In the January 1994 issue of *POSITIVE LIVING*, Paul Serchia criticized President Clinton's recent remarks to a heckler on World AIDS Day.

President Clinton responded to the angry man with a lengthy description of the movie *Schindler's List*, which Serchia took to be nothing less than a commercial plug for the movie. A further review of the transcript shows that the President's remarks were more eloquent than Serchia gave him credit for:

The President said, "The reason I ask you to go see the movie is you will see portrait after portrait after portrait of the painful difference between people who have no hope and have no rage left and people who still have hope and still have rage. I'd rather that man be in here screaming at me than having given up altogether."

In a political arena full of competing concerns, we must keep a critical eye on the President's commitment to fighting AIDS. However, we must also support and encourage the President when he does something positive.

To hear the President not only sympathize with rage over the AIDS epidemic, but publicly defend it, represents a more profound commitment to fighting AIDS than we have previously seen from the White House. The President's recent comments are worthy of praise, not ridicule.

Once again, I am writing to respond to **Revolution's** postcard campaign that was put to my attention. This time the issue is "The Nurse and the HIV Patient," Winter 1993 issue.

Since the beginning of this pandemic, the American Nurses Association (ANA) has been a leader in the causes of many of the issues related to the HIV/AIDS patient and the caregiver.

In your postcard, you write that nurses are not being adequately protected from people who carry the HIV virus or have AIDS and that there is persuasive evidence that "universal precautions" are not adequate. Many nursing experts disagree and point to a body of research that demonstrates that universal precautions are not followed by many nurses.

Scientific evidence has not supported mandatory HIV testing as the answer to increased safety and risk reduction. ANA does maintain the position that anonymous or voluntary, confidential testing must be available to all individuals. HIV testing must be readily available and easily accessible to anyone wishing to be tested. Every effort should be made to give those who may be at risk, the opportunity to receive confidential testing with pre- and post-test counseling.

Mandatory or universal testing programs can serve to create an atmosphere of discrimination and lead to isolation or quarantine. At-risk assessment of all patients and health care workers is costly. Most importantly, negative test results can be deceptive, because of the window period and incubation of this particular virus. Negative test results could encourage health care workers and others not to follow universal precautions and infection control practices.

HIV disease should be reported to public health services according to state law with strict confidentiality maintained. The protection of confidentiality of all HIV-related information, to safeguard the patient's right to privacy, is required by the Code of Ethics for Nurses.

Protection from HIV disease remains a tough, complex dilemma for all. Certainly, individual rights to privacy versus the greater good of members of society is easier in situations where discrimination, stigma, loss of employment, loss of health care coverage, and loss of relationships are not factors.

For the time being, we must go with what we know. Universal precautions do reduce risk of transmission. ANA will continue to lead the demand for availability of proven safety measures in all health care settings, the continued evaluation and modification of work practices and procedures, ongoing research of equipment and personal protective devices to reduce exposure and risk.

At the end of January 1994, the American Academy of Nursing, the honorary nursing leadership component of ANA, will sponsor a three-day HIV/AIDS Nursing Care Summit that will be attended by renown leaders in these fields, including Kristine Gebbie, MN, RN, FAAN, White House AIDS Policy Coordinator.

ANA has also published several publications on these issues including Nurses Risks, Rights and Responsibilities, HIV/AIDS and Nursing, and the State Nurses Association Peer Support Programs. Through its testimony for congressional committees and federal agencies, the American Nurses Association has repeatedly called for immediate and ongoing research and evaluation, with nursing input, of devices and equipment to reduce the risk of injury and transmission of bloodborne diseases. ANA continues to strongly support the consistent and strict use of universal precautions by every nurse for every patient in every setting.

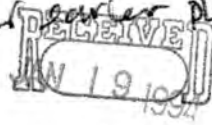

I am writing this letter with the hope that you will be made aware of how certain decisions that are being made are affecting people at the grassroots level. I am referring specifically to the annual cost of living increase allocated to the elderly and those on SSI. I have AIDS and have been on SSI for five years. Every year since 1990 the state of California has diverted federally allocated funds to a general state fund, denying the elderly and disabled their cost of living adjustment. In 1991 it was hard enough to live on a yearly income of \$8376. Three years later it is now \$8050 and to notify me just before Christmas.

SHAME! SHAME! SHAME! I feel like the state of California is saying to me, "You're going to die anyway, so why bother with you."

I really looked forward to the increase in my check. Everything has gone up: rent, utilities, food, but not my check. Plunge the knife into my heart, turn the blade, and add some salt for good measure.

Perhaps you do not realize that every penny of my check goes directly into the local economy of the town in which I live and I pay sales tax that goes right back to the state of California. I must live on beans, rice, and greens; it's a miracle that I'm still alive!

The cost of living increase should be reinstated retroactively for this year. A special fund should be maintained henceforth for the elderly, disabled, and PWAs so that this travesty will not be repeated. I know there are folks who are worse off than I, but what comfort is that when I know that this country has the means to change these conditions. It appears the elderly, disabled, and the PWAs don't mean much to government bureaucrats, but you should know that someone's grand mother, brother, sister, uncle, or friend is a little colder, hungrier, or sicker and you office has the obligation and the authority to turn this shame around.

Thank you for the bitter pill, and for making the lives of those less fortunate than yourselves even more difficult than it already is. I am thirty-three-years old and my life is nearly over and all I want to say is THANK YOU! THANK YOU! THANK YOU!

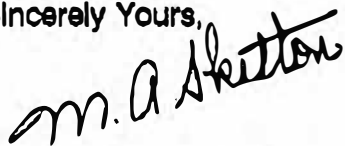

Dear Ms. Gebbie:

I'm writing to offer a few words of support and encouragement from my small corner of the lesbian/gay community.

According to a local gay tabloid (*not* noted for its quality or ethics), you're under fire from AIDS activists who object to proposed HIV-prevention public service announcements, on the grounds that they don't target gay and bisexual men. While I don't know the details of your HIV-prevention package, or your reasons for not targeting those groups, I give you the benefit of the doubt and feel confident you were *not* motivated by homophobia or indifference, as the activists seem to allege.

I'm one of the founders of the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Association, and I heard your speech at our New York convention last September. I was deeply impressed, and walked away feeling very glad that Clinton appointed you to the job. You struck me as compassionate, refreshingly candid, and pragmatic about the realities of working with Congress. It seemed clear that you understood very well the human suffering this epidemic has wrought. AND the difficulties of navigating an ambitious program through the federal legislature and bureaucracy. Yours is no easy task, and any proposal you make is likely to anger somebody. I'm just sorry that AIDS activists are attacking you rather than drumming up support for whatever incremental steps you can realistically take.

Of course, I feel acutely the urgency, the heartbreak, the outrage of watching helplessly while beloved friends die horrible deaths. I understand why AIDS activists are angry, and I'm sure you do, too. I'm sure you wish, as I do (and they do), that people would just get OVER their ignorance and prejudices, deal with AIDS head-on, and welcome gay people into the human family. I feel personally betrayed by the President's backsliding on gay civil rights, and by the federal government's decade of willful blindness to AIDS.

But I also know that institutions change slowly, and that it's sometimes necessary to accept incremental progress, even when it seems obvious that the "right thing to do" is make a radical departure from past practice. I assume this is one of the reasons your PSAs don't target gay men. I imagine you also want to focus limited resources on populations that haven't been getting the message about AIDS as forcefully as the gay community has.

I recently met a young heterosexual couple from the San Francisco Bay Area who asked whether you can get AIDS from a mosquito -- they obviously need an AIDS education, and FAST. Although the gay community *does* need constantly to be reminded about safer sex, it's absolutely critical to educate straight teenagers, women and IV drug users -- particularly those in ethnic minorities and those whose native language isn't English -- to slow the spread of AIDS.

But I'm getting long-winded. I just wanted to offer a vote of confidence. Don't let the turkeys -- on either side of the political spectrum -- get you down. We need you to keep plugging. If I can help in some way, let me know.

Besides -- how seriously can you take a guy who calls himself Luke Sissyfag?!

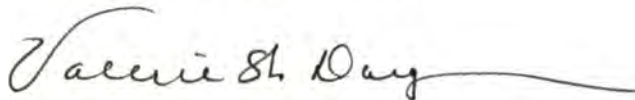

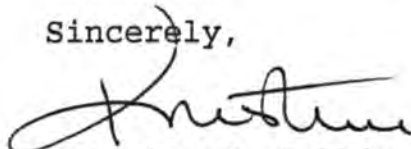

Welcome to Milwaukee. I understand that you will be speaking at the Annual Meeting and Educational Forum of the Wisconsin AIDS Fund, next Wednesday, and I am looking forward to meeting you there.

I am extremely pleased with the more aggressive approach to HIV/AIDS prevention education as promoted on television and radio by the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and the Director of the Center for Disease Control. As an HIV/AIDS educator since 1988, I have long been a proponent of getting the "condom message" out to teens and young adults via television and radio. I am so glad that this is a prominent part of the new prevention strategy.

Let me introduce myself. I am a registered professional nurse of 35 years, with a baccalaureate degree in nursing from Marquette University, and a master of science degree in education from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. I taught in the Associate Degree Nursing Program of Milwaukee Area Technical College for 20 years, and have been retired from the program since May of 1993. I became interested in HIV/AIDS education about 1986, and started attending workshops, to learn more about the epidemic. by 1987, I had begun to serve on the Minority Advisory Committee of the Milwaukee AIDS Project.

While serving on that committee I learned of the availability of funds for community based organizations to conduct AIDS education programs. I proceeded to convince my organization, the Milwaukee Chapter National Black Nurses Association to apply for the funds, and became the first African-American person in Wisconsin to write a proposal to do HIV/AIDS Prevention Education. It was funded by the Office of Minority Health in December, 1988, and I was the Project Director for the three years of its duration. It was quite a fete to direct the project, present on HIV/AIDS, and carry on my full time teaching responsibilities. However, it was a powerful experience, from which I learned as much as I taught.

Since the conclusion of the project I have continued to give presentations on HIV/AIDS prevention. The last two, in November 1993, were a lecture on Women and AIDS presented to the Columbia Hospital health care staff and a radio talk show discussion on Women and AIDS, shared with Barbara Carter, a nurse and certified AODA counselor. I also serve on a community HIV/AIDS prevention consortium involving multiple community agencies.

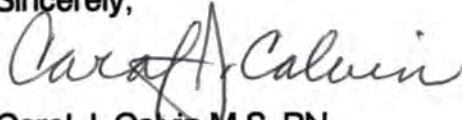
The Milwaukee Chapter National Black Nurses Association did not elect to seek further funding for AIDS education, but continue to implement some of the project programing. However, the Wisconsin Association of Black Social Workers, who

our project provided the original training and certification for, have acquired funding for HIV/AIDS education in the Black community. I am proud to say that I wrote two of their proposals, the last of which was funded by the Center for Disease Control this year.

At this point in my HIV/AIDS Prevention Education career, I feel that I have much to offer related to planning and policy making on a regional or national level, and would like to work on an appropriate committee or council.

Enclosed is my curriculum vita, with an article and a report about the project. Again, I look forward to meeting you, and hope you enjoy your visit to Milwaukee.

Black nurses launch AIDS fight

Before the Milwaukee chapter of the National Black Nurses Association began an AIDS education project in the black community three years ago, little organized effort had been made locally to get information about AIDS to people of color.

"We knew there was very little ongoing AIDS education in the black community, so we decided to write for our own grant," said project director Carol Calvin, a registered nurse and a nursing instructor at Milwaukee Area Technical College.

The project was accomplished with a \$123,422 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Minority Health. The goal was to prevent the spread of AIDS by educating Milwaukee's black, child-bearing population.

The grant allowed the group to provide information in a culturally specific and sensitive manner, said Mary Mason, a project instructor and registered nurse employed as a project nurse for family health and day care for Wee Care Day Care.

Tending to the health education needs of the black community is nothing new for members of the Milwaukee chapter of the National Black Nurses Association.

In its 12-year existence, the group has worked to educate the black community about hypertension, diabetes, cancer, alcohol and other drug abuse, and other enemies of good health. But when the group took on AIDS education, they learned as well as taught.

"It forced all of us to look at human sexuality with greater depth and sensitivity," Calvin said.

Developing culturally appropriate teaching materials to be used in the workshops was an essential step. The group produced nine brochures and a training manual.

Making the information appropriate to diverse audiences was half the battle, said Barbara Carter, a registered nurse and program director of Kettle Moraine Hospital's alcohol and drug treatment center at Northwest General Hospital. "The choice of words was so important. When we did presentations at churches, we were careful not to use inappropriate, offensive language."

They made presentations at

churches, schools, alternative schools, job-training programs, home health agencies, youth organizations, community organizations, shelters for the homeless and social service agencies.

When the project ended in November 1991, project workers had reached about 2,000 people in small group sessions. Nearly 900 participated in pre- and post-testing used to measure how much information they gained from the sessions. The median age of participants was 21.

The results showed a significant increase in knowledge level after the sessions. Generally, the participants knew the basic information about AIDS and how it is acquired, but knew less about preventive measures. Not many knew about the relative safety of a monogamous relationship. Even fewer knew that blacks and Hispanics make up more than 40% of AIDS cases.

One major accomplishment of the project was the certification of 89 people as discussion leaders for an AIDS information speak-

er's bureau. Certification requirements included the completion of 10 hours of training and demonstrated comfort in talking about human sexuality and AIDS, an agreement to facilitate two group discussions a year, administer pre- and post-tests and submit results to the project staff, and attend one local or national conference on AIDS each year.

Project instructors said their booths at fairs drew the greatest interests from those in their 30s and those 10 to 12 years old. Calvin said the average age of those who visited the booths was 33.

"Teenagers were less likely to approach the booths," said Annie Smith, a registered nurse in the coronary intensive care unit at the Milwaukee Regional Medical Center. Smith was one of 14 Black Nurses Association members who volunteered as an instructor.

The group stressed abstinence, but also taught safer-sex methods, such as using condoms. Although women tended to be more informed about AIDS than men, the project exposed a lack of negotiating skills among black women, Mason said.

"They don't know how to negotiate for safer sex or abstinence," she said. "Women who choose to be sexually active should be insisting on their partners using condoms."

Calvin said youngsters, ages 10 to 12 years old, are more receptive to information from adults than teens. She believes parents, clergy and educators should work together with this age group to inform them about AIDS and the other dangers of being sexually active.

Calvin is convinced the Black Nurses Association's involvement was timely. She fears that the government's focus may soon shift from prevention to care. "If fewer funds are directed toward education and prevention, it'll leave us to do preventive activities the best way we can, with private funds or voluntarily," she said.

The real impact of the group's educational campaign is yet to be seen. But already Calvin has seen other AIDS-related activity spring up in the African-American community by people who received certification through their project.
