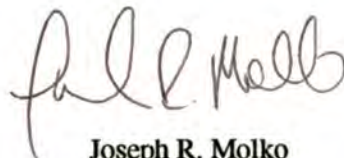
On behalf of The Johns Hopkins University, we would like to invite you to participate in the Milton S. Eisenhower Symposium's town hall meeting on "AIDS policy" on November 9, 1993 or November 12, 1993. The topic for our meeting is the role of each level of government in our nation's battle against AIDS. You would present, for approximately 20 minutes, the federal government's role. After two other presentations, one from Baltimore City Health Commissioner Anthony Bieleonson at the city level, and the other by a state administrator, you will be asked questions from representatives of the AIDS Action Council and the National Minority AIDS Council. Following two rounds of questions, we will open the discussion up to the audience. The audience will consist of university students as well as members of the general public.

The Milton S. Eisenhower Symposium is an annual lecture series founded in 1967, free and open to the public, organized entirely by undergraduates at The Johns Hopkins University. The goal of the Symposium is to present an issue of national importance to the Hopkins, as well as the Baltimore community. Each fall, speakers of national importance visit the Homewood Campus to address various issues. Previous guests have included Jean-Paul Sartre, George Will, Maya Angelou, Alan Dershowitz, Rep. Patricia Schroeder, and Kurt Vonnegut. Notable lectures in the past have been covered by C-Span and Public Television, as well as by national and local networks.

This year's speakers include: Professor Angela Davis, Dr. John Money, Dr. Roger Gorski, John Waters, Professor Camille Paglia, and others.

Ms. Gebbie, it is our hope that you will be able to participate at the Homewood Campus in Baltimore, this fall. The events are always free and open to the public, and would be held in Shriver Hall, which seats 1200 people. Your topic is broad and should address not only the role of the government in the battle against AIDS, but also should address what role the general public should play in the battle. 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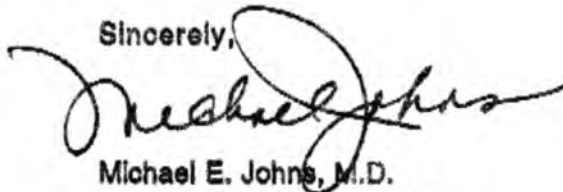
