**ANNOUNCEMENT OF REPORT FROM FIGHT CRIME: INVEST IN KIDS:
“America’s Child Care Crisis: A Crime Prevention Tragedy”**

I. PURPOSE

To demonstrate your commitment to both child care and reducing crime by announcing the report from Fight Crime: Invest in Kids, entitled “America’s Child Care Crisis: A Crime Prevention Tragedy.” You will highlight the Administration’s historic FY 2001 child care budget and highlight crime prevention as an added benefit of investing in child care.

II. BACKGROUND

Overview

You will announce the report, highlighting the Administration’s historic FY 2001 child care budget. Dr. T. Berry Brazelton of Harvard Medical School, a co-author of the report, will discuss the report’s findings. Sheriff Patrick Sullivan, of Arapahoe, Co, Colorado, will discuss the applicability of the findings at the local level, delivering the message that child care reduces crime. Senator Dodd and Representative Ben Cardin (D-MD) will discuss the importance of funding the increase in the Child Care and Development Block Grant, attaining the \$1 billion increase in Head Start, and passing the Early Learning Fund.

Standing behind you while you make the announcement will be: Deputy Attorney General Eric Holder, Assistant Secretary of Health and Human Services Olivia Golden, [hopefully 2 families]. Child care advocates and the other authors of the report will be in the audience.

The Report

Fight Crime Invest in Kids is a national anti-crime organization of police chiefs, sheriffs, prosecutors, and crime victims. The report was authored by Sanford Newman, President of Fight Crime: Invest in Kids, Dr. Brazelton, Dr. Edward Zigler, Professor of Psychology at Yale University, Dr. Lawrence Sherman, Professor of Human Relations at University of Pennsylvania, William Bratton, Former New York City Police Commissioner, Jerry Sanders, Former San Diego Chief of Police, and William Christenson, Research Director of Fight Crime: Invest in Kids.

The report contains no original research data but is groundbreaking in the way that it synthesizes the available research on child care outcomes and recasts the child care issue in a crime prevention light. The report does include large-scale research data that was just released within

the last month based on the Perry Preschool program.

The main theme of the report is that the government could greatly reduce crime and violence by assuring families access to high quality, educational child care programs. Among the key findings:

- *Denying at-risk children quality child care development programs may multiply by five times our risk that they will be chronic lawbreakers as adults.* This figure is based on the High/Scope's Perry Preschool Program, in Ypsilanti, Michigan, in which two-income three- and four-year-olds were randomly divided into two groups. Half received no special services, while the others were enrolled in a quality preschool program, including a weekly home visit, until they started kindergarten. When the children reached age 27, arrests records showed that those who had received quality preschooling were only one-fifth as likely to be chronic offenders. Among males, the children who received preschool and home visitor services in this program were eight times more likely to earn over \$24,000 a year. Earnings were lower for females, but nearly three times as many of the pre-schooled females as of those not in the program were earning more than \$12,000 a year, and those who were preschoolled were 25% less likely ever to have received welfare.
- *Attend quality educational day care programs cuts in half the risk that youth will have two or more arrests by age 18.* Any doubt that a major government-funded initiative could produce results similar to those of High/Scope's Perry Preschool were erased by the new results recently released from a long-term study of Chicago's Child-Parent Centers (CPC). Almost 1,000 at-risk kids who had been enrolled in 20 of these centers were compared at age 18 to very similar children who received all day kindergarten but not the preschool and parent coaching program. Those who had not been in the CPC were 60% more likely (26% vs. 16%) to have at least one juvenile arrest, and nearly twice as likely (15% vs. 8%) to have two or more such arrests.
- *Boosting government investment in the quality of child care and development programs for at-risk young children can cut almost in half the number of children experiencing more serious behavior problems when the children start school.* This is based on a study of children in North Carolina's Smart Start program, which found that comparison children were almost twice as likely to score poorly on behavior problems in kindergarten as kids who attended Smart Start centers that received all the quality supports.
- *At-risk young children who attend high-quality child care programs wind up with no more behavior problems at age eight than children of college-educated parents.* However, children of high school-educated mothers from poor quality child care had significantly more behavioral problems. This is from *The Children of the Cost Quality Study Go to School* report, in which child care centers in four states were rated for quality, and when the children in the various centers were eight years old, their behavior was evaluated.

The report also cites a Children's Defense Fund study which found that low- and moderate-income working parents cannot afford good child care programs. According to the study,

adequate care for two children in a child care center easily costs over \$12,000 a year – about \$2,000 more than a full-time minimum wage worker earns. The report also concludes that Head Start serves only half the eligible children, and serves most of those for only part of the time parents are working, while the Child Care and Development Block Grant serves only one out of ten eligible children.

Finally, the report concludes that investments in quality educational child care saves taxpayers' money. In the High/Scope Perry Preschool Program example, an economist estimated that, even accounting for inflation, over seven dollars was saved by the public for every dollar invested in the preschool and home visitation program. The Chicago CPC study estimated that the program saved the government, the public, and the participants combined almost five dollars for every dollar invested, with savings to the government alone of \$2.31 for every dollar invested.

Administration Budget Proposals for FY 2001

Providing Access to Affordable Quality Child Care:

- **Helps low-income families afford child care.** The Administration's budget boosts the Child Care and Development Block Grant by \$817 million in FY 2001, enabling the program to provide child care subsidies to nearly 150,000 more children next year. These new funds, combined with the child care funds provided in welfare reform, will enable the program to serve over 2.2 million children in 2001, an increase of nearly one million since 1997.
- **Invests \$30 billion over ten years in tax relief to help over 8 million families pay child care expenses.** The Administration's proposal makes the Child Care and Dependent Tax Credit (CDCTC) refundable for the first time, increases the level of the credit, and extends the credit to parents who stay at home with their children.

Promoting Quality Child Care:

- **Includes the largest expansion of Head Start in history boosting funding by \$1 billion.** This increase would assure that 950,000 children have the opportunity to participate in Head Start, nearing the President's goal of serving one million children in 2002. Head Start is our nation's premier early childhood development program preparing low-income children for a lifetime of learning and development by providing early, continuous and comprehensive child development and family support services.
- **Calls for a major investment in child care quality.** To ensure that children have access to early childhood programs that promote their cognitive development, the President's budget includes \$3 billion over five years for the Early Learning Fund to help improve child care quality and early childhood education for children under five years old. It also includes a \$30 million early childhood professional development initiative to ensure that well-trained child care professionals are caring for our young children.

Helps Families with Child Care at Work and at School:

- **Creates a new child care tax incentives for businesses.** The Administration's

budget includes a new tax credit for businesses that provide child care services for their employees, costing \$1.4 billion over 10 years.

- **Helps low-income parents pursue higher education by offering college campus-based child care.** To enable low-income parents to pursue higher education, the Administration's budget includes \$15 million – a \$10 million increase over last year's funding level – to provide an additional 150 college campuses with grants to support the establishment or expansion of child care services.

FIRST LADY HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON
REMARKS TO RELEASE CHILD CARE/CRIME REPORT
THE WHITE HOUSE – ROOSEVELT ROOM
APRIL 28, 2000

Thank you – and welcome to the White House. We have come here this morning to send a clear message: Child care is not only a lifesaver for working families, it's also a crime fighter for our communities.

I am delighted to be joined today by so many people who have worked tirelessly for the health and safety of our children. We have with us Deputy Attorney General Eric Holder; Assistant Secretary of Health and Human Services, Olivia Golden; members of Congress; parents, children; pediatricians, advocates, and members of law enforcement.

In a few minutes, you will hear from my friend, Dr. T. Berry Brazelton, who is one of the authors of the groundbreaking report we are releasing today about child care and crime prevention. We will also hear from two members of Congress who are working on the Hill to make child care a national priority -- Senator Dodd and Congressman Cardin. And, we will hear from Sheriff Patrick Sullivan of Colorado, who understands so well that if we want to reduce crime, we need to invest in our children.

As parents, we know that everything in life pales in comparison to our ability to keep our kids healthy and safe. For the last 30 years, I have talked to parents, who tell me the incredible anguish they go through every time they leave for work worried about whether their children will be o.k. during the day.

Over the years, we have learned quite a lot about the importance of quality child care. We know it can help parents balance the jobs they need with the children they love. We know it can help businesses, which depend upon employees who are relaxed and ready to work. We know it can help young children, who need nurturing in their earliest, most critical years – and extra support if they are going to start school ready to learn.

And, today we are releasing a report that gives us one more good reason to invest in quality child care. It's called America's Child Care Crisis: A Crime Prevention Tragedy. It is produced by Fight Crime: Invest in Kids, an anti-crime group made up of 700 police chiefs, sheriffs, prosecutors, experts and victims of violence.

And, it tells us that at-risk children who receive quality child care today are much less likely to commit crimes tomorrow. They are less likely to enter school with serious behavioral problems. They are less likely to be arrested. They are less likely to break the law again and again when they grow up to be adults. And by investing in child care, we save not only precious lives and futures – but also precious resources. For every dollar we invest in child care, we save more than \$5 in crime costs down the line.

The fact is, we need every weapon we can get in the fight against crime and violence. We need common sense gun controls. We need tough penalties. We need more police on the streets. We need to make sure our children have adults they can count on, and positive activities they can say “yes” to. And, as today’s report makes clear, we need to put quality affordable child care within the reach of every family who needs it.

Many people in this room have worked hard to make that possible. And, over the last seven years, we have doubled funding for child care. But, as proud as we are of that achievement, we all know that about 13 million low-income children still don’t receive assistance with child care.

When I talk to their parents, they tell me that child care is often the second or third biggest item on their budget, right up there with housing and food. With more and more mothers working today, we know that asking parents to succeed without child care, is like asking businesses to succeed without computers. Our national policies should reflect that reality.

And, that's what the President's budget for next year would do. It makes an historic investment in quality child care. If we pass this budget, 950,000 children will have the opportunity to participate in Head Start. If we pass this budget, we'll be able to dedicate \$3 billion to improving child care and early education for children under five. If we pass this budget, businesses that provide child care will get needed tax relief. If we pass this budget, more than 2.2 million low-income children will benefit from child care subsidies – and 8 million parents will get tax credits to help pay for their child care.

It is my great hope that Congress will pass this budget, so that we can take another step forward in protecting our children, strengthening their futures and creating the kind of country we are

proud to pass on to them. We don't need a lot of debates and delays.

As today's report confirms, investing in child care is not only the right thing to do, it is the smart thing to do. Our children are waiting for us to act. We cannot let them down.

Now, our next speaker has certainly never let them down. No one has worked more tirelessly on behalf of our youngest and most vulnerable children than Dr. T. Berry Brazelton. It is my great honor to introduce a professor, a pediatrician, a co-author of today's study, a great champion for children, and someone who I am proud to call a mentor and a friend: Dr. Brazelton.

PROFESSIONAL ACHIEVEMENTS

In July of 1988 the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office became the 11th sheriff's office and only the 79th law enforcement agency to be nationally accredited under the 908 professional standards as established by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. In Colorado, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office is the first sheriff's office and the fourth law enforcement agency to achieve this national recognition. Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office has been subsequently reaccredited.

In November 1989, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office Detention Division Medical Section received the Certificate of Accreditation by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care. Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office has been subsequently reaccredited.

In January 1991 the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office Detention Division received Accreditation Certificates on its two detention facilities by the Commission on Accreditation for Corrections and the American Correctional Association. Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office has been subsequently reaccredited.

In June 1993 the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office was one of only nine sheriffs' offices in the country to receive the prestigious Triple Crown Award recognizing simultaneous accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, the Commission on Accreditation for Corrections, and the National Commission on Correctional Health Care.

In August, 1993, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office was responsible for public safety involving World Youth Day activities. The World Youth Day Prayer Vigil held on August 14, 1993, had 175,000 in attendance. On August 15, 1993, there were 400,000 in attendance at the Papal Mass with Pope John Paul II. There were 7,000 heat-related medical emergencies during these two days in the mile high Cherry Creek State Park in Arapahoe County in August temperatures.

In June 1997 the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office provided law enforcement incident command for five events in Arapahoe County that were part of the Denver Summit of Eight.

On April 20, 1999, the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office responded to the Columbine High School shooting and bombing with over 100 Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office staff providing traffic direction, crowd control, incident command, SWAT entry teams, bomb disposal, fire investigation, crime laboratory services and victim assistance in support of the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. Support also included crowd control, VIP security and traffic for the commemorative memorial service on April 25, 1999, which included Vice President Al Gore.

Draft Talking Points for Dr. T. Berry Brazelton

- 1. Quality early childhood development programs are proven to greatly reduce violence and crime.**

SOUNDBITE: “Rigorous scientific research now proves that the early childhood development programs that help kids in so many other ways are also our most powerful weapons in the fight against youth violence.”

- Researchers at the High/Scope Foundation randomly chose half of a group of at-risk toddlers to receive a quality educational child care program while they were three and four years old. 22 years later, the children *left out* of the program were *five times more likely* to have grown up to be chronic lawbreakers, with five or more arrests.

- Brand new research from a large 14-year study of children enrolled in government-funded Child-Parent Centers at ages 3 and 4 shows that, compared to children who had been left out the program, they were only half as likely to have two or more arrests as teens.
- In North Carolina, compared to similar kids, children who had been in child care centers bolstered by the state's pioneering Smart Start program were half as likely to have behavioral problems when they reached kindergarten.

2. Why do these programs work to cut crime?

(We often point out that, in the first few years of life, children's intellects and emotions, and even their ability to feel concern for others – a prerequisite to "conscience" – are being permanently shaped, but you should just explain this as you see fit)

3. These investments more than pay for themselves

- The High/Scope and Child-Parent Center studies together show that every dollar invested can save the public up to \$7 in crime and other costs.

SOUNDBITE: “The bad news is our federal and state governments are falling far short of the investments they need to make in early childhood development programs. That’s pennywise and pound-foolish.

The good news is that if elected leaders expand these investments, they can greatly reduce violence and help youngsters become the good neighbors and happy, healthy adults we all want them to be.”

**New Research Shows Inadequate Public Funding for Educational Child Care
Is Multiplying Youth Violence**

***Report by Brazelton, Leading Law Enforcement and Child Development Experts
Presented at White House Event***

Ground-breaking new research shows that government's failure to assure at-risk families access to educational child care is multiplying the number of children growing up to be violent, according to a new report presented to First Lady Hillary Clinton and members of Congress at a White House event today. The good news, according to the law enforcement, criminology and child development authorities who wrote the report, is that government action to expand access to quality child development programs can greatly reduce youth violence.

The report, *America's Child Care Crisis: A Crime Prevention Tragedy*, was prepared by an expert panel convened by Fight Crime: Invest in Kids, an anti-crime group of over 700 police chiefs, sheriffs, prosecutors, victims of violence, and youth violence experts. The authors are pediatrician T. Berry Brazelton of Harvard; Yale child development expert Edward Zigler; University of Pennsylvania criminologist Lawrence Sherman; two former police chiefs, William Bratton of New York and Jerry Sanders of San Diego, each of whom achieved record crime reductions in their cities; and Fight Crime: Invest in Kids president Sanford Newman, and research director William Christeson.

Brazelton, America's best-known pediatrician and the author of 28 books on child development, emphasized that "rigorous scientific research now proves the early

childhood development programs that help kids in so many other ways are also our most powerful weapons in the fight against youth violence.”

Brazelton said three major new studies of thousands of children show that early childhood development programs can achieve extraordinary reductions in behavior problems, crime and violence:

- A large 14-year study followed over 1,000 children enrolled in government-funded Child-Parent Centers at ages 3 and 4. Compared to children left out of the program, the CPC children were only half as likely to have two or more arrests in their teens. The program has served 100,000 youngsters at 24 centers over the last 23 years.
- Another recent study shows that when North Carolina’s Smart Start program bolstered child care quality in some centers, those children were half as likely as similar kids to have serious behavioral problems when they reached kindergarten.
- A further large national study of existing child care centers shows that at-risk kids who attend high-quality child care programs as babies and preschoolers have no more behavior problems at age eight than children of college-educated parents.

These studies have all been completed in the last 12 months, and the Child-Parent Center study has just been completed. They greatly strengthen the findings from small studies of model programs, such as the High Scope Foundation’s Perry Preschool Study, in which 120 at-risk children had been randomly divided into two groups. Half the children had been enrolled in a quality child-development program for one to two years, at ages three and four. Twenty-two years later, the children left out of the program were five times more likely to have become chronic offenders, with five or more arrests.

At the event, Arapahoe County, CO Sheriff Patrick Sullivan said, “I’m a conservative Republican, ~~and not a fan of big government.~~ ^{but this is not a police issue.} But when failing to provide at-risk kids with quality educational child care can multiply five times our risk that those kids will become chronic lawbreakers, it’s just common sense to expand Head Start, child care and early learning funds. Shortchanging these investments squanders lives and tax dollars.” Sullivan noted that the High/Scope study had shown that the public saved \$7 for every dollar spent, and that the large new CPC study showed similar savings.

“We’ll win the battle against youth violence when we are as ready to guarantee a

kid a place in Head Start or an early learning program as we are to guarantee a criminal a place in a jail cell,” Sullivan said.

^ Fight Crime: Invest in Kids President Sanford Newman said, “Today hundreds of America’s police chiefs, sheriffs, prosecutors are saying that implementing the President’s proposals to expand Head Start and Child Care and Development programs and to provide early learning grants to states and communities are, together with expansion of after-school programs, the most important steps Congress can take this year to reduce youth violence.” The White House has proposed a \$1 billion increase to expand and strengthen Head Start, a \$2 billion expansion of Child Care and Development Block Grants, and creation of a new Early Learning Fund.

“I spent 26 years helping put dangerous criminals behind bars where they belong, but by the time we do that, people have already gotten hurt. We have to start at the front end, and that means investing in early childhood development programs that help kids get the right start so they never become involved in violence. If we invest in America’s most vulnerable kids, they’ll never be America’s Most Wanted adults,” said former San Diego Police Chief Jerry Sanders.

The National Sheriffs Association, Major Cities Police Chiefs Organization, Police Executive Research Forum and dozens of state law enforcement groups have urged elected officials to make sure families have access to quality educational child care. Polls by George Mason University professors Scott Keeter and Steve Mastrofski, show that nearly nine out of ten police chiefs believe “expanding after-school programs and educational child care programs like Head Start would greatly reduce youth crime and violence.”

The report concludes that federal and state funding for early childhood development programs are woefully inadequate. For example, it notes that:

- Head Start, the child development program for children living in poverty, is so underfunded it can serve only half of the three and four year olds eligible, and usually for just half of their parents’ work day, and for only part of the year.
- The Child Care and Development Fund, which helps families pay for child care, can serve only one in ten of the families that are eligible, and provides them with stipends so meager that adequate care usually remains out of reach.

Because adequate child care requires trained teachers and high ratios of teachers to children, it can't be cheap, the report says. In every state, the cost for an infant to attend a good urban child care center exceeds the cost of public university tuition. Even though many child care teachers are paid poverty wages, child care for two children can cost \$12,000 per year. "That's way out of reach for parents making \$10,500 a year at full-time minimum wage jobs, and for millions of other struggling families," according to the report. "Those families can no more pay for adequate child care during these years than they could pay the full cost of the education we provide in public schools," the report says.

"The bad news," according to criminologist Lawrence Sherman, "is that our federal and state governments are falling far short of the investments they need to make in early childhood development programs. That's penny-wise and pound-foolish. The good news is that if government makes these investments, we can greatly reduce violence and help youngsters become the good neighbors and happy, healthy adults they can be."
