The Government of Guam.

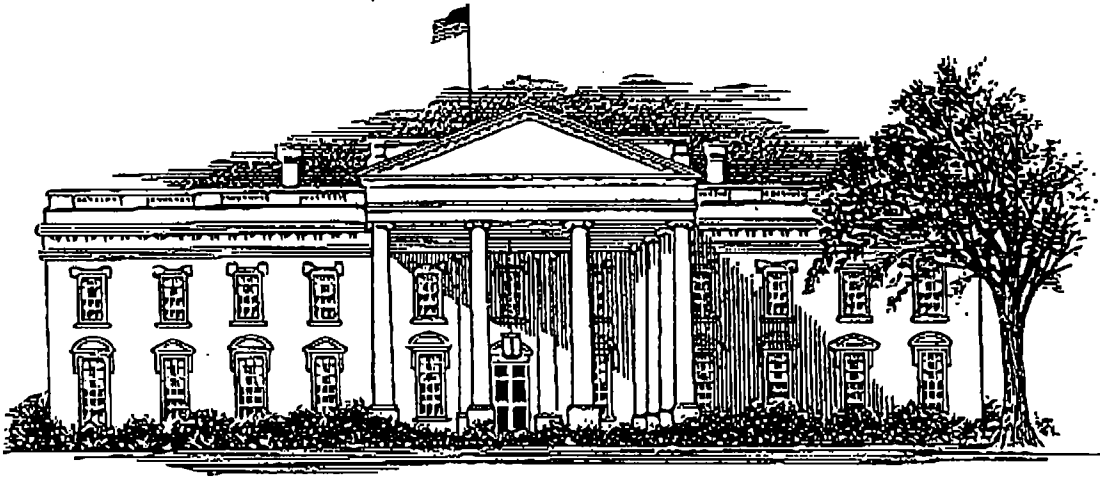
BACKGROUND:

PROPOSED SCRIPT GUAM CENTENNIAL VIDEO

Hafa Adai (Hafah-day),

I am pleased to join all those celebrating the Centennial of the relationship between the United States and Guam. And, I am privileged to pay tribute to the people of the territory on this occasion for their many contributions to our country.

Our flag was first raised on Guam in war 100 years ago today. In the years since, the Island and its residents have provided a vital service to our national security and international relations. You have contributed to the cause of world peace.

Guam has been an invaluable part of the U.S. security presence in the Asian-Pacific region. The island "Where America's day Begins" has hosted bases that are a crucial forward presence for us in the Western Pacific.

I know that hosting these bases has had costs as well as benefits for the people of Guam. As the Commander-in-Chief, I thank the Chamorro people for sharing their land with the rest of the country in this way.

On behalf of your fellow citizens, I also thank you for your sacrifices as individuals to our nation.

United States citizenship had not yet been granted when the island was seized in World War Two. But the loyalty -- and bravery -- of Guamanians during the occupation was unflinching . . . and should never be forgotten.

Guamanians hid American flags . . . and Americans.

Many were subjected to horrible punishment. And some paid for their patriotism with their lives.

They were forced out of their homes and forced to work for the occupiers.

Much of the development on the Island, including the capital of Agana (Ah-gahn-ya), was destroyed in the liberation campaign.

I honor the suffering that the Guamanian people endured.

In the aftermath of the Island's liberation, many of the people of Guam willingly gave up their land so that our country could pursue and preserve peace in the region.

My Administration is working with the Congress and Governor Gutierrez's Administration to transfer land no longer needed by the military to the community for its benefit and growth. The

process is slow, but I am committed to such transfers.

Our military activities on Guam are vital. But, our country's primary interest in the Island concerns the welfare of its people -- our fellow citizens. Guam's status is territorial but it is a member of the U.S. family nonetheless.

You deserve to be treated equitably and sensitively in policy and consulted as it is made. Your unique situation, needs, and proposals should be fully considered. Those of us in federal office have an obligation to try to ensure this because you do not have votes in your national government.

I have had my Administration review Guam's Commonwealth proposals, explore alternatives with your representatives where necessary, and offer the best we can. It is now up to Congress to act to give you final federal positions. I hope it will.

You also have the right to choose a fully self-governing status if you want one.

I am dedicated to addressing your aspirations and helping you develop the territory's status in ways that it can be. This is especially warranted because the Chamorro people have never had the opportunity to choose their political status.

Your Governor and my friend, Carl Gutierrez, and your very able Delegate, Robert Underwood, have helped me understand these matters. I work very closely with them.

They have invited me to visit the Island. I hope to accept their invitation soon.

strong supporters of the President, have tried to get him to stop on Guam during each of his Asian-Pacific trips. Most of Guam's citizens think they are generally ignored because of the territory's lack of votes, small population, and distance from the States. Many are disappointed that the Administration is not willing to agree to most of the changes in Federal policy that the territory proposed in a 'Commonwealth' bill, in spite of the President's commitments since 1992 to work for a Federal-insular agreement on it. Some see the Centennial as particularly significant because the Island, after a century of U.S. control, is still subject to governing in most matters by a government in which it lacks a vote.
