encephalopathy diagnosed and the AIDS dementia complex progressing.

Help us, Lord. I had not prepared for this. Oh, bless Mary, Lord. Carry us, for I am not ready to give up this part of her.



"Colin came to her bedside and she whispered 'Hi sweetie.' She repeated back, 'I love you, too' to each of us."

I ask Marty how much more time. Cautiously, he says six months. I'm numb. After Mary falls asleep, I fall back on habits that work — kinetic therapy — I run from Swedish to Volunteer Park and back, on the verge of vomiting the whole way.

God carries us back to Port Townsend, to our haven in this dark valley.

May 30, 1993

This past week has been rough, confronting this present reality. I'm not ready to let her essence slip away, her mind and thoughts, her creative and sensitive intellect. Yet it's slipping away. I'm losing her and I can't do anything about it except love her as she is. Can we do this?

She is so frail, so elderly, reminding me of my grandparents just before their death, lost in the spaces of senility beyond our grasp, places we could not reach or touch with them. And so it is becoming for Mary. Only God knows the answer. Yet I trust Him, and I see that she does too in her quiet grace, her moments of meditation take her far away, to places of preparation to meet Him.

June 5, 1993

Treasured windows of coherence. We talk and decide to meet with the children to let them know what's happening. It's unexpectedly easy — the boys show little emotion on hearing that their mother may not survive this illness. Hilary runs from the room upon hearing the news. In spite of our offers to hug and support

they're off again soon to their routines. Though later in the evening many discussions occur about death, heaven and angels. They seem incredibly objective and calm. Thank you, Lord.

July 18, 1993

To Lutheran Church of the Redeemer. Mary in wheelchair, fatigued. Able to mentally connect with about 50 percent of the program. Spontaneously asked to be taken to the microphone during announcements. Needed help to stand; thanked the congregation for their help, love, meals, support. Thanked the Lord for his blessings. Standing ovation with tears. The Spirit moved her, for this would be her last opportunity to share this with those she loved.

July 24 - 11 am to 1:30 pm

Rose Garden, White House, 1963 Boys Nation Reunion. Bill Clinton greeted us and thanked me for letter sent in January. Compassion and warmth, sincere personal interest. Both of us with moist eyes. His eyes said that he deeply cared and understood.

Shared picture of Mary and rest of family. I expressed how much his note and concern meant.

Aug. 1, 1993

Mary sat writing at her desk in living room. Brought over letters to each of the children asked me to keep them for them and share at an appropriate time. Last opportunity, must have been moved by the Spirit. Several days later could not physically write or mentally compose coherent

sent

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Aug. 7-8, 1993

At home with kids during weekend. Tough duty, Mary a bit agitated requiring extra help, and kids were kids needing lots of attention. Finally realized I needed extra help - too much for one person. Called Paula and Lisa to start ASAP. Paula Lallish and Lisa Flores start, great help and presence. They're guardian angels, comforting and strengthening us all.

Mary is withdrawing more. No longer calling for the children. Seems to be much less aware of her illness and impairments. The dementia is agonizing for us, yet seems to be offering some emotional protection for her, as she withdraws quietly yet progressively from our world. Thankfully, she still recognizes us and returns "I love yous" and kisses. On listening to Scripture being read to her, will comment "great" or "that's good" at certain passages. Fragments of her mind remain, the most important ones the last to yield.

Aug. 17, 1993

Short ride in wheelchair outside. Great day, sunny and warm. Gardens beautiful. Yet she doesn't seem to notice.

Aug. 19, 1993

Insisted on going in car, not sure where. Out of frustration and need to see if she had a real objective I took her on short ride around block. She was clearly confused as to her agenda. Didn't even appreciate she was in the car. I finally accepted this as a function of her dementia.

Aug. 22, 1993

Colin's family birthday celebration with Tudors, Jacobs; Mary unable to go downstairs any more. She doesn't seem aware of celebration, or his birthday. Colin seems OK.

Aug. 23, 1993

Starting to have difficulty with chewing and swallowing. Have been dispensing and administering medication for weeks; brushing her teeth, washing her hands and face, and giving her showers, doing her hair.

Aug. 26, 1993

Colin's birthday; Mary kissed him and told him she loved him.

I'm between two worlds. One sonatural, children laughing and playing; the other world upstairs, my beloved drifting away from us.

Aug. 27, 1993

Last shower today - we barely make it through the ordeal. Bed baths from now on.

Mary is so serene and beautiful. More difficulty with swallowing medicines. Wondering how long this can go on. Initial shock in June with declining cognitive function. Was not prepared. Children cried then wondering if mama would recognize them much longer. Was losing her in life - almost more than I could bear. But adjusting now. Just thankful to have her with us no matter how much impairment as long as she was comfortable.

Comfort in her physical presence, comforted by her breathing, her warmth, her eyes. Frequent kisses and hugs given, some returned. Whispers back "I love you too."

Aug. 30, 1993

Pain now with turning, otherwise seems comfortable.

Aug. 31, 1993

Quiet, introspective, gazing into space. Wants quiet, little conversation. Declines radio, TV, music. Wants limited visitation.

Sept. 3, 1993

Bad day, rigors after amphi with temperature of 102. Father Heffernan to visit. I took kids dirtbiking - more kinetic therapy - and had good time sharing with them in car. Discussed mama's progressive illness and what to expect; refreshing time out. Mary

taking no significant food or fluids, refusing. Stopped elective medicines and food.

Sept. 4, 1993

Hilary awoke and immediately came into room to check Mary. Mary very still and quiet in her sleep. Hilary reaches out and touches mama who stirs; Hilary states emphatically, "Well, mom's not dead yet!" promptly turning around and walking out of the room apparently satisfied with her discovery.

Dick Lynn, our internist, came and we discussed treatment. Agreed since she no longer was interested in fluids or food we would stop all feedings and continue comfort medicines only. Landmark day in this chapter of our lives. The time had come for her, and some relief for us that the end would come within days. Shared decision with family and all supportive.

Janelle and Keith Harper came by in evening - a Godsend, suggesting and offering to set up a nighttime vigil with a schedule of volunteers. Dorothy, Mary's mother, and I covered this night. So good to be near to her.

Sept. 6, 1993

Mary opened eyes later in day and again was able to weakly yet perceptibly relate to kids and me. Colin came to her bedside and she whispered "Hi sweetie." Repeated back, "I love you too" to each of us. After this afternoon, no longer responsive other than some pain with turning. Volunteers again at night. I treasured the hours with her after kids were asleep and we were alone. Just enjoyed sitting quietly by her, holding her hand, caressing and kissing her.

Sept. 7, 1993

Respirations changed, more labored. Brought kids in and let them know mama might not be alive when they woke in a.m. Lots of hugs and kisses for mama, but not returned. The kids ran crying to boys' room and I joined them with lots of tears and hugs for each other. Hilary said "Papa, let's don't get a new mama. We can't ever replace our mama." They finally fell asleep, crying.

4 a.m.

Couldn't sleep. The Lord brought to my heart a realization that His promise to her had been fulfilled, having completely healed her. I saw for the first time the difference between an earthly physical cure and healing. Every part of her life had been offered to, touched and healed by Him. Every relationship, including her relationship

with Him. She would leave this life perfected by Him, prepared and ready to meet Him face to face, so that He could restore her physically. Hallelujah! He really did what He promised. No deceit, no feelings of betrayal or abandonment. God is gracious and holds true to His promises. Peace came to my heart and soul. God prepared me for Mary's final steps.

Sept. 8, 1993 - 3 p.m.

David Housholder, our pastor, here, administering the short service for the dying. Passage imminent. Wrote essence of memorial service at her bedside while waiting. Many kisses and caresses. I love holding her hand. She's so hot, so limp, turning cool peripherally, working so hard with each breath, yet no sign of pain. Offered to carry her downstairs so Mary's dad could be with her, but he declined.

3:30 p.m.

Kids home, immediately to room, hugging mama and telling her they love her. Sticking very close. Learned that several days before Colin took Pete, his best 11-year-old friend, to see Mary. "Pete, mama has AIDS. Do you know about AIDS?" Pete said yes. "I want you to see my mom, she's very sick and is going to die soon. I want you to know."

4:42 p.m.

Dianne, her sister, arrives from Seattle, last car on 3:10 ferry. Drove in excess of speed limit the whole way. Emotionally drained, joining me, children and several others at her bedside. Too quiet, just the sound of soft tears and I love yous with background of struggling respiration. Put on music "Cry Out" by ABBA. Rev David Housholder reassuring her, asking her to let Jesus take her and to let go.

4:45 p.m.

I've physically and emotionally transferred her to David, she needs him to help her cross the line into Jesus' arms. The father of the bride giving her to the groom. It is right, for David is our good shepherd. David is holding her by the hand, lovingly regarding her face. I am by her side feeling her advancing coolness as life's warmth ebbs. I love her so and repeatedly tell her, caressing her.

Mary opens her eyes, nods at David's bidding to let go of life and walk to Jesus; she attempts to speak, then lets go.

She has passed from earth to heaven, joining our Savior, now healed and complete.

Many tears, hugs, kisses and caresses. Children sharing in all. Graham says quietly "Don't be too sad; mama is doing cartwheels in heaven." Just like she used to do when she was whole and well.

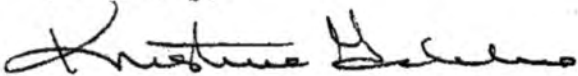

Thank you for your most informative presentation on HIV/AIDS and health care reform at the recent "National Pediatric/Family HIV/AIDS Project Meeting" in Baltimore, Maryland. Your analysis was clear and helped me to understand better the implications of health care reform for HIV infected families, as well as for other medically underserved groups. As a public health professional and evaluator for The South Texas AIDS Center for Children and Their Families, I have had the privilege of working with the dedicated team of nurses, physicians, and case managers serving the needs of HIV-infected families in the 47-county area of South Texas. We were honored by your visit to our program in August.

I am writing to ask your support for an increase to \$42 million for Title IV of the Ryan White CARE Act. As you know, the pediatric, adolescent, and family AIDS demonstration projects, including the Center, are now part of Title IV. As part of an academic medical center, our program is devoted to the integration of service, education, and research missions. In order to make accessible clinical trials to our families and to fulfill our educational and system developmental objectives, additional resources are needed. The transition from a categorical-funded program to one supported by the President's proposed legislation will require great effort to develop standards of care, to train qualified providers, and to prepare alliances and communities to care for these families in a competent and compassionate manner. The national pediatric/family HIV/AIDS projects are demonstrating approaches to care coordination that will serve as valuable models for future alliances facing the challenges of caring for other medically underserved chronically and terminally ill patients. Moreover, many of the demonstration projects have already successfully linked public health with medical systems, thus reducing duplication of effort and optimizing scarce health care manpower and technologies.

Title IV of the CARE Act will increase in importance as we struggle with the necessary changes in our health care system. If you or your staff need further information related to these programs funded under Title IV, please contact David Harvey, coordinator for public policy at the National Pediatric HIV Resource Center (202-289-5970) in Washington, D.C.

We must guide our young people toward an understanding that sex is an important part of life and that they must make responsible choices about sexual behavior.
