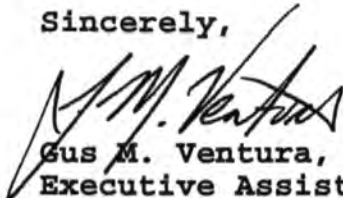

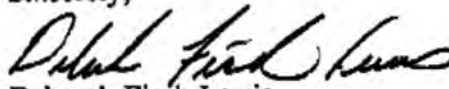
Dear Ms. Gebbie:

The Institute is a national training and demonstration program designed to enhance higher education's capacity to address HIV disease. This year's participants are college and university administrators, faculty, staff and students from Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Nebraska, Tennessee, West Virginia, and Wisconsin. Also in attendance will be representatives from the Departments of Health, Education, and Higher Education. The overall mission for bringing together teams from colleges, universities, and state agencies is to encourage communication and collaboration in order to maximize the effectiveness of HIV education. Funding for this program is provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Regardless of your availability for our Institute, my colleagues at Rutgers and I appreciate the work you have done thusfar and hope that you will continue to be a proponent of HIV prevention education and quality and affordable health care for all Americans.

This is the first printing of this list. The information herein has helped to educate me about HIV/AIDS. I have chosen to assist in the management of this virus through taking a holistic approach that includes a healthy diet (minus sugar, caffeine, any processed foods and including whole grains, vegetables, legumes, fresh fruit, and organic meat), supplements, acupuncture, chiropractic, massage, prayer and meditation, as well as positive thinking. I have found the aforementioned to keep me healthy, both emotionally and physically. The thing about living with HIV that has been so hard for me, is feeling powerless. I have been told by the media and the doctors that I am going to die from AIDS and it won't be pleasant. That seems too bleak a future, and that is why I got involved with my own healing instead of blindly accepting the words of my physician: "You have a good few years left. Enjoy your life while you are robust." He is not my physician any longer. Through a long search I have finally found someone to work with me. My current doctor helps me monitor the effects of my alternative and compatible treatment, answers my questions, and is supportive and optimistic. Educate yourself about all the possibilities. In the books and periodicals listed above there is lots of information. Some things may contradict others and some will claim to reverse the HIV diagnosis. I read all of them and found some things that are repeated in nearly all the journals, some common sense, and some stuff that really applies to me. We are all individuals and so our bodies respond differently. Find the right path for you. A last word on the financial disability of this disease and its impact on being able to pay for different treatments not covered by insurance or medicaid: ASK FOR HELP. Don't give up if you don't get it on the first try. I had to learn a lot of humility since I have chosen a path that is rarely covered by any insurance. I have bartered, begged credit, and received some services free. It has definitely been a struggle, but it can be done. I have recently started a non-profit organization called the Women's Wellness Fund to give grants to women seeking alternative care. It is in the beginning stages, but I hope to have it helping people by Fall '94. I will keep you updated. If you have any questions, please call or write-River Huston, 18 N. We will support the use of acupuncture, chiropractic, homeopathy, chinese herbs, massage and nutritional supplements. Any other healing practices that would benefit the health and well being of a women will be considered. *The Women's Wellness Fund* will print and distribute a thorough resource list of services and references for women living with HIV Infection. Funds are now being solicited through grant proposals, fund raising, benefits and donations in order to begin services in December, 1994.
