FOOD BANK

The Capital Area Community Food Bank would be the best location, on Taylor Street, NW, near Catholic University. The President and other principals could sort, bag, or box food there that will be distributed through food pantries and soup kitchens. **Mrs. Gore and Secretary Glickman has visited the food bank** --- which serves hundreds of member soup kitchens and food pantries in the DC region --- in the past. USDA works very closely with them, and the Executive Director would surely state publicly that the Clinton Administration has helped them more than all other Administrations combined. Also, since POTUS has visited DC Central Kitchen twice, (which, is, in one sense, a competitor with the food bank), it would demonstrate good balance for him to go to the food bank.

Info. from their website:

Founded in 1980, Martha's Table, provides low-income children and teens with nutritious meals and supervised learning and literacy activities in a safe environment, 365 days a year. McKenna's Wagon, our seven-days-a-week mobile soup kitchen feeds the hungry and homeless daily at nine locations in Washington, DC. Our Community Center for Healthy Living offers a family-centered laundromat with literacy activities, health education office, clothing distribution center, and a shower and day center for adults.

NUTRITION, LEARNING and LITERACY 365 DAYS A YEAR: Every day, children and teens, ages one to 18, come to Martha's Table to eat nutritious meals and participate in interactive learning and recreation, away from the violence of the streets. Activities and programs include:

After-School Program and all Summer Day Camp for age 3 and up

One-on-one Tutoring Program with volunteer tutors

Weekend and Vacation programs for all ages

Adolescent Program for ages 13 to 18, including teen employment and job readiness

Bridge Program for ages 11 to 12

Computer Learning Center, for ages 3 to adult, with daytime, evening and weekend courses

Martha's Table's Child Development Center, a parent-involved pre-school for ages 1 to 4

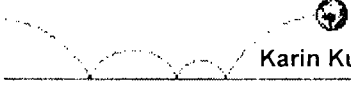
Nutritious meals and snacks, educational games, literacy and reading, computer learning, arts and crafts, study hall, community service, sports, outdoor recreation, and weekly field trips are some of the activities children and teens enjoy at Martha's Table. Children, teens, whole families, and volunteers thrive at Martha's Table.

McKENNA'S WAGON: The McKenna's Wagons vans are a mobile soup kitchen feeding approximately 1,200 hungry and homeless every day of the year at nine locations, including four overflow shelters. **Volunteers prepare 3,000 sandwiches, 65 gallons of soup and 65 gallons of beverage daily from food donated by grocery chains, food stores, cafeterias, bakeries and private groups.** Food valued at over \$1.4 million is donated to Martha's Table, which is supported by private contributions.

COMMUNITY CENTER FOR HEALTHY LIVING provides outreach and basic services to families and children in need including a family-centered laundry with literacy program, health education office, clothing distribution center and showers and day center for neighborhood adults.

These are summaries of the deliverables:

1) Senior Coupon Grants - summary:

USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will be making grants to States and Indian tribal governments. The grants must be used to provide coupons to low-income seniors that they may exchange for eligible foods at farmers' markets, roadside stands, and community supported agriculture programs. Eligible foods are fresh, nutritious, unprepared, locally grown fruits, vegetables, and herbs. Ten million dollars are available for grants for the 2001 farmers' market season.

DATE: Applications must be received on or before December 1, 2000.

2) COMMUNITY FOOD PROJECTS 2000 COMPETITIVE GRANT PROGRAM: summary

Community Food Projects are projects designed to increase food security in communities by bringing the whole food system together to assess strengths, establish linkages, and create systems that improve the self-reliance of community members over their food needs.

Community Food Projects are designed to: meet the needs of low-income people by increasing their access to fresher, more nutritious food; increase the self-reliance of communities in

providing for their own food needs; and promote comprehensive responses to local food, farm, and nutrition issues.

For 2000, USDA is awarding 16 grants totaling about \$2.4 million. Since the inception of the program, and including this year's grants, 85 community food projects have received over \$10 million to fund community-based projects that address comprehensive responses to long-term food, farm, and nutrition concerns.

3) Year 2000 Progress Report on the USDA Community Food Security Initiative: Helping Faith-Based Organizations, Nonprofit Groups, and Local Governments Fight Hunger and Strengthen Local Food Systems

In the year and a half since it was launched by the Clinton/Gore Administration under the leadership of Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman, the USDA Community Food Security Initiative has achieved tremendous success in building innovative public/private partnerships at the grass-roots level with faith-based organizations, nonprofit groups, and state, tribal, and local governments to help reduce hunger, improve nutrition, strengthen local food systems, and help Americans move from welfare to work.

As I mentioned, the following deliverables are available for next week's service event.

Farmers Markets Coupons for Seniors - Announce new \$10 million program to enable up to 500,000 low-income senior citizens to purchase fresh produce at farmers' markets, roadside stands, and community-supported-agriculture farms, thereby improving the health of senior citizens and aiding family farmers. Eight states currently operate elderly coupon programs; although California is not one of them, they do have a WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program and would be eligible to submit a proposal for a senior citizen program. USDA would follow the announcement by releasing an RFP and making awards by the end of the year

Release Accomplishments Report on USDA Community Food Security Initiative Announce new report detailing how this Administration initiative has worked nationally and in all fifty states to help faith-based organizations and nonprofit groups reduce hunger, improve nutrition, strengthen local food systems, and help families move from poverty to self-sufficiency — all while reinventing government, building livable communities, strengthening community, expanding opportunity, and promoting personal responsibility. The report includes information showing that, following the first National Summit on Food Recovery and Gleaning keynoted by Vice-President Gore in 1997, USDA employees across the nation helped glean or recover over 13 million pounds of nutritious food --- which was distributed to the hungry by faith-based organizations and other nonprofit groups --- at virtually no additional cost to the Federal government. The President can challenge employees to sustain these impressive efforts.

\$2.4 million in Community Food Project Grants to Nonprofit Groups --- Announce that 16 grants will go to nonprofit groups in California (Venice/Los Angeles, Berkeley, and Rancho Cordova), Colorado, Florida, Kansas, Massachusetts, Missouri, Mississippi, New Mexico, New York, South Dakota, Texas, Vermont, and Washington State to meet the needs of low-income people by increasing their access to fresher, more nutritious food; increasing the self-reliance of communities in providing for their own food needs; and promoting comprehensive responses to local food, farm, and nutrition issues.

If the President wants to visit a senior citizen feeding program on November 22, I would recommend he visit Sarah's Circle, which is in NW DC on the edge of both Adams Morgan and Columbia Heights, at 2551 17th Street. Sarah's Circle is now scheduled to start feeding seniors there at noon on the 22nd.

We have worked with Sarah's Circle before --- they do an excellent job and have wide-spread community support. They feed seniors who live there, as well as people who live in the community. The seniors served there are typically very socio-economically diverse. However, just to provide the WH with a number of other options, I am discretely obtaining a list of other senior centers in the DC area that will be feeding seniors that day.

Here's what POTUS could announce on November 22nd:

1) The Senior Farmers' Market Coupon Program. Announcing this is a little tricky, because the RFP for this program was published in the Federal Register a few weeks ago, and applications must be in to USDA by December 1, 2000. However, I do think we can finesse this, focusing on how much interest has been generated by RFP.

2) Progress report on the USDA Community Food Security Initiative. The report details how USDA has helped faith-based organizations, nonprofit groups, state, local, and tribal governments, and private businesses fight hunger and strengthen local food systems.

3) \$2.4 million in Community Food Project grants to nonprofit groups.

I am checking with our Agricultural Marketing Service to determine whether we will have any "bonus buy" commodity donations to announce as well.

As always, let me know what I can do to nail all of this down.
