Dear Dr. Tompkins:

I am writing to inquire about the status of your manuscript "Therapeutic effects of diethylcarbamazine and 3'-azido-3'-deoxythymidine on FeLV infection." My last letter from Dr. Sandra Bridges of NIAID's Division of AIDS indicated that as of January 12, 1994 this potentially important data was still unpublished four years after NIAID started DEC research.

If the paper has been published, please let me know the reference citation and if possible send me a preprint. If the paper has not been published and is not in press, I would like to offer my assistance in shortening the paper, perhaps for a tropical medicine journal. Having just returned from finishing the Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene course at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, I have detailed knowledge of the extent to which DEC is widely used in tropical regions for prevention and treatment of filariasis. Data regarding even a modest antiretroviral effect of DEC would likely be of interest to the editors and readers of a tropical medicine journal. I would be willing to undertake this rewrite in exchange for coauthorship (as last, or next-to-last listed author). To do so, I would require (1) a hard copy of the current draft, (2) a floppy disk containing the manuscript in MS-DOS WordPerfect 5.0 or 5.1 format, and (3) access to reviewers' comments and any relevant raw data.

any case, please let me know your decision re coauthorship within the next six weeks.

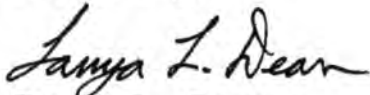

Thank you for sharing your views on cultural sensitivity with me. As you indicate in your letter, my recent visit to New Mexico gave me an opportunity to discuss many minority health concerns, in particular HIV/AIDS. In order to make our programs more effective, we must target linguistically specific and culturally based messages at the populations at highest risk for HIV. I agree with you that among minority communities, we must take into account the unique cultural characteristics of each racial and ethnic group.

In order to accomplish this, we are taking steps to decentralize the way that prevention priorities are determined. In the past several years, communities in various parts of the country that receive Federal funding for prevention activities, had to use that funding within pre-established parameters. Starting on January 1, 1994, the state and local jurisdictions that receive prevention funding had to establish Community Planning Groups that will be charged with developing the priorities for prevention at the state and local level. Starting with fiscal year 1995, these priorities must be followed in funding HIV/AIDS prevention activities at the state and local level. The Community Planning Groups are required to include representatives from impacted communities, including racial and ethnic minority communities. In this fashion, the prevention activities will follow the local rather than national priorities.

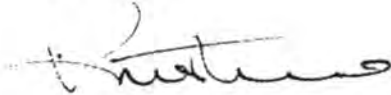
In the area of prevention, we are also working to deliver clear and concise messages to young adults through the Prevention Marketing Initiative. The three major networks have provided over two million dollars in free airtime to deliver a prevention message aimed at people 18-25. The Prevention Marketing Initiative is aimed at demonstrating the leadership of the Federal government in this critical area.

I have examined your proposal addressed to the State of New Mexico Department of Health. I am very encouraged by your interest in working with the Health authorities to address the issue of cultural sensitivity. It is my belief that through private public collaboration we will be better equipped to develop and implement the necessary programs to stop the spread of HIV. I wish you good luck on your endeavor.

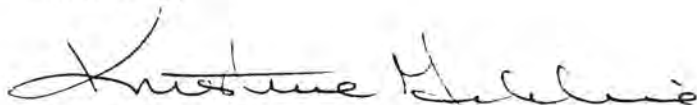
Dear Committee Members:

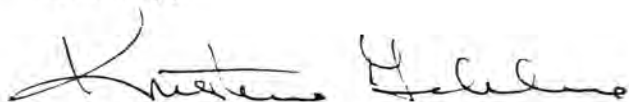

I am writing to nominate Bruce B. Decker to serve on the National Task Force on AIDS Drug Development. I have known Mr. Decker since 1983 when the epidemic was first coming to the attention of policy makers here in Washington. At that time, I was the physician advisor to the Labor and Human Resources Committee, majority, and Mr. Decker was working with Gov. Deukmejian of California. He volunteered to come to Washington to conduct a briefing for Senate staffers on the developments in California, and the pressing policy issues which he felt needed national attention. 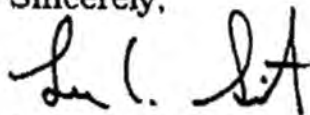

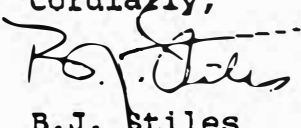

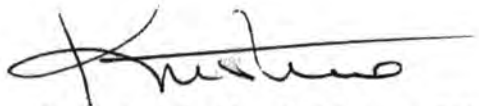

Thank you for distributing the material you prepared for last month's budget conference. I agree in full with the Top Ten Issues you outlined related to AIDS policy. I am concerned, however, about the point you made regarding the availability of specialized providers of AIDS care. Over the past 5 or 6 years AIDS care has become increasingly complex as a wider array of antiretroviral drugs and drugs directed at HIV-1 associated opportunistic infections has been developed. As a specialist who has been deeply involved in delivering AIDS care, as well as in pre- and postdoctoral training in this area, it is becoming more and more clear to me that my earlier hope that AIDS would become a disease that most generalists would become comfortable with was unfounded. If anything, as the medical decision making has become more complex, most generalists have retreated farther and farther from being heavily involved in AIDS care. I am now quite comfortable with this trend because it is clear to me that most generalists don't have the time or interest required to provide state-of-the-art care in this area.

Having said this, I am distressed to see Infectious Disease fellowship training lumped in the same category as training for anesthesiologists, ophthalmologists, gastroenterologists, and the like. The net effect is that although the HIV-1 infected population is expanding, I am being told in my role as Director of the Infectious Disease Program, that I should prepare a plan for cutting back on our postgraduate training slots to help right the ratio of general medicine and specialty training positions. As an individual who provides comprehensive care for my patients, who makes house calls when needed, and who is called in the middle of the night by Hospice Nurses when my patients die, it is not clear why my activities are being placed in the same category as those of my procedure oriented colleagues.

I would like to suggest that you consider the following two suggestions:

1. Infectious Disease Postgraduate Training Positions should either be counted as Primary Care slots, or should be exempted from the ratio-driven cutbacks in "specialty" training positions.
2. Thought should be given to the development of training programs directed at training Primary Care HIV-1 Care Providers. I would have to think more about details, but I would think one could go a long way toward providing for essential providers if a handful of such programs were established on a pilot basis. One might envision recruiting individuals who have completed internal or family medicine

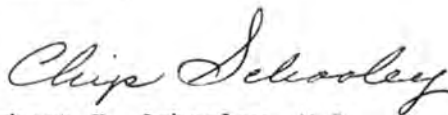
programs. The first year of the program could be a mix of inpatient and outpatient exposure to HIV-1 medicine with training in infectious disease, oncology, dermatology, neurology, and other areas key to HIV-1 Medicine. During the second year the trainees would assume a more community-based orientation with an emphasis on providing comprehensive longitudinal care.

In the current climate, I cannot envision how I could fund postdoctoral fellows in such a program. Our hospital has taken the position that infectious diseases is a "specialty", and will be trying to eliminate, rather than to expand positions. We have an NIH AIDS Training Grant, but it is restricted to the support of research trainees. Our direct patient care revenues are meager because of the payer mix, and Ryan White funds are not to be used for training.

I'd like very much some feedback from you as to how this issue could be most effectively addressed. Please feel free to either call or write, or to talk with me when the National AIDS Drug Development Task Force meets.

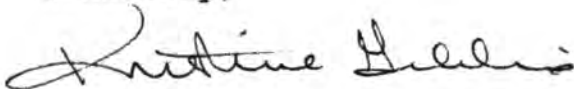

In the problem of developing effective treatment for HIV, I beg to humbly offer my opinion. As someone not to be classified as an expert or scientific intellect I don't understand how a problem like this can continue to persist. Through a decade-years of untold Human Suffering and Loss. None of our brilliant minds have been able to produce outcome.

I have not heard or seen any definitive outcomes. We have an establishment that is either afraid or unable to establish outcome. In the meantime the human toll and suffering is astounding.

If a product is promising pre-clinically and qualifies for clinical testing why can't an outcome be determined in approximately six months. I don't think it is far-fetched to expect that a truly EFFECTIVE TREATMENT would not elicit significant positive pharmacologic or biologic responses within six months of treatment.

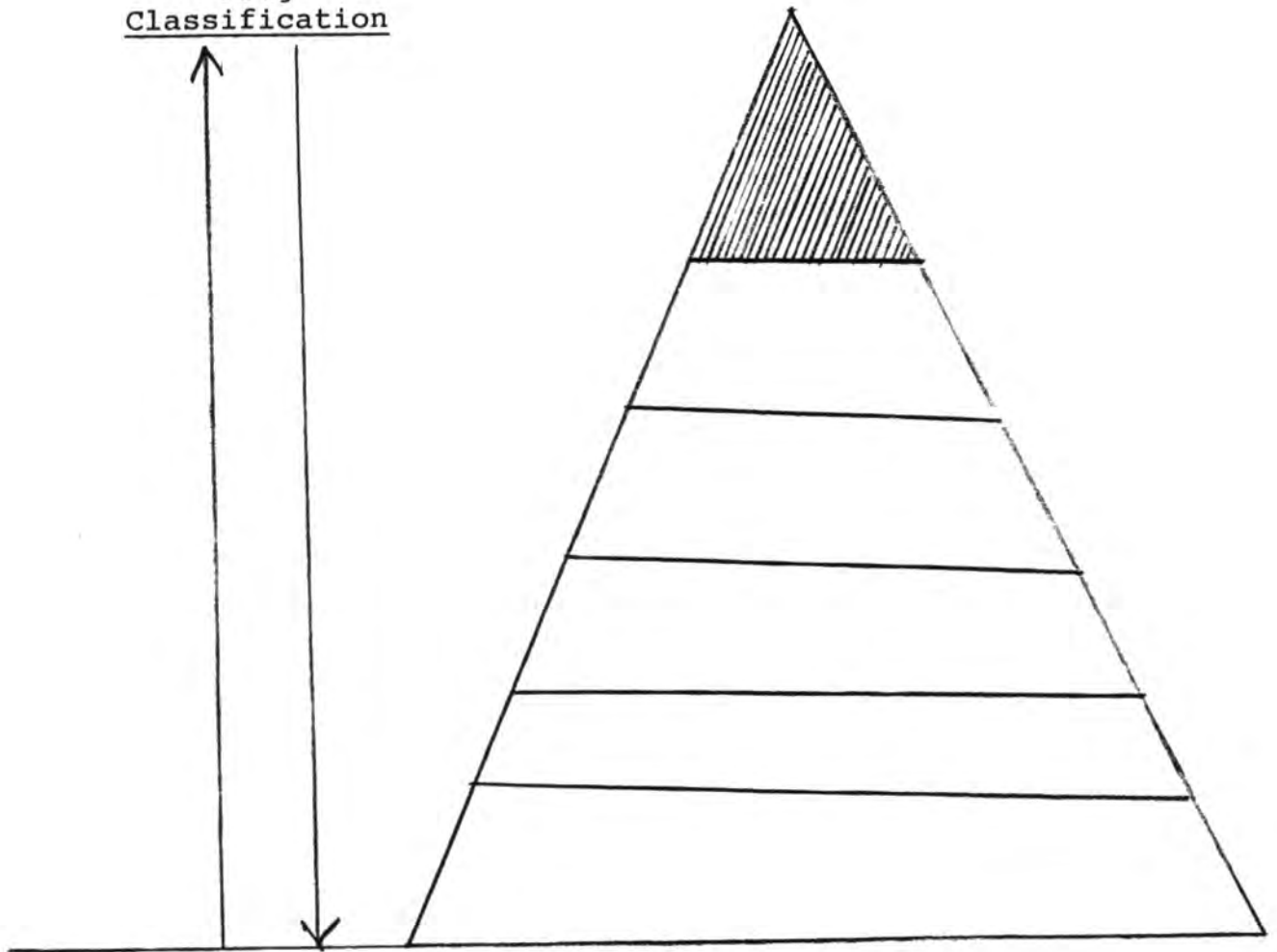
Why after 15 years we have no really effective treatment? My answer is the establishment is not mandated to looking for this. If you are looking for EFFECTIVE TREATMENT, then you have to work within a short period of time - six months - of treatment with the agent. I consider " Effective Treatment " to be a return to acceptable immune function and resolution of all symptoms. The premise of your research effort must be based on this principle.

I suggest that this optimum be at the apex of all government funded research, and all other outcomes be graded after their six month trial period. Funding, priority and urgency will be maximum at the apex. Grade levels can include five categories based on a set criteria for example CD4 percent increases and other surrogate markers and symptom resolution.

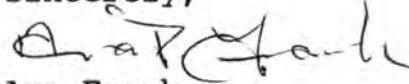

In summary, for any product that qualifies for clinical testing there should be an outcome in six months. Let all the HIV research efforts be guided by this principle. Every six months products in trials must have a reported outcome. Based upon this, a central data bank will classify or reclassify products as outcomes indicate. In the case of contradictory outcomes classification will be based on the most negative outcome. There is no reason in hammering away at a dead horse as you are currently doing with AZT. You have been doing this for 10 years. In the mean time Humans are dying and Suffering. There are no definitive outcomes only controversy. People are dying and suffering. Kindly respond.

HIV CARE ISSUES

North Carolina is a large state, tenth in population and 542 miles from east to west, the same distance as Washington, D. C. is to Detroit, Michigan. The state has no city larger than about 300,000. The state is half rural and half small cities.

The state has no metropolitan area large enough to qualify for Title I Ryan White funding. Although resources under Title II of the Ryan White C.A.R.E. Act have been much needed and very welcome, the \$2 million dollars which the state has received for FFY 94 are spread thin in order to assure that a person living with HIV no matter where they live in North Carolina has access to a comprehensive continuum of essential outpatient health and support services.

Since the Ryan White C.A.R.E. Act is up for reauthorization, it is important that the inequities between funding for Title I and Title II be addressed in the legislation. States simply do not have sufficient resources to take care of the epidemic and the Act, by having two Titles, has set up coordination problems and funding inequities because of separate funding for cities and states.

In addition, the special needs of poor rural states like North Carolina where the epidemic is expanding rapidly need to be recognized in the funding formula for Title II in two specific ways:

1. additional weight should be given to per capita income in the funding formula so that poorer states receive additional resources;
2. the funding formula should take into account the substantial burden placed on states like North Carolina by migration of persons into the state who have been diagnosed elsewhere; the funding formula should be revised to take migration into account.

Finally, North Carolina applauds the re-establishment of the National Commission on AIDS and is especially pleased that half of its members will be people living with HIV and AIDS. We recognize the challenges of balancing the many interests which such a Commission must represent. We encourage the Administration to consider representation from rural states such as North Carolina.

Dear Concerned Citizen:

As Chair of the North Carolina AIDS Advisory Council, I want to thank you for volunteering in our effort to expand AIDS awareness across North Carolina, and educate North Carolinians about the need for an expanded front in the battle against AIDS. The following is a strategy for informing our state legislators about AIDS and our growing crisis.

The Council's mission is to advise State policymakers about issues confronting the health and interest of those affected by HIV. In order to reach these goals, funding must be provided by the North Carolina Legislature. Our immediate objective is to focus on the need for appropriations by expanding state legislators' awareness of the AIDS epidemic.

The North Carolina Department of Environment, Health & Natural Resources has submitted a funding request to the Governor for inclusion in his budget proposal to the General Assembly in this year's short session. If the Governor decides to include the department's request in his overall budget proposal, we will have the difficult task of convincing the General Assembly to vote favorably on funding at a level that will effectively address the problem. Our Legislative Committee has developed an outreach packet that will help ensure that the Council's outreach initiative is unified and representative of the Council's goals.

Plan of Action

Letter to Legislator - (April 19- April 26) A draft letter to legislators has been prepared for you. Please send this letter to the legislators in your district first. You will need to redraft the letter and personalize it with your name and your legislator's name. You may also want to add information concerning local AIDS issues to make your legislator aware of how AIDS is affecting his or her district. This letter should be mailed out immediately. You will find the addresses of your legislators in your packet.

Contact by Phone - (May 24 - June 1) You should follow up your letter with a phone call to your legislator(s). This phone conversation will have several purposes:

- Re-introduce yourself & the N.C. AIDS Advisory Council;
- Inquire about receipt of letter.
- Discussion of AIDS; Expressing your concerns & listening to the concerns of legislator;
- Inform of AIDS Legislative Day & set up time that you and your legislator can meet and discuss AIDS issues;

Legislative Day - (June 1 - June 9) You should plan on visiting the General Assembly and observing its operation. You should also seek out your legislator(s) and introduce yourself and discuss the purpose of your visit to the General Assembly.

(Itinerary for Legislative Day will be forwarded to you)

If you have questions concerning the preceding information/schedule please contact me, Zoe Beatty or the Office of Legislative Affairs in DEHNR. Numbers are listed in your outreach packet.

We also hope to extend our initiative to the public through the media (Newspapers & Radio/TV). If you have local media contacts or suggestions please contact me and we can discuss utilizing these resources and ideas. We further anticipate having speakers visit local civic and social clubs to expand awareness of AIDS issues in communities. This is another effective way to get the message out to the public. Several different speakers have made themselves available for such engagements. Again, if you have suggestions along these lines your input is welcome.

The Council is very excited about the up-coming Short Session of the General Assembly and anticipates great success. Your commitment to the fight against AIDS will increase the chance of success. On behalf of the N.C. AIDS Advisory Council, I would like to extend my appreciation for your assistance in stumping for AIDS funding in the 1994 General Assembly.

LOBBYING - ARE YOU OR AREN'T YOU?

DO'S AND DON'TS

The North Carolina General Statutes in Chapter: 120-47.1(5) define "lobbying" as:

- " a. Influencing or attempting to influence legislative action through direct oral or written communication with a member of the General Assembly; or
- b. Solicitation of others by lobbyists to influence legislative action."

Section(6) goes on to define a "lobbyist" to mean an individual who:

- "a. Is employed and receives compensation, or who contracts for economic consideration, for the purpose of lobbying; or
- b. Represents another person and receives compensation for the purpose of lobbying."

The North Carolina AIDS Advisory Council is clearly asking you to "attempt to influence legislative action through direct oral or written communication with a member of the General Assembly". The Council cannot and will not compensate or reimburse an individual or group for its efforts in this matter. As far as the Council is concerned, you may be lobbying for an issue of which it has deep concern but you are not a lobbyist representing the Council.

Please be mindful, however, of certain protocols and strategies when communicating with a legislator.

1. Be courteous at all times. Our elected officials are citizen legislators and have time commitments and obligations separate from state government.
2. Address your legislator by his/her legislative title (i.e. Representative X, Senator Y)
3. Be direct in your presentation/discussion. Clearly identify yourself. Tell him/her exactly why you have called or stopped by to visit. Give a brief statement of the problem and how that person's support will help solve it.
4. Be prepared to answer questions in the middle of your initial statement. All legislators are different. Some state their support immediately and talk openly. Some will state their objection and talk openly. Some will state their support or opposition and not want to discuss any details. Do not try to debate the issue. Your job at this point is to provide information.

5. Do not pressure a legislator's staff person for information. If you cannot get in contact with a legislator on your first attempt, be prepared to offer multiple time specific return calls or visits. Don't blame the employee for not having tighter control over the employer.
6. Listen attentively for any voids in information a person may have and report those back to the Council. Don't try to answer questions on which you may not be well-informed. Let the Council know and we will follow-up.
7. If you are confronted with true opposition to the issue whether it is based upon factual information or not, do not debate the matter. Kindly thank the legislator for his/her time and excuse yourself.

Legislative Letter - Draft

Dear Rep./Sen.

I am writing to enlist your support of the N.C. AIDS Advisory Council's effort to educate North Carolinians about AIDS. The North Carolina AIDS Advisory Council was established at the end of 1993 by Governor Hunt's office, the Department of Environment, Health, and Natural Resources, and the Department of Human Resources. The Council's responsibility is to advise State policymakers about issues confronting the health and interests of those affected by HIV and the community at large.

The Council, which is chaired by former Senator Helen Marvin, needs your support to educate the people of this State. An educated public can go a long way in putting an end to this fatal disease. We hope you will assist us in our fight to contain this deadly and costly epidemic.

Over the next five years the cost for treating the 7,000 identified HIV-infected persons in North Carolina will exceed \$665,000,000. An estimated 8,000-13,000 are unaware they are infected.

AIDS is not going away. The number of cases among heterosexuals continues to rise, while new AIDS cases among homosexuals have declined. Aggressive education campaigns designed to reach homosexuals have demonstrated how education can be successful in controlling AIDS.

The Department of Environment, Health, and Natural Resources has requested funding in its expansion budget for AIDS assistance. The Council certainly hopes you will consider the importance of this type of funding to the health of North Carolina citizens.

I appreciate the time you have taken to read this letter, and I hope you will consider the importance of this issue during the 1994 Short Session of the General Assembly. Please feel free to contact me or the Council for further information.

SENATE SEATING CHART





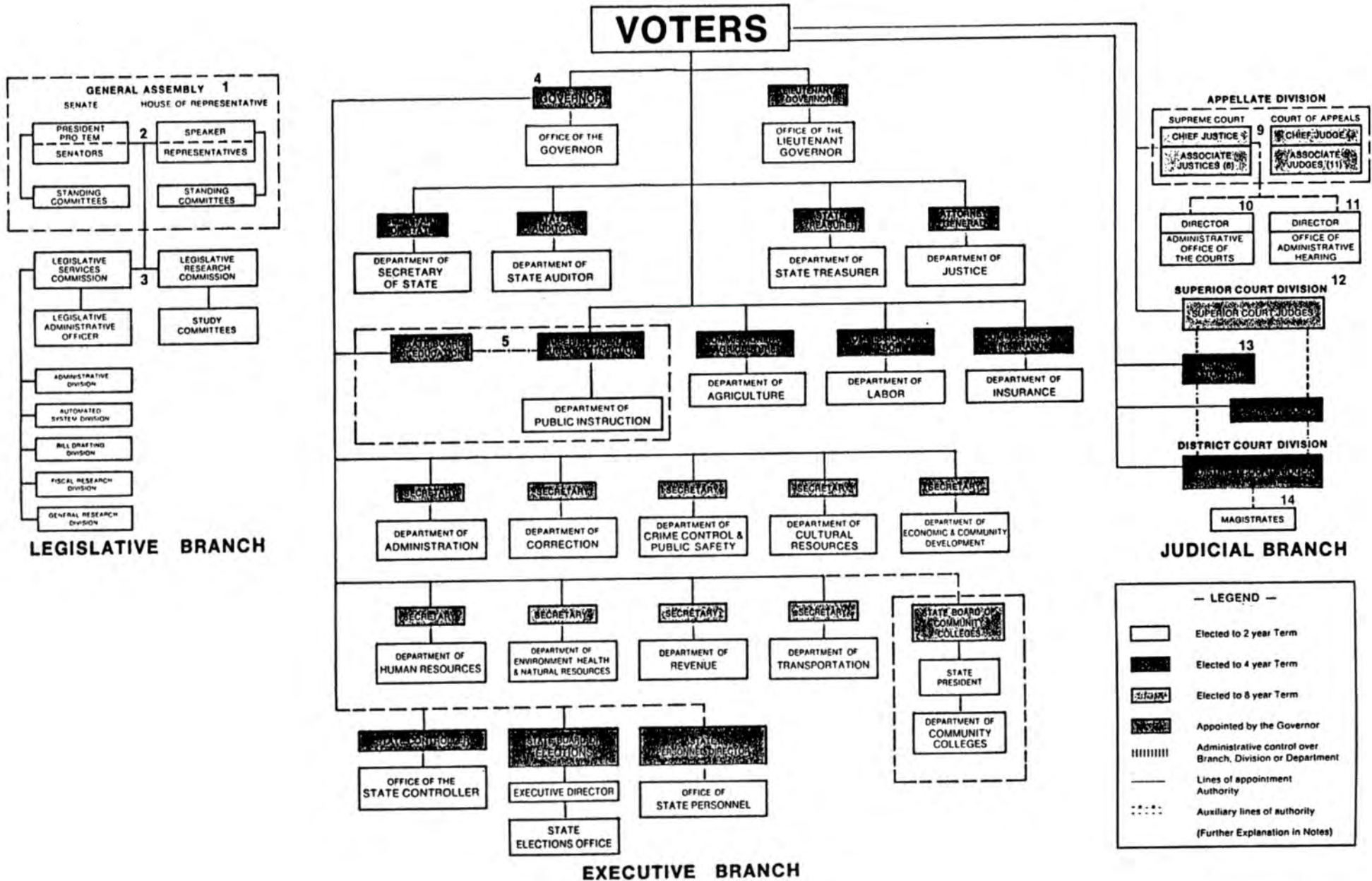

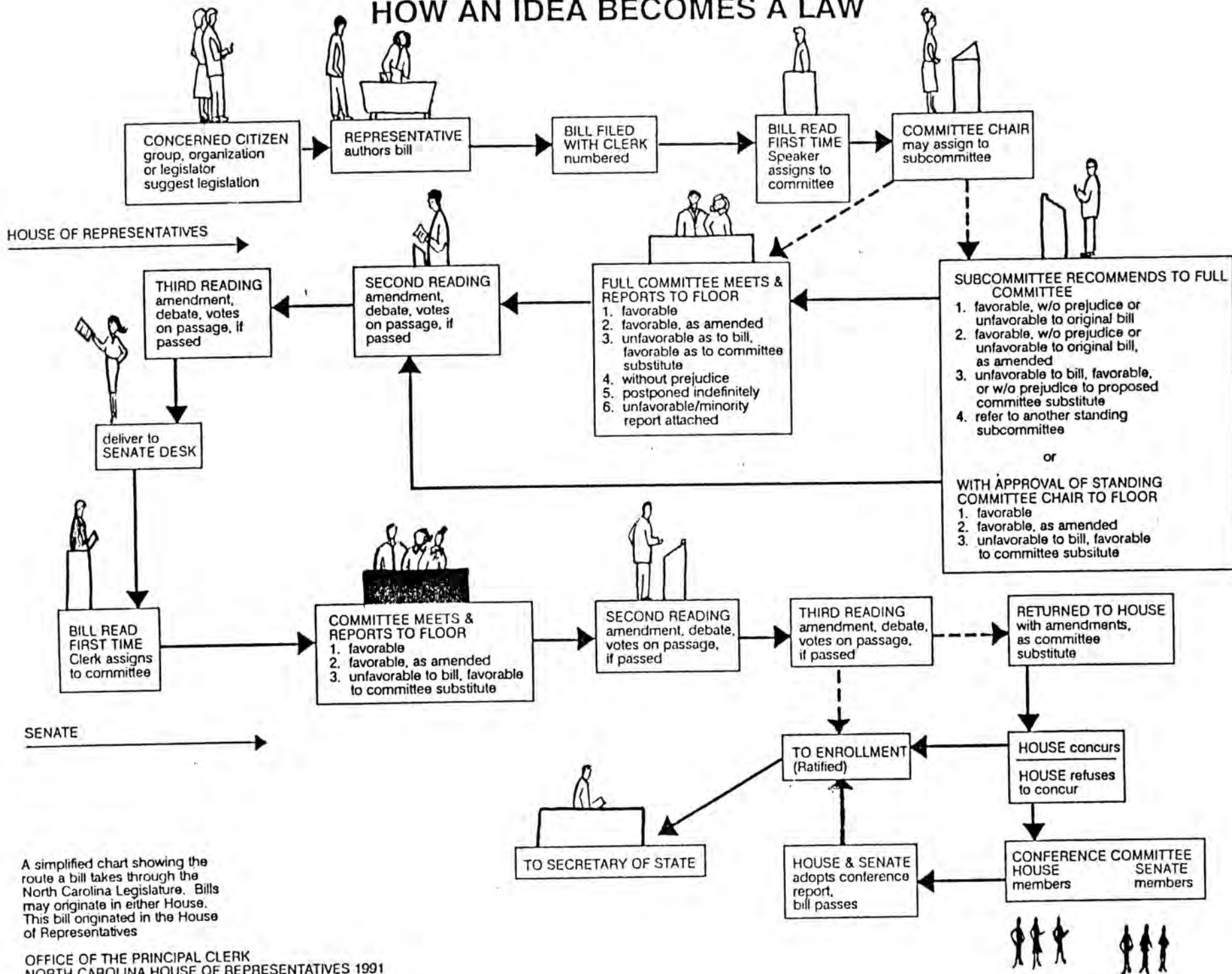


NOTES OF EXPLANATION

1. The North Carolina General Assembly is divided into two houses—the Senate with 50 members and the House of Representatives with 120. The Lieutenant Governor is presiding officer of the Senate and is called the President of the Senate. The Speaker is the presiding officer of the House of Representatives and is elected by the representatives from among their members.
2. Legislators are appointed to one or more committees within their respective houses by the President Pro Tem in the Senate and the Speaker in the House of Representatives.
3. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House serve on the Legislative Services and Legislative Research Commissions. They also appoint 5 members each from their respective houses to serve on the Legislative Research Commission and 6 each to serve on the Legislative Services Commission. The Legislative Administrative Officer is appointed by the Legislative Services Commission and provides administrative support to the Legislators.
4. The Governor and the other 9 elected officials of the Executive Branch form the Council of State. The heads—called "Secretaries"—of other executive departments are appointed by the Governor and serve at his pleasure.
5. The State Board of Education serves as "head" of the Department of Public Instruction. 11 of its 14 members are appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the General Assembly in joint session. The Lieutenant Governor, State Treasurer, and Superintendent of Public Instruction, who is secretary to the Board, are *ex officio* members. The Superintendent of Public Instruction is the administrative head of the Department of Public Instruction and is elected by the citizens of North Carolina.
6. The State Board of Community Colleges governs the North Carolina Community College System. The system is comprised of 58 colleges and the Department of Community Colleges. The Board is made up of ten members appointed by the Governor, eight appointed by the General Assembly, and two *ex officio*—the Lieutenant Governor and the State Treasurer. The President of the Community College System is elected by the State Board and is the administrative head of the Department.
7. The State Controller is appointed by the Governor, subject to the confirmation of the General Assembly in joint session. The term of office is 7 years.
8. The State Board of Elections is an autonomous agency whose members are appointed by the Governor. The Executive Director-Secretary is appointed by the board and with a supporting staff provides administrative services to the board and to the local boards of elections in the counties.
9. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court designates one of the Judges of the Court of Appeals as Chief Judge. The Chief Justice also designates one of District Court Judges in each district as Chief District Court Judge.
10. The Administrative Office of the Courts provides administrative and research assistance to all levels of the Judicial System. The Director is appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.
11. The Director of the Office of Administrative Hearings is appointed by the Chief Justice for a term of 4 years.
12. North Carolina is divided into numerous Judicial Districts.
13. District Attorneys serve as prosecuting officers at both the Superior and District Court levels. The Clerks of Court in each county also serve both courts.
14. Magistrates—1 or more in each county, are appointed for two-year terms by the Senior Resident Superior Court Judge in each district and serve under the supervision of the Chief District Court Judge in their respective Districts.

GENERAL NOTE: If a vacancy should occur in any elected office in State Government, the Governor is empowered under various sections in the Constitution to make temporary appointments to fill said vacancy until the next election for members of the General Assembly, provided the vacancy occurs 60 days prior to the election.

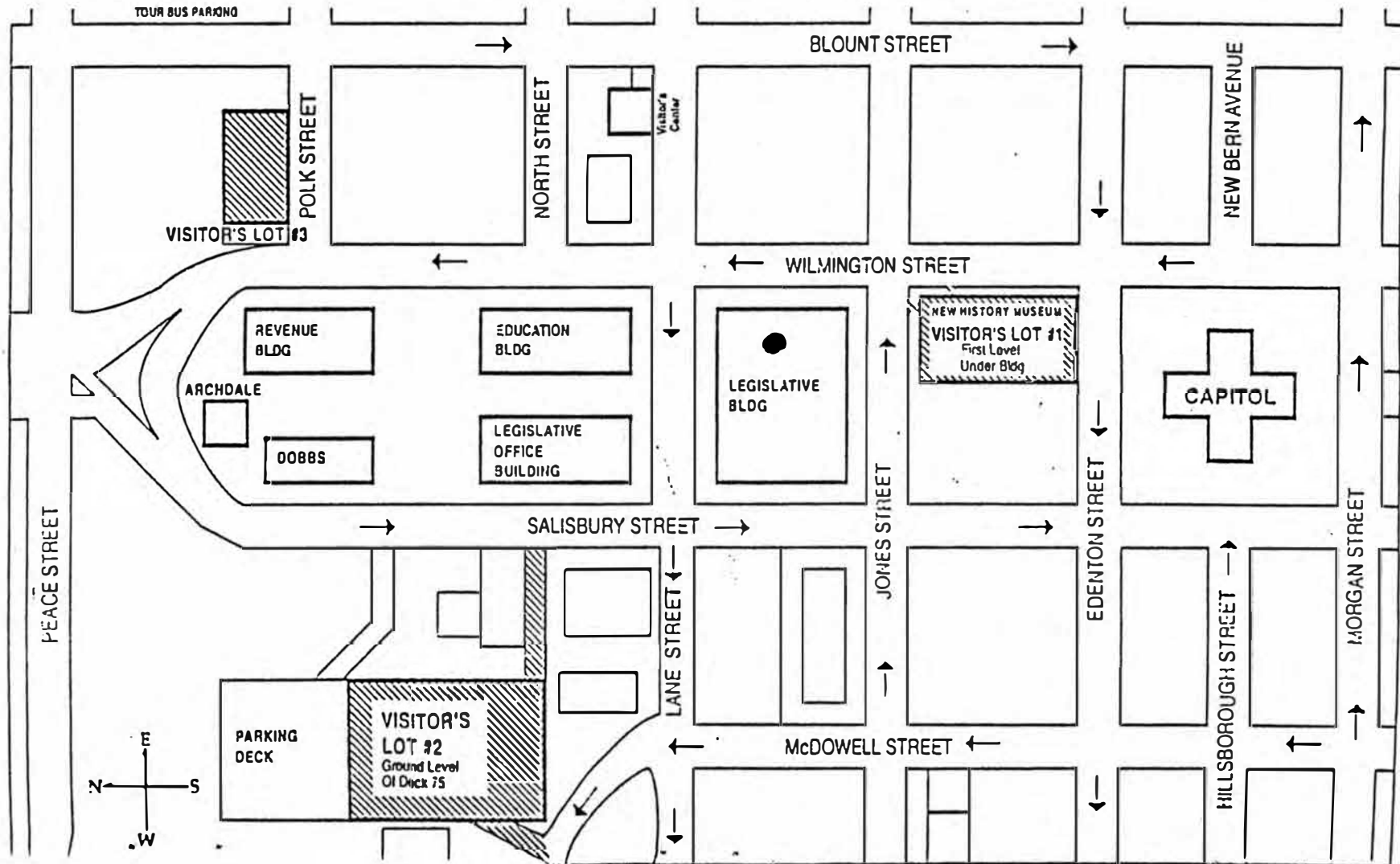

Dear Mr. Majahad:

Thank you for sharing with me your thoughts on the need for HIV/AIDS education in prisons. As you know, the President appointed me National AIDS Policy Coordinator to lead the Federal government and the Nation in the fight against HIV/AIDS. The President and I are committed to stopping the spread of HIV, to provide adequate care for those already infected and to finding a cure for AIDS as soon as possible.

I am encouraged to hear of your interest in obtaining HIV/AIDS prevention education in prisons. As you may know, the health issues of most prison systems in the country are decided at the state and local levels, where corrections authorities decide what will be the individual policies in specific jurisdictions. As National AIDS Policy Coordinator, I support addressing health issues in a comprehensive fashion, which includes providing the information and resources necessary for inmates to protect themselves from exposure to HIV. I believe that this comprehensive approach must be appropriate for the age and cultural background of the inmates and must educate individuals on a positive self-perception. I also believe the families and relatives must be involved in encouraging the inmates to take the steps necessary to protect themselves and those around them once outside the prison.

We are working with various Federal departments and agencies on expanding programs to include HIV/AIDS prevention throughout the country. As you indicate in your letter, the issue of HIV/AIDS prevention in prisons is a very complex one, as the behaviors that place people at risk for HIV may not be of the type that corrections authority may be able to address adequately. However, it is important that individuals such as yourself continue to raise your voices about the need to provide for the health needs of prison inmates.

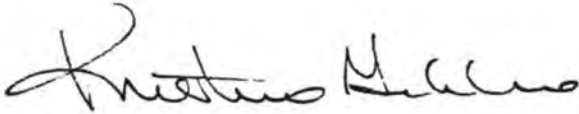

Dear Ms. Gebby,

I am writing this letter concerning the spread of AIDS to our children. I am presently incarcerated in the State of Massachusetts at N.C.C.I. Gardner. YES, I am a recovering addict who has seen what AIDS does to people and have been following the AIDS issue since the early 1980's. I'm also a father of two children, A daughter 11 years old and a son 20 years old, who enlisted in the U.S. Army on September 15, 1993.

Personally I am not H.I.V. positive. My concern is for my two children and societies children. I'm sure you are concerned about your children contracting the H.I.V. virus. As you well know anyone may unknowingly become H.I.V. infected. Even with all our percautionary measures and education there are not any guarantees we can't be infected.

I would like to point out to you what the Department of Corrections in Massachusetts is allowing to happen. I had the unfortunate experience to be court ordered to the Addiction Center located at the Bridgewater Complex in Bridgewater Massachusetts. What I observed during me 30 day stay at the Addiction Center was a crime. I don't know if the Commonwealth of Massachusetts is aware what is happening at this complex or not. I've been persuing this matter with local agencies without any results. Who's going to listen to a recovering addict and convict ? I hope you have time to give this letter and grave issue very careful consideration. If not, please contact the proper agencies to handle such a situation . From the articles I read in the news paper you seem to be very concerned about the spread and control of AIDS. Will you please do something !!

To explain what went on at the Addiction Center I'll start by saying that the Administration didn't care or couldn't

comprehend what they were allowing to happen. During my stay there I observed many things. The main issue here is how young men ranging from the age of 17 to 20 were sharing razors to shave and give each other haircuts. I even watched people use razors taken out of trash barrels. I don't believe they knew any better. I brought this to the Administration. I first made the head correctional officer aware of the situation. his response was, "don't worry about it, thats on them" from there I went directly to won of the superintendents without any results. Finally I had to call my wife. My wife had to threaten Thomas Rapone, Commisioner of the Department of Safety, David Mulligan Commissioner of Department of Public Health and Larry DuBois Commissioner of the Department of Corrections my wife told them if something wasn't done about this situation she would go to the media.

Granted they made razors available and improved the the poor living conditions somewhat. During the end of my stay there things started to drift back to the way they were. They even went so far as to make sure I was put out of the building during the inspection of The Department of Safety's Commissioner Thomas Rapone. They painted, waxed and buffed the floors what they really did was sweep the problem under the rug.

From what I experienced in Massachusetts I can assume it is happening all across our country. If this is true I have a very real concern about my children and societies children. I hope you also see my concern. It seems that everyone in local government are afraid to cause any waves. This is my reason for writing to you. From what I understand you are known as President Clinton's AIDS Czar.

There are many other issues in our prison system. I feel this issue needs attention first and now. Most of these young adults sent to the Addiction Center may never see prison walls again, but unknowingly become H.I.V. infected. They will go out having sex and getting married spreading AIDS even faster. I'm sure you are aware of the high percentage of AIDS in the prison population.

Please Ms. Gebby give my request for assistance very careful consideration. If you need any testimony concerning this issue please contact me. I may get alot of flack by writing this letter, but I feel this issue is very serious. I hope you agree and respond as soon as possible.

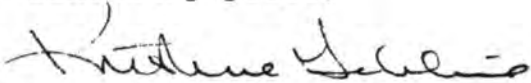

Dear Mr. Maddox:

Thank you for sharing your thoughts on HIV/AIDS Prevention among homosexual men. As National AIDS Policy Coordinator, I am devoted to the development and implementation of policies that will stop the spread of HIV. I am encouraged by the interest of individuals on the complex issues of HIV/AIDS prevention. Your comments focus on whether I believe it is proper to educate young men on how to have homosexual sex.

The history of AIDS prevention is one which has been shrouded in misinformation. I believe, and I am supported by research conducted in various populations groups, that in order to stop the transmission of HIV, we must address the issues from a public health standpoint. After almost thirteen years of the HIV/AIDS epidemic, we understand that the primary mode of transmission of HIV (and other STDs) is through unprotected sex.

Individuals may engage in the same sexual behavior while using a latex condom consistently and correctly and will effectively prevent the spread of HIV. In fact, research shows that HIV transmission occurs in situations where individuals do not use condoms at all or use condoms inconsistently or incorrectly. The research stresses the fact that it is not whether it is two men or a man and a woman, but rather the exchange of bodily fluids, that places people at risk for HIV.

Also, after almost thirteen years since the beginning of the epidemic, our messages are couched in a deeply held belief that all life is precious, and that we must safeguard all those that are entrusted to our care. My primary aim is to promote programs and educational campaigns that are flexible enough to address the needs of those who choose to abstain as well as those who choose to be sexually active. In order to do this effectively, it is my belief that the messages must speak the language of those we are trying to reach. If the language will prevent some from hearing the more important message of HIV/AIDS prevention, then it may not be the correct message to concentrate on.

Finally, I have been entrusted by the President with the task of protecting the lives of all Americans, regardless of race, creed, gender, age or sexual orientation. Our Constitution grants the right to life to all those fortunate enough to be born under our flag. In order to safeguard their safety, it is imperative that we do not confuse the message and that we understand that we are all equal under the American flag and are entitled to its protection.

Thank you for sharing with me information on your educational materials entitled Condom Man. As you know, the Office of National AIDS Policy was created out of the commitment of the President to take positive steps to stop the HIV/AIDS epidemic. As National AIDS Policy Coordinator, I, like you, am devoted to the development and implementation of policies that will stop the spread of HIV. Effective education for young men and women is paramount in this effort.

I have closely looked at your materials and am very encouraged by your interest in the area of HIV/AIDS prevention. As we work to stop HIV/AIDS, I want to hear about new concepts and ideas that individuals may have on this subject. To reach individuals at risk, we must use prevention education materials that speak the language of those at risk and are population specific. That means the message must take into account the specific cultural background of the intended audience. Twelve years of the epidemic have shown that blanket campaigns may not be as effective as targeted ones.

In order to make your product more popular, it may be possible for you to market directly to the organizations that provide HIV/AIDS prevention interventions for people at risk for HIV. In the United States there are over 2,000 community based organizations that provide HIV/AIDS prevention and services. Combining your idea with the ideas you have on fundraising would make your product very appealing to these organizations. In order to obtain a complete listing of AIDS-related organizations, you may want to contact the National AIDS Clearinghouse at (800) 458-5231. They can conduct a search of organizations for you.

You may also want to market your Prophylactic Pals through existing networks of national non-profit organizations that engage in HIV/AIDS prevention activities. Among these are the

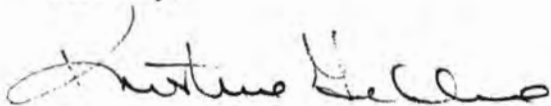

"SUPER HERO FOR THE 90's"

Shying away from protection

■ The recently approved condom for women is not creating the interest its manufacturers thought it would. The likely reasons? Expense, ignorance and downright distaste for the revolutionary device.

Step into the smallish restroom at Planned Parenthood in Tampa, and your nose almost scrapes the grim statistics tacked to the wall.

"Sex now leading HIV cause in women," one headline blares. "Women may become No. 1 AIDS target," warns another.

Out in the waiting room, the news is no better. The walls of wisdom remind women that they contract sexually

transmitted diseases more easily than men. That fewer than one-third of sexually active men between 20 and 39 reported using a condom over a four-week survey period. That health authorities think about 1-million people carry the virus that causes AIDS.

Can a date with Reality change any of this?

It's too soon to know. So far, women have been reluctant to embrace Reality, the only female condom on the American market. Since making its debut at Planned Parenthood in November, Reality has remained tucked in the bottom of a locked file cabinet, unclaimed by the very women expected to snap it up.

"I'm not sure if it's because of the cost or because they're unfamiliar with it or because they don't like it," said Kathy Herrmann, Planned Parenthood's area director.

Probably some or all of the above.

Approved by the Food and Drug Administration last May, the Reality condom won't be in stores until spring. It's an odd-looking device that resembles a traditional condom crossed with a miniature windsock. At \$5 for a three-pack at Planned Parent-

hood, it costs more than many women can pay, particularly when compared with the cost of traditional condoms.

But Herrmann and others anticipate the unfamiliarity with Reality will fade especially once the manufacturer, Wisconsin Pharmacal, blitzes the public with an information and advertising campaign and once the product is more readily available.

"I expect as women become more familiar with it and as they become more educated about disease control the use and demand will increase," Herrmann said.

Like traditional condoms, Reality is designed for one-time use. It can be inserted a couple of hours before it is needed. Constructed of polyurethane as opposed to latex, it provides "a thin and very strong material that transmits heat and is very resistant to rips and tears," said Holly Sherman, a spokeswoman for Wisconsin Pharmacal.

"It's very natural. A man doesn't have to do anything other than use it correctly," Sherman said. "It's not constricting to a man, and the woman

hardly feels it."

A list of outlets that provide Reality was not available, but Sherman said almost 300 public health and family planning clinics around the country have ordered it and are spreading the word to their clients about what it is and how it works.

Though many women are still shy about trying this method, three-quarters of those who gave it a chance said they liked the product and would use it again; 80 percent of the men concurred, Sherman said.

"You have to get used to anything that's new," she said. "Imagine what it was like when the diaphragm first came out."

Sherman hopes the product will be the protective method of preference for women who are already comfortable with using a female barrier method or who are sexually active but are unsure of their partner's history.

"For a lot of women, (the female condom) will be the choice. It adds a new alternative, a new weapon in the battle against AIDS and other STDs (sexually transmitted diseases)," she said.

"This was designed specifically to prevent the transmission of disease. The beauty of it is for the first time since the onset of the AIDS crisis, there is a new alternative under a woman's control with which she can protect herself. She doesn't have to ask a man in the heat of the moment to stop and put something on."

When it approved the condom last spring, the FDA did so with stipulations.

It required the product label to include the 26 percent annual

pregnancy rate, a high figure that was, the FDA said, "believed to have been the result of improper use of the device."

Sherman said the failure rate was based on typical use, which reflects a rather casual approach to protection.

"It's important to point out the difference between typical use — which means not necessarily using it with every sex act and not necessarily using it correctly — and perfect use," she said.

Printed information released by Wisconsin Pharmacal compares Reality's 13 percent pregnancy rate over six months to the 9 percent rate attributed with use of latex condoms for men.

The comparable rate of pregnancy with other barrier methods is 10 percent for cervical caps, 8

percent for diaphragms and 12 percent for contraceptive sponges, none of which prevent disease.

Surprisingly, disease prevention is not often a main concern of women seeking birth control devices from Planned Parenthood. Most of the clients, women in their early 20s, still favor birth control pills over other contraceptive methods and think STDs are other people's problems, Herrmann said.

"They understand birth control pills. They know they're not going to get pregnant if they take them every day on time," she said.

"We still have women say, 'Oh no, I only go out with nice boys.'"

Herrmann's face crinkles. "People do not have a tattoo on their forehead that says: 'I've got a sexually transmittable diseases. I'm contagious.'"

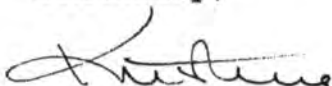
Thank you for drawing my attention to the licensing of antisense related technology from the NIH to the private sector.

As you know, the transfer of technology developed in federal laboratories to the private sector is critical and important for drug development. There should be a mechanism to expeditiously facilitate this transfer within the regulatory and legal framework at the NIH. Dr. Varmus' letter to Rep. Joseph Kennedy indicated that the NIH has been reviewing the licensing progress of its antisense related technology.

The Office of Technology Transfer at the NIH has expressed to my Office that Hybridon, or other companies developing antisense technology, should be able to obtain this technology from the NIH in the near future. You may want to contact Dr. Paul Tran of my staff at (202) 690-5560 for a further discussion. I also understand that the NIH will be running a workshop on technology transfer under CRADA on June 27-28, 1994.

As the National AIDS Policy Coordinator, I strongly support HIV/AIDS related research and development, and regulatory processes which would expedite the development of drugs and vaccine for HIV/AIDS.

The immune systems of babies develop whether or not they are breast fed by their mothers. Those babies who are breast-fed, however, have the advantage of receiving some of the anti-bodies that their mother's have developed throughout their lifetime. This early protection is especially beneficial to the newborn while its own immune system is still developing. For this reason breast-feeding is recommended over formula feeding by many neo-natal care providers. Unfortunately, research has shown that HIV+ mothers can transmit the AIDS virus to their babies through breast-feeding. [cc]

Recently, greater emphasis has been put on designing research to determine how to restore the immune systems of those infected with HIV and other immuno-suppressive diseases. Hopefully, this research will be produce useful results.

It is not within the purview of the Office of National AIDS Policy to determine the merits of any particular potential cure. I am forwarding your letter to the Office of AIDS Research at the National Institutes of Health for their information. Thank you for sharing your thoughts on this issue with me.

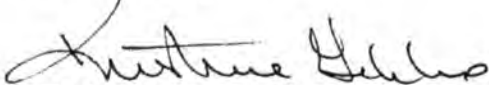

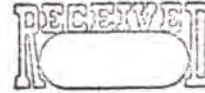

Dear Ms. Gebbie,

I have had the pleasure of hearing your speech at the annual Vermont CARES dinner, and compliment you on your assessment of the AIDS problem, but especially on your composure in the light of the intense pressure you must be under.

Although my sending you this is a shot in the dark, and I in no way claim to know the solution to AIDS, I truly beleive that this is worth looking into. And only real people, as have been brought to power with the Clinton administration, can have the guts to seriously consider alternatives that might cause ripples or tidal waves in the status quo.

Personally I have used 714-X to overcome AIDS (I was on my deathbed in the fall of '87), and although I'm still HIV+, I lead a highly productive life and have been able to return to the workforce and contribute to my collectivity.

Ideally 714-X is used in tandem with a somatoscope (or adapted microscope); the health care product was developed with the help of the somatoscope. This powerful diagnostic tool, or its adapted counterpart, helps establish the condition of the body's "terrain" (the body's potential of developing health problems, or overall state of the immune system are thusly determined). The blood can indicate a complete deregulation even if few conventional tests confirm such. At such an early stage of organic function deregulation a minimum of 714-X (usually three consecutive series) as well as appropriate dietary and mental changes are enough to avoid the horrendous experience of cancer, or of other degenerative diseases altogether. Since these optical tools are not yet widely available wide scale preventive testing is only a desireable goal while preventive treating is only an illumined dream.

In spite of its ideal purpose 714-X has been extensively used by humans in more advanced stages of degenerative diseases. The non-toxic and innocuous properties of 714-X make it appealing as a first therapeutic effort, an adjunct to other efforts, or simply as a last beneficial resort.

Since its first human use in 1977 (for prostate cancer) 714-X has proven itself beneficial -subjectively or otherwise- for innumerable anecdotal cases, and for various illnesses; most of these success stories, however, are not considered medically documented since their follow-ups do not conform to the rigorous criteria required for the compilation of medical statistics.

Included you will find a few articles of interest. Also you will find an order form for highly enlightening videotapes. I highly recommend "Somatidian Orthobiology" since this videotape contains a good overview of Mr. Naessens' theory, and of 714-X and its applications. As in all the videotapes it has images taken from the somatoscope itself. I am sending you a complimentary copy of this videotape since it is a most appreciated medium of communication.

Mr. Naessens is legally bound and no longer sees laypeople as patients. On rare occasions he sees Doctors or other health professionals, but he cannot speak about health with laypeople. Therefore blood tests with him are impossible. If an illness has been medically diagnosed, however, there is no real reason to perform a live blood test using the Naessens' method since it is primarily used to prediagnose certain ills.

Here in Canada, a patient wishing to use 714-X must find a doctor willing to call Health and Welfare Canada's Emergency Drug Release Programme (613-941-2108, FX:613-941-3194) to obtain a special permission to use this health care product for a specific patient. After two years of supplying Canadian citizens/doctors free of charge (with the hope that sufficient interest would lead to clinical research), Mr. Naessens and C.O.S.E. Inc. were forced to review this position in January '93 because of the great demand.

I hope that Mr. Naessens' ground breaking research is deemed worthy of further research from the current administration. I remain at your disposal if you should need more information.

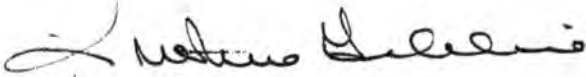

Although we can assist in directing individuals to sources of federal funding, we do not make determinations as to whether a particular program should be funded. Similarly, as National AIDS Policy Coordinator, I cannot direct any Federal government entity to fund any activity outside of their own processes and procedures.

I have shared the information on your letter with the Office of the Associate Director (HIV) at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). As you may know, CDC is the Federal agency that has taken the lead in the conduct of programs to stop the spread of HIV. You may obtain additional information on available sources of funding from the National AIDS Clearinghouse at (800) 458-5231.

- During the past two years, cumulative reported AIDS cases have increased 50% for young people aged 13 to 19 years of age.
- AIDS is a leading cause of death for males 19 - 45 years of age.
- One in every 250 persons in the United States is infected with HIV.
- Seventy percent of teenagers are sexually active by the age of 19.

TEENS T.A.P. (Teens Teaching AIDS Prevention) is a program of Good Samaritan Project, a not-for-profit corporation (501(c)3) located in Kansas City, Missouri. Good Samaritan Project is the oldest and largest AIDS service organization in the Kansas City area. The agency was founded in June, 1985, in response to community needs for education and human services. The purpose of Good Samaritan Project is to assist persons with HIV/AIDS, their families and loved ones, and the Greater Kansas City community by providing emotional, educational and financial support.

The purpose of **TEENS T.A.P.** is to provide education, support and referrals about HIV/AIDS for teens by teens through the only national hotline dedicated for teens on this topic. **TEENS T.A.P.** was established in 1987 by area teenagers who approached Good Samaritan Project about starting an HIV/AIDS educational program for teenagers. The national hotline began in April, 1988, and currently operates Monday through Friday from 4:00 - 8:00 p.m. CST. All teens who staff the phonelines receive extensive training before participating in the program. An adult supervisor is present during the operation of the hotline. One hundred fifty teenagers are currently enrolled in the program.

TEENS T.A.P. receives approximately 2,500 calls per month.

In March of this year, a full-time **TEENS T.A.P.** supervisor was hired to administer the daily operation of the program. This includes phoneline recruitment and training through Kansas City area schools, speaking engagements to community groups, schools, churches and the workplace about transmission/prevention of HIV disease and basic AIDS 101 information.

The National Commission on AIDS made a site visit to Good Samaritan Project in 1992 and recommended that the **TEENS T.A.P.** program be funded by the Centers for Disease Control because it is an outstanding program serving all 50 states.

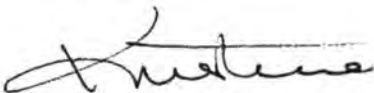

On April 27, 1994, the World AIDS Day Advisory Committee convened for the first World AIDS Day 1994 committee meeting. The members listed above from various organizations introduced themselves and the function of their respective associations. New member organizations represented by Barney Singer and Tanya L. Dean were present and welcomed to the committee. New member organizations of this year's advisory committee that were not present are AIDS Action Council and Dignity/USA National AIDS Project. A suggestion was made to invite the Names Project Foundation to serve on the advisory committee.

After the introduction of representatives of the member organizations, Richard L. Wittenberg welcomed all attendees and gave a brief overview of World AIDS Day. He emphasized that World AIDS Day, December 1, is a day for people all over the world to share the prevailing challenges that AIDS creates concerning research, care, and prevention. The challenges and achievements of World AIDS Day 1993 were then presented by Jessica Muro in her World AIDS Day 1993 Follow Up Report.

The focal point of the meeting was to determine a unifying theme for a poster design and national promotion of World AIDS Day 1994. WHO designated the theme as "AIDS and The Family". However, none of the committee members were in favor of using this theme in the United States because feelings arose that it was exclusive, offensive, and non-action oriented. "The Family" might be conveyed solely as The Family in the traditional sense- father, mother, 2 kids and a dog. However, we want to emphasize the family in the grandest sense- family means something different to everyone and includes

all loved ones and support groups in different areas of one's life. AIDS has created new families, revolutionized the family, brought families together as well as turned them upside down. Therefore, Family is a very powerful word and although controversial can be used to convey a sense of empowerment, inclusivity, and agency without becoming offensive. Some suggestions included "AIDS and OUR Families," "AIDS affects us all," and "Our Family of Humankind". Many good points concerning the theme were brought to the table. However, the perfect theme has yet to emerge from our collective images and thoughts related to AIDS and family.

Richard L. Wittenberg introduced the possibility of collaborating with Johns Hopkins University, School of Hygiene and Public Health, and the National Basketball Players Association (NBPA) HIV/AIDS Program. Mr. Wittenberg presented possible cooperative activities, such as half time shows on HIV/AIDS prevention by basketball stars taking place during at least 6 NBA games on December 1, 1994. The committee felt that although basketball was a good avenue to target youths, it was not appropriate and of broad enough interest to serve as our main focus for this year's national activity. Therefore, the committee was in favor of collaborating with this group as a side effort to promote HIV/AIDS awareness among all populations but was not in favor of using this activity as an outlet for a poster design and resource booklet cover in promoting World AIDS Day 1994.

The committee discussed the opportunities of coordinating the national promotion of World AIDS Day 1994 in Washington D.C. more intimately with the federal government in 1994. Richard L. Wittenberg explained that this was one of AAWH's goal and will be facilitated by the addition of Kristine Gebbie and Tanya L. Dean from the Office of National AIDS Policy to the advisory committee.

Another focus of the meeting was to discuss the resource booklet and possible additions and changes to be considered. The committee agreed that the resource books for World AIDS Day 1994 should be in the hands of leaders and coordinators by labor day weekend. The committee gave recommendations to change the layout of the booklet to make more user friendly. To promote more coordination, some members suggested placing the "Call to Action" section with ideas and directions for planning activities in the front of booklet and moving the educational sections towards the end of the booklet. The majority of the committee agreed that it was pertinent to keep the educational material in the book, such as the sections on prevention and STDs, to allow individuals with easy access to concise and simplistic information. However, the main goal of our resource materials is to empower individuals and community leaders with the information and ideas to make their job as planners and coordinators as easy as possible. Therefore, it was suggested that a call to action section be tailored to specific communities and sectors of society.

Two subcommittees of the advisory group were formed. The Resource Kit Subcommittee will help develop the 1994 Resource booklet and distribute it within the United States. The Promotion Planning/Funding Subcommittee will be responsible for developing an action strategy for the promotion of World AIDS Day 1994 to include coordination with Federal Agencies, in addition to identifying possible sources of funding. Those members who expressed interest to serve as active participants on these subcommittees will be notified upon determination of meeting dates.

WORLD AIDS DAY 1994: "AIDS AND THE FAMILY"

The World Health Organization (WHO) has chosen **"AIDS and the Family"** as its theme for World AIDS Day 1994, reflecting the fact that this year is the International Year of the Family. In the coming months, and in special events on and around 1 December, WHO urges the world to focus especially on how **families** are affected by AIDS, how **families** can become more effective in both AIDS prevention and care, and on how **families** can contribute to global efforts against the disease.

"Families whose bonds are based on love, trust, nurture and openness are best placed to protect their members from infection and to give compassionate care and support to those affected by HIV or AIDS", says Dr Michael Merson, Executive Director of WHO's Global Programme on AIDS (GPA). "Families are also the place where the young learn to practise safe behaviour and reject discrimination. If we all do our utmost within our families of choice - whether they are the people who share our home or those who share our planet - we shall help immeasurably to defeat AIDS in every family."

In the mid-1990s, many families are already disrupted by political upheaval, civil unrest, migration, and other factors. For millions of them, the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) is an additional burden and growing threat.

In early 1994, according to GPA estimates, around 13 million women, men and children were living with HIV and AIDS worldwide. The problem would be devastating enough if limited to these people alone, but it also has enormous repercussions on their families. Apart from the huge emotional loss of people dear to them, the families will also face a loss of income as breadwinners sicken and die; a loss of care, nurturing and stability; and in rural areas - as AIDS takes its toll on the labour available to till family plots - even a loss of food supply.

Increasingly, it is children who are paying the price of AIDS - not only through the loss of their parents, but also by becoming infected themselves. In 1993, about 700 000 children were born to HIV-positive women in Africa alone. Most of those born infected face an early death; those not infected will soon be orphaned. And if grandparents or other relatives cannot or will not step in with the family support needed, the children may have to leave home and fend for themselves.

Our concept of family is not limited to relationships of blood, marriage, sexual partnership or adoption. It extends to a broad range of groups whose bonds are based on feelings of trust, mutual support and a shared destiny. This means that groups of street children, sex worker collectives and self-help circles of drug injectors are "families". So are religious associations or support groups of people living with HIV and AIDS, and networks of governmental, nongovernmental and intergovernmental organizations. And any company - from the corner shop to the largest global corporation - can regard its workforce as a family to protect and support.

By early 1994, since the start of the pandemic, an estimated 15 million men, women and children had been infected with HIV. Every day, 5000 new infections occur, and the cumulative total of infections could more than double by the end of the century unless the world devotes far more energy and resources to AIDS prevention.

Designed to raise public awareness of AIDS and spur the response, World AIDS Day was observed for the first time on 1 December 1988. The most recent themes were "Sharing the Challenge" (1991), "A Community Commitment" (1992) and "Time to Act" (1993).

Hundreds of thousands of people worldwide took place in last year's events and activities, which included concerts, speeches, marches, seminars, workshops, radio features, street theatre, and special condom promotions.

**"Long haul on AIDS - no shortcuts,
and no let-up on international commitment to combat AIDS",
says WHO AIDS Executive Director**

"The AIDS crisis will be with us until well into the 21st century", says the Executive Director of the World Health Organization (WHO) Global Programme on AIDS (GPA). "If we fail to tackle it vigorously at this point, it will simply snowball out of control - and by then, action will be just as inevitable - but harder and far, far more expensive."

Michael H. Merson, M.D., speaking on the eve of a US Congressional hearing on 28 April,* said: "The fight against AIDS will be a long haul with colossal economic and social consequences if we fail. An AIDS epidemic out of control will set back hard-won development gains and waste billions of dollars which have already been invested in the health and well-being of many of the poorest nations in the world."

Dr Merson said that AIDS has already had a devastating effect on sub-Saharan Africa and, unless existing prevention efforts are scaled up dramatically, Asia and Latin America, with seven times as many people, will suffer similar consequences.

The World Health Organization estimates that 15 million men, women and children have become infected with HIV since the start of this pandemic. Only one-fifth of them have gone on to develop AIDS. Five thousand people are being infected with HIV every day and, unless action to slow the spread of the virus is expanded very soon, at least 30 to 40 million people will have been infected by the end of the century. Inevitably, the worst is yet to come in terms of disease, death and related suffering.

WHO has calculated that in order to mount effective HIV prevention efforts worldwide, there needs to be a ten-fold increase in present spending. The funds that donor governments contribute for HIV prevention in developing countries are usually allocated in two ways: bilaterally - through direct payments to HIV/AIDS projects in developing countries, or multilaterally - through organizations such as the World Health Organization, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), or UNICEF.

"The people of the United States have consistently shown themselves to be willing to support efforts aimed at alleviating hunger, malnutrition, rapid population growth, disease, illiteracy, and other basic problems of the developing world. Since 1986, that support and compassion has extended to the global effort against AIDS. The importance of American agencies such as USAID, the National Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the National Institutes of Health (NIH) cannot be overstated."

Since 1987, USAID has committed over US\$ 500 million to assist developing countries in their efforts to prevent HIV infection. This figure includes multilateral support to WHO. USAID has been the single largest financial supporter of WHO's Global Programme on AIDS Trust Fund, contributing over US\$ 145 million multilaterally between 1986 and 1993. Last year USAID provided US\$ 34 million to the core budget of GPA.

But the support from USAID goes beyond its financial contributions. GPA and USAID have a good record of technical collaboration in areas such as AIDS programme evaluation - an unusually complex challenge because of the nature of HIV infection. The two agencies have jointly developed 10 indicators of achievement which national AIDS programmes around the world can use to measure their success in preventing new infections.

CDC also works closely with the Global Programme on AIDS in many areas, including training on epidemiological surveillance and the development of microcomputer systems for data analysis. NIH and GPA are working together in the field of HIV vaccine development, in particular, on the WHO Network for HIV Isolation and Characterization, and establishing and maintaining cohorts at WHO sponsored vaccine evaluation sites in four countries.

"Simply to list the roles of GPA and USAID and the other US agencies such as CDC and NIH is to demonstrate how they reinforce and complement one another. To take USAID/GPA collaboration as an example, GPA works with all developing countries around the world, helping them set up, strengthen and coordinate their national AIDS programmes, while USAID focuses on selected countries, helping them implement and finance their plans. As an intergovernmental agency, WHO works in partnership primarily with national governments, while USAID is able to complement these partnerships by working with community-based, nongovernmental organizations."

As the multifaceted nature of the AIDS pandemic has become apparent, other agencies of the United Nations system have joined in the response to AIDS. The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), the World Bank, and WHO are now all major players in the fight against AIDS.

Last year discussions began to establish a single programme combining the joint expertise and competence of the six UN agencies. Speaking with one voice, this Programme would be in a position to deliver the strongest possible support to countries in their fight to bring the epidemic under control.

Even though there is no vaccine, experience shows that AIDS can be prevented through education, condom promotion, and improved services for the treatment of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs).

Well researched and well designed prevention programmes for STDs and HIV can drastically change sexual behaviour and increase condom use. Condom sales in Africa rose from less than two million a year in 1986 to more than 70 million in 1993, thanks largely to condom social marketing programmes. The 20 million subsidized condoms sold in Zaire in 1991 are estimated to have prevented 25 000 cases of AIDS.

In addition to promoting the use of condoms, another key strategy for HIV prevention is prompt, effective treatment for syphilis, gonorrhoea, chancroid and other STDs. These diseases, if left untreated, make people far more susceptible to both acquiring and passing on HIV infection. The World Bank 1993 *World Development Report* states that preventing HIV and other STDs is one of the most cost-effective ways to improve the world's health. In the developing countries of the world, it would cost US\$ 1.5 to 2.9 billion per year to set up and run effective prevention programmes that could avert nearly 10 million infections by the end of the century. A tremendous return on an investment in HIV and AIDS prevention.

"The international effort to bring the AIDS epidemic under control owes a great deal to the financial, technical and human contributions of the United States. This country has been the world leader in the fight. But the fight cannot be won with the resources currently available, even though those involved in the AIDS effort are doing their utmost to wring every ounce of value out of each dollar spent", says Dr Merson.

"There are those who might argue that the epidemic within America's borders appears to be stabilizing. Isn't it time for America to pull back on the AIDS effort? The answer is a resounding no. In this tightly interconnected world, no nation can insulate itself from the epidemic. A temperate climate, a well developed infrastructure will not keep this particular virus at bay. HIV needs no exotic mosquito for a vector; what it needs to spread and multiply is ordinary human behaviour, found here as everywhere else. In a very direct sense, American citizens stand to gain from their country's contribution to the international effort, including scientific progress in uncovering the many remaining mysteries of AIDS. Whatever we learn about prevention and care through the international fight will be of direct benefit to all Americans."
