Course Title: Oncology and Immune Dysfunction Nursing 2B: Nursing Care Needs of Clients with HIV/AIDS: An Interdisciplinary Approach

Allocation of Credits: 5 Semester Hours (graduate students) 2 didactic credits, 3 clinical credits

Catalogue Description: This course will focus on integration of advanced nursing knowledge and clinical excellence in the provision of care for the client and family with HIV/AIDS throughout the life span. Health maintenance, community health resources and treatment methodologies will be explored. The clinical component of this course will emphasize patient care management. Findings from clinical research are integrated throughout the course.

Course Objectives: On completing the course, the student is be able to:

1. Apply advanced knowledge of pathophysiology of HIV disease in clinical care management.
2. Discuss the nursing care requirements for the client and family with HIV throughout the life span.
3. Teach and apply health maintenance efforts for the HIV family.
4. Utilize relevant community resources in the delivery of care to the family with HIV.

5. Analyze treatment modalities specific to HSV disease.
6. Apply clinical skills in the management of HSV disease.
7. Discuss ethical/legal/cost issues identified in practice.
8. Critique research studies and identify new research areas related to HSV care.
