PURPOSE: To commend MADD and the youth summit delegates for

BACKGROUND: Mothers Against Drunk Driving is a 501(c)(3) non-profit
grass roots organization founded in 1980 by a group of
women in California following the death of a 13-year-old
girl who was killed by a hit-and-run drunk driver. There
are more than 600 chapters nationwide, and their stated
focus is to look for effective solutions to the drunk driving
and underage drinking problems, while supporting those
who have already experienced the pain of these preventable
crimes.

The National Youth Summit provides youth from across
the country the opportunity to participate in a forum
discussion about alcohol-related topics, and to explore new
solutions and approaches to address the problems
associated with underage drinking. On the last day of the
five-day conference, the youth delegates will present their
policy-level recommendations on reducing America's
underage drinking problem at a press conference on Capitol
Hill, and will hand-deliver a hard copy to each member of

Congress. Following the summit, local MADD chapters and many of the youth delegates will be working with community organizations to hold 'Town Hall' meetings in state capitols across the country to help rally community support to address the underage drinking problem, and the delegates will share their insights and proposed solutions as a result of the National Summit.

President Clinton's Message to National Youth Summit Delegates

Together, you represent every congressional district in this country. Each of you brings a unique history and background to the table as you work to develop strategies and solutions. Working in partnership with local and state leaders, you can ensure that every young person has the opportunity to grow up safe from the damaging effects of underage drinking.

Right now across our great nation, lawmakers are debating a number of issues in state capitols. But laws are not the only answer. It is up to you and your individual communities to develop policies and to create a mindset that does not tolerate underage drinking.

Together, you can reverse the rising trend of underage alcohol use in your community and across America. This Summit provides you with an opportunity to produce creative solutions to preserve your generation, as well as the next. It is my sincere wish that each of you leave this Summit with a sense of accomplishment. The work that you do here can make the difference

between life and death. I applaud your efforts at the Summit and your commitment to your classmates and your community. I look forward to hearing about the progress you make at home in implementing the recommendations developed here and I wish you the very best of luck.

who meet those standards.

The President was instrumental in establishing this
organization through his role in the National Governors
Association while Governor of Arkansas, and he has been
supportive of their efforts throughout his Administration.
In his 1997 State of the Union Address, the President set a
goal of having a National Board Certified Teacher in every
school in the country. During the 1999-2000 school year, a
record number of nearly 10,000 teachers sought NBPTS
certification, and today there are nearly 5,000 National
Board Certified Teachers (NBCT) in the United States.

TALKING POINTS for PRESIDENT CLINTON VIDEO
Fourth Annual Meeting of National Board Certified Teachers
Orlando, Florida
October 20-22, 2000

I am pleased to join you for your Fourth Annual Meeting of National Board Certified Teachers. Although I can't make it to Orlando in person, I am there in spirit. I am pleased that your meeting this year is in the state of Florida, where there is a total commitment on the part of Florida's teachers and legislature to National Board Certification.

This will be my third NBCT meeting – the only one I've missed is the year you went to Charlotte, North Carolina, and I know my good friend, Governor Jim Hunt, hosted a fine meeting for you that year.

Twice during my presidency I have had the honor of inviting you to the White House. We did that for the very first group of NBCTs in October of 1995. There were 177 of you then.

In 1997, we had you all in a big tent on the White House lawn. You numbered 600 then.

In 1999 I went to your meeting at the hotel. You numbered 1835 then.

This year, there are close to 5000 (4804) of you. There are over 9,000 waiting to hear their results of this past year's assessment. And I understand you are anticipating close to 15,000 candidates to sign up to take their boards this year.

You are one of the most important success stories in education reform our country can claim. You have the potential to reach into every classroom in this country – if not each of you directly, then surely through the enormous impact you will have on your colleagues in your schools.

You are our nation's master teachers. And while your numbers are still small compared to where you'll be in a few years, you are already having an impact on the quality of our schools. Look at what's happening here in Florida; in Coventry, Rhode Island; in Rio Rancho, New Mexico; in Charlotte, North Carolina; in Los Angeles, California; and in Nettleton, Arkansas.

I set a goal for you in my State of the Union speech in 1997. I said I wanted 105,000 of you within 10 years – one in every school building in America. But I didn't just talk that goal, I sent up budgets to Congress, and got them agreed to, to work to achieve those numbers. I put National Board Certification at the pinnacle of my Administration's efforts to improve the quality and the lot of our nation's teachers and teaching. I put my best man on your case, the best Secretary of Education this nation has ever had, Dick Riley.

All of this because I know the potential you have for bringing the best educational opportunity to each of the students you teach and the teachers you mentor. You are indeed a pivotal ingredient of America's educational promise.

I hope you have a successful meeting in Orlando. And more importantly, I wish you a safe and speedy return to where we need you the most, with your students, in your classrooms, next week.

Draft remarks prepared for President Clinton in honor of the Make-A-Wish
Foundation's 20th Anniversary

I am honored to greet you this evening as the Make-A-Wish Foundation commemorates its 20th year of serving children with life-threatening illnesses. I am sorry I cannot be with you in person to celebrate this wonderful occasion.

During the past 8 years, I have been touched and humbled each time a child battling a life-threatening illness had the opportunity to select anything in the world -- and he or she chose to meet me. What a privilege. Needless to say, I have had the opportunity to meet individuals from all walks of life during my presidency, but few have left as deep an imprint on my heart as the Make-A-Wish children.

A couple of years ago, a wish child named Yoni traveled all the way from Israel and presented me with an "I met Yoni Dotan" T-shirt. This year, young Sharleen came from California to participate in our Easter Egg Hunt on the White House lawn and to play me a special song on the saxophone.

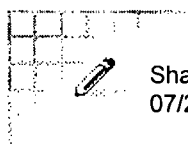
