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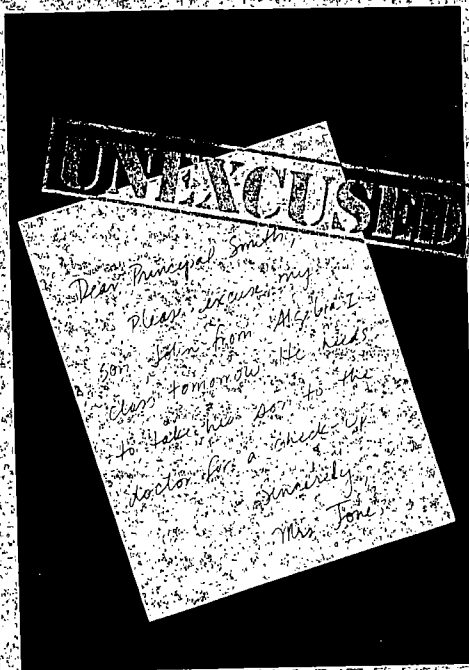

"TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION MONTH"

The Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Coalition of North Carolina has designated May as "North Carolina Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month." We will provide leadership and activities that will increase prevention planning, programs, and funding.

Statewide, the Coalition will do the following this year and we hope to increase each year, the involvement and participation of local agencies, departments, councils, churches, the media, and businesses in the campaign.

1. Governor's Proclamation declaring May "Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month."
2. Poster that addresses the need for prevention and community awareness.
3. Buttons, placemats, bookmarks and other materials for "Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month"
4. 10th Anniversary State Conference in Raleigh, "The Kaleidoscope of Prevention: A Decade of People and Programs"

Things that you can do to support the state campaign:

1. Initiate and take part in activities in your community to promote "Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month."
2. Attend the State Conference in May and bring local Legislative representatives with you.

Things To Do Locally to Participate in Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month:

1. Develop a local poster contest, in schools, clubs, youth groups.
2. Make a presentation to the Mayor, City/County Councils. Ask for Proclamation declaring May "Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month."
3. Plan a Community Forum on Teen Pregnancy Prevention.
4. Ask area churches to use a Sunday in May to discuss teen pregnancy prevention in Sunday school, the pulpit or in bulletins.
5. Ask local newspapers and high school newspapers to do articles on teen pregnancy prevention.
6. Ask businesses to put a prevention message in their pay check envelopes.
7. Ask for billboard space.
8. Ask television and radio stations to run PSA's on prevention. Get teens to record radio PSA's - it's a great way to involve them.
9. Ask to be guests on television and radio talk shows in May.
10. Do: Bumper Stickers, Buttons, T-Shirts.
11. Design a display about your programs on prevention for public spaces, malls and libraries.
12. Make presentations to United Ways, School Boards, Clubs, Agency Meetings.
13. Put prevention posters in bathrooms of teen hangouts/businesses.
14. Do a Cable TV show on your own.
15. Health Fairs at Malls - Schools.
16. Ask Pizza Hut, Domino's, etc to put Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month Stickers on their boxes.
17. Plan and participate in Parent-Child Retreats.
18. Ask Hospitals to include lectures on Teen Pregnancy Prevention in grand rounds, teaching programs.
19. Plan a training program for professionals to increase their prevention skills.
20. Invite your state legislators and local elected officials to see your program.

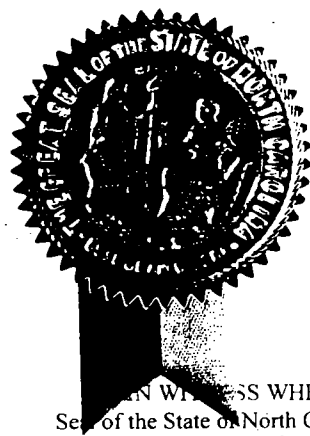
A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, teenage pregnancy significantly affects the health, economic and educational future of teenagers and cost our state more than \$458 million in 1991; and

WHEREAS, teenage parents are often unable to complete their education, which later results in unemployment, underemployment and dependence on public welfare. Teenage mothers often seek prenatal care late, if at all, and therefore frequently suffer higher than average levels of toxemia, anemia and cervical trauma. Their babies are often born premature and with low birthweights; and

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina is committed to involving churches, businesses, media, parents, agencies, educational institutions, policy makers, and health providers in helping to prevent teenage pregnancy. The purpose of the Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Coalition of North Carolina is to advocate and support programs and strategies that prevent adolescent pregnancy and decrease the problems associated with adolescent pregnancy in North Carolina;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JAMES B. HUNT JR., Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim May, 1995, as "Teen Pregnancy Prevention Month" in North Carolina, and commend this observance to our citizens.

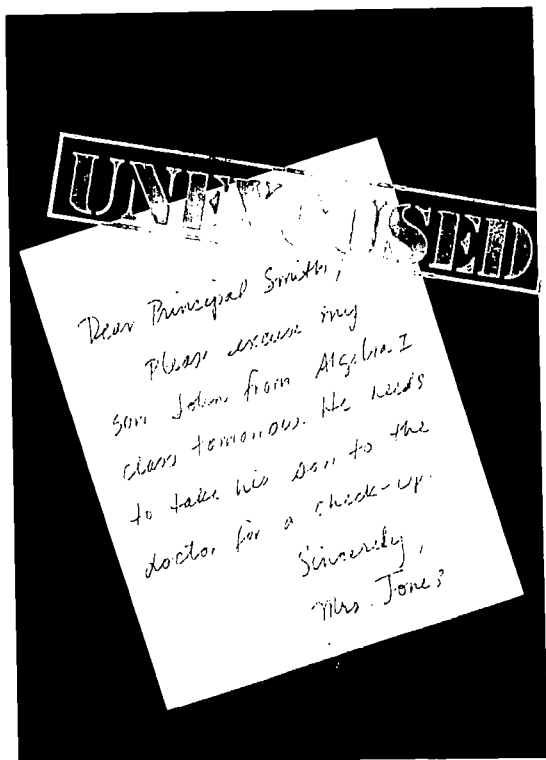
