Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG) are distributed through a formula based on poverty and housing needs. \$150 million in Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funds will go to:

- 312 local jurisdictions, 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and 4 territories.

1998 CONTINUUM OF CARE ANNOUNCEMENTS

FACT SHEET

Announcement

On April 30, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) issued a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for its competitive homelessness assistance programs. The NOFA made resources available for three programs: the Supportive Housing Program (S HP), the Shelter Plus Care program (S+C), and the Section 8 Single Room Occupancy (SRO) program.

In addition to the Federal Register announcement, HUD held two national satellite broadcasts to homelessness assistance providers gathered in HUD field offices and other sites around the nation to provide information on the NOFA and answer questions from potential applicants.

Today, HUD announces \$700 million in competitive homeless grants for transitional and permanent housing.

Response

The major announcement today is the Continuum of Care competitive awards. Nearly 450 communities submitted Continuum of Care applications. These applications contained more than 2,640 individual projects designed to address homelessness. The applications are evaluated by looking at local strategies for addressing homelessness, including the coordination and involvement of Federal, state and local governments agencies, nonprofit organizations, homeless persons, and in many cases, local businesses. This includes existing services for, and gaps in services to the various sub-populations of homeless people, including individuals and families, veterans, youth, persons with severe and persistent mental illness, persons with substance abuse issues, victims of domestic violence, and persons living with (HIV/AIDS) or other disabilities. Each community submits a list of priority projects for funding that addresses the needs that exist.

Results

The attached list of programs funded under this Continuum of Care competition provided \$700 million in finding for 307 Continuum of Care efforts and approximately 1420 individual projects in 46 states, and the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

History

It is estimated that there are at least 600,000 homeless men, women, and children in the United States on any given night. The homeless population is a diverse group whose homelessness has been caused by a complex array of factors ranging from economic difficulties and lack of access to affordable housing to mental illness and problems with substance abuse. Approximately 20-

25% of the homeless population is made up of families with children. An estimated 25% of the homeless population is experiencing mental illness, while as many as 50% of those who are homeless may have substance abuse issues. Some have become homeless as a result of domestic violence, while others were forced into homelessness by a health crisis, such as HIV/AIDS. Also, as many as one-third of all homeless men are Veterans.

It is the consensus of those who have been seeking to address homelessness in this nation that the solutions to homelessness must involve access to safe, decent, affordable housing and oftentimes, to supportive services, including job training and placement, day care, health care, mental health services, and substance abuse treatment. Toward that end, President Clinton has made the development of comprehensive efforts to address homelessness a top priority. With support from Congress, the President has more than doubled the HUD homelessness assistance budget, and under the direction of HUD Secretary Andrew Cuomo, the Administration has implemented the Continuum of Care approach to homelessness which encourages communities to plan comprehensively for the full range of needs of poor and homeless people, and to coordinate services in a way that maximizes the impact of existing resources. The goal of the Continuum of Care is to give communities the flexibility and decision-making power to craft plans which move away from short-term emergency measures toward permanent solutions which will allow homeless persons to reach the maximum level of self-sufficiency possible. The key elements of a Continuum of Care system are:

- Outreach and assessment efforts to identify an individual or family's needs and make connections to facilities and services
- Provision of Emergency shelter and appropriate support services as safe decent alternatives to the streets.
- Transitional housing and necessary social services to help persons who are get the support, skills, and resources they need to move to permanent housing and independent living.
- Permanent housing or permanent supportive housing to help meet the long-term needs of homeless individuals and families.

The results of the Continuum of Care efforts over the last few years were documented in a 1996 report from the Barnard-Columbia Center for Urban Policy. The study found that as a result of such efforts, at least 4 times and perhaps as many as 14 times as many homeless persons are receiving a wide-array of assistance to help them move into jobs and housing. Also, the study indicated that the number of children being assisted has grown from 6,500 in 1992 to 89,000 in 1995. The report pointed to a significant transformation in the way communities are addressing homelessness. The fragmented approach of the past has been replaced by comprehensive planning and coordinated housing and service delivery.

Emergency Shelter Grants

In addition, today, HUD is announcing \$150 million in Emergency Shelter Grants distributed by

formula to 311 local jurisdictions, all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Insular areas. These funds can be used to improve the quality of existing emergency shelters, to make available additional shelters and transitional housing, to meet the costs of operating shelters and of providing essential social services to homeless individuals, and to help prevent homelessness.

SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROGRAM

- FACT SHEET -

PURPOSE

The Program is designed to promote the development of supportive housing and supportive services to assist homeless persons in the transition from homelessness and to enable them to live as independently as possible.

PROGRAM

The Supportive Housing Program funds may be used to provide: (I) transitional housing designed to enable homeless persons and families to move to permanent housing within a 24-month period, which may include up to 6 months of follow-up services after residents move to permanent housing; (ii) permanent housing provided in conjunction with appropriate supportive services designed to maximize the ability of persons with disabilities to live as independently as possible within permanent housing; (iii) supportive housing that is, or is part of, a particularly innovative project for, or alternative methods of; meeting the immediate and long term needs of homeless individuals and families; (iv) supportive services for homeless individuals not provided in conjunction with supportive housing, or (v) safe havens.

ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES

There are six categories of eligible activities:

1. Acquisition of structures for use as supportive housing or in providing supportive services;
2. Rehabilitation of structures for use as supportive housing or in providing supportive services;
3. New construction of buildings for use as supportive housing under limited circumstances;
4. Leasing of structures for use as supportive housing or in providing supportive services;
5. Operating costs of supportive housing; and
6. Supportive services costs provided to homeless persons, such as job training, substance abuse counseling, child care, mental health treatment and case management.

The program provides grants for leasing costs, operating costs and the provision of supportive services for three years. Grants for operating costs are for up to 75 percent for the first two years of the grant, and up to 50 percent of those costs for the next year. The recipient must match the finding provided for acquisition, rehabilitation, and new construction with an equal amount of funds from other sources. Acquisition and rehabilitation funding is limited to \$200,000 (or up to \$400,000 in high cost areas) per structure. New construction funding is limited to \$400,000 per structure.

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS

States, local governments, other governmental entities, private nonprofit organizations, and community mental health associations that are public nonprofit organizations are eligible to compete for grant funds through a national selection process.

**SECTION 8 MODERATE REHABILITATION PROGRAM FOR SINGLE
ROOM OCCUPANCY (SRO) DWELLINGS FOR HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS**

- FACT SHEET -

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Section 8 Moderate Rehabilitation Program for Single Room Occupancy (SRO) Dwellings for Homeless Individuals is to provide rental assistance on behalf of homeless individuals in connection with the moderate rehabilitation of SRO dwellings. Resources to fund the cost of rehabilitating the dwellings must be from other sources. However, the rental assistance covers operating expenses of the SRO housing, including debt service for rehabilitation financing, provided the monthly rental assistance per unit does not exceed the moderate rehabilitation fair market rent for an SRO unit, as established by HUD.

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS

Public housing authorities (PHA) and private non-profit organizations are eligible applicants. Private nonprofit organizations must subcontract with a PHA to administer the SRO assistance. At such time as a system is in place to allow nonprofit applicants to administer the assistance, a subcontract will no longer be required.

ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES

Assistance may only be used for rental assistance and for administering the rental assistance. The assistance will be available for 10 years. A unit to be assisted must need a minimum expenditure of \$3,000 of eligible rehabilitation, including the units prorated share of work to be accomplished on common areas.

SHELTER PLUS CARE

- FACT SHEET -

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Shelter Plus Care program is to provide rental assistance for hard-to-serve homeless persons with disabilities in connection with supportive services funded from sources other than this program. Assistance is targeted primarily to homeless persons with severe mental illness; chronic problems with alcohol, drugs, or both; or persons living with HIV/AIDS or related diseases.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS

The Shelter Plus Care program provides rental assistance through four components. Applicants may request assistance for any component or combination of components:

Tenant-based Rental Assistance (TWA) provides grants for rental assistance over a five-year period. Participants reside in housing of their choice, except that, where necessary to facilitate the coordination of supportive services, grant recipients may require participants to live in a specific area for their entire period of participation or in a specific structure for the first year and in a specific area for the remainder of their period of participation.

Sponsor-based Rental Assistance (SRA) provides grants for rental assistance through contracts with sponsor organizations over a five-year period. A sponsor may be a private, nonprofit organization or a community mental health agency established as a public nonprofit organization. Participants reside in housing owned or leased by the sponsor. Applicants must identify in their applications the nonprofit sponsor(s) and the housing site(s) to be provided.

Project-based Rental Assistance (PRA) provides grants for rental assistance, through contracts between the grant recipient and owners of existing structures, where the owners agree to lease the subsidized units to, or on behalf of participants. Rental subsidies are provided for a period of five or ten years. To be eligible for 10 years of rental subsidies, the owner must complete, at his or her expense, at least \$3,000 of rehabilitation for each unit (including the unit's prorated share of work to be accomplished on common areas or systems), to make the structure decent, safe and sanitary. The rehabilitation must be completed within 12 months of the date of the grant agreement.

The monthly rent per unit for TWA, SRA, and PRA components must be reasonable in comparison with rent for comparable units and HUD assistance may not exceed the difference between existing fair market rent (FMR) established by HUD for units of comparable size, minus the portion of the rent paid by the participant.

EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANTS (ESG) PROGRAM

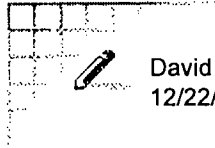
PROGRAM: This program provides grants to states, metropolitan cities, urban counties, and territories according to the formula used for Community Development Block grants (CDBG). Eligible activities include renovation, major rehabilitation, or conversion of buildings for use as emergency shelters or transitional housing for the homeless. With certain limitations, grantees may also spend funds on essential services for the homeless, and homeless prevention efforts. In addition, grantees may spend funds on shelter operating costs such as maintenance, insurance, utilities, rent, and furnishing. To receive a grant must have an approved Consolidated Plan.

PURPOSE: The program is designed to help improve the quality of existing emergency shelters for the homeless, to make available additional shelters and transitional housing, to meet the cost of operating shelters and of providing essential social services to homeless individuals, and to help prevent homelessness.

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS: States, metropolitan cities, urban counties, and territories according to the formula used for Community Development Block Grants (CDBG). If, according to the CDBG, formula, a city or county receives less than .05 percent of each appropriation in any fiscal year, its ESG amount is added to the allocation for the state in which the city or county is located.

City and county grantees must distribute their ESG funds to public agencies and nonprofit recipients for homeless shelter and service activities. States must distribute all of their funds to local governments, or to nonprofit organization with the approval of the local governments.

**PRESIDENT CLINTON ANNOUNCES \$850 MILLION IN ASSISTANCE
TO HELP MORE THAN 330,000 HOMELESS AMERICANS**

BALTIMORE – President Clinton today announced \$850 million in grants to help more than 330,000 homeless Americans get housing, job training, child care, mental health services and substance abuse treatment so they can move from homelessness to self-sufficiency.

The assistance announced today will go to more than 300 communities, all 50 state governments, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and American territories. In addition, more than 1,000 non-profit organizations such as the Salvation Army, Volunteers of America and Catholic Charities will receive funding for homeless assistance programs.

(UNAPPROVED) “These grants will transform the lives of some of the most vulnerable people in our country,” President Clinton said in Baltimore, where he announced the assistance. “In this holiday season, we are giving homeless Americans the most precious gift of all – a brighter future filled with hope and prosperity, instead of despair and poverty. Our assistance will help homeless people across this nation to achieve the American Dream of decent housing, a job with a living wage, and a chance for their children to build successful lives.”

“The President’s policies recognize that if we provide homeless people with the help they need, they can overcome their problems and work their way out of poverty,” Housing and Urban Development Secretary Andrew Cuomo said. “I have met men and women across this nation who would be dead today or would be living on the streets if not for our programs.”

A total of \$700 million of the HUD assistance is targeted to 1,420 long-term programs to help individuals and families permanently end their homeless status, as part of HUD’s Continuum of Care approach to homelessness.

Programs funded by the Continuum of Care grants will provide transitional and permanent housing assistance and will help people overcome problems that can lead to homelessness, such as a lack of basic education and job skills, mental illness and drug addiction. The grants are awarded to states, local governments and non-profit groups based on a number of factors that measure the effectiveness of plans to help homeless people become self-sufficient.

-more-

The remaining \$150 million in funds are for Emergency Shelter Grants that provide food and shelter on a short-term basis to homeless people. These grants are awarded through a formula based on a community's housing and poverty needs. States and cities select projects to receive funding.

"Every homeless person has a story of enormous personal tragedy and incredible hardship," Cuomo said. "Helping these men, women and children rebuild their lives isn't easy, but it's one of the most important investments we can make. It's an investment that says America is the land of opportunity not just for some of us, but for all us."

President Clinton successfully won approval of increased funding for homeless assistance programs to \$975 million in his fiscal 1999 budget. He had proposed an even larger increase that would have boosted funding to \$1.15 billion.

The President's proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2000 will call for a record \$1.125 billion in funding for HUD programs for homeless Americans, including: \$1.025 billion for the same type of grants announced today and \$100 million in rental assistance vouchers under the Section 8 program to enable 18,000 homeless individuals and families to live in subsidized apartments.

HUD has invested nearly \$5 billion in programs to help homeless Americans since President Clinton took office in 1993. That's more than three times as much as the \$1.5 billion HUD spent on homeless assistance programs from the time they were created in 1987 until 1993.

The Continuum of Care, which is the centerpiece of the federal policy on homelessness announced by President Clinton in 1993, stresses permanent solutions to homelessness through comprehensive and collaborative community planning.

Communities submit Continuum of Care plans to HUD that reflect efforts to address the complexities of homelessness through a range of housing and services. The services have a short-term goal of providing emergency assistance and assessment of a homeless person's needs and a long-term goal of helping the person to obtain permanent housing and become self-sufficient.

Cuomo said the Continuum of Care approach has been successful because it brings together non-profit groups, the private sector and local and state governments in a partnership to design local programs to help homeless people become self-sufficient.

This year, the Continuum of Care was one of 25 finalists, out of 1,400 competitors, for the prestigious Innovations in American Government Award that is awarded by the Ford Foundation and the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

A Columbia University study concluded that HUD's homeless policies spelled out in the Continuum of Care "have had a positive impact on communities across the nation" and were an improvement from past efforts that focused on short-term emergency shelter.

STORIES OF HOMELESS PEOPLE WHOSE LIVES WERE TRANSFORMED BY CLINTON ADMINISTRATION HOMELESS ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

Throughout the United States, homeless people have dramatically transformed their lives because of the Clinton Administration's Continuum of Care homeless assistance programs. Many men and women have moved from desperate poverty and life on the streets to jobs and homes of their own with the help of the programs funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Here are five success stories. The formerly homeless people have asked that their full names not be used.

WASHINGTON – As a child, Dorthea was abandoned by her drug-addicted mother, sexually abused by her stepfather and uncle, and beaten by her grandmother. Dropping out of school in the 9th grade, she drank and smoked crack. Dorthea married at age 15. She was a victim of several assaults. When she left the street and arrived at the House of Ruth – a homeless facility funded by HUD – she was dirty and had gone so long without human contact that she could not even carry on a normal conversation. A psychiatrist diagnosed her with depression, psychosis and auditory hallucinations. Dorthea's struggle to gain a stable life was difficult and she relapsed into drug use a few times. Finally, after a year and much hard work, her life began to turn around. Today, Dorthea has her own apartment and a job as a receptionist with a social service agency.

LOS ANGELES – Nancy (not her real first name) was severely injured when her abusive husband poured acid over most her face and upper body. Her husband went to prison and her marriage broke up. With no job, Nancy and her three children soon became homeless. The family was referred to Beyond Shelter in Los Angeles, which is funded by HUD. Beyond Shelter provided the family with emergency food and clothing, helped them find affordable housing and assisted Nancy in obtaining income. In addition, the shelter provided counseling, therapy referral, and connected the disfigured woman to an organization willing to provide her with free plastic surgery this year. Today, Nancy and her children live safely in their own home.

DENVER – Harold was a homeless veteran who lived on the streets for 18 years. The Colorado Department of Human Services used HUD funds to link him to support services such as case management, substance abuse treatment, and group therapy. After two years in these programs, Harold bought a home and reunited with his estranged family. He recently became a grandfather.

NEW ORLEANS – Cindy and her one-year old son spent last Christmas living in an emergency shelter. When Cindy found out about the Unity transitional housing program in New Orleans funded by HUD, she and her son moved there. With housing, child care, and an array of other support services available to her, Cindy was able to secure a job in the health care field with full benefits for her family. She is part of a program to help her become a homeowner.

QUINCY, MA – Two years ago, Bob spent a cold and lonely Christmas living in the “weeds” – the tall marsh reeds – in Quincy, MA. With help of a local shelter funded by HUD called

BALTIMORE, MARYLAND
Summary**

On any given night, it is estimated that over 2,500 men, women, and children are homeless in the City of Baltimore, Maryland with as many as 9,000 persons experiencing homelessness in that city each year.

The Continuum of Care is Baltimore's strategic plan for addressing homelessness. The Continuum was produced by the Baltimore Department of Housing and Community Development Office of Homeless Services in partnership with over 60 non-profit homelessness assistance organizations, government agencies, businesses, philanthropic organizations, and homeless and formerly homeless people. These groups come together through the Mayor's Homeless Relief Advisory Board. Input is also received from numerous other task forces, coalitions and program-specific groups with knowledge and experience regarding services and housing for homeless people.

The Clinton Administration's Continuum of Care policy calls on communities to develop a range of services from outreach and assessment to permanent housing to address the complex needs of homeless Americans. The primary goals of Baltimore's Continuum (listed below) operationalize the Federal Continuum of Care model in a way that reflects unique local needs:

- Provide appropriated accessible services to individuals and families residing in shelters
- Provide facilities that will enable services to be more timely and accessible
- Assist eligible families to access appropriate housing
- Increase skills and income of individuals and families
- Increase private funding of homeless services by foundations and business

Baltimore's 1998 Continuum of Care priorities build on the elements of the Continuum put in place over the past few years. In FY 1997, nearly 18,000 homeless persons were served by Baltimore's Continuum of Care programs. Also, over 1,417 units of permanent housing for homeless persons have been developed. Baltimore's 1998 Continuum of Care priorities focus on the needs of the most disenfranchised members of the homeless population – the chronically mentally ill and those living with HIV/AIDS. Other priority projects will assist families as they transition to independence, single adults as they deal with substance abuse, and those in need of job training and job placement. (*Individual project descriptions attached*).

Based on the high quality of the Baltimore proposal, HUD will provide \$7,296,336 to fund 21 of that city's top priority projects. Baltimore, in turn, has committed to leveraging these funds with \$17,053,826 in additional public and private resources, making the implementation of the Continuum of Care a real Federal-local partnership.

PROJECT #1: Maryland Center for Veteran's Education and Training (MCVET)

The supportive services being provided are designed to assist in the recovery of these veterans from substance abuse and both mental and physical health difficulties. The MCVET program being funded includes outreach services, a drop-in center, transitional housing and single room occupancy (SRO) permanent housing, as well as needed supportive services.

This project will be implemented in conjunction with the Sinai Hospital Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) team.

DESCRIPTION: The purpose of this renewal project is to continue Sinai Hospital's Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) team activities first funded with a Supportive Housing Program grant in 1997. These activities will be implemented in conjunction with the University of Maryland Medical Systems Supplemental Security Income Project as described immediately above (see Project #4).

The case management services to be provided will equip the project's clients with the resources necessary to access appropriate treatment programs, medical care and benefits and, thereby, allow them to successfully remain in permanent housing.

DESCRIPTION: This project will continue to provide critically-needed services and housing to homeless HIV-positive parents and their dependent children. By providing such families with a safe, affordable and well supported place to live, as well as access to the supportive services necessary to maintain the families' well-being, this project will continue to encourage family preservation and the success of the children's development.

PROJECT #8: Project PLASE SRO

AWARD: \$227,400

PROJECT SPONSOR: Project PLASE, Inc.

PROJECT ADDRESS: 1812 Maryland Ave., Baltimore, MD

TYPE: Section 8 Moderate Rehabilitation Single Room Occupancy Program

DESCRIPTION: This new project will create five (5) Single Room Occupancy (SRO) units for currently homeless men and women, especially those with HIV/AIDS by providing 10 years of rental assistance for five currently homeless individuals. Most residents of this permanent housing will also evidence a history of mental illness and/or substance abuse. Importantly, the specific neighborhood in which the project will be located in mid-town Baltimore has already voted its support for the use of the currently unoccupied structures for permanent housing for this homeless population.

PROJECT #9: Project PLASE AIDS Housing

PROJECT SPONSOR: Project PLASE, Inc.

PROJECT LOCATION: 1812 Maryland Ave., Baltimore, MD

PROJECT TYPE: Supportive Housing Program

DESCRIPTION: This new project will fund the rehabilitation of the five Section 8 Moderate Rehabilitation SRO units being created with the rental assistance provided under Project #8 (see immediately above). This project is, therefore, essential to the implementation of Project PLASE's five (5) unit Section 8 SRO project and ensures that the SRO housing will meet all required housing quality standards.

PROJECT # 10: Dayspring House

PROJECT SPONSOR: Episcopal Housing Corporation

TYPE: Supportive Housing Program

The women will receive substance-abuse treatment at the Johns Hopkins Hospital Comprehensive Women's Center and will be required to follow an individual service program developed case managers detailing a path to recovery and self-sufficiency. HUD funds will be used to construct a new building with 9 two-bedroom and 9 three-bedroom units with a capacity of 72 persons.
