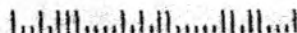

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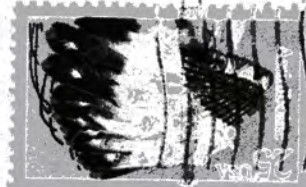

There is now persuasive evidence that "universal precautions" are not adequate.
