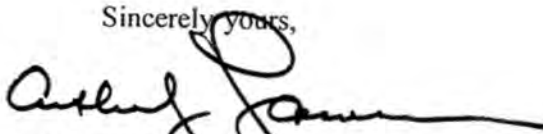

Please be assured when we consider applicants for Federal employment, we do not discriminate on any basis, including, but not limited to age, race, sex, origin, sexual preference, or disability. We will mail copies of position announcements to you as they become available.

When the Office advertises a vacancy for which you believe you are qualified, you will need to submit a completed SF-171, and indicate on the SF-171 the vacancy announcement number of the position for which you are applying. At that time, you may also wish to submit transcripts of college course work and other material pertinent to your education, background and experience.

I read where you might consider hiring a person with HIV. I'd like to be considered; but for perhaps a one-year special assignment only. And the assignment I'd like to entertain is Middle America.

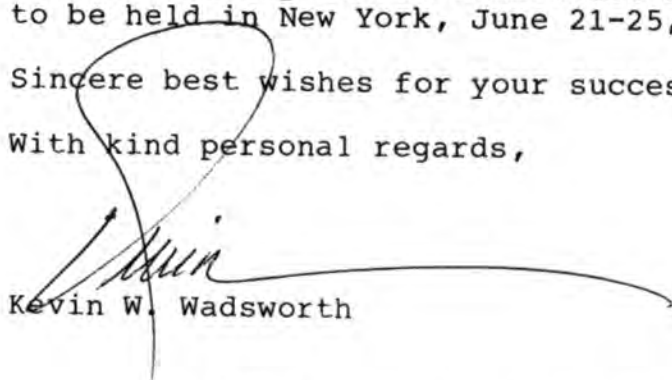
My home in Placerville is located in El Dorado County; by voting pattern the MOST conservative county in California. As president of our AIDS Task Force, I've been able to forge alliances that would not normally be thought possible in rural America. Enclosed are a few of these items.

I do have one strike against me, however. I am Republican. Some cynics like to note that a "gay Republican" is a contradiction. At times, perhaps. But I enjoy working slowly within my party to effect real, long-term change. A grain of sand at a time.

Am aware of your busy schedule but I hope you might consider my experience in dealing, successfully, with AIDS in rural America. There are certain approaches used in metropolitan areas that simply won't "play in Peoria." Along this line of thought, I've enclosed also a proposal for presentation at **The 16th National Lesbian and Gay Health Conference and 12th Annual AIDS/HIV Forum** to be held in New York, June 21-25, 1994.

El Dorado activist battles AIDS virus

Kevin Wadsworth says he is lucky — at least, as lucky as anyone who is living with AIDS can be. He has the support of many friends, and has found new ones in El Dorado County since moving from the San Francisco Bay Area two years ago.

At age 43, he has had a successful career in bank administration and made good investments, enabling him to retire a little over a year ago. He ran for the San Francisco County Board of Supervisors in 1979 and 1980, and says he was the first openly gay candidate to receive the endorsement of a major newspaper, the San Francisco Examiner.

He now has frequent guests in his spacious home, a customized country retreat with artistic appeal, set on a gently sloping hillside above a rambling brook.

The home is the fourth one he and Paul Johnson have owned in their 14 years together. They say their relationship is strong — financially and

emotionally supportive.

Although they have lost many friends to AIDS, they are hopeful that the experimental drug Wadsworth is taking, Compound Q, will save his life, or at least make the rest of his life worth living.

So far, it is working.

Compound Q is a derivative of the Chinese cucumber, and has been used to control viruses and induce labor. "The tradition is to look at old remedies, see if they are applicable to new diseases," Wadsworth said.

"Before I got on Compound Q, my T-count (measuring the ability to fight infection) was dropping fast, and I had fungus of the feet," he said. "I couldn't sleep at night, my feet itched and hurt so bad. I had thrush fungus of the mouth, swollen lymph nodes in the neck and groin."

"These are the base markers for full-blown AIDS," Wadsworth said. "I've been under treatment since May of '90, and all those symptoms are gone."

Wadsworth is HIV-symptomatic,

having tested positive for the human immunodeficiency virus, and developed symptoms that indicate the onset of AIDS. It used to be called ARC, for AIDS-related complex.

He receives treatment at San Francisco General Hospital and is one of only 50 people who have been on the Compound Q program.

"You have to take advantage of the only glimmer of hope and grab it and use it," he said.

"You have to know a program is going on, where it is and who to contact. I keep up with what's going on and participate in my health-care decisions," he said.

Wadsworth was chosen to participate in the experiment because his T-count was low and he had not taken other experimental drugs, such as AZT.

Initially, he had to travel to San Francisco every week. "It wore me out — not so much the travel, but Compound Q is very hard on you," he said.

Gold River gets OK for school

Residents applaud San Juan district

Approximately 250 Gold River residents celebrated Tuesday night after learning their community will have its own elementary school in the fall of 1993.

The residents exploded in applause after San Juan Unified School District trustees unanimously approved construction of the school in Gold River before a packed house in the Ferd Kiesel Performing Arts Center on the Mesa Verde High School campus in Citrus Heights.

"Gold River is proud to be a part of San Juan Unified," Nancy Griffin, president of the Gold River Education Task Force, told the board before its vote. "We are a community devoted to a quality education for all students."

The task force was organized early last year to press San Juan to build the school.

"I'm very excited," said Elizabeth Ruygt, whose son will enter kindergarten in the fall of 1994. "This is why we moved to Gold River—to be in the San Juan district."

Ruygt, who moved to Gold River last May, said she is also looking forward to her son eventually attending Rio Americano High School, her alma mater.

Gold River will have a "discovery school" that will focus on a science curriculum and take advantage of the natural habitat of Gold River, including the American River Parkway and the trails that go through the planned community.

Language arts, math, social studies, art, music and physical education would be taught with science interwoven throughout the curriculum.

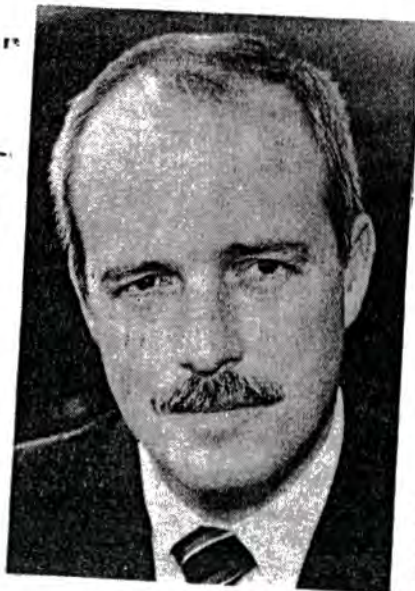
Trustee Jim Olson, in his motion to build the school, stipulated that Gold River

At the annual dinner of the Log Cabin Club of San Francisco, held on Sept. 21 at the Holiday Inn, Union Square, Kevin Wadsworth of Placerville was named the recipient of "The Ronald Grant Kershaw Award for meritorious Service."

Kershaw, who succumbed to AIDS in late 1992 and whose memorial included a testimonial by Governor Pete Wilson as presented by the late Assemblyman Bill Filante, is best remembered for providing the leadership instrumental in creating the Log Cabin movement in California and, today, throughout the country. With 10 clubs in California (Los Angeles, Orange County, Riverside County, Greater Sacramento, San Diego, North San Diego, San Francisco, San Luis Obispo, Santa Clara and Ventura County) and over 30 nationwide (in California, Colorado, District of Columbia, Florida, Illinois, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Nevada, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Texas, Washington, and Wisconsin), Log Cabin has become one of the most active and suc-

cessful of all Republican clubs.

At a dinner featuring former congressman and current state senate candidate Tom Campbell and a number of other Republican luminaries, Wadsworth, currently an elected member of the El Dorado County Republican Central Committee, was honored for his many years of service to Log Cabin Clubs in California, the Republican Party, and his AIDS education and policy activism at corporate and political levels. His tenure as president of Concerned Republicans for Individual Rights in 1979-80 is recognized as the critical developmental phase and a tremendous growth period for the Log Cabin movement. He later helped establish and served as president of Log Cabin, Greater Sacramento.

Retired now for three years due to HIV, Wadsworth is also president of the El Dorado AIDS Task Force and serves on the Regional AIDS Planning and Coordination Committee board of directors.

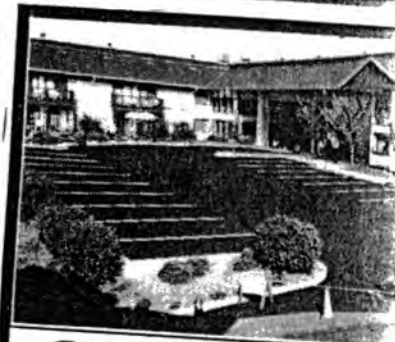

Whereas, A stubborn myth about AIDS is that it is almost exclusively transmitted through male homosexual activity or injection drug use. A recent national report should begin to put to rest that myth. The federal Centers for Disease Control found that in 1992, more women have developed AIDS through heterosexual transmission than through injection drug use. Statistics show that the percentage in heterosexual-sex and female transmission cases increased at greater rate than other forms of transmission; and

Whereas, Among sexually active people, those being infected with the AIDS virus at the fastest rate are women in their teens and early 20s, including many who have had relatively few sex partners; and

Whereas, The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that American women of all ages are contracting AIDS at a significantly greater rate than men; and

Whereas, HIV is into the teenage population and it is spreading quickly and silently. Adolescents and young adults are at the leading edge of the next wave of the epidemic; and

Whereas, Since 1981, there have been 69 reported cases of AIDS in El Dorado County and, as of March 1, 1993 45 deaths; one of whom was an infant. El Dorado County case managers have a current client base of 51 cases and it is estimated that the actual number of AIDS and HIV symptomatic cases in El Dorado County is between 100 and 300; and

Whereas, Based on statistics released by the State Office of AIDS, El Dorado County has one of the highest rates of recorded cases of AIDS per capita of rural counties in California.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved That it is the sense of this Board that the danger posed by AIDS to the citizens of El Dorado County cannot and should not be minimized; and

Be It Also Resolved That it is the sense of this Board that all possible efforts be made by education and health-care service providers in El Dorado County to stress, without reservation, that this disease is a threat to all individuals who are uninformed and, as a consequence, do NOT consider themselves at risk; and

Be It Also Resolved That this Board commends and extends the thanks of our El Dorado County community to those organizations, and their Volunteers, which have steadfastly worked to provide reliable information, relevant education, and quality services; and

Be It Also Resolved That this Board declares the month of October as "AIDS Awareness Month" in El Dorado County, and encourages County citizens, civic and religious leaders, educators, press, and public officials to pause in remembrance of those no longer with us due to AIDS and to rededicate our efforts by providing fact-based education to those not yet familiar with AIDS and ensuring that common courtesy, professional care, and compassion are extended to those who are all too familiar with AIDS; and

Be It Also Resolved That this Board does hereby encourage the community to support the educational and fundraising efforts of those organizations which provide services and support to those affected by AIDS/HIV, and which build public awareness and understanding of this disease.

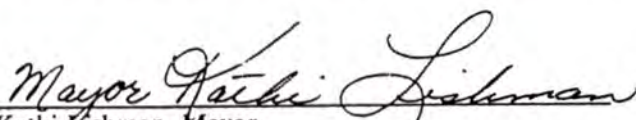

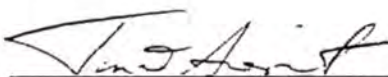

Dear Terry,

It was good to talk to you today and to have the opportunity to catch up. I am glad that you are working with Kris Gebbie and I am sure that that will immeasurably help her sensitivity to many of the issues related to AIDS research and community expectations. As I indicated to you over the phone, I would certainly be happy to help in any capacity that you and she deem appropriate. I am concerned that at the present time we are not maximally efficient in studying clinically useful combinations of drugs and making them available to patients as rapidly as possible. As I said over the phone, I feel that we are dealing with a demographic time bomb in terms of the number of people whose CD4 counts are dropping and for whom we do not have optimal therapeutic protocols. On the other hand, I certainly think that basic research initiatives and partnerships with industry have to be explored as well. Thus, any solution will have to be to directional definition.

Enclosed is my curriculum vitae for your perusal. Feel free to utilize as you see fit and circulate. If there is any material in the CV that you think would be of interest, please do not hesitate to contact me and I will be glad send you copies. In the meantime, good luck in your current assignment. I think that you have an opportunity to play a major constructive role in facilitating dialogue and formulating an effective, rational policy.

This letter is regarding a possible part-time internship with the Office of the National Aids Policy Coordinator as part of my requirements for a Masters degree in Nursing/Health Policy at the University of Maryland at Baltimore. Dr. Barbara Hanley, my department chair, suggested that I write you. Enclosed is a resume. (Please let me know if you would also like me to send you a writing sample.) This internship is to be scheduled for January through April of 1994.

My particular interests are policy issues regarding women's health and perinatal issues. As you can see from my resume, my most recent experience has been in developing and implementing educational programs in perinatal health, including developing and writing a "Healthy Pregnancy" course for the American Red Cross, and a childbirth and parenting program for Providence Hospital. I have focused on working with underserved, urban populations. 7. The student's advisor will visit the agency approximately midway through the practicum to meet with the student and preceptor.

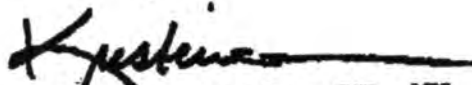

I enclose my resume for consideration for a position on the staff of the Clinton's Administration's AIDS Office.

My background in AIDS, law, and administration could be very useful to implementing and monitoring the federal government's policies dealing with HIV/AIDS. I presently serve as a senior manager of an AIDS service agency which has a caseload of more than 400 men, women and children living with HIV/AIDS. The agency also provides education and advocacy about HIV/AIDS throughout Central Massachusetts. The caseload of the agency is more typical of the HIV caseload in the future. Over 40% of the agency's clients are women; most of the clients are from minority groups; and nearly 70% acquired the virus from sharing needles or from heterosexual contact with persons who shared needles. In formulating policies in the future the federal government needs to look at how the virus is effecting women, minorities and intravenous drug users. Educational outreach needs to focus on these groups also.

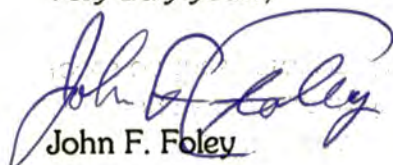

My work has encompassed case management issues, educational outreach, advocacy, fundraising and strategic planning.
