Stars Shine on ZPG

ZPG New York Dinner Packs the House, Wows the Crowd

By the time Ted Turner brought down the house by declaring, "We're right and they're wrong," there was no question that a new day was being ushered in for ZPG. Hundreds of guests, including some of the most influential people in entertainment, business and government, packed the ballroom of the Manhattan Center across the street from Madison Square Garden. They were joined by ZPG members, supporters and staff from all over the country who were on hand to see ZPG honor Turner and his wife, Jane Fonda.

The stage was graced with four of the most talented actors in the world. Glenn Close, Vanessa Redgrave, Jane Alexander and Jane Fonda, who between them have 22 Academy Award nominations and three Oscars. The dinner committee included such luminaries as Robert Redford, Rob Reiner, David Letterman, Joanne Woodward, Paul Newman, Oprah Winfrey and Pat Schroeder. The dinner program contained congratulations and thanks from HBO, MTV, Random House, New Line Cinema, Castle Rock Entertainment, NBC, UPB, Sony, Hilton and many others. This was a night about population, the environment, personal giving and public commitment.

In his opening remarks, ZPG executive director Peter H. Kostmayer said, "In a world that is growing by 168 people every minute of every day, there is no greater challenge facing us than that of stabilizing world population. We must provide comprehensive, age-appropriate sex education in our schools. We must make voluntary family planning available to everyone

who wants and needs it. We must make the education and empowerment of women our top priority. It is dedicated people like you who will make a difference. We thank you for your continued support and we thank you for being here tonight to honor Ted Turner and Jane Fonda."

Richardson: "Get a Handle on Population Growth"

As dinner was being served, UN Ambassador Bill Richardson took time out from a UN Security Council meeting in Iraq to come across town and speak. He apologized for not having time to change out of his business suit and into a tuxedo, but he said that he felt that it was important that he be at the dinner.

"The ability to tackle social, economic and even political problems will be impossible," he said, "if we don't first get a handle on population growth."

He stressed the importance of ZPG's work in international family planning and invoked the vision in the Plan of Action from the Cairo Population Conference, "based on the core principles of human rights, gender equality and an improved standard of living. That is why the work of NGO groups such as ZPG is so important, not just for our own country but for the world's future."

After dinner, Gerald Levin, CEO of Time Warner (who Master of Ceremonies Chevy Chase described as, "the only person that Ted Turner calls 'boss.'"), said that Ted and Jane's "consciousness, compassion and commitment serve as a personal example in the cause of human dignity." He went on to announce the establishment of the "Turner Fonda Project" which will be coordinated by ZPG to focus on issues involving population

and the environment by helping young people become informed participants in shaping public policy."

Fonda: ZPG "Important Beyond Belief"

In presenting Jane Fonda with the ZPG Humanitarian Award, actor and former chair of the National Endowment for the Arts Jane Alexander said, "She is always a step or a day or a decade ahead of others in her thinking. She has kept us on our toes. And now she has turned her attention to the prevention of teen pregnancy and she will make a profound difference. She cares about kids. She knows how to talk to them and they respect her. She tells it like it is."

"She has already made her mark on the world because she cares so much about it and the land and the people and the legacy we leave our children. This will be her lifelong commitment. We

are very, very proud that Zero Population Growth has chosen Jane Fonda for its first Humanitarian Award."

Jane Fonda spoke about how Vanessa Redgrave served as a role model for her when she first got involved in social activism. Jane said she got involved because she believed it was important. "I'm very honored by this award. I think the work of Zero Population Growth is important beyond belief. I was especially happy that Peter Kostmayer and Ambassador Bill Richardson both mentioned not just family planning but the importance of educating and empowering young girls and women."

A young, single mother I know gets up every morning three hours before she has to be at work so she can spend time with her two-year-old son, dress him and get him breakfast. A married couple in their mid-twenties have decided to delay having children until they get to know one another better and can provide a more stable environment for a family. A teacher spends her own money for classroom supplies and a pair of shoes for one of her students.

These people and millions more just like them are motivated by a boundless love of children and an understanding that as adults we have no more important role in life than protecting, nurturing, educating and caring for children. Every child is special and deserves the highest quality of life that we can provide. And this is precisely why, every two years, ZPG spends so much time and so many resources preparing the *Children's Environmental Index*.

We take a great deal of pride in the work that we do everyday to educate, illuminate, advocate, and communicate the ZPG message. Population stabilization is not just a "numbers game"—it is about protecting the future and preserving natural resources for generations to come. Most importantly, it is about providing a decent quality of life for everyone. I believe that the work we do is important and effective. That is why we are here. But there is probably nothing we undertake that is more important than the *Children's Environmental Index*.

cities. And this *Index* is the third which directly addresses the social and physical environment of children. The phrase "quality of life" is as ubiquitous in this country as the term "politically correct," and numerous studies have attempted to devise objective methods measuring the quality of life.

Compared to all of these studies, however, the *Children's Environmental Index* is unique. First, it examines quality of life on the level of 319 individual cities—rather than on the metropolitan level. Second, its indicators are designed specifically to illustrate the well-being of children. In focusing on quality of life at the city level, the *Index* presents a much more precise picture of the environment in our communities—exactly where our children play, learn and grow.

Although the *Index* represents only 219 of the more than 13,000 incorporated areas in the United States, more than 25 percent of our population call those 219 cities "home." These cities thus vividly illustrate the relationship between population dynamics and quality of life trends throughout the country.

Why study children? The *Children's Environmental Index* focuses on children because, true as it may sound, our children are the future. They are the leaders and the policymakers of the next millennium. For 30 years, ZPG has been working to guarantee a bright and prosperous future for the planet by fighting for population stabilization. We can achieve zero population growth by guaranteeing access to quality family planning and reproductive health services, by educating and empowering women, by reducing unplanned and teenage pregnancies, and by doing all the other things we know work.

We want every child to be a wanted child. We also want every child to have the food, shelter, health care, education, and protection from crime and abuse that she or he needs to develop into a healthy and happy adult. ZPG produces the *Children's Environmental Index* to provide information that can be used to fight

for change in communities and to help improve the environment children grow up in.

So how are the children in our nation's cities doing? It really depends on where they live. In some cities they are doing quite well; in others they are not. When you look at the profiles of the top cities and the bottom cities, you will notice that the indicator of percent of "children in poverty" stands out. The rate of child poverty varied from a low of 1.1 percent in Naperville, IL to a high of 54.1 percent in Brownsville, TX. Statistically, this indicator explains more of the variation in the final score than all of the other variables put together.

Another indicator closely related to a city's quality of life score was the percent of births to teens. Cities with a lower teen birth rate tend to rank higher in the *Index*. As in the 1995 *Index*, we again found a strong relationship between the percent of births to teens and the rate of poverty. Because being a teenage mother significantly reduces a woman's chance of ever obtaining a high school diploma, this statistical correlation is far from surprising. In an increasingly demanding job market, a teen mother's lower average educational attainment and her formidable parenting responsibilities severely limit her employment opportunities. And because pregnant teens are more likely to have medical problems with pregnancy—but are less likely to seek pre-natal care—it is not surprising that we also found a high correlation between percent of births to teens and percent of low-birth-weight infants and infant mortality rate.

The findings of the *Children's Environmental Index* indicate that policy interventions which aim to reduce the percentage of children in poverty as well as the number of teenage pregnancies and births will have the greatest impact in our struggle to create healthier environments for our children.

The mother, the couple, and the teacher are all hidden in this survey. Look closely for them. Then look carefully for what you can do to make our cities a better place for children to grow up in.

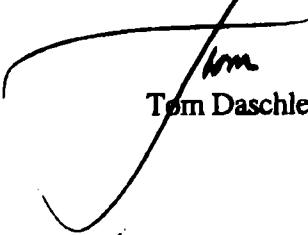

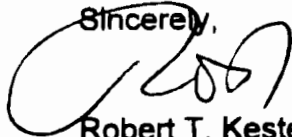

We are delighted to know that the luncheon with the First Lady, *People Magazine*, and editors of teen and parent magazines has been scheduled for December 1. I sincerely appreciate your efforts to get this date on the calendar -- Ann Moore is absolutely thrilled about this and sends her warmest thanks.

As Bobbie and I discussed, Ann and I will begin putting together a draft invitation list and a draft plan for the luncheon. Once we have something that we think looks about right, we'll send it over to you for comments.

Just for your information, we are encouraged by our recent success with *Teen People*, the popular new magazine from the publishers of *People* -- it's an early indication that working with magazines in this way is very powerful and effective. We worked with the senior editors of *Teen People* on an editorial package for their May issue (see enclosed) that dealt candidly and substantively with parent-teen communication about sex. We were thrilled with the results, as was *Teen People* -- the issue sold out in ten days and reached approximately 1 million readers nationwide.

Magazines are one of the most valued sources of information for teen girls about sex and health. Parents, too, rely on magazines for advice on how to deal more effectively with their teens around issues of sex, pregnancy and prevention. I know that the First Lady's participation in this important meeting will make a tremendous and lasting impact.

Again, my sincere thanks for all your support and I look forward to working with you.

Dear Ms. Tilly:

My organization and Concerns of Police Survivors, Inc. (COPS) have organized an ultra run from Philadelphia to Washington, DC on May 11-13, 1998. I realize that this is late notice, but we didn't have the course fully mapped out until now. We would appreciate it very much if the Vice President could run a short distance with our runners. This is not a race but rather a run at a set pace. Of course with the Vice President running with us, we would let him set the pace.

There are some reasons I thought the Vice President might want to participate. The first is that the run is for a very important cause: to represent the sacrifices of over fourteen thousand Police Officers who have been killed throughout the history of the United States, as well as the plight of those survivors left behind. Each year, COPS organizes a convention of police survivors and there is a ceremony at the Law Enforcement Memorial on E Street, N.W. in D.C.

All along the route, there will be significant support from each of the police districts in which the runners pass. Police Officers from those districts will run segments of the course. There will also be ultra runners running the full 3-day distance. The last day, May 13th, we will be starting in College Park, MD from where the remainder of the run is less than 15 miles. The Metropolitan Police are planning a big motorcade (motorcycles more than cars) to accompany the runners to the Memorial. There should be considerable media coverage. The Vice President would have ample opportunity to show and express his support for law enforcement and for police survivors.

We are leaving the start time on May 13th open in case the Vice President would want to run into DC with us. Of course he would be welcome to join us at any point along the way and we would time the start to meet him in keeping with his schedule. We have a large margin on that day since the run will only take about 2 ½ hours and we need only arrive at the Memorial before 1 PM. One option is to start early in the morning and have a special ceremony for our arrival at the Memorial with the Vice President.

I realize at this late date there is perhaps just a glimmer of hope that the Vice President would be available to join us. At least you now have our intentions in hand and can judge it accordingly.

July 17-19

Women's American ORT- First Triennial Convention, Washington, DC

World ORT is the largest non-governmental training and educational organization in the world. Originally founded to benefit Jewish communities, ORT educates and trains over 250,000 children and adults worldwide. ORT centers provide everything from basic health and hygiene and mother and early child care programs in developing countries to agricultural, forestry and high tech vocational training in developed countries.

This is American ORT's first Washington Convention and first time coming to meet with members of Congress on issues of concern. Their issue of improving the quality of life of individuals in developing nations through education is in line with the First Lady's international priorities. They want to present Mrs. Clinton with the Beverly Minkoff award, which has previously been presented to Barbara Bush and Madeleine Kunin. Amb. 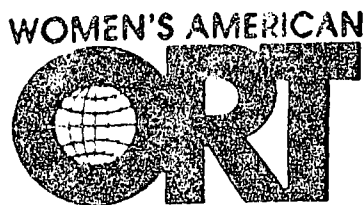

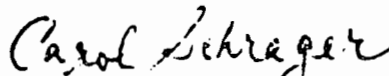

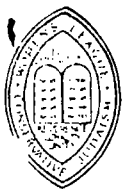

This year, the President's Committee is launching a Coming Up Taller Awards program to honor exemplary out-of-school arts and humanities programs for children and youth at risk. We will present ten awards of \$10,000 each as well as a plaque, statute, or medal to ten winners. This initiative follows up on our landmark report *Coming Up Taller: Arts and Humanities Programs for Children and Youth At Risk*, issued two years ago by the First Lady at a White House event. This initiative is supported by members of the President's Committee and private-sector donors.

Because of the First Lady's interest in children and the arts, her role as Honorary Chair of the President's Committee, and the special recognition that a White House event would bring to the awards ceremony, we would like to request that the awards be presented by the First Lady at a White House event. It is our understanding that Mrs. Clinton has agreed to make these awards.

If possible, we would like to schedule the event for late October/early November. We anticipate an audience of 200 people. During the awards ceremony, we envision performances by a small number of young people. A reception following the presentations would give participants a chance to mingle and greet the winners and First Lady.

I don't think there was any discussion in your presence of the magnitude of Norman's commitment to Save the Treasures. He has agreed to cover the full cost of a three-year project that will result in the publication of volumes 35 and 36 of the *Papers of Benjamin Franklin*, volume 4 of George Washington's *Retirement Series*, volumes 11 and 12 of *The Papers of John Adams*, volumes 28 and 29 of the *Jefferson Papers*, and volume 5 of Madison's service as Secretary of State under Thomas Jefferson. The total will be [REDACTED] - a wonderful lead *[2004]* individual gift to announce on May 4th. If Norman can be here, I know he'll find the words to move others to follow his lead. Ironically, he has a family obligation that day that could prevent him from coming -- not his family, yours -- he is one of the co-chairs of a presidential message event in LA. I think we can find an effective way to showcase this "gift to the future" even if Norman can't participate in person though clearly that would be preferable.

Norman is such a huge fan of yours that I think a personal note of appreciation for this early show of support -- and his lifetime of good citizenship -- would mean a great deal to him. *Will do*

Archives Policy

Apparently my conversation with Presidential Libraries' White House liaison was helpful. The Archivist has now decided that there will be no content review of library exhibits. This amounts to policy, at least so far as it will effect the Clinton Library. There will be new regulations issued shortly on other exhibit standards, but content will not be affected. I would first like to tell you how honored I am to have been asked to attend this presentation in honor of the recipients of the National Medal of Arts and The Charles Frankel Prize Awards.

It is my privilege to attend this event as representative of the American Society for Theatre Research. However, I wear another hat as well. I am currently Dean of the College of Fellows of the American Theatre, a unique group of outstanding American theatre artists, scholars, and educators. The membership, numbering only about 100, is made up of individuals who are leaders in their fields and have made significant contributions to American theatre. I've enclosed a card that outlines the purpose of the College and have also included a list of current members.

Each spring (this year on Sunday, 3 May) the Fellows meet at the Kennedy Center in order to induct the latest group of honorees. A number of Fellows have encouraged me to invite an important Washington figure or figures to meet with the Fellows late that morning for an informal dialogue of about 45 minutes duration on the state of the arts in America today. We would, of course, be flattered and delighted if one or both of you might be able to be our inaugural Washington (and in your case, national) spokesperson(s) at the Fellows' meeting. Re: University Admissions Policies, Leadership Alliance Invitation

It was nice speaking with you on Friday.

This memo contains two items: the Association of American Universities' statement on the continuing importance of diversity in college admissions, titled *"On the Importance of Diversity in University Admissions,"* and some added points I wanted to highlight about the Leadership Alliance meeting on December 11 and 12 that President Clinton has been invited to address.

I look forward to working with you on these issues.

On the Importance of Diversity in University Admissions

On April 14, during its annual spring meeting in Washington, D.C., the Association of American Universities adopted a statement that expresses strong support for continued attention to diversity in university admissions.

The Association of American Universities consists of 62 leading North American research universities. These institutions are represented at the association's meetings by their president or chancellor.

The text of the statement that was adopted April 14 is reproduced below.

For some time, the consideration of ethnicity, race, and gender as factors in college and university admissions has been strenuously discussed both within and outside of the academy.

The public debate about the goal of diversity, as well as affirmative action; the 1995 decision of the Regents of the University of California to discontinue any special consideration of ethnicity, race, and gender as factors in admissions; the passage of Proposition 209 in California; and the *Hopwood* ruling of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals have all combined to create substantial uncertainty about the future representation of minority students within our student bodies. Special efforts to identify and enroll women--particularly but not only in fields such as mathematics, the physical sciences, and engineering--may also be affected.

As members of the Association of American Universities, we therefore want to express our strong conviction concerning the continuing need to take into account a wide range of considerations--including ethnicity, race, and gender--as we evaluate the students whom we select for admission.

We speak first and foremost as educators. We believe that our students benefit significantly from education that takes place within a diverse setting. In the course of their university education, our students encounter and learn from others who have backgrounds and characteristics very different from their own. As we seek to prepare students for life in the twenty-first century, the educational value of such encounters will become more important, not less, than in the past.

A very substantial portion of our curriculum is enhanced by the discourse made possible by the heterogeneous backgrounds of our students. Equally, a significant part of education in our institutions takes place outside the classroom, in extracurricular activities where students learn how to work together, as well as to compete; how to exercise leadership, as well as to build consensus. If our institutional capacity to bring together a genuinely diverse group of students is removed--or severely reduced--then the quality and texture of the education we provide will be significantly diminished.

For several decades--in many cases, far longer--our universities have assembled their student bodies to take into account many aspects of diversity. The most effective admissions processes have done this in a way that assesses students as individuals, while also taking into

account their potential to contribute to the education of their fellow-students in a great variety of ways. We do not advocate admitting students who cannot meet the criteria for admission to our universities. We do not endorse quotas or "set-asides" in admissions. But we do insist that we must be able, as educators, to select those students—from among many qualified applicants—who will best enable our institutions to fulfill their broad educational purposes.

In this respect, we speak not only as educators, but also as concerned citizens. As presidents and chancellors of universities that have historically produced many of America's leaders in business, government, the professions, and the arts, we are conscious of our obligation to educate exceptional people who will serve all of the nation's different communities. The evaluation of an individual applicant to our universities cannot, therefore, be based on a narrow or mainly "statistical" definition of merit. The concept of merit must take fully into account not only academic grades and standardized test scores, but also the many unquantifiable human qualities and capacities of individuals, including their promise for continuing future development. It must include characteristics such as the potential for leadership—especially the requirements for leadership in a heterogeneous democratic society such as ours.

We therefore reaffirm our commitment to diversity as a value that is central to the very concept of education in our institutions. And we strongly reaffirm our support for the continuation of admissions policies, consistent with the broad principles of equal opportunity and equal protection, that take many factors and characteristics into account—including ethnicity, race, and gender—in the selection of those individuals who will be students today, and leaders in the years to come.

Key Points About the Leadership Alliance Invitation to President Clinton

This is an opportunity to address several audiences important to advancing diversity and opportunity in higher education and the sciences at one gathering.

If the President were to decide to address the Leadership Alliance gathering on December 11 or 12 (he was invited for the 11th, but they'd obviously accommodate him either day), he'd essentially be addressing three audiences:

- **an audience of 200 of the country's top minority students headed for or attending graduate school and conducting graduate-level research in the sciences and other fields,**
- **college and university presidents – as well as faculty – from both elite research universities, historically black colleges and universities, and other schools that serve Americans underrepresented in graduate education, such as the University of Puerto Rico and Montana State University's American Indian Research Opportunities Program.**
- **the leadership of an important scientific society, the American Society for Cell Biology, whose membership includes Nobel laureates and whose annual meeting is being held in conjunction with the Leadership Alliance.**

All of these groups are representative of larger groups – of students, of leaders in higher education, of leaders of the scientific community – that will carry the President's message to their colleagues.

This is an opportunity to address an ethnically diverse groups of students, including those studying at non-Leadership Alliance institutions.

Because the bulk of Leadership Alliance member institutions are historically black (the HBCUs) or historically white (the Ivies), it would be easy to view the Alliance as a black-white initiative. In fact, the Leadership Alliance is charged with addressing the paucity of minorities in graduate level study, including Hispanics and Native Americans as well as African-Americans, and to bring more balance to a level of study (Ph.D.) currently dominated by whites and Asians.

As an example, the Alliance works closely with SACNAS (Society for the Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science), and has recently affiliated with seven tribal colleges in Montana in efforts to reach

other groups of students historically (and currently) underrepresented in graduate study and scientific fields.

As you'll notice from the attached Leadership Alliance Student Database Summary, roughly 28 percent of the students supported by the Alliance are hispanic, asian american, pacific islander, or another ethnicity.

The Database Summary also points out that *fully 80% of the students in graduate school are attending institutions not currently affiliated with the Leadership Alliance.* This event therefore will reach both the schools that currently participate in the Alliance and, through the students, the universities who currently aren't as involved in promoting opportunity in advanced study.

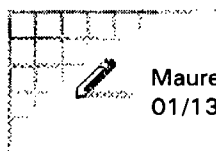

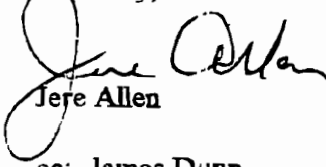

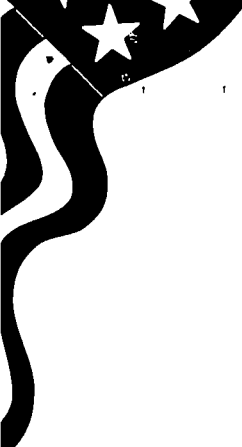

First, we believe that our Children's Rights Project could serve as a model for other state and local bar associations throughout the United States to adopt similar programs and, if you were to personally make that appeal by delivering the "kickoff" address at our annual dinner, we believe that hundreds, if not thousands, of volunteer attorneys across the nation would respond to your challenge and take up the cause of protecting and promoting the rights of poor and disabled children to enjoy the medical care and educational opportunities to which they are entitled under the law;

Second, your appearance at our dinner would provide a special opportunity for Senator Barbara Boxer to make a high-visibility appearance in Orange County and to deliver introductory remarks preceding yours to an audience of at least 700 lawyers and judges from throughout Orange County;

Third, by attending the dinner, you would be on hand to witness a truly historic event for Orange County, i.e., the induction of the first female Presiding Judge for the Orange County Superior Court, Judge Kathleen O'Leary -- an outstanding jurist and a good Democrat to boot; and

Fourth, since our dinner is on a Thursday night in late January, you would be compelled as a good parent to visit Stanford the following day to monitor some classes, possibly take in a basketball game, and, of course, spend some time with your daughter, Chelsea.

Now, let me end this letter on a more serious note. Just over two months ago, you represented our country at the state funerals of two remarkable women, Mother Theresa and Princess Diana. In life and in death, both of these unique individuals had a profound impact on the world at large and each received the praise and respect of millions of people for their charitable work in helping the poor, the sick, and the disabled -- particularly children.

As we search for ways to honor the memory of these two world figures and to carry on their work of helping those afflicted persons who cannot help themselves, we need look no further than our own cities and towns in the United States for children who, through no fault of their own, were born into poverty or were marked at birth with mental or physical disabilities and desperately need our assistance in obtaining proper health care and educational benefits. Likewise, in looking for volunteers to assist these

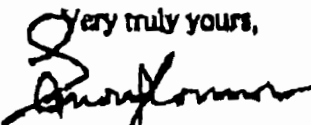

underprivileged children in securing and exercising their rights to adequate health care benefits and educational opportunities, we need look no further than the members of the organized bar.

However, "looking" and "doing" are two different things, and thus we need your voice to challenge and inspire attorneys to volunteer their time to help those in our society who will be left most vulnerable in this new age of Welfare Reform: the children. The new president of the State Bar of California, Marc Adelman, has already issued a call to arms to develop programs to protect children's rights, but, quite frankly, your voice would speak much *louder* in favor of this cause.

Although we recognize that your schedule must, of necessity, remain fluid and unpredictable, we ask you and your staff to give careful consideration to accepting our invitation to speak at our dinner. Thank you for all the good work you continue to do in support of our nation's children.

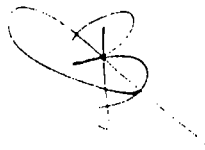

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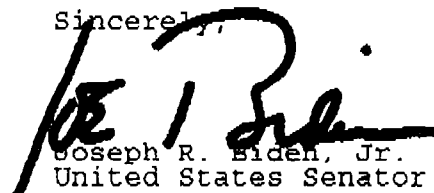

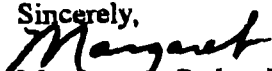
As you will see from the attached, the First Lady has indicated her interest in coming, and her direction of the invitation to her scheduler.

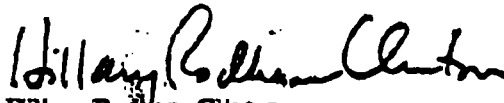

Once again, it was a pleasure to see and hear you speak the other evening at the Peace Links dinner. As a member of the Peace Links board, I heartily concur with your comments regarding the amazing force of Betty Bumpers' incredible spirit. But I also wanted to let you know, personally, what a significant impact you have, particularly as a role model for young professional women, or those about to embark on a professional career. I was struck by that fact afresh when I observed you through the eyes of five young women on Tuesday evening.

After twenty years as a lawyer and business woman, three years ago I returned to school -- Yale Divinity School -- to study ethics. The five young women are my female classmates and were my guests at the dinner. None of them had had the opportunity to see or hear you in person previously. Each of them was genuinely impressed and inspired by your brief comments and appearance, commenting on how strong and intelligent, how warm and natural you were. Their eyes sparkled and they were animated and excited when they spoke about you.

I know you do this countless times a day, and that this dinner was but a brief moment on your exhausting schedule. However, I hope you occasionally are buoyed by the realization that, as First Lady, you represent a very different model for women than we have had before. I suspect you do not even credit the significance of the skills you bring to bear on your work and exhibit so effortlessly -- most importantly, your facility in making articulate, substantive, serious, gracious and appropriately witty remarks.

As a result of hearing you, these women, as directors of the Women's Center and Committee of Social Ministry, at Yale Divinity School, asked me to invite you to come to Yale as the featured participant of a continuing symposium -- which the women at the Divinity School are organizing for the spring 1998 semester. The goal of the symposium, entitled "Women: Discerning and Raising our Voices", is to consider the different ways in which women can find and express their diverse and essential voices: as ministers, as teachers, as artists, as grass roots civic leaders and as advocates for social justice.

You could participate in the morning as the chapel speaker, during the day as a lecturer or evening as the dinner speaker. In addition, we have also extended (or are in the process of extending) invitations to Toni Morrison, Wendy Wasserstein, Jodi Foster, Joan Martin, Catherine Mackinnon, Edwina Sandys (sculptor) and Marianne Williamson to speak at other times.

We look forward to hearing from you -- and again thank you for your continuing inspiration.
