**PRESIDENT WILLIAM J. CLINTON
RADIO ADDRESS ON DOMESTIC AGENDA
SKANEATELES, NEW YORK
September 4, 1999**

Good morning. I am speaking to you today from Waterman Elementary School in Skaneateles, New York. After vacations well spent with family and friends, children here and across America are getting back to the basics of reading, writing, and arithmetic. As members of Congress return from their summer recess, Washington, too, must get back to basics. Today, I want to talk about what we must do to get an "A" on the assignments given us by the American people.

First we must show we have learned the lessons of Littleton. In the wake of that terrible tragedy, and with each subsequent shooting, I have asked the Congress to protect our children – by passing common-sense measures to prevent youth violence and keep guns out of the wrong hands. A full month has passed since House and Senate conferees met to work on this legislation. Nearly five months have passed since the shootings at Columbine. I am still waiting – America is still waiting – for Congress to act. It should not take another tragedy to shake them from their summer slumber.

Today, I am sending a letter to the Republican leadership urging that Congress take immediate action. It is time for Congress to send me a balanced, bipartisan juvenile crime bill that strengthens – not weakens – our gun laws. This legislation should close the gun-show loophole, not open new ones. It should require child safety locks for guns. It should ban the importation of large capacity ammunition clips. Congress should send it to me without delay. If they pass it, I will sign it. And our children will know that they are our first and most pressing priority.

Regrettably, the majority in Congress has had little time for anything but its risky and reckless tax plan. As I have said, I do not believe it is the right course for America. I do not believe we should squander our surplus, imperil our prosperity, or jeopardize our children's future by forcing crippling cuts in education. With yesterday's news that unemployment is down to [TK] percent. . . with the number of new jobs up to 19 million. . . it is more clear than ever that we have turned the economy around and should not do anything to risk it.

Now is the time to meet our national interests for the long term – not to reward special interests in the short term. We should pay down the debt, save Social Security, ~~and~~ ~~and~~ modernize Medicare, and invest in our people. We can do that and still have sensible tax cuts, and still extend our prosperity into the places it has yet to reach. That is what I have proposed. That is what the American people have told us they want. And that is what I will work to achieve.

As America goes back to school, and Congress goes back to work, our elected representatives have other important assignments:

To protect the 160 million Americans who rely on managed care, Congress should pass a strong, enforceable patients' bill of rights. There is a bipartisan bill ready for action. The AMA has endorsed it. More than 200 medical and consumer organizations have endorsed it. It is high time for Congress to act.

With the number of students at historic levels, Congress should make the investments in education that our children deserve. Here, again, the legislation is ready. As part of my balanced budget I have proposed to build new schools and fix old ones across our land. Congress should pass that proposal; and it should fulfill the commitment it made to hire 100,000 well prepared teachers to reduce class size in the early grades.

Preventing youth violence. Paying down the debt. Saving Social Security and Medicare. Protecting patients' rights. Bringing investment to struggling communities and investing in education. These are big assignments. But in every one of these areas, there is legislation ready for approval – ready for my signature – as soon as Congress proves ready to act. If we work together, in the weeks and months ahead, we can make this season not only one of action, but of real achievement for the American people.

**PRESIDENT WILLIAM JEFFERSON CLINTON
VIDEOTAPED REMARKS TO THE FORTUNE GLOBAL FORUM
SHANGHAI, CHINA
SEPTEMBER 7, 1999**

[To be played in Shanghai on September 27 or 28]

I am delighted to have the opportunity to join all of you today for the FORTUNE Global Forum in Shanghai. With nearly 500 CEO's from around the world and many distinguished participants from China, this is truly an extraordinary gathering.

I was in Shanghai a little more than a year ago. I saw first-hand how the oldest civilization on Earth is becoming young again. It's not hard to marvel at the extraordinary pace of change, or to see in Shanghai the tremendous potential for China's future.

The United States sees China's continuing economic growth as beneficial to our nation and the world. China's progress ensures the well-being of nearly a quarter of the world's population. Its growing openness to the world can bring better jobs, better pay, and greater prosperity to the American people – and it can contribute to the global store of knowledge. That is why I believe it is vital to make China a full and constructive member of the international trading system.

As I said to business leaders in Shanghai last July and as all of you know well, China faces major challenges in advancing economic progress beyond the present point – including more restructuring of state-owned enterprises, developing a transparent legal and regulatory system, preserving the environment as the economy grows, and providing greater openness and accountability of its government and freedom of expression to its people. The United States is prepared to work with China in meeting all these challenges.

The extraordinary group that has gathered for the FORTUNE Global Forum both reflects your confidence in China's future and will help assure that this future will meet its great promise. Thank you and I wish you every success in your meeting.

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
