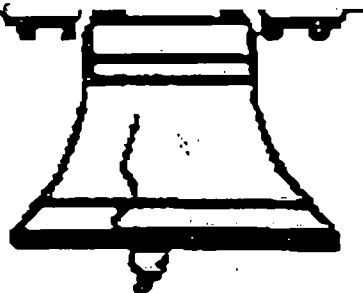

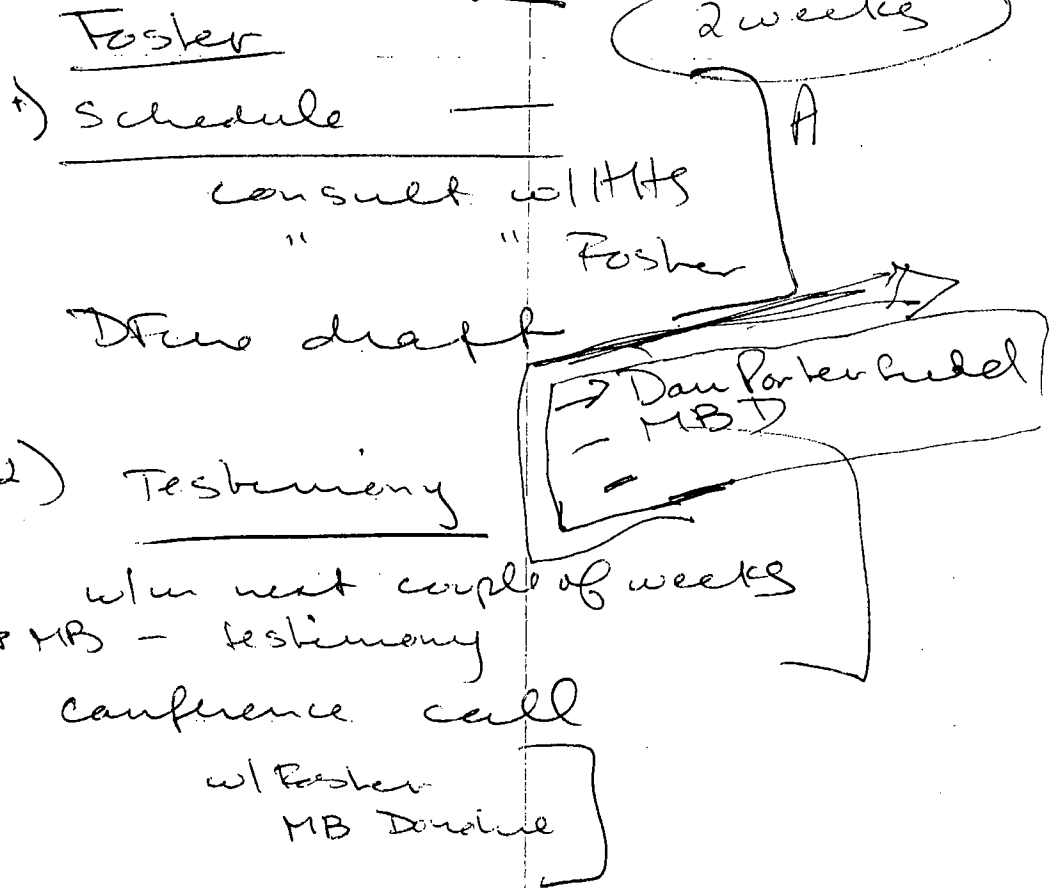

SUBJECT: Invitation to Dr. Foster to Testify Before Congress

On Tuesday, April 30, the Subcommittee on Human Resources and Intergovernmental Relations of the House Committee on Government Reform and Oversight is holding a hearing entitled, "Preventing Teen Pregnancy in America: Coordinating Community Efforts." The stated purpose of the hearing is to explore strategies for reducing teen pregnancy rates by focusing on local, community-wide, collaborative efforts. (See attached letter of invitation.) Rep. Chris Shays, Chairman of the Subcommittee, has invited Dr. Foster to testify.

It is our understanding that the hearing will be made up of three panels: 1) representatives of the National Campaign to Reduce Teen Pregnancy, 2) teenagers, and 3) representatives of private organizations. More details about the agenda and who will participate in the panels will not be worked out for another couple of weeks. (Note: We do know from our conversations with The Campaign that they are planning to send Kristin Moore, a member of their Board and Executive Director of Child Trends, to represent them. It was their sense that the Subcommittee hoped to have Dr. Foster join her on the panel representing the Administration.)

From talking unofficially to people on the Hill and in HHS, the Subcommittee seems to be fairly moderate and it is highly possible that this will be a positive forum for discussing these issues.

We have been talking with HHS to explore whether or not it makes sense for Dr. Foster to testify. Although Dr. Foster was invited as a member of the National Campaign -- he is not a member of this non-profit organization; as you know, he is an unpaid, Expert Consultant to HHS and a Senior Advisor to the President. HHS Legislative Affairs believes that the Subcommittee will want Dr. Foster to participate regardless of who he is representing.

If the panels for this hearing develop in a way that seems friendly, we think this would be a good forum for Dr. Foster to represent the Administration, drawing on his personal experience in this field.

Do you agree with this recommendation?

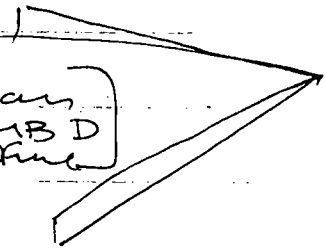

SUBJECT: Several Items

I seem to have gathered several things on my desk about which I need to consult with you; I thought I would use this written form to outline them. If I need to clarify any of this please do not hesitate to call me; I will be in the office Wednesday and then not again until Monday, April 8.

1. I have had a number of calls and inquiries within and outside the White House about the Philip Adler piece in the WASHINGTON POST on Tuesday, April 2 entitled "Preventing Polio: Don't Tamper With Success." Can you send me anything that CDC and/or AAP has put out that discusses the "other side" of this issue?

2. In the March 19 LA TIMES there was an article by Robert A. Rosenblatt regarding a "Clinton Administration" summit with Congress, business, etc. to "devise ways to help the baby-boom generation prepare for retirement. About 100 people will attend..." Needless to say we are getting inquiries. We assume this refers to a piece of the Administration on Aging's initiative on REDEFINING RETIREMENT...about which I have seen a one page draft flyer. Can you share more with us on this "summit"?

3. In the HHS weekly report of March 22-29 the President has asked Leon and myself about the New Jersey Childhood Brain Cancer Cases and expressed interest in our staying abreast of the matter. Can you send me a more in-depth briefing on this issue including current action on the matter?

4. The President has inquired about the ongoing work of Dr. Foster. He would like to see a memo giving an overview of the next several months outlining what Dr. Foster will be doing with as much specificity as possible. I have asked Jeremy Ben-Ami to contact you so that the memo might be a joint effort by HHS and the White House with input of course from Dr. Foster.

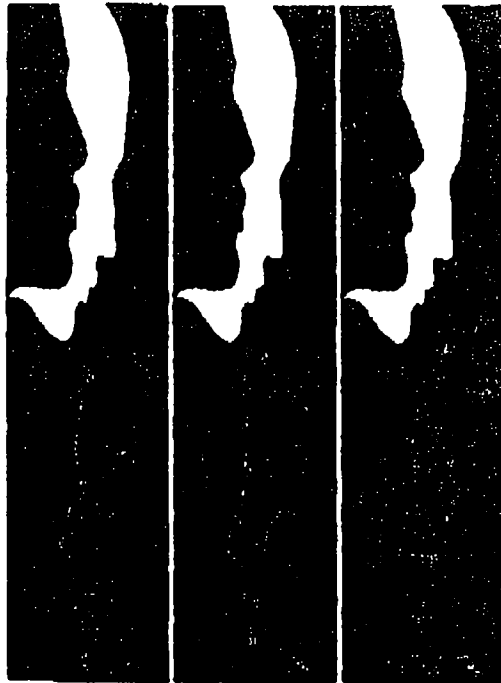

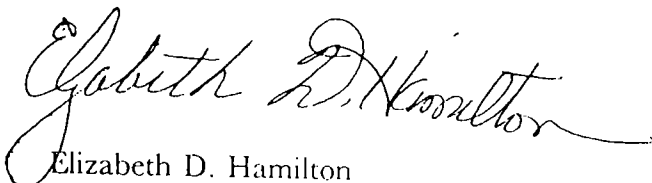

BY LAWS

The MISSION of the SAN MATEO COUNTY PERINATAL COUNCIL, a local chapter of the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies is to ensure that all women, girls and families have access to a continuum of quality perinatal services.

ARTICLE I Name

The name of this organization shall be SAN MATEO COUNTY PERINATAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II Purpose

The purposes of this organization are to:

- A. Serve as a clearinghouse to provide a larger picture of services in San Mateo County. Serve as a Council to clarify the services available and identify gaps and overlap.
- B. Inform and educate policymakers, community leaders, and decision makers, that perinatal issues are a crucial component of women's health and family health issues.
- C. Advocate for the needs of women and for maternal/child legislation at county and state levels.
- D. Encourage support for the activities and programs of Council members.
- E. Focus on prevention and education.
- F. Identify and suggest improvements in needed services and advocate for resources to meet those needs.
- G. Provide education to Council participants and encourage collaboration between members and the community.
- H. Assure access to care for clients.

ARTICLE III Council Membership

- A. Nature of membership: Membership in the Council is open to any interested individual or member of an organization who agrees with the mission and purpose of the Council.

- B. Qualifications of Membership: Members of the Council agree to attend Council meetings, sign a MOU (memorandum of understanding), pay designated membership dues, and promote awareness of perinatal health issues to the constituency served by our organizations. Additionally, as members of this Council, each organization agrees to participate in one or more of the following:
- (1) Advocate for policy and environmental changes at the local, state and national level, which will improve access for women and their families.
 - (2) Participate in Council committees and activities.
 - (3) Support Council activities with donations or in-kind goods and services.
 - (4) Support activities or programs of member Council organizations through endorsements, referrals and technical assistance.
 - (5) Provide special skills to support or assist the Council with its mission, goals, programs or activities.
- C. Members may renew every June by signing new MOUs. New members will be accepted throughout the year.
- D. Rights and Responsibilities of Members. All members who have signed a MOU and who are current with their membership dues will be considered members in good standing and are eligible to vote.
- E. Endorsement Provisions
By signing an endorsement, an organization endorses the mission and purpose of the Council and agrees to have its name on the letterhead of the Council.
- F. Dues
- (1) Membership dues are set by the general Council membership by majority vote.
 - (2) Dues are for a calendar year. New dues are to be published in Council minutes.
 - (3) Dues for the period of March 1993 through December 1993 are established at \$0 per member.

ARTICLE IV Council Meetings

- A. Regular Meetings: the regular meeting of the San Mateo County Perinatal Council will be held quarterly.
- B. Special Meetings: special meetings of the COUNCIL can be called by its Steering Committee or Council Coordinator in order to address issues which cannot wait until the next quarterly meeting.
- C. Quorum. Twenty percent of the active Perinatal Council members at any regular or special meeting shall constitute the number necessary for purposes of conducting business or amendment of these laws, rules and regulations. A simple majority of those present will be required for passage of any action.
- D. Minutes:
 - (1) Minutes of each Perinatal Council meeting shall be prepared and include a record of attendance of members attendance and the action taken on each matter.
 - (2) Responsibility for minute taking will rotate among the members of the Steering Committee.
- E. Regular membership meetings may include a number of educational, informational, coordinating, networking or other activities or events as well as a business meeting session.
- F. The general membership as the decision-making body of the Council will make decisions on the following issues:
 - (1) Disbursement of funds
 - (2) Active Council membership
 - (3) Approval of public positions taken in the name of San Mateo Perinatal Council (such as letters of support for grants, statements to be made to the press, advocacy statements to be sent to lawmakers, etc.)
 - (4) Amendments of the by-laws such as new committees, or dues.

ARTICLE V Steering Committee

- A. The Steering Committee shall consist of Council members, members elected by Council members, and representatives from standing or adhoc committees to total at least 11 and not more than 15 persons.
- (1) Of the original Steering Committee (established in 1993), four persons will serve for 1 year and 4 for 2 years.
 - (2) After the first year of the Council, four will continue to serve for 1 more year. Four members will be voted onto the Steering Committee. Election meetings to be held in March of each year.
 - (3) Elected members will serve up to two consecutive 2 year terms.
 - (4) Other members of the Steering Committee will consist of a representative from each of the standing committees as well as any ad hoc committee requested by the general membership; committee chairs may serve up to 4 consecutive years.
- B. All general members are welcome to attend the Steering Committee Meetings.
- C. Responsibilities of the Steering Committee:
- (1) Make recommendations to the Council
 - (2) Prepare agenda for quarterly Council Meetings and make suggestions as to direction of all committees
 - (3) Call meetings as needed
 - (4) Prepare and make minutes available to the general membership upon request
 - (5) Maintain the on-going process of the Council
 - (6) Address and propose procedure for voting as an individual or as an organization on special issues.
- D. Quorum: Presence of half or more of the Steering Committee members shall constitute the number necessary for purposes of conducting business. When there is a quorum a simple majority of those present will be required for passage of any action.

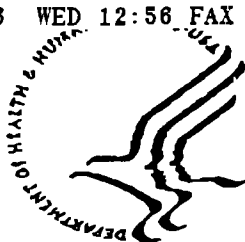

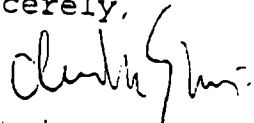

The Communitarian Network announces its annual White House/Congressional Conference on Character Building, co-hosted by the White House and U.S. Congress.

This year's meeting will be a special and unique one:

- *Bipartisan support.* The growing universality of our message is demonstrated by the bipartisan nature of our co-hosts in an otherwise partisan year – President and Mrs. Clinton and Senator Bill Bradley (D-NJ) and Senator Nancy Kassebaum (R-KS).
- *The breadth and scope of our speakers.* Coming to speak to you are governors, leading national state and local educators, journalists, academics, business and labor leaders, and community leaders.
- *The ambitious objectives for the meeting.* Through this meeting we expect to:
 - ⇒ Put the behavioral approach to character formation on the national agenda and take the steps needed to build national consensus about its importance;
 - ⇒ Bring together top leaders to identify the most promising strategies for character building in our schools and forge agreement on action plans for the coming year;
 - ⇒ Engage decision-makers at all levels of government, education, and community life in discussions about how they can help carry out our character building agenda.

The conference will be held on June 6-8, 1996 in Washington, DC. We will meet both at the White House and on Capitol Hill.

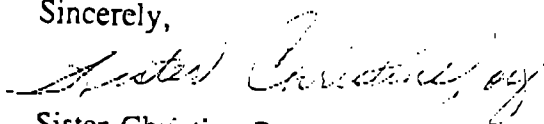

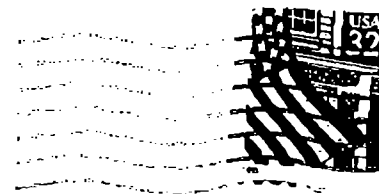
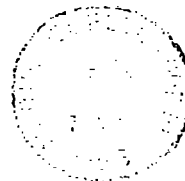
