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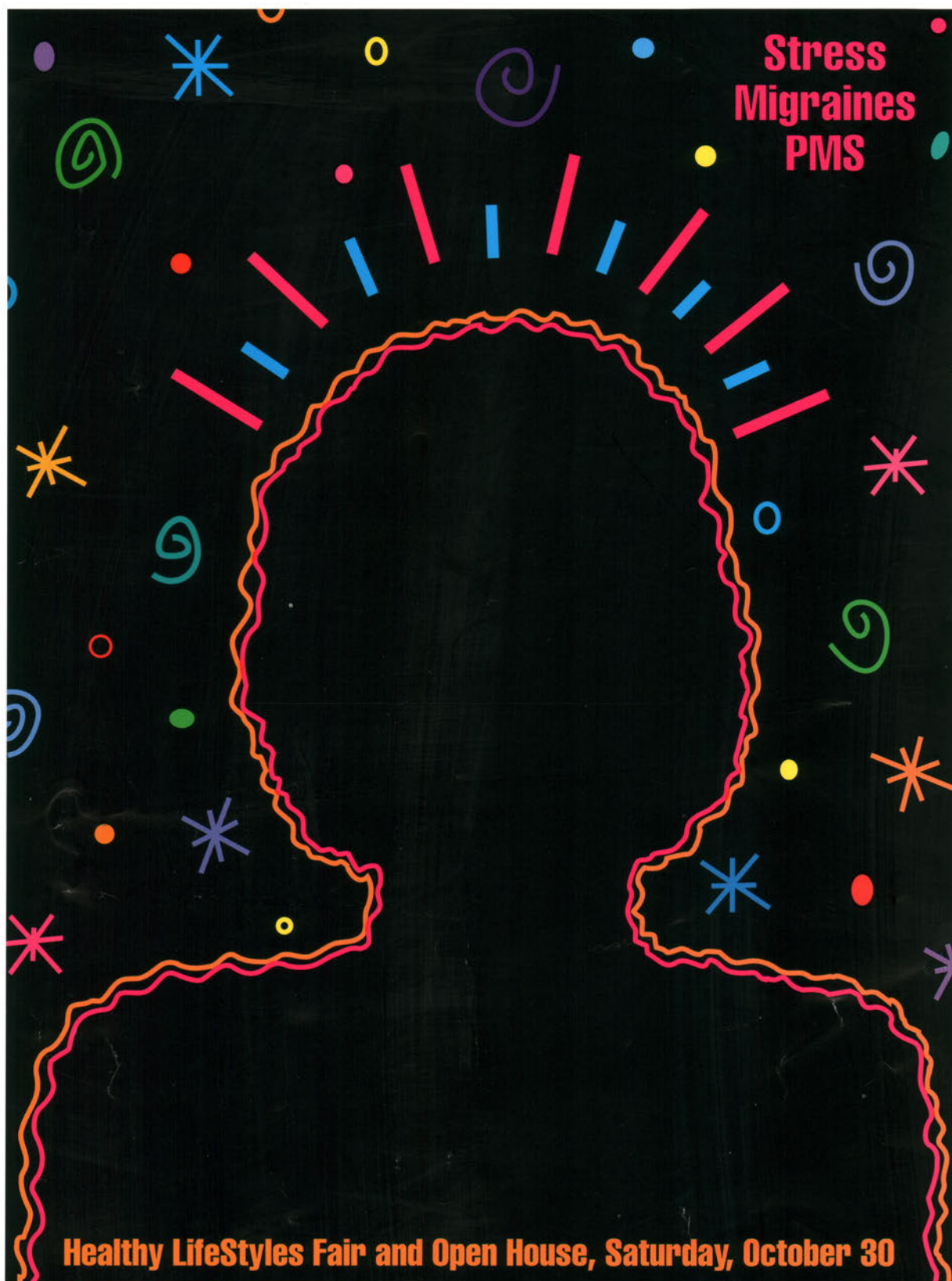

INTER-COMPANY COLLABORATION FOR AIDS DRUG DEVELOPMENT

Summary of October 8, 1993 Meeting

The Inter-Company Collaboration for AIDS Drug Development held its second formal meeting on October 8. Each of the 15 member companies* was represented by its head of pharmaceutical R&D (or authorized delegate) and senior scientists and clinicians responsible for HIV antiviral research. The formation of the Collaboration was announced in April 1993 as a means to facilitate early clinical evaluation of various HIV antivirals in combination through the sharing of information and drug supplies.

Dr. Edward Scolnick, President of the Merck Research Laboratories, chaired the meeting of the Board of Participants, the oversight body with general responsibilities for implementing the activities of the Collaboration. The Board appointed subcommittees to facilitate interactions with various third-party groups and organizations--including NIH (subcommittee to be chaired by Dr. Scolnick), FDA (chaired by Dr. Leon Rosenberg, Bristol-Myers Squibb), HIV community (chaired by Dr. David Barry, Burroughs Wellcome), and the "Future Directions in AIDS Research" group (chaired by Dr. John Niblack, Pfizer).

Professor Juergen Drews, President of International Research and Development at Hoffmann-La Roche, chaired the meeting of the Scientific Panel, which coordinates the exchange of scientific information and other scientific activities related to HIV antiviral evaluation. Six companies made scientific disclosures on HIV antivirals and related compounds: Glaxo presented on the nucleoside analog 3TC®; Astra on Foscavir® as a broad spectrum antiviral; Boehringer-Ingelheim on the non-nucleoside analog nevirapine; Burroughs Wellcome on the nucleoside analog 935U; Hoechst on pentoxifylline; and Eli Lilly on the non-nucleoside analog LY300046.

Dr. Emilio Emini, Senior Director of HIV Virology at the Merck Research Laboratories and chair of the Scientific Panel's subcommittee on assay validation, reported that a consensus protocol was established for determining cell culture antiviral activities of novel anti-HIV therapeutic agents. The assay will be tested in several laboratories using standardized reagents supplied by various member companies. Data from such an assay will permit direct comparisons of different therapeutic agents and will facilitate the consideration of possible combinations.

The next meeting of the Collaboration will take place in early 1994.

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White House AIDS official discusses care

What is the place of professional nursing in the field of the HIV/AIDS epidemic?

How does the nurse bridge the emotional gap between the physician and the patient?

How can national health care turn traditional nurse practitioners into community caregivers?

These questions and more were addressed last night when Kristine Gebbie spoke to an audience of approximately 100 in the Nursing Education Building.

Gebbie, recently appointed by President Clinton as White House National AIDS Policy Coordinator, drew a crowd of fellow professionals, students, patients and interested community members.

Her speech, which lasted for nearly an hour, focused on the role of the nurse in the caretaking of the

Kristine Gebbie focused on the role nurses play in taking care of HIV/AIDS-infected patients as well as on AIDS prevention.

HIV/AIDS-infected patient, as well as in the prevention of the epidemic.

Gebbie said that a physician can only care for a patient to a certain extent, and that nurses often take that care farther with more personal, emotionally-stabilizing care.

She also spoke on the relation of the disease to the present state of American health care.

"The epidemic gives us a lens on problems of our health-illness system, the problems of our finance system and the problems of our social

system," said Gebbie. "And in each case, we are enabled to see flaws, but also to see opportunities and strengths that we don't very often see."

After holding various positions in nursing and health care - including assistant director of health in Oregon, secretary of the Washington state Department of Health and coordinator of ambulatory care at St. Louis University - Gebbie was appointed to the White House position last summer.

In describing her position, Gebbie said, "It's not only that we get the biggest bang we can for every federal dollar we get ... but also that we weave together the public and private sectors in a single, national response to the epidemic."

Gebbie also pointed out the distinct need to rid the nation of its denial of the HIV and AIDS problem.

"We'll really go to work on this as a community-wide problem," she said.

The dilemma of funding was also brought up both during the speech as well as during a question and answer session afterwards.

Suzanne Langder, author of an HIV early intervention program, raised the question of unequal funding in different areas, specifically between a well-backed city such as New York and Philadelphia, which she said is quite lacking in money for primary care.

Dear Mr. Gurrola:

This letter is a follow-up to our telephone conversation this morning concerning an interview with Kristine Gebbie. I am requesting this interview at the recommendation of Terry Beswick, whom I called for information about reforming the AIDS research effort.

The topic of my interview would be what the administration thinks is necessary to make AIDS drug development move more quickly. It would cover such questions as:

Is there a need for a research program directed by a central funding agency or should the US continue to operate an investigator-driven grant program at the NIH while leaving private funding sources (like the drug companies) with no guidance? should be done about the large number of AIDS drugs that appear promising in initial research and then seem to fall through the cracks for a variety of bureaucratic, political and economic reasons? For that matter, even the investigations that are pursued take an agonizingly long time before they bear fruit — where are the bottlenecks and how can we speed up the overall situation? At the same time, aren't some areas over-researched (eg., nucleoside analogs)? And what about drug prices — are the huge prices of new drugs necessary, and if not, how does one control prices without hobbling research?

I would like about 30 minutes for this interview. If it is thought advisable that Terry be there too, that would be fine. As I mentioned on the phone, I will be in Washington from December 13 to December 19, and would like to conduct the interview in person. If scheduling problems prevent this, doing the interview over the telephone would be OK, too.

I am a regular contributor to *PAACNotes* (the journal of the Physicians Association for AIDS Care), *AIDS Treatment News* and the *Bulletin of Experimental Treatments for AIDS* (sponsored by the San Francisco AIDS Foundation). My work has also appeared in a variety of other national publications, including the *Village*

Voice. This interview would be featured in *Lifetimes*, which is produced by Stadtlander's Pharmacy, a national mail-order operation based in Pittsburgh that concentrates on AIDS-related medications and services. *Lifetimes* is a full-color, glossy publication with a circulation of about 30,000 in the AIDS community. *Lifetimes* wants the interview to be a major feature to accompany my report on the National Conference on Human Retroviruses taking place next week in Washington.

AIDS policy chief hails Clinton proposals

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - President Clinton's health care plans represent a major improvement in fighting AIDS, the national AIDS policy coordinator said Thursday.

Kristine Gebbie told 100 business leaders that Clinton's proposals "give us the financial base of caring for HIV that we've never had before."

"This gives us the building blocks for treating this disease," she said at the Governor's Business Responds to AIDS Confer-

ence, co-sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Gebbie, a nurse who has been the policy coordinator for about two months, told reporters after the speech that a key part of Clinton's plan is universal coverage that can not be revoked.

"Knowing that you are covered and community-rated are critical," she said. Community-rated means patients are not singled out as exempt from insurance coverage.

Clinton's proposals greatly increase in-

surance benefits for AIDS patients and make treatment more available in neglected areas, Gebbie said.

All this means that those with HIV should be encouraged, she said.

"They need to be receptive to this plan and watch what happens in Congress."

Gebbie, former secretary of health in the state of Washington, said current AIDS treatment is basically community programs that are patched together.

"This (Clinton's reforms) gives us a base to plan for prevention."

Gebbie said she was not surprised that the insurance community has already begun a public relations campaign against the plans.

"They stand to lose the most. Their world is going to have to change drastically," she said before flying to Chicago to attend a town meeting at the University of Illinois at Chicago.

She was part of a contingent of Clinton's top aides who fanned out across the country to drum up support for the reform movement.

In her speech, Gebbie urged the business leaders to do more than write their employees memos on the subject of AIDS.

"We need leaders who don't just delegate - they participate," she said.

"They don't just send out memos but follow up and are visibly unafraid to be associated with the problem."

She said the business community needs to recognize that a comprehensive health education curriculum is needed in schools "or in 20 years there won't be any workers." Gebbie, who has been in the nursing field for 30 years, said the public reaction to AIDS is similar to the way cancer was regarded 30 years ago when it was not listed as the cause of death in newspaper obituaries.

"We're not quite sure we can reach out and embrace this disease like others."

Sex ed at school, home is key, AIDS czar says

President Clinton's new AIDS czar called yesterday for stepped-up sex education in the schools and at home to help fight the nation's AIDS epidemic.

"It's our failure to talk that has caused children to experiment with their sexuality in ways that are dangerous to them," said Kristine M. Gebbie, who was named AIDS policy adviser in June.

While Gebbie said students as young as 12 should be taught about condoms as a way to protect themselves against AIDS, she stopped short of calling on schools to make condoms available to students.

That decision, she said, should be made by local school authorities, not the federal government. "The basic question is not condoms, but how we teach sexually-active people about condoms," Gebbie said.

Gebbie's remarks came in a talk at the Franklin Institute and an hour-long interview yesterday before she opened the museum's new federally-

funded AIDS exhibit.

The exhibit, which will be run until January, aims to educate young people about the AIDS epidemic by making use of interactive technology such as computer videos and a hotline to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta.

The exhibit, which is to tour the country next year, includes a video with explicit instructions about how to put on a condom. That section of the display is marked for parental guidance.

Gebbie hailed the exhibit, saying it represented a "new direction" in AIDS education, which until now has relied on more traditional methods to teach about AIDS.

"We have to bring the nation out of denial," Gebbie told a crowd of about 200 people gathered at the museum's Stearns Auditorium. "Too many people in this country are still saying this is somebody else's problem in somebody else's city, not mine."

As she spoke, about a dozen protest-

rounding community, who have been fighting the facility in state court for more than three years.

It comes down to how far the mayor could — or should — go to make 48 units of "single-room-occupancy" housing proposed by a non-profit group called Project HOME a reality.

Activists for the homeless say Rendell's unwillingness to make it happen is a sign that he lacks commitment on the issue of homelessness and has kowtowed to his closest ally, City Council President John F. Street, who opposes the facility on behalf of his constituents, the residents of nearby neighborhoods. And the activists have pursued a strategy in federal court — under the federal Fair Housing Act — to circumvent a parallel case that has been stuck in state court.

Administration officials respond that Street's opposition has nothing to do with it. Rendell has done everything he can to support the project, they say, but does not think federal law should be used to deprive those who oppose it of their say in state court. What's more, they say, the plaintiffs are using the Fair Housing Act inappropriately.

"This case is about a proposal to renovate a commercial building as a housing facility for handicapped adults who were formerly homeless," the Justice Department brief begins. "Despite the pressing need for this project, it has been tied up for more than two and a half years by litigation brought in state court by neighborhood groups opposed to

ers from the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power rang a cowbell and held up signs that said "Killing time is killing people," "AIDS won't wait" and "Condoms in schools now."

But Gebbie appeared to disarm the protesters by thanking them for their bells (which she called a "creative approach") and by outlining an agenda that included many of their concerns.

Gebbie called for an expansion of AIDS research, more involvement by activists in setting the research agenda and more attention to AIDS in the curriculum of medical schools.

She said the Clinton administration was committed to lifting the immigration ban on people with AIDS, but said it would likely take a year to convince Congress.

Gebbie said she talks with Clinton "often" about AIDS — and would next week put the entire White House staff through an AIDS training session.

Gebbie, 50, assumed the new AIDS post in August. A registered nurse and epidemiologist, she formerly served as the chief state health official in Oregon and Washington state.

In an interview, Gebbie said she had two major goals: to get more "bang for the buck" out of the more than \$1 billion in federal funds spent annually on AIDS, and to encourage "national ownership" of the AIDS epidemic.

Although on the job for little more than three months, Gebbie said she has already made a difference.

She said her lobbying helped to maintain a specific provision in Clinton's proposed health package that retains AIDS programs funded under the Ryan White CARE Act. Other so-called categorical programs will be phased out under Clinton's plan.

"We were able to be there to say 'no,'" she said.

Gebbie said she has also initiated an AIDS education program that will reach three million federal workers.

And she took credit for thwarting a

\$20 million vaccine trial that has been denounced by AIDS researchers because it was approved through pork-barrel legislation and bypassed the normal scientific review process.

Gebbie said yesterday she wanted to maintain the money for AIDS research, but said she was uncertain

exactly what the funds should be spent on.

Gebbie's visit to Philadelphia included stops at the Strawberry Mansion health center, where the city operates a family AIDS clinic, and private meetings with AIDS service providers and the local Act Up chapter.
