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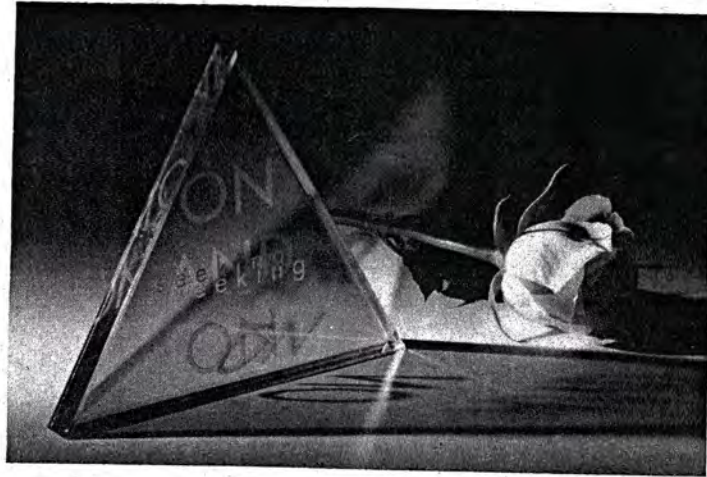

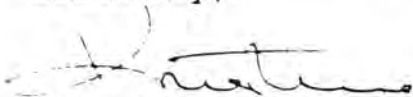

I remain troubled by the tone and nature of our telephone conversation today regarding the participation of Kristine Gebbie in the HIV Awards Event sponsored by Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon and scheduled for May 2, 1994 at the Portland Hilton Hotel.

You indicated that you were not sure if Kristine could be present because you were not confirming any appearances for Ms. Gebbie in advance of sixty days. When I explained to you that we had initiated discussions about the Awards Event last summer just about the time that Kristine was being confirmed by the Clinton administration, you seemed to doubt my integrity. Though I continued in my explanation to you that Kristine's office had conversed with us several times and finally the date of May 2 was mutually determined, you indicated that all appointments were subject to your approval despite any past scheduling (copies of my correspondence attached). I also offered that The Rev. Dr. Rodney Page, Executive Director of Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon had met with Kristine Gebbie a few weeks ago in Washington and that we had again spoken with Ms. Gebbie's office staff to reconfirm the date.

A possible problem had come to light only after Dr. Arthur Z. Buck, Chair of the event met with you in Washington D.C. a short time ago and you stated to him that Kristine knew nothing of the event and was not scheduled to be present in Portland in May. In our conversation this morning you indicated to me that other invitations to Kristine from the City Club of Portland and the Oregon Health Sciences University were pending and were important priorities to be scheduled before we could be considered. Finally you further indicated that Kristine would be coming to Oregon in February and that you did not know if you could justify another visit in May.

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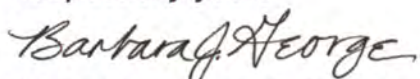


I trust that there is a speedy resolve to this matter and I further understand the very difficult role you must hold in trying to provide coordination of Kristine's schedule. My usual inclination in a situation like this would be to be accommodating and make every effort to try to do whatever is reasonable to manage the problem; --including re-scheduling if necessary. However, I must add that your conversation did not invite such a response, --rather I perceived you as annoyed with the whole topic and certainly uninterested in trying to work things out. This attitude was confirmed when you casually stated that "I'll get back to you." Since I have called your office several times without your having returned my calls and having finally reached you this morning by calling through another staff person in your office, I did not feel that it was reasonable for me to agree without some idea of when you might call back.

Again, I am feeling troubled; yet I trust this situation can be worked out. It is my intention as an agent of Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon to cooperate fully with Kristine Gebbie's office there in Washington, D.C. as we did during her service here in Oregon.

Thank you in advance for your help in moving a resolution of this matter along quickly.

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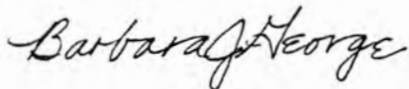

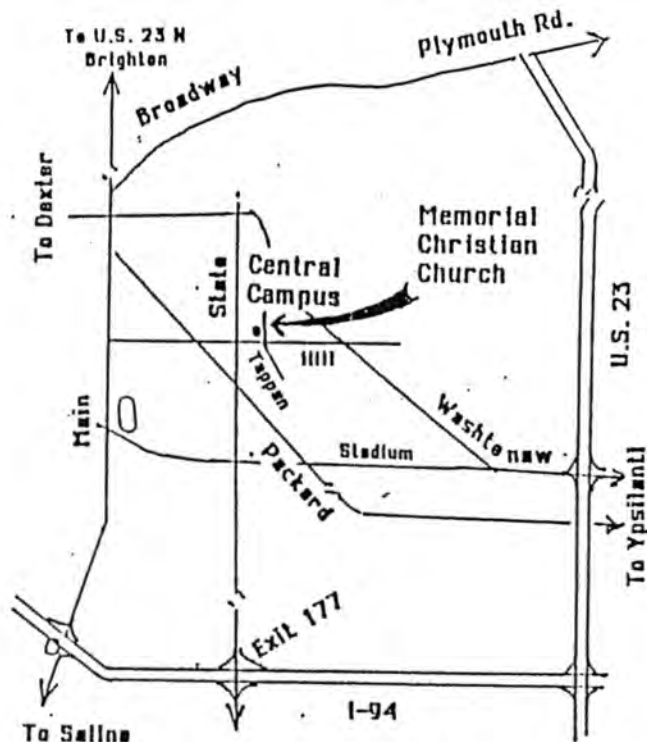

AIDS not only attacks the body. It challenges the spirits of its sufferers and those who love them. This workshop will help participants consider resources and services which can strengthen and sustain the spirit.

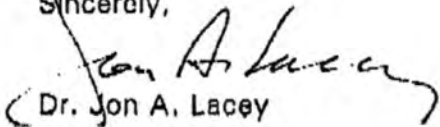
We will also need to know what your expectations or needs are for accommodations that weekend, for honoraria, and for travel assistance.

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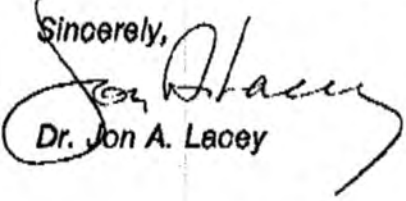

HIV/AIDS - AN ESSENTIAL CONCERN FOR RELIGIOUS CONGREGATIONS

We Believe...

- ...that AIDS must be seen as a worldwide epidemic already having profound effect in reshaping local communities, on national economics, and in the free interchange of life through international trade and travel.*
- ...that AIDS does not discriminate between persons or nations; rich or poor; heterosexual, homosexual or bi-sexual; religious or non-religious; male or female; old or young; drug users or non-users.*
- ...that AIDS must be seen as other diseases are seen, treated as other diseases are treated, resisted as other diseases are resisted.*
- ...that there are now few people in our nation who do not know someone personally who has been touched by this epidemic, and that every religious congregation is likely to have families in its circle who are so affected.*

We Regret that the religious communities in the United States...

- ...have on the whole been slow and reluctant to recognize and to respond to this crisis, if not eager to believe AIDS is a problem only of "someone else";*
- ...have been quick to judge persons with AIDS and slow to offer intelligent understanding and compassion;*
- ...have too often left people in their own congregations feeling uneasy to be known as having AIDS or having loved ones with AIDS;*
- ...have not developed strong programs to serve and nurture persons and families touched by the epidemic;*
- ...have not given leadership to our communities and nation in the face of one of the most significant crises to be faced in this century;*
- ...have not been sensitive to the impact of AIDS on their sisters and brothers in other parts of the world.*

We Urge Congregations and Judicatories Of All Faiths...

- ...to plan and offer programs that will help their people to understand the nature of this disease, its epidemiology, and its impact on persons and families;*
- ...to make the facts of AIDS a topic for open and frank discussion;*
- ...to help resist the kinds of fear and judgmentalism which tend to curtail honest discussion and restrict true caring;*
- ...to plan and to offer ministries of understanding, compassion and support to persons and families touched by HIV/AIDS;*
- ...to include in their educational program such understandings and concern as will enable children, youth and adults to talk freely and be guided wisely in a world with AIDS, and encourage them to respond to all of those affected by the epidemic with earnest caring and compassion;*
- ...to join with the wider instrumentalities of their family of faith in extending such concern around the world;*
- ...to not only join with other local and regional groups, but make it a matter of principle and priority to lead their neighborhoods, cities and nation toward an active, enlightened and caring response to the epidemic and those most affected by it.*
- ...establish partnerships between suburban congregations and congregations in epicenters of the epidemic to share resources, prayer and supportive services for all those living with HIV/AIDS.*

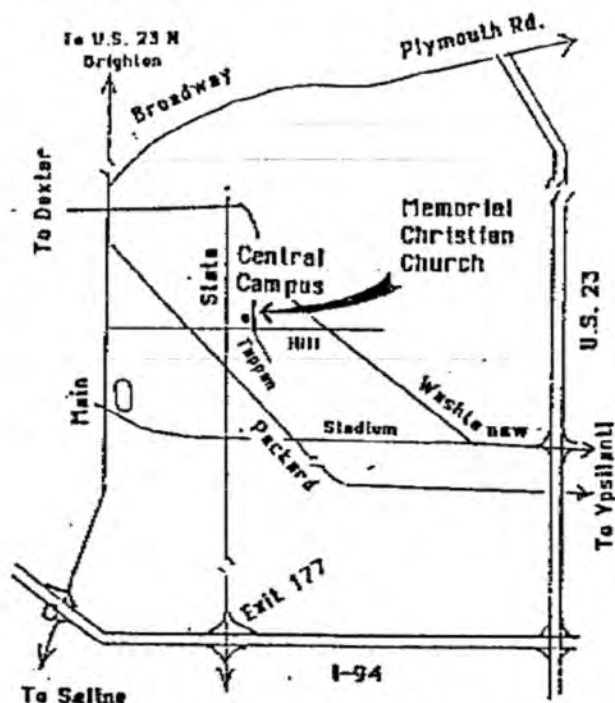
