SUBJECT: Commission to Support Law Enforcement

Esteemed Colleagues:

As you may or may not know, one of the consensus provisions of the crime bill that we won't be re-visiting is a provision to appoint a Commission to Support Law Enforcement. This commission, which was originally included in the scaled-down 1990 crime bill and has already been funded, was re-authorized in the 1994 crime bill with a clause requiring that appointments be made within 90 days of the bill's enactment, or Dec. 13, 1994. Although its membership is quite limited and most of its members are to be appointed (in equal parts) by the Republican and Democratic leadership on the Hill, it is a very important provision to the many law enforcement groups that helped us pass the crime bill. Moreover, since we have become so popular with the various groups, we and Justice are already getting many request to appoint people -- and certainly more than the essentially 2 slots we're allowed.

It's my understanding that Justice leg. affairs would like to take the lead on working with the Hill to make sure there is no overlap, and that all our friendly police groups get a rep on the commission. This makes considerable sense to me, and I would recommend that all of us in the White House who may have an interest in this matter meet to make sure we're in agreement about how to proceed w/Justice -- or how to give guidance to the Justice folks as they proceed on our behalf.

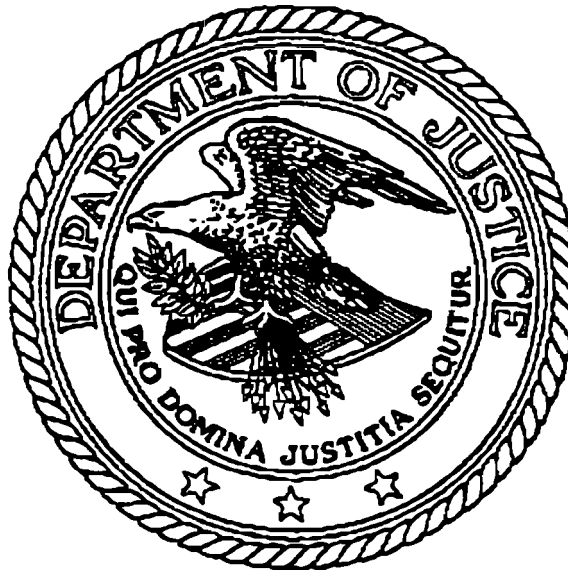
Thus, may I suggest a brief meeting before the week is up? How about Thursday at 2pm in Room 211.

The President today announced his intent to appoint Jamie S. Gorelick, Matt L. Rodriguez, and Robert T. Scully to be members of the National Commission to Support Law Enforcement.

Jamie S. Gorelick, of Maryland, is currently serving as deputy attorney general for the United States Department of Justice. The Deputy Attorney General's Office supervises and directs all organizational units concerning criminal matters of the Department. Ms. Gorelick previously served as general counsel for the Department of Defense. Before joining the Clinton Administration, Ms. Gorelick was a partner with the Washington firm of Miller, Cassidy, Larocca & Lewin where she specialized in civil and criminal litigation, including grand jury and agency investigations in health care, environmental issues, and other areas. Ms. Gorelick holds a J.D. from Harvard Law School and is a graduate of the Radcliffe College of Harvard University.

Matt L. Rodriguez, of Illinois, is Superintendent of the Chicago Police Department, the second largest police agency in the nation, and is a thirty year veteran of the police force. Superintendent Rodriguez is Chairman of the Major Cities Chiefs Organization. He is also a member of the Civil Rights Committee, Community Policing Committee and the Communications Committee of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. In addition, he is the Chairman of the Board of the Hispanic Institute of Law Enforcement, and a member of the Crime Bill Task Force of the U.S. Conference of Mayors. Superintendent Rodriguez is a member of the adjunct faculty of the University of Illinois at Chicago. He has masters and bachelors degrees from Roosevelt University.

Robert T. Scully, of Michigan, is executive director of the National Association of Police Organizations (NAPO), located in Washington, D.C.
