WHO accepts drug donation for AIDS patients in Africa

A Belgian pharmaceutical firm has agreed to give the World Health Organization a large quantity of drugs to treat people in developing African countries for two common fungal infections related to AIDS: oral and oesophageal candidiasis. WHO believes the drugs donated by Janssen Pharmaceutica of Belgium will be enough to treat 300 000 people over five years.

The agreement, signed on 25 November, is a result of GPA collaboration with the pharmaceutical industry on improving HIV/AIDS care in developing countries.

Dr Hiroshi Nakajima, Director-General of WHO, expressed his thanks to Janssen for the donation. "Our objective is to alleviate the suffering of hundreds of thousands of AIDS patients in Africa and to improve the quality of their life," he said. "I sincerely hope that others interested in helping



AIDS patients will make similar donations."

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Sex education leads to safer behaviour

Teaching young people about sexuality and contraception is often thought to encourage early sexual experimentation. This belief, which is a powerful barrier to the introduction of HIV/STD prevention programmes, has been conclusively disproved by a GPA review of studies on the effects of sex education in schools. In fact, sex and AIDS education often encourages young people to delay sexual activity and to practise safer sex when they are sexually active.

Among the studies that evaluated the sexual behaviour of students exposed to sex education, 19 considered its effect on reported age at first intercourse and reported levels of sexual activity.

■ No study revealed evidence of sex education leading to earlier or increased sexual activity in young people.

- In six studies, sex education either delayed the onset of sexual activity or caused a fall in its overall extent.
- Two studies showed that access to counselling and contraceptive services did not encourage earlier or increased sexual activity.

During the summer we will be working on putting together a meeting summary to be distributed to Washington-based policymakers. We may call on you to review your remarks prior to publication.

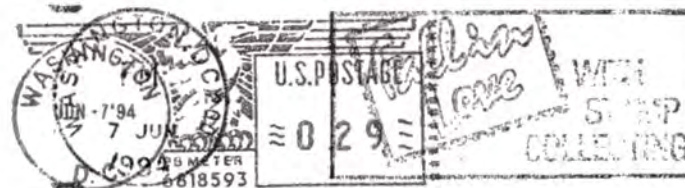

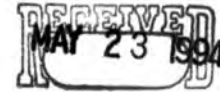

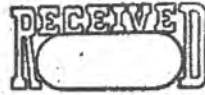

I understand that it is not easy doing the kind of work that we do. It's with me 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

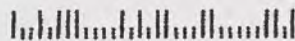

After a recent meeting with the organizers of the *Tenth International Conference on AIDS*, a few items regarding the Conference should be brought to your attention.

- **Registration for the Conference is NO LONGER required for submission of an abstract.**

The abstract submission deadline is February 28, 1994. Those who submit an abstract will be notified by the organizers during May as to their acceptance or rejection, and whether the abstract is accepted as an oral or poster presentation.

- An invoice for your registration fee in the amount of ¥80,000 will be included with your abstract acceptance letter if payment has not been previously received by the Conference organizers.

The registration fee prior to March 31, 1994 is ¥60,000 (~\$560), thereafter it is ¥80,000 (~\$750). Registration may be cancelled up to June 15, 1994, and will carry a ¥10,000 (~\$93) penalty, with refunds being issued after completion of the Conference.

Please note that your hotel deposit of ¥20,000 per room will be applied directly to your hotel bill, with the remainder of your hotel charges payable upon check-out from the hotel. All major credit cards are accepted by the hotels in Yokohama.

There has also been a change to the Conference program. Opening ceremonies will be held at 4:00 pm on Sunday, August 7, with closing ceremonies held at 5:00 pm on **Thursday, August 11** (closing ceremonies were originally scheduled for Friday morning, August 12). A few sessions will be offered on Friday morning, August 12, but these sessions are oriented toward Japanese participants.

Message from the Chair of the Organizing Committee

The 10th International Conference on AIDS/International Conference on STD will be held in Yokohama, Japan, from August 7 to 12, 1994. The Organizing Committee is busy making preparations in close cooperation with the conference sponsors IAS, WHO, and the Japanese Foundation for AIDS Prevention; with its cosponsors GNP+ and ICASO; and with the capable support of the Japanese Ministry of Health and Welfare. This newsletter has been published to heighten awareness of the significance, focus and content of the conference and to publicize the progress of the conference preparations.

One dominant feature of the upcoming conference is its locale—for the first time in its 10-year history, the International Conference on AIDS will be held in Asia. Although AIDS is a relatively recent problem in Asia, the explosive growth of HIV infection now seriously threatens several Asian countries and requires urgent attention.

To promote a global fight against AIDS, we must encourage the worldwide sharing of experience, knowledge and expertise. Clearly, the Yokohama Conference of-

fers an exceptional opportunity for such exchanges, which I believe will contribute to the adoption of effective measures against AIDS, particularly in Asia.

In an effort to ensure that the conference is both relevant and of interest to the widest possible audience, the International Steering Committee and the Program Committee are developing a conference program that reflects the wide-ranging opinions submitted by concerned individuals worldwide. As the conference should be structured to yield substantive results, I believe the conference program must deal with an extensive range of issues related to AIDS. The conference will, of course, include presentations of the highest quality on the latest findings in basic science and clinical medicine; however, it will also feature comprehensive discussions involving such issues as public health, behavioral science, ethics, law, education and economics.

Those preparing the conference program are attaching great importance to the participation of Asian and developing countries, the increased involvement of women, and a stronger focus on community activities. In addition, the Yokohama conference will offer more venues for round-table sessions than did previous conferences, thereby encouraging fruitful multidisciplinary dialogue. We expect that re-

searchers representing many diverse fields will participate in the conference and make broad-ranging presentations, thus serving to stimulate discussion. As well, we are confident that the Yokohama conference will offer venues for scientists, PWAs and NGOs to exchange information and develop the type of cooperative relationship that is needed to heighten the effectiveness of measures against AIDS and STD.

The landmark 10th conference will highlight recent scientific developments in the fight against AIDS and will spark discussion of the course we must choose for the coming century. Now that AIDS and STD have become global problems, the fight against them requires an increasingly international and cooperative effort. Thus, for we who will be hosting this event, the Yokohama conference marks a milestone in our country's history of international cooperation in AIDS-related medicine. I hope that all conference participants will take advantage of this opportunity to deepen their understanding of Japan, a country in which traditional culture and technological advancement coexist in harmony.

Finally, I would like to stress that, as several months remain before the conference opens, we very much welcome the frank opinions and suggestions of all concerned individuals.

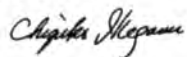

Not even the smallest, most remote community can escape AIDS, and Asia may be hit hardest by the virus. How can we combat the worst health threat of the 20th Century and ensure a secure future? One answer is to learn from the experiences of others. We need to reunite, communicate, network, and further empower ourselves. The CLC hopes the Yokohama Conference will foster such contacts.

One-Day Forum for Community Workers

The Community Liaison Committee has received correspondence from many AIDS workers and groups worldwide involved in a variety of fields. A common thread links their messages: the desire for an opportunity to build international solidarity with their counterparts in the fight against AIDS.

The Community Liaison Committee, acknowledging the importance of this need and the frustration felt by participants of previous conferences, will organize a one-day forum for community workers on 6 August 1994, the day before the opening ceremony. 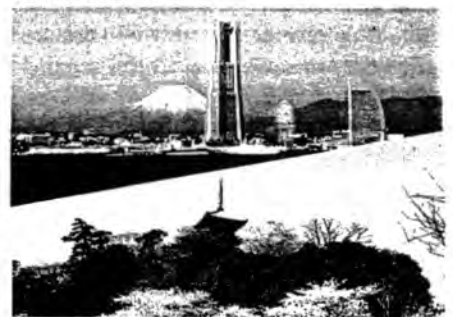

Immigration Issues

Various groups have asked us about the Japanese Immigration Policy. We are happy to respond to those questions as follows:

• People with HIV/AIDS

No one will be denied a Japanese visa or entry into Japan simply because he or she is HIV-positive or has AIDS. No question about a person's HIV status is asked when an individual applies for a visa or enters Japan, nor is HIV testing required.

• Sex Workers

Issues related to sex work and AIDS are an important part of the conference and will be discussed at the Plenary Sessions, Round-Table Sessions, etc. A mechanism has been developed to ensure the involvement of sex workers and former sex workers. For further information, please contact the CLC at the address listed at right.

• Drug Users

Although methadone is not available in Japan, individuals can bring it with them for their own medical treatment. Obtaining permission involves several simple steps.

1. Request an application form from the Ministry of Health and Welfare, Japan.

2. Complete the form and attach your medical certificate.
3. Return the form to the Ministry of Health and Welfare, Japan
4. A permission document will be issued to you.

THE STATE OF THE UNION

In a speech before a Joint Session of Congress, the President laid out his plans for the year ahead, and described the broad themes at the core of his Presidency. In 1994, we will push ahead, fighting to create more and better jobs, guarantee health security for all, reward work over welfare, and reclaim our streets from violent crime.

HEALTH CARE: We will make history, face down the special interests, and reform our health care system this year.

- * The President will fight for a plan that guarantees every American private health insurance that can never be taken away.
- * His approach builds on what works today in the private sector by expanding the employer-based system to guarantee private insurance for every American. Health insurance with comprehensive benefits covering preventive care and prescription drugs; one simple form for patients; the freedom to choose a health plan and your own doctor.

- * And while we demand tougher penalties for criminals, we must also restore work and opportunity to America's toughest neighborhoods and poorest areas: Empowerment Zones, CRA reform, and community development financial institutions.

EDUCATION, TRAINING, AND SKILLS: The only ticket to a real job with a growing income is real skills and the ability to learn new ones.

- * Goals 2000 -- tough, world-class standards for our students, linked to grass roots reforms.
- * School-to-work links schools to workplaces, and provides at least a year of apprenticeship after high school.
- * Transform the unemployment system into a reemployment system, and streamline today's training programs into a single source of new skills to help move people into new jobs.

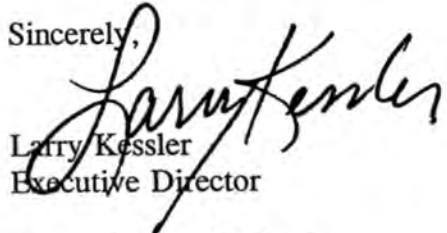

We are careful to always make it very visible that the Drug Policy Office and AIDS Policy Office are working together, because of the way that needle drug use and HIV transmission interact.

With this in mind, Kristine M. Gebbie, the President's National AIDS Policy Coordinator, has requested that if all possible, a statement from her be included in the press release that is being sent out tomorrow. Here are some possibilities:

"Thirty percent of all AIDS cases in the U.S. are a result of injection drug use. Because of this, we have a partnership with those working to stop drug abuse. If you stop drugs, you help stop AIDS. Our commitment to fight substance abuse is part of our national AIDS prevention and education program."

"Prevention and treatment in substance abuse is AIDS prevention. I am delighted to stand beside the President and Dr. Brown in their efforts and I look forward to working with Dr. Brown. Holy See Recalls Ambassadors To Explain Population Position

VATICAN CITY—In a rare move, the Vatican said Friday that it had summoned all ambassadors accredited to the Holy See to explain its position on population and development ahead of a major UN conference.

Diplomatic sources said the Vatican was trying to influence a UN-sponsored Conference on Population and Development, to be held in Cairo in September.

Vatican spokesman Joaquin Navarro-Valls said the ambassadors would listen to addresses Friday afternoon by Pope John Paul II's top two diplomats and his experts

on issues of justice and the family.

Last week, the pope delivered a scathing attack on sterilization, abortion and contraception and urged the United Nations not to try to impose limits on family size.

The pope outlined the Vatican's firm position in an address to Nafis Sadik, head of the United Nations Fund for Population Activities. Sadik is secretary-general of the Cairo conference.

The diplomatic sources said that by summoning the envoys the Vatican wanted to influence the Cairo conference's preparatory document, which is to be drafted in New York next month.

Bosnian war crimes study focuses on rape

UN team hears of terror, courage

SPLIT, Croatia—Is rape an outgrowth of the violence and lawlessness of any war, or is it used as a deliberate terror tactic in Bosnia's ethnic conflict?

Interviews with the war's rape victims—many of them done by volunteer professionals from Chicago—may help answer that question.

The Chicagoans, among mental health experts and lawyers from around the world, completed their mission here Sunday for a United Nations war crimes commission. The next step: To try to bring the guilty to justice.

"People have to realize that without justice, there can never be peace," said Cherif Bassiouni, a De Paul University law professor who heads the commission. While Bassiouni traveled throughout the war-ravaged towns of Bosnia this month, the other professionals teamed up to question refugees.

Sexual assault "has been happening during war for a long time," said attorney Sharon Crooks. "But there are so many things that happen in war that it doesn't tend to get the focus other crimes do—like the mass killings in the camps during World War II."

Crooks, a Canadian prosecutor who has studied World War II war crimes for Canada's Federal Department of Justice, investigated rapes from that war, as she did from this war during the past month.

But though rape has accompanied war throughout history, this study is "groundbreaking," focusing specifically on sexual assault in the middle of a war, said Daniel Hardy, president of Chicago's Isaac Ray Center.

Crooks suspects that some wartime sexual assault stems from the prevailing atmosphere of violence but she said some appears to be organized and "systematic." In World War II, for instance, sections of Nazi concentration camps were set aside for women to be raped, she said.

She said sexual assault of women can terrorize a community and humiliate the enemy, thereby becoming an instrument of war.

Rape is also a key example of the acute psychological trauma that accompanies the death and physical destruction of war, said Hardy, the only man in the otherwise all-female team of mental health specialists who traveled to Croatia, many from Chicago's Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center. The health workers accompanied lawyers during interviews, making sure the talks didn't traumatize victims a second time.

"If you've seen Sarajevo, you know it'll probably take 40 years

for the city to be rebuilt. It'll probably take even longer than that for the psychological wounds to heal," Hardy said.

Alice Geis, a psychiatric nurse at Rush, helps treat rape victims in Chicago and saw similar reactions to the trauma. But in Croatia, "what we're finding is that we're not just dealing with sexual assault victims—it's hard to separate that from the other war crimes."

"Sometimes getting raped isn't the most horrible thing that's happened," Geis said. "Sometimes it's knowing that their kids are watching it, or knowing that something is going to happen to their kids."

The professionals—volunteers who arrived a month ago—had to confront their own emotions when exposed to the stream of horrors. Sometimes they cried along with the victims, but often ended up impressed with the women's strength and determination.

"What I heard was, 'I must go on. I have children. I have grandchildren.' That tells me there's a great deal of hope among people who've gone through incredible circumstances," said Stephanie Ann Gregory, a Rush doctor who usually deals with cancer patients.

She said their testimony was often "a healing practice in itself. Many of them want to talk, want to go on. ... It was amazing, the outpouring."

The victims come from all three groups in Bosnia's ethnic war—Bosnian Croats, Muslims and Serbs—and are spread throughout the former Yugoslavia.

The team members concentrated on Croatia, but hope to gain entry to Serbia next, a commission lawyer said.

Lisa Capitanini, another Chicagoan, had the complex job of coordinating the 11 interview teams. "We go wherever a witness wants us to go. ... We've had people literally show up in this lobby," she said in a Split hotel.

The victims "want their day in court," Capitanini said. "But I'm not naive to the fact that the politics are very strong, in terms of whether any of this will ever see the light of day."

A final report is due from the commission by the end of April, to be presented to the UN secretary general and Security Council. A war crimes tribunal—the first since World War II—sits in The Hague, Netherlands. But whether there will ever be any trials is an open question.

Commission members hope their work—and the courage of the victims—won't be in vain. "There's never been in history an investigation of women as victims of sexual assault in war ..." Bassiouni said. "I really want the world to know the story."

How to End Impasse On RU-486 Patent

To the Editor:

In "RU-486, Made in America" (Op-Ed, March 17), Lawrence Lader, president of Abortion Rights Mobilization, suggests turning to legislation to break the stalemate that has kept RU-486, the "abortion pill," unavailable to American women for years, although it has long been available to women in Europe.

Specifically, Mr. Lader writes of the leanness by the current patent holder, France's Roussel-Uclaf, to introduce the product into the United States market for fear of a consumer boycott of its other products by anti-choice groups. In that light, Mr. Lader suggests legislation to make it possible to strip the patent holder of the patent, so that any pharmaceutical company would be free to manufacture and sell RU-486.

I will be introducing within the next week legislation, drafted last year, that would accomplish much the same thing, though by a slightly different device.

My essential pharmaceuticals bill would, rather than outright canceling a patent, provide for subjecting a patent for a pharmaceutical to a compulsory-licensing procedure, akin to that now in place with respect to music copyrights.

Where the Secretary of Health and Human Services determines (1) that a patent holder "has not taken all reasonable steps toward the commercial marketing" of the patented drug and (2) that "the availability of the product to the public is of vital importance to the public health or welfare," any pharmaceutical company could manufacture and sell the drug.

A company that did so would be required to pay royalties, in an amount to be determined by the Commissioner of Patents and Trademarks to represent fair compensation to the patent holder.

This approach will accomplish the same result sought by Mr. Lader's proposal, while avoiding protracted litigation over whether or not cancellation of a patent would constitute an unconstitutional "taking" of property.

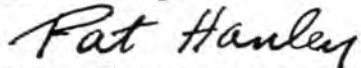

There's Got to Be a 'Morning After'

A city law requires even Catholic hospitals to offer rape victims the pill

As the woman in charge of the city's response to AIDS, Chicago public health commissioner Sheila Lyne is used to handling hot potatoes. Now Lyne, a Roman Catholic nun, is juggling an even hotter one: what to do about a little-noticed city ordinance that appears to require all hospitals, including Catholic facilities, to offer a "morning-after pill" to rape victims.

Alderman Mary Ann Smith of the 48th Ward began asking questions about the ordinance after *The Chicago Reporter*, a bi-monthly newsletter that focuses on racial matters, in October published results of a survey that asked hospitals how they dealt with rape. Twenty-two of the 26 non-Catholic

hospitals questioned did offer rape victims a pill that could prevent conception or terminate a pregnancy if taken soon enough after conception. But 14 of 16 Catholic institutions said they did not offer such a pill, citing church policy against abortion. The article noted that religious hospitals are exempt from a state law requiring that the pill be provided. But a similar Chicago ordinance apparently makes no such "freedom of conscience" waiver. The city ordinance states that rape victims "will be furnished with anticonception and antivenereal disease treatment" unless there is a medical reason not to.

Based on the article, Smith wrote Lyne and asked her to enforce the city ordinance. "If Catholic institutions can't follow the law," Smith says, "maybe they shouldn't do business in the city of Chicago."

The Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago,

however, argues that it is following the law—as it sees it. The key point is the conditions under which hospitals must offer the pill, according to Father Michael Place, chairman of the Archdiocese Medical Ethics Commission.

Though they have different names, the "morning-after pill" and the "birth-control pill" generally are the same drug. Depending on the dosage and the circumstances under which they are taken, the same pills can either prevent conception or abort a fertilized egg. The Archdiocese has advised its hospitals to allow use of the pill to prevent conception in cases of rape, thus complying with the city law's "anti-

conception" language, but not to abort a fertilized egg, Place says. He adds that the inevitable gray areas will be resolved by a physician "in line with the medical history of the patient and pertinent pharmacological information"—whatever that means.

Are Catholic hospitals obeying the law, or are they dodging it under cover of a philosophical fog? The decision is up to Lyne, who has drawn both criticism

and praise for the way she administered a condom distribution program, another issue with religious overtones. Before she decides on the pill flap, Lyne says she'll research the intent of the law and get back to Alderman Smith. But it's worth noting that Mercy Hospital and Medical Center, where Lyne was CEO before joining the city administration, was one of only two Catholic hospitals that told *Chicago Reporter* they did offer rape victims the pill.

Smith hints that she might, if necessary, live with a compromise in which Catholic hospitals gave patients a complete list of their medical options and the addresses of facilities where the pill is available. Taking the pill after a rape "is not something people are choosing because they don't want the hassle of a baby," Smith says. "Rape is a crime." ~

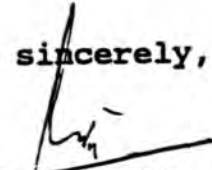
Thank you very much for your letter of May 25, 1993.

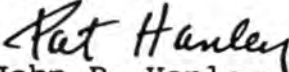

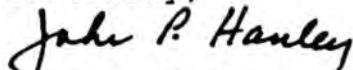

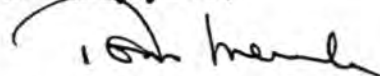
Thanks for sending me the materials you promised during our phone conversation. As I mentioned to you, my role is to let our operational staff know about important developments in our field. They, in turn, work with the member-country governments who have projects that cover family planning and reproductive health services.

Because it is a lending rather than granting agency, the Bank does not get directly involved in the procurement of contraceptives. It does advise governments about how to do it and encourages other donors to co-finance this procurement using their grant funding. We are currently preparing materials on this topic to guide the operations staff. The Bank is encouraging countries to include natural approaches where-ever it is feasible.

I think that your point about combining a fertility regulation method with use of condoms to prevent AIDS is an excellent one. A number of family planning agencies have adopted this approach.

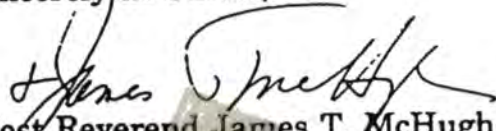

Dear Mr. Hanley,

Thank you for your letter of March 22nd concerning the Fertility Finder.

On expert advice, in the light of modern Natural Family Planning methods, I find your Fertility Finder to be unacceptable.

1. It is simply a pocket version of the "Rhythm Method" - hence it is twenty-five years out of date. Therefore, it is not a reliable guide for women, whose cycles vary widely and who today can rely on the observation of their bodily symptoms to chart their own personal cycles, taking into account the variable factors in their own lives (Ovulation Billings and Sympto-Thermal Methods).

2. It is a morally imprudent guide, because you include the advice referring users to a physician "if you experience cycles with considerable monthly variance". Such advice would open the way for many women to be subjected to pressure to accept contraception.

4. Because your Fertility Finder is not reliable, particularly at certain phases of a woman's life, it will result in unplanned pregnancies, which will in turn lead to abortions - for example if used by teenagers.

5. Promoting an outmoded method of N.F.P. widely will give a bad reputation to N.F.P. in general and will strengthen the attacks on N.F.P. made by those who dishonestly describe all N.F.P. as "Rhythm".

For these serious reasons, not only do I find the Fertility Finder to be of no use to Catholics, but I counsel you to abandon this project at once. You have a duty to the medical scientific community and to the moral and physical well-being of women and families not to continue promoting an inadequate device, which will discourage couples from using modern N.F.P.. I hope that your sincerity will lead you to study the modern methods of natural child spacing which have superseded "Rhythm", and to work in promoting those methods.

The computer application of fertility control is evidenced by the simple Fertility Finder enclosed.

As the patent rights were granted the day before yesterday on July 31, 1979 the feast day of St. Ignatius of Loyola, I would like to as did St. Ignatius offer my services for the special interests and for whatever use of by the Pope.

The Fertility Finder is based on a computer study done on the Atlas Computer of the University of London as reported in the Nov. 1969 issue of Population Studies published by the London School of Economics.

Basically it shows that as 85% of menstrual cycles are the normal 28 day cycles, the fertile period will fall at midpoint in the cycle. In other words allowing for variance the fertile period taking into account the life span of the sperm and the egg, will be from the 11th to the 18th day from the beginning of the menstrual cycle.

The 15% of irregular menstrual cycles can be regulated medically with pharmaceuticals which will then enable those so regulated to use the Fertility Finder as well.

The enclosed letter from The World Bank indicates the availability of aid to the 127 member countries of The World Bank.
