The All* AmeriCorps Award

The occasion of the fifth anniversary of AmeriCorps kicks off a new annual award that honors the efforts and accomplishments of the men and women who have served as AmeriCorps members. The AmeriCorps alumni who are being honored with the All* AmeriCorps Award represent the thousands of AmeriCorps members who have devoted their energy and idealism to improve communities and our nation. Award winners were chosen from hundreds of finalists in a national competition.

The All* AmeriCorps Award was designed and produced by the Franklin Mint. It carries the AmeriCorps logo and the Great Seal of the United States of America, representing the national tradition of service and the patriotism that AmeriCorps members exemplify.

Award Winners

The **Getting Things Done Award** reflects the service, results, and achievements of AmeriCorps members who tackled challenging assignments and met critical needs in one or more of AmeriCorps' priority areas – education, public safety, the environment, and other human needs.

- *Christine Packer (1994)*, while serving as an AmeriCorps*VISTA and VISTA Leader with the Idaho Immunization Project in Boise, helped start a statewide effort that boosted the immunization rate for two-year-olds from 50 percent to 70 percent and drew her to a career in public health.
- *Traci Chevraux (1995)*, with Sheridan AmeriCorps in Colorado, developed school-based health initiatives, including Smoke Free Sheridan, a broad coalition and comprehensive campaign to prevent and reduce the prevalence of smoking among school-aged children.
- *Lin Min Kong (1996)*, a lawyer serving with the National Service Legal Corps in Los Angeles, helped low-income Hispanic and Thai residents of run-down public housing projects purchase their buildings and renovate them into safe and affordable housing with space for social services, after-school programs, and computer classes.
- *Toni Sage (1997)*, after serving with AmeriCorps*NCCC, started a tutoring project for Parkview Elementary School through Salt Lake County Reads and Promotes Service in Utah. Concerned about an adjacent lot that had become a haven for drug activity, she brought together local college students and residents to turn the area into a safe place for children and their families.
- *James Boland (1998)*, a Marine veteran and AmeriCorps member with the National Collaboration for Homeless Veterans in West Haven, Connecticut, developed mentoring, family, and crisis programs for other veterans in the very facility that had helped him twelve years earlier, when he was homeless and struggling with drug addiction.

The **Strengthening Communities Award** honors AmeriCorps members who made a lasting impact by mobilizing resources, expanding the reach of service organizations, and recruiting volunteers, especially young people, to improve their communities.

- *Jack Bridges (1994)*, after finishing college out of state, moved home to Georgia to care for his mother and thirteen siblings. As an AmeriCorps member with Habitat for Humanity in Americus, he helped launch a partnership that now engages more than 600 AmeriCorps members in helping Habitat and volunteers of all ages build decent, affordable housing in thousands of communities.
- *Scott Finn (1995)*, after graduating from Harvard University, served as an AmeriCorps*VISTA member in West Virginia. While serving in the community of Big Ugly Creek, he transformed an abandoned school building into a community center with after-school and summer programs.
- *Tera Oglesby (1996)*, who served with the police department in Seattle, developed the department's first victim support team, offering a range of emergency and long-term services for victims of crime and abuse.

- *Anna Severens (1997)*, serving the Washoe County School District in Reno, Nevada, ran a free mobile preschool program operating out of a converted school bus, called COW (Classroom on Wheels). She helped double the number of children served through the program.
- *Byrnadett Frerker (1998)*, of the St. Louis Safety Corps in St. Louis, Missouri, provided disaster relief to families and communities in the wake of wildfires in Florida, a hurricane in Mississippi, floods in Missouri, and, most recently, Hurricane Floyd in North Carolina.

The **Leadership Award** recognizes the personal commitment and responsibility of AmeriCorps members and honors those who served above and beyond the call of duty, showed character, demonstrated courage, and exemplified the ethic of service to others.

- *Kyoko Henson (1994)*, who served with two Pittsburgh projects, joined AmeriCorps to return the community support she had received as a young mother. She started summer youth programs, launched a family tutoring program, coordinated community service projects, and now is pursuing a master's in social work at the University of Pittsburgh.
- *Kelton Young (1995)*, serving with the Youth Crime Commission in Fort Worth, Texas, helped young people in gangs or at risk of joining them – by encouraging them to make positive choices, starting eighteen TRUCE sites serving more than 200 young people each, and engaging young people in activities through local YMCAs.
- *Mason Jenkins (1996)*, in addition to serving with YouthBuild of New Bedford, Massachusetts, took on a range of leadership responsibilities. He engaged young people as resources for their community, helped start a grassroots organization to address youth issues, and coordinated a conference to open discussions between young people and public servants on the issues that affect them.
- *Maria del Mar Bosch (1997)*, who served with Programa Dundo Amor and University of Puerto Rico America Reads, trained and placed tutors in Head Start centers and launched after-school programs for older children, including a leadership program that gives them a chance to give back to their communities through service.
- *Jason Lapeituu (1998)*, serving with Pine Island and Southern Minnesota Youth Works, wanted to provide a safe and stable place for young people. Working with local youth, he turned an old laundromat into the Pine Island Union of Youth, Inc., the community's only youth center.
- *Arthur White (1998)*, who grew up in poverty and lived on his own from the age of fifteen, joined AmeriCorps after graduating from high school. While serving with an environmental education program for elementary school students, he worked with a tutoring specialist to improve his own reading and writing skills so he could better help the young people.

The **Common Ground Award** honors AmeriCorps members who brought together people and organizations and helped others learn to find common ground, live peacefully, and work together toward shared goals.

- *Christy Hicks (1994)*, who served with the 4-H Youth Programs in Pontiac, Michigan, started a conflict resolution program for middle school students, teaching them skills in managing conflict and diversity and then training them as peer mediators and role models for younger elementary students.
- *Mark Payne (1995)*, who served with both City Year and Public Allies in Chicago, recruited young African-American males to volunteer and serve as role models for others in his Southside neighborhood. He also started a blues festival to bring people together and honor cultural traditions, and engaged corporate, public, and community support to reduce violence among local African-American, Mexican, Vietnamese, Caucasian, Puerto Rican, Filipino, Indian, and Caribbean teens.
- *Jamie Lee Manning (1996)* served in San Diego and San Jose, with the AmeriCorps*National Civilian Community Corps and City Year, organizing city-wide service events for the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday that brought together thousands of children and their families from a diversity of racial and ethnic backgrounds in hands-on community service projects that honor Dr. King's legacy and teachings.
- *Trampas Stucker (1997)*, serving with the Washington Service Corps in his hometown of Tonasket, Washington, brought the special perspectives of those living with physical and learning disabilities to teach reading and math to economically disadvantaged, rural elementary school students.
- *Graciela Noriega (1998)*, served with the Center for Drug Free Living in Orlando, Florida, on a diverse team of AmeriCorps members of all ages, races, cultures, and backgrounds. To bridge differences among community residents, she started Culture Shock, an education program for the city's young people that has now reached youth in other countries through an international pen pal program.

The Corporation for National Service

The Corporation for National Service was created in 1993 to bring Americans together to solve community problems, and to make service the common expectation for every citizen. The Corporation -- in close partnership with governor-appointed state commissions, nonprofits, faith-based groups, schools, and other organizations -- provides service opportunities for more than a million Americans of all ages. In addition to overseeing AmeriCorps, the Corporation promotes education and service through Learn and Serve America and supports senior service through the National Senior Service Corps.

HOWARD UNIVERSITY CHOIR

The Howard University Choir, the resident choir of the nation's pre-eminent African-American University, is recognized as one of the most outstanding choral groups in the United States. A national treasure, the Choir gained national and international acclaim under the leadership of its late conductor Dr. Warner Lawson. In the hands of Dr. J. Weldon Norris, its present conductor, the Choir has maintained its tradition of excellence in performances in some of the major cities, both here and abroad. Under Dr. Norris, the Choir has been critically acclaimed for its performances of choral works by J. S. Bach, Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Brahms, Rachmaninoff, and Poulenc. In 1978, after a performance of J. S. Bach's Mass in B Minor, The Washington Post exclaimed, "The total effect was impressive and the chorus in particular was superb." True to its singular legacy, the Choir has become the definitive interpreter of Negro Spirituals and Work songs, as well as of choral works by composers of African descent. The Washington Post pronounced recently the Choir's performance of Negro Spirituals as "mesmerizingly beautiful."

In 1960, under the auspices of the United States Department of State, the Choir performed in eighteen (18) Latin American nations. Since the appointment of Dr. Norris as its conductor in 1973, the Choir has performed in the International Choral Festival in Rome, Italy; the Music Festival in Cracow, Poland; the International Choral Festival in Tokyo, Japan; the International Choral Festival in Canada; as well as in concert in New York City, California, Washington, and the first International Festival of University Choirs in Valencia, Spain. The Choir has also toured the Caribbean and France, where one of its performances was in the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris.

The Choir has also performed at The White House at the invitation of Presidents Gerald Ford, Jimmy Carter, and Ronald Regan. One of those performances was the nationally televised NBC special, "In Performance at The White House with Leontyne Price." Because the Choir is recognized as the musical voice of its people, it has been and continues to be invited to perform for such special televised occasions as the Kennedy Center Honors Gala for Marian Anderson, "The Element of Protest in Negro Spirituals" (Sunday Morning Today Show, NBC-TV), the opening inaugural concert for President Bill Clinton, and at the memorial service for The Honorable Thurgood Marshall. The has appeared in performances of Gershwin's Porgy and Bess with the National Symphony Orchestra and in A Ceremony of Spirituals by the eminent Black composer, Noel da Costa, with the Symphony of the New World in Carnegie Hall; it has



performed Handel's oratorio Theodora and the Dettinger Te Deum with the Handel Festival orchestra; Beethoven's Ninth Symphony and Berloiz' Requiem with the New Haven Symphony. The Choir also performs in the "Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Concert," held annually in the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

The Choir participated and won first prize in the Habanera portion of the International contest of Habaneras and polyphonic compositions in Torrevieja, Spain in August 1994. In 1996, the Choir returned to Spain, where it participated in the International Festival of University Choirs that was held in Valencia in September. The Choir received outstanding ovations and reviews. In November of 1996, the choir toured St. Thomas in the U.S. Virgin Islands, rendering concerts and workshops. The Choir was inundated with rave reviews and great praise. As a result of the concerts in Valencia, Spain the Choir was asked to mount a series of concerts in Russia. Sponsored by the Glinka State Conservatoire in Nizhny Novgorod, Russia, the Choir traveled to Russia in May 1997. In addition to the concerts in Nizhny Novgorod, the Choir was privileged to perform in the ancient town of Amaras, Russia. The European concert tour of 1997 also took the choir to Belfort, France to participate in their annual International Festival of Music and to Oxford University, England where the Choir performed in the chapel of Balliol College.

In September of 1998, the Choir was invited to participate in an International Choral Festival held at the University of Caracas and other outstanding sites in Caracas Venezuela. In February of 1999 the Choir appeared on Good Morning America where the hostess of the show Diane Sawyer, referred to the Choir as "God's alarm clock". In March of 1999, the Choir performed in Las Vegas, Nevada at the "Las Vegas Vocal Extravaganza In Black".

In April of 1999 the Choir toured with the Chicago Sinfonietta, Maestro Paul Freeman, Conductor, from mid April to May in Switzerland and Germany. The tour included the cities of St. Gallen, La Chaux-de Fonds, Lausanne, Geneva, Bern, Zurich, and Lugano Switzerland, and Stuttgart, Cologne, and Dusseldorf Germany. Also in May, the Choir traveled to the city of Libreville, in Gabon, Africa, to participate in the city's Art and Cultural Festival, celebrating their 150th anniversary.

In June of 1999, at the request of civil rights activist Ms. Rosa Parks, the Choir performed at the U.S. Capitol Rotunda Ceremony, honoring Ms. Parks with the Congressional Medal of Honor before President Bill Clinton.

J. WELDON NORRIS CONDUCTOR THE HOWARD UNIVERSITY CHOIR

Dr. J. Weldon Norris, a native South Carolinian, graduated from South Carolina State College in 1955, having earned the Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry and biology. After a tour of duty as a commissioned officer in the United States Army Reserve, Dr. Norris matriculated at Howard University from which he was awarded the degrees, Bachelor of Music and Master of Music (music history) in 1959 and 1960, respectively. At Howard, Dr. Norris studied under Professors Vada E. Butcher, Evelyn White, Warner Lawson and Mark Fax. From 1969 until 1973, he served as Director of Choral Activities; Chairman, Department of Humanities; and Acting Academic Dean at Morris College in Sumter, South Carolina. In 1975, Dr. Norris, a Ford Foundation Fellow, was awarded the Doctor of Music degree from the school of Music at Indiana University. There, he studied under the eminent Julius Herford, as well as Drs. Flora Contino and Hugh Johnson.

Dr. Norris was appointed Director of University Choral Activities and Professor of Music at Howard University in 1973. He has pursued post-doctoral studies at the Johann Sebastian Bach Academy in Stuttgart, Germany, as well as at the Hadyn Congress in Vienna, Austria, and Hungary. He has also studied with the eminent choral director, Robert Shaw, and Eric Ericson, Director of the Swedish Radio Choir in Stockholm, Sweden. Dr. Norris has participated in a number of study tours in Germany. A published arranger of and scholar on the Negro Spiritual, he was asked in 1986 to deliver lectures on that genre at the "Amerika-Schule" and the "Amerika-Haus" in Hamburg, and at the University of Gottingen (Germany), as well as recently in Krakow Poland, and Valencia, Spain.

Despite a busy schedule of performances with the Howard University Choir throughout the United States and abroad, Dr. Norris is often in demand as a choral adjudicator and guest conductor at county and state festivals. He recently appeared as a commentator in two films for the BBC, namely, "Al Green," and "Jessye Norman." Dr. Norris created and recorded the music score for a film produced by the United States Park Service entitled "To Do Battle in the Land,"--a documentary on John Brown. He has served on the Educational and Choral Panels for the National Endowment for the Arts and is presently a member of the panel for the District of Columbia Commission on the Arts and Humanities.

In addition to his duties as Director, Office of University Choirs and Bands and conductor of the Howard University Choir, Dr. Norris has recently been appointed to the music panel for the Maryland Arts Council.

EXECUTIVE ORDER 11649
REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE SEALS OF THE PRESIDENT
AND THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES

SOURCE: The provisions of Executive Order 11649 of Feb. 16, 1972, appear at 37 FR 3625, 3 CFR, 1971-1975 Comp., p. 675, unless otherwise noted.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by Section 713(b) of title 18, United States Code, I hereby prescribe the following regulations governing the use of the Seals of the President and the Vice President of the United States:

SECTION 1. Except as otherwise provided by law, the knowing manufacture, reproduction, sale, or purchase for resale of the Seals or Coats of Arms of the President or the Vice President of the United States, or any likeness or substantial part thereof, shall be permitted only for the following uses:

- (a) Use by the President or Vice President of the United States.
- (b) Use of encyclopedias, dictionaries, books, journals, pamphlets, periodicals, or magazines incident to a description or history of seals, coats of arms, heraldry, or the Presidency or Vice Presidency;
- (c) Use in libraries, museums, or educational facilities incident to descriptions or exhibits relating to seals, coats of arms, heraldry, or the Presidency or Vice Presidency;
- (d) Use as an architectural embellishment in libraries, museums, or archives established to house the papers or effects of former Presidents or Vice Presidents;
- (e) Use on a monument to a former President or Vice President;
- (f) Use by way of photographic or electronic visual reproduction in pictures, moving pictures, or telecasts of bona fide news content;
- (g) Such other uses for exceptional historical, educational, or newsworthy purposes as may be authorized in writing by the Counsel to the President.

[Sec. 1 amended by EO 11916 of May 28, 1976, 41 FR 22031, 3 CFR, 1976 Comp., p. 119]

SEC. 2. The manufacture, reproduction, sale, or purchase for resale, either separately or appended to any article manufactured or sold, of the Seals of the President or Vice President, or any likeness or substantial part thereof, except as provided in this Order or as otherwise provided by law, is prohibited.

§ 713. Use of likenesses of the great seal of the United States, the seals of the President and Vice President, the seal of the United States Senate, the seal of the United States House of Representatives, and the seal of the United States Congress

(a) Whoever knowingly displays any printed or other likeness of the great seal of the United States, or of the seals of the President or the Vice President of the United States, or the seal of the United States Senate, or the seal of the United States House of Representatives, or the seal of the United States Congress, or any facsimile thereof, in, or in connection with, any advertisement, poster, circular, book, pamphlet, or other publication, public meeting, play, motion picture, telecast, or other production, or on any building, monument, or stationery, for the purpose of conveying, or in a manner reasonably calculated to convey, a false impression of sponsorship or approval by the Government of the United States or by any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof, shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

(b) Whoever, except as authorized under regulations promulgated by the President and published in the Federal Register, knowingly manufactures, reproduces, sells, or purchases for resale, either separately or appended to any article manufactured or sold, any likeness of the seals of the President or Vice President, or any substantial part thereof, except for manufacture or sale of the article for the official use of the Government of the United States, shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

(c) Whoever, except as directed by the United States Senate, or the Secretary of the Senate on its behalf, knowingly uses, manufactures, reproduces, sells or purchases for resale, either separately or appended to any article manufactured or sold, any likeness of the seal of the United States Senate, or any substantial part thereof, except for manufacture or sale of the article for the official use of the Government of the United States, shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

(d) Whoever, except as directed by the United States House of Representatives, or the Clerk of the House of Representatives on its behalf, knowingly uses, manufactures, reproduces, sells or purchases for resale, either separately or appended to any article manufactured or sold, any likeness of the seal of the United States House of Representatives, or any substantial part thereof, except for manufacture or sale of the article for the official use of the Government of the United States, shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

(e) Whoever, except as directed by the United States Congress, or the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives, acting jointly on its behalf, knowingly uses, manufactures, reproduces, sells or purchases for resale, either separately or appended to any article manufactured or sold, any likeness of the seal of the United States Congress, or any substantial part thereof, except for manufacture or sale of the article for the official use of the Government of the United States, shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

(f) A violation of the provisions of this section may be enjoined at the suit of the Attorney General,

(1) in the case of the great seal of the United States and the seals of the President and Vice President, upon complaint by any authorized representative of any department or agency of the United States;

(2) in the case of the seal of the United States Senate, upon complaint by the Secretary of the Senate;

(3) in the case of the seal of the United States House of Representatives, upon complaint by the Clerk of the House of Representatives; and

(4) in the case of the seal of the United States Congress, upon complaint by the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives, acting jointly.

Given that, I don't think you need our office's permission for use of the Presidential Seal, but you *do* need to be consistent with the rules governing the Great Seal of the United States. (If you'd like to have them, call Derek at 65388 and he can fax them.) Because in the materials you've sent me it appears that the awardees are participants in a federal initiative, to be chosen by a federal entity, and to be awarded by the President of the United States, I am not aware of any reason the awards should not contain the Coat of Arms.

Hope that's helpful -- let me know if you have questions.

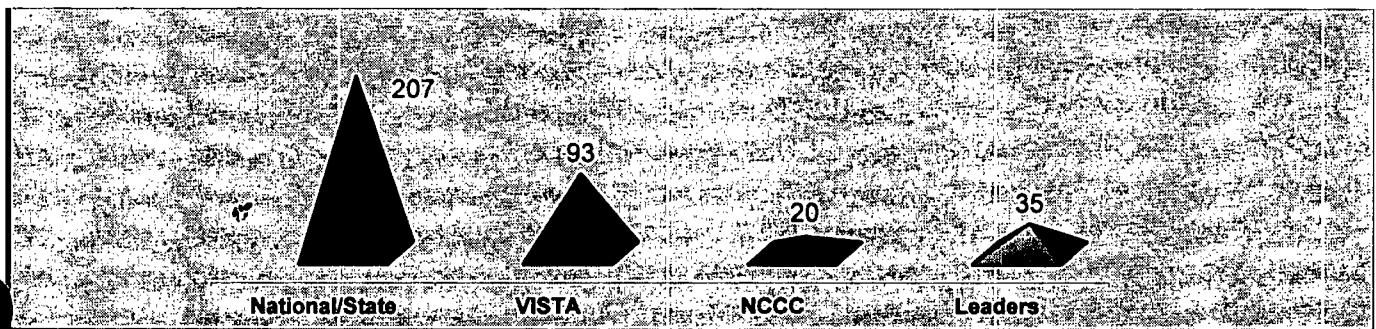
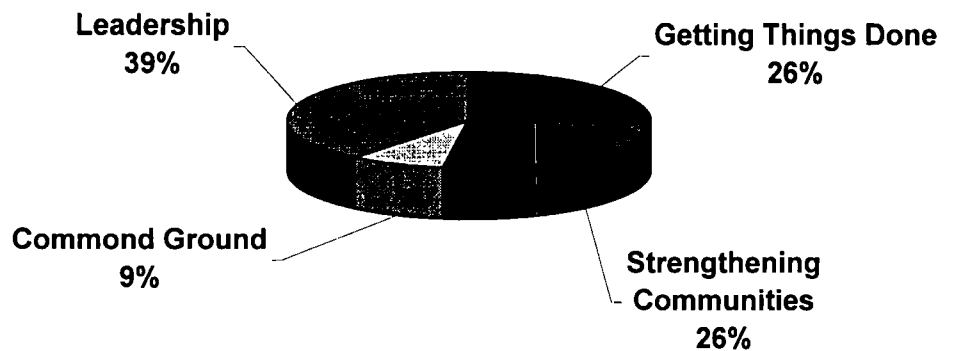

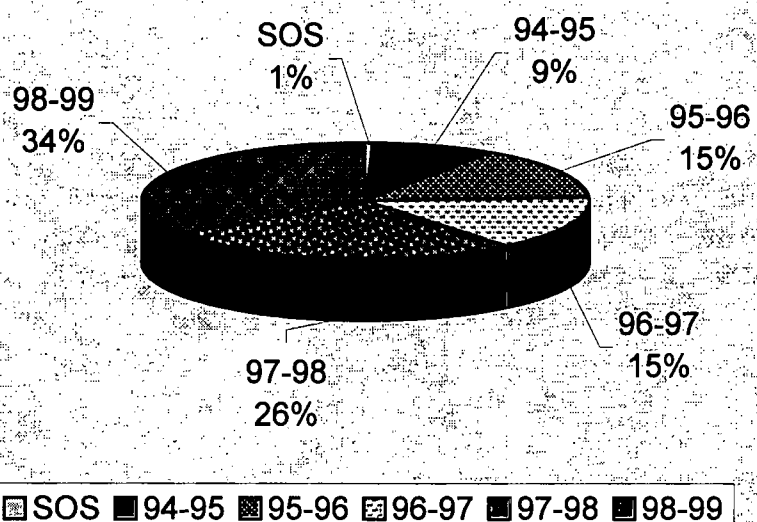

Bio for Andre Crisp

Andre Crisp is 19 years of age and is a second year Corps Member with the Capital Region Campus of AmeriCorps NCCC.

Last year Andre came into the program in need of his GED. He worked on service projects through the year while actively working on getting his GED by being tutored in a formal program at Roosevelt High School and in a home tutoring program in Maine while there on a spike.

Andre took the GED while in Maine and passed it with flying colors.

Andre has said that the NCCC program has changed his life. In Andre's words, "the NCCC pushes you to better yourself in life, to broaden your horizons, puts you into a diverse atmosphere and gives you a chance to find yourself and be yourself. It's a chance to open up and meet great people and push yourself past limitations and to do what you never knew you could do. I found myself as a people person. Around some of my friends (before NCCC) I couldn't be myself. In NCCC people accept you. I developed people skills, communication skills, I gained a lot of confidence in myself. NCCC is like another family, a whole other family that you will never forget."

Andre has one younger sister and one older brother. He was born in Lorraine, Ohio and lived there until he was ten years old. He moved to St. Paul, Minnesota with his mother when he was in the sixth grade. Andre's parents relationship was a rocky one and they went through periods of separation throughout Andre's years of growing up. Andre's mother worked at a YMCA in a child care center and his father was a factory worker.

When Andre was young, his family didn't have much. Andre was supported by the Boys and Girls Club when growing up. There was a foundation that adopted families for Christmas and gave Andre and his brother and sister Christmas gifts for several years during this time. His family was on public assistance for three or four years.

Andre dropped out of school in the eleventh grade because his grades were poor and he just didn't like school and he felt he was missing something by being in class. At this time in his life, Andre was involved in drugs. Instead of classes, Andre would go to a friends house, get high, play video games or just stay home and sleep.

Around this time, Andre's mother moved to Atlanta. Andre remained in Minnesota initially and lived with a friend of the family. A few months later, Andre moved to Atlanta and tried to get involved in a school system but the bureaucracy was overwhelming so he began to work at Ticketmaster.

A friend of Andre's mother was a VISTA and saw Andre trying to change his life and she told him about the NCCC. Andre applied and was accepted and was assigned to the Capital Region Campus.

Once he got in the program Andre saw that it was a chance to change his life and decided to "run with it and to better his life". He earned his GED and applied to be a second year Corps Member and was accepted hands down because of the growth that he had demonstrated through his first year and because of his leadership and motivational skills and his ability to work well on a team.

Service Projects through his first year at NCCC include:

- Disaster Relief with the American Red Cross in Puerto Rico;
- Habitat for Humanity- Lynchburg, VA (leading college students during collegiate challenge);
- DCHA (renovating a senior citizen high rise building);
- JBJ Nursing Home/SEED Charter School (providing one-on-one attention to senior citizens in a nursing home and tutoring 7th graders at a public, charter school); and
- Morris Farms in Maine (working on an organic farm).

Traci brought together the local school district, school-based clinics, higher education institutions, faith based groups, the health department, community based organizations, physicians and local residents to develop a program that would prevent and reduce the prevalence of smoking among school-aged children and their families in Sheridan. The Smoke Free Sheridan program included a classroom curriculum, educational programs for parents, health screening and counseling at the school-based health clinic, and a public awareness campaign.

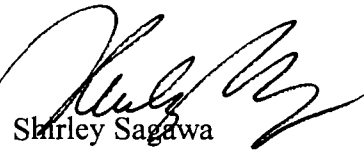

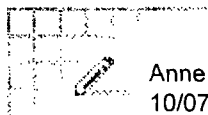
