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PRESIDENT CLINTON AND VICE PRESIDENT GORE:

Supporting Women and Families

EXPANDING ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES:

- **Passed the Family & Medical Leave Act.** Family and Medical Leave enables workers to take up to 12 weeks unpaid leave to care for a new baby or ailing family member without jeopardizing their job. Twelve million families have already benefited from Family and Medical Leave since its enactment. And the President proposed expanding the Family & Medical Leave Act to allow workers up to 24 hours per year of unpaid leave for parent-teacher conferences or routine medical care for a child.
- **Cut taxes for 15 million working families** by extending the Earned Income Tax Credit.
- **Increased the Minimum Wage from \$4.25 to \$5.15** by giving 6 million women a raise.
- **Narrowed the wage gap.** Last year, the median earnings of women working full-time increased 2.4%. In 1996, the median earnings of women represented 74% of the median earnings for men, the narrowest gap ever.

MAKING OUR HOMES AND COMMUNITIES SAFER:

- **Putting 100,000 more police on the streets.** Because of President Clinton's Crime Bill, over 64,000 officers are already keeping our neighborhoods and communities safe, on the way to 100,000. And violent crime has dropped five years in a row - the longest period of decline in 25 years.
- **Signed the Assault Weapons Ban** into law as well as the **Brady Bill**, which has already kept guns out of the hands of 250,000 felons, fugitives and individuals under restraining orders related to domestic harassment. The President also signed into law an extension of the Brady Law, which prohibits anyone convicted of a domestic violence offense -- misdemeanor or felony -- from owning or possessing a firearm.
- **Signed Megan's Law** allowing community-notification of sex offenders.
- **Championed the Violence Against Women Act**, the cornerstone of the President's efforts to fight domestic violence, and created an office at the Department of Justice dedicated to combating violence against women.
- **More than tripled funding to domestic violence shelters** and instituted new penalties against men who stalk, threaten or abuse women across state lines.
- **Established nationwide 24-hour domestic violence hotline.** The hotline (1-800-797-SAFE) provides immediate crisis intervention, counseling and referrals for those in need. Since the hotline opened, there have been over 118,000 calls from all 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

INVESTING IN EDUCATION AND TRAINING:

- **Increasing Participation in Head Start.** Since 1993, funding for the program has increased by 43% -- in fiscal year 1997, Head Start will have serve nearly 800,000 low-income children.
- **Fought for passage of education tax breaks to promote lifelong learning.** Representing the largest single increase in higher education since the G.I. Bill, the Balanced Budget includes a \$1,500 Hope Scholarship to make the first two years of college universally available, and a 20-percent tuition tax credit for college juniors, seniors, graduate students, and working Americans pursuing lifelong learning.
- **Promoted national service and educational opportunities through AmeriCorps.**
- **Fighting for voluntary national education standards and signed Goals 2000** establishing world-class educational standards.

CARING FOR OUR CHILDREN:

- **Held First-Ever White House Conference on Child Care and White House Conference on Early Child Development and Learning.** In April 1997, the President and First Lady held the White House Conference on Early Child Development and Learning to highlight the benefits of early nurturing by parents. And in October 1997, the White House Conference on Child Care began a dialogue on the child care challenges facing parents today -- availability, affordability, and assuring safety and quality.
- **Extended health care to millions of children with the Children's Health Initiative,** the single largest investment in Health Care for children since 1965. The President fought to ensure that the Balanced Budget included \$24 billion to provide meaningful health care coverage to millions of uninsured children.
- **Fought for and won \$500 child tax credit for 27 million families with 45 million children under age 17.** Thirteen million children from families with income below \$30,000 will receive the child tax credit as a result of the President's efforts.
- **Increasing child care funding.** Since 1993, federal funding for child care has increased by nearly 79%, providing child care services for over one million children.
- **Signed the Comprehensive Childhood Immunization Initiative.** Thanks to President Clinton, immunization rates among two-year-olds have reached historic highs.
- **Launched new strategies to reduce the high rate of teen pregnancies.** Teen births have fallen four years in a row, by 8.5 percent from 1991 to 1995.
- **Imposed strict measures to keep cigarettes out of the hands of our children** by restricting youth-targeted advertising; and the FDA made 18 the minimum age to purchase tobacco products nationwide, requiring photo I.D.s for anyone under the age of 27.

EXPANDING ACCESS TO QUALITY HEALTH CARE:

- **Continues to lead the fight to give every American access to affordable, quality health care.**
- **Preserved and protected Medicare and Medicaid** from Republican attempts to cripple those programs. The Balanced Budget extends Medicare solvency for at least a decade.

- **Fought for greater health security for America's families.** The President signed into law the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act which includes important new protections for an estimated 25 million Americans who move from one job to another, who are self-employed, or who have pre-existing medical conditions.
- **Increased funding for breast cancer research** by 86% -- from \$276 million in FY93 to \$513 million in FY97 -- and implemented the Mammography Quality Standards Act to ensure the quality of mammograms.
- **Ended drive-thru deliveries.** Proposed and signed into law legislation requiring insurers to cover at least 48 hours of a post-natal hospital stay (72 hours for a Cesarean).
- **Endorsed legislation that would ban drive-thru mastectomies**, allowing women to stay in the hospital at least 48 hours following a mastectomy. And the President has also endorsed legislation that will **prevent health plans from discriminating on the basis of genetic information.**

PROMOTING REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH SERVICES FOR WOMEN:

- **Reversed the "Gag Rule"** limiting the information federally funded family planning clinics could give to women.
- **Increased funding for Title X Family Planning** -- each year, some 5 million persons receive Title X-supported services.
- **Signed the Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act**, establishing a safety-zone around women's health clinics.

GENERATING MORE BUSINESS OPPORTUNITIES FOR WOMEN:

- **Women are starting businesses at twice the rate of all businesses.** The Small Business Administration's Office of Women's Business Ownership is working to foster this growth.
- **There are nearly 8 million women-owned businesses in the U.S.**, generating nearly \$2.3 trillion in sales.
- **Conducted a survey over 250,000 working women** to learn more about their workplace experiences.

WOMEN AS PARTNERS IN DECISION MAKING:

- **Named women for 41 percent of Administration appointees**, by far the highest percentage ever.
- **Appointed the first women ever to serve as Attorney General and Secretary of State.**
- **A third of all judicial nominees are women**, the highest proportion ever.

The Women's Office has played a central role in promoting, expanding, and strengthening the President's agenda on women and families.

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Preliminary Listing of Special Activities Related to the 150th Anniversary of the First Women's Rights Convention

January 1998 Women's Rights Suffrage Statue Busts Exhibit

On loan from the Smithsonian Institution, a special exhibit featuring the marble busts of suffrage leaders Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony and Lucretia Mott, will open at Women's Rights National Historical Park in Seneca Falls. Adelaide Johnson sculpted these busts before she created the famous Suffrage Statue that has recently been moved from the crypt to the Rotunda in the U.S. Capitol, Washington, D.C. On exhibit through December 1998.

February through June 1998 Seneca Falls Colloquium on Women's Rights Issues

Women's Rights National Historical Park, together with the Susan B. Anthony Center at the University of Rochester, and Hobart and William Smith Colleges in Geneva, are planning a series of monthly seminars. Topics are "Women in Sports", "Gender Equity in Education", "Women and Spirituality", "Women in Non-Traditional Careers", and "Domestic Violence Issues", which is specially co-sponsored by S.A.V. (Seneca Against Violence) Coalition.

March 5, 1998 Room Full of Sisters

Treble Associates presents, and Women's Rights National Historical Park will co-sponsor, the fifth annual "Room Full of Sisters," a day by, for and about women at the Holiday Inn in Auburn, New York. This one day celebration brings together friends, relatives, acquaintances and colleagues for a luncheon gathering, sharing, workshops, and viewing of women vendor's products. The keynote speaker is Poet Laureate of Seattle, WA Mona Lake Jones.

March 1998 Mary Baker Eddy Exhibit

Sponsored by Women's Rights NHP and developed with assistance from The National Women's Hall of Fame, an exhibit and film on Mary Baker Eddy, founder of the First Church of Christ, Scientist; inductee into The National Women's Hall of Fame; and associate of Elizabeth Cady Stanton will be featured in the park's Visitor Center.

March 1998 Educational Guides

Developed by Women's Rights NHP with the assistance of the NPF Parks As Classroom Program and Eastern National the park will distribute two new teachers guides. "Be Your Own Historian: Seneca Falls and the 1848 Women's Rights Convention: A Evidence Kit for Historical Detectives, written by Dr. Judy Wellman of SUNY Oswego will be distributed through the park bookstore.

"Celebrating Your Cultural Heritage: Discovering the Untold Stories In Your Community" written by Dr. Sally Roesch Wagner, provides a overview of the influence of the Iroquois Women on the women's rights movement. Both guides are designed to help teachers participate in the park's celebration by using these materials in their classrooms.

June 13, 1998 Conference -- Women's Rights Around the World: Past, Present and Future

As part of the 1998 National Women's Studies Association Annual Conference, June 10 - 14, 1998, at the SUNY Oswego campus, a one day embedded conference will be held at Women's Rights National Historical Park in Seneca Falls. Co-sponsored by the National Park Service and the National Women's Studies Association, this embedded conference will explore the following questions: what has been/is the role of international organizations like the United Nations in expanding, protecting, and defining women's rights; can an international community create a common language; what are the costs of women's rights activism; and how can/does an international community of women's rights activists support and encourage each other? Teachers, students, theorists, scholars, and activists are invited to explore the legacy, advance the agenda, and create the networks to sustain women's rights activism into the twenty-first century.

July 1998 - The Iroquois Women's Influence on the Women's Rights Movement

The park will coordinate a temporary exhibit based on the primary research by Dr. Sally Roesch Wagner of the influence of the Iroquois women on the women's rights movement. This exhibit has been developed in cooperation with Cornell University, Wells College, Eastern National, and the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Foundation.

July 10, 1998 Welcome Reception for The National Women's Hall of Fame Inductees

The National Women's Hall of Fame and Women's Rights NHP will co-host a reception for the 1998 The National Women's Hall of Fame inductees at the national park. Following the reception, a candlelight march will take place from the Wesleyan Chapel to the Hall of Fame.

July 16 - 19, 1998 Celebrate '98

Women's Rights NHP will participate in Celebrate '98, the official 150th anniversary celebration of the first Women's Rights Convention taking place in Seneca Falls, New York, the birthplace of Women's Rights. Four days of events, exhibits, performances, speakers, presentations, and celebratory activities are taking place throughout the Village. In conjunction with Celebrate '98, Women's Rights NHP will offer the following events at park sites:

Visitor Center

The National Park Visitor Center hosts a full range of visitor activities including a 25 minute film "Dreams of Equality," interactive exhibits on the history of the women's rights movement, a bookstore featuring titles for children, for academic researchers, and those related to public women's rights issues in general, as well as note cards, posters and gift items.

Wesleyan Chapel

The Wesleyan Chapel is the site of the first Women's Rights Convention. There will be regularly scheduled, daily dramatizations of the Convention in the Chapel.

Declaration Park

Declaration Park features a 200 seat outdoor amphitheater ringed by a waterwall that has the Declaration of Sentiments and the names of the signers of the Declaration engraved on it. *Sally Roesch Wagner* and *Charles Pace* will perform as Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Frederick Douglass; *The Proper Ladies* will perform acappella Victorian ballads and suffrage songs; *Babes in Arms*, a multi-cultural performing troupe, will recreate Lucretia Mott's journey from the Philadelphia multi-racial anti-slavery meetings, to women of the Iroquois Nation, to Canada and the escaped slaves, and on to the first Women's Rights Convention in Seneca Falls.

Suffrage Print Shop

In 1851, Amelia Bloomer opened *The Lily*, the first suffrage newspaper in the United States which was a model for numerous others, and which Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony used to promulgate the movement for women's rights. The Suffrage Print Shop is a working turn of the century press, where visitors will learn how the early suffrage leaders used the press to promote their causes, and where they will design and create placards and broadsides of their own under the guidance of a master printer. Celebrate '98 Administrative Offices are located on the second floor of this building at 116 Fall Street in Seneca Falls.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton House Tours

The home of Elizabeth Cady Stanton from 1847 to 1862, the House is restored and will be open daily for public tours. The interpretive talks at the House focus on Stanton's life and personal experiences before, during and after the time period she lived in Seneca Falls, on how she came to age intellectually and politically in Seneca Falls, and about her lifelong synergistic friendship and partnership with Susan B. Anthony as women's rights leaders.

Speakers Tent at the Elizabeth Cady Stanton House

A Speakers Tent will be set up on the lawn of the Stanton House, and will feature both talks and interactive presentations throughout each day by prominent women. Celebrate '98 is working with the President's Interagency Council on Women to obtain leading women to speak on the U.S. follow-up to the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women on platforms as diverse as working women, discrimination on the job, violence on the job, economic security, women's health, the environment and more. Additionally, The National Women's Hall of Fame will be requesting past honorees and inductees into the Hall to come and speak about their distinguished accomplishments in the arts, athletics, business, government, philanthropy, humanities, science, and education.

Ceremonial Opening of the M'Clintock House, Women's Rights NHP

Located in Waterloo, 3 miles west of Seneca Falls, the National Park Service is planning a ceremonial opening of the M'Clintock House, site of the writing of the Declaration of Sentiments by Stanton, M'Clintock and other Quaker abolitionists. The National Park Foundation, located in Washington, DC is responsible for raising the private sector support for the restoration of the House. The house will be open during the celebratory period for public tours.

Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. Wider Opportunity Education Program

Seventy-five Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts (grade 8 - 12) from across the nation will have the opportunity to participate in a very special activity, *Women: Now, Then and All Ways*. Scouts will come to Seneca Falls and with local Girl Scouts will be trained as guides at Women's Rights National Historical Park by park staff. They will learn about the history of the first Women's Rights Convention and early women's rights movement, will interact with the public, and will learn about historic preservation techniques. The girls will experience new environments while working side by side with professional and subject matter experts. In addition, local Girl Scouts will serve as color guards at various Celebrate '98 activities.

The theme of *Women: Now, Then and All Ways* focuses on women's history, women's leadership and career opportunities. In addition to the site visit and work at the National Park in Seneca Falls, the Scouts will tour other facilities in the area and receive a "Wider Opportunities" badge.

August 20 - 22, 1998 Conference -- Teaching Women's History

This special conference, co-sponsored by the Organization of American Historians and the National Park Service, is being held in Seneca Falls to observe the 150th anniversary of the first women's rights convention. The conference will examine new scholarship and research in women's history, both for general academic use and for specific use by secondary school and community college teachers and professors.

CELEBRATE 98

CELEBRATING THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF

THE FIRST WOMEN'S RIGHTS CONVENTION

In July 1998, the nation will celebrate the 150th anniversary of an event which changed the world - the first Women's Rights Convention held in 1848. At that time, women were not allowed the freedoms assigned to men in the eyes of the law, the church or the government. Women could not vote, hold office, attend college or earn a living. If married, they could not make legal contracts, divorce an abusive husband, or gain custody of their children.

Then, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, a Seneca Falls housewife and mother of three sons, sat down with a small group of Quaker and abolitionist women, and decided that these wrongs should be made into rights. They called for a Convention, open to the public, to be held in Seneca Falls at the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, July 19th and 20th, 1848. There they presented a Declaration of Sentiments, based on the language and content of the Declaration of Independence. Stating that "all men and women are created equal," they demanded equal rights for women, including - a radical idea - the right to vote. Over 300 people attended the Convention; the document was ratified and was signed by 68 women and 32 men.

The first Women's Rights Convention and the Declaration of Sentiments have earned the small Village of Seneca Falls a large place in the hearts of the people all over the world. There is no major part of our lives which has not been affected by the revolutionary document.

Now, a century and a half later, a not-for-profit organization called *Celebrate '98*, honors the first Women's Rights Convention and the women who made it happen. *Celebrate '98* is planning four days of events, July 16th to 19th, 1998. The focus will be on the past, present and future: To honor the 150th birthday of the women's rights movement; to acknowledge the profound ways this has affected us today, and to chart a bright future for women and men all over the globe. *Celebrate '98* has been designated the *1998 I Love New York Summer Festival* by New York State Governor George Pataki.

Celebrate '98 programs in Seneca Falls will feature women in politics, industry, medicine, sports, entertainment and the arts. There will be a daily dramatization of the first Women's Rights Convention, and other dramatic productions highlighting famous women. Prominent women will discuss their achievements: From their exploration of outer space to their inner journeys. In the Legacy Tent, girls and women will be encouraged to leave an autobiographical record of their ideas and their hopes for the future, to be preserved as a living archives. A partnership has been formed with Forum'98 from Rochester; who is bringing together women from around the country and will write a new Declaration of Sentiments for the 21st century, which will be on display for everyone to sign.

Seneca County is located in the beautiful Finger Lakes Region, and is famous for wine, women and sparkling waters. Enhancing the programs of *Celebrate '98* will be boat rides on a branch of the Erie Canal, buggy rides through the Historic District along with other sites; tours of local wineries, art exhibits, and museum programs. Visitors can explore four state parks, the Finger Lakes National Forest, and the Montezuma National Wildlife Refuge. The Women's Rights National Historical Park, The National Women's Hall of Fame, the Seneca Falls Historical Society, the Seneca Falls Urban Cultural Park and the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Foundation will offer special events for all ages. THE DECLARATION OF SENTIMENTS FOR THE 21st CENTURY - Forum '98 will present the new declaration at a ceremony where women and men will have the opportunity to sign the new declaration and become part of history.

MUSICAL PERFORMANCES - Trios, quartets, quintets, women and men, young and old, will perform classical, jazz, folk, and rock n' roll throughout Celebrate '98. Enjoy an evening of classical music with the Syracuse Symphony. The Kit McClure Big Band who "wowed the crowd" at Clinton's inaugural ball will jazz things up. Modern female rock will have Celebrate '98 dancing into the future.

HISTORICAL DRAMAS - Daily dramatizations of the 1848 Convention in the Wesleyan Chapel - the location of the original Convention. Sally Roesch Wagner and Charles Pace perform as Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Frederick Douglas. BABES IN ARMS, a multi-cultural troupe, will take you on a journey with Lucretia Mott from the antislavery meetings in Philadelphia, to the First Women's Rights Convention in Seneca Falls. THE PROPER LADIES will perform acappella Victorian ballads and suffrage songs. The Alice Paul Foundation will reenact the 1923 unveiling of the ERA at the Seneca Falls Episcopal Church.

LEGACY TENTS - Photographs and narratives by our contemporaries on important women in their lives are displayed in the *PAST TENT*. The *PRESENT TENT* houses a forum for the exchange of ideas between professional women/mentors and visitors. In the *FUTURE TENT*, women and girls will share and preserve their dreams of women's rights and human rights in a variety of media for our archives.

CHILDREN'S ENTERTAINMENT and ACTIVITIES - Designed to educate, challenge and enrich young children with interactive games, historical figures, puppets, clowns, dancing, a children's marching band, magic, arts and crafts. Charlotte Winger Bearskin, a Seneca clanswoman, is the featured story teller.

SPEAKERS PAVILLION - At the Elizabeth Cady Stanton House, the National Park Service is working with the President's Interagency Council on Women to bring women leaders in government to speak in Seneca Falls. In addition, The National Women's Hall of Fame brings their Distinguished Speakers Series the the Pavillion.

HOUSE TOURS - The National Park Service will have tours of the home of Elizabeth Cady Stanton as well as restoration tours of the yet to be completed home of Mary Ann M'Clintock, where the Declaration of Sentiments was written, in Waterloo. Wind your way through a 23 room Victorian Home featuring Victorian period rooms and exhibits of local history with the Seneca Falls Historical Society.

FINGER LAKES FOOD and WINE PAVILION - Come savor New York State. Prominent women in the food and beverage industry will provide demonstrations. Sample New York State's finest wines at our daily wine-tastings.
