

## **Administration for Children and Families**

The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) Office of Planning, Research and Evaluation (OPRE) funds several research, evaluation and demonstration projects. We received an extensive description of the following:

### **Research and Evaluation**

Teen Parent Demonstration Evaluation From 1986-1991, ACF funded the operation of the Teen Parent Demonstration, a large-scale education-training-employment demonstration initiative for teenage parents on welfare, in two state welfare agencies, Illinois and New Jersey. ACF and ASPE are currently funding a five-year follow-up.

New Mothers' Study Since FY 1988, ACF/OPRE has jointly funded with other government agencies and with private foundations of the research and analysis of the nurse home visitor project in Memphis, Tennessee. Through the New Mothers' Study, first-time pregnant, low-income women were randomly assigned to treatment streams, one of which included weekly home visits by a nurse throughout the period of pregnancy and the next two years following delivery. Approximately 65 percent of the research sample were 18 or younger at enrollment.

Evaluation of the Home Visiting Services Demonstration ACF/OPRE committed FY 1995 funds to enhance the evaluation of the Home Visiting Services Demonstration targeted to teenage parents receiving AFDC. Under the demonstration, which is funded by ACF, state and local welfare agencies are responsible for identifying first-time teenage parents coming onto welfare. This is being done jointly with the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation.

### **Demonstrations**

Comprehensive Services for Teenage Parents on Welfare Beginning in FY 1992, 15 demonstration sites in 14 states were approved for a 24 month period. The goal of this activity was to support the development of programs which provide comprehensive services to meet the personal, physical and social needs of teenage parents on welfare as well as aid the cognitive, physical and emotional development of their children in conjunction with mandatory participation requirements for JOBS activities (i.e., education and employment-related activities).

Home Visiting Services Demonstration In FY 1994 ACF awarded five grants to support a 17-month Feasibility Phase of the demonstration. In FY 1995, ACF selected three of the five sites to continue for an additional two year period of full operations. Under the demonstration first-time teenage parents on welfare are being randomly assigned to one of three groups, a control group which receives the services normally provided through the welfare system and two experimental groups: one in which the teenage parents receive JOBS/employment-related services and weekly home visits by a paraprofessional through the welfare agency and another in which the demonstration activities are provided by a community-based organization under contract to the welfare agency. ACF expects to continue the Home Visiting Services Demonstration grants for an additional 12-month period, through November 1997.

## **Dissemination of Information**

ACF has issued fact sheets and press releases to inform the public about the findings from the Teen Parent Demonstration evaluation (based on two year follow-up period). In addition, press releases have been issued to inform the public regarding the award of funds for new demonstration projects.

ACF/OPRE has sponsored conferences bringing together demonstration project managers and staff to share information across experiences and with ACF and to facilitate dissemination of related research findings to enhance demonstration design and implementation in the local site.

The Office of Community Services funds the Demonstration Partnership Program which authorizes grants to Community Action Agencies and other Community Services Block Grant Eligible Entities for the Development and implementation of new and innovative approaches to increasing the self sufficiency of the poor. This office submitted summaries of all grants from 1989-1994 and highlighted those related to teenage pregnancy. While their sole purpose is not to prevent teenage pregnancy, there have been approximately 20 grants awarded related to youth-at-risk that could include the issue.

The Administration for Children, Youth and Families funds a variety of programs for youth (see attached draft matrix). We will be receiving information on their research and evaluation findings.

## **Health Care Financing Administration/Medicaid Bureau**

In general, adolescents enrolled in Medicaid are entitled to a comprehensive range of preventive, primary, and specialty services encompassed with the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) program. EPSDT is a comprehensive health program for Medicaid eligible individuals under age 21.

The Medicaid Bureau has information on how much it spends on family planning services for those aged 20 or younger.

Together with the Health Resources and Services Administration/Maternal and Child Health Bureau the Medicaid Bureau conducted the Bright Futures project which included guidelines for children's health services. The report included adolescent pregnancy prevention.

Medicaid operates as a joint Federal-State program. Each state, using Federal and state funds can develop its own teenage pregnancy prevention initiatives and ways to improve teenage pregnancy outcomes. In addition, several states have been granted waivers for demonstrations to expand family planning services for up to five years for women following a birth. These efforts are being evaluated.

## **Public Health Service Agencies**

Included below is summary information on teenage pregnancy prevention activities from the **Indian Health Service, Health Resources and Services Administration, Office of Population Affairs, National Institutes of Health, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.**

### **Indian Health Service**

The Indian Health Service (IHS) has had a limited role in its ability to be proactive on teenage pregnancy prevention and related issues given the nature of the relationship between the federal government and the sovereign American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) nations. Despite high teenage pregnancy rates many AI/AN nations have not identified this as a high public health priority.

IHS **research and evaluation** has focused on broader contributing issues to teenage pregnancy prevention which includes child abuse and neglect, family violence, teenage behavior patterns (risk factors) and Teen Clinic projects. There does not appear to have been an enhanced interest or focus on teenage pregnancy prevention within IHS during this Administration.

IHS **disseminates information** in a variety of ways including: IHS Primary Care Provider Newsletter, Community Health Representative program, IHS AIDS program, IHS Public Housing program, Teen Health Clinics, and IHS Health Education program which functions as a clearinghouse of information.

IHS has recently only minimally participated in two **local demonstrations** which have addressed teenage pregnancy.

### **Health Resources and Services Administration**

Two Bureaus within the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) address teenage pregnancy prevention. HRSA provided information from the Maternal and Child Health Bureau (MCHB) and the Bureau of Primary Health Care (BPHC) on research projects, dissemination of information, and demonstration projects. Some of the activities listed below are jointly funded by the two Bureaus.

Since FY 1992 MCHB funded 10 **research** projects which address teenage pregnancy related issues. Some are training projects which include a research component. MCHB **disseminates information** through a variety of mechanisms including: six databases, many publications, the National Maternal and Child Health Clearinghouse, National Resource Centers on Adolescent Health, conferences and meetings, and electronic media. Since FY 1992 MCH has funded 59 **demonstration projects** related to teenage pregnancy prevention.

The BPHC **disseminates information** through publications, technical assistance, and associations. The Healthy Schools, Health Communities is the only **local demonstration** BPHC

is currently funding which addresses teenage pregnancy prevention. This demonstration funds school-based health centers.

### **Office of Population Affairs**

The **Title XX Adolescent Family Life (AFL)** Program, administered by the Office of Population Affairs, supports **research** grants that encourage all applicable scholarly approaches to the study of adolescent family life. Grant awards are made to investigate six areas: 1) influences on adolescent premarital sexual behavior; 2) consequences of adolescent premarital sexual behavior; 3) consequences of adolescent premarital pregnancy; 4) the adoption option for the unmarried adolescent mother; 5) parenting by the unmarried adolescent mother; and 6) adolescent pregnancy services. Awards are for three years and direct costs do not exceed \$100,000. Deadlines for AFL research grants are October 1, February 1, and June 1 of each year. The AFL research grant program was enacted in 1982 and has provided funding for approximately 58 projects related to adolescent health and other youth related issues. In FY 1993 AFL funded four projects.

The **Title X Family Planning Program**, administered by the Office of Population Affairs, supports **research** grants for topics about which greater knowledge is needed as a basis for improving the delivery of family planning services in the United States. Service delivery improvement research projects with a focus on adolescents are invited in ten topical areas: 1) Family planning client behavior; 2) adolescent family planning clients; 3) male family planning clients; 4) targeting of family planning services; 5) clinic personnel behavior; 6) organization and management of family planning services; 7) role of private physician; 8) natural family planning; 9) infertility services; and 10) counseling services. Deadlines for family planning research grants are October 1, February 1, and June 1 of each year. The Family Planning research grant program was enacted in 1970 and has provided funding for more than 30 service delivery improvement projects. In FY 1993 the Family Planning program funded three projects.

The Office of Population Affairs supports a clearinghouse which develops and **disseminates educational and informational material** on adolescent pregnancy prevention, as well as general reproductive health and family planning issues.

The Title XX Adolescent Family Life (AFL) program, administered by the Office of Population Affairs, supports **demonstration projects**: 1) to develop and implement programs designed to prevent adolescent pregnancy and 2) to develop and implement new approaches in the delivery of health, social and educational services to pregnant and parenting adolescents, their infants and their families. The AFL program was enacted in 1981 and has since provided funding support to nearly 200 demonstration projects. In FY 1992 AFL supported 31 local demonstrations.

### **National Institutes of Health**

The National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) has primary responsibility for research on adolescent sexual behavior and pregnancy-related issues. From FY 1992 to FY 1995 NICHD funded 24 research projects

including both new and continued projects. NICHD also provided a listing of more than 100 research projects funded since FY 1992 by other institutes at NIH on teenage fertility research.

### **Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration**

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is primarily focused on the prevention and/or treatment of substance abuse or mental health problems as opposed to reduction of teenage pregnancy prevention. However, these issues are closely related. SAMHSA operates through three Centers: Center for Mental Health Services, Center for Substance Abuse Prevention, and Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. SAMHSA provided information from each Center on the many relevant research and evaluation and demonstration projects currently underway. SAMHSA disseminates information through a variety of mechanisms including: clearinghouses, resource centers, electronic media, publications and public information/education campaigns.

### **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention**

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) provided information on teenage pregnancy prevention activities in several areas: (1) HIV prevention activities related to high-risk sexual behaviors among youth, school health education, (2) STD prevention programs focusing on youth risk behaviors, and (3) teenage pregnancy prevention.

In the area of HIV prevention activities related to high-risk sexual behaviors among youth CDC conducts research and evaluations.

In the area of school health education CDC began in 1994 to conduct evaluations with state and local education agencies on school-based programs designed to reduce sexual risk behaviors that result in teenage pregnancy, HIV, and other sexually transmitted diseases (STDs). These evaluations will continue through FY 1996. Another project in this area was initiated in 1993 and is aimed at examining existing intervention research and to provide qualitative and quantitative analyses on a variety of teenage pregnancy prevention related topics. A variety of mechanisms are used to disseminate information in this area, such as: Research to Classroom project, conferences, newsletters and electronic media.

In the area of STD prevention programs focusing on youth risk behaviors CDC conducts research and evaluation on a variety of related topics. Information is disseminated through program announcements, conferences and meetings, professional journals, and other publications. In this area CDC has conducted many local demonstration projects.

In the area of teenage pregnancy prevention CDC disseminates information through the Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR), other journals, newsletters and reports, and technical assistance. CDC is currently supporting a local teenage pregnancy prevention demonstration known as the Community Coalition Partnership Program for the Prevention of Teenage Pregnancy. Thirteen coalitions were funded in FY 1994.

**Name of Report or Program:** Job Corps

**Years Funded:** Started in the early nineteen sixties Job Corps is an ongoing program.

**Objective:** To provide employment training and assistance for economically disadvantaged youth, ages 16 through 22.

**Types of Activities Funded:** These include entry diagnostic training, occupational exploration and world-of-work training, occupational training, academic education, intergroup relations, counseling and health care, life skills development, regular student progress reviews, work experience programs, and post-program placement services.

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** Administered directly at the federal level.

**Grants Awarded:** More than 100,000 annually at 110 Job Corps centers.

**Significant Results/Findings/ or Lessons:** Job Corps developed an expanded, Comprehensive and competency based preliteracy to precollege academic education program in response to the needs of the workplace of the 1990s and beyond for additional and advanced skills. Part of the required academic program is a comprehensive Health Education curriculum which includes reproductive health. In addition, all students, male and female, are required to take a parenting course.

Child care availability was expanded both on-site and off-center through linkages developed in coordination with state and local agencies. A comprehensive Social Skills Training program was implemented at all centers during PY 1991 to complement the job skills received by enrollees, focusing on such characteristics as teamwork, decision-making, dealing with emotions, self-control, and punctuality.

A national study is now being conducted on Job Corps to provide reliable estimates of the net impacts of the program on participants' post-program-life lives. Answers to questions to determine the program's impact on participants' employment, earnings, behavior, family formation and children, the likelihood of bearing and fathering children, among other factors will be discussed. An interim report on this study is expected in May 1997.

**Name of Program:** Youth Fair Chance (YFC)

**Objective:** To fight poverty by providing a variety of services and harnessing the cooperation and involvement of other service providers to focus on such youth problems as dropping out of school, teen pregnancy, drug and gang involvement, employment and training, lack of sports and recreation, family support, child development and health.

**Types of Activities Funded:** School-to-work program and an out-of-school component are both designed to provide education and job training for teens and adults between the ages of 14 through 30.

**Name of funding Department and Organizational Unit:** The U.S. Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** Currently seventeen YFC community sites are being funded by the DOL including 13 urban communities, 2 rural sites, a native American site, and a migrant and seasonal worker community.

**Funding Cycle/When are Funds Available:** Funding began in 1994 with \$3 million, 18 month grants which received additional resources and funding in 1995. Grants extended to 1997.

**Funds Available in 96:** Not available

**Typical number and average amount of grants:**\$3 million in 1994 to 17 locations; \$ amount not available after 1994.

**Name of Report or Program:** Quantum Opportunities Demonstration:n

**Years funded:** Not Available

**Objective:** Matching high school students in inner city school districts with adult counselors during their four years of high school in order to ensure that the students stay in school, achieve high academic standards, apply to and presumably attend colleges and universities, and the students are educated on adolescent pregnancy.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Counseling, academic support, and sexuality education.

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** The U.S. Department of Labor and the Ford Foundation

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** Joint DOL and Ford Foundation fund.

**Grants Awarded:** The current demonstration involves 1000 youth in seven sites.

**Significant Results/Findings/ or Lessons:** This project is modeled after a similar one done by the Ford Foundation. On a smaller scale, however with virtually identical circumstances, the first results of this project were very successful. Drop out rates were cut in half, college entrance rates were doubled, and births were reduced for all participants involved.

**Name of Program:** Women's Educational Equity Act (WEEA) Program

**Objective:** To promote gender equity in education; to promote equity in education for women and girls who suffer from multiple forms of discrimination based on sex and race, ethnic origin, limited English proficiency, disability, or age; and to provide financial assistance to enable educational agencies to meet the requirements of title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.

**Types of Activities Funded:** (1) Grants for the implementation of gender equity programs in schools; and (2) research and development grants to develop model equity programs.

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** Department of Education; Office of Elementary and Secondary Education; School Improvement Programs

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** ED makes grants directly to public agencies, private nonprofit agencies, organizations, institutions, student groups, community groups, and individuals.

**Funding Cycle/When are Funds Available:** The WEEA program receives an annual appropriation. ED announces grant competitions in the *Federal Register*.

**Funds Available in 96:** Both the House-passed bill and the Senate Committee-passed bill would eliminate funding for WEEA. Under the current continuing resolution, the FY 1996 appropriation would be \$2.975 million. At that level, all funds would support continuation grants.

**Typical Number and Average Amount of Grants:** 15-20 grants; average amount \$179,000

**Name of Program:** Adult Education State Grants

**Objective:** To assist States to improve educational opportunities for adults who lack the level of literacy skills requisite to effective citizenship and productive employment and to expand and improve the delivery system for adult education services that enable educationally disadvantaged adults to acquire the basic educational skills necessary for literate functioning, profit from employment-related training, and complete high school.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Adult basic education; high school equivalency instruction; and English classes for adults who speak other languages

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** Department of Education; Office of Vocational and Adult Education; Division of Adult Education and Literacy

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** ED distributes funds by formula to States. State educational agencies subgrant funds to: local educational agencies, correctional education agencies, community-based organizations, public or private nonprofit agencies, postsecondary educational institutions, and other institutions that have the ability to provide literacy services to adult and families.

**Funding Cycle/When are Funds Available:** This is a forward-funded program. The FY 1996 appropriation would become available on July 1, 1996.

**Funds Available in 96:** Both the House and the Senate Committee would provide \$250 million for this program.

**Typical Number and Average Amount of Grants:** Under current law, ED makes 59 grants averaging \$4.2 million each.

**Name of Program:** Goals 2000: Educate America Act, State and Local Grants

**Objective:** To provide assistance to States and local school districts to devise their own strategies for comprehensive reform of elementary and secondary education. The strategies center on the creation and implementation of high standards in the State's core academic subjects that define what all students should know and be able to do at various points along the K-12 school continuum.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Education

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** U.S. Department of Education, Office of Elementary and Secondary Education

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** Federal funds are distributed to States by formula; States award subgrants to local school districts

**Funding Cycle/When Funds Are Available:** Annually

**Funds Available in FY 96:** The House-passed appropriations bill would provide no funding for Goals 2000. However, the Senate Committee-passed bill includes \$300 million for State and local grants.

**Typical Number and Average Amount of Grants:** In FY 1994, 50 States (including D.C. and Puerto Rico) received a total of \$91.5 million, averaging \$1.8 million per State.

In FY 1995, 52 States (including D.C. and Puerto Rico) are eligible for a total of \$358.3 million, averaging \$5.9 million per State.

**Name of Program:** Goals 2000: Educate America Act Parental Assistance

**Objective:** to support a network of parent information and resource centers that provide parents with training, information, and support in better understanding their children's educational needs and how to help their children achieve to high standards.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Education, training.

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** U.S. Department of Education, Office of Elementary and Secondary Education, Goals 2000 Staff

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** Competitive grants to nonprofit organizations and to nonprofit organizations in consortium with local educational agencies.

**Funding Cycle/When Funds Are Available:** Competition held every four years. The first four-year awards were made in FY 1995.

**Funds Available in FY 1996:** The House-passed appropriations bill includes no funds for this activity, while the Senate committee-passed bill includes \$10 million. If the program receives a 1996 appropriation, all funds will be used for continuation awards to the grantees selected in the initial competition.

**Typical number and average amount of grants:** Currently, 28 grantees share a total of \$10 million, for an average grant of \$357,000.

**Name of Program:** School-to-Work Opportunities, State Grants and Local Partnerships

**Objective:** To enable every State to design and implement a comprehensive school-to-work transition system that will be available to all children. These systems integrate academic and vocational education, link secondary and postsecondary education, provide learning opportunities at the work site, and fully involve the private sector. States and local partnerships develop plans that, among other things, describe the methods they will use to ensure opportunities for young women to participate in school-to-work programs in a manner that leads to employment in high-performance, high-paying jobs, including nontraditional employment.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Education

**Name of Funding Department:** School to Work Office (jointly administered by U.S. Department of Education/OVAE and U.S. Department of Labor/ETA)

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** (1)Competitive grants to States; States make subgrants to local partnerships.(2)Competitive grants to local partnerships located in States that do not yet have grants to implement State plans.(3)Competitive grants to local partnerships in urban and rural areas characterized by high poverty.

**Funding Cycle/When Funds are Available:**(1)States receive 5-year grants; competitions held annually.(2)Local partnerships receive grants of one or more years duration, depending on State receipt of grant; competitions held annually.(3)Grants to high-poverty areas are for five years; competitions held annually.

**Funds Available in FY 96:**The House-passed bill would provide \$190 million total for the two Departments; the Senate Committee-passed bill would provide \$245 million, the same as the FY 1995 level.

**Typical number and average amount of grants:** For FY 1995

- (1) 27 States; average award = \$6.4 million
- (2) 90 local partnerships; average award = \$500,000

**Name of Program:** Bilingual Education: Instructional Services

**Objective:** Improve the quality of instructional services for limited English proficient students to teach them English, permit them to achieve to high academic standards, and prepare them to enter all English classrooms.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Instructional Services that may use the native language and are designed to teach English, assist limited English proficient students to achieve to high academic standards, and prepare these students to enter all English classrooms.

**Name of funding Department and Organizational Unit:** U.S. Department of Education, Office of Bilingual Education and Minority Languages Affairs

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** Discretionary grants, primarily to local educational agencies

**Funding Cycle/When are Funds Available:** Discretionary grant competitions are held, usually every year for two- to five-year grants. Competitions are generally announced in late summer or fall with deadlines in late fall. Awards are usually announced the following spring.

**Funds Available in 96:** At the House-passed appropriations bill level, all 1996 funds would be required to fund continuations; no new awards could be made. At the Senate committee-passed level, approximately \$18 million would be available for new grants.

**Typical number and average amount of grants:** In fiscal year 1995, the Department made 237 new awards at an average level of \$220,000.

**Name of Program:** Title I Grants to Local Educational Agencies

**Objective:** This program supplements State and local funding to school districts and schools, especially in high-poverty areas, to help low-achieving children in all school grades achieve educational excellence. The 1994 reauthorization gives Title I the purpose of helping children in high-poverty schools reach the same high State academic standards expected of all children, thus making the program an integral component of State and local educational reform efforts.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Funds provide extra educational reinforcement for students who do not typically have access to the same resources as other, more advantaged children, either at home or at school: activities during the regular school day to help students master challenging curriculum in reading, mathematics, and other core academic areas as well as pre-school, after-school and summer programs to reinforce classroom teaching and learning.

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** U.S. Department of Education, Office of Elementary and Secondary Education, Compensatory Education Programs

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** Program funds are allocated by formula through State educational agencies (SEAs) to almost all the Nation's school districts. Within districts, funds go to schools with the highest proportions of children from low-income families.

**Funding Cycle/When Funds Are Available:** Annually

**Funds Available in FY 96:** The House-passed appropriations bill would provide about \$5.6 billion for Title I LEA Grants, while the Senate Committee-passed bill includes an amount slightly over \$6 billion.

**Typical Number and Average Amount of Grants:** About 93 percent of the Nation's school districts, or more than 14,000, receive formula grants that range from a few thousand dollars in small districts to about \$400 million in the largest district (New York).

**Name of Program:** Title I Migrant Program

**Name of Report or Program:** Dropout Prevention Demonstration Program, Evaluation of Structured Dropout Prevention Projects.

**Years Funded:** 1991 - 1995

**Objective:** To test and evaluate the effect of promising strategies in high school dropout prevention and reentry.

**Types of Activities Funded:** Demonstration projects participating in this evaluation carried out a variety of programs, including comprehensive dropout prevention and recovery models that focused on restructuring and reform within schools clusters (that is, a high school and its feeder elementary and middle schools), and model programs that involved comprehensive targeted services for at-risk youth. **Significant Results/Findings/or Lessons:** Preliminary findings from the Evaluation of Structured Dropout Prevention Projects indicate that alternative middle school programs look promising, but there are weak results for alternative high schools. School-wide reform efforts can affect student outcomes when they include targeted support services. Such reform efforts are difficult to sustain, however, due to staff turnover and shifts in district policy. Students in the dropout prevention programs had much higher rates of drug use and arrests, and were more likely to have children, than youth in general. It may be possible to look at these highly at-risk groups separately in the final report.

**Objective:** The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) National Youth Sports Program was authorized by the National Affordable Housing Act of 1990. HUD provides grants in support of sports, recreational, and cultural programs initiated in public housing communities. YSP acts as a vehicle for youth to develop leadership skills, gain self-esteem, learn the value of teamwork. These skills if developed successfully can lead to the prevention of teen pregnancy and exercise self empowerment in a positive drug free environment. All Public and Indian housing agencies are eligible to receive YSP funds. The program is targeted for youth ages 5-25.

**Objective:** The Public and Indian Housing Drug Elimination Program is a funding resource to help public and Indian housing authorities combat drugs and drug-related crimes, in their communities. Working with residents, local governments and law enforcement, social service providers, and other community partners, public housing agencies use PHDEP grants to fund comprehensive anti-drug and anti-crime strategies. These strategies have focused on building self-esteem, decision making skills, and establishing sense of purpose and an impression of competency among residents and young people in public housing communities. Some of these skills are crucial to teen pregnancy prevention as well as drug use. PHDEP works to increase the quality of life for public housing residents by providing a means to a drug-free and healthy environment in which to live and grow.

This requires providing each young person with the opportunity to maintain a balanced lifestyle and a purposeful direction. CIS endorses a Comprehensive School Health approach to adolescent development. This includes a holistic focus on behaviors that promote health and wellness; prevent specific diseases, disorders and injury; prevent high risk social behaviors; intervene to assist youth who are in need; and help support those who are already exhibiting special health care needs. It includes providing programs that promote positive health and safety behaviors, and ensuring a supportive and healthy environment that nurtures academic growth and development.

**Objective:** The grantee, Cook County Juvenile Temporary Detention Center, is working to develop a comprehensive strategy to promote systemic change and alternative community-based services to adjudicated female juvenile offenders in Cook County, Illinois and to enable them to become productive members of their communities and avoid further involvement in the juvenile justice system.

**Types of Activities Funded:** 1) Assessing the juvenile justice system in Cook County; 2) assessing the alternative services available to adjudicated female juvenile offenders in Cook County; 3) refining the definition of the Cook County female juvenile offender population; 4) developing a strategy to promote systemic change and a shift in attitudes in the Cook County juvenile justice system about handling female juvenile offenders and alternative sentencing/sanctions; 5) developing gender-specific programs for female juvenile offenders that addresses education, life management and personal growth skills, physical and mental health care and counseling, parenting skills, job training and skills, community service; 6) preparing an implementation plan; developing a means of evaluating both the planning process and the programs designed; and 7) developing a plan for securing funding support from both public and private community organizations.

**Objective:** The SafeFutures community-wide approach will prevent and control juvenile violence and delinquency in targeted communities by: a) reducing risk factors for delinquency and increasing protective factors; b) providing a continuum of services for juveniles at risk of delinquency with appropriate immediate interventions for juvenile offenders; and c) developing a full range of graduated sanctions designed to hold delinquent youth accountable to the victim and the community, to ensure community safety, and to provide appropriate treatment and rehabilitation services.

**Types of Activities Funded:** 1) The SafeFutures Partnership will facilitate systems reform and linkages among the juvenile justice, education, social service and mental health systems that will improve access to services for families and youth; 2) increase the number of youth/families that receive culturally relevant and gender specific case management services and therefore are properly assessed and linked to needed support services; 3) increase the availability of culturally appropriate, neighborhood and school based before/after school and summer programs for youth ages 5 to 14 in the target neighborhoods; and 4) increase parents' knowledge of and access to the juvenile justice system, social, health and education services, through a variety of parent education and intensive family support services.

The SafeFutures program will include up to nine components: Serious, Violent, and Chronic Juvenile Offender Program Development; Program to Promote Continuum of Care Services for At-Risk and Delinquent Girls; After School Programs; Juvenile Mentoring Program; Family Strengthening and Support; Mental Health Services for At-Risk and Adjudicated Youth; Delinquency Prevention Program; A Comprehensive Community-wide Approach to Gang-Free Schools and Communities and Community-Based Gang Intervention; and Bethesda Day Treatment Center Services.

As too-early childbearing is associated with several undesirable outcomes -- school dropout, delinquency, alcohol/substance abuse, life-long poverty -- that family strengthening programs seek to ameliorate, teen pregnancy prevention is an outcome of successful family strengthening programs.

**Types of Activities Funded:** This project will examine the research literature on family strengthening program models, conduct a search for exemplary family strengthening practices and review evaluation data on these models and practices to select those family strengthening approaches that are most effective and replicable. The project will widely disseminate those findings nationwide through a variety of vehicles including one-page fact sheets, newsletters and the WWW. It will also develop training and TA manuals and reference material in conjunction with its provision of training and technical assistance to selected communities in family strengthening program model development and improvement.

**Name of Funding Department and Organizational Unit:** The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention within the Office of Justice Programs, Department of Justice.

**Funding Flow and Eligible Grantees:** The funds for this project were provided through OJJDP's discretionary grants funds in a competitive solicitation open to all public and private agencies with demonstrated expertise in providing training and technical assistance in family strengthening.

**Grants Awarded:** An FY95 award of \$250,000 was made for a single year to the University of Utah's Department of Health and Education to carry out this project.

The Macon (Georgia) Housing Authority (MHA) develops leadership skills in its area's youth through a number of innovative programs. The STARS (Students Taking a Right Stand) is one of these programs, it is based on the premise that kids listen to kids. In the STARS program, State-certified teen community representatives (TCRs) within 42 hours of training work under the direct supervision of a public health education professional. The TCRs conduct workshops for their peers on drugs, sexually transmitted diseases, and teen pregnancy. This program is one of MHA's most effective drug education programs for reaching youth in their middle to late teens, an age when they are beginning to make important life choices. In addition, youth learn practical refusal and restraint skills to avoid poor choices, and the TCRs use their training to talk to other youth about important social issues.

Girls Incorporated in conjunction with Schenectady Municipal Housing's Project Pride, offers a program called "Decisions," for girls ages 9-18. The purpose of the program helps girls become informed on issues regarding puberty, postponement or delaying of sexual involvement, pregnancy, parenthood, and career exploration. The group, meets on the Schenectady Municipal Housing Site, after school during the school year. Topics covered in the group will include, but are not limited to basic assertiveness, identification of teen pressures, and resisting sexual pressures. Once involved, the girls will have the opportunity to participate in different Project Adventure activities, Super Science Saturdays, field trips and other scheduled events throughout the year.
