SALLY L. SATEL, M.D. is assistant professor of psychiatry at the Yale University School of Medicine. She received a B.S. from Cornell University, an M.S. from the University of Chicago, and her medical degree from Brown University. After completing a residency in psychiatry at Yale School of Medicine in 1988, Dr. Satel joined the faculty as the director of Inpatient Substance Abuse Services within the Substance Abuse Division where she conducted a research program in cocaine addiction, funded by NIDA and the Veterans Administration. Dr. Satel has published extensively on the phenomenological aspects of cocaine addiction and on pharmacotherapeutic approaches to cocaine craving and abuse. As education director in psychiatry at the VA campus, Dr. Satel developed a substance abuse curricula for medical students and psychiatry residents. She is a contributing editor to the Psychiatric Times, a widely read professional magazine, where her regular opinion column explores the interface between mental health issues and society. Dr. Satel's work with chronic mentally ill substance abusers led to her interest in disability entitlement systems and civil commitment statutes for patients with severe substance abuse problems.

ERIC W. TRUPIN, Ph.D., a child psychologist, is professor and vice chair in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences of the University of Washington School of Medicine. He is also director of the Division of Community Psychiatry and acting director of the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. Dr. Trupin received both his masters and doctoral degrees from the University of Wyoming. Dr. Trupin is a member of the Governor of Washington State's Task Force on Child Protective Services and chairs its Subcommittee on Foster Care. He also is an advisor and consultant to the judicial system, the Governor, legislators, and governmental administrators on issues such as involuntary commitment, mentally ill offenders, and special education programs. His research interests are focused in the areas of: prevalence and prevention of mental illness in children and adolescents; analysis and development of mental health public policy and service system integration for adults and children; and mentally ill youth and adults in the criminal justice system.

WILLIAM R. BRAITHWAITE, M.D., Ph.D., FACMI, is associate professor and head of the Section on Medical Informatics at the University of Colorado School of Medicine and an elected fellow of the American College of Medical Informatics. He received his medical degree from the University of Chicago and his Ph.D. in medical information science from the University of California, San Francisco. Dr. Braithwaite, who has practiced medicine in industrial, hospital, HMO, and general practice clinic environments, teaches epidemiology, biostatistics, and medical informatics to medical and graduate students and gives continuing education seminars teaching practicing physicians how to select and use computer systems in their offices. He serves on several advisory boards and committees including the Colorado Health Data Commission Advisory Panel, is an active member of the American Medical Informatics Association, has extensive expertise in the development of database systems for the support of clinical and basic science research, and has been the principal investigator on several grants. His main interests

are in making the practice of clinical and research medicine more effective for both patients and medical professionals through the development and use of computer based tools, and in improving medical and health policy decision making processes through the application of quantitative methods.

CONNIE R. CURRAN, Ed.D., R.N., F.A.A.N. is national director of Patient Care Services at APM, Inc., a private consulting firm that specializes in the areas of operations improvement and work restructuring programs. She is also editor of Nursing Economics, a fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, and a faculty member of American College of Healthcare Executives and the Estes Park Institute. Dr. Curran received her Ed.D. from Northern Illinois University, an M.S.N. from DePaul University, and a B.S.N. from the University of Wisconsin. Formerly, she was vice president of the American Hospital Association, and served as dean at the Medical College of Wisconsin and director of the Health Profession's Institute for the City University of New York. Dr. Curran, who has held a variety of executive positions in academic and health care organizations, including managing the nation's largest nursing department with a \$100 million budget and 2,500 registered nurses, has written more than 100 publications on health care management and is the director of two comprehensive national studies on nursing staff recruitment, retention, and labor market participation.

Biographical Statements

OLIVER T. FEIN, M.D. is associate clinical professor of medicine and public health at the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University. Dr. Fein practices primary care internal medicine and is director of General Medicine Outpatient Services at the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center. He received a B.A. from Swarthmore College and an M.D. from Case Western Reserve University. His residency training in internal medicine was completed at Lincoln Hospital in the Bronx. At Presbyterian Hospital, Dr. Fein initiated a faculty group practice designed to provide 24 hour/7 day per week physician access, continuity, and coordination of care for community patients. He also participated in building a network of four satellite community health centers in Northern Manhattan. His research interests include urban health care delivery systems, ambulatory case mix measurement, and the relationship of academic health centers to community populations. As director of Columbia University's Health of the Public Program, he has introduced community medicine and the population perspective to dental, medical, and nursing school curricula. Dr. Fein currently serves as chair of the Committee on Health Services Research of the APHA and chair of the Subcommittee on Health Care Reform of the Society of General Internal Medicine.

JEFFREY L. GELLER, M.D., M.P.H. is professor of psychiatry at the University of Massachusetts Medical School and director of public sector psychiatry at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center. Dr. Geller earned his B.A. from Williams College, his M.D. from the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine, and his M.P.H. from the Harvard University School of Public Health. Dr. Geller was an intern at the Philadelphia General Hospital and then a resident and fellow in psychiatry at the Beth Israel Hospital. Dr. Geller has spent most of his career in Massachusetts working with and for the chronically mentally ill with the exception of a two year stint in the Law and Psychiatry Program of the University of Pittsburgh. Dr. Geller is widely published in the area of mental health services research. He has a particular interest in the history of psychiatric services and recently completed a book, Women of the Asylum, which covers firsthand accounts of women in American psychiatric institutions between 1840 and 1945. Dr. Geller has served as a consultant to the Departments of Mental Health of New York and Virginia, to the Massachusetts Board of Registration in Medicine, and to the United States Department of Justice (Civil Rights Division).

KAREN HEIN, M.D. is professor of pediatrics, epidemiology, and social medicine at Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York as well as director of the Adolescent AIDS Program at Montefiore Medical Center in the Bronx, which she founded in 1987. Dr. Hein earned her bachelors degree from the University of Wisconsin, began her medical training at Dartmouth Medical School, and ultimately received her M.D. from Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons. She completed her pediatric residency at the Bronx Municipal Hospital Center followed by a year of postdoctoral fellowship training in adolescent medicine at Montefiore Hospital. Prior to her current position, she was director of the Division of Adolescent Medicine at Babies Hospital of Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, as well as on the faculty of

Albert Einstein College of Medicine where she was involved in program development, clinical research, teaching, and patient care related to adolescents. Dr. Hein has written over 150 articles, chapters, and abstracts related to adolescent health, particularly focusing on high-risk youth; is a reviewer for many major medical journals and medical societies; and has been the principal investigator on numerous grant awards primarily in the area of HIV/AIDS in adolescents. Dr. Hein serves as consultant to many federal and local health organizations, including the NYC Department of Health and Board of Education, the CDC, and the AMA. In 1989, she received a U.S. federal government Assistant Secretary for Health Award for leadership in the HIV epidemic.

DAVID MICHAELS, Ph.D., M.P.H. is associate professor of community health and social medicine at the City University of New York Medical School, where he teaches epidemiology, clinical epidemiology, and biostatistics. Dr. Michaels earned a B.A. from the City College of New York, an M.P.H. in epidemiology and a Ph.D. in sociomedical sciences from Columbia University. Dr. Michaels' work has addressed a broad range of public health topics, always explicitly linked to public policy. He has conducted numerous studies in occupational and environmental health and has designed workplace illness and injury prevention programs for unions and employers throughout the country. Dr. Michaels founded the Epidemiology Unit at the Rikers Island Prison Health Service, investigating tuberculosis, mental illness, homelessness, and other problems prevalent in disadvantaged populations. Most recently, he has developed a mathematical model to estimate the number of children and adolescents in the U.S. who will be orphaned by HIV/AIDS. Dr. Michaels is also actively involved in designing primary care training programs to meet the needs of medically underserved communities, particularly in the inner city. In 1984, Dr. Michaels received the APHA's Jay S. Drotman Memorial Award, given each year to a young scientist who best demonstrates potential by challenging traditional public health policy or practice in a creative and positive manner.

HOWARD K. RABINOWITZ, M.D. is professor and vice-chairman of the Department of Family Medicine at Jefferson Medical College of Thomas Jefferson University. Dr. Rabinowitz received his undergraduate degree from Rutgers University and his medical degree from the University of Pittsburgh. He completed a residency in pediatrics at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children and a fellowship in ambulatory and community pediatrics at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Dr. Rabinowitz then spent 2 years as a family physician and medical director at the PHS Hospital on the Pima Indian reservation in Arizona. Since 1976, he has been on the faculty at Jefferson, where he directs the Physician Shortage Area Program, which has been successful in increasing the number of family physicians in rural and underserved areas. Dr. Rabinowitz has served as president of the American Board of Family Practice (1992-93), and as a member of the American Board of Medical Specialties. He is on the National Advisory Committee of the Robert Wood Johnson Generalist Physician Initiative, and has served as an advisor to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on issues related to primary care and rural health. His research on health manpower has resulted in publications in JAMA and the New England Journal of Medicine.
