HUD Programs and Persons with HIV/AIDS

Persons with HIV/AIDS may be assisted, if eligible, under any of the Department's programs. These programs have specific references to persons with AIDS.

Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA). Since 1992, HOPWA has been available to assist low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families with housing and services. The program provides formula-based grants to metropolitan areas and States and competitively-awarded grants to localities and non-profit organizations. The grants may be used for housing assistance, technical assistance, and supportive services to assist clients and support program development. In 1995, \$167.4 million for formula grants was issued as part of the CPD consolidated planning process to 43 cities on behalf of their metropolitan areas and to 23 States. Additionally, \$18.4 million was awarded for competitive grants for 16 special projects of national significance and for 5 projects in areas that do not receive formula grants. About 8 percent, \$15 million, may be subject to a rescission of funds currently being considered by Congress.

Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act. Homeless persons with HIV/AIDS may be assisted by: (1) **The Shelter Plus Care Program.** The S+C program combines HUD supported rental assistance with supportive services provided by other sources. Assistance is targeted to homeless persons with disabilities, including persons with serious mental illness, persons with chronic problems with substance abuse, and persons with HIV/AIDS. (2) **The Supportive Housing Program.** SHIP assists homeless persons with HIV/AIDS under its **Permanent Housing for Persons with Disabilities** component which may include housing assistance and supportive services. In 1995, \$900 million was awarded for these programs and an SRO component to support communities in establishing a continuum of care of homeless assistance.

Section 811. The **Supportive Housing for Persons with Disabilities** program (Section 811) provides capital grants and project-based rental assistance for projects serving persons who are disabled, including persons disabled by HIV/AIDS. The 1991 appropriations authorized a \$32 million set-aside for 500 units for persons with AIDS.

Section 8 Vouchers. The **Section 8 Rental Assistance Subprogram for Persons with HIV/AIDS** designates \$103 million for approximately 3,000 rental assistance vouchers for persons with HIV/AIDS who are homeless or at risk of homelessness and their families. The funds are allocated by formula to 43 cities on behalf of their metropolitan area, and to 23 States. The notice also announced \$411 million for approximately 12,000 vouchers or certificates under the **Subprogram for Homeless Families**, which may include persons with HIV/AIDS. Both subprograms may be subject to a rescission of funds currently being considered by Congress.

Public Housing. HUD has initiated local planning demonstrations in five communities to develop model AIDS prevention programs and services for residents of public housing.

Office of HIV/AIDS Housing. The office was established to coordinate HUD's HIV/AIDS-related efforts, advocate for persons living with HIV and administer the HOPWA program. Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS

(HOPWA) - Fact Sheet

FEDERAL AGENCY: U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Office of Community Planning and Development, 451 Seventh Street, SW, Washington, DC 20410.

AUTHORIZATION: AIDS Housing Opportunity Act (42 U.S.C. 12901) as amended by the Housing and Community Development Act of 1992 (Pub. L. 102-550, approved October 28, 1992). Funds were appropriated in FY 1992 and for subsequent years. For Fiscal Year 1995, \$186 million was appropriated by Pub. L. 103-327, approved September 28, 1994, and \$15 million was rescinded by Pub. L. 104-19, approved July 27, 1995, for a net balance of \$171 million.

REGULATIONS: The Fiscal Year 1995 program is governed by the HOPWA Final Rule, published in the Federal Register on April 11, 1994 (59 FR 17194), 24 CFR Part 574, as amended by a rule establishing the Consolidated Plan, published in the Federal Register on January 5, 1995 (60 FR 1878).

PROGRAM: The program authorizes grants for housing assistance and supportive services for low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families. Grants are provided: (1) by formula allocations to eligible States and qualifying cities for eligible metropolitan statistical areas with the largest number of cases and incidence of AIDS; the formula requires that areas have at least 1,500 reported cases of AIDS and metropolitan areas have a population of at least 500,000; and (2) by selection through a national competition of projects proposed by State and local governments and nonprofit organizations. Grantees are encouraged to form partnerships with nonprofit organizations to provide housing assistance and supportive services for eligible persons; the range of eligible activities is described below.

PURPOSE: To provide States and localities with the resources and incentives to devise long-term comprehensive strategies for meeting the housing needs of low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families and prevent homelessness.

CONSOLIDATED PLANNING: The 1995 formula grants are part of the consolidated submission for Community Planning and Development programs, including the Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnerships and Emergency Shelter Grants. Grantees develop plans through a participatory process for an assessment of area needs, a multiple-year strategy and an action plan that describes the use of Federal funds.

EMSA APPLICANT: The city that is the largest unit of general local government in an EMSA will serve as the applicant for the EMSA's formula allocation. The applicant/grantee will serve eligible persons who live anywhere within the EMSA and coordinate activities with other units of general local government in the metropolitan statistical area.

FORMULA AWARDS: In FY 1995, \$153.9 million was allocated by formula to the qualifying cities for 43 eligible metropolitan statistical areas (EMSAs) and to 23 eligible States for areas outside of EMSAs (\$167.4 million was originally announced and \$13.5 million was later rescinded).

COMPETITIVE GRANTS: In 1995, \$17.7 million was awarded on a competitive basis for: (1) sixteen grants for Special Projects of National Significance which, due to their innovative nature or their potential for replication, are likely to serve as effective models in addressing the needs of eligible persons; applications for this category were submitted by States, units of general local government and nonprofit organizations; and (2) five grants for Projects which are part of Long-term Comprehensive Strategies for providing housing and related services for eligible persons; applications for this category were submitted by States and units of general local government in areas that did not qualify for HOPWA formula allocations.

HUD considered: the capacity of the applicant and project sponsor(s) to develop and operate the proposed program; the need for the project in the area to be served; the appropriateness of program activities: housing, supportive services and other assistance; and the extent of leveraged public and private resources for the project. National significance applications were also evaluated on: the innovative nature of the proposal and its potential for replication as a model program. Long-term applications were also evaluated on: the extent of local planning and coordination of housing programs. HUD published a Notice of Funds Availability (NOFA) for these competitions in the Federal Register on February 16, 1995 (60 FR 9260) and announced the 21 conditionally-selected grants on June 26, 1995.

ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES:

Activities: Grantees and project sponsors may use HOPWA funds to provide a range of housing assistance and supportive services, including facilities and community residences, rental assistance, short-term payments to prevent homelessness, technical assistance, supportive services and other activities. The rule at 574.300(b) provides for the following eligible activities, subject to certain standards and limitations provided in the regulations:

(1) Housing information services including, but not limited to, counseling, information, and referral services to assist eligible individuals to locate, acquire, finance and maintain housing. This may also include fair housing counseling for eligible beneficiaries who may encounter discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, familial status, or handicap;

(2) Resource identification to establish, coordinate and develop housing assistance resources for eligible persons (including conducting preliminary research and making expenditures necessary to determine the feasibility of specific housing-related initiatives);

(3) Acquisition, rehabilitation, conversion, lease, and repair of facilities to provide housing and services;

(4) New construction (for single room occupancy (SRO) dwellings and community residences only);

(5) Project- or tenant-based rental assistance, including assistance for shared housing arrangements;

(6) Short-term rent, mortgage, and utility payments to prevent the homelessness of the tenant or mortgagor of a dwelling;

(7) Supportive services including, but not limited to, health, mental health, assessment, permanent housing placement, drug and alcohol abuse treatment and counseling, day care, personal assistance, nutritional services, intensive care when required, and assistance in gaining access to local, State, and Federal government benefits and services, except that health services may only be provided to individuals with HIV/AIDS and not to family members of these individuals;

(8) Operating costs for housing including maintenance, security, operation, insurance, utilities, furnishings, equipment, supplies, and other incidental costs;

(9) Technical assistance in establishing and operating a community residence, including planning and other pre-development or pre-construction expenses and including, but not limited to, costs relating to community outreach and educational activities regarding AIDS or related diseases for persons residing in proximity to the community residence;

(10) Administrative expenses: (i) Each grantee may use not more than 3 percent of the grant amount for its own administrative costs relating to administering grant amounts and allocating such amounts to project sponsors; and (ii) Each project sponsor receiving amounts from grants made under this program may use not more than 7 percent of the amounts received for administrative costs; and

(11) For competitive grants only, any other proposed activity and approved by HUD.

Required supportive services: Appropriate supportive services must be provided as part of any HOPWA assisted housing and may be provided independently of housing support.

Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA)

OVERVIEW

Since 1992, HOPWA has been available to assist low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families with housing and services. The program provides formula-based grants to metropolitan areas and States and competitively-awarded grants to localities and non-profit organizations. The grants may be used for housing assistance, technical assistance, and supportive services to assist clients and support program development.

In 1994, 34 cities and 20 States received \$140.4 million in formula grants and 31 competitive grants were awarded for \$25.1 million. In 1995, \$167.4 million for formula grants was issued as part of the CPD consolidated planning process to 66 states and communities. In addition, \$18.3 million for competitive grants will be announced in June.

HOPWA & THE RESCISSION BILL

Under the guise of budget cutting, the Republicans in Congress voted to rescind \$30 million from the HOPWA program. That is \$30 million already appropriated by the last Congress. A few weeks ago on June 6, President Clinton vetoed the Republican rescission bill. In his opposition to the rescission package, President Clinton explained that he is committed to cutting the deficit, but he will not neglect our most needy citizens. The \$30 million in HOPWA funds were among the \$1.4 billion that the President demanded be restored if he was to sign the measure.

CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The House Budget Resolution reduces HOPWA funding by 8% in FY 1996 and 16 percent in successive years. The resulting \$42 million reduction in the first two years would bring:

- ◆ a reduction of 3,500 units of rental assistance serving over 4,800 fewer persons with AIDS and their families.
- ◆ a reduction of assistance for short-term rent, mortgages, and utility payment and short term facilities serving 6,000 persons.

HOPWA AND HUD'S REINVENTION BLUEPRINT

The Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) program was created in 1992 to provide communities with a tool that addresses both the increased need for resources and the need to better plan and coordinate existing public and private efforts. HOPWA has given flexibility to communities in organizing their efforts and determining what types of

activities and forms of housing will best help their residents who are living with HIV/AIDS. In addition to financial resources, the program has created a statutory basis for the use of funds to address a targeted population of vulnerable persons. A locality's Consolidated Plan serves as the application, planning, and reporting mechanism for formula-distributed HOPWA funds, thereby providing a vehicle for coordinating HOPWA and other affordable housing efforts.

The HOPWA program will continue to operate as a separate program in fiscal years 1996 and 1997. Under the proposed consolidation, in 1998, HOPWA will become part of AHF, with any appropriate modifications to performance measures or the formula distribution made to reflect the consolidation at that time. This 2-year transition for HOPWA is needed to ensure that newly supported AIDS housing efforts have sufficient time to strengthen their operations and increase their integration with other community housing and development efforts.

This transition is also necessary because HIV/AIDS housing development and planning under HOPWA has only been available since the fall of 1992. In many communities, the initial planning efforts and selection of project sponsors have only recently resulted in fully operating housing programs. The transition will allow these communities time to assess how these programs have benefitted clients, make improvements, and further build the organizational capacity of the non-profit sector.

HOPWA COMPETITIVE PROGRAM

The HOPWA competitive program will fund housing assistance and supportive services in two categories:

1. **Special projects of national significance** which, due to their unique or innovative nature, are likely to serve as effective models in addressing the housing and service needs of low-income persons living with AIDS and their families.
2. **Projects which are part of long-term comprehensive strategies** for providing housing and related services for eligible persons in areas not qualifying for HOPWA formula grants.

Examples of Special projects of national significance:

A technical assistance grant to the **AIDS Housing Corporation** will fund an AIDS resource exchange to expand resources that can be shared by all of the AIDS housing programs in the metropolitan Boston area. Each resource will be developed by an AIDS service provider that has already demonstrated expertise in the particular area. **Victory Programs Mobile AIDS Resource Team** will recruit, train and fill requests for "buddies" and home helpers. **Justice Resource Institute's Assisted Living Program** will create a centralized pool of relief workers. **The Massachusetts Coalition for the Homeless** will expand its donation program and storage area, making many more donated items available. **The Consumer Employment**

Agency will develop job placements for people with AIDS and coordinate a pool of workers to fill these positions.

A grant to **Community Counseling and Mediation (CCM)** will be used to acquire and rehabilitate a 4-story building next to CCM's Crown Heights Multi-Service Center, converting it to permanent supportive housing for twelve families living with AIDS. The project targets chronically homeless women with children and offers a family unification/preservation model geared toward uniting and maintaining the family unit through integrated mental health, primary care, and social services. The program provides intensive, culturally sensitive support for families living with AIDS while assisting the family to plan for the death of the parent and/or child and make arrangements for the survivors, affording the person with AIDS control over important areas of the dying process and planning for the future of loved ones.

AIDS Housing of Washington will receive two HOPWA grants. One grant will fund a national technical assistance program which will provide technical assistance to community-based AIDS residences in capacity-building, housing development and operation, community-based needs assessments, and development of multi-year AIDS housing plans. The research and information services component of this effort includes the development of the first national database on HIV/AIDS housing which will be published for national distribution. As part of this technical assistance grant, the grantee will also conduct provider workshops, training and conferences. The second grant will fund the renovation of the Lyon Building, a historic downtown Seattle office building, into 64 efficiency apartments to be used as a supportive housing for homeless, single adults who are disabled with AIDS, chronic mental illness and/or chemical abuse.

FRED KARNAS, JR.

Fred Karnas has been involved in anti-poverty efforts and housing work for over 20 years, working with homeless people, farm workers, Native Americans, and the elderly. In his role as an advocate and as a housing developer and manager, he has regularly worked with individuals living with AIDS.

From February 1991 to June 1995 Karnas served as executive director of the National Coalition for the Homeless. With board members from 40 states and territories, NCH is the nation's oldest and largest organization advocating on behalf of homeless Americans. In his role as executive director, Karnas oversaw the National Coalition's efforts to end homelessness through public education, community organizing, and advocacy. He served as spokesperson for NCH, testifying before Congressional committees, representing NCH with the print and electronic media, and regularly speaking to groups across the nation. During his tenure at NCH, the organization expanded the involvement of homeless people as active participants in the effort to craft public policy at both the national and local levels, worked with Congress to introduce several pieces of housing and social service legislation benefitting homeless people, conducted national campaigns on voting rights and welfare reform, and compiled and disseminated numerous reports on various aspects of homelessness.

City gets \$1 million for AIDS program

HUD funds will help find housing for patients; state also is given money

WASHINGTON — Praising Mayor Kurt L. Schmoke for his leadership on the issue, Housing Secretary Henry G. Cisneros yesterday awarded Baltimore nearly \$1.1 million for a city program that helps people infected with the AIDS virus find homes.

"There isn't a more competent or more compassionate mayor of a city in the United States than Mayor Schmoke in every respect," Mr. Cisneros said at a news conference.

The secretary of Housing and Urban Development noted that Baltimore's program, which the mayor has championed, is one of the first to address the specific problem of homeless people living with the human immunodeficiency virus or with AIDS.

HUD also awarded Maryland a \$1 million grant for a similar housing program for people elsewhere in the state. In addition, HUD doled out \$18.4 million to other programs nationwide.

Baltimore's program enlists private nonprofit groups such as the Health Education Resource Organization Day Center and the Black Education AIDS Project to provide homes, counseling, substance-abuse treatment and other assistance for people with HIV.

Of the 21 programs awarded funds around the country, Baltimore received the fifth-largest grant, behind San Francisco, New Orleans, New York City and Yonkers, N.Y.

The award is intended to help about 500 people in Baltimore infected with HIV and 135 of their family members. Nearly 2,900 people are living with AIDS in Baltimore; 33,700 are living with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, according to a report prepared for HUD.

Mr. Schmoke, the only mayor at the news conference, said he was proud of the HUD grant because of the hard work put into designing the city's program.

The mayor also said that Mr. Cisneros and President Clinton "are fighting the fight to continue these ... funds when there were many who wanted to turn their back on this problem."

The Republican-led House approved a bill that would have rescinded \$30 million from the federal housing-assistance program, but Mr. Clinton vetoed the bill.

HUD's \$1 million grant to the state of Maryland is planned to help people living with HIV or acquired immune deficiency syndrome on the Eastern Shore and in Western Maryland. The money will fund a program that makes use of local and state health departments to supply health care and housing to 560 people infected with HIV and 437 of their relatives.

By having support services around Maryland, "We really have circled the problem of HIV infection within the state," Martin P. Wasserman, secretary of Maryland's Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, said at the news conference.

At the news conference, Douglas Garriott, a Baltimore resident, stood out from the crowd of blue suits and dark dresses in his purple striped T-shirt and blue jeans.

Mr. Garriott, who has been infected with HIV for 13 years, is a founding member of Housing Unlimited Group Inc., which since 1991 has helped those who are HIV positive find homes in Baltimore. But two years ago, Mr. Garriott's companion died of AIDS, and he could not afford to keep his home. "I was in danger of being out on the street," he said. "This program helped me find a place to live and it's been great."

HUD ANNOUNCES \$18.4 MILLION TO ASSIST LOW INCOME PERSONS WITH HIV/AIDS

Grants totalling \$18.4 million have been awarded to 21 projects that assist persons with HIV/AIDS and their families, Housing Secretary Henry G. Cisneros announced today. The funds are from the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) program, which provides secure housing and supportive services.

On June 6, President Clinton vetoed a Republican bill that would have rescinded \$30 million from the HOPWA program. The HOPWA funds are among the \$1.4 billion that the President said must be restored if he is to sign the measure.

"There is no more vulnerable population in America than people who are living on the streets and infected with the HIV/AIDS virus," Secretary Cisneros said. "The President understands that this program provides housing alternatives and services to people who have nowhere else to turn."

In addition to the competitive grants announced today, \$167.4 million in HOPWA funds will be distributed by formula to eligible States and cities in FY 1995.

Cisneros also announced the opening of the new HUD Office of HIV/AIDS and the hiring of its director, Fred Karnas, currently Executive Director of the National Coalition for the Homeless. The Secretary established the Office of HIV/AIDS to eliminate barriers to providing housing assistance for this population.

The HOPWA initiative funds programs to serve as national models for addressing the needs of low income people with HIV/AIDS as well as initiatives in areas that receive no AIDS

housing funds. Local funding may provide rental assistance, short-term housing expenses, support for housing development and necessary supportive services.

From across the country, 21 applications were selected including 12 non-profit organizations (one has two projects), six states or state-wide governmental agencies, and two local governments.

The projects are located in 15 states, in each region of the nation, and one project will provide assistance on a national basis.

Of the 21 award winners, 16 are considered special projects of national significance due to their innovative and exemplary qualities and will serve as models for providing housing assistance and related supportive services.

The 21 winners indicate in their applications that they will assist directly 12,261 persons during the operating period of these projects (up to three years):

6,287 persons with HIV/AIDS will receive some form of housing assistance;

1,666 additional family members will receive some form of housing assistance; and

4,308 additional persons with HIV/AIDS will benefit from supportive services.

In addition, from 10,000 to 40,000 persons with AIDS will benefit from a national project that will provide technical assistance to develop and improve the capacity of programs that provide housing assistance for persons with HIV/AIDS.

These applicants have pledged \$15.991 million in other funds as leveraging in support of their applications; nearly doubling the \$18.37 million in Federal funds.

The organizations will receive advice and training on capacity-building and housing development and operation. The research and information services component of this effort includes the development of a national database on HIV/AIDS housing which will be published for national distribution. The program will provide intensive on-site case management, enhanced residential services, mental health and substance abuse counseling, life-skills training, congregate meal options, and 24-hour staffing and security. Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS

(HOPWA) - Fact Sheet

FEDERAL AGENCY: U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Office of Community Planning and Development, 451 Seventh Street, SW, Washington, DC 20410.

AUTHORIZATION: AIDS Housing Opportunity Act (42 U.S.C. 12901) as amended by the Housing and Community Development Act of 1992 (Pub. L. 102-550, approved October 28, 1992). Funds were appropriated in FY 1992 and subsequent years.

REGULATIONS: The Fiscal Year 1995 program is governed by the HOPWA Final Rule, published in the Federal Register on April 11, 1994 (59 FR 17194), 24 CFR Part 574, as amended by a rule establishing the Consolidated Plan, published in the Federal Register on January 5, 1995 (60 FR 1878).

PROGRAM: The program authorizes grants for housing assistance and supportive services for low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families. Grants are provided: (1) by formula allocations to eligible States and qualifying cities for eligible metropolitan statistical areas with the largest number of cases and incidence of AIDS; the formula requires that areas have at least 1,500 reported cases of AIDS and metropolitan areas have a population of at least 500,000; and (2) by selection through a national competition of projects proposed by State and local governments and nonprofit organizations. Grantees are encouraged to form partnerships with nonprofit organizations to provide housing assistance and supportive services for eligible persons; the range of eligible activities is described below.

PURPOSE: To provide States and localities with the resources and incentives to devise long-term comprehensive strategies for meeting the housing needs of low-income persons with HIV/AIDS and their families and prevent homelessness.

FORMULA AWARDS: In FY 1995, \$167.4 million was allocated by formula to the qualifying cities for 43 eligible metropolitan statistical areas (EMSAs) and to 23 eligible States for areas outside of EMSAs.

EMSA APPLICANT: The city that is the largest unit of general local government in an EMSA will serve as the applicant for the EMSA's formula allocation. The applicant/grantee will serve eligible persons who live anywhere within the EMSA and coordinate activities with other units of general local government in the metropolitan statistical area.

CONSOLIDATED PLANNING: The 1995 formula grants are part of the consolidated submission for Community Planning and Development programs, including the Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnerships and Emergency Shelter Grants. Grantees develop plans through a participatory process for an assessment of area needs, a multiple-year strategy and an action plan that describes the use of Federal funds.

COMPETITIVE GRANTS: In 1995, \$18.4 million was awarded on a competitive basis for: (1) sixteen grants for Special Projects of National Significance which, due to their innovative nature or their potential for replication, are likely to serve as effective models in addressing the needs of eligible persons; applications for this category were submitted by States, units of general local government and nonprofit organizations; and (2) five grants for Projects which are part of Long-term Comprehensive Strategies for providing housing and related services for eligible persons; applications for this category were submitted by States and units of general local government in areas that did not qualify for HOPWA formula allocations.

HUD considered: the capacity of the applicant and project sponsor(s) to develop and operate the proposed program; the need for the project in the area to be served; the appropriateness of program activities: housing, supportive services and other assistance; and the extent of leveraged public and private resources for the project. National significance applications were also evaluated on: the innovative nature of the proposal and its potential for replication as a model program. Long-term applications were also evaluated on: the extent of local planning and coordination of housing programs. HUD published a Notice of Funds Availability (NOFA) for these competitions in the Federal Register on February 16, 1995 (60 FR 9260) and announced the 21 conditionally-selected grantees in June, 1995.

ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES:

Activities: Grantees and project sponsors may use HOPWA funds to provide a range of housing assistance and supportive services, including facilities and community residences, rental assistance, short-term payments to prevent homelessness, technical assistance, supportive services and other activities. The rule at 574.300(b) provides for the following eligible activities, subject to certain standards and limitations provided in the regulations:

(1) Housing information services including, but not limited to, counseling, information, and referral services to assist eligible individuals to locate, acquire, finance and maintain housing. This may also include fair housing counseling for eligible beneficiaries who may encounter discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, familial status, or handicap;

(2) Resource identification to establish, coordinate and develop housing assistance resources for eligible persons (including conducting preliminary research and making expenditures necessary to determine the feasibility of specific housing-related initiatives);

(3) Acquisition, rehabilitation, conversion, lease, and repair of facilities to provide housing and services;

(4) New construction (for single room occupancy (SRO) dwellings and community residences only);

(5) Project- or tenant-based rental assistance, including assistance for shared housing arrangements;

(6) Short-term rent, mortgage, and utility payments to prevent the homelessness of the tenant or mortgagor of a dwelling;

(7) Supportive services including, but not limited to, health, mental health, assessment, permanent housing placement, drug and alcohol abuse treatment and counseling, day care, personal assistance, nutritional services, intensive care when required, and assistance in gaining access to local, State, and Federal government benefits and services, except that health services may only be provided to individuals with HIV/AIDS and not to family members of these individuals;

(8) Operating costs for housing including maintenance, security, operation, insurance, utilities, furnishings, equipment, supplies, and other incidental costs;

(9) Technical assistance in establishing and operating a community residence, including planning and other pre-development or pre-construction expenses and including, but not limited to, costs relating to community outreach and educational activities regarding AIDS or related diseases for persons residing in proximity to the community residence;

(10) Administrative expenses: (i) Each grantee may use not more than 3 percent of the grant amount for its own administrative costs relating to administering grant amounts and allocating such amounts to project sponsors; and (ii) Each project sponsor receiving amounts from grants made under this program may use not more than 7 percent of the amounts received for administrative costs; and

(11) For competitive grants only, any other activity proposed by the applicant and approved by HUD.

Required supportive services: Appropriate supportive services must be provided as part of any HOPWA assisted housing and may be provided independently of any housing assistance.

Grant Awards. The following chart lists the grants awarded under the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS program. Formula-based allocations, for ninety percent of the appropriation, are made to Eligible Metropolitan Statistical Areas (EMSAs) and to eligible States for areas outside of EMSAs (eligible areas have at least 1,500 cases of AIDS). The EMSA grant is awarded to the largest city in the metropolitan area (except in FY 1992 when a number of Counties were selected to serve as the area's grantee). Competitive awards, for ten percent of the appropriation, were selected in national competitions and are denoted by (*).

Obligations. To date, 100 percent of the allocations and competitively-selected grants from FY 1992, 1993 and 1994 funds have been obligated, except for one competitive grant. Grantees generally have local startup periods involving selection of project sponsors, local agreements and site selection.

1995 Plans. The FY 1995 formula allocations are part of the jurisdiction's consolidated plan and many grantees will apply for these funds later this year. To date, three formula grants have been obligated. Applications for the FY 1995 competition are due on April 17, 1995 with awards expected by June, 1995.

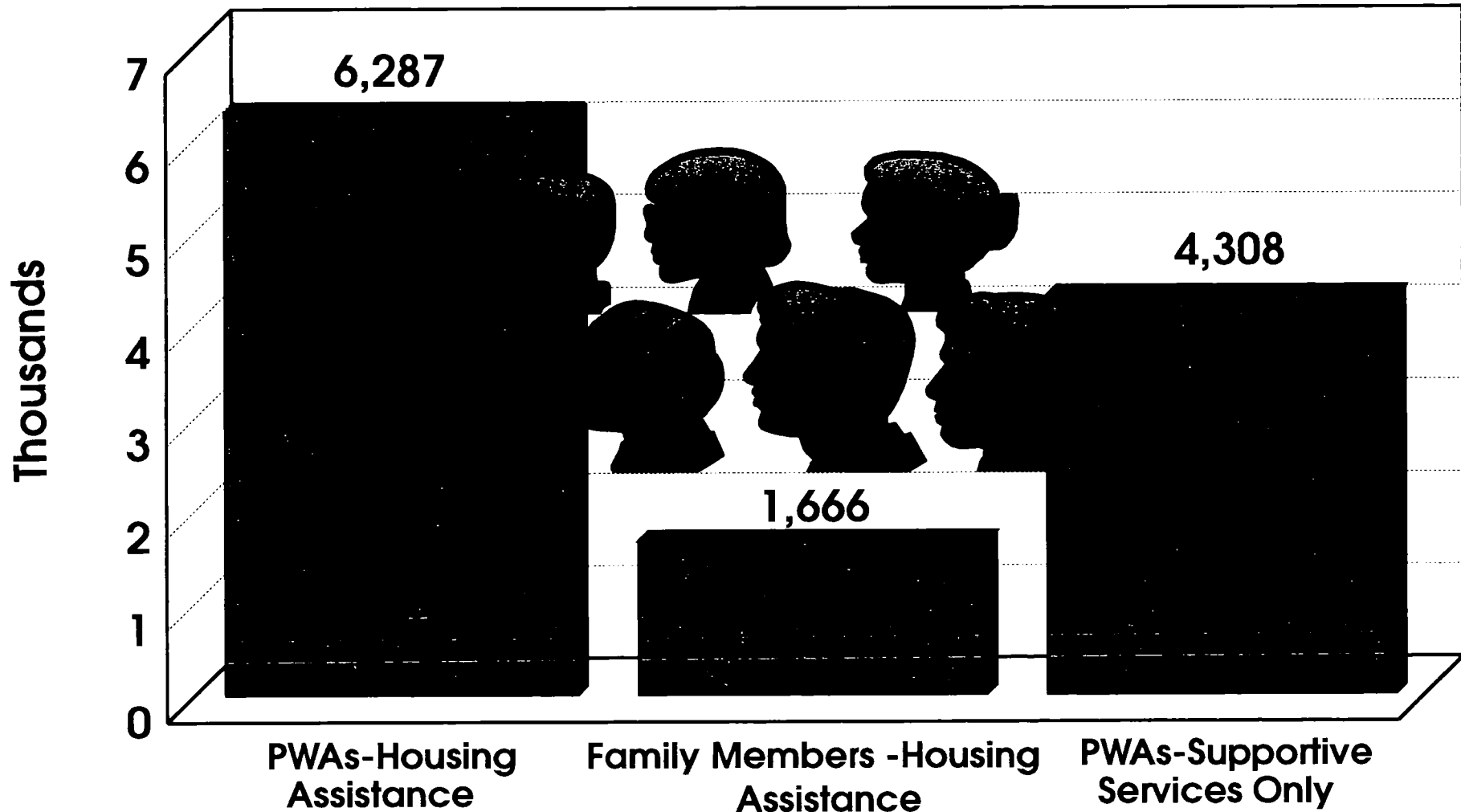
In 1992 a statutory amendment designated the largest city in an EMSA as the grantee for formula funds on behalf of the metropolitan area; thirteen EMSAs were affected by this amendment.
