Items Sought in Lawsuit Are Gone, Simpson Says

LOS ANGELES, April 7 (AP) — O.J. Simpson has told a judge that he does not have his Heisman trophy, his Chevy Suburban and dozens of other items sought by the plaintiffs in his civil lawsuit.

In papers filed on Friday and made public today, Simpson explained why some items were not in his home when Los Angeles County sheriff's deputies arrived to seize them on March 28.

Simpson said that some of the 108 items are being held in trust for his children, Sydney and Justin, and some were given to his ex-wife Marguerite in their divorce in 1978.

Most of the luxury items on the list, such as diamond jewelry, fur coats and art objects, are "the property of Nicole Brown Simpson and subject to her estate," Simpson said.

Simpson was acquitted of murdering Ms. Simpson and her friend Ronald L. Goldman but was recently held liable for damages in a civil trial. The families of Ms. Simpson and Goldman, who sued Simpson, were awarded \$33.5 million by a civil court jury on Feb. 10.

High School Students Move Against Joe Camel

GALT, Calif., April 7 (AP) — Angry over a cigarette billboard that can be seen from the school, students at Galt High School are bringing down Joe Camel.

The students collected hundreds of petition signatures and wrote letters to persuade an advertising company to remove the cartoon mascot of Camel cigarettes from its perch at Highway 99 and Simmerhorn Road, about 30 miles south of Sacramento. The cigarette advertisement is to come down on Tuesday and be replaced with one for ice cream.

"I think these people are terrific," Anthony Gora, a Galt City Councilman, said of the campaign's leaders. "They did what the city couldn't do."

Julie Kim, a spokeswoman for the Eller Media Company of Oakland, the advertising company, said the company had a policy of not placing alcohol or tobacco advertising within sight of a school.

Once students invited company officials to the school and demonstrated that the billboard was visible, Ms. Kim said, Eller arranged to remove the sign when contractual details could be worked out.

150 Volunteers in Texas Search for Missing Girl

FRIENDSWOOD, Tex., April 7 (AP) — About 150 volunteers searched rural areas of Harris and Galveston Counties today for a 12-year-old girl who disappeared on Thursday.

The girl, Laura Kate Smither, was last seen by family members when she left home for a quarter-mile jog, the authorities said. Over the weekend, a Coast Guard helicopter with heat-sensing equipment joined the search. On Sunday more than 300 volunteers searched north and south of Friendswood, which is about halfway between Houston and Galveston. Because searchers do not know whether foul play was involved, the leader of the search, Michael E. Barker, urged precautions.

A \$50,000 reward has been offered for information about the girl's whereabouts, Mr. Barker said.

Van Stopped by Police Is Full of Illegal Aliens

SEELEY, Calif., April 7 (AP) — Officers who stopped a van in Imperial County, in the state's southeast corner, discovered 29 illegal immigrants crowded inside, the California Highway Patrol said today.

The van was pulled over about 1 A.M. on Sunday on Interstate 8 after an officer saw a large number of people in the back of the vehicle. The immigrants were returned to Mexico, said Vic Waggoner, assistant agent in charge of the United States Border Patrol office in El Centro.

Investigators Reach Plane Crash in Canyon

GRAND CANYON NATIONAL PARK, Ariz., April 7 (AP) — Investigators on snowshoes reached a remote area near the North Rim of the Grand Canyon today to examine the wreckage of a small plane that crashed last week.

A helicopter spotted the missing Cessna 210 on Sunday. The plane had radioed it was in trouble on Wednesday night. James and Darla Eldredge of Salt Lake City are believed to have died in the crash.

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
