Jean McGuire, Moderator

Former Executive Director, AIDS Action Council

Jean McGuire has worked in the disability arena for the last 20 years. At the national level she was the Assistant Director of Governmental Affairs for the Association for Citizens with Mental Retardation before taking over as Executive Director of the AIDS Action Council. She is currently working on her dissertation at Brandeis University's Heller School. Her research focuses on ethical issues associated with the implication of HIV research access policies.

Nicolàs Parkhurst Carballeira

Executive Director, Latino Health Institute

Dr. Nicolàs Parkhurst Carballeira, a native of Puerto Rico and a resident of Boston since 1988, is the Director of the Latino Health Institute. Dr. Mindy Thompson Fullilove was appointed by President Clinton in February 1994 to the National AIDS Drug Development Task Force. Dr. Fullilove is Associate Professor of Clinical Psychiatry and Public Health at Columbia University, and a research psychiatrist at the New York State Psychiatric Institute. Her primary research interests include sociological aspects of drug addiction and the AIDS epidemic, particularly focusing on their impact on women and minority communities.

She has taught courses in health at the University of Washington, the Oregon Health Sciences University in Portland, and St. Louis University.

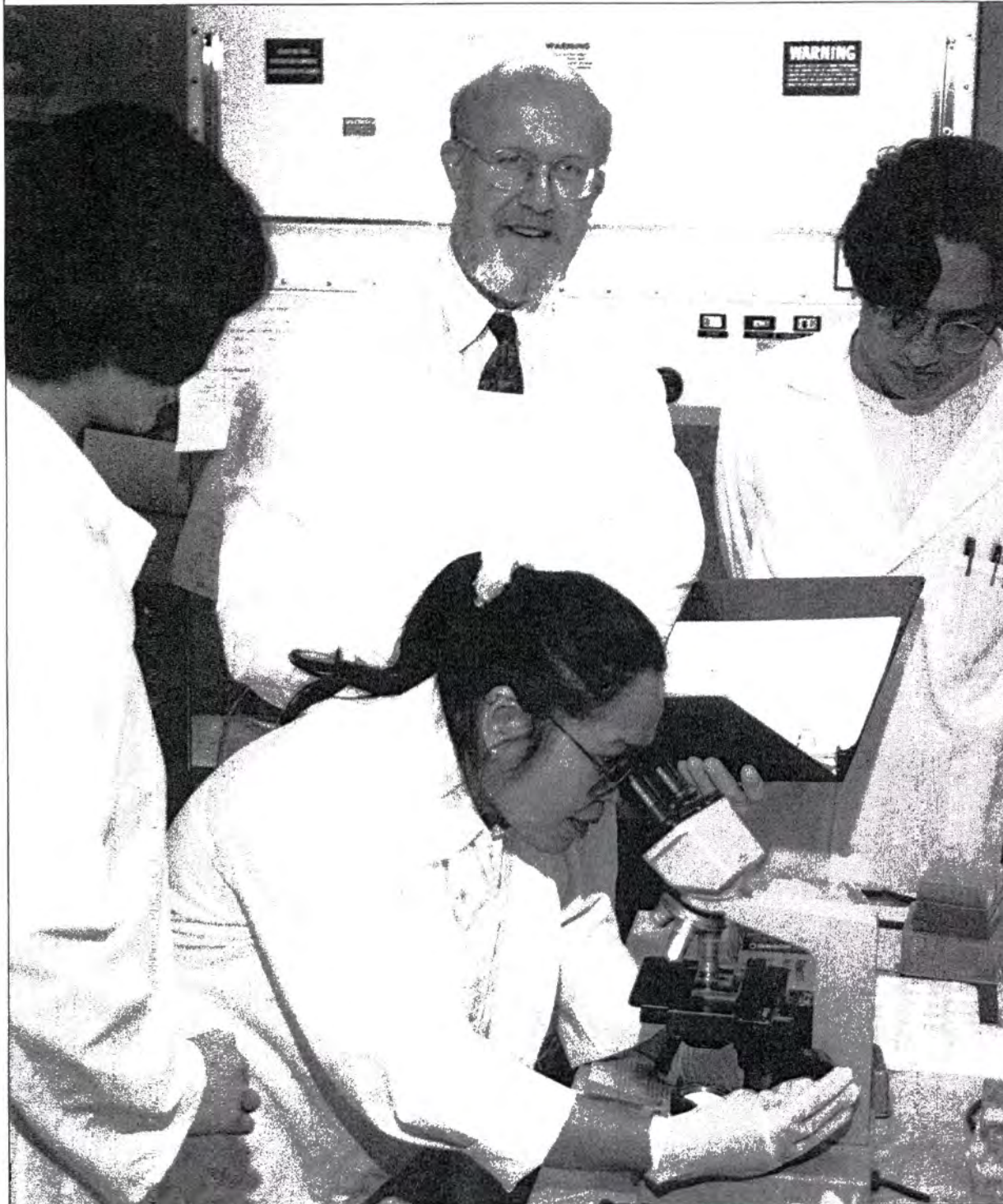

Overview and Discussion Points

HIV demographics in the United States have changed dramatically since AIDS was first recognized among gay men in 1981. The epidemic is rapidly becoming a disease of the politically and economically disenfranchised, disproportionately affecting communities of color.

In order to promote a fruitful discussion, we would like each panelist to use the following questions as a starting point:

- o Are policy makers responsive to the needs and concerns of men and women of color living with AIDS?
- o The largest and most prominent AIDS organizations which emerged in the mid-1980s were formed largely by and for white gay men. To this day, those organizations play a crucial role in the formation of policy and in fundraising for AIDS services, HIV education, and research. Are these organizations able to keep pace with the changing dynamics of the epidemic?
- o To what degree do national policy makers rely on the views and recommendations of such organizations?
- o What kinds of institutional mechanisms are needed to communicate the needs, opinions, and ideas of the wide variety of communities affected by AIDS to policy makers at all levels?

Please incorporate your range of experiences in exploring these issues and others you feel might be relevant to the topic.

First of all, we are honored that you have accepted our invitation to participate in the panel discussion on AIDS policy next Tuesday, April 26. - I. What are the changing dynamics of the epidemic?
 - A. Different demographics of the disease.
