

Settlement Odds Improve In Schools Suit

*Parties to D.C. Battle
Say Talks Are Positive*

Both sides in a lawsuit over fire code violations in District public schools said yesterday that they are moving toward a settlement of the five-year legal action that has grown increasingly contentious in recent weeks.

Attorneys for the D.C. public school system and Parents United, the education advocacy group that filed the suit in 1992, met yesterday for the first time in several months and said later that they are making progress at reaching a compromise.

"I am hopeful," said Bruce K. MacLaury, chairman of the school system's emergency board of trustees, which was appointed last year to oversee the troubled school system. "We are moving toward a settlement. It certainly would be wonderful for the kids."

Barbara Kagan, an attorney for Parents United, said after yesterday's meeting that for the first time, she feels "optimistic" about a settlement.

"We have made more progress than we have ever in the past," she said.

The meeting followed secret talks held in recent weeks between leaders of both sides—talks that apparently paved the way for progress on various issues yesterday, a source said.

The suit was filed to force the previous school administration to fix hundreds of fire code violations at the city's 144 schools. But the recent closure of five schools for repairs sparked new

RICHMOND, Oct. 17—During the last year, tobacco giant Philip Morris gave \$1,000,153 to the three major national Republican Party fund-raising committees that contribute to state campaigns, according to federal election reports.

In roughly that same period, the three committees gave \$1,085,163 to Republican James S. Gilmore III in his bid for Virginia governor.

Critics question whether there was a connection between the Philip Morris donations and the money that went to Gilmore, a former state attorney general. Republicans say that the money was part of \$26 million donated this year to the national groups by many different sources and that there is no reason to believe the Philip Morris money ended up with Gilmore.

No one suggests that the GOP, the Gilmore campaign or Philip Morris—the cigarette maker once based here and still the biggest employer in the capital of this tobacco-growing state—did anything improper. But those push-

ing for changes in campaign finance laws say the fact that the money given to Gilmore cannot be traced to its original donor is an example of the limitations of federal and state disclosure policies.

Ann McBride, president of Common Cause, a Washington-based nonprofit watchdog group, said: "It's frankly impossible to know definitively what went on here. But it does raise a question of whether the party committees were used to launder tobacco money to campaign and frustrate disclosure laws."

Internet User Gets 2 Years For Having Sex With Girl

Parents of Another Alleged Target Decry Term

In what prosecutors called one of the most serious cases brought by an FBI task force targeting pedophiles who use the Internet, a Rockville computer consultant who contacted more than 100 young girls online and had sex with a 14-year-old was sentenced yesterday to two years in prison.

The parents of one of Donald M. Lytle's alleged targets—a 12-year-old Fairfax girl whom Lytle had arranged to meet at a library—said they were outraged that Lytle didn't get more prison time. But U.S. District Judge Claude M. Hilton said it was the maximum he could legally impose under federal sentencing guidelines. Lytle, 64, had no prior record before he pleaded guilty in July to two counts of crossing state lines to engage in sex with a minor.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Robert A.

Spencer had asked Hilton to make a rare upward departure from the guidelines because Lytle, unlike most people caught by the Innocent Images task force, actually had sex with a minor, and he admitted that he made sexual advances to his stepdaughter and a teenage babysitter nearly 20 years ago.

Lytle's attorney, Jonathan Shapiro, urged Hilton to go easy on the self-employed consultant because he is receiving psychiatric treatment and did not have sexual contact with minors for nearly 20 years between the incident with his stepdaughter and his online activity.

Hilton rejected defense pleas for leniency and ruled he didn't have the legal grounds to give Lytle more than 24 months in prison, although he also imposed three years of probation and a \$4,000 fine.

The girl's mother, who was in the library for another meeting, prevented the liaison when she saw her daughter with a much older man, according to court documents filed in Alexandria.

"I don't know if these treatments really work. After 20 years of not doing it, he started again," the mother said. "It's too bad he's going to be out fairly soon."

After the Fairfax parents notified

authorities about their daughter's contact with Lytle, the multi-jurisdictional task force launched an online sting. The work of the task force, an outgrowth of the investigation of the 1993 disappearance of George "Junior" Burdyski, a 10-year-old Prince George's County boy, has led to the conviction of 153 people, but in most cases the contact with children occurred entirely online.

Arlington Detective Paul Reid and FBI Special Agent John Mesisca ran the investigation of Lytle, in which investigators pretended to be a 13-year-old and arranged to meet Lytle in an Arlington park in February, according to court documents.

Lytle was arrested, and further investigation determined that he had contacted more than 100 girls through computer chat rooms, traveled to New Jersey and Atlanta to meet youngsters, and had sex with a 14-year-old Georgia girl, court documents said.

"We're getting more and more of these traveler cases where the guys want to meet the girl," Reid said. "We need to change the statute. People getting charged with possessing child pornography are getting more [prison] time than these people."

Under Lytle's plea bargain, he still could be prosecuted for statutory rape in Georgia, prosecutors said.

State Police Report 1996 Drug Seizures

■ Maryland State Police seized 64 pounds of crack cocaine in traffic stops in 1996, the largest amount recovered by any police department in the nation last year, according to federal drug interdiction monitors.

The crack, or "cake," form of cocaine, with a retail street value estimated by state police at \$3.2 million, was in addition to 220 pounds of powdered cocaine, 130 pounds of marijuana, 4 pounds of heroin and \$1.6 million in drug-connected cash seized by troopers in 1996.

State police spokesman Greg Shipley attributed the record seizures to Maryland's extensive interstate highway system, especially Interstate 95, used by couriers to shuttle drugs among East Coast cities.

State Police Report 1996 Drug Seizures

■ Maryland State Police seized 64 pounds of crack cocaine in traffic stops in 1996, the largest amount recovered by any police department in the nation last year, according to federal drug interdiction monitors.
