NOTE TO KRISTINE GEBBIE

Information you requested for today's Boufford 1-on-1:

YOUNG GAY MEN: Received responses from: NIH, CDC, HRSA, SAMHSA, FDA, IHS, AHCPR and Population Affairs. In the process of compiling the responses and will have a preliminary compilation by May 20.

CDC EXTERNAL REVIEW REPORT: I talked to Gary Conrad at CDC and he said that the Report has been sent to the printers, along with a foreword and executive summary (you were sent a copy of the foreword and executive summary by CDC). The printed report will be ready for distribution after June 1.

HIV ACTION AGENDA: Bob and George briefed you on this Wednesday. In a nutshell, the Agenda will establish a national framework upon which the public and private sectors can build. The document will establish the main points and be used as a starting place or straw man for developing a consensus document. The consensus document will contain a vision statement and problem statements that describe the current reality and identify the situations that currently distort the vision or present barriers to the attainment of the vision. In the consensus document each problem statement will be accompanied by goals and measurable objectives that describe how the Nation is "going to fix" the problem.

Currently we are receiving comments from the Public Health Service and the private sector. Comments from other Federal Departments and Agencies will be elicited in the next couple of weeks. I am developing a process to ensure that all interested parties can have a part in developing the consensus document.

PHS WORK GROUP ON TREATMENT INFORMATION DISSEMINATION: finished its proposal April 21. Dr. Boufford concurred two weeks ago with the ONAP recommendation to make a presentation of the proposal to Dr. Lee. We are working to get a briefing date on Dr. Lee's calendar. We are now putting a briefing package together for Dr. Lee's concurrence with the idea that we will be making a presentation to Dr. Lee and the Agency Heads at one of their meetings.

BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH: NIH, CDC, and SAMHSA have agreed to joint coordination and have a tentative first meeting date of May 31.

Open issues:

CDC Strategy Meeting: Need to schedule a Lee/Satcher/Curran meeting on CDC issues (I've been unable to find a time yet to recommend to Phil that is acceptable to all parties).

Content Guidelines: Still on hold.

Needle Exchange: ONAP is working on strategy.

SUBJECT: Gay Youth Focus Group on April 2, 1994

The following are some highlights of my notes on the session we held on April 2.

- Those present felt there was very little useful sex education, health education out there among youth in general. Most of it was talking at them rather than involving them in designing materials that would be responsive to their needs.
- They stress the importance of education especially at the high school level as part of mainstream sex education activities. They felt that many kids especially outside of large metropolitan areas have absolutely no clue that HIV or AIDS is a issue for them either heterosexual or homosexual. This was particularly stressed for rural areas and more conservative areas.
- When asked to talk about things that worked, they mentioned a Planned Parenthood program for student and teacher education in Vermont had been effective in teaching teachers how to teach sex education without offending the gay minority. In other words, a sexually neutral approach.

Some books mentioned as particularly valuable were: One in Ten, Growing up Gay-A Literary Anthology, On Being Gay by Brian McNaught, and two organizations-Horizons out of Chicago and Smyal here in the District.

- Expecting gay teens to access gay media is very difficult because they fear being labeled as "out" by even appearing to read newspapers, magazines or showing up in clubs or bookstores. It is similarly very hard for younger gay people to reach out to the gay community as a source of support.
- They see outreach to gay youth as being almost non-existent and sex education issues being largely limited to fairly direct heterosexual "coupling". Most of the health concerns on MTV or ads are "hetrosexist" as they call it. They feel it is important to show that sex education activities are applicable to gay and non-gay and that they are everyone's problem.

- They also indicate that the condom is not necessarily linked to gay concerns or anal sex, but because it is most often linked to contraception, many young gay men don't associate the need to use condoms with their own concerns.
- A lack of power and self-esteem is a big issue. They feel overwhelmed by the issues of sexual identity and attention to these key factors is needed in any approach to counseling and support.
- There was also a concern about not using too many scare tactics around the effects of being HIV positive or having AIDS because of the HIV positive youth that do exist and a real concern that HIV positive youth need support.
- They were supportive of media activities that try to emphasize safer sex and safe sex can be fun. They cited the Gay Man's Health Crisis "We play hard, We play safe--Use a Condom" campaign as particularly attractive.
- They would be very pleased to see more accurate media images of gay people. They cited Melrose Place having a gay character who essentially is not gay.
- They noted that British ad campaigns for safer, better sex are interesting.
- They discussed the issue of more "gender neutral" sex education messages such as the HIV AIDS threat being about exchanging fluids not necessarily going into heterosexual or homosexual sex practices alone.
- They felt it would be important if celebrities, artists or athletes make more "gay positive" statements at least showing that they are respectful and accepting of the gay life style, even if they are not gay themselves.
- Most homosexual teens are not linked to the gay community and feel especially isolated, therefore some were advocating leadership so all teenagers would be more accepting of gay or heterosexual teenagers.
- There are very few places for gay teens to go other than the bar and club scene which leads directly to a pick up situation.
- The issue of homelessness was raised. Fundamentally many kids leave home because of family abuse or family abandonment and the services available provide very limited counseling.
- Repeated emphasis went to interventions targeted back on the schools as a place where real mainstream work could take place.

- Some suggested street workers specifically skilled at counseling gay youth going out into places where people are likely to be; modeled on the street workers working on needle cleaning/exchange with addicts.

- The idea of a town meeting for the Washington metro area talking about gay youth, who they are, and what kind of problems they have followed by questions and answers with the effort to attract the broadest group possible. Broadcasting on C-SPAN was discussed. This might be followed by a social event--dance or activity without alcohol.

- There needs to be a visible champion in the administration for gay youths and their concerns. Someone even mentioned Tipper Gore who has a history of being involved with youth protection but might be convinced to look at this issue.
