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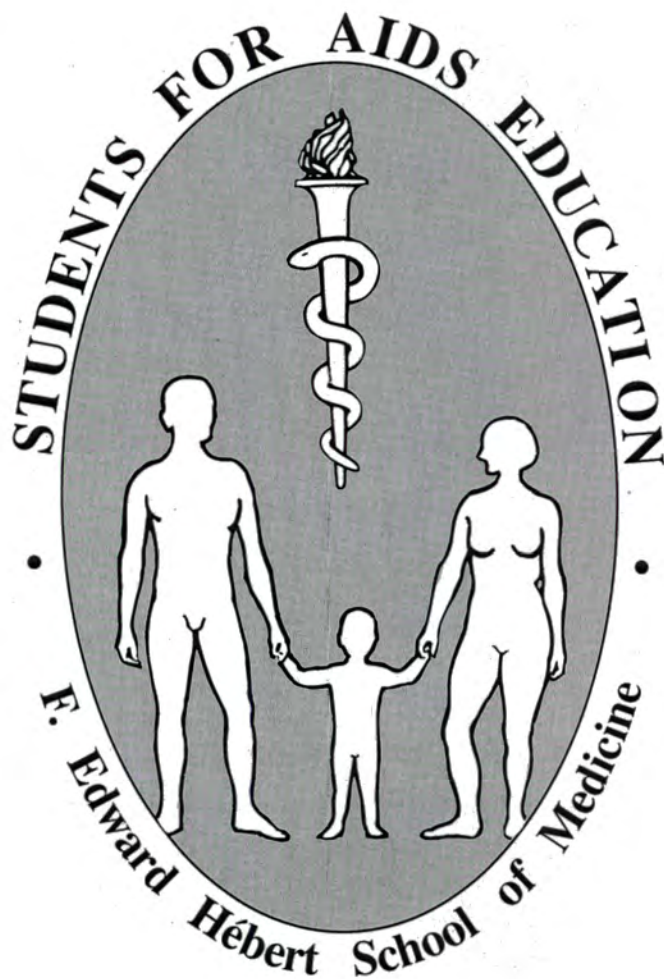

Students for AIDS Education

In the fall of 1988, a group of first and second year medical students at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences founded the **Students for AIDS Education (SFAE)**, and developed a community outreach program to educate and motivate young people to conduct their lives in ways that would essentially eliminate their risk of becoming exposed to the Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). Adolescents in junior high school and high school were specifically targeted to receive this educational program because (1) such youngsters characteristically experiment in adult behavior as part of their normal development and (2) because it was well known that this viral illness was transmitted most commonly through sexual activity and intravenous drug use.

The program is self-perpetuating and involves (1) medical students who have been previously trained, and who have become experienced in presenting the program to small groups of adolescents in their own classrooms and (2) a group of expert medical faculty who serve as consultants and advisors.

SFAE presented its first program to approximately 60 ninth to twelfth grade Biology students at the Maret School in Washington, D.C. in the Spring of 1989. Since that time, **SFAE** has had the opportunity to interact with more than 2800 students in over 125 classes at 35 different elementary schools, junior high schools, senior high schools, and education facilities. The Health Education Division of Montgomery County, Maryland, Public Schools has invited **SFAE** to offer its program throughout the county's junior high school system. In 1992, the District of Columbia Public School's Office of HIV/AIDS Education invited **SFAE** to implement a pilot program for the eleventh and twelfth grades at five different high schools. Typically, each presentation has involved a group of three to four medical students talking with a group of ten to thirty adolescents. In addition, **SFAE** provided numerous workshops and seminars for various groups of teachers, educators, and counselors.
