On average, one law enforcement officer is killed somewhere in America nearly every other day. More than 60,000 officers are assaulted each year and about 20,000 are injured. Some 600,000 sworn officers put their lives on the line for our protection each and every day. The National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial was dedicated in 1991 as a richly deserved tribute to that extraordinary service and sacrifice.

Tonight, we gather on this hallowed ground to salute all of America's law enforcement heroes—past and present. Special tribute will be given to the 13,516 officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty, and whose names grace the Memorial's marble walls. Those names include 260 new additions that we formally dedicate this evening.

Representatives from across nation gather for NAPO conference

The end of June found the East Coast starting to heat up. Not only was the temperature on the rise, but issues at the Capitol in Washington, D.C. were also hot.

PORAC President Skip Murphy and Past-President Bud Stone, the PORAC representatives, along with PORAC members, Mike Derbyshire (Monterey DSA), O.J. Holt (Santa Clara DSA), Todd Shipley (Reno POA/Nevada Chapter) and Alan Garcia (RPOAC), journeyed to Washington D.C. to participate in a NAPO Executive Committee meeting.

They were also there to attend NAPO's annual Legislative Conference and to do some coordinat-

ing on law enforcement issues with our California legislators.

The work started on Tuesday morning, June 22. NAPO President Tom Scotto (New York City Detectives Endowment Association) and NAPO Executive Director Bob Scully recapped much of the activity that's transpired since the NAPO Convention last August.

Matters of general NAPO business were discussed at the Executive Committee meeting. Included was a review of the need to get NAPO actively involved in a research grant on some aspect of general law enforcement from the
