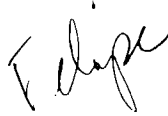

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BACKGROUND ON THE CLINTON-GORE ADMINISTRATION'S NEW MARKETS INITIATIVE

BUILDING ON SIX YEARS OF WORK TO EXPAND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. The Clinton-Gore Administration has made community development a priority since taking office. The recently-announced efforts build upon a number of critical economic development initiatives to help communities that need it most. These initiatives include the Community Reinvestment Act, Community Development Financial Institutions, Micro-Enterprise Programs, the Economic Development Initiative and Section 108 Loan Guarantee Program, Empowerment Zones and Enterprise Communities, and the Brownfields Tax Incentive.

PROPOSING NEW INITIATIVES TO ENCOURAGE PRIVATE SECTOR INVESTMENT: President Clinton's New Markets Initiative will build upon these existing initiatives and help create conditions for economically successful investment in underserved inner city and rural areas. The New Markets Initiative is designed to prompt approximately \$15 billion in new investment. Elements of the plan that require new legislation include:

- **The New Markets Tax Credit.** President Clinton and Vice President Gore have proposed a tax credit worth 25 percent for investments in a wide range of vehicles to help spur \$6 billion in equity capital for investment in America's new markets. Eligible investment companies include community development financial institutions, community development venture capital funds, and new types of investment companies created by this initiative.
- **America's Private Investment Companies (APICs).** This new program will provide equity capital for large-scale businesses in inner cities and rural areas. Just as America's support for the Overseas Private Investment Corporation helps promote growth in emerging markets abroad, APIC will encourage private investment in this country's untapped markets. APICs will be eligible for up to \$200 million in government guaranteed debt for every \$100 million in private equity invested.
- **New Markets Venture Capital (NMVC) Firms.** SBA will select ten to twenty NMVC firms whose management has successful records in community-based venture capital investment. The equity funds of private investors will be matched with government debt guarantees. Each firm will also be required to match technical assistance grants from SBA with private funds.

In addition to these new programs, the New Markets Initiative includes the expansion of several existing programs:

- **SBIC's Targeted to New Markets.** For over 40 years, SBA's Small Business Investment Company (SBIC) program has provided roughly \$20 billion in equity and debt financing, helping companies grow from small businesses to household names, like AOL and Staples. SBA will now offer more flexibility and new financing terms for SBICs that invest in underserved areas.
- **New Markets Lending Companies (NMLC).** SBA will approve approximately 10 new non-bank lenders --- firms authorized to originate loans under SBA's largest loan program -- the 7(a) General Business Loan Guaranty program. Firms must have a strategy to target lending in underserved areas.
- **Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFI) Fund.** The President's FY 2000 budget proposes a \$30 million increase in funding for the CDFI Fund to \$125 million. This Fund increases the availability of credit, investment capital, and financial services, in distressed communities.
- **BusinessLINC.** The President's FY 2000 budget includes seed money to expand BusinessLINC -- an innovative public-private partnership launched by Vice President Gore -- for new markets in economically distressed communities. BusinessLINC (Learning, Information, Networking and Collaboration) is designed to encourage large businesses to mentor and work collaboratively with small business owners and entrepreneurs.

AN OVERVIEW OF PRESIDENT CLINTON'S NEW MARKETS TOUR

This summer, President Clinton will travel throughout the United States to bring attention to America's underserved urban and rural areas – or New Markets. During the week of July 5, the President will spend three days visiting a number of these New Markets across the country in an effort to mobilize new commitments from the private sector and highlight examples of successful investment in economically distressed communities.

Bringing Attention to New Markets. There are communities throughout the country that have not fully participated in America's expanding economy. These urban and rural areas include places like:

- The Mississippi Delta where 27.9% of the population lives below the poverty level and the median household income is \$16,583.
- Harlem, New York where 50% of adult residents do not have a high school diploma and less than 10% are employed in businesses located there.
- Indian Reservations where in many instances unemployment exceeds 70% and the majority of incomes are less than \$15,000.

Travelling with a Bipartisan Delegation of CEOs and Members of Congress. On this trip, the President will be accompanied by CEOs from diverse industries and members of Congress from both parties.

Highlighting Private Sector Commitments. The President will join CEOs in the following types of announcements:

- New investment efforts in underserved areas or in disadvantaged businesses
- New business locations that large companies are creating in underserved areas
- Technical assistance that large businesses are providing to disadvantaged businesses
- New Community Reinvestment Act commitments that banks may be making
- New investments in Community Development Banks or in Empowerment Zones
- New investments in Small Business Investment Companies (SBICs)

Focusing on Themes and Issues in New Markets. During the course of three days the President will visit at least six cities focussing on different themes at each stop. Issues that will be covered include:

- Making private sector workforce investments in disadvantaged youth
- Operating businesses in Urban Empowerment Zones and Inner City Communities
- Investing in Rural New Markets including Appalachia and Native American communities
- Providing access to capital in Hispanic communities
- Supporting investment in small businesses through Small Business Investment Companies
- Assisting microenterprises through Community Development Financial Institutions
