Interview Questions:

What do you hope to accomplish through the speeches, as well as the town meeting-style gatherings you are holding throughout the country? (note: you are scheduled to return to Baltimore Nov. 9 for a "town meeting" at Johns Hopkins University.)

Although you've only been in office two months, some AIDS activists have criticized you already as being too slow moving. What is your top priority and how do you hope to accomplish it? What is your time table to accomplish this?

What (a) characteristic and (b) experience do you bring to this job that is especially valuable?

You have said you support needle exchange programs but see them as something that must be implemented on the local level, and that the federal role should be technical support and research - how can you help get that support streamlined to local governments?

Mayor Schmoke of Baltimore is implementing a needle exchange program. You have said that you see these programs as only an interim measure. What long-term measures are needed?

The CDC began urging businesses to form policies on how to handle employees with AIDS last year. You also are urging businesses to do so. Many AIDS activists say progress is slow - what will you do to convince American businesses that these policies are worthy or necessary?

What is the size of your staff now and your budget for the staff?

You have commented that it is easy to call for a "Manhattan Project"-type AIDS research but harder to make it happen. You also have talked about ensuring that money already allocated to AIDS is well spent. How can you do that?

In the face of 50,000 new cases of AIDS each year, you have called for "blunt talk with people of all ages" about the cause-and-effect relation-

ship between behavior and HIV. You have also spoken about the need to keep local education under the jurisdiction of local administrations and communities. Members of many communities would object to "blunt" talk.

How can your office make a change in the talk, the education, the behavior of Americans of all ages?

You have endorsed the concept of mandatory names reporting of those infected with HIV and predicted that such a policy will be implemented in 5 to 25 years. (Maryland is presently hashing out a "unique identifying" system to provide a way of tracking people anonymously) What steps - and assurances - do you feel need to be taken and given before a reporting system should be put into place?

What kind of detective novels are your favorite?

Attached for your review are some bits of information describing the University of Maryland at Baltimore (UMAB) and our Distinguished Lecturer Series that I believe you will find useful.

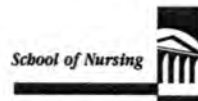

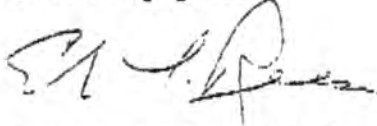

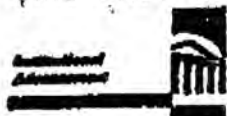

SUBJECT: Live interview request

Our office has had a request from WMAR Channel 2 in Baltimore for a live interview with you tonight at 5:05 p.m. or 5:20 p.m. just prior to your lecture on campus.

The station is covering a public hearing being held today in Baltimore concerning the state's desire to create a database of HIV positive citizens. These citizens would be tracked through a "unique identifier" -- a number that includes a portion of the person's social security number, gender, race, and birthdate.
